Ousted Panama President Held In Assassination Of Chief Executive

World News In Brief

Albany, N.Y.—(AP)—Averell Harriman took office Saturday as New York's 48th governor and in his inaugural address pledged "a bold, adventurous administration" devoted to the economic and social welfare of all the people of the state. Harriman succeeded Thomas E. Dewey, and is the state's first Democratic governor in 12 years.

New Delhi—(AP)—The proprietress of a Delhi fertility clinic was hanged today as the jealous murderer of three of her employees whom she suspected of having a romantic interest in her husband. Rattan Bai Jau, 35, was the first woman ever executed in India's capital. She was convicted of giving poisoned candy to her 'teen-aged victims.'

London—(AP)—Dr. Edith Summerskill, chairman of the Labor party, left London airport Sunday night on what she termed a "one-woman mission" to Israel and the Arab countries. "What I should like to do more than anything else is somehow to help them to come to some kind of understanding," Dr. Summerskill said.

London—(AP)—Former Prime Minister Clement Attlee was 72 today. After a quiet day at home he and Mrs. Attlee planned to go out for a birthday dinner.

Ontario Education Author Dead

Toronto—(AP)—Mr. Justice John Andrew Hope, who four years ago was chairman of the royal commission on education in Ontario, died Friday of a heart attack. He was 64.

The 500,000-word Hope report was completed in 1950 after five years of work. The majority report covered 300 recommendations for changes in the educational system and advocated among other things a three-level educational system, increased provincial grants to schools and a reorganization of teacher training. Its recommendations have never been implemented.

Report Sighting Of Missing Plane

Long Beach—(AP)—The United States coast guard reported today that the plane of Diana Bixby, prominent woman flier who has been missing since Sunday, has been sighted in the Gulf of California about 150 feet from the eastern shore of Baja California, Mexico.

The meagre report, received by Mrs. Bixby's husband and relayed to the coast guard, said some boxes and cargo were seen floating but there was no sign of any survivor.

A coast guard plane and another piloted by Mrs. Bixby's husband took off before dawn for the scene from San Diego. The coast guard plane carried a diver and equipment for diving in shallow water.

Canada's Violent Death Toll Highest For Years

Canada's fatality toll for the long New Year's week-end is at least 35, the highest in years.

A year ago only nine died over the holiday when New Year's Day fell on a Friday.

A Canadian Press survey shows 15 violent deaths in Ontario from 6 p.m. Friday to midnight Sunday, seven each in Quebec and British Columbia, three in Nova Scotia, two in Alberta and one in Manitoba.

Nine died on the country's highways and streets, seven were drowned, six were burned to death, three were asphyxiated, three died in suicides and three in shootings. A knife and a beating, a skiing mishap and a skating accident killed four others.

The worst accident happened near Kenora in northern Ontario when two cars plunged through lake ice, killing six persons. The drivers mistook a turning.

At Blind River, Ont., police charged bushworker John Lecuyer.

Over 2,000 Honored By Her Majesty

London—(AP)—Queen Elizabeth has knighted the greatest living expert on the first Elizabethan Age.

The Queen, who has called for a new Elizabethan era of adventure, conferred a knighthood on Prof. John Ernest Neale, 64, the distinguished biographer of her namesake, in handing out 2,000 New Year's honors ranging from medals to peerages.

Included were an additional accolade for the Aga Khan, who already holds a dozen titles, and a knighthood for Prof. Wilfred E. Le Gros Clark, one of the three British scientists who exposed the "Piltdown Man" as a fake specimen of the ancient race.

The honors list—sixth of the young Queen's reign—covered a wide range but was generally regarded as conservative, with fewer than usual names known internationally.

Conspicuously missing, too, from major awards were headliners in the theatre and in sports. Distribution of honors in recent years to include leaders in these fields brought some doubts among the traditionalists. One sports figure was recognized. John Landy, the Australian teacher who was beaten in the British Empire Games mile at Vancouver run by England's own Dr. Roger Bannister, was made a member of the Order of the British Empire. Landy holds the world record of 3:58 for the mile.

The 77-year-old Aga Khan became a Knight Grand Cross of the Order of St. Michael and St. George in recognition of his services among Moslem communities.

A similar award went to Sir Roger Makins, 50, British ambassador in Washington. Three of Her Majesty's representatives in the Caribbean were made Knights Commander in the same order—Patrick Murin Renison, governor of British Honduras; Rt. Hon. Thomas Daniel, Earl of Rarfurly, governor of the Bahamas, and Edward Betham Beetham, governor of the Windward Islands.

Elevated to the House of Lords as barons were Sir William Fraser, 66, chairman of the Anglo-Iranian Co., Sir Arnold Gridley, 76, Conservative MP and a postwar president of the British Association of Chambers of Commerce, and Dr. E. D. Adrian, 66, one of Britain's outstanding physiologists.

Four women were named Dame Commanders of the Order of the British Empire. They were Eva Isabel Marion, Countess of Rosebery, for public services in Scotland, and three others for nursing services in the RAF—Nancy Marion Salmon, Roberta Mary Whyte and Elizabeth Cockayne.

Kiel, Germany—(AP)—A German motorship and a Russian freighter collided in Kiel canal Saturday night. Ship-owners said the 472-ton German vessel Oungsborg was ripped open and would have been submerged had not the 7,176-ton Volkov jammed her into shallow waters. No one was injured.

Panama City—(AP)—After a lightning roundup, police early today announced the arrest of Panama's former President Arnulfo Arias in connection with the slaying Sunday night of President Jose Antonio Remon, strong man of this strategic Central American republic for 10 turbulent years.

Secret police officials said they arrested more than 20 persons in pre-dawn raids aimed at catching the assassins who machine-gunned the 46-year-old Remon as he chatted with a party of friends at Juan Franco race track.

Two other persons died in the gun battle between the president's bodyguard and his assassins. Three of Remon's companions were wounded.

Police said they nabbed Arias, who was thrown out of office in 1951 by Remon's police forces after a bloody palace battle, at Boquete, 300 miles west of the capital. Arias has a large coffee plantation near there. Reports earlier in New York that Arias was travelling in Europe apparently were without foundation.

In a 3 a.m. session, the National Assembly swore in Foreign Minister Jose Ramon Guizado as president. Guizado was elected first vice-president on the ticket with Remon in 1952. Their terms had until October, 1956, to run.

The assembly had planned to declare a 30-day state of siege but was unable to do so because it lacked the necessary quorum. However, the cabinet, in a statement, announced to the shocked Panamanians that calm prevails in the country and the "government is maintaining rigorous order throughout all the national territory."

The cabinet statement gave no clue, however, to the identity of the president's killers or the reason for the plot.

There was no official confirmation of a report in New York from Panama's delegate to the United Nations, Ernest de la Ossa, that Panama police were holding a woman who had joined Remon's party at the race course and "exposed him deliberately to the assassins."

De la Ossa said he got his information in a telephone conversation with the foreign ministry. He did not name the woman but said she belonged to the "communal action headed by Arias."

News of the death of Remon, rated by many Western leaders as the ablest president Panama has had in its 52 years as a republic, brought expressions of grief from shocked leaders among Panama's neighbors. Many noted that Remon, first Panamanian president to be assassinated, died on the 24th anniversary of Panama's first successful revolutionary coup, Jan. 2, 1931.

Remon died in hospital two hours after he had been hit in the groin and liver by machine-gun bullets. Five blood transfusions failed to save him.

