

WMA prepares annexation fight

Calls open meeting, urges Blier protests to halt Quebec move

The Westmount Municipal Association has launched an all out campaign to prevent the 'strongly rumored' implementation of recommendations contained in the Blier Report.

The Association has been given to understand that the Quebec Government plans to put through the Blier proposals as soon as possible.

If the Blier recommendations, now being studied by a special cabinet committee, are implemented they would set up a Montreal General Council through which suburban municipalities would be dominated by the City of Montreal.

Scores of letters and telegrams have been sent to provincial officials requesting that no action be taken until the report can be given further study.

GENERAL MEETING

The Association's executive met Tuesday evening and approved a special committee's recommendation that a general meeting of the 2,000 membership be called. March 23 has been set as a tentative date for the Victoria Hall meeting. Also approved was a proposal to send out to every Westmount citizen a letter outlining the annexation danger inherent in the Blier Report.

"We of the Westmount Municipal Association recognize the desirability of some form of metropolitan organization," WMA President Robert L. Hunter told The Examiner, "but such an organization must not be under the complete domination of any one community."

The Blier Report calls for a

1965 campaign

'Y' seeks \$11,500 locally

Plans are now being made by the Westmount YMCA, as it joins with eight other divisions in launching the Montreal YMCA's 1965 Annual Financial Campaign.

This year, the city-wide objective is \$310,000.00 of which Westmount has accepted an increased goal of \$11,500.

During the two week Campaign period, March 27th - April 12th, 89 volunteer canvassers, divided into 20 teams will visit over 1150 Westmount homes and business firms.

D. H. Gatehouse, Chairman of the Westmount Division, announced today, "In a concentrated effort to complete our canvassing within the two-week period, we are planning a "One-day Blitz" for Saturday, March 27th. Canvassers will gather at Altitude 737, Place Ville Marie, for breakfast on the 27th, to receive their campaign kits and last minute instructions. Canvassers then plan to spend the rest of the day calling on subscribers.

In commenting on the Blitz, G. L. Welton, Branch Executive Secretary stated "This is a new venture this year but we are confident that 70% of our resi-

Mayor corrects Saulnier

Mayor Michael L. Tucker late this week issued a statement answering charges by Lucien Saulnier that citizens of Westmount are using pressure methods to delay implementation of the Blier Report.

Said Mayor Tucker in the statement:

"The charge by Mr. Lucien Saulnier . . . indicates once more an apparent contempt for any demonstration of the popular will. In effect, the citizens of Westmount and their elected representatives are being condemned for exercising their right to make representations to Provincial authorities.

"While we have no desire to engage in a quarrel with Mr. Saulnier, it should be pointed out that it is the City of Montreal which might in fact be accused of pressure tactics. For some time now, Mr. Saulnier has been making frequent trips to Quebec City

"We have not suggested that there was anything reprehensible about Mr. Saulnier exercising his right to discuss Metropolitan matters in Quebec.

"Before criticising the proposed contribution by the City of Westmount to the costs of the Subway,

Up to Stanton street

City staff moves next weekend

All departments located at City Hall will be moved to the Stanton street City Hall Annex

and Police Station after March 19.

The big move will take place Friday evening and Saturday of that weekend. Any one having business at City Hall will have to locate the department concerned in the Stanton street buildings.

City officials have been working to relocate the departments so that Westmount citizens will have the least difficulty in doing business with the city while the City Hall undergoes interior renovation during the next five months.

A map detailing the location of each department is being prepared at City Hall.

Departments now located in the City Hall Annex, 15 Stanton street — Health, Welfare, and Accounts — are not involved in the relocation.

Beginning the morning of March 22, the Light and Power

Department, and the Finance Department, including the cashier, will be located on the third floor of the City Hall Annex. Persons having business with these departments need only enter at 15 Stanton and take the elevator to the third floor.

The offices of the General Manager, City Clerk, City Engineer, Building Inspector, Assessors' and Purchasing will all be found on the second floor of the Police Station at 21 Stanton street. Some of the departments will be entered via stairs down a corridor on the ground floor of the station, and others by stairs or elevator immediately left of the entrance to the Police Station. The map will show clearly how to reach each department.

Meetings of City Council will be held in the court room on the second floor of the Police Station.

