World News In Brief

Ottawa, Sept. 29.—(CP)—An early-morning fire in a flimsy frame house today killed three small boys in Ottawa's south-end Glebe district.

Mrs. Rita Lavigne, mother of the three boys, leaped from a second-story window of the house after a futile attempt to save them.

The dead, all brothers, are: Leonard Lavigne, aged seven months; Philip Lavigne, two, and Richard Lavigne, three.

New York, Sept. 29.—(AP)—The Big Four Foreign Ministers met in a four-hour session until early this morning in another unsuccessful attempt to agree on an Austrian independence treaty.

A short communique issued after the meeting said only that the Big Four had continued their discussions and would meet again next week.

London, Sept. 29.—(P)—Britain yesterday, signed a five-year trade pact with Czechoslovakia. The United Kingdom will gain important non-dollar imports as well as payments from the Czechs for British property affected by Czech nationalization and expropriation following the Communist coup.

Cincinnati, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Bucky Walters was released today as manager of the Cincinnati Reds. Warren Giles, general manager, said no successor has been chosen to succeed him.

Walters, for many years a star pitcher for the Cincinnati club, became manager August 6, 1948.

Buffalo, N.Y., Sept. 29.—(P)—One hundred deputy sheriffs today hurled tear gas bombs to break up a rock-throwing crowd of striking United Automobile Workers (C.I.O.) after non-striking tried to pass an all-union picket line before the Bell Aircraft plant near here.

Melbourne, Sept. 29.—(Reuters)—Gasoline is to be rationed again in Australia, premiers and ministers representing the six Australian states agreed at a conference here yesterday.

Gasoline has been rationed since June 6.

Buenos Aires, Sept. 29.—(P)—The Argentine navy reported yesterday the mine-sweeper Fournier, with a crew of 65, has been missing for eight days in the South Atlantic. The craft was en route to Tierra del Fuego, big island territory at the tip of South America.

Madrid, Sept. 29.—(P)—Torrential rains and an electric storm yesterday brought death to 17 persons and caused widespread property damage in southern Spain.

Beddgelert, Caernarvonshire, Wales, Sept. 29.—(CP)—A five-foot, six-inch sphere of fused metal and stone, believed to be a meteorite, wrecked the lounge of the Prince Llewellyn Hotel here. Guests were uninjured but the sphere tore a hole through the room's ceiling and splintered its heavy wooden floor.

Labor Government To Face Confidence Vote Tonight

London, Sept. 29.—(P)—Health Minister Aneurin Bevan said today that if Britain stopped buying Canadian products the United Kingdom's dollar crisis would become a Canadian financial crisis.

First government speaker on the final day of the three-day debate in the House of Commons, Bevan said:

"If it be a crime in the British government to fail to balance its dollar purchases by its dollar sales, then what about Canada?"

"Canada has never done it, either under a Liberal or a Conservative administration."

London, Sept. 29.—(P)—The three-day House of Commons debate on devaluation—which some observers believe has seen the opening guns fired in the forthcoming general election battle—will wind up tonight with Prime Minister Attlee asking for a vote of confidence in the Labor government.

That vote was denied last night by the predominantly-Conservative House of Lords where the government was defeated, 93 to 24. But Labor whips in the Lower House foresaw no possibility of an upset by the Commons despite the fighting speech yesterday by Winston Churchill, who roundly attacked the government's economic policies.

Russia Scraps Friendship Treaty With Yugoslavia; Tito Again Is Assailed

Master Of Noronic To Be Heard

Toronto, Sept. 29.—(P)—The master's story of the Noronic disaster will be told officially today.

Short, grey-haired Captain William Taylor of Sarnia, Ont., who saw his ship go up in flames at her Toronto pier Sept. 17, will testify at a federal inquiry set up to determine why the Great Lakes cruise-ship burned within reach of all the fire-fighting facilities provided by Canada's second largest city. Possibly 130 persons died in the fire.

He will tell his story today for the official record before Mr. Justice R. L. Kellock of Ottawa, appointed by the department of transport to investigate the disaster. The hearing, which opened yesterday, is being held in Toronto's dingy, 50-year-old city hall.

Some 25 members of the Noronic's 171-man crew are slated to give testimony during the hearing which may last two weeks or more. The total of witnesses may reach 100, commission counsel J. W. Pickup said.

J. R. Naudie, superintendent of the C.S.L.'s western division, testified yesterday that six doors on the deck or starboard side of the Noronic were closed on the night of the fire. These could have been opened by any member of the crew as an avenue of escape for passengers, he said.

He said it would have been a simple matter to open the doors used for loading and unloading cargo. The Noronic had no cargo Sept. 17.

Mr. Naudie was unable to say whether the superstructure, largely of wood, had been painted over a number of times in recent years, or whether the paint was fire-resisting.

He claimed sufficient water pressure was maintained to operate fire-hoses on all decks. Survivors said during the previous Cleveland and Detroit inquiries there was little or no water in the hoses.

John James Moffat of Toronto, supervisor of marine inspection for the Dominion transport board, said fire equipment in excess of Canadian shipping regulations was carried by the Noronic. He said the ship last was inspected April 23, 1949.

