

WILFRID POPE CHANGED NAME

Was Legally Known in Houston, Texas, as J. E. Wright

MESSAGE TO RECORD ABSOLUTELY CONFIRMS IDENTITY OF MISSING BROMPTONVILLE MAN.

The Record is in receipt of a communication which absolutely confirms the story published in Friday's issue to the effect that W. F. Pope, the missing Bromptonville merchant, had been located in Houston, Texas.

Mr. B. S. Davidson, Chief of Police of Houston, Texas, in the course of a letter says: "It seems that Mr. Pope left Bromptonville and legally changed his name to J. E. Wright. He declined to make any statement to me in reference to his leaving Bromptonville."

"His mother is at present in this city with her son."

"The members of the Pope family in Richmond have no further news other than that conveyed in the telegram received last Friday confirming the identity of their brother, W. Pope, and it is not known whether the latter will come home again or not."

PURPORTS TO BE INTERVIEWED WITH POPE.

The Montreal Gazette this morning has a despatch from Bromptonville giving what is purported to be an interview given by Pope to a newspaper man in Houston.

Mr. Pope's brother in Richmond, when spoken to by the Record this morning, discredits the report, and the above letter from the chief of police of Houston states that Pope had given out no statement to the press there.

The purported interview, therefore, cannot be given as authentic, and may only be the creation of some imaginative mind at Bromptonville. It runs as follows:

"Things were not going very well with me at the time," he told the Houston newspaper correspondent, "and although I was able to meet all demands made upon me I felt utterly weary and tired of my life at Bromptonville. It was a cold winter and I was not in the best of health at the time. I was run down and nervous and felt the need of a change. I admit that I was not making as much money as I wished for. It was while in this mood that a pamphlet issued by the advertising department of an American railway came into my hands. It was all about Texas, about which state it gave a glowing description. The idea of getting away from the bitter cold, which I was feeling more than usual on account of my low vitality, was very alluring to me. The chances for an enterprising man in that part were also dwelt upon. I felt I must go to Texas and I was in a fever to go at once. I was afraid if I told my plan to my mother and family they would raise objections."

WENT THROUGH MONTREAL.

"Of course the story of my disappearance is well known in Quebec," said Mr. Pope. "I went out to a lumber camp, as was supposed, but I only drove part of the way and then I fixed things to look like an attack. I gashed the horse, though it seemed a murderous thing to do, and I spotted with blood my hat and coat and, which I then left in the bushes. I left my horse on the outskirts of the town, then walked to Sherbrooke station, where I took train for Montreal. But even in Montreal I had pangs of conscience about leaving my mother in such a way. I was tempted to return, but having gone so far I could not decide to face the old place. Having secured every cent I could before leaving, I was fairly well provided with money. When I arrived in Texas I found it was not always summer. It was raining when I arrived at Houston and the rain made me feel just as miserable as I had done in my worst moments at home. I walked about that rainy night feeling utterly miserable, and at that moment I would have given all I possessed to be back in Canada."

"Fears that some unfortunate being might be blamed for the supposed murder were removed," said Mr. Pope, by the conclusion of Chief McCaskill that there had been no murder. But the fact that his mother and family were constantly making inquiries about him led to his sending anonymous letters to his home saying that he was sound and prosperous, and although this led to his being traced a few weeks ago he did not regret it. "It feels good to know that I have friends in the world after all," he said.

"Mr. Pope intimated that he had not made up his mind as to whether he would remain in Texas or return to Canada."

PLOT TO ASSASSINATE PRESIDENT HUERTA

Arrest of One Deputy and Ten Others Frustrated Attempt

INTENTION WAS TO USE BOMBS WHEN OFFICIALS WERE ON THE STREET.

Mexico City, July 14.—A plot to assassinate President Huerta, General Felix Diaz and General Blanquet, the war minister, has been frustrated by the arrest of one deputy and ten others of no great importance.

It is said that the intention was to use bombs at some opportune moment when these officials were driving through the streets.

Documents were found on the prisoners identifying them as supporters of Zapata and setting forth an outline of the plot. Several of the prisoners have confessed. In a building somewhat remotely located they had practised the throwing of bombs, studying their effect.

ANTI-AMERICAN DEMONSTRATION.

