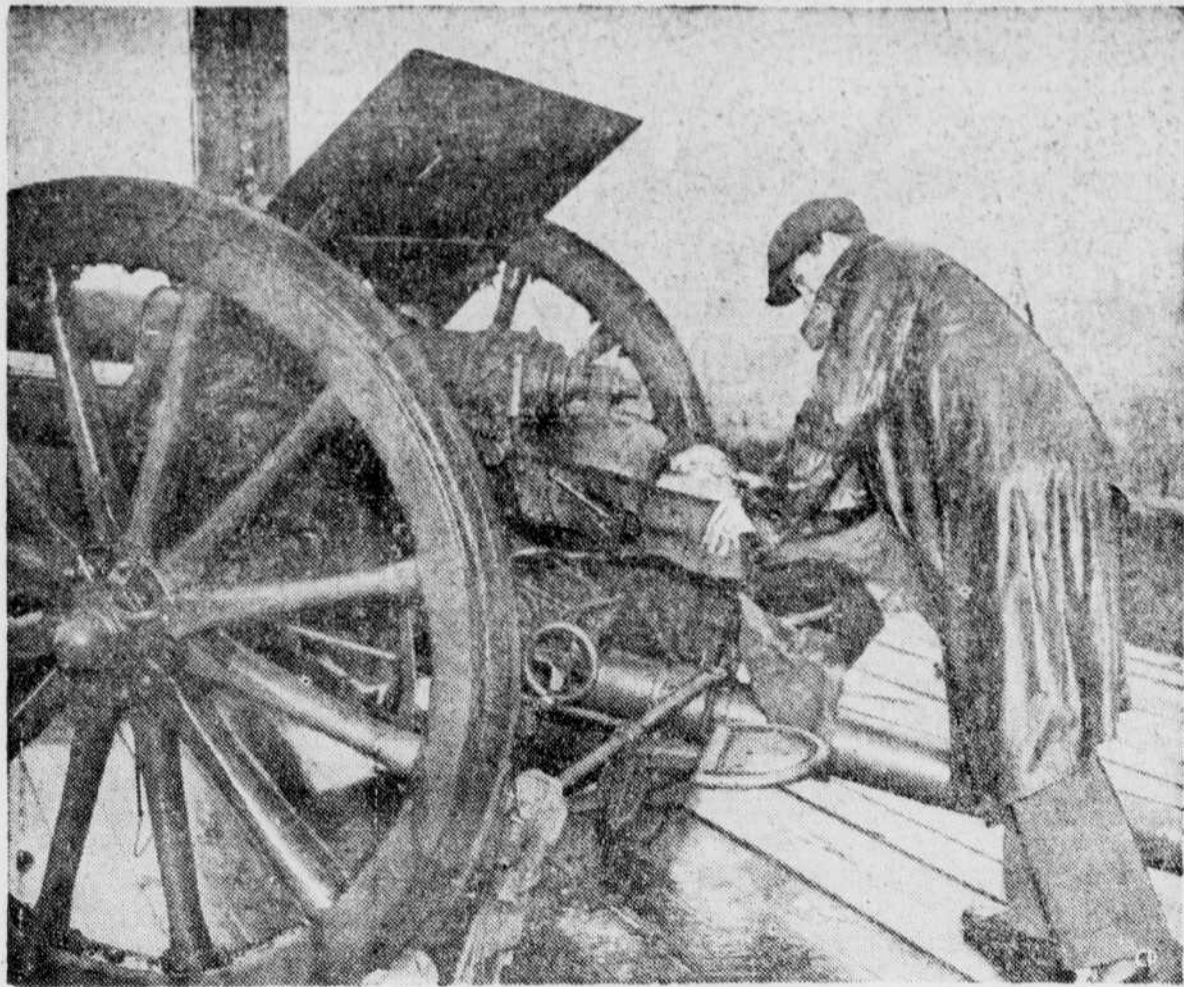


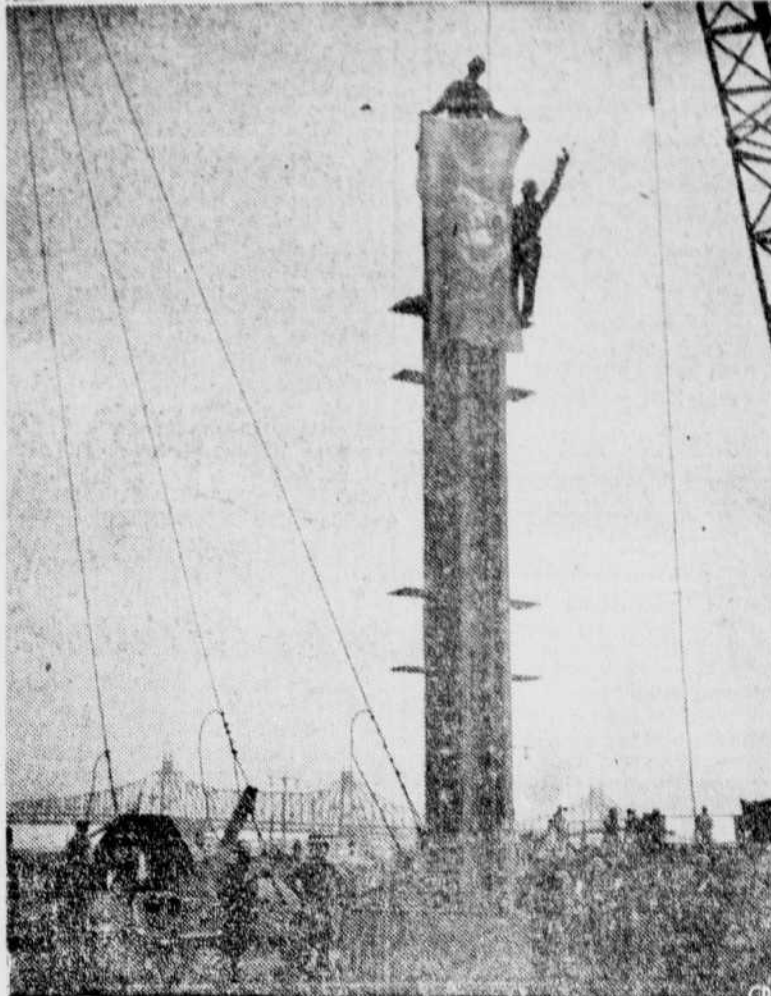

### Noon-Day Meal



The army's veteran time-gun atop Citadel Hill in Halifax opens its maw for a daily meal of gunpowder. Fired each day at noon, the cannon's booming roar steps Halifaxians in their tracks to check watches. This Canadian Army photo shows the 44-year-old army type fieldpiece which will be replaced by a shiny, new 25-pounder in time for Halifax's June Bicentenary.

### Erect First Steel



Erection of steel work for the first unit of the United Nations permanent headquarters has begun on the midtown New York site. The 39-story secretariat building, which will contain the general assembly hall and a conference area in addition to office space, is expected to be ready for occupancy by autumn, 1950. Because of its narrowness—72 feet wide and 267 feet long—some of the largest wind braces ever developed will be used to keep it from swaying. Some of the concrete piers in which the steel is anchored extend 40 feet into the ground. The men are wearing odd pieces of old Chinese cotton-padded uniforms. The Amethyst was driven aground by the Red artillery fire, with 17 killed and 23 wounded in the action.

