ALLIED TROOPS ROLL HUNS BACK IN SWIFT ADVANCE TOWARD ROME

Bridgehead Established By Canucks Across Melfa

British Troops of 8th Army Capture Aquino and Poles Seize Piedmonte, Last Remaining Strongpoints of Once-Vaunted Hitler Line—Fifth Army Troops Occupy Littoria Southeast of Cisterna.

Naples, May 26.—(P)—Allied forces rolled back the Germans today in swift new advances toward Rome at both ends of the Italian battle line.

At the Eastern end of the active front, British troops of the 8th Army captured Aquino and Polish troops seized Piedmonte, the last remaining strongpoints of the once-vaunted Hitler line, and troops of the Canadian Corps established a bridgehead across the Melfa River, in the Liri Valley 13 miles West of Cassino.

Cisterna, which had constituted one of the kingpins of the enemy's line around the Anzio Beachhead, fell yesterday after a savage four-hour battle in which heavy casualties were inflicted on the defenders. American infantry and armor had been battering the town for three days.

Southeast of Cisterna, 5th Army troops occupied Littoria, Mussolini's model town in the Pontine Marshes, without opposition.

The Canadian Division commanded by Maj.-Gen. B. M. Hoffmeister, consolidated its positions on both sides of the Melfa River while troops of the 1st Canadian Division under Maj.-Gen. Chris Vokes also consolidated its positions nearby.

Front-line dispatches indicated that it was units of the 1st Division which captured the strongpoint of Pontecorvo Wednesday and presumably the 1st Division was established in or near that town.

The Canadian push compelled the Germans to pull out of Aquino yesterday and withdraw Northwest across highway No. 6 towards the Town of Roccasecca, Douglas Amaran, Canadian Press war correspondent, said. Presumably also it was this push which forced the Germans to give up Piedmonte, six miles Northeast of Pontecorvo.

New Burn Fluid Used On Victims

Hamilton, Ont., May 26.—(P)—Dr. Miles G. Brown, Superintendent of the Hamilton General Hospital, said last night that a new "burn fluid" developed recently at the University of Western Ontario at London, was used on all victims of the fire here Wednesday which claimed nine lives and resulted in burns and injuries to 34 others.

Dr. Brown said the hospital had been testing the new treatment for the university and it had given "remarkable results."

"Only Hamilton general hospital and the hospital at London are using it so far," Dr. Brown said. "But when the tests are completed there is no doubt that its use will be universal."

"Fortunately," he said, "we had a sufficient supply on hand to treat all the emergencies from the fire (at the Moose Hall yesterday) but I have wired London for more of the fluid." He said the fluid contains sulphathiazole, one of the "sulphas" which have proved so effective in cases of infection.

Tar Sands Development In Alberta Subject Of Parliamentary Debate

Ottawa, May 26.—(P)—Now a hardy annual in Parliamentary debates, the Athabasca, Alta., tar sands development had its day in the House yesterday.

The debate developed thus:

1. Resources Minister Crerar said the Dominion Government was making "an honest effort" to find out whether commercial development of the sands for oil production was justified.

2. John R. MacNichol (P.C., Toronto-Davenport) said he was not satisfied with what had been done by the Government and felt there had been waste of money. He said there should be a Parliamentary committee to study the development.

3. J. M. Deane (L., Athabaska) said Hon. W. A. Fallow, Alberta Minister of Public Works, had criticized the Dominion Government operations at the tar sands on information given him "by a lot of drunk men in the hotel at Edmonton."

4. C. E. Johnston (S.C., Bow River) said Mr. Crerar failed to deny one of the statements made by Mr. Fallow in the Alberta Legislature. A Royal Commission should be established to examine the charges made by Mr. Fallow, for the Alberta Minister had accused the Federal Government of sending a survey party

CHALOULT SAYS QUEBEC PEOPLE ARE UNDERPAID

States Residents of Province "Victims of Social Injustice"—Declares Wage Rate in Ontario for Similar Work Far Greater.

Quebec, May 25.—(P)—Rene Chaloult rose on a question of privilege in the Legislative Assembly today, and protested against "the social injustice of which the people of the Province of Quebec are victims," and touched off a debate on the subject.

The Nationalist member for Lotbiniere was answered by Premier Godbout, with Opposition Leader Maurice Duplessis and Fisheries Minister Bienvenue joining in the discussion.

Mr. Chaloult said residents of Quebec received less pay than those of Ontario for similar work, and quoted average weekly salaries from Federal statistics of 1941, showing \$26.14 for an average resident of Quebec and \$29.39 for Ontario.

He said Quebec was "in a state of inferiority in all spheres, and French-Canadians some day will revolt against that social injustice."

Premier Godbout said the Lotbiniere member was "unfair" and that the average of salaries "does not indicate anything because the salary is relative to the cost of living which is lower in Quebec. He added that Quebec had made more progress in the last five years than any other province.

Mr. Godbout said French-Canadians "have not entered the war for a foreign cause, as the Lotbiniere members keeps on telling the population, but for their own cause, to protect their national and religious liberties."

Canada belongs to all Canadians and I would like French-Canadians to have their share by winning the respect of the others."

Mr. Duplessis said that for the past five years Liberal governments in Ottawa and Quebec "followed a policy of centralization placing a stranglehold on the provincial social and economic resources."

He added that decentralization was "a timely necessity" and had always been advocated by the Union National Party.

A proof that salaries are higher for similar work in Ontario than in Quebec, he said, is the fact that 75 per cent of Toronto residents are property owners while the proportion is only 10 per cent in Quebec.

SAYS NO TRACE OF ARSON FOUND IN QUEBEC FIRE

Mayor Lucien Borne Declares There Would Be No Reason to Denounce Population of Quebec Even if Evidence of Crime Found.

Quebec, May 26.—The start of a fire at the Jewish Synagogue is "very regrettable but nothing yet proves a crime was committed and even if so it would be no reason to denounce the population of Quebec," Mayor Lucien Borne today told the City Administrative Committee.

Fire, described by H. H. Caisserman, National Secretary of the Canadian Jewish Congress, as "an act of arson against a house of worship," damaged the newly-built uptown Synagogue here Sunday, a few hours before the building was scheduled to be consecrated. The consecration ceremony went on after firemen brought the blaze under control.

"Friends of order and liberty, our citizens disapprove in advance of any attempt to infringe upon the free exercise of worship and all individual rights granted by the law to all those living in our country," Mayor Borne said, adding: "But in virtue of those same principles, they cannot be made responsible for crimes committed in their city, above all when it is not yet proved that a crime was committed and who are the perpetrators."

"An inquiry is going on. If it is proved that the fire was set deliberately and if the guilty persons are found, those criminals will be punished according to the law. Meanwhile, Quebecers protest with energy against any attempt to hold them responsible for a crime they have not committed and which they are the first to condemn."

ACUTE MANPOWER PROBLEM IN U. S.

Chicago, May 26.—(P)—The United States' manpower problem is critical, says Lt.-Gen. Brehom Somervell, but it must be solved and he suggests that if we have to close the night clubs, let's lock them up—and the poolrooms and bowling alleys with them."

