EDITORIAL COMMENT

Why Textile Week In Valleyfield

The manufacturing of textiles in Valleyfield is not only an important segment of the Textile industry throughout Canada but is the most important provider of jobs and work for the residents of Valleyfield and vicinity. Some 2,000 people are employed by the various Textile Mills in Valleyfield at an annual payroll of about \$6,000,000.

Surely an industry of this size deserves the support of every local person who buys textiles in one form or another throughout the year.

Since 1954 the Textile Industry has had to cope with a great number of difficulties of which the competition of cheap foreign imports is the most important. In spite of this it has gone ahead to modernize and improve its production.

A typical example of this is the Montreal Cottons Ltd. which in 1958 spent some \$6,000,000 on the construction of the new Salaberry Mill and has over the years spent other millions to make its operations more and more efficient.

At the opening of the Salaberry Mill on Tuesday Oct. 14, 1958 G. B. Gordon, President of Dominion Textile Ltd., said: "It is by ventures such as the creation of this plant — the more venturesome, perhaps because times are so difficult in this industry — that we express a faith in the future and make a constructive effort to assure that future will be a successful one."

Mr. Gerard Bruchesi, M.P., who was one of the guest speakers at this occasion said in part: "You have before you today the example of an industry that is not just sitting back and protesting in the face of prolonged and severe difficulties. This kind of effort deserves the assistance any government can offer on behalf of the workers."

"We depend more and more on the Central Government, Mr. Bruchesi continued." I can tell you, as one who hears these demands in Ottawa quite often, that it is wonderful to try to help those people who try to help themselves."

Since then, programs for greater efficiency and better products have been and still are being, carried out by all textile mills in Valleyfield, in one way or another.

Commenting on the effort of the Canadian Textile Industry for greater efficiency and modernisation W. M. Berry, President of the Primary Textiles Institute, writes in an article for the annual review of the Montreal Gazette just recently published: "...However, the impetus now must come from government. The textile industry, in common with most other manufacturing, is doing everything possible to help itself, but action is required in areas of trading where only the government can act."

The industry is helping itself, the government has acted and is planning more. Our question now is: "Are we doing our part, are we doing enough to help an industry which is so vital to our own economic and social welfare?"

CANADIAN ALCOLAC LIMITED TO START PLANT CONSTRUCTION IN EARLY SPRING

TO EMPLOY BETWEEN 25 AND 50 PEOPLE

At last Friday's Press Conference Mayor Cauchon announced that the Canadian Alcolac Ltd., plant who will manufacture chemicals used in the production of detergents, will establish itself in Valleyfield on the tract of land the city is buying from the Montreal Cottons near its Salaberry plant along the CNR tracks.

The City will finalize negotiations with the Montreal Cottons on the purchase of 17 acres of land, 12 of which have been bought by the new company, in the near future.

The new plant will employ between 25 and 50 people and has been approved by the Provincial Dept. of Health.

Brault secretary, Paul Lavigne chairman of the recruiting committee, Mr. George Bouret Club captain, Mike Marchuk in charge of the Greens committee, Dick Tremaine chairman of the social committee and Walter Wilson president of the Club House.

TEXTILE WEEK
FEB. 6 - 11th

In an interview with the Press on Monday of this week the President of the company, Mr. J.E. Rivière of Montreal, stated that construction will get underway early in the spring and it is expected that in the neighbourhood of \$100,000 will be spent on buildings tanks and machinery.

M. Rivière said that the parent company of his plant is the American Alcolac Corporation of Baltimore, Maryland and that the company also has plants in France and England. Mr. Rivière said that one of the reasons Valleyfield had been chosen was the excellent location of the city transportation-wise... both to important Canadian centres as well as to the United States. Asked if his plant would be producing for domestic use or export, Mr. Rivière stated that while the Canadian market would be the companies 1st consideration it was also looking for

an export market in England. RUMORS ABOUT MORE NEW INDUSTRY CONTINUE

With the announcement of this new plant by the Mayor rumors continue to do the rounds about the Valleyfield plant of Merck and Co. as having been sold. There is even talk of the plant having been sold to an Italian company which would be manufacturing along the same lines as Merck. No comment or confirmation from city or company officials was available.

A Third, but also definitely unconfirmed report has it that important and serious negotiations are going on for the establishment of a very large plant in the Valleyfield area.

With one sure and two uncertain there is perhaps cause for some "cautious optimism."

