

SEVERAL IMPORTANT PROBLEMS ARE SETTLED

Extra Police Ordered To Protect British Ministers

Egyptian Plot To Assassinate Gov't Officials

Alleged Egyptian Plot to Assassinate Prominent Members of British Government and Destroy Various Public Buildings in London is Regarded as Very Serious in Government Quarters—Stated that Police Chiefs of Scotland Yard Were Summoned for a Conference, and Specially Experienced Officers Assigned to Protect Ministers, While Extra Guard of Armed Police Was Allotted to Every Governmental Building—Thus Far Nothing Has Been Learned of Alleged Plot from Government Sources.

LONDON, December 5.—An alleged Egyptian plot to assassinate prominent members of the British Government and destroy various public buildings in London is reported by the Daily Mail, which declares Government quarters regard it very seriously.
A late edition of the paper says news of the discovery of the plot was sent to the Foreign Office by Lord Allenby, the High Commissioner in Egypt, and that a special meeting was immediately summoned to consider his despatch.
After the cabinet meeting, the account continues, Sir William Johnson-Hicks, the Home Secretary, summoned the police chiefs of Scotland Yard for a conference, and specially experienced officers were assigned to protect the ministers, while an extra guard of armed police was also allotted to every governmental departmental building.
Thus far nothing has been learned of the alleged plot from Government sources.
According to the Daily Mail the plot grew out of propaganda fomented by the executive branch of the Egyptian Nationalist organization, which has emissaries throughout the continent and England.

CABINET HAS DECIDED TO DISSOLVE EGYPTIAN PARLIAMENT

LONDON, Dec. 5.—Ziwar Pasha has informed the President of the Chamber that the Cabinet has decided to dissolve Parliament, according to the newspaper Akshar, quoted by the Cairo correspondent of the Daily Telegraph, who adds: "A royal decree dissolving Parliament is expected today."

MINISTERS AND OFFICIALS OF STATE ARE GOING ABOUT DUTIES TODAY ACCOMPANIED BY BODYGUARDS

LONDON, Dec. 5.—The British Cabinet ministers and many other officials of state are going about their duties today accompanied by the bodyguards of various proportions attached to them by orders from the Home Secretary as a precaution against violence by Egyptian sympathizers, whose alleged plots against these personages have been disclosed.
The discovery in Cairo of a plot in which the prime movers were asserted to have been planning operations against the British ministers was communicated to London yesterday and placed before the cabinet here. That body immediately took steps to safeguard itself and the others concerned.
In the official departments to which the plot was revealed it was stated today that the facts were as yet very meagre, that the exact extent of the plotters' activities was not known and that the bodyguards were being used as more of a precaution than against the existence of any imminent danger.
Similar precautions were taken often during the European war and the Irish troubles, it is recalled.
No arrests have as yet been made in London, but it was said some might be expected soon.

TWO WENT THROUGH ICE AND WERE DROWNED

MOVE TO SETTLE DISPUTE OVER LABRADOR BOUNDARY

Newfoundland Delegation Appointed to Confer With Canadian and Quebec Governments.

It is understood the delegation will be leaving here some time this month.

VISCOUNT CECIL IS WINNER OF \$25,000 PRIZE

Rendered Most Meritorious Service of Public Character Looking to Establishment of Peace Through Justice.

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—Viscount Cecil of Chelwood, formerly Lord Robert Cecil, was yesterday declared winner of the first \$25,000 award of the Woodrow Wilson Foundation. Norman Davis, president of the foundation board of trustees, announced that Viscount Cecil had been chosen by the jury of award as the person "who rendered the most meritorious service of a public character looking toward the establishment of a peace through justice, and who had done most to give effect to the ideals and great plan for world peace" to which Mr. Wilson gave so much thought and effort.

WOULD RETURN MONEY TO THE INDIAN PRINCE

Robinson Will Appeal Judgment in Midland Bank Case—Further Startling Developments Impending.

LONDON, Dec. 5.—C. E. Robinson will appeal against the judgment in the Midland Bank case and has executed a deed of assignment making over all his rights in the £125,000 which he claims from the bank, according to a statement made to the press in behalf of Mrs. Robinson, who says she has begged her husband to fight the case to the last ditch.
The deed of assignment, according to Mrs. Robinson, provides that if the appeal is successful, the money shall go to a public trustee to repay Sir Hari Singh, who parted with it in consequence of an alleged blackmailing plot hinging on his reputed relations with Mrs. Robinson; if the Rajah refuses to accept the money, the trustee is empowered to pay the amount to any hospital or charity chosen by him.
Further startling developments in connection with the case are impending, according to current reports. The question whether the Rajah will testify in the coming criminal proceedings of William Cooper Hobbs and James Charles Arthur, Sir Hari's aide-de-camp, is much canvassed, but reports in this connection are contradictory.
According to some, the Indian potentate is not likely to be asked to testify, and probably would not assent to do so if asked, while others say he is willing either to attend court or to give his testimony under affidavit.
Contrary to a report printed in another London paper to the effect that the Rajah was sailing from Bombay for England, the Daily Mail today says he is now in Europe and can easily be communicated with if necessary.