Mexico City, July 14.—The American ambassador's note of protest to the Foreign Office against permitting an anti-American demonstration yesterday had certain indirect results, although the Government did not absolutely forbid the holding of what officials style "a popular manifestation of patriotism."

A demonstration took place in the capital yesterday afternoon, but not more than 400 persons participated. There were no speeches and very few cries against Americans.

EXPRESS AND TRAM CAR COLLIDE

Latter Was Struck at a Crossing in Cambridge, Ohio.

CONDUCTOR TOOK HEADLIGHT OF ENGINE TO BE A LIGHTNING FLASH.

Cambridge, Ohio, July 14.—Four persons were killed, a fifth probably fatally injured, and a score of others hurt last night when Baltimore and Ohio passenger No. 15, the Wheeling-Chicago express, westbound, crashed into a Cambridge and Byesville inter-urban street car at a crossing in East Cambridge.

The accident was caused by a terrific storm which was passing over the section. The conductor of the street car had stopped his car and gone forward to the crossing and signalled the car to come ahead. He is stated to have seen the headlight of the oncoming passenger train but believed it was a lightning flash.

The impact came just as the street car reached the middle of the crossing, and none of the thirty people on the car had a chance to escape by jumping. The car was demolished, the wreckage, together with the killed and maimed passengers, being scattered along each side of the right of way for a hundred yards.

TIRED UP OF GERMAN SHIPYARDS.

Hamburg, Germany, July 14.—(Special)—A strike affecting from 12,000 to 14,000 workmen was declared at the shipbuilding yards to-day.

M. LEPIRE IN PARLIAMENT.

Paris, July 14.—M. Lepire, ex-prefect of Paris police, who recently retired from that office, was elected yesterday Republican deputy for Montbrison.

OPENED EACH MORNING'S BUSINESS WITH PRAYER.

Chicago, July 14.—Samuel A. Kean, for years a banker and bond dealer in La Salle street, known for his practice of holding a brief religious service in his bank at the opening of each business day, died at his home in Evanston, Ill. His firm was prominent in the city's business life 20 years ago. Each morning, up to the time of his retirement from banking, Mr. Kean's first act upon entering his bank was to summon all employees to his private office. He announced the number of a hymn, led the singing, made an introductory talk, and had employees take turns in reading the day's lesson. Then he interpreted it for them. Mr. Kean was 76 years old.

TWELVE PERSONS KILLED; 200 INJURED IN TRAIN WRECK

Los Angeles, Cal., July 14.—(Special)—Two middle-aged youths, who played with a train whistle, are attributed the loss of twelve lives and injury to some two hundred persons near here last night, when two Pacific electric trains collided, telescoping two cars and wrecking another at Wineryard Station, near City limits.

Many of the injured will die.

Arthur Hill, a sailor from the torpedo boat Paul Jones, carried out eight bodies, including one woman gripping an infant's body in her arms.

A few of the Christian Endeavor delegates were on the train.

The headquarters of Toronto delegation of 125 announced that none of the Canadian visitors were in the wreck.

Practically all of those killed and injured were residents of Los Angeles and suburbs.

TURKS ADVANCE ON ADRIANOPLE

March on Former Stronghold With Consent of Serbia and Greece

THERE IS NO SIGN OF PEACE AT PRESENT—POWERS ARE VERY ANXIOUS.

Constantinople, July 14.—The Tchatalja and Bulair armies are advancing by forced marches and have already occupied Tchatalja without opposition. The Bulgarians have evacuated Rodosto.

BALKAN STATES IN MELTING POT.

London, July 14.—The Balkan states appear to be again in the melting pot. There is no sign of peace at present. Greece and Serbia have declined so far to agree to an armistice. The Turkish army is advancing by forced marches from Tchatalja and Bulair, apparently with the consent of Greece and Serbia, to attempt the capture of Adrianople and Thrace. Rumania is said to be proceeding to occupy a much greater extent of Bulgarian territory than she previously claimed and Greece is burning to avenge the Bulgarian massacres, concerning which horrible details continually appear in the official reports issued from Athens and Saloniki. According to these reports wars and fingers of Greek women still bearing ear rings and rings were found in the pockets of Bulgarian prisoners.

There is still talk of Russian interference, and it is reported from St. Petersburg that the powers have notified the Sublime Porte that they will not permit military operations beyond the Enos-Midia lines fixed by the London conference. But the European concert is slow in moving.