The other dead were identified as Jose Peralta of Panama's secret police, who was with the

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Safety Head Attacks U.S. Death Toll

Chicago—(AP)—The toll of motor vehicle accidents in the United States during the two-day New Year's week-end far outstripped the National Safety Council's estimate of 240, and it prompted Ned H. Dearborn, council president, to ask:

"What more do we need to bring us to our senses?" Traffic accidents between 6 p.m. local time Friday and midnight Sunday cost 282 lives. The council had predicted 240 deaths on American highways and streets. The number of deaths was far greater than for the only other two-day New Year week-end since the Second World War—1948-49—when the traffic death figure was 207.

During the period 27 persons died in fires and 36 in a variety of accidents for a total of 345 violent deaths. The overall total for the 1948-49 New Year week-end was 309.

While the total was still mounting Sunday, Dearborn called the slaughter a "national disaster."

"Hurricane Hazel, which swept up the east coast last fall, was a piker compared to the tidal wave of carelessness, selfishness and cold indifference that is piling up a holiday death toll on our highways which should shame any civilized nation."

Hurricane Hazel caused 118 deaths in the U.S.

Belated reports of accidents today were expected to run the total near the record figures for a three-day New Year period recorded last year—317 traffic, 40 fire deaths, 76 miscellaneous, total 433.

In a comparable non-holiday week-end in December, an Associated Press survey showed there were 225 deaths in traffic accidents, 39 in fires, 67 in miscellaneous accidents.

Bushworker Held In Ontario Death

Blind River, Ont.—(AP)—A bushworker was charged Sunday with murder in the beating death of a tiny 21-year-old woman in a shack on nearby Dean lake.

Charged is John Lecuyer, 26, who had lived with the dead woman, Helen Rivers, for five years, police said. They said the couple had been on a drinking bout Friday night in this community 60 miles east of Sault Ste. Marie. Beer and wine bottles were found among wrecked furniture in the one-room shack six miles west of here.

Police said Lecuyer phoned Dr. J. L. Pigeon of Blind River Saturday morning from the adjoining home of his employer, Lumberman James Leishman. They said Mr. Leishman was absent over New Year's and Lecuyer broke into his home.

Dr. Pigeon said when he arrived at the bushworker's shack he found the woman lying on a bed, her face beaten to a pulp and her body covered with bruises.

Johannesburg—(Reuters)—Southern Africa is suffering one of its worst outbreaks of poliomyelitis in years, with hundreds of cases listed in the Union of South Africa and the Central African Federation since early September.

Weather Is Blamed For Road Halt

Ottawa—(AP)—Poor weather during 1954 has been blamed for a lag in highway building which put road builders even farther behind in attempts to cope with the output of new automobiles.

The Canadian Good Roads Association, in a year-end statement yesterday, said it was "one of the wettest seasons on record."

Delays and postponements left most provinces with large backlogs of unfinished projects and unspent funds. A record \$470,000,000 had been budgeted for roads in 1954 by all levels of government, and while about the same amount was planned for the new year "road and street problems will not become less."

"Automobile manufacturers continued to turn out automobiles faster than the ability of road builders to cope with them," the association said.

Last year there was one motor vehicle for every four Canadians, compared with one for every eight persons in 1945. The year also saw a continuation of the steady post-war increase in miles driven by private and commercial motorists.

However, there was "a substantial increase and improvement" to the country's highway network which brought to 33 per cent the proportion of roads which are hard-surfaced.

On a dark note, the association said 1954 highway deaths probably exceeded the previous year's total of 2,906.

The road is being built under cost-sharing agreements between the federal government and nine provinces—all but Quebec. The six-year agreements, expiring in December, 1956, call for a 5,000-mile road costing \$300,000,000.

Last Friday, Works Minister Winters said 1,050 miles had been paved and another 400 graded and ready for paving in the first four years, after total expenditures of \$105,151,000. He urged a speed-up of construction.

Australian Fires Reduced By Rains

Sydney, Australia—(AP)—Light rain and cooler weather today dissipated a forest fire threat from blazes which have raged over wide areas of the states of Victoria and South Australia.

Thousands of men who had fought the fires throughout the night brought them under control around Adelaide with the aid of showers and a 20-degree temperature drop. Several other threatened towns also were reported out of danger.

The fires, which followed an early summer heat wave and drought, destroyed 54 houses, a church and two small factories, killed sheep and cattle and burned over thousands of acres of orchards and crop lands.

A 67-year-old orchard owner was believed to have died in a vain attempt to save his home.

Among the residences lost was the summer home near Adelaide of the Governor of South Australia, Sir Robert George. The Governor, his wife and members of their staff narrowly escaped the flames.

Peaceful Co-Existence On Principles Of Bethlehem Is Urged By Pope Pius

Vatican City—(Reuters)—Pope Pius today published a solemn appeal for the peaceful coexistence of all nations on the basis of "the principles of Bethlehem."

The appeal was contained in a Christmas message to the world, which the Pontiff was too ill to complete in time for Christmas and which he was still too weak today to broadcast himself.

The Pope, still seriously ill, wrote his message in Italian. Official translations were issued in other languages.

The 7,000-word text was divided into an introduction and three successive chapters entitled "Co-existence in Fear," "Co-existence in Error," and "Co-existence in Truth."

In an apparent criticism of the recent Paris pacts, the Pontiff said the accords no longer look toward extensive European unification. In the past, he had expressed approval of the European Defence Community.

But "recent accords which have opened the way to a cold peace, no longer have for a basis the ideal of a more extensive European unification. Many, in fact, believe that the governing policy is for a return to a kind of nationalistic state, closed within itself, centralizing therein its forces, unsettled in its choice of alliances and, consequently, no less perilous than that which had its time of highest development during the last century."

The Pontiff warned against a return to this type of state. "Too soon have been forgotten the enormous mass of lives sacrificed and goods extorted by this type of state, and the crushing economic and spiritual burdens imposed by it."

The real error in this was in confusing national life in the proper sense with nationalistic politics. The first was "the right and prize possession of a people."

The second was "a germ infinitely harmful." He described the nationalistic state as "the seed of rivalries and the foment of discord."

"It is clear that, if the European community were to move forward on this road, its cohesion would become, as a result, quite weakened in comparison with that of the opposing group."

Reviewing the 16 years of his reign over the Roman Catholic Church—16 years of hot and cold war—the pontiff declared: "We feel that it was the intention of Divine Providence to assign to us the particular mission of helping, by means of patient and almost exhausting toil, to lead mankind back to the paths of peace."

"At the approach of the Feast of Christmas each year, we would have ardently wished to be able to go to the cradle of the Prince of Peace and offer to him, as the gift he would cherish most, a mankind at peace and all united together as in one family."

"On the contrary, we had to experience during the first six years the indescribable bitterness of seeing nothing at all around us but peoples in arms, carried away by the mad fury of mutual destruction."

"We had hoped, and many others had hoped with us, that once the rage of hatred and revenge had finally ceased, there would very soon have dawned a period of secure peace."

"Instead, there continued that agonizing state of uneasiness and danger, which public opinion described as the 'cold war' because in reality it had little or nothing in common with the true peace and had much of the character of a truce that trembled at the slightest touch," the pontiff said.

"According to many reports, the cold war has slowly been replaced by a period of decreased tension between the opposing parties, as if they were giving each other a longer breathing space. And, not without some irony, this decreased tension has been given the name of the 'cold peace.'"

"While we willingly recognize that this does represent some progress in the laborious ripening of peace happily so called, nevertheless it is not yet a gift worthy of the mystery of Bethlehem."

"Cold peace is only a provisional calm whose duration is conditional upon the changeable sensation of fear and upon the varying calculation of present strength."

The most obvious absurdity of this cold peace based on fear was that current political practice, while dreading war as the greatest of catastrophes, at the same time put all its trust in war, as it were the only expedient subsistence and the only means of regulating international relations.