NINE KILLED IN EXPLOSION AT COLLIERY

Explosion of Fire Damp Caused Casualties—Several Others Are Reported Missing.

WREXHAM, Wales, Dec. 5.—Nine men were killed and many were missing in consequence of a colliery explosion early this morning.
An explosion of fire damp caused the casualties, which it is believed were confined to the nine known dead. Eight of the bodies, badly burned, have been brought to the surface and the rescuers are working hard to find the ninth.

MESSAGERS HELD UP AT SAN FRANCISCO

Charles And Francis Aiken, Of Whitehall, Ordered By Judge Lemay To Stand Trial For Murder Of George Benton Last May

Preliminary Hearing in Case Was Concluded at St. Johns Yesterday—Contemplated Line of Opposition Abandoned by Counsel for Defence—Brothers Will Remain in Bordeaux Jail Until Trial.

CHARLES and Francis Aiken, two brothers of Whitehall, N. Y., arrested in connection with the shooting and killing of George Benton, at Roxton, Que., in May last, were yesterday morning ordered to stand trial before the criminal court by Judge J. H. Lemay following the completion of the preliminary hearing at St. Johns.
This case has been before the court at St. Johns for some time, and has caused a considerable amount of interest. At a hearing several weeks ago the case was suddenly adjourned on a request of Col. J. J. Creelman, K. C., appearing for the defence, in order that he might bring a certain point before the Superior Court for decision. Col. Creelman claimed that as Benton, the murdered man, was shot in Canada but died several days later in a hospital in the United States, there was no murder committed in Canada, and consequently the Canadian Courts had no jurisdiction in this case. Judge Lemay refused to allow this motion to stand, but stated that the Canadian Courts did have power to act. The case was then adjourned in order that this question might be decided by the Superior Court.
Col. Creelman, however, shortly after the adjournment stated that he had come to the conclusion that the moment was inopportune for action, and that he would not bring this question before the Superior Court.
Following the decision of the defence, the Crown declared that its witnesses had all been heard, and as the defence had no more witnesses, the enquete was concluded yesterday with Judge Lemay's decision.
Superior Court likely to meet in early part of year.
It is not known exactly when the case will come up before the criminal court as the fall term at St. Johns was cancelled in October owing to the lack of cases. The Crown Attorney, Andre Regnier, the sheriff and the prothonotary of St. Johns, will, however, communicate at once with the Attorney-General's office at Quebec asking for a term of the Court of the King's Bench as soon as possible. It is thought, however, that such a term can take place before the end of January or early in February next. This delay, it is explained, is caused by the fact that it will be some time before the decision of the Attorney-General can be sent to St. Johns officials. Then, it is claimed, it will need a month of preparation to assign the jurymen and the witnesses.
After their appearance in the court yesterday morning the Aiken brothers were brought to Montreal by provincial detectives and placed in the Bordeaux jail where they have been held during the preliminary enquete.
Story of the Murder Recalled.
The murder of George Benton occurred on the evening of May 7 last when Benton was near his milk house on his farm.
The young man wearing masks suddenly came up to him and ordered him to hand over his money. He turned and ran and was chased (Continued on Page 9.)

AGREEMENT IS REACHED BETWEEN GREAT BRITAIN AND FRANCE ON MAIN INTERNATIONAL QUESTIONS

Premier Herriot and Austen Chamberlain, British Secretary for Foreign Affairs, Propose to Continue Consideration of Less Pressing Matters on Lines Agreeable to Both of Them—More Specific Information as to Subjects Two Statesmen Discussed Was Withheld for the Moment.

PAYS PENALTY FOR THE MURDER OF SWEETHEART

Shooting Occurred While Couple Were Out Driving and Their Marriage Was Being Discussed.