No fresh fighting is reported and it appears that the rumors regarding a revolution in Sofia are without foundation.

A RECORD NON-STOP FLIGHT

Was Made by French Aviator and a Passenger

FLEW A DISTANCE OF THREE HUNDRED AND SIXTY MILES.

Chateau Dun, France, July 14.—(Special)—A young German aviator, with a passenger was made yesterday by Lieut. Adolphe Leopold Varcin, of the French Army aviation corps, who, accompanied by Sapper Chepeau, of the Engineer Corps, flew direct from Pau to this city, a distance of 360 miles.

GERMAN AVIATOR KILLED.

Muehlhausen, Germany, July 14.—(Special)—A young German aviator named Dietrichs, was killed here to-day. While landing, he brought his aeroplane too abruptly to the earth. The dead flying man was recognized as a man named Percin, who was experimenting with a new monoplane of his own invention, and his son, who had accompanied him as mechanic.

The aeroplane capsized from an unknown cause, at a height of 150 feet. It fell with a crash to the ground, and the violence of the impact caused the fuel tank to explode. The aviators were pinned beneath the motor, whence they were unable to extricate themselves, and were burned to death.

FLEW BERLIN TO PARIS.

Paris, July 14.—Edmond Audemars, the Swiss aviator, made a monoplane flight from Berlin to Paris yesterday, winning the international cup and a prize of \$2,000. Audemars, who made four descents, left Berlin shortly after 4 o'clock yesterday morning and arrived at Paris at 7.32 last evening.

Berlin, July 13.—The French aviator Leon Letort made a flight from Paris to Berlin to-day without a stop. He left the French capital at 4.10 o'clock this morning and landed here at 1.10 in the afternoon.

The majority of the visitors arrived Saturday evening, and were accommodated at the various hotels, or entertained by friends. At 10.30 Sunday morning, the Knights and candidates assembled at the Club Rooms, Gordon Street and proceeded in a body to St. Patrick's Church, to attend High Mass, the Parish Priest, Rev. E. C. Fiset being a member of the K. of C. The celebrant was the Rev. N. Codere of St. Charles Seminary, and the musical portion of the service was rendered by the choir of the church most effectively.

BRITAIN RETAINS EMPIRE TROPHY

Dominion Obtained Third Place With a Total of 2075

AUSTRALIAN TEAM CAME SECOND AND INDIA FOURTH IN SHOOTING AT BISLEY.

Bisley Camp, Eng., July 14.—The second and final stage of the shooting for the Empire Match trophy resulted in the victory of Great Britain, Canada obtaining third place with a total of 2,075. The winning total was 2,210, Australia coming second, with 2,120, and India fourth with 1,923. Saturday's order was the same as on the previous day, Canada having been third, with 1,085, and the other three teams in the same relative positions.

At the ranges of eight hundred, nine hundred and a thousand yards, which were shot off on Saturday, the totals were naturally not as high as on the previous day. The scores of the Canadian team were as follows:

FRANCE IS FACING ENORMOUS DEFICIT

Difference Between Receipts and Payments May Reach \$100,000,000

UPKEEP OF SOLDIERS IN MOROCCO, EXTRA EXPENSE FOR THE ARMY.

Paris, July 14.—The heavy French budget deficit, which will certainly lead to the floating of a big loan in the near future, is held to be significant of the present state of the money market and is arousing grave disquiet among financial experts.

The world, it is declared, has been borrowing and borrowing as if it had unlimited resources, and now France, for one, must soon have recourse to the \$200,000,000 loan now being considered by Parliament, as well as a special war loan of \$400,000,000 which will burden succeeding budgets with a perpetual interest item of \$14,000,000, in addition to over \$200,000,000 to the taxes to make both ends meet in the future.

The deficit balance this year between receipts and payments is estimated at no less than \$154,000,000, which may possibly be reduced to \$109,000,000.

The chief items which go to make this deficit are the upkeep of about \$6,000 men in Morocco, the supplementary credits to increase the efficiency of various departments, the cost of maintaining extra recruits under the flag in accordance with the "three years' law, and the carry-in; out of the naval budget.

PROMPT ACTION OF C. MARTEN SAVED DROWNING FATALITY AT PICNIC ON SATURDAY.

