Parent And Child 'Palship' Can Be Detrimental: Whelan

After having congratulated the graduates the parents and teacher, His Excellency went on to say that there was a growing tendency in the world today for girls and boys to be pals with their parents. This palship between parents and children can

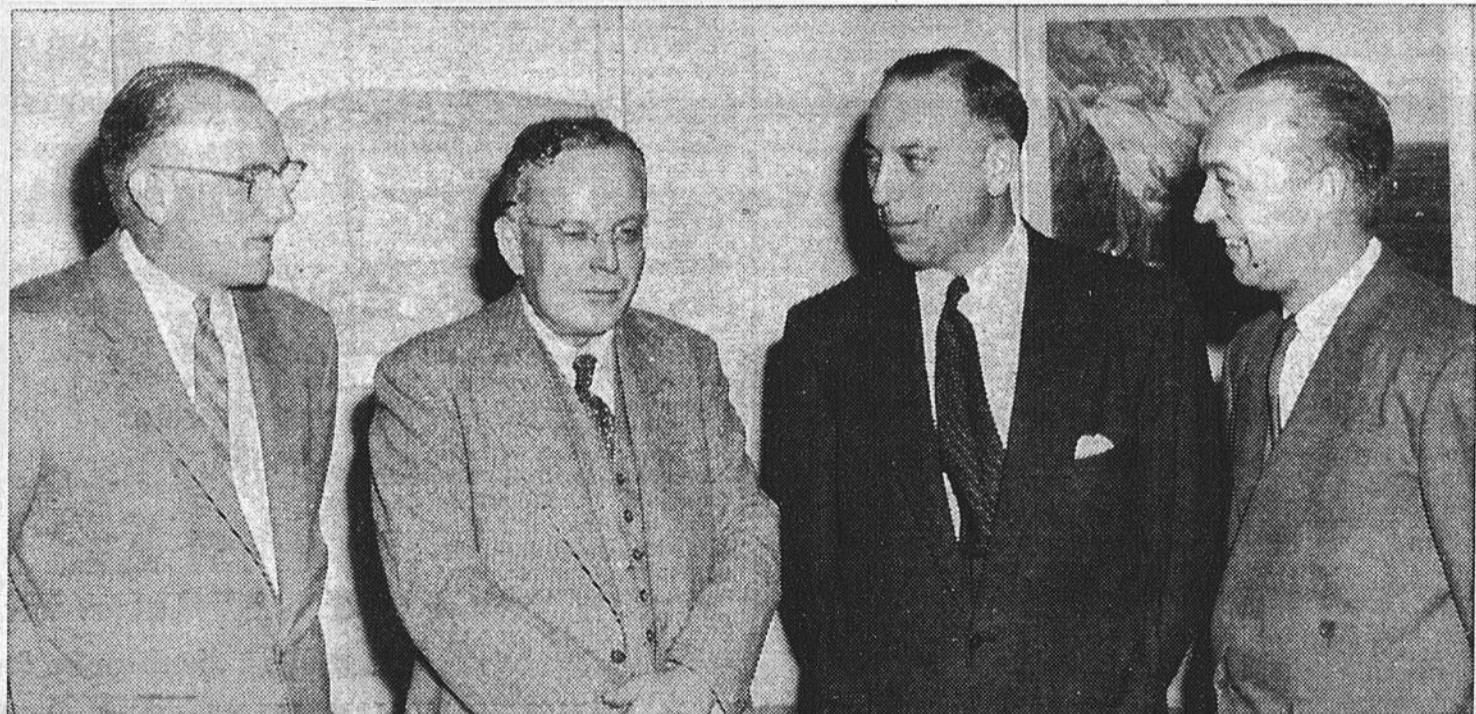
ussion then followed and students voiced different ideas on the subject.