LINDSAY, Ont., Dec. 5.—Fredrick William McGaughey was executed at four o'clock this morning for the murder of his sweetheart, Miss Beatrice Fee, on May 25 last. The shooting occurred while the couple were driving near here in a motor car and when the subject of their marriage was being discussed.
The hanging this morning was two hours ahead of the prescribed time, and ten seconds after the condemned man stepped on the gallows the execution was completed. Pulsation ended four minutes after the trap was sprung.
Relatives of McGaughey visited the jail last night and said farewell to the young man, his aged mother being among the visitors. Rev. A. McIntosh, his spiritual adviser, remained with McGaughey throughout the night, and this morning declared that he fully repented of his act.
McGaughey went to the gallows this morning with a steady step and after the execution executioner "thrust Ellis announced that the fracture was a perfect one."
The funeral took place at 6:30 this morning with interment in Lindsay cemetery. No relatives of the dead man were present however, the minister and undertaker being the only persons to witness the burial.
William Fee, father of the murdered girl, had requested permission to witness the execution, but this was not allowed by the authorities.

SIX KILLED AND SEVEN PROBABLY FATALY HURT IN REAR-END COLLISION

France Plans A Complete Reconstruction Of Fleet At Cost Of Ten Billion Francs

Work to Be Spread Over Twenty Years—Particular Attention Will Be Given To Strengthening Mediterranean Fleet, Which in Many Respects Is Far Inferior to Italian, and to Development of Air Service.

PARIS, Dec. 5.—France's new naval programme as outlined in the report of the Chamber of Deputies Commission, just published, calls for complete reconstruction of the fleet at a cost of ten billion francs, the work to be spread over a period of twenty years.
The programme provides for a high seas fleet consisting of 178,000 tons of battleships, as authorized by the Washington agreement; 360,000 tons of cruisers and des-

MUCH LIQUOR SMUGGLED FROM NEW ENGLAND

Alcohol Manufactured in Belgium Is Being Distributed in This Province, It Is Stated.

QUEBEC, Dec. 5.—Huge quantities of alcohol manufactured in Belgium, slightly colored to resemble Scotch whiskey, put up in suitable containers, and packed with a view to withstanding a considerable amount of knocking about, have reached the United States during the past few weeks. The liquor has been landed at various points on the New England coast, transferred to the city of Boston, thence to Northern Vermont, and ultimately has been safely conveyed to different points in this province, after which the liquor would be distributed throughout Canada at enormous profit to the men higher up.

These facts which were gleaned here yesterday from a United States official, who has just returned from a trip to the eastern sections of the States, throw a new light on the activities of a powerful smuggling organization which is said to have at its head a number of prominent Canadian and American financiers representing millions of dollars.
A significant fact was here learned when the information was forthcoming that just a few days ago a large motor-truck, loaded with the liquor, successfully ran the gauntlet from the outskirts of Boston to a place in Northern Vermont in something less than forty-eight hours. The facts, apparently, had not become known until the huge load had left American territory and was well on its way to the Province of Quebec.
A watch was set for those in charge of the truck and every effort was made to have the alcohol seized, but the gang, it is thought, had been "tipped off," and succeeded in delivering the wet goods on Canadian soil, from where it will be distributed to other points in this country.
Though the French possession of St. Pierre, Miquelon, has been known as the distributing centre for the majority of liquor shipments that find their way into the United States and Canada in contravention to the laws of both countries, it is stated that the Belgian manufacturer is brought direct from Europe on steamers and other craft, and is only landed when the American coast is reached.

CLAIM AGAINST
MAGOG TEXTILE
IS REVIEWED

Mayor of Newport Is Opposed to a Settlement of Claims by Private Agreement.

NEWPORT, Vt., Dec. 5.—Mayor W. C. Lindsay, of Newport, in a very clear, positive way, states his opposition to any private settlement of the damages alleged to have been done by the Dominion Textile Co. of Magog, P.Q., in raising the levels of the waters of Lake Memphremagog. His statement to the Caledonian-Record in full, follows:

"I deem it of municipal importance to direct the attention of the citizens to the recent maneuver of the Dominion Textile Company and its allied interests, if any, in its recent gesture designed to effect a premature settlement for damages to private parties for overflowing their land due to raising the dam at Magog—as outlined in the letter of the 10th inst., and detailed in the meeting of the 22nd inst., by Attorney Aaron H. Grout, its special local attorney.

"So far as I am aware, the city received neither a copy of said letter nor notice of said meeting. This is significant because of the city's ready heavy damage sustained which will be tremendously multiplied by accrual if the lake level is maintained at its present height, and the former identity of Attorney Grout as the city's counsel in the premises. The city should have had formal notice of the proceedings.

"The lake is International Waters and a public highway between natural low and high water marks. And any person or corporation employing artificial means calculated to disturb its flow or spread of waters beyond the marks stated, without international authority to do so, is encroaching upon both public and private rights, and is subject to both restraint and damages.