TEXTILE WEEK IN VALLEYFIELD is being observed in conjunction with the Canadian Textile Conference which is being held in Montreal starting next week. The purpose of the Conference, at which some 1,500 delegates of the Canadian Textile Industry will get together during Feb. 7-8 and 9, is to demonstrate to the Canadian people, their governments on all levels and to the industries allied to textiles, the size, scope and economic vitality of this Canadian industry — the second largest employer of manufacturing labour in the country.

TEXTILE WEEK IN VALLEYFIELD is being held during the same period to emphasize and make this cities' citizens realize that some 2,000 of its residents work in the various Valleyfield textile mills and take home an annual payroll of \$6,000,000.00.

The largest is the **MONTREAL COTTONS LTD.** which employs some 1,600 people working with the most modern machinery available in the industry today. Its main lines of production are Cottons and Cotton Yarns.

DUPLAN DYEING CO. LTD. took over from the former Valley Dyeing and Finishing Co. in 1950 and is a wholly owned subsidiary of the Duplan Dyeing Corporation with head offices in New York. They employ a little over 100 people and their work is described as Dyers, Finishers and Coaters of synthetic fabrics. They produce among other things nylon fabrics, snow suits and outerwear jackets for men, women and children.

BEACON RIBBON MILLS LTD. is a steadily growing concern now employing some 40 people but this number is expected to double by the end of this year. Dave Henderson established the plant in Valleyfield in 1948 and has since then increased its operations ten fold. It produces decorative ribbon for industrial and consumers use, cotton tapes, motor amature winding, ribbon for the garment industry and garment boning or stiffener.

CANADIAN CONVERTERS LTD. manufacture nylon stockings and the **SPRINGDALE MILLS LTD.** specializes in lingery fabrics. Both firms have been established in Valleyfield for only 3 or 4 years but, although perhaps small in size, contribute to the steady employment market in Valleyfield's textile industry.

STYLE-QUALITY-PROGRESS is the theme of the Canadian Textile Conference in Montreal and can serve as a reminder to residents of Valleyfield and surrounding area especially, where so many families are dependent on the welfare of this local industry, that by buying **CANADIAN MADE TEXTILE GOODS** they are supporting their own industry and contributing to the security of their own jobs. 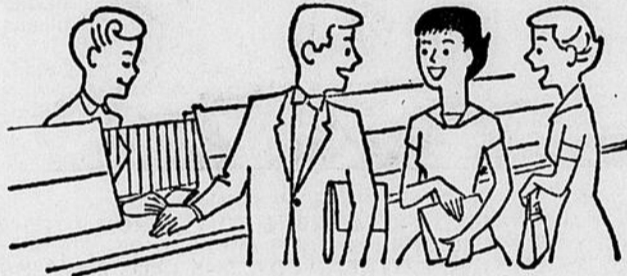