Only other witness heard yesterday was James W. Johnstone, a photographer for the Toronto fire department, who identified 14 pictures of the Noronic taken several hours after the fire, some a week later. One picture taken Sept. 24 showed a wire screen over the upper part of a cabin window. The inquiry is expected to deal with the question of whether passengers were trapped in their cabins by this screening.

Left no doubt that he is convinced the time is "due and overdue" for a new government to take over and try to repair the damage caused by the "last four lavish years" of Labor mismanagement.

The Commons was to vote first on Churchill's "no confidence" motion against the government for failing to curb Britain's economic crisis. Then the Commons will vote on the government motion asking approval of its devaluation action as one short-term answer to the financial crisis.

A "no confidence" vote against the government would mean that it would be forced to call a general election immediately instead of during the next nine months when its five-year term expires.

Such a possibility seemed unlikely. Labor members, even the government's left-wing critics, seemed to be solidly behind the Prime Minister. Labor has 395 of the 640 seats in the Commons.

Before the voting, expected about 5 p.m. there will be a day of long debate, with Labor's Health Minister Aneurin Bevan as the first speaker. Conservative Oliver Lytton will follow Bevan, then Churchill's right hand in Parliament, Anthony Eden, will sum up for the opposition. Attlee will wind up the debate for the government.

In rolling sentences, Churchill yesterday dealt solemnly with Britain's present financial difficulties and told the Commons:

Soviets Accuse Premier of Lining Up His Regime With "Foreign Imperialistic Circles."

London, Sept. 29.—(P)—Soviet Russia scrapped her friendship treaty with Yugoslavia today, declaring that Premier Marshal Tito's regime has lined up with "foreign imperialistic circles."

The decision ending the alliance signed in 1945 was disclosed in a Soviet note to Yugoslavia. It was broadcast by Moscow radio.

The note declared the Budapest treason trial of former Hungarian foreign Minister Laszlo Rajk, sentenced to death Saturday, disclosed Yugoslavia had been carrying on hostile activity against the Soviet Union.

Rajk was accused specifically of plotting with Yugoslav and American agents to overthrow the Moscow-backed communist government in Hungary. Marshal Tito denounced the trial as a Russian propaganda move aimed at weakening his Yugoslav regime.

The Russian action was the sharpest diplomatic slap at Yugoslavia since the Moscow-led communist bloc expelled the Yugoslavs in June, 1948.

Since that time Russia and her eastern European satellites have clamped an economic boycott on Yugoslavia.

Marshal Tito Tuesday accused Russia of rattling the sabre and digging trenches in the satellite countries along the Yugoslav border in an attempt to intimidate his country.

There was immediate speculation here that other communist countries may follow Russia's lead and sever formal ties with the Yugoslavs.

Yugoslavia has friendship and mutual aid treaties with Albania, Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Hungary, Poland and Romania.

As a result of the Budapest trial, Hungary expelled ten Hungarian diplomats from Budapest, and Tito retaliated by expelling nine Yugoslav legation attaches from Belgrade.

Facts brought out at the trial, the note said, show that the Soviet-Yugoslav treaty has been "rude" trampled upon and torn to pieces by the present Yugoslav government.

The Yugoslav-Soviet friendship treaty was signed in Moscow on April 11, 1945, by Marshal Tito and V. M. Molotov, then Foreign Minister of the U.S.S.R.

It bound them to "participate, in spirit of sincere collaboration, in all international actions to ensure the peace and security of the nations."

The Soviet-Yugoslav treaty was to have remained in force until 1965.

Tokyo Rose Case Still Undecided

San Francisco, Sept. 29.—(P)—A federal court jury, weary but determined to reach a verdict, tried anew today to decide the fate of Mrs. Iva Toguri d'Aquino.

The 33-year-old Los Angeles-born woman is charged with treason in connection with "Tokyo Rose" broadcasts to United States troops in the Pacific during the war.

Judge Michael J. Roche offered the jury of six men and six women the evening off last night to relax, but they reported they wanted to keep at the case they took Monday noon.

However, when a long-winded wrangle by the prosecution and defence counsel developed over what parts of three depositions should be kept from the jury, the jurors recessed at 7:45 p.m. PST last night. They were called back at 9 a.m. today.

The prosecution argued that both the questions and answers should be stricken where they were not admitted as evidence; the defence said only the answers should be linked out. The prosecution won.

The depositions requested were those concerning the testimony of Ruth Hayakawa who, like Mrs. d'Aquino, broadcast on radio Tokyo's "Zero Hour"; Little Ghevenia, a Tokyo woman who testified it was generally assumed that Iva was the person dubbed "Tokyo Rose," and George Ozasa, a radio Tokyo employee.

Mrs. d'Aquino contended during the 13-week trial that her broadcasts were harmless entertainment.

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Imports Of Steel To Be Restricted

Ottawa, Sept. 29.—(P)—Canada's latest dollar-saving move—restriction of some United States steel imports—probably will go almost unnoticed by the average Canadian.

That was the opinion expressed by trade department spokesmen following announcement last night that import controls on certain categories of iron and steel will be tightened effective Oct. 1.

The trade department announced that such items as plates, bars, rods, forgings and pig iron, all now in plentiful supply in Canada, will be placed on a quota basis. Items still in short supply such as enamel sheeting still will be allowed in freely. Under a quota basis, importers must obtain permits before the items will be allowed across the border.