"Without international authority—and in defiance of it, the textile company has impounded the lake waters, and by its dam, caused the water level to rise several feet above its natural high water mark. The city in its behalf—and of others, petitioned our government to have the company restrained in its default and pay damages for its invasion. This action was taken several years ago, and is now pending adjudication with the proper tribunal. Until that tribunal determines from facts and circumstances the extent of high water level in the lake to be maintained, and issues its mandate, the city will be in no position to treat with the textile company on the question of damages.

"For the season of 1924, the lake level has been maintained about four feet above its natural high water mark, receding from peak level more or less due to rain and outflow. If an order issues insuring present artificial high water mark, now controlled by the company's dam, the city's sewer system discharging into the lake will be submerged from four to six feet deep, and by flooding the lines, destroy its efficiency. Our highways bordering rivers and lake shore, by wave wash will melt away by erosion unless protected by stone shoulders. Our bridge abutments of earth fill likewise. We are confronted with these two latter problems, and this year have expended hundreds of dollars to protect a small area of one road which will call for thousands more in the future. Much of the land donated to the city for park purposes, is now under water—defeated of its beneficial design. Large new areas have also been partly flooded evolving new nestings for the unwelcome propagation of mosquitoes.

"The Mayor owing land affected by the foregoing trespass was notified in his private capacity of above proceedings; and was present at the meeting noted. City Attorney Cleary was also here. The city has heard nothing judicially affecting the petition since hearings and testimony taken by engineers about three years ago. The mayor has arrived at the following conclusions affecting present proceedings:

"The textile company wants to settle all issues and damages between parties—by agreement, rather than submit to an international mandate, and in advance of it. But it demands of all parties to settlement, in payment for damages, a warranty deed of shore and water rights affected, and that in the conveyance the grantor shall assent to its government, that the lake level may be maintained as it is now impounded by the textile company's dam, and transmit to its government by suggestion that character will be unopposed.

"The City of Newport is the trustee of the lands donated it for park purposes; it cannot deed them away. Its highways and bridges are under Sovereign control. Obviously, the city's sewerage system must continue unimpaired of its efficiency. The mosquitoes—we will gladly relinquish.

"In view of the foregoing, in behalf of the city and for other reasons, I stated on the floor of the meeting, that I would decline to listen to any terms of settlement by private agreement, nor until the city was informed judicially of the maximum high level of water to be maintained in the lake. A local paper as it is now impounded by the textile company's dam, and transmit to its government by suggestion that character will be unopposed.

"It was also stated in the meeting that the textile company to date had already expended more than \$50,000 in defending its position—and would continue its course and expense to attain its ends. City Attorney Cleary, in addressing the meeting commenting on this unusual expenditure said, he did not doubt the figures at all, for in the preparation of the textile company's case and the testimony presented by it, after reviewing the transcript of evidence—it was one of the best prepared cases he ever read. A kindly scribe reported that it was Mr. Grout's case Mr. Cleary was referring to.

Mr. Grout admitted that he was retained by the textile company in these proceedings, but in view of his former connection with the case, he was moved by personal interests and

desired to reach a mutual settlement satisfactory to all claimants for damages—that he was acting as mediator in the premises. Impossible—a paid attorney for one party cannot mediate a contesting issue between it and the opposite party. The situation is untenable.

Since these proceedings both the City Attorney and myself have addressed Washington requesting official information as to the latest judicial status of the case. In my letter, I transmitted a copy of Mr. Grout's letter of the 10th inst., and called official attention to what transpired at the meeting of the 22nd. I will see that the citizens are fully advised of the progress made in the case.