And the Commanding General of the Army Service Forces said in a speech last night, entertainers who have lost their jobs in night clubs because of a new tax law should find no difficulty in getting work in war industries.

Hamilton Death Toll Now Nine

Hamilton, Ont., May 26.—Two women died of burns in hospital today, bringing to nine the death toll in the fire at Moose Hall here Tuesday night when dairy employees were holding a dance.

Those who died today were Mrs. Hazel Lindsay and Mrs. James Muir. Previous victims were Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Numbers, Mr. and Mrs. William Cleland, Mr. and Mrs. William W. Egan and Mrs. Roy Martin.

Of the thirty-four injured four are still in critical condition.

C. L. Snyder, Deputy Attorney-General of Ontario, announced at Toronto yesterday that "a wide-open investigation" would be held into the blaze, cause of which has not yet been determined. The blaze started on the main floor and quickly swept the stairway, trapping the dancers.

8,500 JAPS IN MANIPUR AREA REPORTED DEAD

Japanese Have Failed to Penetrate Allied Position on Southwest Edge of Imphal Plain.

Kandy, Ceylon, May 26.—(P)—Allied Headquarters estimated today that a total of 8,500 Japanese troops have been killed in the Manipur area in Northeastern India, where heavy fighting was said to be continuing in the Bishnupur sector Southwest of Imphal.

Additional heavy losses are being inflicted on the invaders in this fighting, Headquarters said.

Despite all attempts, a communiqué declared, the Japanese have failed to penetrate Allied positions on the Southwest edge of the Imphal Plain and have been thrown back in disorder on the Tamu-Palel road, leaving 200 killed and abandoning eight machineguns.

Chungking, May 26.—(P)—Allied troops have foiled a Japanese attempt to reinforce the garrison at besieged Myitkyina in Northern Burma, ambushing a relief column approaching from Nankai to the West of the city, a communiqué from Allied North Burma headquarters announced today.

In the Mogaung Valley the Chinese 22nd Division was credited with further advances against Japanese positions Southeast of Malakwang.

Northwest of Myitkyina, meanwhile, Allied troops continued to exert pressure on the Japanese garrison, while directly North of the city 52 Japanese were killed by attacking Chinese troops, the bulletin declared.

WAR BULLETINS

London.—A broadcast German communique today claimed that a Soviet air attack on a German convoy off Northern Norway resulted in Nazi fighters shooting down 69 out of 80 attacking aircraft. Another plane was brought down by escort vessels in the convoy, the communique said.

London.—The Nazis who usually describe the retreats of their troops as "disengaging movements," acknowledged today in a Berlin broadcast that "German troops had to retreat" in the Cisterna area in Italy under a heavy tank assault.

Washington.—President Roosevelt today called an international monetary conference to meet in the United States beginning July 1 to discuss post-war financial problems.

Invitations were issued to 42 countries and the French Committee of National Liberation.

GEORGE CROSS IS CONFERRED POSTHUMOUSLY

23-Year-Old Canadian Army Corporal Suffered Mortal Injuries When He Attempted to Throw Clear Unexploded Grenade.

Ottawa, May 26.—(P)—A 23-year-old Corporal of the Canadian Army who interposed himself between an unexploded grenade and his comrades and attempted to throw it clear, suffering mortal injuries when it exploded, has been awarded the George Cross posthumously. Defence Headquarters announced today.

He was Cpl. (Acting Sgt.) John Rennie, of Kitchener, Ont., who served with the Canadian Infantry Corps until his death October 29, 1943. Rennie was cited for "conspicuous courage in the face of extreme danger." The George Cross ranks second only to the Victoria Cross.

Rennie was supervising grenade throwing by a member of his unit at a Canadian training camp in England when a grenade failed to clear the protective embankment and rolled back into the throwing area.

"Despite the fact that he had time and opportunity to escape from danger, Acting Sgt. Rennie without the slightest hesitation dashed forward, interposing himself between the grenade and his comrades, and attempted to pick up the rolling grenade and throw it clear," his citation said.

"Before he could do so, however, the grenade exploded and Acting Sgt. Rennie sustained mortal injuries."

"By his sacrifice, Acting Sgt. Rennie prevented serious and possibly fatal injuries to three other soldiers who were within five yards of the explosion, and his gallant act, carried out in complete disregard of his own safety, showed bravery of a high order that stands out in the annals of the Canadian Army."

Defence Headquarters also announced the award of the British Empire Medal (Military Division) to Sgt. David Shepherd, 33, Rumsey, Alta., Royal Canadian Army Service Corps; Corporal Clifford A. Saunders, 22, of Verdun, Que., Canadian Armored Corps, and Cpl. R. S. Eckhardt, 22, of St. Catharines, Ont., also of the Canadian Armored Corps.

Shepherd was cited for his services in removing blazing cans of petrol from a petrol point area under which several enemy shells fell, igniting two stacks, one of 1,600 and the other of 800 gallons.

Shepherd took up a position on the far side of the stack nearest the blazing petrol, removed the cans with a shovel as they were blown against the stack where men were working and beat out or held in check several fires which started in the undergrowth at the edge of the road.

Saunders took charge of a rescue party after an explosion at the site of an Italian coast defence battery. Slightly and although suffering himself from "extensive burns" assisted in the rescue of a number of wounded.

Cpl. Eckhardt, though burned in the same explosion in which Cpl. Saunders was injured, ran half a mile to a workshop attached to an anti-aircraft gun site for help, and refused all attention to himself until the officer in charge had reached No. 33 General Hospital and all possible aid had been sent Eckhardt's comrades.

GREAT ALLIED AIR OFFENSIVE IS SLOWED UP

Bad Weather Conditions Over English Channel with Most British-Based Planes Grounded During Night and Early Today.

London, May 26.—(P)—The great Allied pre-invasion air offensive dwindled as adverse weather conditions prevailed over the English Channel and most British-based planes were reported grounded during the night and early today.

The Italian end of the mighty sky pounding of Europe continued, however, with attacks last night by R.A.F. heavy and medium bombers on tactical targets in aid of the battle for Rome.

The lull at the British end of the two-way offensive followed a night in which more than 6,000 planes of all types, operating from both Britain and Italy, hammered European targets with more than 8,000 tons of bombs.

Planes from Britain hammered targets in France and those from the Mediterranean theatre flew to points in Southern France—including over Germany by the Berlin radio, heard by the Associated Press.

Only single aircraft, probably reconnaissance planes, were reported over Germany by the Berlin radio, heard by the Associated Press.

Later the German-controlled Vichy radio said the Lyon and Etienne regions of France were attacked this morning, followed by an alert which covered a considerable area of Central France.

Photographs revealed heavy damage to rail facilities in France and Belgium as a result of attacks by American bombers and fighters yesterday, said an American Air Force communique. It said a particularly large explosion occurred at Mulhouse and hangars were damaged in attack on an airfield at Nancy.

R.C.A.F. fighters escorted Allied medium bombers which attacked an airfield at Shievers, Belgium, yesterday, while other squadrons of Canadian fighter-bombers participated in attacks on railway targets and on French and Belgian airfields. None of these Canadian planes were lost.

Montreal Scene Of Race Battle

Montreal, May 26.—(P)—Police of St. Henri district last night drew a cordon around the intersection of Green Avenue and St. Antoine Street after about 100 English-speaking boys staged a street battle with the same number of young French-Canadians.