This means, the spokesman said, that Canadian industries using iron and steel in their manufactured products now will buy their supplies from Canadian steel mills, rather than U.S. mills.

He said the items placed on a quota basis are not sold direct to the consumer trade but are of the type used as raw materials in industry. The move should have "little or no effect" on the average Canadian. There should be no decline in the volume of appliances or any other goods available to Canadian consumers since the controls applied only to items already in plentiful supply in Canada. Fully-manufactured items will not be affected by the order.

The main idea is to keep out iron and steel commodities which can be produced in adequate supply by domestic industries. In this way, it is hoped Canada's dollar reserves position will be improved. The department said the new order will not affect shipments in transit on or before Sept. 30.

Legal Profession To Be Surveyed

Toronto, Sept. 29.—(P)—A survey of the legal profession to determine its place in Canada's social and economic life and to appraise its future, was announced today by A. N. Carter, of Saint John, N.B., president-elect of the Canadian Bar Association.

The project, organized under the leadership of John T. Hackett, of Montreal, former C.B.A. president, will be conducted by a panel of 21 men selected from all walks of life and working independently of the Bar Association.

Mr. Carter said the survey panel is a "completely independent" organization. It will be financed by funds from the Carnegie Foundation of New York, the Nuffield Foundation of England, and the C.B.A. Its members will include leaders of the Bar, university presidents, businessmen and labor leaders. Each of Canada's 10 provinces will be represented on its membership.

Charles P. McTaggart, of Toronto, former Supreme Court Justice in Ontario, will preside over the council of survey. He is a member of the law society of Upper Canada, and a member of the Senate of the University of Toronto and of the board of regents of the University of Ottawa.

Mr. Carter said the survey will study every aspect of the lawyer's life and work so that "the profession would have an opportunity to see itself through the mirror provided by a completely independent survey."

Charles P. McTaggart, of Toronto, former Supreme Court Justice in Ontario, will preside over the council of survey. He is a member of the law society of Upper Canada, and a member of the Senate of the University of Toronto and of the board of regents of the University of Ottawa.

Mrs. Pitre, Brother Viewed As Dupes In Bombing Plot

Quebec, Sept. 29.—(P)—Provincial police today are working on the theory that both Mrs. Arthur Pitre and her 47-year-old paralytic brother were used as "dupes" in the making of a home-made bomb which caused the crash of an airliner Sept. 9, killing 23 persons.

Last night a high city police official said that investigation of Mrs. Pitre's brother, Genereux Ruest, showed that he had "unknowingly" manufactured "a tiny mechanical part" of the bomb. The police official did not explain what Ruest thought he was doing or why he agreed to make the mechanical part in the first place.

Both Ruest and his 41-year-old sister are acquaintances of J. Albert Guay, 32, who is accused of murdering his pretty wife, Rita, by having a bomb placed aboard the Canadian Pacific Airlines plane that crashed into the side of a small mountain at Sault au Cochon. Mrs. Guay was a passenger on the plane which was flying from Quebec to Baie Comeau, Que.

Mrs. Pitre who was questioned by police last week after she was discovered suffering from an overdose of sleeping tablets in a Quebec hospital, admitted she placed a parcel aboard the plane which she now believes to have contained a bomb. When first questioned by police she said that Guay had told her the parcel contained a statue.

Tuesday Mrs. Pitre was arraigned on a charge of attempted suicide. However, no other charges have been laid against her in connection with the actual crash of the plane.

Both Ruest and his sister are expected to be the chief crown witnesses against Guay when his preliminary hearing in the murder charge will be held Oct. 4.

Yesterday an R.C.M.P. spokesman revealed how police first came to suspect Mrs. Pitre in the case.

He said that police became curious after a freight shipper at the airport recalled a woman had brought a heavy parcel to his office a few minutes before the plane was scheduled to take off. A short time later police traced the woman to a taxi that took her to the airport. Its driver said the woman appeared nervous and greatly concerned about the parcel in her care.

Later police instructed the cab driver to drive to a Quebec residence where they believed the "mystery woman" lived. The driver at that time was unable to get a look at the woman when she failed to answer his knock at her door. But a "break" came in the case when the same woman was reported in hospital suffering from an overdose of sleeping tablets.

The Mounties immediately had the driver and freight shipper identify her. Questioning of the woman followed and enough evidence was gained to allow them to issue a warrant for the arrest of Guay, who police described as Mrs. Pitre's brother.

Police described the home-made bomb as being made up of 20 sticks of dynamite weighing 10 pounds and wired to two batteries. The explosive was set off by a mechanism in which an unwinding copper coil made contact with the batteries.

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New Liberal M.P.'s Take House Floor

Ottawa, Sept. 29.—(P)—New Liberal members are beginning to monopolize the Commons throne-speech debate—traditional arena for aiming gripes, requests and praise of all kinds at the government.

Six of the eight members who took part in the debate at yesterday's abbreviated session were Liberals delivering their maiden addresses.

The preponderance of speeches by members friendly to government policies has noticeably taken the edge off the normally-lively debate.

There are obviously fewer gripes and more praise. There is, however, no reduction in the number of requests directed to the government.

Six requests—or suggestions—of varied descriptions reached government ears yesterday and four of them came from Liberal members.