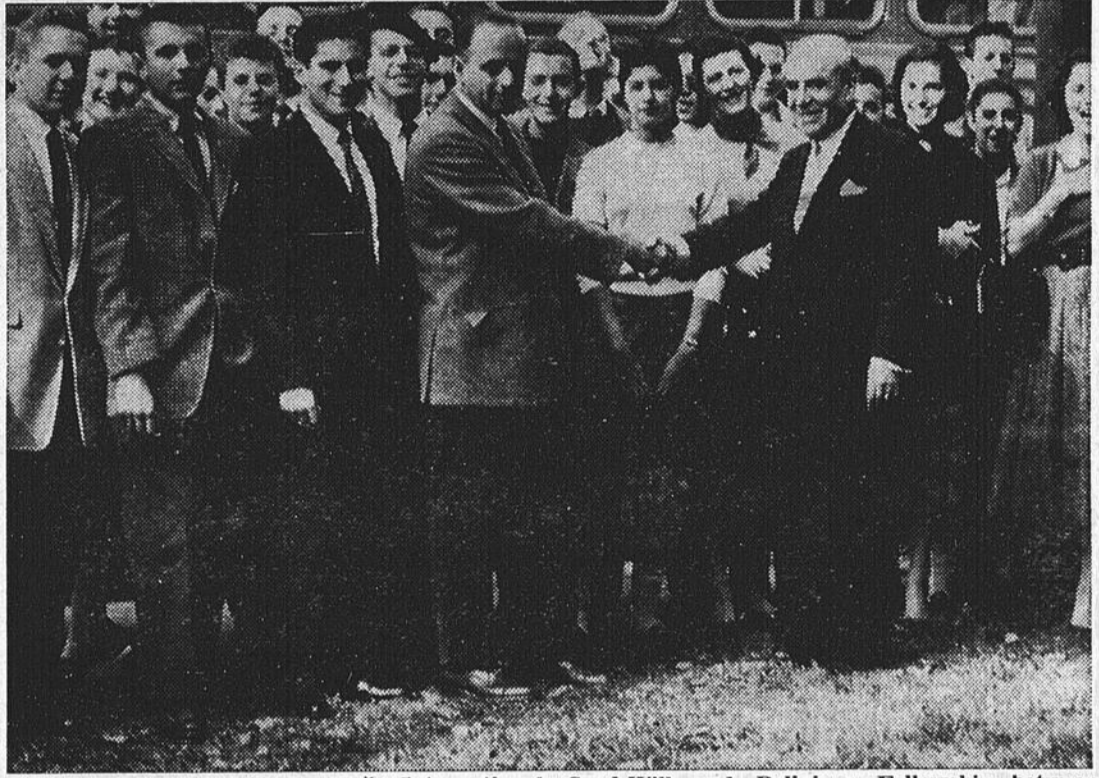
Westmount Pupils Offered Piano Course Opportunity

Many Westmount pupils will have the opportunity of studying in the new piano class courses to be given this year in a great number of the Westmount and Montreal Protestant schools under the direction of the Canadian Bureau for the Advancement of Music.

Piano class instruction has been in operation in Canada since 1922, and more than 200,000 children have participated successfully in the programme. The Canadian Bureau for the Advancement of Music, under the direction of Richard Edmonds, has recently taken charge of the work in most of Canada and is attempting as its name implies, to advance the study and appreciation of music throughout the country.

The Bureau takes charge of all music in connection with the Canadian National Exhibition, including the annual competitions which bring entries from all parts of Canada, and or-

training, musical interpretation and appreciation. The classes will be given in the schools immediately after the conclusion of regular school hours, and will consist of three terms of twenty half-hour lessons each. The fee is to be \$7.50 for each term making the individual cost of instruction less than thirty-eight cents a lesson! This low fee enables many children to study where private lessons are financially impossible, and allows parents to determine the interest and talent of their children before investing too great a sum in this particular branch of musical education. But

The piano class instruction covers the first two years of study and includes, besides the playing of piano, a well-balanced "diet" of technique, theory, ear-

perhaps most important aspect of the work is that children enjoy it! An effort is made to use the "Play and Story" method whenever possible. This not only impresses the desired point in the child's mind but tends to make music study fun rather than hard work. Children lose nervousness and self-consciousness through playing before each other at lessons. The results have been particularly noticeable at recital and examination time. Pupils also develop a more critical musical ear through listening to others, and a little competition helps to stimulate interest and speed progress.

Piano class work plays a great role in that spiritual enrichment which anyone who has ever studied or enjoyed good music has felt, for it lays the foundation for

a well-balanced musical education while fostering cooperation, competition, self-expression and above all an awakened interest in and love for music.