The only casualties, police said, was a constable who was struck with a club and a man who was hit in the eye with a stone when he opened his front door to look things over.

Two arrests were made and two boys will appear today in juvenile court charged with disturbing the peace.

Police said the street battle last night was a sequel to a series of fights among French-speaking and English-speaking youngsters Wednesday night at Brewster Park in Westmount. The Westmount boys did not like police officials added, the "invasion" of "their" park by the French-Canadian.

NAZI HIGH COMMAND PREPARING FOR NEXT WAR

Stockholm, May 26.—(P)—A new instruction manual issued by the German High Command, a copy of which was received here yesterday, gives evidence that the German High Command already is preparing for the next war.

Called "Merkblatt Fuer Den Kompanie Unterricht," the blue-covered booklet contains a description of "every stout boy born in 1943 can become a brave soldier in 1953."

CONSTITUENCIES IN QUEBEC ARE RAISED TO 91

Counties of Riviere du Loup and Kamouraska Revert to 1939 Electoral Status.

Quebec, May 26.—(P)—The Legislative Council, sitting after a week's adjournment, today adopted a Government bill raising from 86 to 91 the number of provincial constituencies.

The measure was adopted unanimously after acting Government Leader Jacob Nicol explained briefly. Opposition Leader—Sir Thomas Chabais and Elise E. Theriault (Liberal, Kennebec Division) expressed their satisfaction and pleasure at seeing the counties of Riviere-du-Loup and Kamouraska revert to their 1939 electoral status.

A Government bill to vote a "provisional" sixth of the budget, as well as the bills amending the charters of the cities of Quebec and Dolbeau, were also approved yesterday by the Council.

First and second reading were given to three bills providing for children's protection, family courts and child protection schools, adopted by the Assembly last week. Readings were given without debate.

The Private Bills Committee of the Council later adopted by a 3-3 vote the bill amending the city charter of St. Lambert, opposite Montreal on the St. Lawrence river. The bill sets at \$400,000 the valuation of the Victoria Bridge within the town's limits.

WHITE PAPER ON POST-WAR LABOR OUTLOOK ISSUED

British Government Plans Proposals to Assure Work for All in Next Era of Peace Through Measures of Economic Control.

London, May 26.—(C.B. Cable)—The British Government today issued a long-awaited White Paper in post-war employment, sketching proposals to assure work for all in the next era of peace through widespread measures of economic control.

The paper, issued by Lord Woolton, Reconstruction Minister, suggested, however, that the problem of unemployment is unlikely to arise immediately after the war. External trade is held up by the White Paper as the key to the whole post-war employment problem. The document said if the expansion of Britain's foreign trade can be assured, then the Government believes that widespread unemployment can be prevented.

The Government recognizes that maintenance of a high and stable level of employment is one of its primary purposes, said the paper, which proposed for the immediate post-war period a controlled switch-over of industry from war production, the allocation of labor and raw materials on a priority basis, a temporary extension of rationing and of limited price control.

Its long-term proposals are aimed at keeping at a high level the demand for goods and services of a more elaborate nature. As part of the broader aspect of post-war employment, the paper said the Government is seeking by international collaboration to create conditions of world trade which will make it possible for all countries to carry out full employment policies.

VISIBILITY IS POOR ON INVASION COAST

London, May 26.—(P)—A blanket of mist covered Dover Strait at daybreak today but was dispelled during the forenoon, although the sky remained overcast and visibility poor.

A strong Southwesterly wind blew for a time during the night, moderating toward dawn and then freshening as the day progressed. The sea was choppy.

The temperature was around 50 degrees at 9 a.m., and the barometer, which has been high for the past 12 hours, remained unchanged.

Knowlton High School Is Razed By Fire At Loss Estimated At \$25,000

INVESTIGATION HELD IN LOCAL DROWNING CASE

Hector Robin, fifty-one-year-old Sherbrooke resident who took his life by leaping over the railing of the Montcalm Bridge on King Street West yesterday morning, was declared of unsound mind at the time of death by a coroner's jury, at the inquest held yesterday afternoon in the Marquette Street police station by Leonidas Bachand, Coroner for the District of St. Francis.

The drowned man's body was recovered from the middle of the basin in the Magog river between the dam and the bridge, about thirty feet from the bridge. Two local men, Paul Martineau and Alcide Yergeau, who had been helping police with the dragging operations which were carried out under the direction of Captain Edouard Morvan, made the recovery at two-fifteen yesterday afternoon, approximately five hours after the incident occurred.

Testimony was heard from the Misses Gabrielle and Bernadette Lassonde, and Lieutenant Paul Oulmet of the 35th Battery (Reserve), who gave eye-witness accounts of the tragedy.

Lt. Oulmet stated that he had seen the man remove his coat and place it on the railing of the bridge, and then leap over the side. The drowning man made very feeble attempts to remain afloat, and from the time he landed in the water, until the time he disappeared beneath the surface, he had not lifted his head out of the water.

This evidence was corroborated by the Lassonde sisters, who had been crossing the bridge approximately thirty feet from Robin when he took the fatal plunge.

Evidence was presented at the inquest by Sergeant Detective Pierre Arcand, of the local police department, who stated that he had known the deceased for the last two years. He testified that he had escorted the man to the St. Michael's Hospital in Quebec, where he had been confined for a period of eight months, undergoing treatment as a mental case. He further stated that he had had no recent reports from the deceased's boarding house proprietress, as to any insane actions on his part.

The jury stated in their verdict that it was their opinion that the deceased had suffered another mental lapse, and "had taken his life while of unsound mind."

INTERVIEW WITH PARTISAN CHIEF IS DISCLOSED

American Correspondent Slipped into Yugoslavia for Discussion with Tito at Marshal's Headquarters.

WALTER BERNSTEIN, (Distributed by The Canadian Press) Partisan Headquarters, Somewhere in Yugoslavia.—Marshal Tito, Yugoslav army and partisan leader whom we had called the "mystery man of the Balkans," is a man of high intelligence and sensitivity, dedicated with his people to the job of freeing his country and establishing a federal democratic Yugoslavia.

I can report this after walking from the Adriatic Coast deep into liberated territory to Partisan headquarters for the first interview with him.

To get here it was necessary to hike day and night for what seemed like months, most of the time over mountains and part of the time through German-occupied territory. My guide led me by night to a house by a mountain waterfall where Tito and his staff members have their headquarters heavily guarded by tough young partisans, tommyguns over their shoulders and captured German pistols in their belts.

Looking at him and listening to this man you could understand the miracle of organization that the partisans have created; formation of the first complete army and now of a state with all its components.

We talked for an hour, then it was time to go.

Tito was standing behind his desk as I went out into the night. He is not a tall man, but he filled the room.

U.S. SENATORS LOOK TO WORLD FREE FROM WAR

Believe Only U.S. Participation with Peace-Loving Nations Can Preserve Peace Allied Forces Are Fighting to Win.

Washington, May 26.—A small group of United States Senators are working secretly to help bring free from war and the threat of war.

This is the Sub-Committee on Foreign Affairs, acting as a liaison between Congress and the State Department on plans for United States participation in a world organization for peace.

