## 'Y' REPORTS BEST YEAR



### H. C. Nourse Management Chairman

A balanced budget, a record attendance and an expanding program were the highlights of the 42nd annual report of the Westmount Y.M.C.A. presented last night at the annual meeting.

The chairman's report for 1953, presented by A. W. D. Swan, retiring chairman of the board of management, which headed a long list of worthwhile statistics documenting the efforts of the various phases of the institution, revealed that 1953 for the Westmount 'Y' was the biggest and best yet.

In his report Mr. Swan said: "Our success is due largely to the work of the whole staff . . . assisted by the enthusiastic law leaders who give freely of their time, knowledge, ability and fellowship".

### Veterans Rehabilitation Story Told To Royal Empire Society

Brig. C. B. Topp, chief pensions advocate in the Department of Veterans' Affairs, reviewed Canada's multi-million dollar veterans rehabilitation program recently.

Describing the program to members of the Royal Empire Society's Montreal branch, Brigadier Topp classed as "primary" the task of caring for the disabled and the dependents of those who died on the field of battle.

Total cost of rehabilitation plans for veterans of World War II will

eventually run to \$1,500,000,000, he said.

Maj.-Gen. R. O. G. Morton, CBE, was elected president, succeeding H. C. P. Cresswell, whose report reflected a busy year. It showed that Hon. Douglas Abbott, Minister of Finance, had been named an honorary life member of the society by the headquarter's council in London, England.

P. L. Hall was re-elected secretary with A. Archibald as corresponding secretary and A. S. Keiller, treasurer.

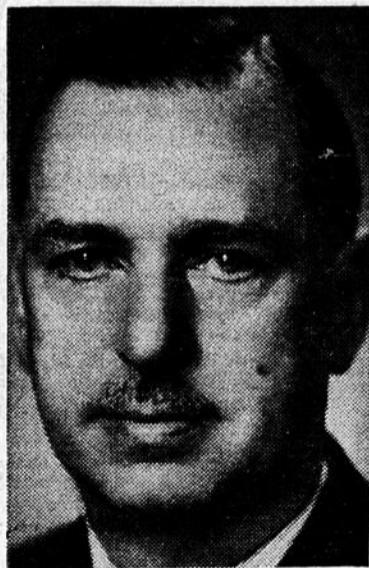

## Atlantic, Exdale Exchange Names To Alter Sunday

Thousands of telephone subscribers in the northwestern section of Greater Montreal, including Town of Mount Royal and Cote des Neiges, will get new numbers early Sunday morning, Charles deL. Harwood, Bell Telephone manager for Montreal, announced this week. A few minutes after midnight two exchange names will cease to exist and two new ones will come into use. Atlantic will become REgent 8, and EXdale will be renamed REgent 7.

Telephone users should have little difficulty in remembering the new numbers, Mr. Harwood said, because only the prefixes will be changed. For example, Atlantic 1234 will be REgent 8-1234, and EXdale 1234 will be REgent 7-1234.

The farewell to Atlantic and EXdale numbers means that another step is being taken in the progressive introduction of the two-letter and five-figure telephone numbers, which are required to provide for the continued development of Montreal's telephone system. The new numbering system fits in with a uniform plan being established throughout Canada and the United States.

## 'Borrow The Borough' Sydney Phillips Urges

A switch to the borough system of government, thus taking matters out of the hands of the present "huge unwieldy body," was advocated Wednesday by Sydney Phillips, well known Montreal lawyer and past vice-president of the Young Men's Section of the Montreal Board of Trade.

Addressing the weekly meeting of the Westmount Rotary Club, he said that "Montreal is wallowing in its own bureaucracy, thus affecting neighboring municipalities such as Westmount."

He criticized the city council, composed of 99 men, saying that decisions on purely local affairs took up time on minor details, most of which are only of interest to the councillors from those particular localities.

A system involving a general manager, which he deemed "a bit better", is only practical for small communities. He said that such a man is under constant pressure, and is forced to bend one way or another.