Now 75, the pioneer researcher in normal child behavior has recently published his latest findings, covering the years from 10

to 16. Earlier books, particularly Infant and Child in the Culture of Today, and The Child from Five to Ten, won the author and his associates international recognition. His work, based essentially on close observation of so-called average children, has become a standard method of

measuring child development. Until 1948 when he retired as its head, Dr. Gesell's base of operations was the Clinic of Child Development at Yale University.

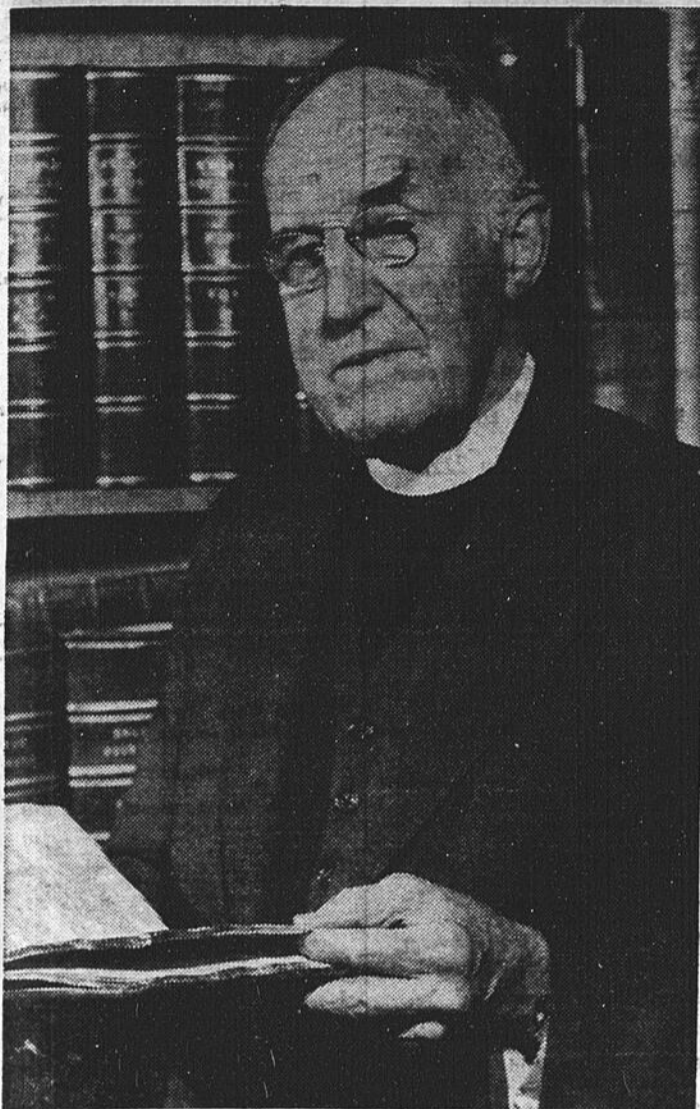

Canon Naylor Is Named Archdeacon Of Montreal

Rev. Canon R. K. Naylor, rector of Trinity Memorial Anglican Church, has been appointed Archdeacon of Montreal, succeeding the late Venerable Archdeacon A. P. Gower-Rees. The announcement was made this week by Bishop Dixon.

Known for his outspoken comments as a leading churchman, theological professor, church editor and community worker, Archdeacon Naylor was ordained a deacon in 1912.

A graduate of McGill University, he was appointed editor of the Montreal Churchman in 1924, rector of Trinity in 1940, an honorable canon of Christ Church Cathedral in 1942 and a lecturer in divinity at McGill in 1952.

Archdeacon Naylor began his career as rector of Rawdon Anglican Church in 1912, remaining until 1925. He was ordained in 1913. From 1925 to 1940, he was professor at the Montreal Diocesan Theological College.

He has been closely associated with the campaign for a concert hall for Montreal. In 1954 he vigorously opposed proposals that the hall be constructed on Fletcher's Field but has worked towards its establishment on other sites.

He is also known as spokesman of a group dedicated to preserving Mount Royal in its natural state. He was widely quoted early this year following a suggestion by Mayor Jean Drapeau that two traffic arteries be constructed across the mountain.

Those Who Came To John
By Ven. Arch. R. K. Naylor
Rector, Trinity Memorial Church

Let us look more closely at John's hearers and consider whether we should have been at home in any of the groups into which they were divided. There were, of course, the people in authority, the rulers in Jerusalem. They acted wisely, and at first, courteously.