The other two were from the opposition members who took part in the debate, Hazen Argue (C.C.P.—Assiniboia) and Ray Thomas (S.C.—Wetaskiwin).

Mr. Argue asked Transport Minister Chevier to delay the order of the Board of Transport Commissioners putting into effect an eight-per-cent increase in freight rates for Canadian railways.

Mr. Argue argued that the financial report of the Canadian Pacific Railway—yardstick line in deciding on increases—shows there is no need for increased rates at this time.

The increase would only result in higher prices for many products—which are already up as a result of Canada's 10-per-cent devaluation of the dollar.

Mr. Thomas, had two requests. He wanted the government to consider increases for superannuated civil servants as a result of higher cost of living and asked that veterans' legislation be modified to allow ex-servicemen to gain government loans for paying down payments on businesses.

The request most general in scope came from Gladstone M. Ferrie (L.C.—Mackenzie).

He would like to see the government appoint a minister of federal roads. The minister would head a commission in charge of selecting sites for a comprehensive network of highways across Canada which would be of extreme strategic importance in the event of attack from the north.

At present, said Mr. Ferrie, many parts of the country had roads which would not permit free movement of troops in case of emergency.

Montreal, Sept. 29.—(P)—Councillor J. O. Asselin, chairman of Montreal's executive committee, in an address yesterday handed out a strong implication that communists will stick undesirable hands into Canada's housing situation unless the governments and people generally act first.

Mr. Asselin, chairman of the housing committee of the Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities, spoke before the general election period which the Quebec Union of Municipalities, held aboard the Saguenay river ship Tadoussac.

He described the housing situation across Canada as the No. 1 domestic problem.

New \$70,000,000 Expense Bill Submitted At Ottawa

Ottawa, Sept. 29.—(P)—The Commons, with a new expense bill of more than \$70,000,000 before it, will be asked today to vote the government a new supply of money.

Finance Minister Abbott, who yesterday tabled further supplementary estimates totalling \$70,521,100, will ask the members to vote the government enough money to meet bills until the budget and the estimates of expenditure for the 1949-50 fiscal year are passed.

At the last session, members voted the government enough money to last until the end of this month. The vote carried it through the general election period which extended from April 30 to June 27, but now the fund is exhausted and more money is needed.

Neither the budget nor the estimates were passed before Parliament was dissolved for the election. Mr. Abbott told members he hopes to reintroduce the budget not later than the middle of October.

At the last session, supplementary estimates of \$55,000,000 were presented to cover expenditures arising out of Newfoundland's entry into confederation. Those estimates along with the further supplementary estimates boosted the estimated total of this year's expenditures to \$2,343,239,281.

That figure is still below the forecast made by Mr. Abbott in his budget speech, but it is expected other supplementaries will be presented.

sentenced before the fiscal year ends next March 31. In the budget speech, he estimated expenditures at \$2,390,000,000 and revenues at \$2,477,500,000 for a surplus of \$87,500,000.

In the 1948-49 fiscal year expenditures totalled \$2,193,000,000. The agriculture and works department accounted for the largest amounts in the further supplementaries. The agriculture department asked for \$17,318,064 and the works department requested \$16,701,784.

The supplementaries confirmed earlier announced government plans to advance \$4,500,000 to the CBC to help meet the initial cost of television developments in Canada.

The defence department submitted a bill for \$7,918,000 and earmarked \$3,130,390 for use on the research and development of the jet aircraft engine known as the Orenda.

A total of \$275,000 was for the National Research Council to help pay for construction of a supersonic wind tunnel, building and equipment.

Further capitals and operating expenses of the atomic energy plant at Chalk River, Ont., were set at \$375,000.

In the literary field was a vote of \$18,000 to start a national library. In the sports field was \$20,000 to help pay the cost of sending a team to the British Empire Games next year in New Zealand.

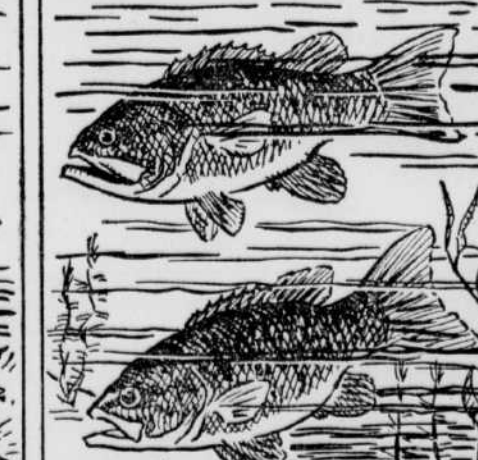

Dominion Textile To Hold Open House At Magog

Magog, Sept. 29.—Thousands of citizens of Magog and surrounding Eastern Township communities are expected to troop through the cotton mill of Dominion Textile Co. Ltd., here next week when the company holds a three-day open house for the public at large. The route laid out for visitors through the plant will give a step-by-step view of cotton manufacturing processes and will include a great deal of the new wing of the cotton mill, one of the most modern such buildings in North America, complete with air-conditioning and fluorescent lighting.

Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, October 5, 6 and 7, have been set as the dates for visiting, which is to be open to everyone excepting children under the age of 14. Machinery in the mill will be in operation throughout the visit and safety precautions demand that youngsters below this age cannot be admitted. Mornings of the three days will be devoted to school children over the 14 years limit who will be conducted through the mill in groups with teachers, and each afternoon starting at 1:30 p.m. the general public will be admitted.