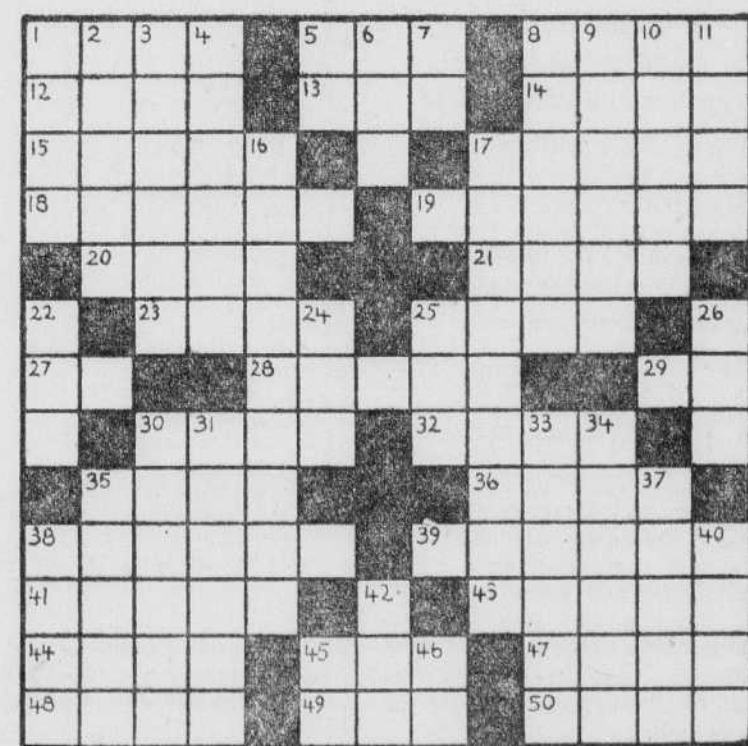

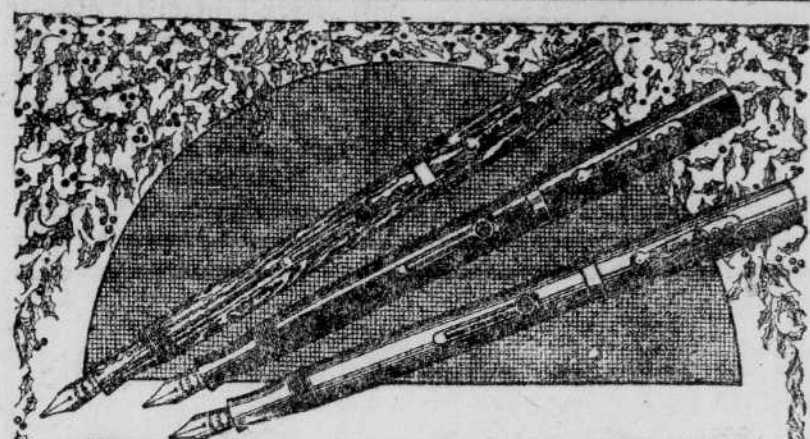

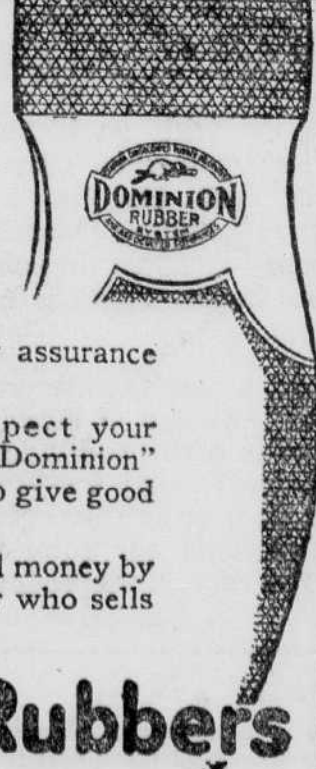

AUTO THIEF IS SENTENCED TO FIVE YEARS

Man Found Guilty of Stealing
Auto from Local Garage Sentenced for Taking Stolen Articles into the U. S.

Girard Prevost, alias Royer Roy, who was accused on August last of stealing an Essex auto from the garage of Messrs. O'Donnell and Morissette, was sentenced yesterday at St. Albans Vt., to five years in the penitentiary, when he was found guilty of taking stolen goods into the United States.

The matter was immediately placed in the hands of the local police department, and received the close attention of Captain Camirand, which resulted a short time later in locating the car. A thorough effort was made on the part of Captain Camirand to have Ray brought before the Canadian Courts for trial, but he was wanted by the American authorities for several serious charges, and a compromise was reached between Captain Camirand and the American officials.

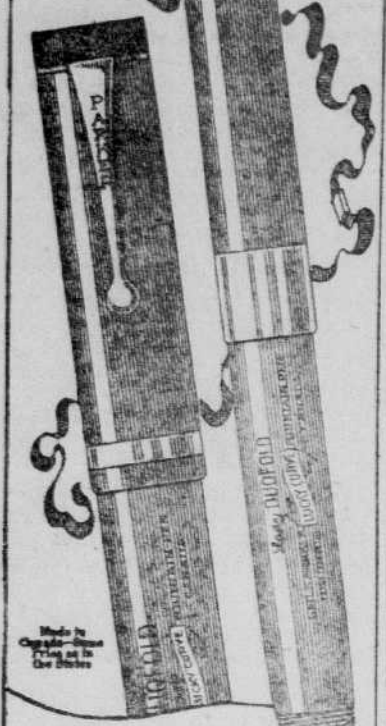

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—A portrait of the President of the United States was put on the air in London this week and twenty minutes later was reproduced in New York.

