THE DUKE OF YORK.

Yesterday at two o'clock the Prince Regent left Carlton House and proceeded to Oatlands, on a visit to his Royal Brother, in consequence of the accident of breaking his left arm on Sunday morning. The Regent was met there by the Queen and Princesses, who went from Kew.

The following report of the state of his Royal Highness was received in London yesterday:

His Royal Highness the Duke of York has passed another good night, he is this morning free from fever, and in all respects going on favourably.

Government are very active in making arrangements for the peace establishment:—At Woolwich, orders have been received to prepare for the reception of two line-of-battle ships and 26 frigates and sloops, in order to pay them off; and near 500 labourers and artificers from the Arsenal are likewise to be discharged. At Deptford, between 50 and 60 frigates, sloops, and armed vessels, are also to be paid off; and 200 men discharged from the Victualling Departments.

The Ball given by the Duke of Wellington last week was uncommonly magnificent. All the Allied Potentates were present, together with all distinguished English families, among whom were Lord and Lady Grenville, Lord and Lady John Somerset, Lady Kinnaird, Mr. and Lady Frances Webster, &c.

On the 18th of June Buonaparte was at the head of 150,000 choice troops, in Belgium, and on the 18th of July a prisoner on board the Bellerophon.

Lord Wellington's army is to be completed to 100,000 effective men.

AMSTERDAM, JULY 23.

According to private letters from Paris, it has been already determined that Alsace and Lorraine shall be separated from France.—The Hanseatic Contingent was expected to reach St. Denis on the 4th of August. Colonel Sir Neil Campbell has been appointed by Lord Wellington its Brigadier Commandant.

MONTREAL, Sept. 30.

Since the arrival of the August mail, we have heard reports in town, that Sir George Prevost is to be impeached before the House of Commons on seven different Charges.—We can state from the best authority, that there is no foundation whatever for these rumors—that the August mail brought no further intelligence respecting Sir George Prevost than the Morgans—and that by that vessel his friends received accounts from him and of him, as late as the 3d August, at which time tho' all things were working together for his advantage, yet nothing decisive had been done. By a letter from a Staff Officer, who was in London on the 2d August, it appeared that Sir James Yeo was at last coming forward with a charge or charges; and that they would be produced in a day or two.

The absurdity of speaking of an impeachment before Parliament when the Parliament was not sitting, is alone a sufficient refutation of that report, but independent of this, we happen to know that the Government had officially informed Sir George Prevost that he was to be tried by a Court Martial, and letters by the August Mail speak of the assembling of the Court Martial accordingly.

A London paper of the end of July, mentions that Sir Harry Calvert (the Adjutant General to the Forces) had given a dinner to Sir George Prevost, at which the principal naval and military characters in town, and many other persons of distinction were present.

LONDON, Aug. 6.

The following letter will not, perhaps, be uninteresting to our readers.

Bellerophon, Plymouth, Aug. 5.

"It was on Sunday the papers announced the determination of sending Bonaparte to St. Helena, and as he regularly enquires for them, perusing with the assistance of Madame Bertrand almost every item, that part did not long escape his notice. Indeed it was now publicly spoken of by every person. Before this I had heard it was his determination never to quit the ship alive to be sent to St. Helena; and Madame Bertrand informed me on reading the above that he had again positively asserted that they should first take his life.

"On Sunday evening he had the mark of much agitation in his countenance. On the Monday, when he officially heard his destination, he remained on deck but a short time, and appeared as pale as death. Yesterday he was something better. I fear, on the arrival of the Northumberland, we shall witness some tragic scene. You know we are not the ship destined to carry him to St. Helena.

"A circumstance occurred last Sunday night, which seemed to be very near being a beginning of the scene I mentioned above. About nine o'clock Marshal and Madame Bertrand were walking on the opposite side of the deck to where I was, in earnest conversation—suddenly Madame rushed into Napoleon's cabin, threw herself at his feet for about half a minute, then flying below to her own cabin, threw herself nearly out of the stern window, when she was caught by the leg by General Montholon. She continued delirious the whole night. To-day she is better.