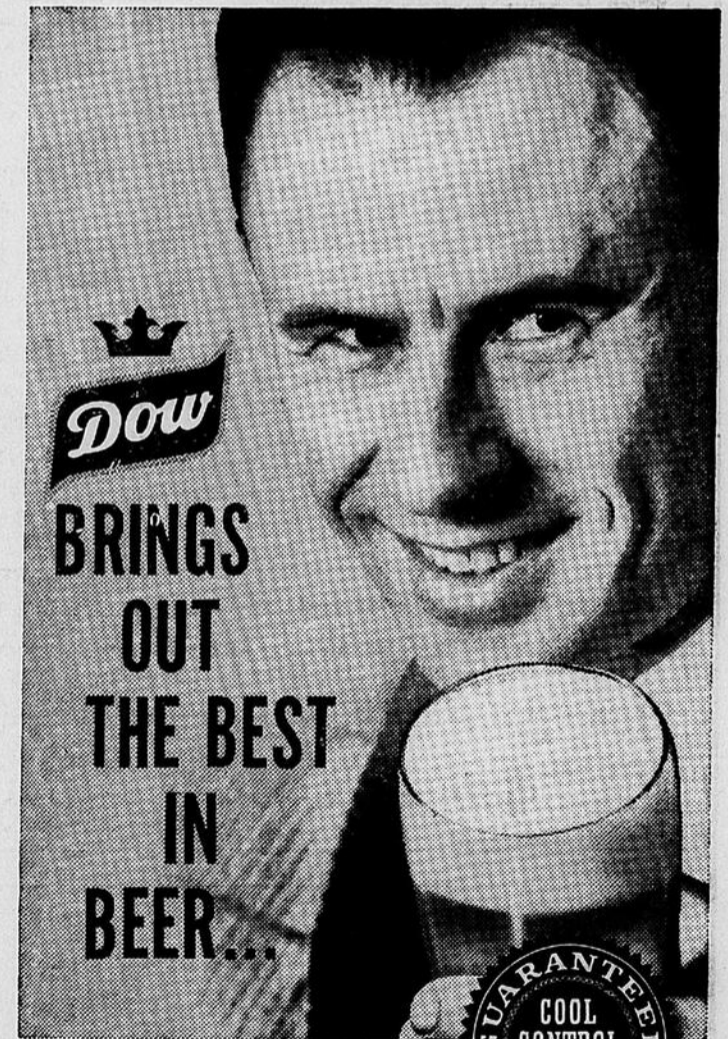

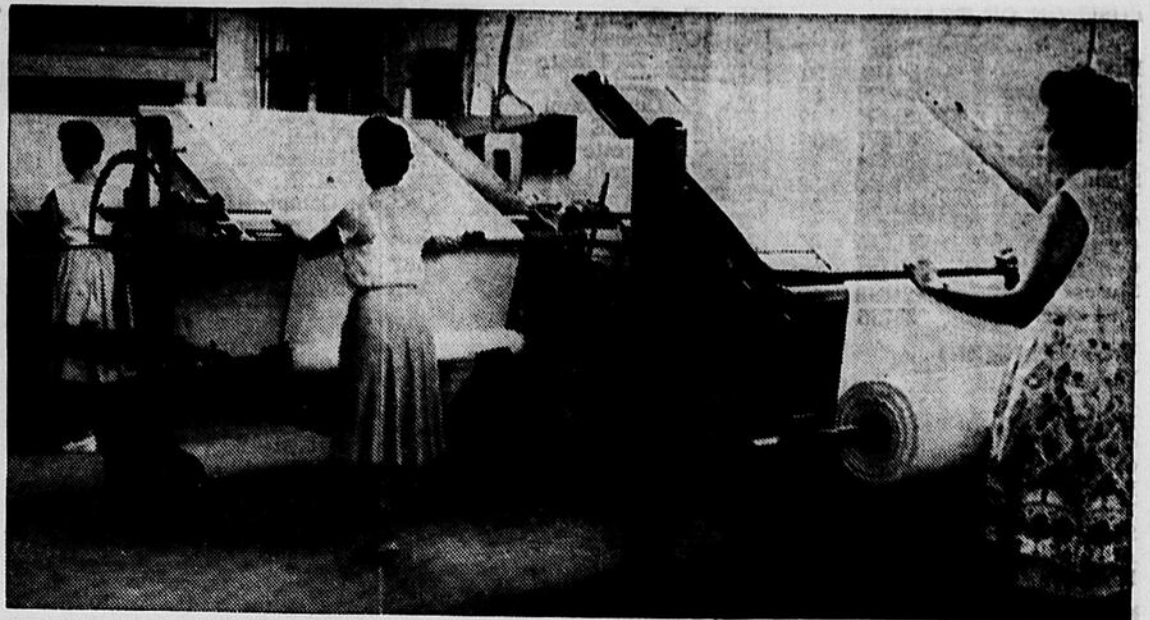

The SUN is pleased to be able to publish the winning essay of Miss Ponting which is titled: "The importance of the Textile Industry to my Community" :-

The impressive growth of Valleyfield is due, in no small part, to the textile industry. Such companies as Montreal Cottons Beacon Ribbon Mills, Duplan Dyeing Company and Canadian Converters have contributed much to our community.

The textile industry provides work for hundreds - work that is sorely needed in these times of severe unemployment. By supplying jobs, the industry also puts in circulation capital necessary for the successful operation of numerous private businesses stores and garages. Because people buy more, the number of stores increases, as does the amount and quality of merchandise. This results in a wide choice of all articles from food to furniture. There is little need to shop outside Valleyfield since most articles are easily obtainable. Consequently our city is richer. This is, as one can see, directly due to companies such as the textile mills.

Aside from the work provided by the industry for its employees, it creates jobs for many others as well. Those who drive transport trucks, engineers freight trains and captain ships benefit as do the people who load and unload these vehicles. Raw materials must be transported; finished products must be transported out and all these media are employed.

The textile industry, as any other, constantly draws new citizens to Valleyfield. These new comers swell the population of the city. This is, of course desirable. With such persons come novel ideas which better industry, community life and recreation. It is morally unhealthy to sit at the bottom of an intellectual social or industrial rut, untouched by the healthful breeze of different thoughts and convictions. While people continue to move to our community, it will remain a pleasant one in which to live, work and stay.

