RECTOR'S REPORT 2002-03

Concordia is one of Canada's largest and most dynamic universities. Established in 1974 by the merger of Loyola College (1896) and Sir George Williams University (1873), Concordia has two campuses: the picturesque Loyola Campus in the city's residential west-end, and the Sir George Williams Campus in the heart of downtown Montreal. The campuses, about 7 km apart, are linked by a free shuttle bus service. Students may choose from over 250 undergraduate and graduate programs in four Faculties (Arts and Science, Engineering and Computer Science, Fine Arts and the John Molson School of Business) and the School of Graduate Studies. Integrated within the Faculty of Arts and Science are five colleges (the Liberal Arts College, Science College, Loyola International College, the School of Community and Public Affairs, and the Simone de Beauvoir Institute). The School of Graduate Studies offers more than 70 programs leading to master's and doctoral degrees and graduate diplomas. A wide selection of not-for-credit courses and programs is available through the Centre for Continuing Education, including professional programs in information technology, business, communications and tourism, and second-language-English courses. The university has more than 800 full-time and 1,000 part-time faculty, many of whom are leading professionals drawn from industry, the business world and artistic community. Concordia is the only English-language university in Quebec that offers a comprehensive co-operative education program, thus allowing students to alternate terms of study and work and build a foundation of relevant experience before graduation.

THE MONTREAL EXPERIENCE

Concordia offers a rich multicultural atmosphere, with students drawn from more than 160 countries. Students and faculty take advantage of Concordia's location in one of North America's most exciting cities. Montreal is the world's second-largest French-language metropolis, where English has wide currency and many residents have come from all over the world. While classes at Concordia are given in English, services are bilingual, and essays and examinations may be written in French.

FLEXIBILITY, SUPPORT AND OPPORTUNITY

Students are supported throughout their studies by a wide array of services, from language training and writing skills to health and vocational counselling, job placement and extensive services for students with disabilities. Class sizes are small and professors are accessible. Although most students are recent CEGEP (Quebec community college system) graduates, Concordia welcomes students of all ages and backgrounds, and provides special support services for mature students. Part-time studies and flexible class schedules allow students to pursue their academic goals while working. There are more than 125 student clubs and associations at Concordia.

RESEARCH FOR THE REAL WORLD

Concordia's research centres promote interdisciplinary, collaborative projects in many areas. The Centre for International Academic Co-operation encourages and coordinates the university's international activities. Each year, Concordia welcomes more than 2,000 international students in both undergraduate and graduate programs, and conducts joint research and teaching projects around the world, including in China, India, the Middle East and the Caribbean.

SERVING THE PUBLIC

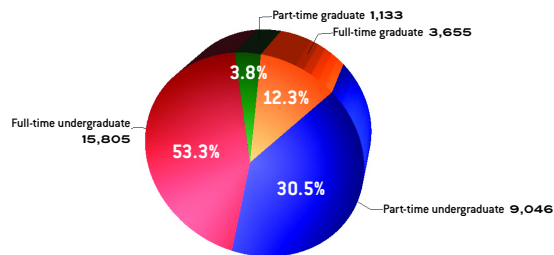
Most of Concordia's theatre, music and dance performances at the Oscar Peterson Concert Hall, art exhibitions at the Leonard & Bina Ellen Art Gallery, and sports events at the Loyola Athletic Complex are open to the public. Concordia experts offer professional seminars and consulting services to the larger community. Public lectures and panel discussions on campus are frequent and varied, and conference sites are available to non-profit groups.

BUILDING OUR FUTURE

Concordia University is in the midst of an ambitious \$350-million construction boom. The new \$85-million Richard J Renaud Science Complex on the Loyola Campus opened in September 2003. Construction of the Engineering, Computer Science and Visual Arts Complex on downtown Ste. Catherine St. is well under way. Occupancy by 2005 is the target. A 2004 start on construction of the new home for the John Molson School of Business on Guy St. and de Maisonneuve Blvd. is planned. Renovation of the Drummond Building on the Loyola Campus and the Hall Building downtown are beginning. New downtown athletic and recreation facilities and a new Loyola Athletics Complex are scheduled, as well as a student centre and a new performing arts centre at Loyola. Student housing and dorm space is another upcoming project.