Presumably they are acting on the assumption that only United States participation with peace-loving nations can preserve the peace Allied forces are fighting to win.

These Senators, who confer frequently with State Department officers, are pledged to remain silent until the time has come to talk of what they are doing.

But their chairman is the veteran Senator Charles McNary (Dem., Ore.), sponsor of the Senate resolution of last fall, carried by a vote of 85-5, "that the United States, acting through its constitutional processes, join with free and sovereign nations in the establishment and maintenance of international authority with power to prevent aggression and preserve the peace of the world."

But the goal is a long way off. Any pronouncement now of United States readiness to co-operate in the maintenance of world peace would be an encouragement to the war-weary people but it would not be shown to the public at regular intervals this summer as they were up until last year. Because gas rationing has cut the flow of tourists to a trickle, this is not now necessary. The few tourists who come may see the youngsters playing before their home or going to and from their schoolroom.

Retiring directors were given certificates of appreciation as a testimonial of the honor accorded this organization and as a tribute to the leadership and unselfish work in the interests of the city. Those receiving certificates were J. E. Bouffard, N. V. Cloutier, Arthur Lapierre and Keith Reynolds.

Mr. Carr, after accepting the presidency again for another year, said that he was mindful of the responsibilities facing the Chamber of Commerce in connection with the various problems resulting from conditions of war. Regarding post-war planning he said he hoped that the master plan evolved by the Post-War Reconstruction Committee (under the sponsorship of the C. of C.) would benefit Sherbrooke in the days of peace.

He conveyed his thanks to the retiring directors and members, including the Council of Committees, for their unflinching courtesy and diplomacy, and also expressed his appreciation to the city newspapers for their co-operation during his first term in office.

Eight members were accepted into membership: Romeo Rousseau, Jack Latraverse, I. Steinman, A. Schachter, Phillip Remberts, Rhee Beaulieu, Paul E. Brazeau and A. J. Whalen, the last named being the new manager of the Bell Telephone Company here.

Pointing out that there still is much work to be done, Mr. Carr said that it should be the desire of the organization to continue to the fullest extent to co-operate with the City Government of Sherbrooke and other organized groups in Sherbrooke for the benefit and improvement of the City.

"We worked on several projects during the past year and on account of present conditions these could not be completed," President Carr said in making his report. "We should continue efforts to bring these matters to a successful conclusion." Among the few he mentioned were water filtration, flood control, better roads and an income tax office.

He urged the Post-War Committee to continue doing its work in order that a programme will be ready at the termination of the war. He warned that the matter of new industries should be kept before the C. of C., if Sherbrooke is to expand properly in the future.

"I am sure that with the continued support and co-operation of all the members of the Chamber of Commerce, your organization will become increasingly successful and valuable to the City of Sherbrooke," Mr. Carr said.

Referring to other activities of the year, he pointed out that a special committee was appointed by the Council to look for a proper industrial site in Sherbrooke, with this site being necessary if Sherbrooke was to have proper industrial expansion. As a result of careful study, recommendations were made to the City Council and an industrial site has been purchased by the municipality on the Drummond Road near the Military Camp.

"We have at the present time two potential prospects, but they are unable to make any changes until the end of the war, and we hope that Sherbrooke will be favored in their expansion," he added.

Retail merchants have been organized in conjunction with the Chamber under the chairmanship of C. E. Soles, he mentioned, and being that this is a recent development, excellent progress has been made.

1,700 May Need Jobs After War Is Shown In Report Of Post War Group

That 1,700 persons may require employment at the end of the war in this city was disclosed in a preliminary report of the Sherbrooke Post War Committee, read at the annual meeting of the Sherbrooke Chamber of Commerce last night. President George Carr said that a complete and full detailed report will be made shortly.

The industrial survey carefully taken and compiled showed the findings that nearly two thousand people can be satisfactorily employed on various suggested plans. The number of people for each job was estimated on a yearly basis, with the realization that some of this work is seasonal and during the seasonal period many more people can be employed. However, in the estimate presented, all job requirements have been rated on an annual basis.

Suggestions have been divided in three broad divisions, according to the preliminary report: Those which are largely a Federal or Provincial matter, those which are a municipal problem and those having to do with the agricultural community in and around Sherbrooke. It was pointed out that these suggestions may overlap in jurisdiction, but this did not interfere with the usefulness or desirability of the work to be done.

The suggested divisions follow: Group one, Federal and Provincial; Flood control, Sherbrooke Civic Centre and roads.

Group two, Municipal projects; Filtration plant, increased facilities for electrical production at Two Miles Falls, housing projects, improvement to the City of Sherbrooke water system, construction of three

bridges, improvements to city grounds, and further improvement and development of Jacques Cartier Park.

Group three deals with agriculture: An agricultural school and a school of domestic arts; drainage and improvements on farm land. Improvements to farm buildings and extension of rural electrification, and reforestation of the land and conservation of maple bushes.

In concluding the report the Committee explained that the proposed programme is estimated to take care of approximately 1,700 persons, and the money required would probably be spent for these various projects sooner or later, and as a result of this it was feasible to assume that these projects could be used to take care of post-war unemployment.

Although many other suggestions were received and considered, the Committee felt that the suggested proposals were sound, reasonable and offer a plan to help eliminate unemployment following the war.

It was explained that the original purpose of the Post-War Committee was: 1—to find out the number of people who might need employment in the first year after the war ends, and 2—to find out how these people could be employed, and to suggest employment of work which would be of a permanent and lasting value. The Committee sought preferable work which would have to be done irrespective of the times and conditions, with the idea of using such type of work to tide over the period of transition from war to peace and to cover development and expansion of industry, should that be necessary.

The report further stated that many other items were suggested and studied in order that the final report might cover as many angles of the community life as possible. "All people who were interested in the formation of this Post-War Committee understood what our method of approach would be an acquiescent in attacking the problem in this matter," the report continued. With these ideas in mind, the Committee was prepared to make suggestions regarding employment on useful and beneficial work when hostilities cease.

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R.C.A.F. Has Grown From Force Of 4,000 To Over 200,000 Personnel

One of the most important tasks devolving on any organization is the selection of its personnel. Wing Commander R. B. Curry, Assistant Director of Personnel Selection and Research at R.C.A.F. headquarters in Ottawa, said last night when he addressed the annual meeting of the Sherbrooke Chamber of Commerce in the New Sherbrooke House.

The R.C.A.F. in a little more than four years had grown from a force of some 4,000 to well over 200,000 persons, the speaker explained, with this great number of people recruited from civil life. They were selected and have been trained to enter one of the most hazardous and demanding of all occupations and included among them are tens of thousands of airmen.

He pointed out that the soundness of their training has been recognized in their success in combat, adding that to enable those who are responsible for the training to receive the requisite volume of right type of personnel, selection at the source must be adequate and scientific. Commander Curry was speaking on the subject of psychology put to work in the R.C.A.F.

After outlining the selection of airmen at the outset of the war and drastic changes made in this field of endeavor two years later, the speaker explained the present course of selection employed by this branch of the service. The latest development given to selection procedure in the R.C.A.F. had already received attention in Parliament and in the press, he continued, and said this is what has come to be known as personnel counselling.

