YESTERDAY'S BURLINGTON MAIL.

Boston, June 30.

By the arrival on Wednesday last, of the brig Favorite, Captain Stacey, 37 days from Lisbon, we have been favoured with papers of that city to the 16th May.

They speak favourably of the state of the combined English and Portuguese troops—that they had been so greatly increased and disciplined as to afford the strongest assurance of safety to the inhabitants—that business had revived; and the public houses again opened for the amusement and accommodation of the people;—that the Theatre was opened, on the 14th May, for the first time since the departure of the Prince Regent. Of the military operations of the armies, and other information, the following sketch from the latest date, will furnish examples:—(B. Gazette.)

Lisbon, May 16.—“Authentic letters from Lamego, of the date of the 9th current (May) affirm that the Portuguese have rendered themselves masters of the passage of Regos, and of other strong positions on the opposite side of the Douero, and that our troops in consequence have a free passage to the other side of the river.—The French have not yet given us battle. “By a vessel which sailed from Oporto for Brazil, and which has been obliged to enter the Tagus, we are assured, that the French have retired from Amaraura, to take a position on the Douero.—In a few days we expect to give the detail of an action, which cannot fail to take place.

“The captain of the same ship reports, that the province of Galicia had recovered its liberty, that the French are shut up in the fort of Coruna, and that the troops of Romana surround them, and that there is no doubt that they will be obliged to surrender in a few days. Copy of a dispatch from General Berresford to his Excellency Pereira Forja.

“I have the honour to communicate to your Excellency, that on the 9th of May, I had caused a detachment to advance to take a favourable position between Amaranta and Mezaio Frio, which are occupied by the French, having met with no other enemy than a small detachment, who fled. I had an opportunity of placing four pieces of cannon in an excellent position. I ordered a constant fire upon the division of the enemy, who at the end of two hours beat a retreat in great disorder. Major Harding, whom I had sent to observe the effect of this fire, reports to have seen the French carry off 5 waggons of wounded. Their force consisted of 250 infantry and 500 cavalry, commanded by General Loisson. I have ordered a reinforcement, commanded by the General Francisco de Silveira to keep this position, and to cut off the communication between Amaranta and Mezaio Frio. The conduct of the enemy was horrible, having burnt all the villages and huts in his retreat.

(Signed) BRESFORD. “Head Quarters at Lamego, 11th May.” Copy of a letter, dated the 11th of May, at the advanced posts. “I have the honor of informing your Excellency that the French have abandoned Mezaio Frio. I shall do my utmost to maintain the good position I have taken.—By the advice that I have received I can say that the French have lost 30 cavalry and 30 infantry, and that they have had a great number wounded, and have abandoned one ammunition wagon and a great quantity of waggons loaded with provisions.

(Signed) FRANCISCO DE SILVEIRA.” Copy of a letter from his Excellency M. Villiers, Minister of his Britannick Majesty, to his Excellency Pereira Forja, May 11th. “I have this instant received the news that the troops commanded by Sir Arthur Wellesley, have completely beaten the French to the number of 4000.—The 16th Portuguese regiment distinguished themselves.—We have obliged the enemy to abandon their position.”

The following article is received in a letter from Lisbon, dated on the 17th May:—“There have been great rejoicings here to day, on account, as I understand, by the Guards, of the French being defeated at, or near, Oporto.”

In confirmation of the above Intelligence, Capt. Stacey verbally reports, that the day previous to his departure, (18th May) official accounts were received of the retaking of Oporto by the English and Portuguese troops;—that the French had retreated some miles from the city; but their communications with Spain being completely cut off, and surrounded by a superior force, news was momentarily expected of their unconditional surrender; and that great rejoicings and illuminations had taken place in consequence of this agreeable intelligence:—Capt. Stacey also reports, that the armies were in high spirits; and that the greatest good will and unanimity existed between the English and Portuguese armies.

Extract of a letter from Lisbon, dated May 17. “We have just received the glorious news, that Oporto is retaken by the English, the retreat of the French is cut off, and their surrender as prisoners of war inevitable.”

Lisbon, May 16. “FROM OPORTO, May 15.—“I have the satisfaction to announce to you the restoration of this city. The combined Portuguese and English army arrived yesterday morning at Villa Nova, and took immediate measures for crossing the Douro; though the French had that morning blown up the bridge. The French had troops at various points on the banks of the Douro, but by a ruse de guerre, the English succeeded in diverting their attention from the main body, and by skillful management, succeeded without any material loss. Some fighting succeeded, and the French were compelled to retreat with the loss of some men, 3 pieces of artillery, and 2 howitzers.

SEVILLE, April 26.—The would-be King of Spain, Joseph Bonaparte, has addressed a letter to the Supreme Junta, in this city lamenting the contest in which Spain is engaged, and the misfortunes it has produced; and proposing that commissioners should be appointed to negotiate for tranquilizing the country. The Supreme Junta has returned an answer full of spirit and patriotism: It attributes all the calamities of Spain to the criminal ambition of Bonaparte; and tranquility will be restored, when Joseph, and his invading troops shall have quit Spanish territory; and have restored to Spain its legitimate Sovereign. The Supreme Junta have sworn to accept no other terms.

Boston, July 1.—Letters from Martinique state, that the British expedition against Gaudaloupe was in forwardness.

NOVA-SCOTIA.

HALIFAX, JUNE 18.—The Provincial Assembly met on Wednesday agreeable to his Excellency's Proclamation, for the dispatch of business.