"The present system was drafted to fill a need — it did but is now inadequate. The governing of Montreal includes the business of outside municipalities, and our present one can not do this."

"The borough system, as used in London, England for example, is a good answer. It has been described as the decentralization of government for the local issues, and a centralization for the non-local ones."

"A similar plan was proposed here. It would have split the town into 24 boroughs, each with its own council, and with representation on a metropolitan council."

"In places where such a system has been tried, it was found to be extremely successful, and had a manner of keeping 'politicians' out as local councillors."

"A real sense of pride also develops within the community, and local participation becomes important."

"The Metropolitan Commission, as presently set up, is a borough system but on a financial level."

He said that the solution of these problems rests as much with the outside municipalities as with the city, and the latter cannot cope with them itself. But, he said, if brought together some way, there are many common problems that would find immediate solution.

## Income Tax Comes To Us All

Charlie Chaplin Seeks To Re-enter U.S.

HOLLYWOOD, Feb. 18.—Former President Harry S. Truman had to resign from active politics in order to build himself a little nest-egg. His salary as chief executive of the United States was only enough to defray personal and official expenses. His salary as senator for many years was even considerably less. But now, as one of the only two living ex-presidents, he is writing his memoirs and in one swoop of the mighty pen will earn a minimum of \$600,000.

The breakdown on this and how it will be taxed makes interesting reading. The \$600,000 comes from Life Magazine, which will serialize the memoirs first; The New York Times, which will publish them on a daily basis; and The St. Louis Post Dispatch, ditto.

Because Mr. Truman is not a professional writer, a man who makes his living by writing year after year, the government is reciprocating the courtesy his administration showed former General Eisenhower when he published his book some time back. This involves spreading the tax over a six-year period rather than taxing the entire \$600,000 as a single year's income. Mr. Truman's landfall will be taxed on the basis of \$100,000 annually for six summers, and he will save about \$170,000 in income levies by remaining in the lower tax bracket.

Actually, this is not identical to Eisenhower's tax status. He was allowed to list the \$1,000,000 reported income from his story as a capital gain, making it only half taxable. But at Mr. Truman's age he's not going to quibble over a few hundred thousand dollars!