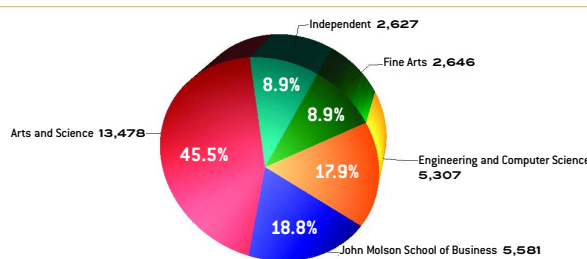

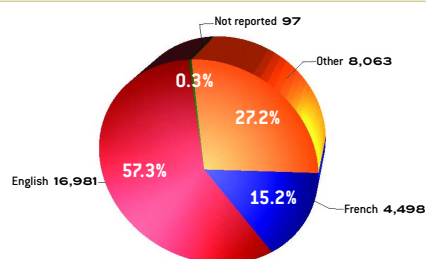


Enrolment by Faculty

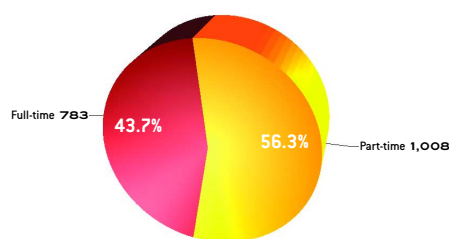


Enrolment by first language spoken (as declared on application)

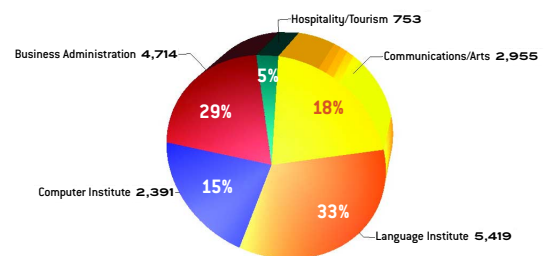


Enrolment by Mature students

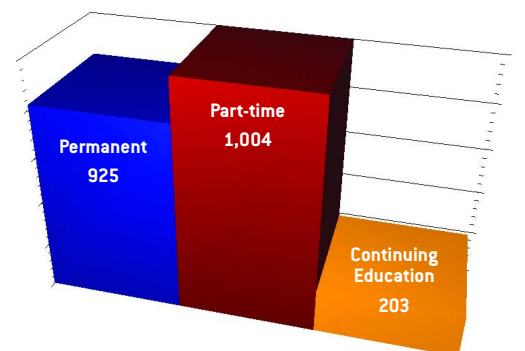

Continuing Education course registration

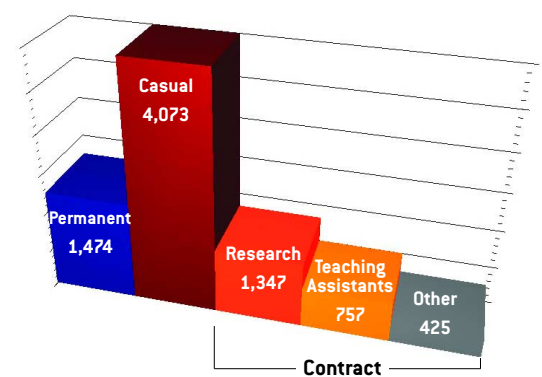

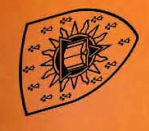

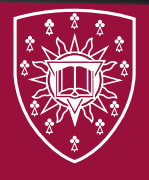