A young lady named Lillian Liddell, of Queen street, Sherbrooke, had a narrow escape from drowning at "Riverside Park" on Saturday afternoon.

She was a member of the Baptist picnic party, and while the main body were holding the sports a quarter of a mile away, she went bathing with a friend in the river opposite the landing stage.

After being in the water a short time she got out of her depth and was sinking fast when the cries of her mother, who was watching from the bank, attracted the attention of a young man named Charlie Martin, who is employed at Allatt's bakery.

Martin rushed to the spot, and without waiting to divest himself of boots or clothing, plunged into the river and brought her out as she was going down for the third time.

She was taken to the Dollard Show-shoe Clubhouse and in about an hour afterwards was restored to a normal condition.

The owner of the clubhouse exchanged Martin's wet clothes for some dry ones.

MAY BE STRIKE OF 80,000 MEN

Up to Railways to Say Whether They Accept Arbitration

IF NO SOLUTION IS REACHED STRIKE WILL BEGIN IMMEDIATELY SAY DEALERS.

New York, July 14.—Whether or not a strike of upwards of 80,000 conductors and trainmen on forty-five eastern railroads shall be declared within the next few days, depends upon whether the railroads recede from their present position and withdraw from their refusal to arbitrate the wage and other differences between the companies and the men.

This declaration was made last night in statements by the members representatives after the grievance committee from the various roads, gathered here in conference, had ratified the strike vote of the men, recently voted, and authorized A. B. Garretson, president of the Brotherhood of Railway Conductors and W. G. Lee, president of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, to issue the formal strike order to their respective organizations.

Peace prospects centered upon the attitude of the roads, the men declared, with the possibility that a wayout of the deadlock will be supplied by today's conference in Washington, where amendments to the Erdman law, under which previous disputes between the roads and their men have been arbitrated, will be considered with a view to pressing their speedy passage upon Congress.

DEFIED CHURCH TRADITIONS

Chicago Preacher Appeared in Pulpit Dressed in White

APPEARED QUITE COMFORTABLE IN TEMPERATURE OF 93, WHILE CONGREGATION SWELTERED.

Chicago, July 14.—(Special)—Rev. Arthur J. Francis, Pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Englewood, defied church traditions by appearing in the pulpit dressed entirely in white. There was almost a gasp from the congregation when he stepped on to the platform.

The preacher appeared comfortable in temperature of 93, while many members in Prince Alberts and stiff Sunday gowns fanned vigorously.

After the sermon, Rev. Mr. Francis said he thought conventional heavy black coat and stiff collar were "nonsense." He said yesterday's costume permitted him to "deliver three times better sermon," in hot weather.

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EIGHT DROWNED IN BOSTON HARBOUR

Six Other Passengers on the Sloop Alberta Were Saved

TELEGRAPH OPERATOR MADE A BRAVE ATTEMPT TO RESCUE TWO MEN.

Boston, July 14.—Grafton Morgan, first office of the White Star line steamship Cymric, and Captain Arthur G. Ayres, superintendent of the Sailors' Haven at Charleston, together with six men employed as freight handlers by the Boston & Maine Railroad in Charleston, were drowned in the outer harbor late yesterday afternoon when the sloop Alberta capsized off the Brewsters.

Six other men of the party of pleasure-seekers on the Alberta were rescued.

The motor boat Dreadnought, Captain Charles Devine, was one of the boats that went to the assistance of the Alberta. Her passengers threw lines to the struggling men, but the lines became entangled in the Dreadnought's propeller.

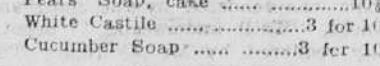

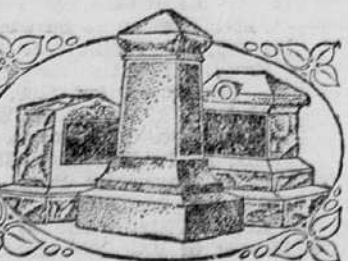

SET FIRE TO BUSH IN CLEARINGS

Nine Farmers in Lake Megantic District Fined by Court

ACTIONS WERE TAKEN AT THE INSTANCE OF CROWN LANDS DEPARTMENT.