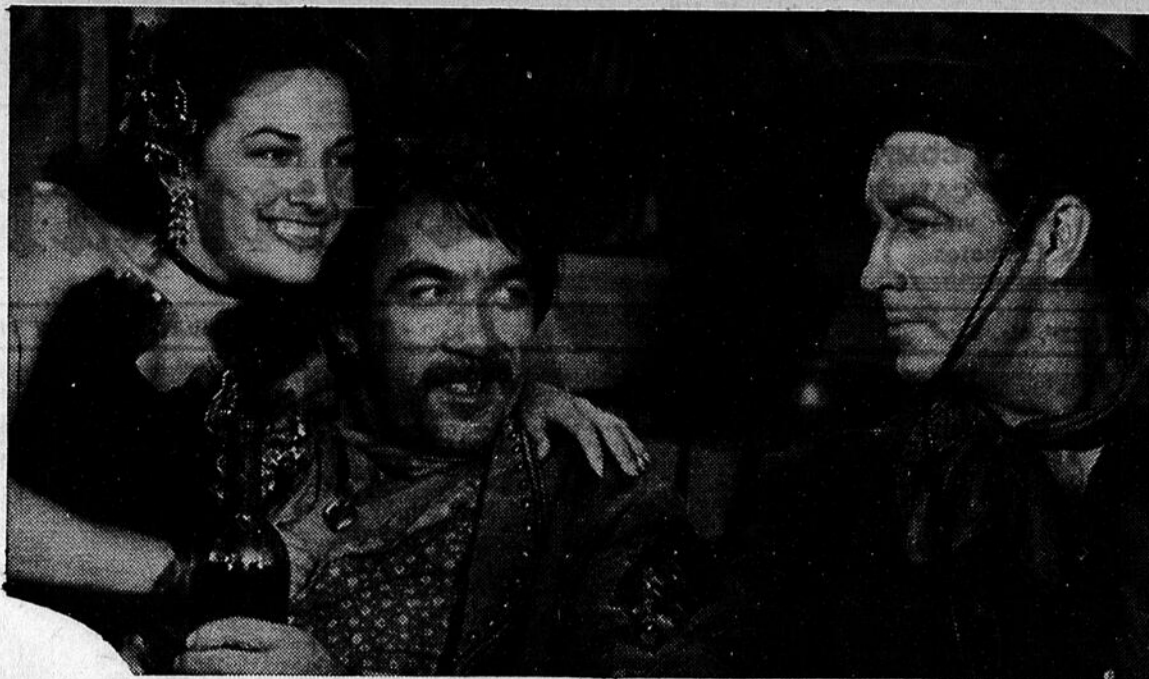

## World Thinking Day

Tribute To Late Lord Baden-Powell  
 Planned for Sunday

Next Sunday, the Girl Guides and Brownies throughout the world will join with the Boy Scouts and Wolf Cubs in paying tribute to the late Lord Baden Powell, the founder of these fine organizations.

It was Baden Powell who, when starting the movement, chose the name Guides — taking it from a corps of specially trained soldiers on the northwest frontier of India, who had to be ready at all times for emergencies. Baden Powell wished Guiding to prepare girls to become self-reliant and capable women. In the forty-five years since the Guide movement started, it has grown

rapidly, and while the aims have not changed, the methods of Guiding has kept pace with changing conditions.

Today in Canada, there are over 37,000 Guides, between the ages of eleven and sixteen, and about 40,500 Brownies, from eight to eleven. For those who wish to continue Guiding after sixteen, there are Ranger, Sea Ranger, and Cadet Companies, and, of course, many opportunities for service as leaders, who are called Guiders.

Next Monday, February twenty-second, Lord Baden Powell's birthday, is World Thinking Day for Guides and Brownies in all countries. Members of all Companies and Packs think of other Guides and Brownies everywhere, remembering the Guide Law, that says: "A Guide is a friend to all, and a sister to every other Guide." In keeping with this ideal, each Guide and Brownie gives one cent, and the amount raised is used to further Guiding in countries where it is being started, or is encountering difficulties in carrying on.

For the modern girl, especially one who lives in the city, Guiding offers an opportunity to develop many skills, and to develop self-reliance and the ability to co-operate with others. Best of all, it furthers international good will and friendship, regardless of race, religion, or colour.

## Coffee And Wheat

The two principal items of our daily breakfast contend for the front page in our daily paper. Coffee and toast have a new meaning since the days when coffee was 25 cents a pound and they dumped it in the sea to give the fish a new flavour, and wheat was 50 cents a bushel and unsaleable at that.

However, we have grown accustomed to wheat at \$2.05 a bushel, and it only occupies a front page now when we gloat over the fact — as one paper did lately — that the half billion bushels lying out on the prairie are as good as money in the bank; and why worry anyway about the millions of India being slowly forced by starvation into Communism? Even if we had given them a generous part of our surplus crop they might still have become Communists and we should have lost both ways. No, our exorbitantly priced wheat has ceased to be front page news.

But coffee is another matter. You see we do not grow coffee, but we do need it for a well furnished breakfast, and we feel a righteous indignation when the price goes to a dollar a pound. We are being gouged by those greedy Brazilians. They have no conscience at all. Just think of it. They exact the highest price they can get for the wretched bean. They have no thought of the poor downtrodden New Yorker or Montrealer who can't possibly wake up in the morning without a cup of coffee. The Government should do something about it. It would not hurt the Brazilians to give away a million pounds to the slum dwellers in New York. If they drive me much farther I shall give up coffee.