"With so much current comment regarding the nature of the post-war world and regarding an early conclusion of the war, however unfounded as it may be, it is only natural that the thoughts of our service men and women should turn to the problem of post-war employment," Commander Curry added.

According to him, it has been felt that the procedures and methods developed in selection for personnel entering the R.C.A.F. could be very logically adopted toward preparing such personnel to return to civilian life at the conclusion of hostilities.

A great deal of planning has been done along these lines and a program of personnel counselling for the R.C.A.F. has now taken definite shape. It should be stressed, the speaker said, that this is in no sense a program of rehabilitation, which field properly belongs to civilian departments of the Government. He said it is rather a programme "in service" counselling and training of personnel in such a way as to prepare them more definitely for the future that may be, and at the meantime, to aid them in settling their minds with regard to their future.

Commander Curry felt that this will be most conducive to morale at present and to better application to the job in hand, namely the winning of the war. He said that there is no use in stating that the coming of peace is so indefinite that people in service should think of nothing in the meantime except the task immediately confronting them. It is only human that they should have some concern about their future, the speaker maintained.

The plan of personnel counselling is designed to give skilled aid in assessing each serviceman as to his abilities, aptitudes and interests in connection with the world of work into which he must eventually enter, inasmuch as occupations have been carefully analyzed and described over the whole field of work.

Counselling aids servicemen in setting his sights toward certain broad types of civilian occupations and helps him to take advantage of opportunities. Commander Curry asserted, while still in the service to advance his goal. Terminating the scope as being very broad, he said it is intended that the benefits of personnel counselling shall be brought to every man and woman in the R.C.A.F., no matter how remote their station and no matter how varied their present duty.

Their training includes the development of skills in the use of objective measurements and personal assessments and these procedures have already proved useful in the R.C.A.F. selection programme because the officers are given special training in interviewing.

Peace may not be close at hand, Commander Curry held, but preparation now can relieve the possibility of distress in the future. He pointed out that some will object to any preparation for peace, just as some objected to any preparation for war in those uncertain days of 1937-39.

"Such heedless advocates of unpreparedness seriously impaired our early war effort. They can just as surely impair our reconstruction effort," he said, adding that the personnel programme is designed to extend the period when men and women may prepare for the transition from service to civil life.

The speaker felt that the lessons learned are applicable to business and industry, especially to those who employ fairly large numbers of personnel. In Canada it is also felt that more attention will be given after the war to the question of selection and training of personnel for business and industry. It may well be that many of the people who have been trained in the R.C.A.F. personnel methods will be invaluable to civilian economy in the same field, he said.

"We have a considerable number of highly trained people in the R.C.A.F. who are very capable of turning such experience to industry," he added. "We have developed scientific use of the interview to a point where it has become a procedure that is objective, uniform and subject to measurement of results."

The R.C.A.F. has developed procedures and methods for rapid and accurate allocation to jobs according to the requirements of those jobs. Possibly, most important, through its analytical and research facilities, Commander Curry said, the R.C.A.F. has been able to assess and weigh the results of its own procedures.

These procedures when unproductive of results have been scrapped and only those that have been productive and that stand up under use have been retained. "In this, therefore, it is believed that business and civilian economy in Canada may stand to gain from R.C.A.F. experience in selecting, training and counselling close to one-quarter million personnel," the speaker concluded.

Commander Curry was introduced by Lee Audet, O.C. No. 67.

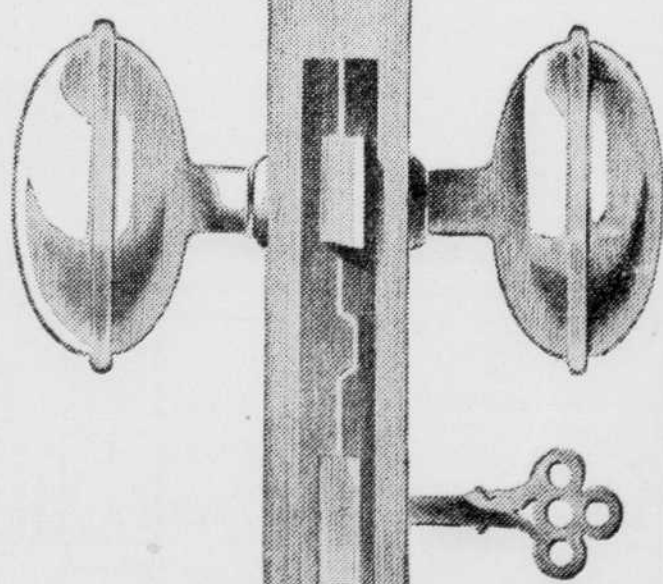

The words of the Allied high command communique concerning the fighting in Italy, "The Canadian Corps has greatly distinguished itself in this, its first action as a corps," will bring a feeling of pride and satisfaction to the people of this country who have long been waiting news of large-scale operations by the Canadian forces stationed Overseas since the late winter of 1939. This feeling of pride and satisfaction in no way indicates that Canadians had any doubt as to the ability and willingness of their representatives in the war theatre to carry on the traditions established by the Canadian Corps in the First Great War. But rather it reflected the impatience, shared by those troops who have been away from home for four-and-a-half years, over those fortunes of war which have prevented the utilization of the Canadians on any substantial scale until the present time.

Senior military officials are strong in their praises of the showing made by these Canadians, most of whom were having their baptism of fire, and the tone of the official communique speaks well for the record that the men from the Dominion are likely to establish in the rapidly-forming battle for the elimination of Hitlerism and all that it stands for.

QUEEN MARY

Today, from all parts of the British Commonwealth of Nations, congratulations are being extended to Queen Mary on the occasion of her seventy-seventh birthday. Although in recent years she has not held as marked a spot in the life of the Empire, she has been carrying on an important work with diligence and dignity.

Wartime censorship and the natural retirement of advancing years have to a marked degree limited the reports on her activities but enough is available for the people of the Commonwealth to know that she is still working hard in the interests of the ordinary man-in-the-street which were also dominant during the time she shared the reins of power with her husband, late King George V.

War conditions impose special duties upon the members of the Royal Family and the manner in which the reigning monarchs have carried out these often self-imposed tasks has been one of the chief instruments in strengthening the links of Empire. And in this task they have had the full support, co-operation and advice of the Queen Mother, who gave the lead in many ways by the example she set through her visits to the hospitals and other military institutions during the First Great War.

THE RECORD REPEATS

Once again the Quebec Legislature has been edited by a demonstration by Rene Chaloult, Bloc Populaire member for Lotbiniere County, who has given one of his now-common diatribes on the place which the French Canadians should occupy in the political life of the country.

The theme has been worked by the Lotbiniere member for many and many a month, until the text of his remarks can almost be imagined as soon as he rises to his feet. In short, he claims that the French Canadians are not getting enough positions in the Civil Service, and quotes the case of several commissions on which the French-Canadian representation has been small.

But he was answered in advance by one Provincial Cabinet Minister who pointed out that while there is still a substantial proportion of English-speaking Canadians left in this Province, less than two per cent of the Provincial Civil Service is composed of representatives of the minority. And the same condition applies in most municipal administrations, many of these local governing bodies being totally devoid of English-Canadians and in some cases there has not been the courtesy to name a bilingual functionary to meet the public.

