Specifications ready option taken on site for composite school

("To keep the record straight" the Protestant Regional School Board has provided the following information to the Equity.)

Since the inauguration of the Protestant Regional School Board of Ottawa Valley in June, 1965 the progress of plans for secondary education in polyvalent schools for the Protestants in the counties of Papineau, Gatineau, Hull and Pontiac have progressed rapidly. Early this year the Minister of Education approved the planning for the region.

Preliminary sketches for a polyvalent school in the Aylmer-Hull area to accommodate 1650 pupils are on the drawing board.

On January 5th, 1966 an agreement was signed between the O.V.R.S.B. and the Papineau Regional School Board to build a wing to their French school in Buckingham. This wing will accommodate some 450 English-speaking students, approximately 50 per cent Protestant pupils and the other 50 per cent English-speaking Catholic pupils. On March 16th, 1966 the Minister of Education approved the agreement to build this wing for English-speaking pupils.

Problems have arisen with regard to co-operation in Pontiac County. In early October 1965, OVRSB initiated a meeting with L'Outaouais Regional School Board, and it was agreed then that a further meeting would take place in approximately two weeks. Nothing further was heard from L'Outaouais Regional School Board and in view of the fact the planning for Pontiac County was being delayed, this school Board terminated negotiations in December, 1965. Since then the Educational Specifications have been prepared

and forwarded to the Dept. of Education and an option on a site has been taken in Shawville.

At the request of the department the two school boards met once more on March 11th, 1966 and it was agreed that a committee would be formed to study the problems. This committee met on March 22nd, 1966 in the Hull High School. It was obvious that very little thought had been given to any planning for English-speaking Catholics in Pontiac County and it is of interest that many Catholic School Boards in Pontiac County are not members of the L'Outaouais Regional School Board. Since it was very necessary to establish a deadline on how long it would require the L'Outaouais Regional School Board to agree to further discussion of the problems, they were asked to make a decision as to whether they wished to continue discussions by March 31, 1966.

It was agreed that the L'Outaouais Regional School Board would inform the Ottawa Valley Regional School Board on March 29, 1966 whether negotiations would continue on the problems of co-operation in Pontiac County. The Ottawa Valley Regional School Board received their answer via a press report in the newspapers on March 29, 1966. The official communication from the L'Outaouais Regional School Board was not received in the office of the OVRSB until the afternoon of April 5th, 1966. This procedure did not help to establish good faith between the two school boards, and is prejudicial to co-operation in an area where co-operation would be beneficial to the English-speaking Catholic students in Pontiac County.

Seeks changes in family allowances government loans for newlyweds and other reforms affecting families

Cet ordre fraternel à but familial et qui existe dans treize diocèses, vient de soumettre un mémoire au Conseil Supérieur de la Famille et au Ministère de la Famille.

Sans entrer, par le détail, dans la longue série des vœux et des recommandations des Dames Champlain, mentionnons les suivantes:

—La création de tribunaux d'affaires familiales et l'établissement dans les grands centres d'un service de consultation familiale;

—L'Utilisation des talents des Retraités;

—Une enquête sur les conditions de travail à l'extérieur de la femme;

—Une assurance—travail permettant aux gens de travailler plutôt que de recevoir les petites prestations de l'assurance—chômage;

—Finalement une politique de

saine natalité, source essentielle de richesse nationale dans une province sous-peuplée comme la nôtre, possédant d'immenses ressources naturelles encore inexploitées, et manquant de main-d'œuvre surtout spécialisée;

L'Aide de L'Etat à la famille, conclut le Mémoire, est de la part de L'Etat un devoir, une nécessité.

C'est pourquoi le Mémoire recommande que les allocations familiales commencent au 2e enfant pour qu'elles puissent être doublées pour les autres et continuées tout le temps des études des enfants. Dans cette optique, le rapatriement de toutes les allocations de sécurité sociale du fédéral au provincial serait souhaitable, voire même nécessaire. Le Mémoire recommande donc un système de sécurité et d'assistance sociales, qui vise surtout à prévenir la pauvreté et à réadapter les pauvres. En somme, la nouvelle législation devrait être faite en fonction de la famille plutôt que de l'individu, contrairement à ce qui s'est fait dans le passé.

Enfin, d'après le Mémoire, cette législation devrait pouvoir offrir aux parents la possibilité de choisir entre une famille nombreuse ou non, sans souffrir d'une différence économique appréciable entre les deux niveaux. Elle viserait aussi à prévenir la pauvreté, en fournissant, après réadaptation et réhabilitation si nécessaire, un travail productif rémunéré au lieu des prestations dévalorisantes de l'assurance-chômage.