But that is the difference. I can give up coffee for it is only a stimulant anyway, and a cup of hot water would do me just as much good. But wheat is another matter entirely. Wheat is food and I cannot, for spite, give up food. I must eat or die. So while we rage against the Brazilian and his high-priced bean let us remember that we are far more guilty than he is with our inaccessible wheat.

Speaking of that, would it not be a wonderful thing if our wandering Prime Minister could venture past the governmental and ecclesiastical officials in Italy, and see why hunger forces so many Italians into Communism; or if he would ask Mr. Nehru, or one of the princes, to let him see the deep-down misery in India. Perhaps he would persuade even Mr. Howe on his return that there is a need which we as Christians,

and as members of one of the wealthiest nations on earth, are under an obligation to meet.

"should not be thrown out of balance in the process."

Mr. Denman, who paid tribute to the work of Mr. Gurton as chairman of the immigration committee, said the society also considered that a full percentage of immigrants from the U.K. should be maintained "if our future population is to contain sufficient elements who by tradition and heritage understand and appreciate the benefits of our Canadian freedom and democracy."

He noted that in 1952 and 1953 the percentage of British immigrants had increased over previous years.

Group membership had increased by 30 during the year and individual membership was now 545, highest in the branch's history, Mr. Denman reported.

Mr. Hall, in his secretary's report, noted the formation of a new branch in Ottawa.

Brigadier Topp, who is a Fellow of the RES, pointed out that the government had provided university training for 54,000 veterans, had assisted 19,000 to build homes, had settled 30,000 others on farms and a similar number on small holdings.

"But," he added, "our primary task is, and always will be, the care of those disabled by reason of their services and the dependents of those who died."

Discussing the medical services, he claimed that Sunnybrook Hospital, Toronto, was one of the finest institutions of its kind in the world. "It is a notable fact," he said, "that service paraplegics, most of them wheel chair cases for life, have been almost 100 per cent rehabilitated and a majority of them are self-supporting."

The Department of Veterans' Affairs did not experience so much difficulty as others in securing nurses for its hospitals, he said.

## W.V.S. Reports Contributions To Hospitals, Welfare Agencies

The annual meeting of the Women's Voluntary Services was held recently. Jean M. Bovey, president was in the chair. Senator Cairine Wilson seconded the reports.

A total of 19,378 hours was given nine hospitals, seven youth clubs and 24 welfare agencies through the placement office of the WVS.

A general survey of jobs done by WVS volunteers during last year includes clothes packed for disaster areas, driving elderly and sick people, food packing, blood donors telephoned, pianists and other entertainers provided, instructors in games and sports and handicrafts provided, visitors sent to veteran's hospitals and to shut-ins, small children cared for while parents attended educational classes, and collecting for worthy campaigns.

The report of the St. Anne's Hospital visiting committee said that various groups had contributed over 100,000 cigarettes, 700 pounds of candy and other useful and entertaining articles. Some 900 Christmas parcels were distributed.

The personal parcels service which began in March, 1946, ended this year. A total of 86,000 parcels were sent to sponsored names in the United Kingdom and France.

The Diggers and Weeders Club made a garden on the grounds of the Queen Mary Veterans Hospital. Garden clubs in the city collected and distributed cut garden flowers to the hospital during the summer, it was reported by the flower committee.

Two contour chairs were donated

to the Queen Mary Veterans Hospital. Some 600 gifts were distributed at Christmas.

The corresponding secretary reported the 1953 campaign was successful and announced the dates of the 1954 campaign, April 6 to 17. New brooches have been designed and issued to all WVS volunteers.

The Civil Defence report mentioned the indoctrination courses held under the joint auspices of WVS and the Montreal Council of Women.

The Notre Dame de Grace Women's Service Group sent overseas parcels, knitted for Korea, gave 50 teas for the blind each week, a picnic at Belmont Park for 250 blind last June, a Xmas party for 55 blind, a Xmas dinner for the blind and also 18 Bingo Boards in Braille.