Receptionists chosen from among employees will be on hand to welcome visitors and they will be grouped into parties to make the tour. Printed information on the various manufacturing processes will be provided in addition to the lecturers on hand in each department.

Long the mainstay of employment in Magog, the company regards the forthcoming open house as "an opportunity for members of the community to see for themselves Magog's biggest 'workshop' and the machinery with which so many Magog residents have so long earned their living."

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Banquet Is Held At Bishop's U.

With Dr. J. D. Jefferis as principal speaker, a banquet was held at the University of Bishop's College on Tuesday night with the purpose of introducing the new students to college life. Members of the faculty, guests, and resident and non-resident students were in attendance.

Introduced by E. Hobbs, president of the Students' Council, Principal A. R. Jewett expressed his satisfaction with the changes that have occurred in the last few years and with the many good points of the college that will always remain. He cited one instance where a student was actually overheard speaking enthusiastically about the meals served in the residence.

Doctor Jefferis described just what goes to make up a university. It certainly isn't just the buildings, he said, for these have been burned down three times. The people who run the college are of the greatest importance; those on the board of trustees and the college council, the members of the corporation, the faculty, the present and past students, and the ground staff.

Doctor Jefferis turned his attention to some of the distinctive qualities of Bishop's College. He remarked that it was the smallest residential college in Canada and compared it to an enlarged family which says its prayers and eats its meals under the same roof. Although founded by an Anglican Bishop it is not owned by the Anglican Church or clergy. Students only pay about one-third of the cost of their education, and in return the speaker asked them to keep up the good name of Bishop's wherever they went. Doctor Jefferis closed his address with a very literal translation of one of Virgil's lines: "Everybody stops talking and I can take a hint."

Mr. Hobbs thanked Doctor Jefferis on behalf of the students and with the singing of "God Save the King," the banquet came to an end.

Preliminary Hearing Of Murder Charge Against Tony Demers Opens

The Demers hearing was concluded at noon. Demers was committed for trial at the forthcoming criminal assizes.

Testimony that Tony Demers was drunk on the night before Mrs. Anita Laberge Robert of Coaticook died was given today at the opening of the preliminary hearing of a murder charge against the 31-year-old Sherbrooke hockey player.

The courtroom and corridors opened before Judge Philippe Marchand of Victoriaville. Demers is accused of slaying Mrs. Robert who died in hospital in Magog on September 16 from what the Crown contends was a beating.

Henri Monty, K.C., of Montreal, is the Crown prosecutor while Paul Etoile Brazeau of Sherbrooke is defence counsel.

The first witness called by Mr. Monty was Mrs. Loretta Williamson, 25, sister of the 32-year-old victim. She testified that she had identified the body of the victim as that of her sister, Anita.

Fernand Houle, 22, who works at the Coaticook House, said he saw Demers in the bar of the hotel at 3 p.m. on September 15 and that Demers had a "couple of drinks."

Demers returned at 4:15 p.m. with Mrs. Robert, Houle testified. He said he had seen Demers and Mrs. Robert together on previous occasions.

The witness said he again saw Demers and the victim at the hotel at 10:30 p.m. that night, this time with John Laberge, Mrs. Robert's father. He said Demers was not sober.

John Laberge, 57, testified that he had not met Demers until the day before his daughter died. He said he met him then because Anita took him out to the car which Tony was driving.

They went to the hotel, he said, and Demers went in and got three bottles of beer and a bottle of hard liquor. Laberge remained in the car and they parked on the street not far from the Laberge home.

They talked for a while and the father said he had one bottle of beer but refused the spirits. Then they returned to the hotel and went in for a while before going to the Laberge home where they talked again until Demers and his daughter went out.

The next time he saw his daughter was at the morgue.

Mr. Monty asked Laberge if his daughter was married and the witness said she was the wife of Paul Robert, chef at C.P.R. hotels in Alberta.

Asked if Anita stayed with her husband, Laberge replied that she

didn't stay at the hotels because this was expensive and lonely but that she used to meet Robert occasionally in Montreal and went out west to meet him.

In reply to further questioning, Laberge said Mrs. Robert was supposed to go out west to meet her husband on the Tuesday before she died and some of her clothes had already gone west. She delayed her departure, however, because her mother was sick. She was to have left on Sept. 16, the day she died.

Mr. Brazeau, cross-examining, asked Laberge if there had been any mention of a trip to La Malbaie.

Laberge said Demers had proposed this "and I let him talk."

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CANADA AND THE ATOM BOMB

Russia's explosion of the atom bomb should shock the complacent into the realization that Canada is one of the key nations in the defensive planning of the western world.

In Washington, where there has long been opposition to any United States sharing of atomic secrets with Canada and the United Kingdom, there is considerable evidence of a change of heart.

Senator Bourke Hickenlooper has stated that he would favor a change in the U. S. atomic energy act to allow Canadian and British scientists to be brought into the American atomic set-up.

Canadian scientists are among the world's most advanced in atomic research and their knowledge might well be used in ensuring that the west does not lose any of the gains it now holds over Russia in atomic development.