As the finished picture was removed from an oscillating cylinder in the offices of the Radio Corporation of America, the jiggling stylus which had drawn it remained poised for a moment. Then there was a buzz, the stylus perked its head this way and that and, putting its inky nose to the paper, traced out a panel in which it embroidered these words from an old Chinese proverb:

“One picture is worth 10,000 words.”

Again the stylus rested for a moment, and again it resumed dancing upon that cylinder, until, as the hours passed, it perfected the likenesses of Premier Stanley Baldwin, Charles E. Hughes, Secretary of State; the Prince of Wales, Queen Mother Alexandra, Owen D. Young; showed H. M. S. Raclama-tion aground in the Tees River and the finish of the Oxford-Cambridge relay races, and topped off the performance with an artistic flourish by reproducing a mural from the Royal Academy.

Radio corporation officials announced at the end of the demonstration that the all-American invention that for radiocasting of photographs, paintings, and printed messages was a complete success.

Few Refinements Needed.

With but little refinement, said the inventors, the process could be made available immediately for the almost instantaneous transatlantic transportation of news pictures, of secret business messages, of diplomatic correspondence and of identification photographs.

The device through which it is expected all these things will become a matter of routine radio transit between continents was developed by C. H. Taylor, chief engineer of the radio corporation, E. F. W. Alexanderson, consulting engineer, and R. H. Ranger, directing engineer.

Owen D. Young, president of the General Electric Company, set the inventors working when he said, on the occasion of Gen. James G. Harbord's inauguration as president of the radio corporation, twenty-one months ago: “Radio's big day will come when one can glance at a picture in a London newspaper and say, ‘New York newspapers are carrying the same picture today!’”

The first photoradiograms, as they are called, were sent months ago—by wire from New York to the radio transmitting station at Tuckerton, N. J., thence by air 230 miles to the receiving station at Riverhead, Long Island, and thence again by wire into New York.

When those transmissions proved successful, photographs were transmitted by radio to England and return. They could not be received in England, because there was no apparatus there, so the radio impulses bearing the pictures flashed from Riverhead to the Marconi radio station at Carnarvon, Wales, and, without being “unscrambled,” were radiocast back to the United States to be reproduced. Thus pictures actually have been successfully transmitted twice across the Atlantic in a single operation.

A feature of the apparatus is that it operates as a simple accessory to the system of radio transmission now in commercial use. Thus, while a picture was being sent today, the London operator would “cut in” to send a news dispatch and the picture-making would be arrested. When the dispatch was “clear,” the stylus would resume its bobbing and reproduction of the picture would continue.

To send one picture required about twenty minutes. Computing the cost on the basis of the number of words that could be sent at toll rates during that time, General Harbord figured the cost of transmission per picture at \$30 to \$40. This sending time is expected to be considerably reduced. A second apparatus which will reproduce messages, advertisements or pictures on an endless spool, instead of on a limited panel, is being perfected.

The system of transmission is much like that employed by the American Telephone & Telegraph Company months ago when it sent photographs from Cleveland to New York by land wire. There is the difference, however—the A. T. & T. process reproduces a picture with parallel continuous shaded lines, while the radio pictures are made up of thousands of dots, placed in parallel.

The first is the product of a continuous electric current fluctuating under control; the second the product of a series of distinct impulses. Inventors of the latter process said they found it impossible to control a continuous current in radio transmission because of the static interference.

NEW RECORDS FOR YEAR ON WALL STREET

Rails and Industrials at Best
Prices of Year—Orders From
All Parts of U.S.

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—The stock market yesterday, continued its unprecedented advance. For the fourteenth day since the election, the turnover of shares on the Stock Exchange exceeded the 2,000,000-share mark, and there was another outburst of speculative enthusiasm, evidenced in the orders for the purchase of stocks which poured into Wall Street from all parts of the country.

The statistical record of the market, presented in bare outline of figures, hardly gives a fair impression of the hectic speculative conditions which ruled in the financial district yesterday. Nevertheless, it was an impressive one. Total sales of stocks aggregated 2,338,415 shares and 550 issues were dealt in. There were registered 103 new high records for the year, of which sixty were in industrial stocks and forty-three in the rails. Railroad shares, at the close, reflected a price of 79.03, at which they were up .70 for the day. The industrials, at 123.42, were up .60 for the day. The advance of the entire market, as reflected in fifty representative stocks, was .65. At the day's best price (which was not maintained) the rails were in new high ground for the year, and the "industrials," at their price, were at the highest in the history of the market.