Stolen torpedoes not worth much but very dangerous

There could be 18 little bangs (or one great one) anywhere anytime and eyes could be blinded, people maimed or even killed at each incident. 12 torpedoes and 6 fuses were stolen from the locked section house at Shawville's CPR station over Easter weekend and the warning has gone out that they are all dangerous.

First the torpedoes. They are a brownish color. 3 inches long and an inch high with wires on the side. These are used to wire them onto the track 300 yards before the red flag when work is in progress. As the train passes over the first torpedo it goes off to alert the engineer that he should stop. Fifty feet further there are two torpedoes which further alert him. Each is as powerful as two 12 gauge cartridges and contains two ounces of black powder.

If one of these torpedoes is tapped on a rock or in any other way discharged it could blind

the person handling it. It would certainly cause severe and maybe fatal burns and could also kill outright.

The fuses are red, 12 inches long by an inch in diameter. They will burn for ten minutes and though not as dangerous as the torpedoes they can also blind a person who is not familiar with their use.

Section foreman Steve Fitzsimmons last saw this equipment on Friday afternoon when he went off work at 4.30. The section house was locked with a padlock which was found to be broken off on Monday morning at 7.30 when Mr. Fitzsimmons returned to work.

The Quebec Provincial Police are conducting an investigation and also the Canadian Pacific Railroad Investigation Department. No fingerprints have been taken but a great deal of questioning is going on.

The total value of the torpedoes and fuses stolen is about \$6 and many valuable tools in the shed were left untouched. Maurice Pilote, station agent, cannot imagine why anyone would take these items but wishes foremost to warn parents and children of their potential danger.

Spur line will reach mill site by May 1st Canada Iron Foundries will commence steel erection in June

The CNR expects to have the spur line to the mill site in Litchfield completed by May 1, according to information received today from the public relations department of Consolidated Paper Corporation Limited. And the exact length of the spur line is 1.9 miles to the site.

Sidings are part of the CNR installation. Grading of the right of way was awarded by the CNR to Alnor, since its equipment was already on the site. Once Alnor has completed the grading work, the CNR crews will lay track.

Concerning contracts, it is of some interest to get the exact name of each organization involved. With this in mind here is the rundown to date:

The Foundation Co. of Canada Ltd. was awarded the contract to clear the site.

Alnor Construction Co. was awarded a sub-contract by Foundation.

Richard & B. A. Ryan (1958) Limited was the successful tenderer on the pipe contract awarded by Consolidated Paper for installation of underground piping.

The contract for the mill construction was awarded to **Rust Associates Ltd.** whose predecessor company, Rust Engineering Co. (Canada) Ltd., was contractor for Consolidated Laurentide Inc., a wholly owned subsidiary of Consolidated Paper Corporation.

The erection of steel which is likely to start in June or possibly sooner will be handled by **Canada Iron Foundries** who have been awarded the sub-contract by Rust.

Consolidated Pontiac Inc. is a subsidiary of Consolidated Paper Corporation and has no direct connection with the mill project here.

Mr. Stephen Branch of the head office in Montreal has informed us that Consolidated Pontiac Inc. is only concerned with the marketing of pulp produced at the new mill being built here for Consolidated Paper Corporation Limited. Consolidated Pontiac Inc. is a wholly owned pulp sales subsidiary of Consolidated Paper Corporation Limited.

The Corporation is calling the mill here "PONTIAC kraft pulp mill", scheduled to be operating in the fall of 1967. Initial daily capacity is 500 tons of kraft wood pulps; bleached, semi-bleached, and unbleached.

Markets for a substantial portion of the new mill's output have already been assured. The mill has been designed to be expanded, at a minimum additional cost, to a daily production of a thousand tons of woodpulp.

It is possible that the mill be expanded at some future date but the Corporation has no way of knowing now when this would be done. Market conditions would dictate the timing of such a decision.

Meanwhile, Consolidated Laurentide Inc.'s new newsprint mill at Grand'Mère is now virtually completed. Contractor on the Grand'Mère project was Rust Associates Ltd., (formerly Rust Engineering Co. (Canada) Ltd.), the same company which is now building the PONTIAC kraft pulp mill here.

New Bridge Portage du Fort

The provinces of Ontario and Quebec have reached agreement on the construction of this bridge which is to be located some 350 feet downstream from the existing bridge. This as you know, is a project involving the Federal Government and also the Governments of Ontario and Quebec. The schedule on this bridge from latest information available will be as follows:

Completion of final plans. and specifications April 1, 1966
Tenders called May 1, 1966
Tenders opened June 1, 1966
Contract awarded July 1, 1966
Contract completed Sept 1, 1966

This schedule of course is dependent upon the results of the test borings and the time element involved in the tenders award.