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UN Officer Holds Talk With Nehru

New Delhi—(AP)—India's Prime Minister Nehru and Dag Hammarskjold met today for the first time almost 19 hours after the United Nations secretary-general arrived here en route to Peiping.

The two men discussed Hammarskjold's trip seeking release of 11 United States airmen and other UN personnel held by the Chinese Reds.

After their morning at Nehru's office, the UN secretary-general had lunch at the prime minister's residence. Immediately after lunch, Hammarskjold was transferred to a Chinese plane for the trip to Peiping.

Neither Nehru nor Krishna Menon, head of the delegation to the last UN assembly, was on hand to meet Hammarskjold when he and his party arrived Sunday by British plane from London.

This apparent coolness by India's leader to the UN mission underlined Nehru's sharp criticism in Calcutta Saturday of Hammarskjold's trip. The prime minister told reporters there that the UN decision to send the secretary-general to Peiping was "unfortunate," and had been made in a one-sided manner.

Nehru also said he had not asked the Chinese Communists to reconsider their imprisonment of airmen and "I don't know whether or not they will."

Hammarskjold on his arrival declined to let Indian reporters draw him into a statement that his trip means the UN intends to admit Red China. He replied that his official position entitles him to talk with representatives of various countries—"members of the United Nations and non-members of the United Nations recognized by members, and nations not recognized by members."

Among those on hand to greet the UN diplomat on his arrival were Shen Chien, charge d'affaires at the Red Chinese embassy here, and Russian, American and Scandinavian diplomats.

South Korea Charges Reds Boost Northern Strength

Seoul—(AP)—South Korea's highest military leader has accused the Communists of violating the armistice by building more than 40 air bases in North Korea since the firing stopped and filling them with more than 500 aircraft, about half jet fighters and half jet bombers.

Gen. Lee Kyung Keun, chairman of the South Korean joint chiefs of staff, makes the charge in a New Year's message printed today in the English-language newspaper Korean Republic. Publication coincided with a visit here by the chairman of the United States joint chiefs of staff, Admiral Arthur Radford.

Lee also claims the Reds since the armistice have added 110,000 freshly-equipped ground troops to the Communist forces in preparation for an attack on the South, and brought in 200 Russian-built tanks and 300 heavy artillery pieces.

He also says the Reds, according to "latest report," are training a newly organized division of North Korean marines.

Lee says that besides expanding its striking power, North

Korea has signed a military pact with Russia providing for creation of 12 more North Korean army divisions.

"The enemy that was reeling at the time of armistice has now regained its strength and is now able to launch another aggressive action," says Lee.

He laments the armistice which "gave the Communists the advantage and we gained nothing from it."

"The truce was exactly what the enemy wanted. This can be fully realized when you look at the enormous enemy buildup since the truce... Their objectives are to bring their war-crimes military strength to the point where they can strike us again."

The forces in South Korea must be strengthened for this reason, and because of the "weakening of the Allied defence line in Korea as a result of massive U.S. withdrawal."

Radford said Sunday he had agreed with South Korean military leaders that U.S. strength in Korea will not be reduced below its present strength of two divisions.

Ottawa-Quebec Tax Pact Still Remote

Quebec—(AP)—French Canada's unique tax on personal income began the second year of its three-year life Jan. 1 with Prime Minister St. Laurent and Premier Duplessis still looking for a way out of the double-taxation woods.

Quebec's government is estimated during 1954 to have collected more than \$22,000,000 from the tax which has no counterpart in Canada's nine other provinces. Revenue is earmarked for education, health and social welfare.

Basing itself on the view that Quebec has a "prior" right to direct taxation under the British North American Act, Mr. Duplessis' Union Nationale government hoped the new tax would not cost Quebecers an extra penny.

The government reasoned that because Quebec has not, like the

other provinces, surrendered its direct tax rights in return for federal government subsidies, Quebecers could expect to deduct the provincial income tax in full from their federal income tax.

Mr. Duplessis' sudden thrust into the personal income tax field after a 10-year quarrel with federal authorities met a firm denial of his claims by Ottawa. Federal law fixed at five per cent the extent to which any provincial personal income tax could be deductible from federal taxes.

The Quebec tax works out at 15 per cent of the rate of federal income tax and preliminary estimates indicate the 300,000 Quebecers affected by it can expect only a \$10,000,000 kickback from Ottawa on their new \$22,000,000 tax bill.

This holds true only, of course, if Mr. St. Laurent and Mr. Duplessis do not reach a

temporary taxation agreement soon.

Talks to find a way of eliminating or reducing the double-taxation effect of the Quebec tax were begun by the two political leaders in Montreal Oct. 5 and some proposals based on a letter sent by Mr. Duplessis to Mr. St. Laurent are under study.

Quebec taxpayers do not have to file their 1954 federal or provincial income tax returns until April so government observers feel there still is a chance an agreement, if reached, could be made retroactive.

While behind-the-scenes negotiations are going on an unofficial truce between Quebec and Ottawa seems to be the rule.

Meanwhile, the Union Nationale party is overhauling its election machinery for what promises to be the busiest year, politically speaking, since the 1952 Quebec election.

By-elections this summer in

three ridings are expected to test government strength in urban areas where its support is usually weaker than in farm districts.

Voters in the Montreal ridings of Westmount-St. George and Montreal Laurier and in St. Hyacinthe, an industrial centre south of Montreal, will probably go to the polls in July, a month often picked by Mr. Duplessis for elections.

Westmont was held by a Liberal, Montreal Laurier and St. Hyacinthe by Union Nationale members. The Liberal, George Marler, resigned to become federal transport minister. The two Union Nationale members died suddenly last year.

No Quebec provincial election is expected in 1956 but 1955 nevertheless will see a series of political meetings including a tour by Mr. Duplessis of out-of-the-way points usually skipped during a busy election year.

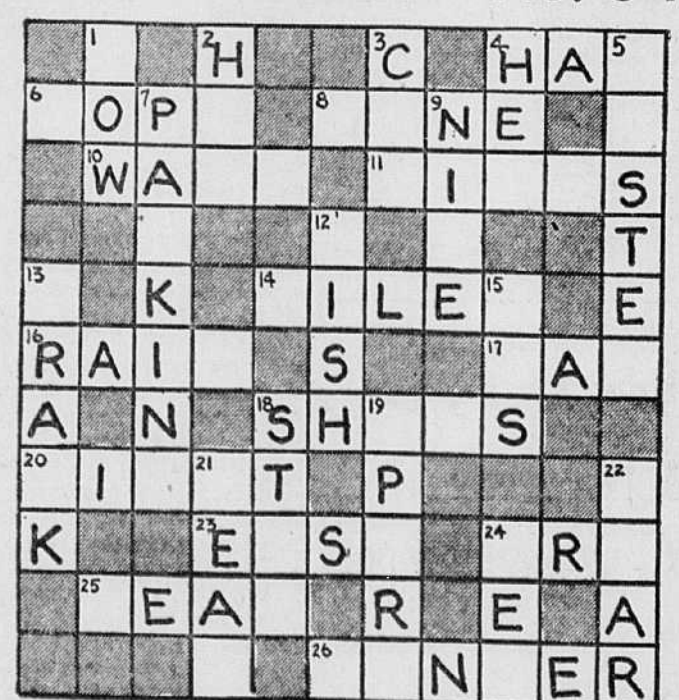

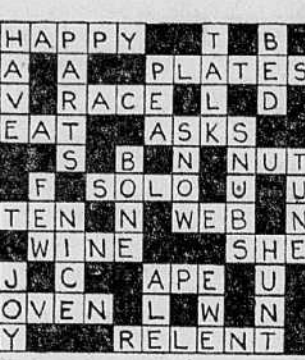

EXPLANATION OF MORE DIFFICULT CLUES:

CLUES ACROSS:

- PLATES is preferred. The phrasing of the clue suggests something of which there is a certain standard number that may prove inadequate. This favors PLATES. PLACES are simply set in any required number. It happens much more often that extra PLATES are needed than that extra PLACES are needed. PLACES are harmless in itself, but PLATES would be nearer the mark if the clue said "wielding AXES".
 - RELENT, to take a kinder attitude, is a very good answer. A man RELENTS because he has truly seen the error of his ways, not because he just happens to be in "the right frame of mind".
- CLUES DOWN:**

- HAVE is the better answer because it is the more direct and comprehensive since it is fair to say that before they can HATE doing so they must first HAVE to do so.
- PARIS is an unanswerable answer. Foreign PARTS would include foreign PARTS. Thus PARTS would embrace both words.
- TALK is the likelier answer. Your eye may be sitting around and you might not be in the position to notice especially how they WALK. They're pretty sure to TALK, however.
- SNOW gives the better link as the clue particularly specifies Christmas. SHOW would be applicable at any time of the year.
- SNUGS is clearly a good answer. If people happen to be SNUGS, it doesn't mean that they are incapable of being only two at a party.
- BONE is the better. You speak of NONE left when referring to things of which there are NUMBERS, such as bags of candies, packages of cigarettes, etc. Of ONE OBJECT you would say there was "NOTHING left", that is, if it were reduced to nothing. In the case of the leg of the turkey the BONE would be left.
- TUNE matches up more directly with the clue word "DANCING". The question of TONE arises more in connection with listening for the pleasure of listening. For dancing, you just want a suitable TUNE.
- You may certainly find FEW suggestions helpful. "A NEW SUGGESTION" simply means a suggestion made for the first time. This certainly does not necessarily imply a suggestion of a NEW PRESENT or, as the clue specifies, an "original" present. Thus FEW is much more likely to fit more actual cases than NEW.
- NICE presents may well delight a child, whether they happen to be two in number or twenty-two; that is, there is no particular point in specifying NINE as against any other number.
- JOY is the more satisfying and direct answer. It is not the TOY which "causes his face to light up" but the JOY OF GETTING the TOY.

One Killed, Several Injured From Holiday Mishaps In Sherbrooke Area

The New Year's holiday brought death to one district resident, hospitalizing three others and causing several other minor accidents in Sherbrooke and district.

Leslie Brown Richardson of Bulwer was tearing down a shed in Bulwer when the roof collapsed on him causing serious head injuries. Brought to Sherbrooke Hospital about one o'clock Friday afternoon he was given X-rays and emergency treatment for head injuries but died two hours later.

Mr. Richardson was 35 at the time of his death, the husband of the former Roberta Laberee. Prayers will be held at his residence in Bulwer on Tuesday at 1:45 p.m. followed by funeral services at Bulwer United Church and burial in Eaton Cemetery.

Alphonse Omer Bisson, 49, of 80 London street, Sherbrooke, was taken to Hotel Dieu Hospital shortly after midnight New Year's morning as the result of a car accident on the King west bridge. Mr. Bisson was driving

his car along King west when he hit ice and ran into the side of the bridge. He received serious cuts on his lips, nose, and left hand as well as bruises about the face and head.

He was accompanied in the car by his son, Andre, 16, who is in hospital suffering from contusions of the left leg and possible fractured ribs. Both are still in hospital. Approximately \$300 damage was done to the car.

A 73-year-old Magog man is also on the list of New Year's injuries. Ovila Leduc, of 303 Sherbrooke street, Magog, was crossing the street near his home early New Year's morning on his way to Mass when he slipped and fell, breaking his left hip. He was brought to Hotel Dieu for treatment.

Mrs. Albert Jubert, 75, of 154 10th avenue, Sherbrooke, was brought into Hotel Dieu Hospital for first aid after being hit by a car near the Capitol Theatre shortly after six o'clock last night. She was able to return home after treatment.

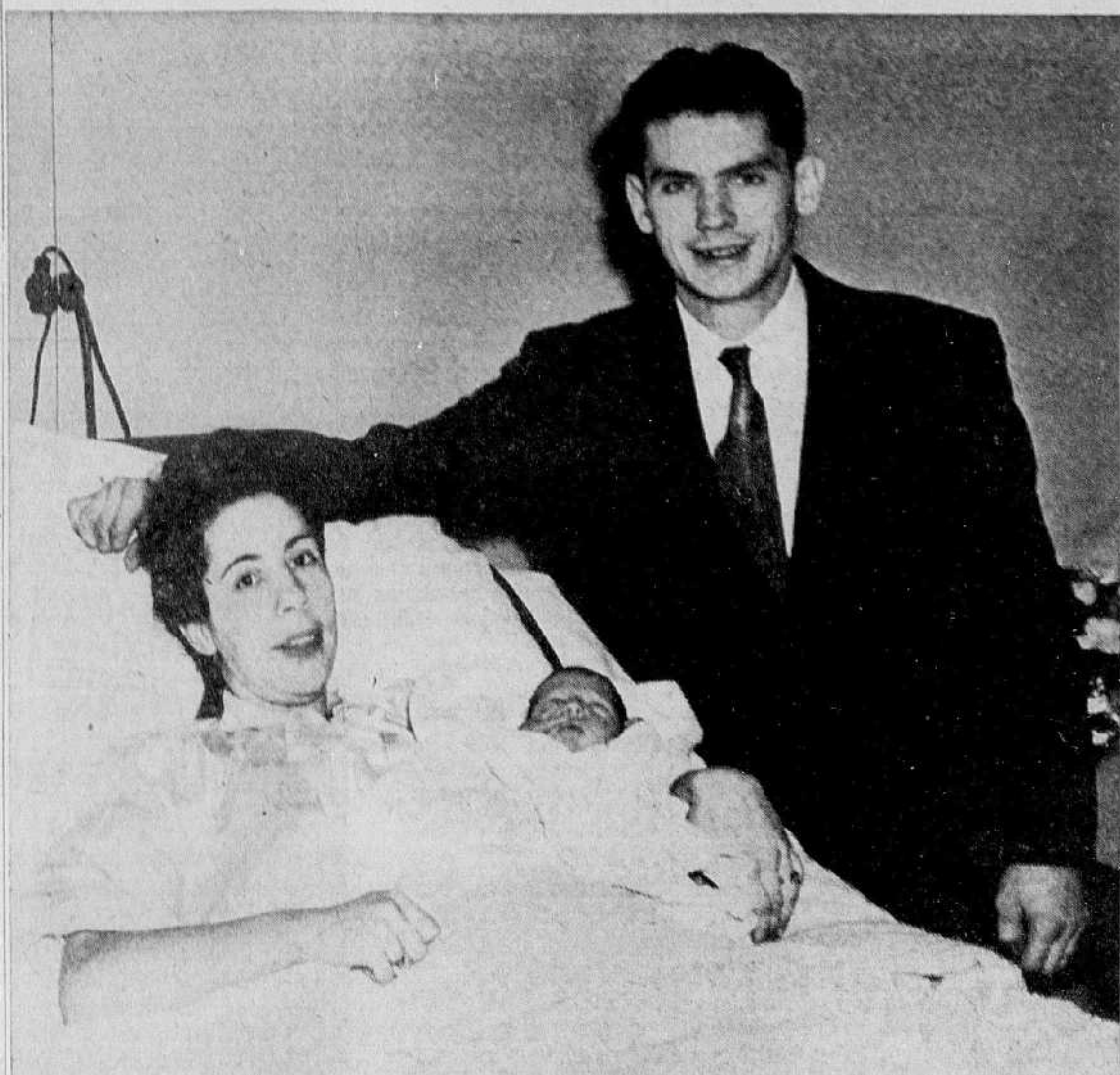

Revision Board Orders City Council To Hear School Commission Protest

Official confirmation came today of a story carried in the Record of December 16 last in which it was stated that the Board of Revision had rejected the protest of the Roman Catholic School Commission against the new machinery valuation roll. In a lengthy judgment handed down by the three members of the Board of Revision, Judge Richard Crepeau, chairman, Andre Royer and J. A. Bernier, they formally rejected the protest, saying that it should be heard by the City Council.