"On the following morning, Lord Keith and Major General Sir H. Bunbury waited upon him, informing him it was the determination of the Allied Sovereigns to send him to the above place, and granting permission to take with him part of his suite, with the exception of those proscribed, Savary, Lallemand, and Bertrand.—I understand he sent for Captain Maitland, and again assured the Admiral and General it was his fixed resolution never to quit the ship alive.

"Notwithstanding the news has greatly affected him, he continues to show himself for about 20 minutes every evening to the really astonishing number of people, which I think daily increase.—It is with great difficulty the men of war's boats prevent the crowd approaching too near the ship. He now continues but a short time on the gangway, and is visible only to the inside boats.—There is no truth in the account of his having taken possession in an authoritative manner of Capt. Maitland's cabin.

"We are so full in the ship, and have all of us given up our cabins and wardrooms to Bonaparte's suite, that we have been forced to sleep upon deck.

"We are all anxious to know whether it is intended to give up all the persons proscribed.—L'Allemand has written a letter to the Prince Regent, stating the manner in which he treated some English prisoners, whom he afterwards liberated, and to whom he wished a reference to be made.

"Bonaparte has also written another letter, from which he seems to have hopes of being permitted to remain in this country."

We are extremely sorry to state, that his R. Highness the Duke of York met with a very serious accident yesterday morning at Gatlands, which is likely to deprive the public for a time of his active and valuable services. His Royal Highness in stepping out of the shower bath, which he is in the habit of using, slipped upon the oil cloth carpet, and in the fall, fractured one of his arms between the wrist and the elbow. Mr. Osborn, a surgeon residing at Weybridge, was immediately sent for, and set the arm before any of the household surgeons arrived. In the course of the day his Royal Highness was attended by Sir Henry Hallford, Mr. Koate and several other physicians and surgeons of eminence, and we have the satisfaction to learn that at a late hour last night he was as well as could be expected.

LONDON, Aug. 7.

The Bellerophon sailed on Friday from Plymouth, accompanied by the Peruvian and Eurotas, with sealed orders. It is understood that they are to meet the Northumberland at sea, when Bonaparte will be transferred to that ship, in order to his proceeding to St. Helena. Bertrand, Savary and Lallemand, who are in the Eurotas, will be sent to some other destination; but it is supposed not to France, as was stated in the course of the last week. These persons were at first put on board the Liffy, and thence transferred to the Eurotas, when the Liffy was ordered to the Downs to be paid off.

French papers of the ad inst, were received yesterday. The information respecting the refractory armies is scanty. There are numerous desertions, accompanied by great disorders and irregularities on the part of the soldiers, who carry off their arms. These desertions and irregularities the Generals declaim against and endeavour to restrain, evidently for the purpose of maintaining their own power, by keeping the troops together, while the King's friends seem disposed to look with indulgence on the outrages in contemplating the reduction of the army. The main body is understood to have gone from the Loire towards the mountains of Auvergne, in which the most desperate will form gangs, living at discretion upon the country, when as a whole the force will have melted away to nothing. It is supposed, when the military chest shall be exhausted, which may be concluded to be nearly the case at present, a general dissolution will take place of itself. The notorious Lefebvre, with a regiment of cavalry, has, it is said, thrown himself into the mountains of Auvergne as partizan, that is, as military robber. Several of the persons of whom the king is more particularly bound to make examples have been arrested; but we suppose only to be let loose again, with the double incentive of provocation and impunity, to commit fresh offences.

The annexed letter came from our own Correspondent:

PLYMOUTH, Aug. 5.

The Bellerophon of 74 guns, having on board Bonaparte, accompanied by the Eurotas frigate and Peruvian brig of war, sailed yesterday afternoon to the eastward, supposed with a view of meeting the Northumberland off the Start Point, in order to transfer him to that ship. The last days previous to his sailing, no boats were suffered to approach near the Bellerophon, during which time he did not shew himself to the public; but previous thereto the numbers that surrounded the ship every evening were immense, amounting at times to upwards of 19,000 persons."

LONDON, Aug. 9.

The only additional account which has reached us relating to the sailing of BUONAPARTE, is the following from Torbay. Imperfect as it is, it will be seen from it, that this Hero has suffered himself to be taken from the Bellerophon without having put his threat of self-murder into execution.