### Philippine Ambush Sparks Drive



Philippine President Quirino has ordered a full-scale military campaign to clean out the rebellious Hukbalahap guerrillas who have kept central Luzon in terror since World War II ended. His action followed the ambush by Communist-led guerrillas in which Mrs. Manuel Quizon, widow of the Philippines' first president and 11 other persons were killed. On map, (X) marks scene of assault on the six-car convoy as it rolled toward Baler, the late president's birthplace. The Hukbalahaps have been conducting a small-scale civil war against the Manila government, operating from "Huklandia," a mountainous area comprised of parts of three provinces shaded on map. Their fortress-stronghold is Mt. Arayat. From this area they make constant forays on nearby towns, killing, torturing prisoners, burning farm houses and exacting "taxes" from land owners.

The endless successions of valleys represent dried up river beds containing some of the world's richest iron ore. ### MR. HERBERT VULNEY WESTON, OF BULWER

Bulwer, May 4. —The community was shocked and saddened when it was learned that Herbert Weston had passed away on the morning of March 29, 1949, at his late residence, after a lingering illness of nearly three years of a cardiac ailment.

Remove from water, add 1/2 tsp. mint flavouring and small amount of red colouring. Beat until thick enough to spread. Tint 3 tbsps. of frosting a deeper pink. Fill and frost cake, making swirls with back of spoon. Fill center of swirls with deeper shade.