The Board of Revision held two meetings, one on December 9 and the other on December 15, and at these meetings they discussed two important points which had a bearing on their final decision. First was the question of whether the School Board has the right to protest the valuation roll in its entirety and the other point was if the answer to the first question was yes, then who was to hear the protest, the Board of Revision or the City Council? On December 16 a decision was rendered on the first question and the Board said that the School Commission could protest the entire roll. The answer to the second question was left open pending further discussion of the matter.

Final Rites Of Miss M. Barnaby At St. Patrick's

The funeral of Miss Mary Barnaby, whose death occurred in Montreal, on December 26, was held on Wednesday morning in St. Patrick's Church, Sherbrooke.

Very Rev. Monsignor J. R. Moisan, c.s., received the body at the door and officiated at the Requiem Mass, with Rev. Olivier Gamache and Rev. Raoul Couture, acting as deacon and subdeacon.

Miss Barnaby is survived by a sister, Miss Addie Barnaby, of Montreal, a brother, Mr. Fred Barnaby, a sister-in-law, Mrs. Fred Barnaby and niece, Miss Barnaby, of Ontario. She was predeceased by two sisters, Miss Olive Barnaby and Mrs. Walter Hunting.

The deceased was a member of St. Patrick's Church, here, until three years ago, when she left to take up residence with her sister, in Montreal. At that time she retired from her position at the New Sherbrooke Hotel, where she had been employed further discussion of the matter.

The reasons for saying that the Roman Catholic School Commission could protest such a roll were based on a Court decision in a similar case at Magog in which the court said that the Roman Catholic Commission could not legally protest the valuation roll. But in the charter of the Sherbrooke Roman Catholic Commission they were granted special permission on February 18 of last year from the Provincial Legislature to protest, if necessary the entire roll. Thus the protest of the Sherbrooke Commission was made on the basis of that special clause in their charter and the Board of Revision therefore are in their rights when they say the protest is legal.

The answer to the point of whether the protest should be heard by the Board of Revision or by the City Council is contingent on the first question. The Board of Revision decided that the protest is legal by virtue of the special clause in the charter of the Sherbrooke School Commission. If there had been no special clause then the protest itself would not have been legal and the Board of Revision would have dealt with that matter itself.

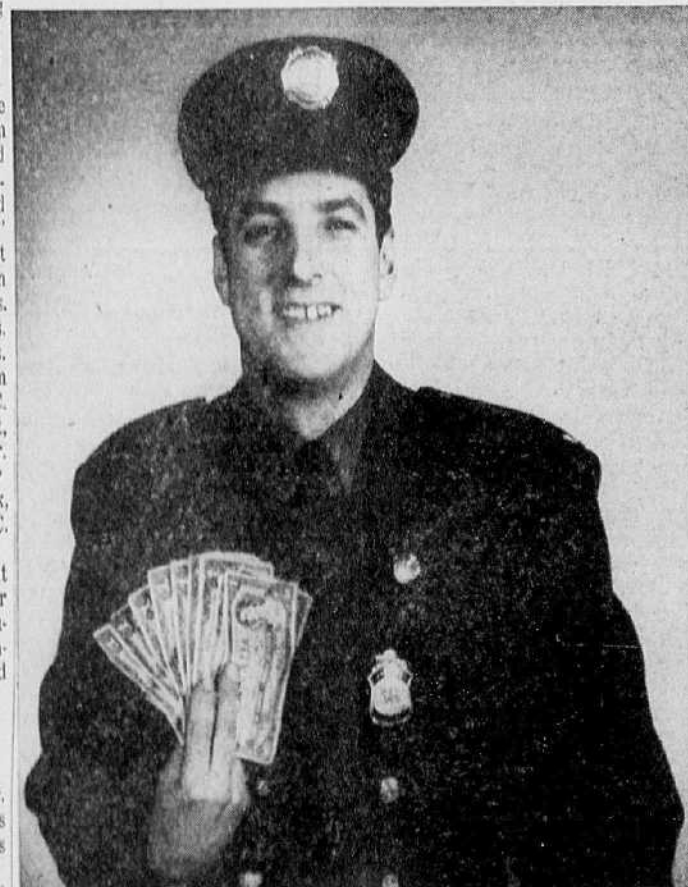
It is expected that the judgment of the Board of Revision will be discussed tonight by the City Council. When this body, in turn, renders its decision the Roman Catholic School Board, if not satisfied, may take the case before the Magistrate's Court within 30 days.

A Boy Of Ten Steals

A father and mother are worried. They have three children, a girl of twelve, a boy of ten, a girl of four. It is the boy who is causing the worry. He is stealing.

The father has a collection of silver dollars. It has shrunk lately and the boy has appeared at stores with silver dollars in his hand. He has admitted taking money from his small sister's bank. He comes home sometimes with articles "given" to him and his parents wonder.

The father and mother are honest, considerate, helpful in their everyday dealings without making a parade of these qualities. One might have to go the proverbial long day's march before meeting better people.

They have tried gently to bring home to the youngster the moral offence and its possible consequences both to his character and his prospects. They have sought to appeal both to his heart and his head. They are getting somewhere but the worry is still there.

There are few things more natural than for a child to steal. In many cases he, or she, comes to realize the value of money long before the moral side develops. The failing is common; it might be a solace to some parents if they could know just how common. Parents are naturally far from being proud when they discover stealing and, like adult vices and peccadilloes, it is generally hushed up.

A small boy, as one instance, stole seventy-five cents from his grand-

father's cashbox. He wanted to buy a pen-knife. He took two dollars from his mother's purse. His parents were quite able and willing to buy him fire-crackers, Roman wheels and rockets but he wanted to buy his own. He was only five or six but to some these acts would look far from promising. Like most children he grew out of it.

All of us are acquisitive. If we weren't the race, obviously, would long since have become extinct. We seek to temper this acquisitiveness for our own sake and for the sake of others. The fight becomes a little easier when we begin to realize something of the greater gain.

Few children can be expected to realize this greater gain. It may take years.

It is frequently a good thing in the long run that children do steal. It is better that the failing should come out and be tackled when the mind is still at its most plastic rather than lie dormant to give more serious trouble in later years. And parents, in most cases, need not worry too much but may, instead, be grateful they are still around to give guidance.

Forbidden fruit — (who does not know it?) — has always been tempting to adults as well as the young. When the day comes when all children have ceased to steal the race will no longer need motor-cars or planes but will need vents in clothing for wings.

A Far More Useful Machine

It used to take a war to make old newspapers valuable. In peacetime they were scorned and like Private Tommy Atkins got less than their deserts. Now, this is on the way to being changed.

A South Portland, Maine, concern has developed a machine to turn newspaper into "high-value containers." The machine cooks newsprint into a thick soup which no one claims is an edible soup, then dries it to a pulp — instead of beating it to a pulp as some have felt like doing to the latest edition. The pulp is then squeezed into a variety of shapes.