Bridges at Chapeau Calumet - Bryson Notre-Dame du Nord

Land surveyors are being engaged to obtain the necessary information for transfer of these

bridges to the Quebec Government, assuming that there are no further problems the bridges should be transferred by the month of July as negotiations are now completed.

To be constructed sometime this year.

Extension of wharf at Kipawa: This work to be carried out during 1966.

Quyon:

The plan is to call for tenders and have work done during 1966 Otter Lake:

Wharf to be constructed this year on site made available in 1963.

Fort William:

Dredging to be carried out this year, reconstruction of wharf may be deferred to next year.

Davidson:

On March 28th the repairs were commenced on this wharf.

Laniel:

Improvements to approach to be completed this year.

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Pastoral comment...

Rev D. J. Harrington
Last week we paid an imaginary visit to the Holy Land. It seemed most appropriate, since all minds dwelt on the important events which occurred there many years ago.

Today, we would like to continue our pilgrimage to these Holy Shrines since we are still in the Pascal Season. Fruitful inspirations might result from this visit, for each one of us, both reader and writer.

Though visits might be made by pilgrims to the Garden of Agony and to the Cenacle, where the Last Supper took place and the Descent of the Holy Ghost all attention is directed to the upon the Disciples, of which we dealt last week, on Good Friday, Via Dolorosa and to the Hill of Calvary.

Thousands join in the yearly procession, from the Palace of Condemnation across the City of Jerusalem, on the very route over which Jesus carried his heavy cross, stopping at the fourteen stations to commemorate what took place at each, and, leaving the city proper, climbing

up the slope of Mount Calvary to the place of the crucifixion.

We will notice four things in particular on arriving at the Basilica of the Holy Sepulchre: The very large dome that covers the tomb of Christ, another dome, much smaller, over the Greek Orthodox Church, the high Bell Tower and a large number of girders, placed there to support the old wall and to carry on the work of restoration.

Christians of all denominations venerated the spot where Christ proved He was Man, by dying as all men do, and that He was God, by doing what no other man can do, Rising from the Dead. To discourage this the Roman veneration Emperor Hadrian built here a Temple to Venus. In the fourth century the Greek Emperor Constantine and his mother, St. Helena, undertook the searching for the True Cross, which marvelously enough they found intact. Today, relics of the True Cross are spread over the entire Christian Church and can be venerated by Christians of all nations. Bishop Marcarious of Jerusalem was given a part of the True Cross and each Friday it was venerated. Since three crosses were found together, a dying woman was brought and each of the three crosses were touched by her. On touching the third, she was suddenly cured and thus it was known to be the Cross of Christ.

The first christian church was built in 335, following this great discovery having the tomb of Christ in the circular Chapel of the Resurrection. When the Persians sacked Jerusalem, this was burnt, only to be rebuilt shortly afterwards by Abbote Modestus, with monies coming from Alexandria and its Patriarch. The Mohammedans again destroyed it in 1010, but it was again restored in 1048 by Emperor Constantine Monomachus. Parts of all three rebuildings can still

"Renewal of Baptism Promises" at St. George's Thorne Centre

On Good Friday evening April 8th part of an ancient Christian pre-Easter rite was held "Renewal of Baptism Promises", in Saint George's Anglican Church, Thorne Centre.

At the beginning of the Service, all persons present read over together the meaning of Duty to God and Duty to Neighbor from the revised Catechism.

An exhortation from The Holy Communion was then read, with explanations, setting out the importance of preparation before receiving Holy Communion and methods of preparation.

In the middle of the service proper, which included reading from Holy Scripture and Psalms those present read out together the three promises made at Baptism.

The congregation then renew-

be seen even after the Crusaders in the 12th century added their ideas of beauty. A fire in 1808 gutted this ancient structure and it was then that the Greek Orthodox came into the picture. The earthquake of 1927 weakened the walls and a fire in 1949 damaged the dome. The former necessitated the girders to sustain the weakened walls and a lighter dome was built, and in 1959 the Greek Orthodox the Armenian and the Catholic Churches agreed to jointly take over all needed repairs.

Since Christians, in spite of all these mishaps, have shown their determination to preserve the Shrine of Calvary, we can expect that all future generations will continue this endeavor. At the Last Supper, Christ had expressed a desire that His death be recalled till His future Coming.

ed their Baptism Promises before God and in the presence of one another, using part of the Service of Confirmation for this purpose.

Renewal of Baptism promises goes back to the custom of the early Christian Church. In early times, Baptism was not held several times throughout the year, as is the general practice today. Instead all infants and adults to be baptized were baptized at one service. This took place on Easter Even, that is, the night before the break of dawn of Easter Day.

At this time, it was the custom in many churches for persons who had already been baptized to renew their vows also.