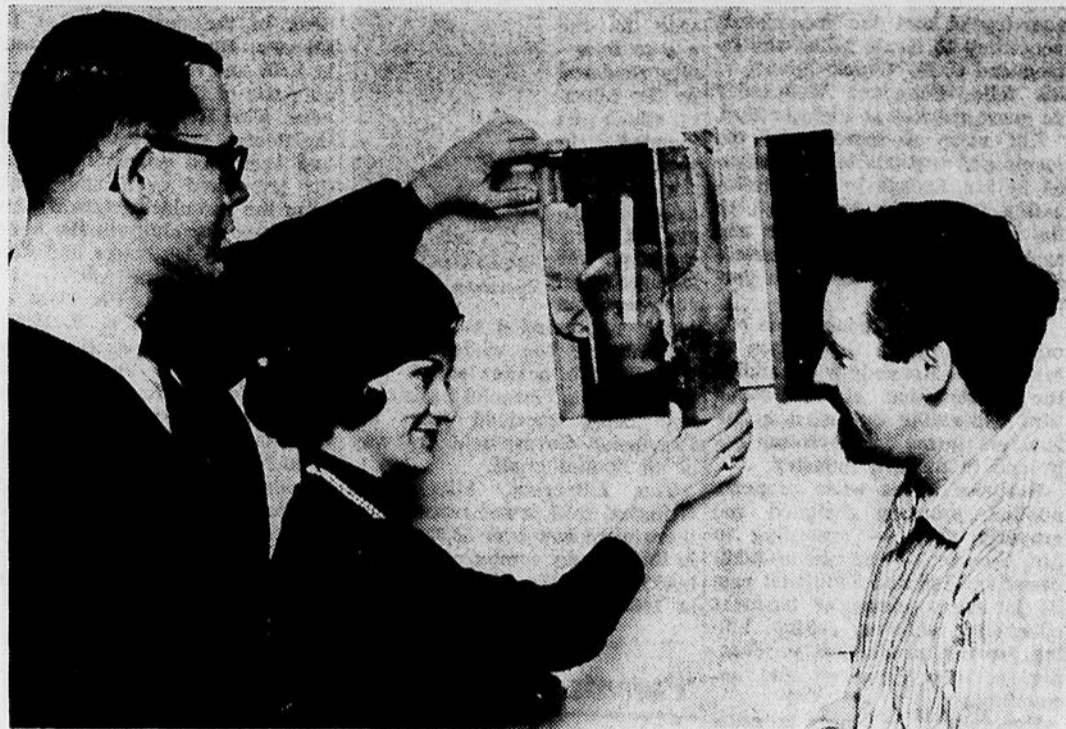

WE SAY

Quebec silence should end

THE Westmount Municipal Association believes it has good reason to fear that Quebec may act quickly to implement recommendations of the Blier Report that would clear the way for annexation moves by Montreal.

The Association is not known to panic without cause. The time has come for someone with authority in the Quebec Government to make clear exactly what are its plans and attitudes in relation to the whole annexation question.

Last week in the letters to the editor column there appeared a very welcome letter from the Speaker of the Quebec House, Hon. J. Richard Hyde. Mr. Hyde stated that he meets with the Premier and the cabinet on numerous occasions. Mr. Hyde is in a position to know what the situation is in Quebec. It is hoped that he will be invited to appear at the public meeting planned by the WMA.

As for Mr. Saulnier's charges that protests by Westmounters on the Blier question are "pressure", we can only say that we certainly hope they are, and that they continue. The will of the people can only be known if they speak up; and we hope that the voice of the people still is able to "pressure" their government into taking into consideration the popular will.

Mr. Saulnier should have taken the time to study pertinent statistics.

"According to the Blier Commission the Island of Montreal have a total taxable valuation of \$5,940,605,980., and the City of Westmount a taxable valuation of \$116,575,304. Westmount's percentage of the Island total, therefore, is 1.96%.

"A second index of Westmount's mission report, municipalities relationship to the rest of the Island is the percentage used by the Quebec Government for sales tax distribution. Westmount receives 1.71% of the total sales tax distributed on the Island of Montreal.

"The third index is the percentage by the Montreal Metropolitan Corporation with respect to sharing of costs by member municipalities. Westmount is assessed 3% of total MMC costs.

"Early in 1964 the City of Westmount, desirous of making a reasonable contribution to the projected subway, requested cost figures from the City of Montreal. Such estimates were provided by the Finance Department of the City of Montreal and, on the basis of the figures supplied, the annual deficit for the entire subway, both north-south and east-west lines, was calculated at an average of \$1,957,598. for a period of 40 years. This amount includes debt service for capital costs.

"Although the population of the City of Westmount represents only 2.24% of the combined populations of Westmount and Montreal and although the other indices were much lower, the City of Westmount offered to pay 3.83% of the subway's annual operating deficit and debt service — an amount of \$75,000. per year, repeat, \$75,000. per year.