Lake Megantic, July 14.—(Special) Judge Mulvena held a special term of the criminal court here on Saturday to deal with a number of complaints laid by Mr. F. W. Roche, inspector of Crown Lands Department, against a number of farmers in the Townships of Marston, Chesnam and Louise. These complaints set forth that the parties had contravened the law by setting fires in clearings at dates forbidden by law. The law prohibits the setting of bush fires, except in special cases, at all times except from the 15th of June to the 1st of September, and from November till March.

Nine were convicted, but as they were all of limited means, and claimed to have acted in good faith and in ignorance of the law, the fines were reduced to \$15.00 each.

The following were convicted: Xavier Bouchard, Louise; Elzear Roy, Marston; David Roy, Louise; H. Boisclair, Marston; R. Huet, Chesnam; F. Gagne, D. M. McLean, Angus McLeod and Bruno Michaud. Great losses have been caused recently by the reckless starting of forest fires for the purpose of clearing the land, and the Government seems decided to put an end to this work at any cost.

AMERICAN MINE CAMPS LOOTED

Mexican Rebels Burn Down Buildings of Two Mining Concerns

OFFICIALS ESCAPED FROM THE PLACE BEFORE THE ARRIVAL OF THE REBEL BAND.

Guadalajara, Mexico, July 14.—Rebels on Saturday looted the camps of the Bocha Ancha Mining Company, a Chicago concern, and the Gold Standard Mining Company, a Philadelphia concern, in the Paranso district in the State of Jalisco. After looting, they set fire to the buildings in both camps, destroying those of the Gold Standard Company and severely damaging those of the Bocha Ancha.

The American officials escaped from the place before the arrival of the rebels. B. C. Johnson, the English owner of the Alchual Hacienda in the Autland district of Jalisco, was driven off the place by the rebels and is hiding with his wife in the mountains. Orders have been sent to the nearest troops to attempt to rescue them. Rebels cut off with a chisel the fingers of the Mexican owner of an adjoining ranch because he was unable to produce \$2,000 which they demanded.

BECKER DENIED A NEW TRIAL

EFFORTS OF COUNCIL TO RE-OPEN CASE DENIED BY THE COURTS.

New York, July 14.—Charles Becker's application for a new trial on a charge of murdering the gambler, Herman Rosenthal, was denied by Supreme Court Justice Goff on Saturday, on the ground of newly discovered evidence.

Justice Goff, who was the trial judge in the Becker case, and in the case of the four gunmen also convicted, held that the former lieutenant had had a fair trial before him, and in a seventeen page opinion denied the plea. If relief comes to Becker now it must be through the higher courts. For months he has been in the death house at Sing Sing.

ALL FRANCE KEPT JOYOUS HOLIDAY

Celebration of 124th Anniversary of the Fall of the Bastille

PRESIDENT POINCARÉ ENTHUSIASTICALLY CHEERED ON WAY TO GRAND MILITARY REVIEW.

Paris, July 14.—(Special) — All France kept its usual joyous holiday today in celebration of the 124th anniversary of the fall of the Bastille. At an early hour the boulevards of Paris were thronged with merry-makers, who promenaded up and down and watched the performances of wandering acrobats, jugglers, magicians and street singers. The streets resembled carnival time, with the crowds of pleasure seekers and the gayly decorated buildings. In the early morning magnificent wreaths were placed on the Strasbourg monument in the Place de la Concorde by various deputations.

President Poincaré, while driving to the Longchamps race course, this afternoon to witness the grand annual military review, was enthusiastically cheered all along the route. In the presidential tribune with him were the members of the cabinet and the ambassadors.

Messrs. Jos. Bernard and Wm. Pearson gave an account of the Good Roads convention recently held at Quebec, which they attended as delegates from this council. A lively discussion followed. A petition was presented to have a portion of road fixed near the town line. Mr. W. J. Pearson was voted \$25. to do the work.

A case of small pox was reported near Shefford Mountain and Mr. W. P. Cox was instructed to see that the family was properly quarantined. Mr. J. T. Bisailon asked to have repairs made on the road near his farm. Councillors Booth and Bernard were instructed to estimate the cost.