# Poetess And Philantropist, Lady Roddick Is Dead At 85

Final tribute will be paid today to Lady Amy Redpath Roddick, noted poetess, philanthropist and member of a prominent family whose achievements ranged into the fields of Canadian medicine, literature and finance.

Service will be at 2:30 p.m. at the Church of St. Andrew and St. Paul. Burial will be in Mount Royal Cemetery. She died Tuesday at the age of 85.

Born in Montreal, she was the daughter of the late John Ames and Ada Mills Redpath, she was educated here privately and at Miss Symmers and Miss Smith's School, where she won the gold medal.

As a child she spent some years in England and on the European continent and later travelled extensively.

In 1906, she married Sir Thomas George Roddick, M.D., LL.D., Hon. F.R.C.S., Engl., who died in 1923. One time dean of the faculty of medicine at McGill University, he was the first overseas president of the British Medical Association, and counted among his most famous work inspiring formation of the Canadian Medical Council.

In her husband's memory, Lady Roddick presented to McGill University the memorial gates and clock at the entrance of the campus. She maintained the strong interest of her family in Redpath Library.

A prolific author, Lady Roddick penned the following works: *The Flag and Other Poems* (1918); *The Armistice and Other Poems* (1919); *The Seekers*, an Indian mystery play (1920); *The Birth of Montreal*, a chronicle play and other poems (1921); *The Romance of a Princess, and Other Poems* (1922); *In a Venetian Garden, and St. Ursula*, two plays (1926); *From Montreal Elsewhere* (1929).

Her poetry saw publication in several North American newspapers and periodicals including *The Gazette*, *The Witness*, *The Star*, and the *Newfoundland Quarterly*.

### ADVOCATED FLAG

Since her poem on a Canadian flag, "What Is Canada's Flag?" was first published in 1918, she devoted a great deal of her time to advocating a national flag for Canada.

In her late years, her deep interest in Canadian Indians took the form of increased efforts on their behalf.

In the late 1930's she took a particular interest in the welfare of the Caughnawaga reservation

and was fondly known by her Indian friends under the title Princess Kawennaroroks (Princess Gathering Woods) which they bestowed upon her.

In great measure it was due to her aid that the reservation's Long House at which curios are sold to tourists was constructed. At her request, Sir Edward Beatty, late president of the C.P.R., donated railway cars to be dismantled by the Indians for their wood content. It was with this wood, and scarce bark purchased from the Abenaki tribe in the United States, that the Long House was built. It was also

through the aid of Lady Roddick that the town shrine was erected.

When the King and Queen visited Montreal during their tour of Canada in 1939, 240 Caughnawaga Indians in costume gathered at Lady Roddick's home to salute the "Great White Father" as he passed.

Lady Roddick held the opinion that the North American Indian would not become extinct.

In 1945 she was quoted as saying: "I believe that if the governments concerned continue their policies with regard to reservations, we shall preserve our last human link with Canada's colorful past."

Lady Roddick was a member of the Canadian Authors' Association (Montreal Branch); the Women's Canadian Club; honorary member of the McGill Alumnae;

and life member of the Montreal Art Association. She was also a patron of the Women's Council of Canada, a former governor of the Montreal General Hospital and a former president of the Montreal branch, Labrador Medical Mission.

Survivors include five nephews; Huntley and Peter Redpath of Montreal; James Bottrell Redpath of Toronto; John Redpath of Winnipeg; and Hugh Redpath of Vancouver; and a niece, Mrs. Gratton Thompson of Montreal.

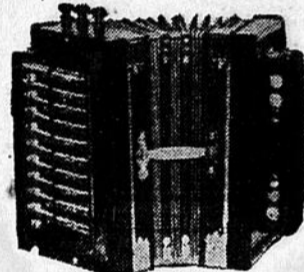

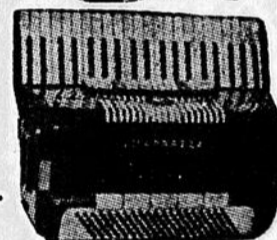