It is well known that many companies do much for the people of their cities. The textile industry is no exception. For example, the Montreal Cottons built streets and streets of houses for employees, as well as a club that offers such entertainments as tennis curling and lawn bowling. Every year the Cottons awards a prize to a member of the Gault Institute

graduating class to help this person to further his or her education. It is acts such as these that render an industry particularly valuable to a city. They are investing in today's youth which will be running their companies tomorrow.

In regard to the products of the textile mills, these are made in Canada by Canadian people. This is important in view of the fact that foreign products are flooding the markets. Canadian goods, while being just as well made, provide work for Canadian people and so should be

given preference. Also, the manufacture of textile products in a city by no means goes unnoticed. It gives that municipality a name - a good name if the products are of high quality; a poor name if the products are of low quality. It is significant that Valleyfield is favourably known for her textile output.

Thus, the beneficial influences of the textile industry are very much in evidence in the everyday life of our community. Without textiles, our lives would be very different.

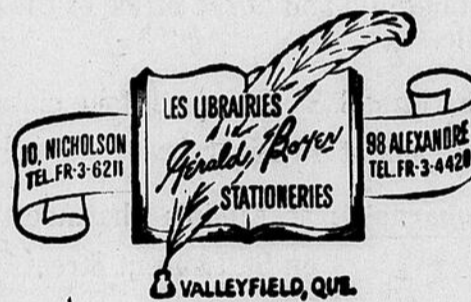

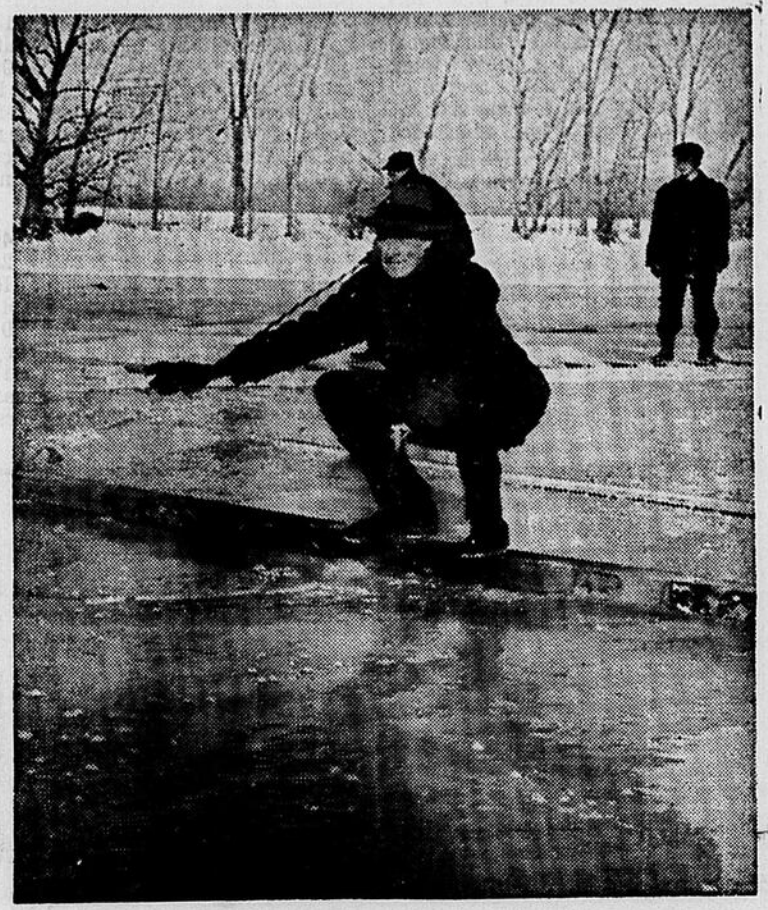

MR. WALLACE BLACK SAVES TWO FROM ICY RIVER

Mr. Wallace Black, 65, well known taxi driver of 282 Salaberry Blvd., Chateauguay last Sunday afternoon saved the lives of two Verdun citizens when he pulled them out of the freezing Chateauguay river underneath the new bridge where their car had gone through the ice. Saved were Mr. and Mrs. Johannes Blockowiak of 4615 Wellington street Verdun, respectively 31 and 21 years of age.

Mr. Black was driving along Salaberry Blvd around 4 p.m. when, as he told the SUN in an interview at the scene of the accident, "I saw these two people bobbing up and down in this big hole in the ice under the bridge. I could hardly believe my eyes."

