income, and who does not authorize the most flagrant oppression to support this ridiculous policy. In short, the only contribution to the glory of the Empire, so much as the two opposite dominions of slaves, separates their private interests from the general good.

The line of policy pursued by the United States for the last twenty months is regarded by their own countrymen with great surprise, if not with indignation, in the mind of a candid and liberal observer. These men do not question that the general political creed of our neighbours has led the foundation of a system as fraught with advantage to their own ambitious views, as it is another respect, and in external appearance liberal and generous.

We care not who may blame us, or bring us to task for the observation which we are about to make; but we have no hesitation to assert, that the indifference and apathetic neglect on the part of the Mother Country towards one of her most promising Colonies, ought to be persisted in, we know not, nor, from the liberal feelings which seem to pervade the whole circle of the Imperial Cabinet with regard to Canada, are we willing to anticipate one moment to its duration. It were, however, well for the future prospects of the British American Colonies, if a greater intimacy were cultivated by all parties at home, with their distant resources - their Commerce - their Agriculture - their Navigation and Geographical boundaries, than has hitherto been done.

The reasons of these observations will be made manifest, from a moment's attention to the singular nature of some of the negotiations said to be depending between the United States and Great Britain. These most particularly regard various claims set up by the former Country, not only in relation to the commercial intercourse with our Colonies, but those ancient territorial boundaries, which, since their independence, have been made such a fertile field of discussion and dispute.