Defensively, too, Canada's position becomes more important now that there is knowledge that Russia possesses the atomic bomb. In this connection, the following comment from the Christian Science Monitor bears noting.

"Military men are by no means convinced that this (the atom bomb) is an 'absolute' weapon," the Monitor states.

"The delivery problem is a considerable one. The fear that saboteurs could carry bombs in suitcases and plant them in vital centres has been lessened by disclosures of bomb weights. So far a 10-ton truck would be required to carry each 'suitcase'."

"Delivery by plane is not nearly as simple as it sounds. The conditions that existed at Hiroshima and Nagasaki will not be duplicated where a country has radar defending aircraft. Radar fences and guided missiles may make surprise attacks difficult."

Canada is at the moment engaged in building up these radar fences. Only last week-end, Sherbrooke was officially brought into the network of defences for the city of Montreal.

The state of Canada's defences has come in for some well deserved criticism lately, the most recent being the revelation by Maj-Gen. George Peakes, V. C., in the Commons of the weakness of Pacific coast defences.

Now is the time to do something concrete about strengthening these defences and it is to be hoped that the knowledge that Russia possesses the atom bomb will be a shot in the arm to our defence chiefs and the government.

MISS RISE STEVENS

Sherbrooke music lovers rarely have been treated to a more enjoyable evening than they had on Tuesday on the occasion of the concert by Miss Rise Stevens.

Too often, big name artists fail to live up to their reputation, but in the case of Miss Stevens, her singing, her stage manner, her appearance and her program all were of the highest order.

The success of Tuesday night's concert is a feather in the cap of the Community Concerts Association. Bringing an artist of Miss Stevens calibre to Sherbrooke is an expensive proposition but the people of Sherbrooke responded by filling the Granada Theatre.

This is proof that the public will turn out for concerts if the artists merit their attendance. The Community Concerts Association is to be congratulated for its initial presentation of the year and thanked too for bringing to Sherbrooke such fine entertainment.

THAT VAGRANT HOUR

Once again we are in the midst of the annual muddle of standard and daylight saving time.

The Boundary communities are the most affected at the moment because towns on the Canadian side of the border are on daylight saving time and those on the American side are on standard time.

There is an hour's difference in time between the adjoining towns of Rock Island and Derby Line, causing no end of confusion to workers going back and forth across the line.

Quebec province towns and cities will be

on daylight saving time until the last week-end of October. Then there will be more confusion, for a number of Ontario communities will be staying on fast time until the end of November.

In the Maritime provinces Halifax is staying on fast time—other towns and cities have reverted to standard time.

All this is too confusing for most of us and it will be a great day when the powers that be can come to some firm agreement that will leave the clocks where they are or at least make the changes uniform from coast to coast.

IS HE AWAKE YET?

The new session of the United Nations General Assembly in New York got under way without the verbal storms that have come to be viewed as part of the act.

The reason was not hard to discover. A news photographer scanning the troupe of UN delegates lit on what should have been the obvious answer to veteran observers: Foreign Minister Vishinsky of Russia was fast asleep.

WHERE BOXCARS GO

During railway journeys we often have marvelled at the number of different lines whose boxcars form part of passing freight trains. We have wondered how many miles a boxcar travels and how many places it gets to. Our curiosity has been partially satisfied. A prominent railroad official tells us that the record of one American boxcar showed that in a year it crossed the continent six times, visited 27 states, traveled over 37 railroads and was on its own line only 14 days during the 12 months.

BIG HOLDINGS

How many people realize that the government of Canada is in business in a tremendously big way, the biggest wholesaler in the country? At the present time, the Dairy Products Board of the Department of Agriculture owns practically all the winter butter hoard for Canada, 66,000,000 pounds at last count, 10,000,000 pounds of powdered skim milk and several million pounds of cheese. In butter alone, there is an investment of over \$30,000,000.

All this, of course, is in support of prices and the claim is made that the government does not intend to lose money in the venture. But there are many complications to face in getting the products back to the retail trade and the ultimate consumer. Can government officials actually do the job? Experience in the past is all against it.

FABULOUS IRON WEALTH

Premier Smallwood, leader of Newfoundland's new provincial government since federation with Canada, last week described immense iron deposits in Labrador as "simply fabulous," following a three-day tour of the area. Touring the property of the Labrador Mining and Exploration Company, he was accompanied by three cabinet members of the infant province's government.

He declared that the company had spent \$7,000,000 to date and would spend \$175,000,000 on development work before any of the rich iron deposits could be mined.

Assays of the ore deposits show more than 300,000,000 tons available and large stocks remain as yet uncharted.

WHALE FACTORY

In the past, whalers from European and New England ports have come into Hudson Bay to catch these members of the dolphin family. Today Churchill has its own factory for processing the whales—the only one of its kind in Canada.

The whales may measure up to 16 feet in length and weigh 100 pounds for every foot. They are harpooned by Indians in small boats and sold to the factory. Tourists can indulge in this sport too and if they catch anything can sell it to the factory at the going price of \$1 per foot.

In the factory, the whales are stripped of their three-quarter inch thick skin and five-inch thick blubber and these are boiled in a rendering vat. The end product is a clear oil shipped by tank car to Montreal to a margarine manufacturing firm.