Of course, Mr. Chaloult conveniently forgets this.

THE BOLSHEVIST BOGEY MAN

Once the tide of war turned against the Germans on the Eastern Front, Herr Goebbels trotted out the Nazis' prize bogeyman—the menace of Bolshevism to the world generally—and has been racing it for all it is worth. Of course he would have the world believe he is working from altruistic motives, but actually he is working for three objectives which are much less worthy. These are: To enlist the sympathy of neutrals; to sow dissension and misgiving among the Allies; and to revive the flagging enthusiasm of the satellites.

Now he has had to confess that the whole campaign has failed completely. Neutrals and enemies, he complains, still maintain "scepticism" despite all German exhortations; and he could have added that the necessity of subjugating satellite Hungary is proof of failure there also.

The Jews, as usual, are represented as the culprits, who have thwarted him in his benevolent endeavors toward mankind. What he has in reality discovered is that though he may be able to fool all the Herrenvolk all the time, he cannot deceive others. Memories are not so short as to have forgotten that he turns the tap of propaganda on and off precisely as it happens to suit German policy.

After years of Nazi fulminations against Bolshevism, that creed suddenly became harmless when it was thought useful to have a pact with Russia in 1939, and it again became a world menace when Germany thought it expedient to attack Russia in 1941.

ENFORCING FUTURE PEACE

Prime Minister Winston Churchill in his speech to the British House of Commons on Wednesday made it abundantly clear that he holds no hope of maintaining world peace in the future by wishful thinking and pious platitudes. Rather he is fully convinced that only by the co-operation of the major peace-loving powers—the British Empire, Russia, and the United States—prepared to use force if necessary against any would-be aggressor will such a state be achieved.

His address to the British Commons made no attempt to give details of the post-war peace set-up which he proposes and he frankly admitted that all the details had not been worked out. For that matter, he also indicated that the Big Three had not yet reached a clear-cut agreement on the basic principles, although the general scheme of action had been reviewed.

History offers much to support the views of the British Prime Minister, the tragic story of the twenty years between the First and Second Great Wars being a case in point. During this period, the major powers were lulled into a feeling of false security by the visionary promises of the League of Nations with its consultative and advisory organization. But as the League serenely went about its avowed objectives, one after another the aggressively-minded powers expanded their armed forces and laid the groundwork for a campaign of world conquest, with the result that when the showdown came, it was with the greatest difficulty that the democracies managed to weather the first shock of the attack.

The address also revealed the complexities which the United Nations face in the international political picture, with special references being made to the case of Spain and Turkey. The latter is ruled out of the Allied camp for the time being although he indicated that the former was displaying a better tone toward the United Nations which might result in non-intervention in its domestic politics after the war.

The internal strife in some of the countries making up the United Nations also reveals many perplexities which call for careful study both now and after these nations are liberated from Nazi oppression.

Latest plunge into civilian reservoirs concerns the water supply, with the House of Lords being told that baths are largely luxuries, not really essential to health. One might agree on the latter point, but there still remains the matter of cleanliness. But perhaps this is no time to go digging up dirt. And the Lords may have a big enough battle on their hands placating the mothers of approving small lads.

READY FOR "THE DAY"

London Daily Mail
An extra 3,000 tons of parcels for British prisoners of war in Germany is to be stored in Geneva under arrangements just concluded by the International Red Cross Committee. The committee feared that, with the gradual breakdown of communities throughout Europe and the possibility of a general upheaval when the second front opens, feeding arrangements for British captives might be seriously affected. Consequently the Red Cross are accumulating huge stocks of parcels at places where they can be rushed to Germany.

OFF THE BEAM

Leithbridge Herald
We know that it is highly important that the Federal Treasury should secure every dollar possible during the war. But it should not wink at discrimination in taxation methods. And in regard to one type of so-called income it is discriminatory. We refer to Government annuities.

Here is a case where the individual makes a contract with the government to deposit a certain amount of capital annually for a certain number of years so that when he reaches a certain age, he may be assured a

certain sum monthly upon which to live. No doubt the government annuity branch has figured just how large a sum of capital is required to produce the required results. As in the case of insurance companies, the amount is figured on an actuarial basis, based upon life expectancy.

Present income tax laws require that the whole payment to the beneficiary of the annuity shall be treated as income. It is not income. Most of it is capital. It is the savings of the individual to which have been added certain sums each year representing interest of the investment. The individual could have placed the same sum in a savings bank and withdrawn practically a similar sum each month after reaching a certain age, and there would then be no question that it represented capital, not income. But a branch of the government decided to treat the whole sum as income, and so income taxes are imposed.

If the government wished to kill off its annuity branch, it could find no better method of doing it.

FOR PARLIAMENT'S OWN SAKE

Parliament's party leaders, have been meeting together to see if they can't find some way of expediting its work. It is to be hoped they succeed. We are not of those who seem to think there should be no talk in Parliament, or a minimum of it, or that it should conduct itself as a meeting of some board of directors. Parliament is not a board of directors, and can't be it is a safety valve for public opinion, a forum of debate, a place to demand redress of grievances. At the same time, government being what it is today, Parliament, if it is to permit democracy to function, must sensibly limit its discussions. It cannot go on in talk to the point where it threatens paralysis of action and it should be anxious to avoid conduct which in the public mind, undermines its authority.

For its own sake, therefore, Parliament must show that it is capable of action that it is not what ignorant critics and those hostile to it accuse it of being.

Thirty Years Ago

Possibilities of an agreement in the Mexican Civil War appear brighter today. Reports from Niagara Falls where the negotiators are in session say that representatives of both factions and the United States are in more conciliatory mood.

The British House of Commons has again passed the Irish Home Rule Bill, this time by a majority of seventy-seven, thus overriding the veto of the House of Lords. It is feared civil war will result in Ireland before the system is inaugurated however.