Market conditions yesterday differed very little from those of the long succession of accelerated trading which has occurred on the Stock Exchange since the election, and in which the average of stock of all sorts has been advanced by approximately 6 1/2 points. There was the usual acceleration of the speculative issues, with the most favored groups going forward in impressive fashion. These were the railroad shares, the steels and a few of the specialties. Gains of from one to three points throughout the list were more or less common. On the other hand, shares based on less favorably situated industries, notably oil and sugar, scarcely moved during the day.

The advance in the railroad shares has led many people in the financial district to the belief that the market has developed into what may be "an old-fashioned rail market." Stocks of the well known railroad corporations were in active demand today, but there was too, the hint that these same stocks are under "pool control" and are being sold for the account of many who were sufficiently fortunate to buy them during the summer and early fall.

Yesterday's final hour action of many stocks was proclaimed as especially peculiar, because of the advance in the high-priced stocks and the advance in the low-priced stocks. Cynically enough, Wall Street was disposed to suppose this a "smoke screen," under cover of which the middle class stocks, which have enjoyed a big advance, were being sold. Yesterday's developments in the entire industrial and financial situation were generally constructive. The advance of sterling to \$4.68 3/4, up more than 2 1/8 cents on the day, attracted most attention, because of the fact that the advance has been so sustained and at the time of the year when cotton and grain bills are pressing most heavily on the market. The strength of francs, too, was the subject of a great deal of interest in the financial district.

Industrial news was more or less colorless. It included, however, reports of increasing strength in the prices of raw materials in many basic products, and reports from many industrial centres of an advance in the ratio of operations in some of the important basic industries.

POLICE CHIEF TOOK STAND AT INVESTIGATION

Belanger Declares that Co-operation of All Is Needed to Close "Red Light" District.

MONTREAL, Dec. 5.—Under present circumstances the "Red Light" district cannot be eliminated, declared Chief Belanger, under examination by J. P. Lanctot at the police investigation yesterday. The chief, who was examined by Mr. Lanctot in much more sympathetic vein than at other times, was pressed as to the system or systems which have brought about, and permit the continuance, of such a district. The witness, while somewhat reserved in his answers, made it clear that there is not the co-operation from the recorders necessary to permit of still greater rigor as regards the district, though he emphasized he had no intention of criticizing judgments of a court, and was prepared to accept them without demur. It was brought out, however, that no more often a disorderly house is raided the smaller it becomes the punishment. To illustrate that point, the Chief referred to a place which had been raided, and a fine of \$100 and costs imposed on the keeper. The place was raided a short time afterwards, within three weeks, and the punishment was only the costs.

Lieut. Demers, in charge of police district No. 16, stated that the talk of payments for promotion was one of the great jokes in the police station. No policeman, except an idiot, believed in a system of promotion through payments. He denied being an idiot, and was still more emphatic in his denial that he had told ex-Captain Carle that he, Demers, had paid \$500 to be made a sergeant, as Carle had testified.

Police station No. 15, according to evidence, has been the scene of two forces, those who belong to the Police Union and those who do not,

FRANCE TO CUT DOWN PERIOD OF ARMY SERVICE

On Account of Complexity of
Questions Involved, Scheme
Will Require Considerable
Time to Perfect.

(Associated Press Despatch)
PARIS, Dec. 5.—The period of military service in France would be reduced under an army reform plan now being worked out at the Ministry of War. General Nollet, the War Minister, has explained to the army committee of the Chamber of Deputies that the reduction would be made possible by an organization permitting the mobilization of all the national energies and resources without exception in the event of war, acting independently of the army, which would remain an organ of training and defence.

The general considered that under the new scheme the periods of training for reservists would have added importance, and should be made really useful and instructive. On account of the complexity of the questions involved, the scheme will require considerable time to perfect.

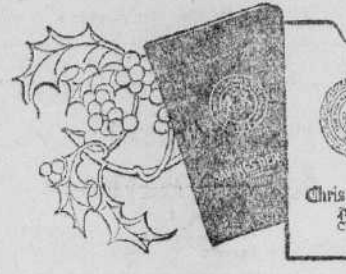

BAN JOHNSON
CENSURED BY
MINOR LEAGUESCommissioner Landis Upheld—
Minor Leaguers Closed Stormy
Session With Attack on Ameri-
can League Head.