John was by birth of a priestly family, he was marked by his message as belonging to the class of those who were waiting for redemption; and the austerity of his life showed that he was more rigid even than the Pharisees. So the authorities sent men who would be sympathetic — Priests and Levites who belonged to the Pharisaic party. Evidently John's answers were not satisfactory, for in the end the authorities disowned him. They could not hear his demand that they too should change their ways of thinking and acting. I wonder if any of us would find ourselves in that group, and if so, what our response would be. The group contained not only Priests and Levites but laymen too, for the Pharisees were on the whole a lay party. So the question "Was I there?" is addressed both to clergy and laity.

The vast majority of John's hearers were the ordinary folk, what the Pharisees called contemptuously "The People of the Land," and what John himself called even more harshly a "generation of vipers." There were tax gatherers and soldiers and every other class, all interested; in fact, so stirred that they accepted baptism and the call to repentance. They acknowledged their sins, and sought for release. Dorothy Sayers has a very interesting radio play describing them. One wonders how long their repentance lasted, and whether it affected them beyond John's death. Would we perhaps have found a natural place in that group, deeply stirred and quickly forgetful?

Among those comers there was a group of young men whom John the Evangelist singles out for comment. They were young but they were deeply concerned in what was going on — probably the sons of those men and women who were waiting for the redemption of Israel, the kind of people among whom the Baptist himself has grown up. John testified of Jesus of Nazareth that He was the Lamb of God, and those young men turned their attention from their first Master and found a new one in Jesus. It was from that group that Our Lord eventually chose the Twelve.

And finally there was Jesus

So He left Nazareth and moved about John, what we might call the Kingdom of God Movement. To make it quite clear that He was on the side of the new Movement He approached John and demanded baptism. John protested, but Jesus bore down the protest. It was the one way in which He could show that He was on the side of that new word repentance — the new way of looking at the world and its Creator and its creatures.

May we commend the plan being sponsored by the United Nations Children's Fund, to enlist the children of the community to turn their Halloween frolic to a useful purpose. They will be given badges to identify them as collectors and they will turn their cash gifts over to UNICEF to help children in the 90 countries receiving aid from the United Nations Organization. If the new departure is carefully controlled it can be a very important venture.

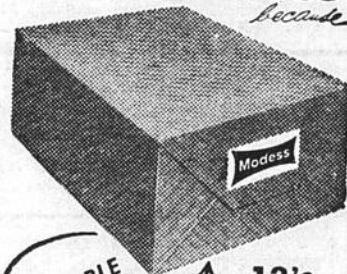

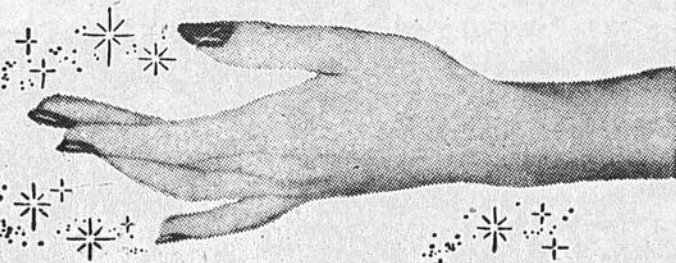

Speaker Lauds Missionaries On Duty In South East Asia

Mrs. J. F. Morris was the guest speaker at the bi-monthly meeting of the Evening Branch W.A. of Trinity Memorial Church held on Thursday evening.

In discussing the current missionary study book, — "East from Burma" the speaker stressed in particular the amazing courage and devotion to duty of the missionaries who had gone out to the south-east Asian countries — Burma, Thailand, Malaya, Indochina, Formosa, the Philippines, Indonesia.

Mrs. Morris pointed out that some of the tremendous difficulties to be overcome in this area were the many different languages and dialects, the tribal and racial backgrounds of the peoples, with the multiplicity of religions coupled with the terrible suffering all had endured as a result of the Japanese invasion, with its attendant destruction. All of this presented a great challenge to the Christian Church today.