FINAL DEPARTURE OF BUONAPARTE.

"Three sail of the line and a sloop of war came to anchor this afternoon near this bay, but at such a distance from the shore as to prevent any one distinctly seeing what they were about. One of the ships bore the flag of an Admiral, and is no doubt the Northumberland. There is also little doubt but she has been receiving on board NAPOLEON BONAPARTE, as boats have been passing constantly from one ship to the other. They are now all under weigh, with a fine breeze at W. N. W. and will soon be out of sight. There has been no communication whatever between them and the shore."

A gentleman who spent the whole of the last week at Plymouth, and saw BONAPARTE regularly every day, states, that most of the accounts published in the Papers were very incorrect, and that, instead of appearing deeply affected at the idea of being removed to St. Helena, or threatening to kill himself, he displayed considerable cheerfulness.—At the very time when it was reported Madame BERTRAND in a fit of despair had attempted to

throw herself into the sea, he saw that lady and her husband gaily conversing with the Corsican, who frequently laughed. He was present at the time the Bellerophon sailed on Friday last. Whilst they were weighing anchor BUONAPARTE stood on the deck reading a newspaper; he afterwards went down to the stern gallery, where Madame BERTRAND and Countess MOUTON had placed themselves. He was then smiling, and apparently in good spirits. He was still there with the same company, which was joined by the rest of his officers, when the ship sailed, and remained till distance concealed him from the public view.

PARIS, Aug. 5.

The Gazette Officielle contains an Ordinance of the King, dated 2d August, stating that in consequence of the disbanding of the army, Councils of War cannot be formed in all the military divisions; and ordering that the Permanent Council of the first military division, shall take cognizance of the crimes of those pointed out in the Ordinance of the 24th of July.

According to the dispositions of the plan for reorganising the army, submitted by the Ministers to the King, for his approbation, military men of every rank are to return provisionally to their homes.—There shall then be formed, instead of regiments of the line and light infantry, departmental legions of 1600 men each, divided into three battalions, one of grenadiers, the other of chasseurs, and the third of fusiliers. The rank of Major is suppressed. With respect to the troops of cavalry and artillery, they shall be formed into regiments of the same arms.

Two country seats belonging to Marshal Ney, situated near Chateaudun, are occupied by five or six hundred Prussians, who live there in free quarters.

In the diligence which brought Labodoyere from Riom to Paris, there were also two officers, who have been carried before the Police.

We do not yet know what has become of General Clausel. In quitting Bordeaux, he caused a report to be spread that he was going to the Duke of Angoulême. This report was generally disbelieved.

On the 20th of July the Secretary of State for the Department of Justice addressed an important circular letter to the Prefects, in which the latter are, on account of the extraordinary circumstances of the country, empowered to suspend from their functions all Sub Prefects, Mayors, Secretaries to the Prefecture, &c. whose removal may be considered necessary for the public tranquillity.

It is believed that corps of Russian soldiers will replace a great part of the other allied troops now in Paris and its environs. There are arrested from time to time some foolish persons who raise sedition in the public meetings. Search is also making for certain individuals who have been charged by the partisans of Buonaparte with keeping registers, in which they inscribe daily the names and residences of the Royalists. Already some of these informers are deprived of the power of farther mischief. It is hoped that the Tribunals will not hesitate to inflict the deserved punishment on them.

Two Labodoyere's sides-de-camp were arrested yesterday.

Madame Murat is still at Trieste.

The Ambassador from Spain is just arrived at Paris. It is supposed his Excellency will assist at the Congress.

Four persons were yesterday evening taken into custody at the Thuilleries who made use of sedition-cries and expressions. It is with difficulty that the Police preserved them from the fury of the people,

BOSTON, SEPTEMBER 21.

FROM FRANCE.—We have received by the brig Amphion, Capt. Sampson, arrived here yesterday from Bourdeaux, the Journal de Paris of August 1st and 2d, the only papers brought by that vessel. Their contents are of little importance. The following articles are all that we have deemed worth the trouble of translation.