We hate to think what would happen if one of these containers were invested suddenly, like Balaam's donkey, with the gift of speech. President Eisenhower might come out as blaming Marilyn Monroe on a

bushy-haired intruder. Mr. Malenkov might say one should take the Rev. Frank Buchman and "bake for thirty minutes, uncovered." The Rocket might be skating on the sands of Hawaii as he stabbed his wife, robbed the Old Brewery Mission and announced a spending program of two hamburgers and a cup of coffee on the mental hospitals of the province since the time of Nero and Lou Costello.

But stop. Things are mad enough, bad enough as they are without having newspaper corpses, transformed into containers, speak. What we would like to see is a device which would turn old newspapers into up-to-the-minute newspapers, complete with editorials, with a paycheck pinned to each newspaperman's copy. That really WOULD be useful.

Notes

A little prophecy: The Studebaker-Packard Corporation, under the aegis of some of the best executive brains in the United States, will gradually begin to make a perceptible inroad into the sales of the big Three. Under Paul Hoffman Studebaker showed, despite its relatively small percentage of the auto market, that it was far from being a dying duck. Both Studebaker and Packard, with its traditionally fine motor, made large contributions to defense in the last war. . . . Under James J. Nance the merged companies are expanding facilities and have optimistic plans.

London's 1955 styles for men, as revealed by Tailor and Cutter, will spotlight masculine legs. Pockets will be shorter and trouser cuffs will be discouraged, the purpose to expose as much of men's legs as possible, and to make them look long and slim. Since Christmas Dior has brought about feminine slimming in a higher

region it seems only fair that men should have their innings.

An ungrammatical but a sensible gunman, sensible, that is, on second thought, handed back two dollars to an hotel clerk he held up in Omaha recently. "It ain't worth it," he decided after Jack C. Walker, the clerk, had opened the cash register to show only two one-dollar bills. A good many men now in prison must wish that they had had the same foresight especially when greeted by small takings.

The American government plans the permanent stationing of trained skeleton forces in some 35 secret headquarters outside Washington with a view to meeting "the emergency" which may come and which is the subject of increasing United States' forethought. Wonder how Ottawa plans to meet the same event?

Ontario New Source Of Pulpwood

Toronto — (C) — Southwestern and central Ontario, long ago stripped by pioneering farmers of most of its natural forest cover, now finds itself in an accustomed role as a source of pulpwood for newsprint.
Two factors are responsible: 1. Reforestation of poorer land with pine carried on since the 1920s by government and public authorities as well as private farmers; 2. Development of techniques which make it possible to use jackpine, red and Scotch pine in making newsprint — once almost wholly a spruce and balsam product.
The development is all the more unusual since in most of the area the natural forests, as preserved in farm woodlots, are of hardwood such as maple, oak, hickory, elm and ash.
So far the pulpwood business hasn't made much of an impression on the area's wealthy mixed farming and industrial economy. The pine pulpwood harvest now

Housing No. 1 Weapon Against Communism

Frankfurt, West Germany — (C) — Dr. Walter Kolb, mayor of Frankfurt, pointed with pride to new buildings springing up among the bomb-scarred ruins of his ancient city and said: "Housing is our No. 1 weapon against the Communists."

In Frankfurt, as in other parts of West Germany, the cumulative effects of war damage, a 21-percent increase in population and lack of building immediately after the war created the greatest demand for shelter in history. An estimated 6,000,000 dwelling units were needed in West Germany to prevent misery, prime hunting ground for communism.

"Before the war we had 177,000 apartments," said Dr. Kolb. "The war left only 40,000 intact. We have worked hard for nine years, and more than 100,000 apartments have been rebuilt here. Still more are needed. Our population has grown from 500,000 to 600,000."

The mayor said people had come from all over Europe to see the reconstruction of Frankfurt, again a bustling city with

gleaming new offices, banks and well-filled shops.
Some had termed the rebuilding a small miracle.
A group of newspaper men touring the Frankfurt area noted an air of well-being in the city. Trailer trucks laden with merchandise rumble along the autobahn to and from the city and around big, new modern-style factory buildings.

New roads and cloverleaf turns dot the countryside.

Large U. S. military establishments are located here and in shops and beer halls it is evident that many U. S. dollars help spark the city's economy.

A survivor of four concentration camps where he was imprisoned for free speaking, Dr. Kolb said:

"Our only desire is peaceful co-operation with all nations and freedom within our country."

runs about 10,000 cords a year, at a price of \$10 a cord laid down at the roadside. Foresters think that by 1970 the yield may reach 30,000 cords a year.

If newsprint makers are successful in present experiments aimed at using all sorts of hardwood as well as pine, potential supply will be far greater. One forester thinks it might reach 2,000,000 cords.

Pulpwood now being purchased is thinnings from pine plantations. Buyer is the Ontario Paper Company. Its mill at Thorold, near St. Catharines, is the only one in the area. It uses 290,000 cords a year, most from northern Ontario forests.

Ontario Paper began testing plantation thinnings for paper making in 1948 when it purchased 1,000 cords from the Ontario department of lands and forests, first truck-delivered wood used in the mill which was built in 1913. Its northern wood comes by water.

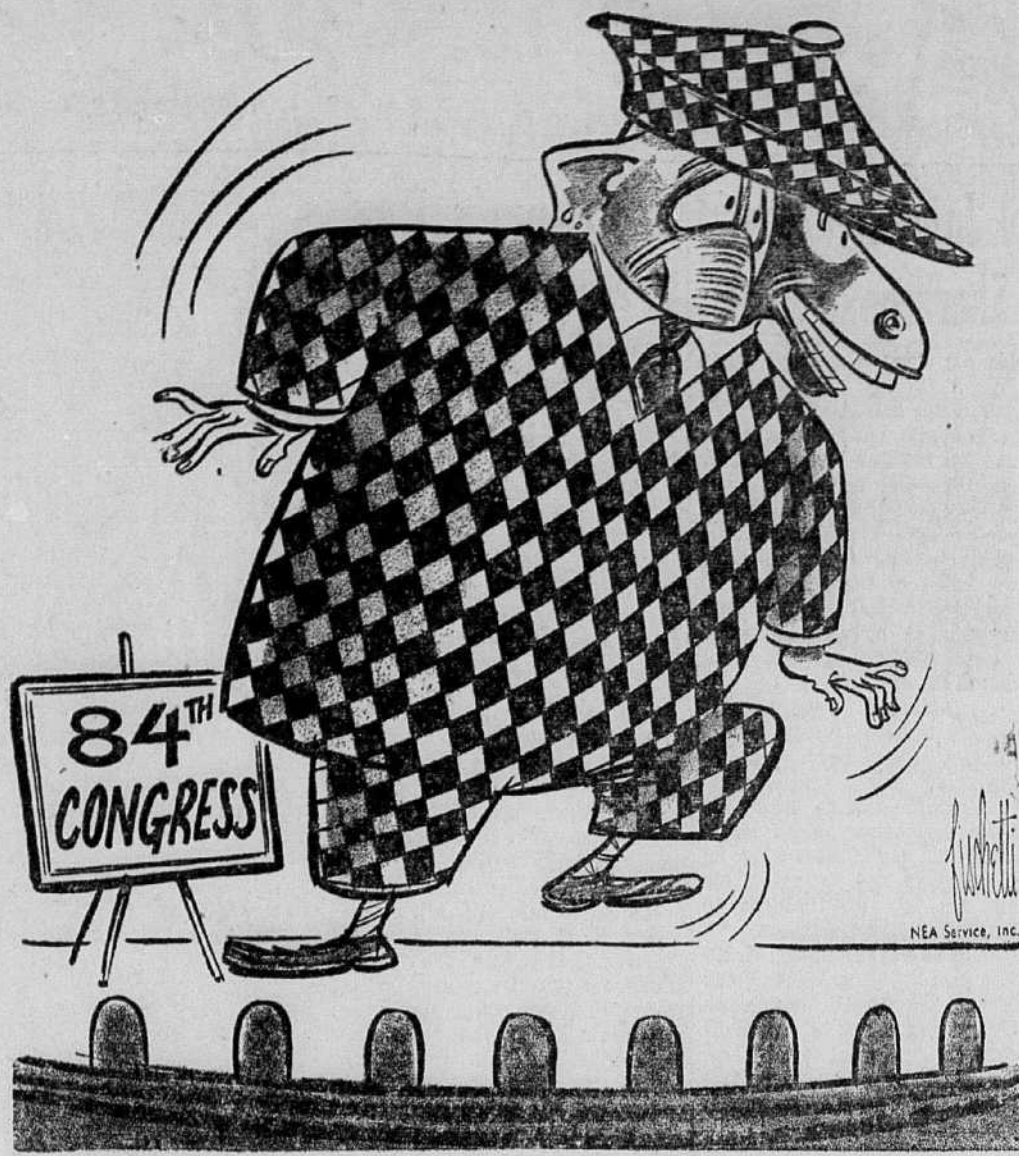
By 1954, use of wood from the southern part of the province rose to 10,000 cords, all brought to the mill by truck.
Much came from Norfolk county, Ontario's sandy tobacco country north of Lake Erie, one of the first sections of the province to get into extensive tree planting. It started there 25 years or more ago to stop the light soil from blowing away.