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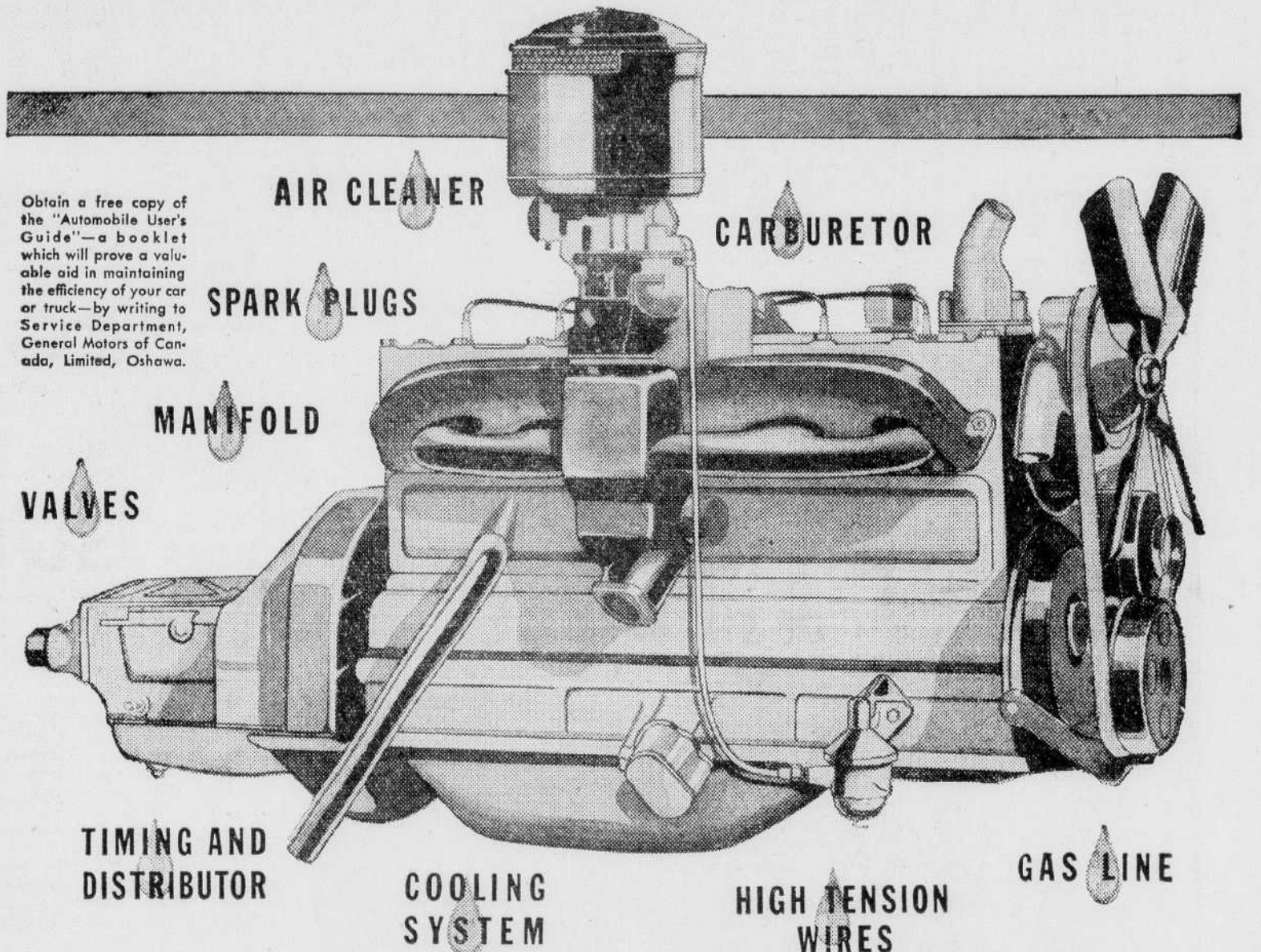