"If the same yardstick were applied to all municipalities on the Island, the City of Montreal would, as Mr. Saulnier well knows, fare more than equitably. While the Westmount offer was inordinately generous, based on the indices outlined, we felt that we were merely doing our duty as residents of the metropolitan region.

"Mr. Saulnier's suggestion that \$75,000. was our contribution to the West End Terminal is incorrect. We were in fact offering to pay more than our fair share of the subway's total annual deficit and part of the capital costs, despite the fact that Westmount's offer to participate in the financing of the subway was turned down and Montreal clearly stated before the Legislature that

Rotarians hear about many forms

There are many kinds of forms — including the femme form divine; and many kinds of systems, including plumbing systems, systems for beating the race-tracks and the income-tax, according to Ernie Mills who introduced C. He did, however, introduce one other form — in the person of Miss Leona Kennedy who handled the presentation of the sound film illustrating the latest in the business forms and systems approach to modern industry.

Business forms when properly applied, properly designed and properly used — according to Mr. Spence — can mean additional savings and additional profit in every phase of business operation, including selling, billing, storing, production, purchasing, personnel, payroll and accounting.

Paperwork, he said, is often referred to as the 'nerve system' of a business, and is the major medium of communications for planning and controlling operations. It records and informs — to help each to do his or her job better. Without it, he stressed, most operating decisions today could not be made.

Improvements, he added, are usually possible in form design, writing method and in the procedure followed.

He was thanked by Gordon Empey.

Atwater Library

Annual meeting told books number 56,000

Norman English was re-elected President of the Mechanics' Institute of Montreal at the 125th Annual Meeting held in the Atwater Library on Monday, March 8, 1965.

In his report to the Members Mr. English spoke of the long history of service to the community rendered by the Library, which was founded in 1840. In addition to its excellent library, a program of free lectures, film showings and music appreciation concerts are held during the winter season. Mr. English acknowledged with gratitude the financial assistance now being received from the Provincial Government by way of an annual grant.

The Librarian, Miss Sybil Grimson, said in her report, that there were now over 56,000 books in the Library compared with 395 books when the Library opened in 1840. Fiction, biography, his-

tory and travel books were still the most popular as they had been in the early days of the Library. Membership now stands at 1,500 and members come from all parts of the city and the suburbs. The Reference and Reading Rooms, which are free to all, had been well patronized during the year and over 5,000 books from the Circulating Library had been used for study in the building. Moms hear scientists, trade twin articles at 'friendly' club

Any Westmount parents who have twins may find it worthwhile to join the Parents of Twins Club.

Mrs. J. B. Dossetor, 530 Mount Pleasant avenue, the mother of five-year-old twins joined and found the club interesting enough to become actively involved, so much so that two years ago she was elected president.

"You learn a great deal from the meetings," Mrs. Dossetor reports. "It is a nice little club, very friendly — if a mother has twins and she would like to go along to the meetings, she would be very welcome."

SIX YEARS AGO

The club, founded about six years ago, meets once a month in a banquet room of a Montreal restaurant.

Speakers, including prominent scientists and medical men, give their views and present studies and surveys dealing with the whole 'twin' question. The subject matter is not always limited to twins — psychiatrists speak on child development, teenage panels are held. As Mrs. Dossetor says,

ACTIVE SOCIAL PROGRAM

The club also has an active social program. At every meeting the parents have an opportunity to get to know each other and discuss common problems and once a year a special social evening is held.

There are also practical benefits to be derived from membership. The club operates a 'thrift shop' where items for twins that otherwise might cost a considerable amount of money, are exchanged or sold. Among the items are strollers, cribs and snow suits.

WELFARE WORK

The club also does some welfare work. At Christmas baskets are made up for needy families with twins. For those of the Hebrew faith, the club puts together Chanukah baskets. Funds collected at social functions go toward sending needy twins to summer camp.

One rather special program put on by the members is a fashion show for twins. The next show will be presented at Victoria Hall, Monday, March 22 at 8:15 p.m. The proceeds will go to a retarded children's fund.

Mrs. Dossetor declined to elaborate on topics discussed by medical and psychological experts at the club's meeting, beyond saying that some controversy does exist over whether twins should be dressed the same, or be given the same toys. However, she reported that at least one doctor, Dr. Metrakas, of the Montreal Children's Hospital and McGill University, has used the club for some scientific information.

Mrs. Dossetor reports that there is also a club for French-speaking parents of twins.