Lesson Hand

PROPER TECHNIQUE ELIMINATES GUESSING

The annual contract bridge teachers' convention conducted by Charles H. Goren of Philadelphia will be held at the Park Sheraton Hotel in New York City Oct. 18, 19 and 20. Teachers from all parts of the country will gather there for a course in the latest methods of teaching contract bridge.

Goren gave me today's lesson hand, which brings out the point that players who complain about guessing wrong could eliminate the guess by proper technique. We will probably never play an evening of bridge without hearing someone say, "If only I could guess them right!"—yet in the majority of cases the guesswork can be eliminated.

First, a word about the bidding. Over one spade North jumped to three spades, which is a stronger bid than four. A jump to four spades tells your partner that you cannot see any prospect of a slam, but you think there is a game in the hand. A jump to three spades tells your partner that you are sure there is a game, and you think there may be a slam. South did not bother to use the Black-

wood convention. He made a direct bid of six spades. In the play the opening lead of the three of hearts was won by declarer with the ten. Now if South could guess the diamond or club correctly, he would have no problem; but why not eliminate the guess. Take two rounds of trumps, cash the heart tricks, then cash the ace of clubs and lead the queen of clubs. It makes no difference who wins it. A diamond return will give declarer a free diamond finesse, and any other return will give him a ruff and a discard.

London, Sept. 29.—(C)—A minimum wage of £5 (\$15.50) a week for adult workers may result from the Labor government's decision to devalue the pound.

The proposal is still in the talking stage. In effect, it would be a sort of last-gasp attempt by organized labor to squeeze what solace it can out of the national emergency.

Trade unions have been long hostile to the idea of a fixed minimum rate. Those who support it now say that it is the only possible way of protecting lower-paid workers against increases in living costs which are sure to follow devaluation.

Sam Watson, chairman of the Labor party, said last week that in the present circumstances the only men who could obtain wage increases would be those in the lower income groups. Prime Minister Attlee referred in a speech at the Trades Union Congress conference to "justifiable advances" for these groups.

Sir Stafford Cripps, Chancellor of the Exchequer, on the other hand, has repeatedly said there must be no wage increases. Presumably, however, the Chancellor would have no objections to the small outlay required to bring all workers up to a £5 minimum—on the firm understanding that wage increases stopped there.

The proposal that there should be a floor below which no workers should be allowed to fall was understood to have been broached by the T.U.C. at last Monday's meeting with Sir Stafford and other government leaders. The Chancellor was said to have reacted favorably to the suggestion.

Death Claims Parish Priest At Richmond

The death occurred on Tuesday afternoon at the St. Vincent de Paul Hospital, of Rev. J. H. Coiteux, parish priest of Ste. Famille Church, Richmond.

Father Coiteux was born at Waterloo, April 13, 1889, of the marriage of Joseph Coiteux and Delencia Lamoureux. He took his classical course at St. Charles Seminary, Sherbrooke, and was ordained to the priesthood in St. Patrick's Church, Magog, in 1913, by the Most Rev. Paul Larocque, Bishop of Sherbrooke. He served as curate and later as parish priest in various parishes in the diocese of Sherbrooke, and in 1938, when His Excellency, Most Rev. P. A. Desranleau, Bishop of Sherbrooke, formed a new parish in Richmond, Father Coiteux became founder and rector of the Ste. Famille Church, where until the end of his career, he exercised a most fruitful ministry.

The local club has added six new members, an indication of the increasing interest in chess in this city.

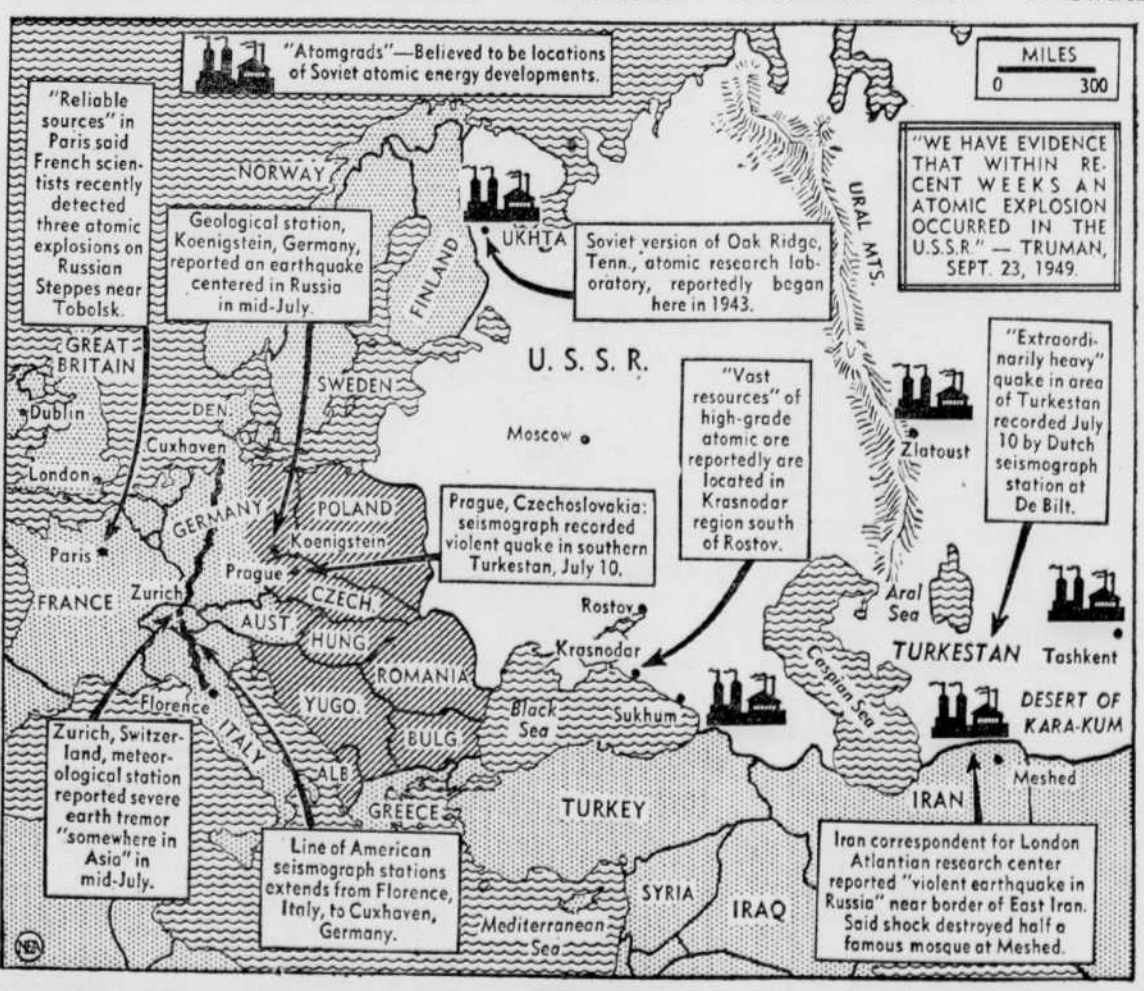
Regular monthly matches are played against the Windsor Mills club for the Eastern Townships championship.