The trees remainder despite spread of tobacco farming which yields crops worth up to \$65,000,000 or so annually. The trees were set out four feet apart. Now they are crowding each other so closely that thinning is necessary for future growth.

Experience of government foresters with a plantation in the Lake Simcoe country north of Toronto indicates the possibilities in tree cropping. The yield on one government plot is two cords an acre annually. Foresters say this yield is high and that half a cord an acre is the more probable average for the first 35 years and one-third of a cord after that.

Officials say there are 75,000 to 100,000 acres of pine plantations in the southwestern and central sections of the province. Many are young and have not yet started to yield a pulpwood crop.
Thinning is supervised by government foresters with the aim of promoting future growth. It is anticipated that by 1970 older plantations will yield pine timber as well as pulpwood.

And Away We Go!



Dublin's Abbey Theatre Is Only 50 Years Old

Dublin (C) — Dublin's Abbey Theatre is having an anniversary this month, and many are surprised to learn that it is only 50 years old.

It has no building of its own any more. The mildewed old structure in Abbey street, a

former city morgue, burned in 1951. Many thought that from an architectural viewpoint it was good riddance.

But the spirit of the Abbey theatre marches on. The organization makes the most of a little subsidy. And Dec. 27 a company of intense and dedicated players who have found a home in the Queen's Theatre in Pearse street will produce Lady Augusta Gregory's "Spreading the News" and poet William Butler Yeats' "On Baile's Strand." These are the plays with which the Abbey Theatre got started in 1904.

To youngsters the Abbey Theatre seems as old and as authentically Irish as the blarney stone. But it is expected that at the anniversary performances there will be many in the audience who were present at its first night.

It has been an eventful 50 years for the Abbey Theatre. In the record are great artistic triumphs, flops, displays of Irish temperament and incidents which seemed to be of hot political rather than theatrical significance.

Probably no modern theatre has had to ask oftener for police protection, or figured in more violent discussions.

The Abbey Theatre was founded by dreamers, poets, idealists, great Irish patriots and scholars. The scholars were determined to preserve the Irish language, and to nurture the special kind of

culture that oozes from Irish soil.

Yeats was inclined to be a dreamy mystic, and everything he touched or sponsored in the years when his influence was strong was full of symbolism, which Irish audiences found charming even if they did not understand everything properly. But in later years the theatre came under the influence of a group known as the "Cork realists." They made it a popular playhouse, portraying comedy and tragedy of everyday life, whenever possible in the Irish language.

But it was always experimental, bringing in many foreign plays which seemed to plow new ground.

In its time the Abbey Theatre had a lot of fun with George Bernard Shaw. In 1909 the censors of England would not permit the production of Shaw's "The Shewing-Up of Blanco Posnet." The Abbey Theatre, which wasn't bothered by censorship, put it on and made insular London critics scurry across the Irish sea to keep up to date.

In its earlier days the Abbey Theatre delighted in pin-pricking the English. For a time its charter forbade the production of English plays that had not reached the stature of classics. Irish nationalists rallied strongly to its support when it refused to close its doors in token of mourning in the death of King Edward VII. The lapse, it developed later, was due to a misunderstanding, but the incident established it thoroughly as an Irish institution of great independence.

The old Theatre building was given to the company by Miss A. E. F. Horniman, a friend of Yeats. It had to fight for a crown patent, the licence needed by a theatre. The document provided that the Abbey must not have more than 562 seats, must not sell liquor or produce modern English plays. The restrictions have been modified. It

for government, have begun to ask themselves sincerely whether

these people had returned to considering the problem of peace and war as involving a higher and Christian responsibility before God and the moral law.

"Once the problem is elevated to this higher plane, which alone is worthy of rational creatures,

there again clearly appears the absurdity of that doctrine which has held sway in the political schools of the last few decades: Namely, that war is one of the many admissible forms of political action—the necessary, and as it were natural, outcome of irreconcilable disputes between two countries, and that war therefore is a fact bearing no relation to any kind of moral responsibility."

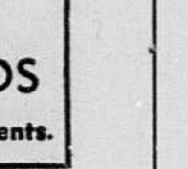
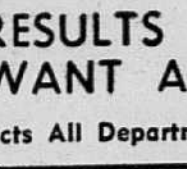