The historic promises at Baptism are: to renounce evil, to believe in the Christian Faith, and to obey God's will and commandments.

During the Service of Preparation for Easter held at the Thorne Centre Church, the Apostle's Creed was recited, as an affirmation in the One true God who is Creator, Forgiver and Strengtheners.

The Cross on the Altar was shrouded in Black, bringing to mind the event commemorated each anniversary of the original Good Friday, the Crucifixion of Jesus of Nazareth, Son of God.

Special Hymns were sung during the Service: "Glory be to Jesus". "O Sacred Head Surrounded" and "There is a Green Hill Far Away."

A special film was also shown "The Betrayal in Gethsemane".

Easter is the most important of all Christian holy days. Special preparations leading up to Easter was the main reason for the development of the penitential season of Lent.

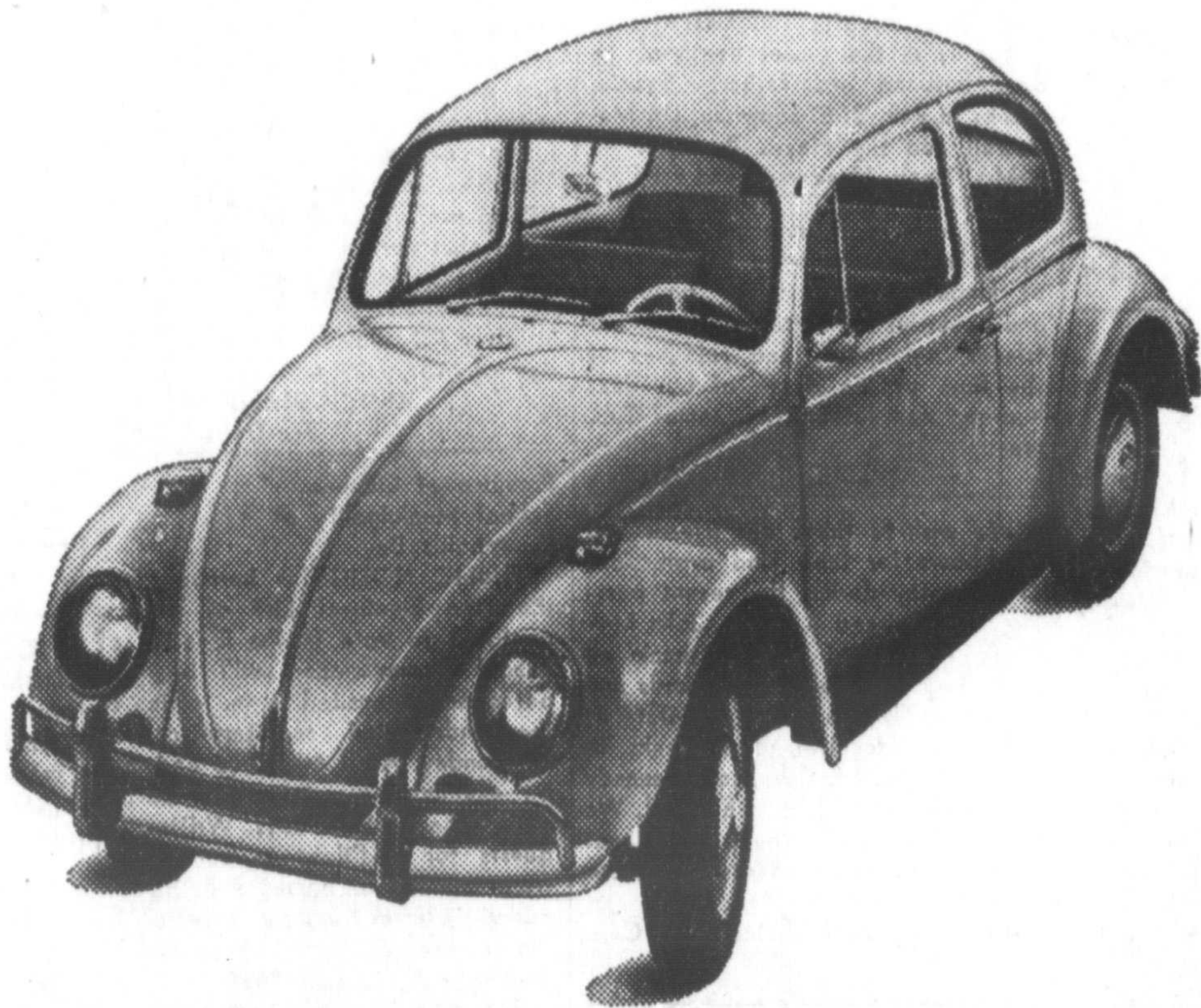