Oil For East



A 1,150-mile pipeline is being laid from Edmonton to the Great Lakes at Superior, Wisconsin. The cost is \$90,000,000 and the purpose is to bring Alberta oil to eastern markets. From Superior, the crude oil will be transported by water to southwestern Ontario refineries. Merely to fill the pipeline will take 1,838,000 barrels, or 64,330,000 gallons, and it will take 26 days for a barrel of oil to move from Edmonton to Superior. First oil should reach Regina in the fall of 1950 and Superior in early 1951. The line is being built by Interprovincial Pipe Line Co., Ltd., a subsidiary of Imperial Oil Ltd. This Imperial Oil map shows its route.

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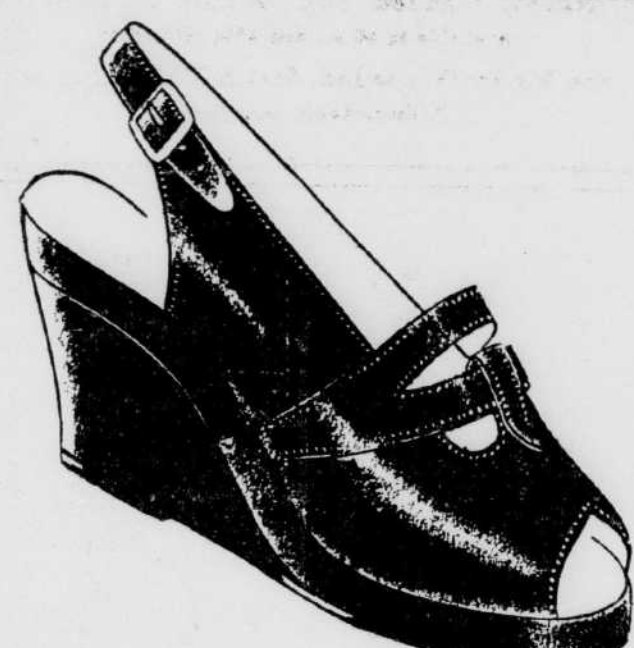

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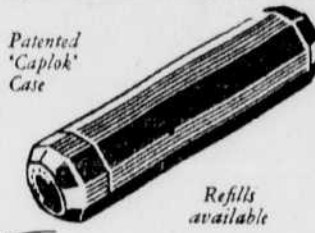

If Canadian Rugby Union officials wish to put the Grey Cup in the \$100,000 class where it belongs, the Canadian National Exhibition sports field is available.

Additional seats can be installed, on a week's notice, increasing accommodation from its present 21,000 to at least 30,000 and there's room for another 5,000 or more standing-room fans.

General Manager Elwood Hughes told the Canadian Press in an interview: "We are prepared to leave laying out of the field to football officials. If they want to move it closer to the stadium (it now is about 100 feet from the nearest paying customers) we are prepared to meet their wishes. We'll leave it up to them."

Hughes' comment to CP was the first big break in the year-old battle—since the city-owned \$3,000,000 stadium was built—concerning its adaptability to sports. Toronto sports writers and others have hammered long on the theme the field was too far from the stands.

Nothing was done about it. Hughes stood pat on statements to critics that everything was "perfect"—the field, the stadium, the view.

In C.R.U.'S Lap
The onus now is on the C.P.U. If they want the field for the Nov. 26 game—instead of the 20,000-capacity Varsity Stadium—they need only say so.