RALPH L. STANDISH, OF WAY'S MILLS

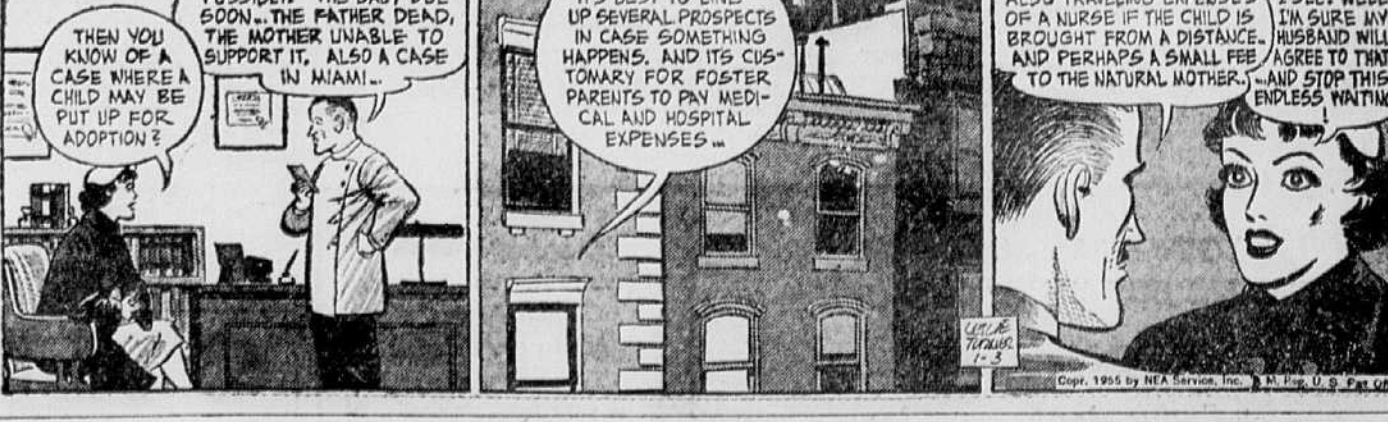

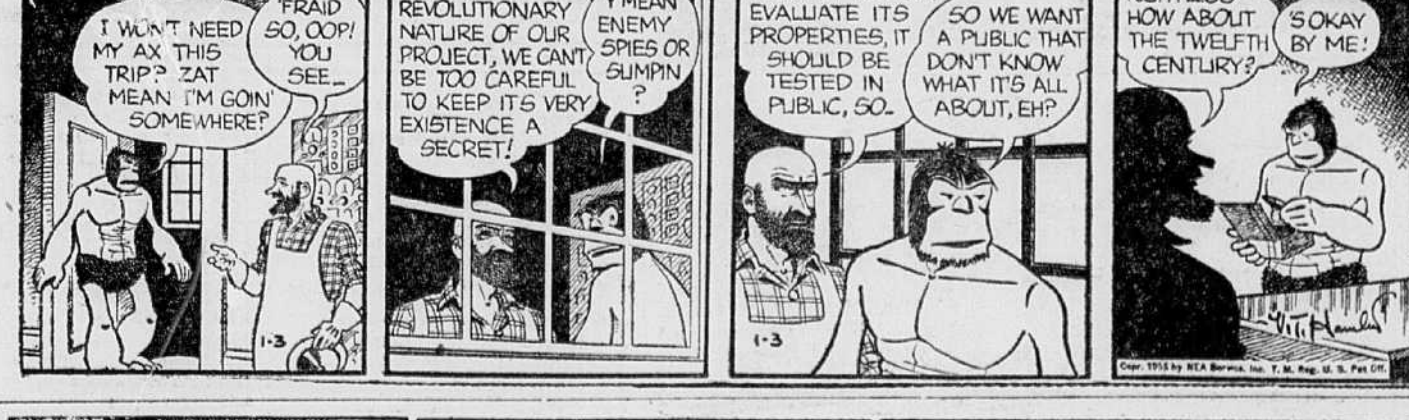

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Ohio State Punches Southern Cal Into Submission 20-7

In Wettest And Muddiest Tilt In History Of Rose Bowl; Only 89,191 On Hand For Game; 12,000 Stay Home

By BOB MYERS

Pasadena, Calif. — (AP) — Ohio State University's champion football team from the Big Ten hammered and punched Southern California into surrender, 20-7, in the Rose Bowl Saturday in the wettest and muddiest game here in 21 years.

Wringing out the eighth Big Ten triumph in nine games with the Pacific coast conference since their pact began in 1947, Ohio State's running backs blasted out two touchdowns in the second period, both stemming from Trojan fumbles, and scored again in the final quarter.

Rain began early in the day and continued throughout the game, but 89,191 fans turned out for the 41st game in this, the oldest of post-season games.

An estimated 12,000 fans proved too timid to brave the elements despite their paid-for tickets. The biggest thrill of the game came on a record return of a punt for a touchdown by Southern Cal's halfback star, Aramis Dandoy.

Dandoy twisted and pivoted 86 yards for the six points, and little Sam Tsagalakis added the extra point.

The Buckeyes delivered the final punch in the fourth quarter, marching 77 yards in 12 plays for the touchdown that dethroned the Trojans.

Perfect Season
Thus ended a perfect season of 10 straight victories for the pride of Columbus, the mythical national champion college team of 1954 as voted in The Associated Press

poll. The Buckeyes' starting backfield—quarterback Dave Leggett, halfbacks Howie (Hopalong) Cassidy and Bobby Watkins and fullback Hubert Bobo—proved too much for USC.

501,847 Fans Attend 13 Bowl Games Over Week-End; Issue Fails To Rate Ohio State As National Champions

The argument over whether Ohio State's unbeaten Buckeyes rated the national football championship over undefeated UCLA is about the only issue the Jan. 1 bowl games failed to decide.

None of the major post-season gridiron classics produced a real surprise, although Navy, victorious 21-0 over Mississippi in the Sugar Bowl, has relinquished the favorite's role after injuries and illness sidelined several first-string players.

Supporters of UCLA, who finished a close second to the Buckeyes in the final Associated Press poll, had hoped Southern California would down Ohio state in the Rose Bowl. Then they would have been in a position today to gloat over those who voted for Ohio State.

PLAYED IN THE RAIN
But the Big Ten conference champions went out to prove that they rated the No. 1 spot.

True, they defeated USC by only 20-7 compared with UCLA's 34-0 romp during the regular season, but rain during Saturday's game was not conducive to high scoring. Duke was the favorite to whip Nebraska, Big Seven conference runner-up, in the Orange Bowl and the Blue Devils came through with ease 34-7. And in the Cotton Bowl Georgia Tech was the choice to knock off 10th-ranked Arkansas. This the Engineers did 14-6.

The other major New Year's Day game produced a 13-12 victory for the Eastern All-Stars against the West in the Shrine Game at San Francisco.

The bowl competition started Friday with favored Auburn downing Baylor 33-13 in the Gator Bowl.

More than a half-million fans — 501,847 to be exact — turned out for 13 games played between Friday and Sunday.

Ohio State's national champions and Navy's "team named desire" lived up to their ratings Saturday with smashing victories that highlighted the annual New Year's Day college football bowl games.

Ohio State completely outclassed Southern California for a 20-7 victory in the Rose Bowl, to give the Big Ten its eighth victory in the nine years of its post-season pact with the Pacific Coast Conference. Played in mud and rain, the game didn't faze the Buckeyes, rated the No. 1 team in the final Associated Press poll.

Quarterback George Welsh guided Navy's patched-up team to a 21-0 victory over Mississippi, Southeastern Conference champions, in the Sugar Bowl. The fired-up middies stopped Mississippi's attack cold. Welsh passed 12 yards to John Weaver for one score and sent fullback Joe Gattuso plunging over for the other two.

Georgia Tech maintained coach Bobby Dodd's perfect bowl record with a 14-6 triumph over Arkansas, Southwest Conference titlists, in the Cotton Bowl. Tech punched over two second-half touchdowns after Arkansas gained a 6-0 advantage on a touchdown by sophomore George Walker on the first play of the second quarter.

And Duke's Atlantic Coast Conference champions walloped Nebraska, runner-up in the Big Seven, 34-7 in the Orange Bowl. Nebraska tried hard, but was no match for the smooth, powerful Duke team which led by 14-0 at half and turned the game into a rout in the second half.

An extra point kicked by Penn State's Jim Garrity proved the margin of difference in the East's 13-12 victory over the West in the 30th annual Shrine benefit football game in San Francisco. The East tied the score in the fourth quarter on a 12-yard pass from Ralph Guglielmi, Notre Dame's all-America quarterback, to Purdue's John Kerr.

In other games, Texas Western walloped Florida State in the Sun Bowl 47-20; Rusty Fairly of Denver University starred in the 20-13 victory of the Skyline Conference's all-stars over Border Conference all-stars in the Salad Bowl, and Prairie View nipped Texas Southern 14-12 in the Prairie View Bowl.

Omaha nipped Eastern Kentucky 7-6 in the Tangerine Bowl for its 14th straight victory, largely on the running and passing of Bill Englehardt, the leading ground-gainer among small colleges in the United States.

A crowd of 80,735 watched Navy's first bowl appearance in 30 years. The middies, ranked fifth, played without tackle Jim

Weston.