The speaker further stated that it was her earnest desire to deepen the interest of Christian women in missionary study books and to that end several very excellent books describing vividly the experiences of missionaries in these countries were recommended for additional reading. Mrs. Morris made specific reference to the work of Dr. Seagrave in Burma during and after World War II, — a book which made most fascinating reading. Dr. Seagrave, the speaker stated, represented the twenty-eighth member of a distinguished missionary family to have served the people of Burma, four generations having given missionaries to the Burmese. The speaker was thanked by Mrs. S. E. Weeks. The meeting was reminded of the visit of Bishop DeMel, of Kurana-gala, Ceylon, who would be speaking in Trinity Memorial Church on Tuesday, evening, October 23.

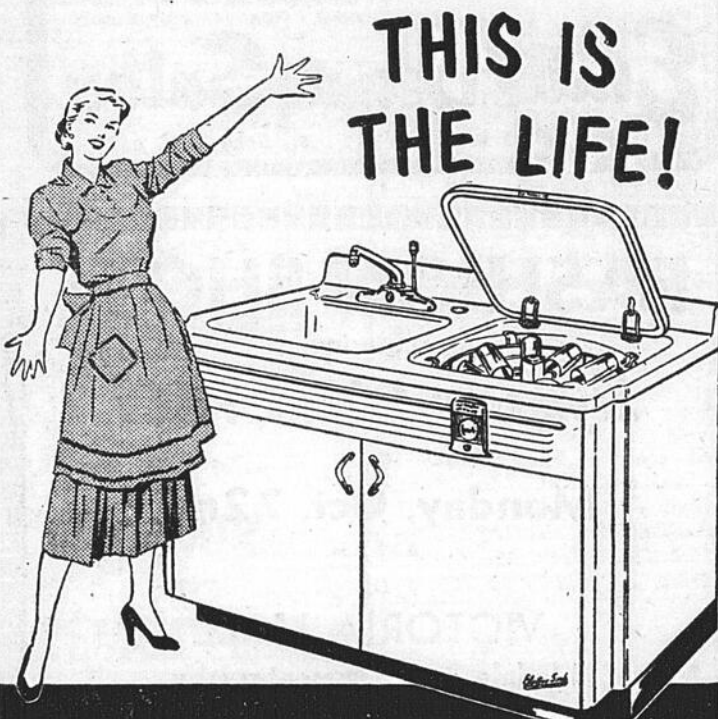

Spurred on by a good turnout of parents and friends, the teams staged a ding dong battle with the lead changing hands several times.

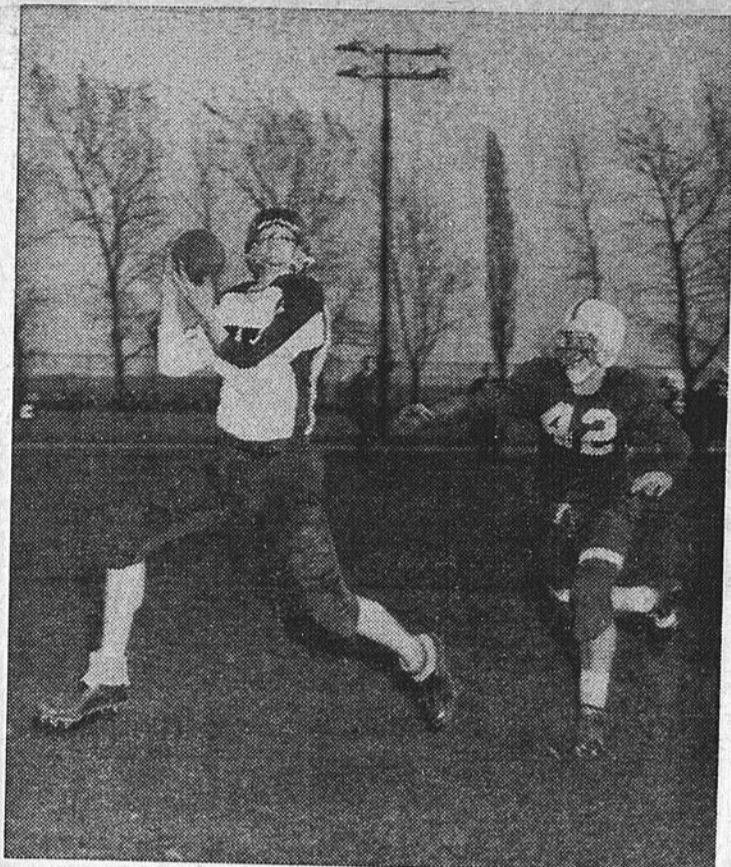