THE FALL OF THE BASTILLE. To-day, July 14th, is the Independence Day of the French nation, for on this eventful date during the Revolution the Bastille was destroyed. The grim fortress, which had witnessed so many tragedies and crushed so many hearts, was razed to the ground and the prisoners liberated. Many who had gone in young came out dazed with their freedom and with hair as white as snow. Many had been forgotten entirely. Their friends were dispersed or dead, and they were strangers in a strange world. The majority of the prisoners were innocent of any crime, but were incarcerated to gratify private spite or political enmity. Small wonder, then, that all France rejoiced when the great stones crashed to the ground and the Bastille was no more. Since that day the anniversary has been religiously celebrated in France and throughout French Canada, especially in Quebec and Montreal. To-day in the latter city a fine statue of France will be unveiled in the Place Viger amidst great ceremonies, and many other festivities will be held.

AMERICAN CONCERN FOR CANADA

Governor Foss Head of Company Dissatisfied With Wilson Tariff

WILL LOCATE CANADIAN BRANCH OF THE B. F. STURTEVANT CO. IN GALT, ONT.

Boston, July 14.—The statement that the B. F. Sturtevant Company has purchased the plant of the Canadian Motors Company in Galt, Ont., and that it will establish there the Canadian branch of that industry, caused a flutter among the politicians.

They thought that they saw in it another evidence that Governor Foss, who is the head of the Sturtevant Company, would run again. They argued that, disgusted with the importunities of the labor agitators, with the failure of the present national Democratic party to press the Canadian reciprocity issue, and disgusted also with the Wilson tariff bill, his excellency has taken the course which he announces. Politicians argued that it looked as if he were squinting a little more towards the Republican gubernatorial nomination. The governor's brother, the Illinois congressman, who is a Republican, is here. Next week something may happen.

It would seem, at any rate, that the bulk of the work heretofore done at Hyde Park would hereafter be done at Galt.

VISCOUNT WOLSELEY'S SUCCESSOR

London, July 14.—The appointment of Field-Marshal Sir John French as colonel-in-chief of the Royal Irish Regiment, in succession to the late Viscount Wolseley, has been gazetted.

It will be remembered that Sir John French, who is chief of the Imperial General Staff and First Military Member of the Army Council, received the baton of Field-Marshal vacant by the death of Lord Wolseley, and he now succeeds that distinguished soldier as colonel-in-chief of the Royal Irish Regiment. Sir John is colonel of the 19th (Queen Alexandra's Own Royal) Hussars, and Aide-de-Camp-General to the King. Sir John visited Canada a few years ago.

CAPTAIN AND WIFE WERE DROWNED

Port Colborne, July 14.—The barge Annabel Wilson, owned by Thos. Lannan, of Port Colborne, founded off Erie on Saturday morning in the high gale. Captain Barney McIntyre and his wife, of Port Dalhousie, were drowned.

The Wilson was loaded with coal from Erie for Port Colborne, and was in tow of the tug Meteor. The tug with great difficulty succeeded in rescuing three men of the Wilson's crew, and put back to Dunkirk.

The loss of the barge and cargo is about \$10,000, and was not insured.

FATAL RAILWAY ACCIDENT IN ENGLAND

Colchester, Eng., July 14.—Three persons were killed outright and thirty were injured when a passenger train was derailed at Lowestoft on Saturday.

TORONTO'S LOYAL ORANGEMEN

Enthusiasm Was Not Dampened by Heavy Downpour of Rain

ABOUT 8,000 MEMBERS OF VARIOUS BRANCHES OF THE ORDER IN PROCESSION.

Toronto, July 14.—Rain cannot dampen the enthusiasm of Toronto's loyal Orangemen, and they paraded Saturday morning in large numbers through a steady downpour and through streets lined with umbrella-spectators. In the neighborhood of 8,000 True Blues, Orange Young Britons and members of Orange lodges in the city and district gathered at Queen's Park in the rain, walked the two miles to Exhibition Park through a distinctly damp atmosphere and then took refuge in the grand stand from which point of vantage and dryness they listened to speeches from prominent men on various aspects of Orangism.

Close to seventy bands accompanied the marchers, and lively music kept time with the raindrops. Brilliant uniforms did not show to the best advantage, though many thoughtful persons carried umbrellas as they walked.

At the Exhibition Park speeches were heard from Mayor Hocken, Colonel Scott, Supreme Grand Master, Rev. Canon Dixon.

MAINE CENTRAL RAILWAY BALKS

REFUSES TO OBEY LAW CALLING FOR INTERCHANGEABLE MILEAGE BOOKS.