PARIS, AUG. 2.—An order of the day for July 31, issued by Count D'essolle, declares, that in conformity to a letter from the Baron de Muffling the allied soldiers found strolling through the streets in the night, will be arrested by the national guard.

Russian troops arrived yesterday in the vicinity of Paris. Seven hundred soldiers of that nation are quartered at La Vilette.

A few days after the entrance of the allies into Paris, some turbulent fellows of the lower class of the people, who are in the habit of assembling on the place de Chatelet, &c, insulted and provoked, at ten o'clock in the morning, the Prussian soldiers, who were going to the hotel de Ville; at two o'clock in the afternoon, cannon were placed on the Exchange bridge, the New bridge of Notre-dame, &c. Yesterday morning, no doubt for the same reasons, pieces of artillery were placed at the Southern extremity of Notre Dame bridge, and that of the bridge of the king's garden; it is absolutely indispensable to seize and punish the agitators and disturbers of the public tranquility, who make such measures necessary.

A newspaper asserts, that M. Bouly de la Mourthe has been arrested, and conducted to one of the prisons in Paris.

It is asserted that one of the French royal Family continues to be announced, will accompany the Empress of Austria to Paris.

The army of the Loire has made a movement which seems to be directed towards the Mountains of Auvergne, whither a great part of its material and artillery, has proceeded it.

The allied troops seem to be making dispositions for the rigorous blockade of Leon and Soissons.

It seems that the reorganization of the army will soon be vigorously commenced in the offices of the ministry of war. His Majesty has, it is said, given his approbation to the plan that has been presented to him for this purpose. It is believed that according to this plan all officers more than 50 years of age will obtain an honorable retreat.

A legion which is to bear the title of Maria Theresa is to be formed in the department of Gironde. It is to be composed of 1200 infantry, 500 cavalry and a company of artillery. The command of it has been confided by the king's commissioners, to Marshal de camp Pigot.

AUG 1.—Lord Wellington has offered his soldiers to M. the prefect of police to gather in the harvest, and the carriages of the army to transport it.

Cardinal Feuch, in passing through Baerig (Aix), officiated there clerically. After divine service some persons conducted him to his residence crying loudly, "Vive l'Empereur!" The Austrian general who commanded in the town, sent for the Mayor, upbraided him with not having immediately repressed the cries of sedition, and imposed a fine of 60,000 francs upon the city, to be paid in twenty four hours, by way of punishment.

The departure of all the English troops from Paris is spoken of; forage begins to be scarce around the capital; it is supposed that they will go to Normandy.

To the Editor of the Quebec Mercury.

Sir,
The following is an extract of a letter from a young man at Marquara, one of the N. W. Company's settlements on the North shore, of the 6th instant, to an acquaintance in this town.—By inserting it in your useful paper you will oblige a subscriber.

"On the 2nd inst. while the people of this place were

in the woods, occupied about their ordinary affairs, some thieves, who, it seems, had watched this favorable opportunity, broke open the company's store and dwelling house; which they plundered of every article of value, to a very large amount, belonging to the Company, the *Engagés*, and the Indians, and left us, at this great distance from other habitations, in a deplorable situation indeed! having deprived us of all our clothes, provisions, guns and ammunition, so that we, as well as the poor natives, run a risk of starving, from cold and hunger, before necessaries can be brought us from Quebec. This robbery we have strong reasons to suspect has been committed by some of those scoundrels from Quebec, and its environs, who under pretence of fishing, infest this coast every summer, for the sole purpose of trading with the natives and pillaging unprotected property. It is distressing to think that such acts of villany should be so long allowed to pass unnoticed, and that they are every year gaining ground without hopes of legal redress."

"The gorgeous palaces; the solemn temples,
The great globe itself, and all which it inherit,
Shall dissolve; and like the baseless fabric of a vision,
Leave not a wreck behind."
or, in the brief, but emphatic language of Solomon, cry out, that "All is vanity and vexation of spirit."

On Friday as a dragon, Servant of Mr. Meredith of the Commissariat, was returning from the races, his horse became unmanageable and ran with him with such violence against the wall, near St Lewis Gate, as to occasion his death, almost immediately.