About one o'clock his Excellency Sir GEORGE PREVOST, Bart. proceeded to the Council Chamber; where being seated, a Message was dispatched, requiring the attendance of the Representative Body.—The SPEAKER and Members of the House attended accordingly.—when his Excellency was pleased to deliver the following Speech:

MR. PRESIDENT and Gentlemen of His Majesty's COUNCIL: MR. SPEAKER, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:—The honor of His Majesty's Government, and the best interests of the Province, have made it my duty to convene the General Assembly, perhaps at a moment when your private concerns require your presence in your respective countries; I shall therefore only recommend for your consideration, such business as is immediately connected with the cause of this meeting.

I have directed the Treasurer to lay before you an Account of the Receipts and expenditures of the Revenue, granted to His Majesty, since the last settlement of the Public Accounts, and the Secretary of the Province, will, by my orders, present to you an estimate of such services, as I consider necessary to be provided for, during the present session.

If in the course of your deliberations you recommend to me any immediate object, which you view as likely to conduce to the further prosperity and welfare of the Province, I shall give to the same a very ready and serious consideration.

MR. SPEAKER, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly: I fully confide in your wisdom and liberality, to make such provision for the support of His Majesty's government, and other exigencies, as I have deemed necessary for those services.

Gentlemen of the COUNCIL, Gentlemen of the ASSEMBLY: As it is unquestionably for the public interest, as well as for your particular convenience, to expedite the business of this Session, I rely on your assiduity and harmony in the discharge of your respective duties, and I assure you of my ready concurrence in all measures originating in public good, and tending to the real advantage of the Province.

The Speaker and the House then retired to the Assembly Room; and Messrs. Hutchinson, Robie and Pearson, were nominated a Committee to draft an address, in reply to his Excellency's Speech.

Friday at twelve o'clock, the Speaker and House of Assembly waited on his Excellency with the following Address: To His Excellency Lieutenant General Sir GEORGE PREVOST, Bart. Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief in and over the Province of Nova-Scotia, and its Dependencies, &c. &c.

We, his Majesty's faithful subjects the Representatives of His Loyal Province of Nova-Scotia, beg leave to offer our sincere thanks for your Excellency's Speech at the opening of this Session of the General Assembly. Sensible that the honor of his Majesty's government, and the best interests of the Province, have rendered it necessary to convene the General Assembly at this period, we shall cheerfully submit to any inconveniences which we may suffer in our private concerns, by our absence from our respective countries.

We shall take into our immediate consideration, the public accounts and estimate, which your Excellency has been pleased to order to be laid before the Assembly, and devote our constant endeavours to effect, with harmony and expedition, the important object of our present meeting. Your Excellency may rely on the continual disposition of the House of Assembly, to make a liberal provision for the support of his Majesty's government, and for all other exigencies of the public service. Should it appear necessary to bring forward any business immediately conducive to the interest of the Province, we shall do so, in the fullest confidence of its obtaining your Excellency's ready concurrence.

ANSWER. Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the Assembly, The assurances contained in your Address are grateful to my feeling: such a ready participation of my views for the honor of his Majesty's government, and the best interests of the Province, must render the performance of my duty a personal gratification.

On Saturday at Eleven o'clock, his Excellency the Lieutenant Governor went to the Council Chamber, and soon after sent a message to the House by Mr. Secretary GEORGE, requiring its attendance in the Council Chamber.—The House attended accordingly: when his Excellency was pleased to give his assent to the following Bills:—

An Act for applying certain Monies therein mentioned, for the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and nine, and for appropriating such part of the supplies granted in the last Session of the General Assembly, as are not already appropriated by the Laws or Acts of the Province. An Act, in addition to an Act, passed in the last Session of the General Assembly, entitled, An Act to regulate the expenditure of Monies hereafter to be appropriated for the service of Roads and Bridges.

An Act, to extend the provisions of an Act, passed in the forty-sixth year of the reign of his present Majesty, entitled, An Act to encourage the raising of Bread Corn on new Lands. After which, His Excellency addressed the Legislature as follows:—

MR. PRESIDENT, and Gentlemen of His Majesty's Council, Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly, The harmony and assiduity with which the public service has been performed, cannot fail to produce the most beneficial effects, by promoting the honor and prosperity of the Province, and enable me to consult your convenience by affording you a recess, that you may attend to those private concerns, which at this season of the year require your immediate superintendance.

I return you my thanks for the liberal and wise provision you have made for the services I recommended at the opening of this Session; as well as for the personal testimony I have received of your consideration of the services performed by His Majesty's Forces lately employed in wresting from France a possession, for the preservation of which her Government had made unceasing sacrifices and evinced extreme solicitude.

I sincerely hope that you will find prosperity, peace and loyalty prevailing throughout the Province; and that those invaluable blessings will be ever promoted and secured by a zealous attention on every occasion, to the best interest of the Country. GEORGE PREVOST. Afterwards the President of His Majesty's Council, by His Excellency's command, declared the Assembly prorogued to the 6th day of September next.

THE QUEBEC GAZETTE.

QUEBEC: THURSDAY, JULY 13, 1809.

Since our last, several vessels have arrived from England which sailed subsequently to our former intelligence. The Neptune, Capt. Kirkus, we are informed, has brought late papers, but we have not been able to procure them in time for this paper. We understand they contain the confirmation of the capture of Oporto by Sir A. Wellesley.

The sum of the intelligence from Germany is that there had been no battle subsequent to that of the 22d of April; but that Bonaparte had entered Vienna, the Archduke Charles still remaining in Bohemia: that the Emperor of Russia had issued an Ukase ordering all his subjects to retire from the Austrian dominions; and it was positively stated in the French papers that he had declared War against Austria. Commotions continued in the North of Germany, and the Captain reports that it was understood that Prussia had joined Austria.

By the last accounts from Spain it seems as if the French were again preparing to retire behind the Ebro.