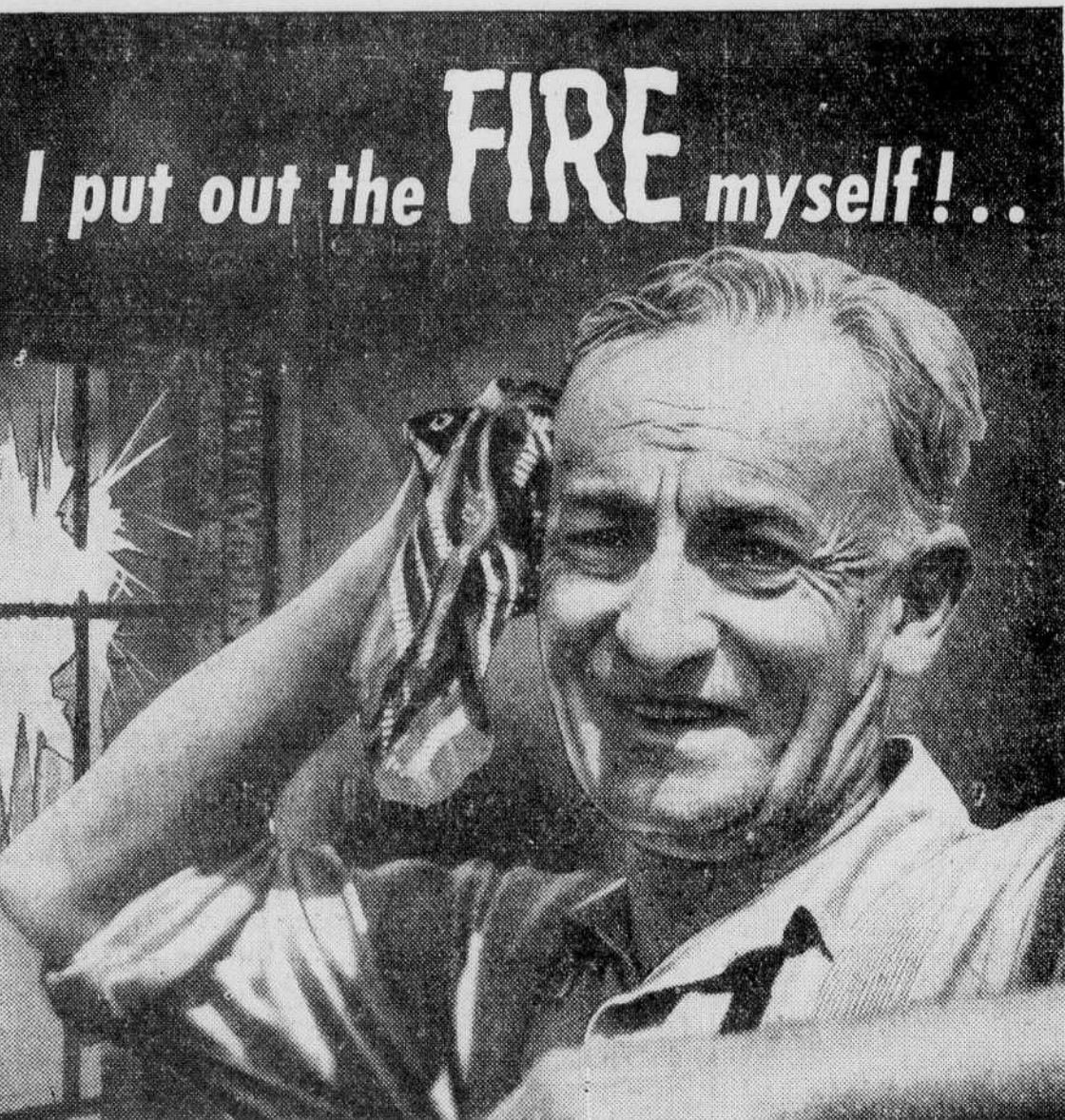

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ANNIVERSARY OF HATLEY CHURCH COMMEMORATED

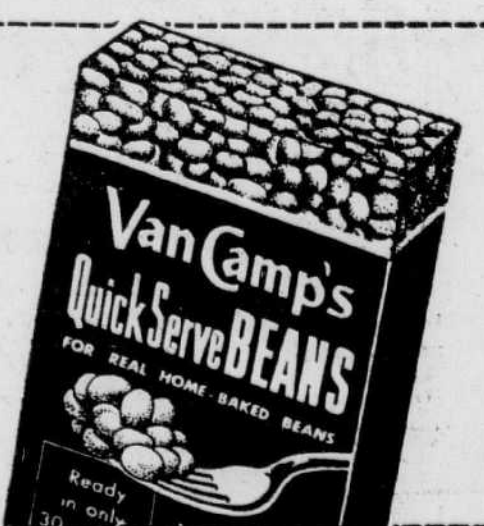

SWEETSBURG

A splendid report of the annual meeting of the Montreal Diocesan Synod was given by Rev. J. O. Pencock at a service of evensong, which told of a former rector of this parish, Rev. E. S. Reed, making a very brilliant address on the anti-Semitism question. On the subject of Lord's Day Observance, it is noted that gas stations are closed on Sundays due to war restrictions, and the Synod has asked the Government to continue the same ruling after the war. The delegates to the Synod representing the parish of Christ Church were Messrs. Champion and Dunkerley, of Montreal, who attended the majority of the sessions. The executive of the Synod, which is composed of twenty clergymen and twenty laity, reported on various topics of general interest, and Rev. E. S. Reed asked if a house in this part of the Townships was available for use as a home and training school for mentally retarded children. On the subject of temperance, the Synod agreed that both people and clergy should be temperate in all things and especially to abstain from strong drink in any form. It was decided to pool the salaries of all clergy in the Diocese of Montreal so that a more equitable way of living may be established.

Rev. Cyril Powles, of Montreal, was the special preacher at the service of Holy Communion on Rogation Day at Christ Church, and gave a splendid sermon dealing with seed time and the great need of bread in all countries or cities alike and on the Communion table. People usually do not sense the necessity of same until they are without it, like the people of China and Japan. All people should have a fair share and realize that city people cannot do without country people and vice versa. The installation of officers of the Junior Anglican Young People's Association took place at this service, and are as follows: President, Mrs. K. G. Lazenby; Vice-President, Miss N. N. Ingalls; and Secretary-Treasurer, Miss Pearl Barber. Rev. Mr. Powles instructed each officer in the duties of her office and required of each one their pledge of office and also gave each one a copy of the by-laws of this organization and a badge. Then the other members of the Junior A.Y.P.A. were required to stand and pledge allegiance to the work of the organization. At the Synod meeting in Montreal His Lordship Bishop John Dixon was approached on the subject of holding well-conducted dances in church basements for the pleasure of local young people and to prevent juvenile delinquency, and Bishop Dixon said by all means such halls should be used for that purpose so that young people can dance under circumstances rather than in public halls, where conditions are not always on a high level.

The Parish Guild and W.A. of Christ Church held an enjoyable bridge and five hundred party, when the prize-winners were as follows: In five hundred, ladies, 1 Mrs. Nason Ingalls, 2 Mrs. B. J. Stone; consolation, Mrs. Stanley Peron; gentlemen's, 1 Mr. William Brown, In bridge, ladies, 1 Mrs. Ardley Tanner, 2 Mrs. J. H. Dunk; consolation, Mrs. A. C. Panton; gentlemen's, 1 Mr. Edgar Guillette. Refreshments were served by several of the ladies. The sum of over sixteen dollars was realized towards the payment of fuel for the church, which amounts to seventy-five dollars.

Y'S MEN WILL HOLD TRACK MEET TOMORROW

Over one hundred and thirty-seven students from various schools in the Eastern Townships are entered for the Y's Men's second annual track meet which is being held tomorrow at the Parade Grounds.

Spectators at the track meet will be able to recognize and keep track of their favorite runners, as all entrants in this year's meet are to be numbered. The numbers and names will be posted on the bulletin board on the Parade Grounds. All results of the events will be posted on this board also.

Students from the two Sherbrooke schools entered in the meet, St. Pat's and S.H.S., have been practising regularly for the past month at the Parade Grounds and their coaches figure that their boys are in good shape and ready to carry off the

honors in the annual classic.

The Y's Men's Trophy, donated last year by Skinner Bros., will be awarded to the school with the highest aggregate of points in all classes in the Eastern Townships Interscholastic Meet. The school with the highest total will retain the cup for one year. Last year, the trophy was captured by Bishop's College School.

All the times and heights in the different events last year were records as it was the first year the track meet was held. There are two exceptions, however. The junior 220 yard dash and the 8-pound shot, won by P. Dufresne, of Magog High School, start again from scratch, the winners this year setting a new record. The reason for this is that Dufresne was later found to be overage. He was subsequently barred from competition in the meet for one year and his records cancelled.

The Sherbrooke High School will be open to all visiting schools for the purpose of changing and lunch.

Rules governing the meet are from the Athletic Handbook, published by the National Council of the Young Men's Christian Association of Canada.

The President of the track meet is Stan Pearson, while assistant chairman of the track committee is Larry Pergau, Treasurer is Frank Simms, while entries are in charge of Ed Loomis. Field equipment is under the care of John Fitzsimmons. Dean Bishop is in charge of the field personnel, while Bill Wolter will act as field judge.

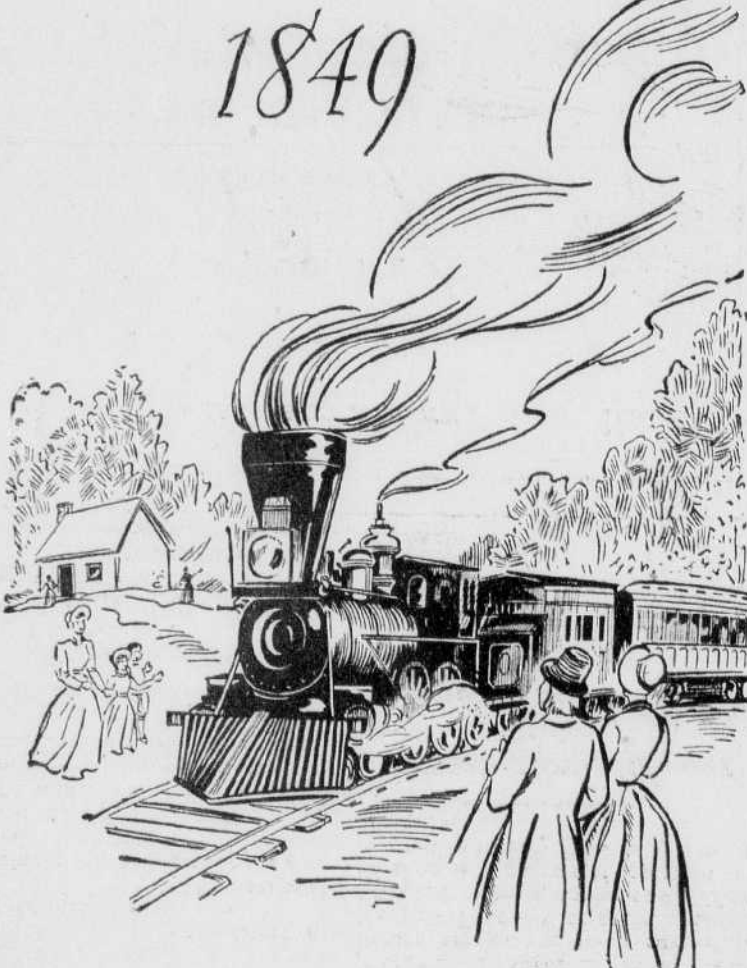