HARTFORD, Conn., Dec. 5.—In one of the stormiest sessions in its history, the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues, involving the twenty-five minor leagues in the country, closed its annual meeting yesterday by adopting resolutions denouncing Byron Baneroff, Johnson, president of the American League for his utterances in respect to gambling conditions in the Pacific Coast League, reiterating its faith and confidence in Commissioner Kenesaw Mountain Landis as head of organized baseball and by ignoring the proposed amendments to the major-minor agreement, knifed at the major leagues for their apparent attempts to dominate baseball in the minor leagues.

Playing "a major league presi-

dent," the first resolution adopted today, for creating "doubt, confusion and a condition inimical to the welfare of baseball," and branding those who by "harassment, guerrilla tactics and otherwise" increase the perplexities of the officers of Commissioner Landis the mag-nates, went on record as saying that baseball was in "a chaotic condition" because of what they termed were "unwarranted attacks."

The parting shot taken at President Johnson in the second resolution was characterized by some of the more prominent league presidents as the most drastic measure ever adopted by baseball to clean up the haze of suspicion against the National game created by Johnson's alleged insinuations. Harry A. Williams, president of the Pacific Coast League, whose circuit introduced the first resolution yesterday which resulted in the general resolution adopted by the convention as a whole, said that Johnson's charges of gambling on the coast would be probed to the roots of their source and that he would be forced publicly to prove his charges or withdraw them.

CHANGES WILL
BE MADE ALONG
BOUNDARY LINE

Plan to Move Canadian Customs
Closer to International Bound-
ary Line.

QUEBEC, Dec. 5.—At a number of places along the International border through the New England states, and even a little farther west, the forces of preventive officers in the employ of the federal department of customs and excise, and that of the inland revenue, will shortly have their headquarters changed from their present location to points much nearer the boundary.

This move, which is considered as being one of the most important to be studied by the Hon. Jacques Bureau, minister of customs and excise, and his colleagues of a recent tour of inspection made by the minister to a number of border points in the eastern states, the facts of which were brought to light here this morning.

The minister of customs is accredited with making the statement, after he had inspected the territory referred to, that the Canadian preventives were too far removed from the line to cope effectively with the situation. It was established that in many cases they had their headquarters some three miles this side of the American line, while at one or two points they were at a distance of from eight to ten miles away.

MURDERER IS
ANXIOUS TO DIE
BEFORE XMAS

Trial of Man Accused of Killing
Twenty-Seven Young Men
Since 1918 Opens at Hanover,
Germany.

(Associated Press Despatch)

HANOVER, Germany, Dec. 5.—"I want to be dead before Christmas," is the insistent demand of Fritz Haarmann, the Hanover butcher whose trial for the murder of twenty-seven young men since 1918, opened here yesterday.

Haarmann, who at the time of his arrest gloated over the murders he had committed, now acts like a man violently insane, jumping about, excitedly tearing his hair and suddenly breaking off in the middle of sentences, apparently losing continuity of thought. He stubbornly declines suggestions from the court that he retire for a while and try to calm himself, however, insisting upon having the trial hurried along.

Haarmann confesses to the murder of fourteen of those he is accused of slaying, but agrees with suggestions that his victims may have exceeded this number. He admits cutting up the bodies and disposing of them, a task that he says usually took him two days, but denies selling the flesh as animal meat.

References to his late father invariably provokes outbursts from the prisoner. "My last word before being beheaded will be a curse upon

my father," he cried on one occasion. Haarmann's alleged chief helper, Hans Graft, denies all the charges of complicity in the crimes. One hundred and ninety witnesses will be summoned in the course of the trial, it is forecast.

KORETZ IS SENTENCED

(Associated Press Despatch)
CHICAGO, Dec. 5.—Leo Koretz, master swindler, yesterday was sentenced to prison from one to ten years on the charge of larceny, the first of four charges to which he pleaded guilty yesterday.

Koretz, who took \$2,000,000 from relatives, friends and others whom he entrapped in his Bayano River oil promotion, heard the sentence without show of emotion, as it was pronounced by Chief Justice Hopkins. There were then to follow the sentence of the other charges of confidence game and larceny.

TO CONTINUE SEARCH FOR
BODY OF AMBROSE SMALL

Sisters of Missing Toronto Millionaire Plan to Have Dump Excavated in Search for Brother's Remains.

TORONTO, Dec. 5.—Basing their hope on the story of a man who said that on the night of Ambrose Small's disappearance in December, 1919, he had seen a motor car drive to a dump in Rose-dale, the fashionable district of Toronto, and several men carry a bundle into the darkness, the Misses Florence and Gertrude Small, sisters of the missing Toronto millionaire, are considering spending \$5,000 to have the dump excavated in search of their brother's remains. They plan to have a steam shovel at work within a week or so.