Concord, N. H., July 14.—The Maine Central Railroad has refused to comply with the provisions of the New Hampshire law passed at the last session of the Legislature, compelling the steam railroads of the State to issue 500-mile mileage books, good for transportation of the bearer over all the railroad lines in the State, and to keep them on sale at all ticket offices at the rate of two cents a mile. Complaint came to the Public Service Commission that the road was not complying with the act and a letter of inquiry to determine the cause brought the reply from the road management that the validity of the law was questioned and it was the intent on to decline to put the books on sale as required by the act. The board has turned the matter over to Attorney-General Tuttle with orders to proceed immediately to begin action in the name of the State of New Hampshire for relief by mandamus or injunction, and to do what is necessary to enforce obedience to the statute at the earliest possible moment.

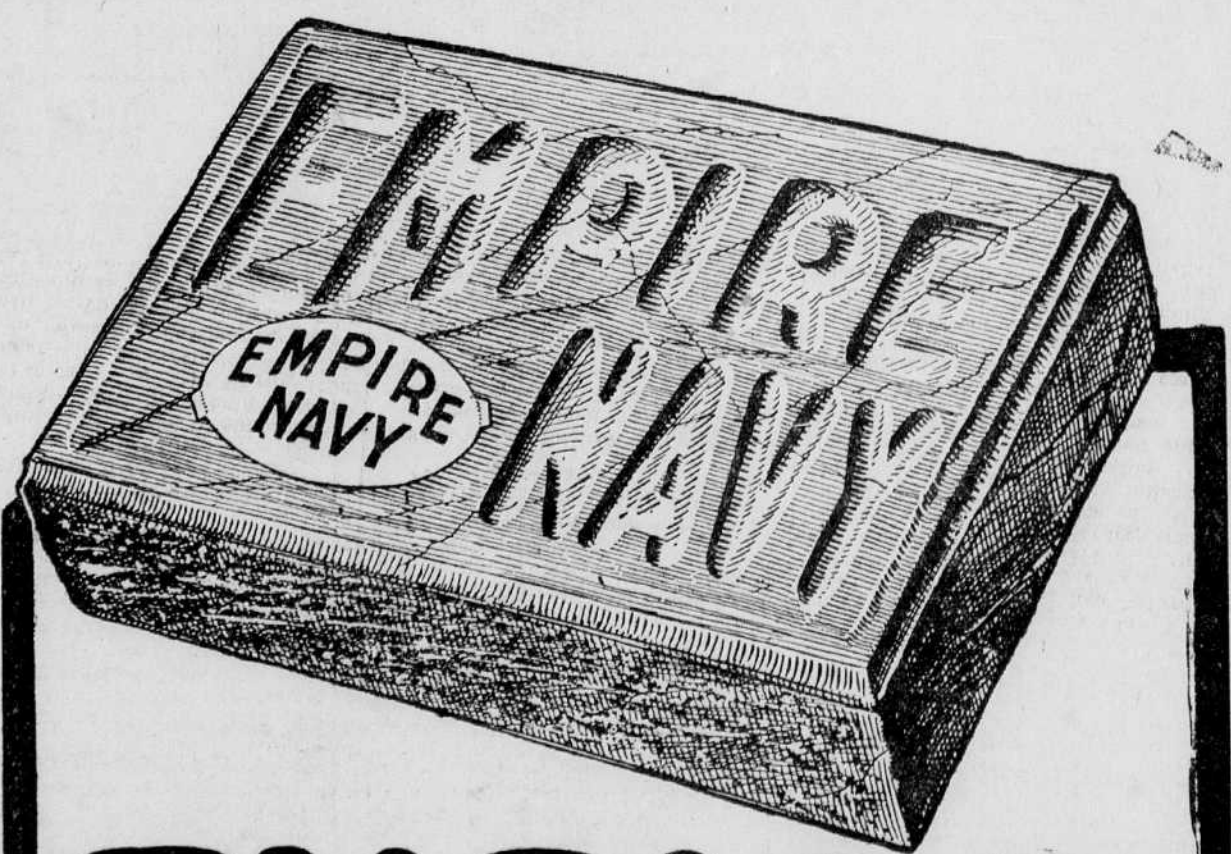