Gifford at St. Matthias

Church stand needed on big social issues

Canadian churches can 'come alive' by taking a stand and taking action on the important social issues of today, Prof. C. G. Gifford said Wednesday.

He told a meeting at St. Matthias Parish Church, Westmount, that Negro Baptist churches in the southern United States had been losing members and declining a decade ago. Since they had begun working directly for Negro rights, they had 'come alive'.

"Either we can take a leaf from their book," he said, "or we can make our Lenten observance just another exercise in hypocrisy."

Mr. Gifford, New Democratic Party candidate in NDG, was speaking at a series on Pierre Berton's controversial book, The Comfortable Pew.

He denied Berton's charge that "the church, when it has been heard at all, has been weak, tardy, equivocal and irrelevant."

"This is not true," Mr. Gifford said. As examples he cited Rabbi Stephen Wise and Rev. John Haynes Holmes in New of New York, who were largely responsible for New York's first child labor law, and for upsetting the New York City Tammany Hall political machine and driving it from office.

During the First War, Rabbi Wise attacked United States Steel Corp. for refusing to deal with trade unions, while Rev. Holmes denounced anti-German hysteria and proclaimed that

Germans and Americans were all sons of one God. Both men's congregations supported them.

Power

"What power there is when you combine a preacher with a conscience with a congregation with a conscience," Mr. Gifford said. "One church like this has far greater influence than the power of a hundred churches to prevent change."

But far more churches were needed to go 'on the front lines' of today's challenges, as the churches in the U.S. southern states had done.

"We have around us a whole series of moral challenges: - the slums of Montreal, which the Catholic priests of St. Henri forced us to take head of;

- political corruption, connected with the fact that politics is one of Canada's spectator sports - 90% of Canadian citizens take no part in it at all;

- corruption in business - government reports showed that many of the bribes to the Duplessis government came from big business;

- the moral outrage of South Vietnam; - the Quebec fact, and the ignorance of French and English about each other in Canada," he said.

"In fact, we have Protestant and Catholic School boards, and we are ignorant of each other. Where else could young people have learned about the Quebec fact," he demanded.

70-member Montreal General Council with 46 members representing the City of Montreal and 24 representing the 28 other municipalities on the Island of Montreal.

GRAVE CONCERN

"We have grave concern," Mr. Hunter said, "that the recommendations of the Blier Report in their present form - by virtue of the complete domination given to the City of Montreal - would be tantamount to annexation."

The Association hopes that a campaign to get individual Westmount citizens to make their feelings known at Quebec will result in a modification of the Blier proposals to include guarantees that annexation-minded Montreal will not be able to dominate the other municipalities.

Three weeks ago the Association set up a committee to study the Blier Report. The members have been meeting every Monday night since then.

Bulletins from Birdland

Crossbills are near cities at this time

Have you seen any Crossbills yet this winter? This is the season when they are most likely to be found near civilization. There are two species, both breeding in our boreal forests; but where as the White-winged has never acquired the habit of wandering over our southern border, the Red Crossbill frequently flies as far down as Florida. Their territories actually overlap, but that of the White-winged extends farther north. Both kinds migrate irregularly, their routes being somewhat oblique — from north west to south east.

Although both are smaller than our familiar English Sparrow, the males at least can hardly be missed because they are red; The Red Crossbill like red brick, the so-called White-winged a beautiful rosy red with conspicuous white wing bars, on the dark wings differentiate the two.

Parrotlike in their movements, all Crossbills use their bills as well as their feet for clinging to branches as they clamber over a tree, consequently they do not look like ordinary perching birds. This behaviour stems from their love of the seeds found in cones of spruce, fir, and hemlock. They travel in flocks, and are a pretty sight in a winter landscape as they cling to evergreens in all positions, looking like Christmas decorations.

On seeing one of these birds at close range or through bi-

noculars many people have been fooled into thinking that it must have been in an accident. No, Mother Nature has given them crossed bills on purpose. Both mandibles are crooked and sharply pointed, the top one crossing over the lower one. This makes a perfect tool for extracting seeds from cones.

Red Crossbills are erratic not only in their migratory movements, but also in their nesting. The great majority of birds brings up families in late spring or early summer. We consider the nesting time of Goldfinches usual because these birds wait until August when there is plenty of down ready for nest lining. The late August nesting of Cedar Waxwings surprises us also; but only then are their favourite berries ready to feed the babies. Apparently for no good reason, Red Crossbills may choose any date from January until August.

Some birds always build on the ground, others place their homes quite high. But the Red Crossbill's nest may be found anywhere from five to eighty feet up in a tree.