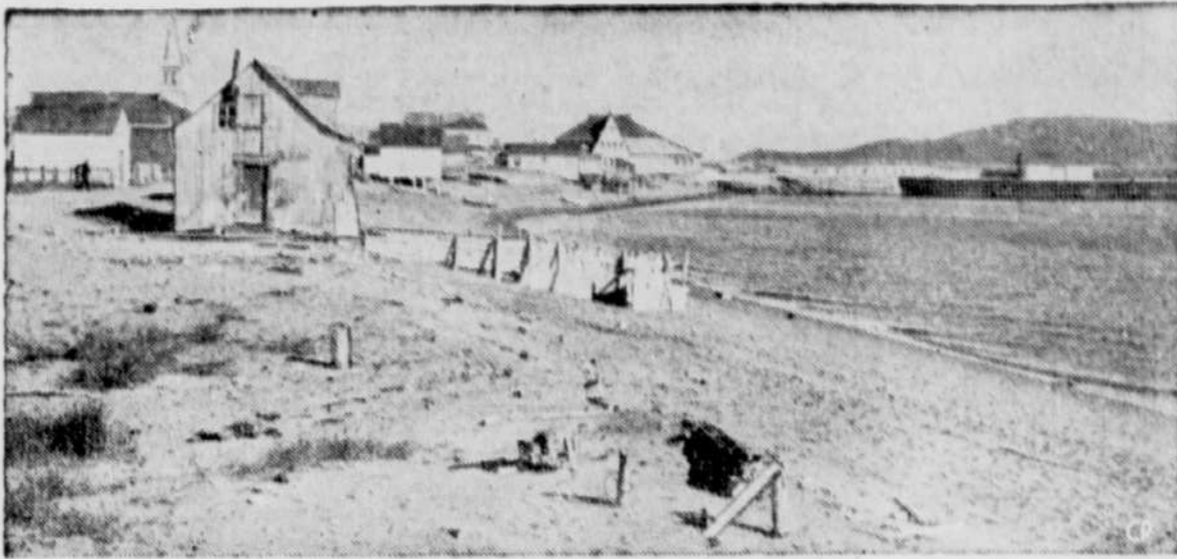

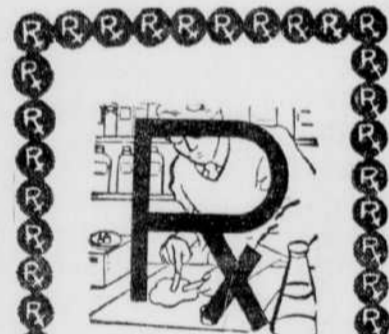

**The Doctor Says**

**DRUG HABIT IS EASILY ACQUIRED BUT EXTREMELY HARD TO CURE**

By Edwin P. Jordan, M.D.

When people speak of the "drug habit" they usually mean the development of a craving or excessive desire to take one of the substances derived from opium. Opium is obtained from the juice of a certain kind of poppy which is grown mostly in Far Eastern countries. This substance, or those obtained from it, have been eaten, smoked, or inhaled for a great many years.

In medicine, opium or its derivatives, morphine and codeine, are a blessing because they reduce pain without causing unconsciousness. The relief which morphine has brought to suffering humanity is incalculable.

Unfortunately these substances cannot be taken too long without causing undesirable effects. Larger and larger amounts become

needed in order to produce the desired relief or feeling of well-being. The craving for these drugs can become so great that the person who becomes addicted sometimes commits crime in order to get supplies of the wanted drug.

**Symptoms Gradual**

Symptoms of the opium or morphine habit come on gradually. For months the health may be little disturbed. Once the habit is well formed, however, the victim feels mentally depressed and is likely to suffer from vague symptoms in the stomach or bowels whenever the effect of a dose has worn off.

The confirmed addict generally grows thin, prematurely gray, and develops a sallow, pasty complexion. When not under the influence of the drug, irritability and restlessness are common. Sleep may be disturbed; appetite and digestion are upset.

The treatment of drug addiction is difficult and takes a long time. It can be done successfully, as a rule, only in an institution. Opium, morphine and other members of this group are, and have been, of enormous benefit to humanity, but they are powerful drugs and should not be taken without professional advice.

Q—What causes a black bowel movement?

A—The type of food eaten or drugs (such as certain iron preparations) affects the nature of the stool. Black or tarry-colored stool, however, may reflect the presence of blood, usually coming from the stomach or somewhere higher up in the digestive tract. It is a symptom which should not be ignored.

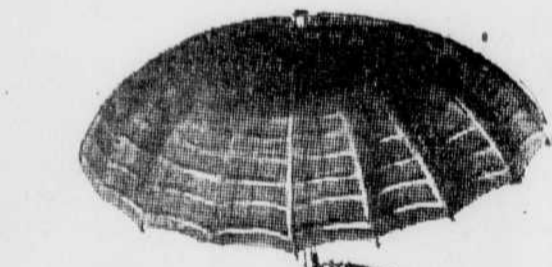