Mr. Black jumped out of his car, grabbed the first construction ladder he could lay his hands on and used it as a bridge to reach the couple at the edge of the opening in the ice. He then managed to pull Mrs. Blockowiak on to the ladder followed by her husband. "Never have I seen two people so thoroughly frozen," Mr. Black told the SUN. With the help of bystanders Mr. Black managed to get them into his car. In the mean time the Chateauguay Police had arrived and the couple were taken to the Plaza Hotel where they were looked after by the staff until a local doctor gave them medical treatment. Mrs. Blockowiak was in an advanced stage

of pregnancy. They were later taken home by relatives. Contacted in Montreal the next day the couple was not prepared to state how the accident had happened.

According to Chateauguay policemen Sgt. 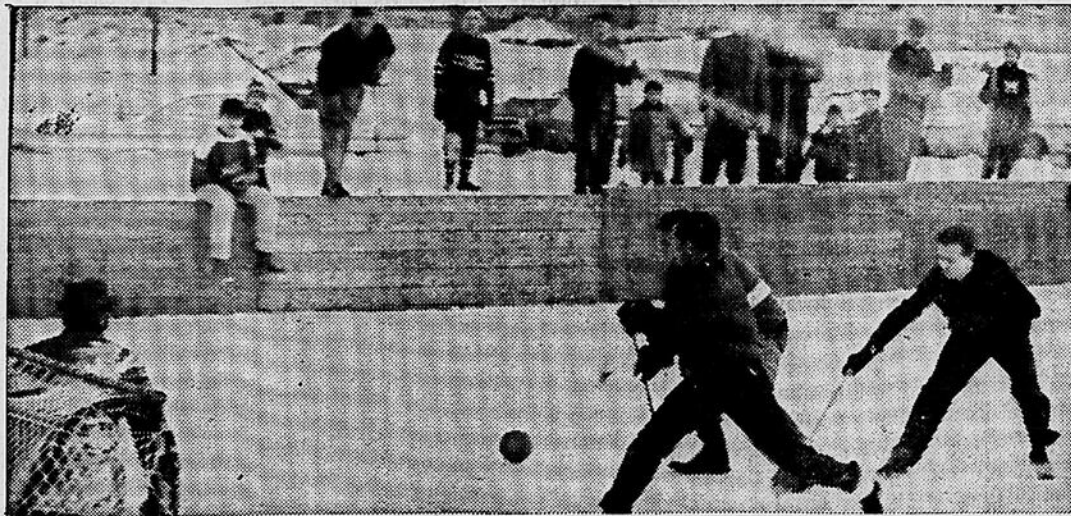

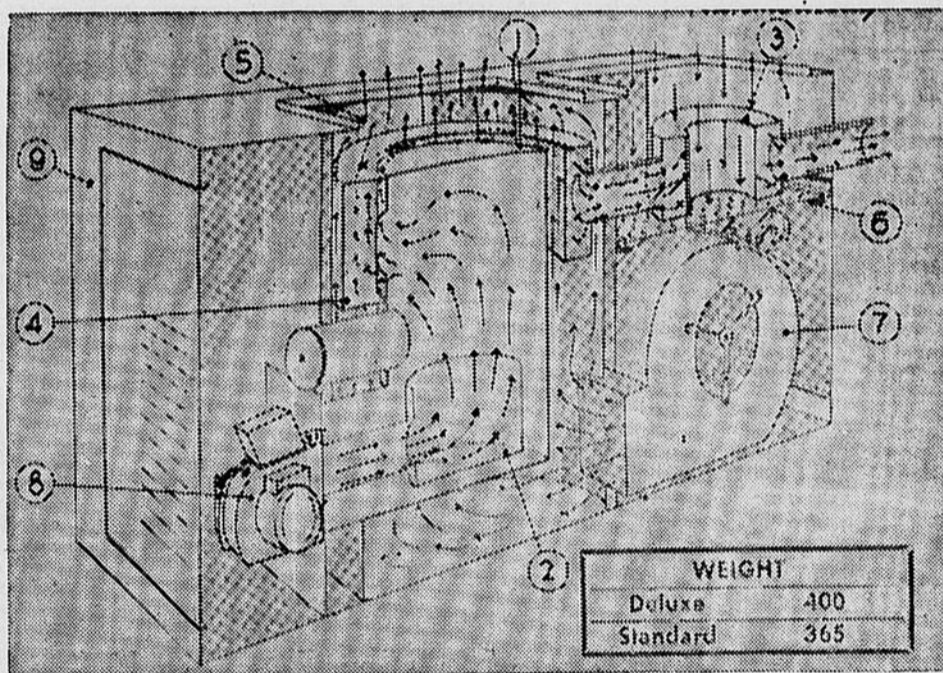
