International Entente Bonds Strengthened

Stanhope-Norton Scene of Impressive Ceremony as Monument to Bonne Entente Between Quebec and Vermont Is Unveiled — Ceremonies Attended by Leading Officials of Two Governments and of Church.

Proudly proclaiming to a hate-charged world that it signifies peace and a common understanding between two great nations, a quiet but stately block of gray granite standing on the international boundary line between Stanhope, Que., and Norton, Vt., was unveiled at impressive ceremonies yesterday afternoon.

Inscribed with the words "Peace and Friendship," and the names of Hon. Maurice Duplessis, Premier of Quebec, and George D. Aiken, Governor of Vermont, the monument was erected by the St. Johnsbury Kiwanis Club in co-operation with the Vermont Commission of Foreign and Domestic Commerce and citizens of Coaticook to mark the friendly relationship enjoyed by Canada and the United States, particularly Quebec and Vermont.

Many dignitaries in both the provincial and state governments participated in the unveiling, which was followed by a banquet last night in the Armory of the 27th Field Brigade, R. C. A., Coaticook. Included among those present were Col. the Hon. Johnny Bourque, Minister of Public Works, representing Premier Maurice Duplessis; Hon. P. J. Leduc, Minister of Highways in the Quebec Government; Governor George D. Aiken, of Vermont; Mgr. P. S. Desranleau, Bishop-Coadjutor of Sherbrooke; R. G. Davidson, M.P. for Stanstead; Rouville Beaudry, M.L.A. for Stanstead; C. B. Howard, M.P. for Sherbrooke; Charles A. Plumley, Vermont Congressman, and a large number of mayors and other civic officials of communities in both Quebec and Vermont.

Members representing International Kiwanis present included George Harrison, of Portland, Me., Governor of the New England district of Kiwanis; Gerald Martineau, former Governor of Kiwanis for Quebec; Napoleon Courtemanche, of the St. Lawrence Kiwanis Club, Montreal; Everett Ireland, of Bolton, Mass., immediate past Governor of New England Kiwanis, and James P. Gallagher, of Boston, Mass., international trustee of Kiwanis.

Speaking French and English respectively, the presiding officers were J. A. Normandin, Coaticook alderman, and Dr. J. D. Bachand, of St. Johnsbury, chairman of the Vermont Commission of Foreign and Domestic Commerce. The guard of honor was furnished by a detachment of the smartly-uniformed Legion of Frontiersmen, accompanied by scarlet-coated members of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, with which the Legion is affiliated, and a unit of the Papal Zouaves.

Governor Aiken was accompanied by Adjutant General Herbert T. Johnson, of Montpelier, Vt., Capt. A. W. Aiken, of Newport, Vt., and Capt. Robert Pierce, of Lyndonville, Vt.

Leo Lacroix, of Stanhope, and Judge Edward Nelson, of Norton, opened the proceedings, outlining the program of the day, the three thousand people present. Rev. Elden H. Martin, of St. Johnsbury, superintended on Page 2, Col. 6.

SEEK TO DETERMINE DAMAGE CAUSED BY EARTHQUAKE

London, June 13.—(P)—Architects, surveyors and Government experts today started a thorough check to determine the extent of damage caused by Saturday's earthquake.

The survey included tests at St. Paul's Cathedral, where delicate precision instruments were placed beside the massive columns supporting the dome to see if they had been moved.

Reports from Brussels said further minor shocks were registered in Belgium this morning.

Czechoslovakia Facing Most Critical Moment Of History

Widespread Indignation on Part of Czechs Expected to Result from Granting of Too Great Concessions by Government to Sudeten German Minorities—Government Given Overwhelming Majorities in Non-German Districts.

Praha, Czechoslovakia, June 13.—(P)—With the overwhelmingly pro-Nazi attitude of its 3,500,000 Sudeten Germans clearly demonstrated at the polls, this twenty year old republic today approached what may be the most momentous decision since its foundation.

Czechoslovakia was not surprised when Konrad Henlein's Nazi-supported German party polled an estimated 90.9 per cent of the total vote in German districts yesterday in the third of three Sundays of municipal elections.

They were more concerned with the outcome of discussions on the troublesome minorities question which will start tomorrow between the Government and the Sudeten German party, in a triumphant mood as a result of the elections.

Yesterday's elections passed quietly, the only serious disorder being at Maerisch-Schönberg where five policemen and nine Henleinites were injured when police dispersed a victory parade celebrating a big Sudeten vote.

Anxious to demonstrate to France, Great Britain and Czechoslovakia's other friends abroad that the Government is willing to make concessions in the cause of peace, Henlein is preparing to hand to Henlein's representatives tomorrow precise proposals designed to satisfy at least some of the Sudeten German demands for more self-government in the Sudeten districts.

Whether the Henleinists will be content with mere concessions, however, remained a vital question. Another question causing equal anxiety among diplomatic observers was how the non-Sudeten vote would react to any attempt by the Government to make sweeping concessions.

GRAFT CHARGES MAY POSTPONE HOUSE CLOSING

Public Accounts Committee May Be Summoned to Probe the Charges and Counter-Charges of Premier and Opposition Leader.

Ottawa, June 13.—(P)—Parliament Hill is wondering today whether the House of Commons and Senate can get through their business in time to prorogue at the end of June—the generally accepted deadline for the Parliamentary session. It is believed every effort will be made to finish the session before the Conservative National Convention, opening July 5.

But an imposing amount of work stands in the way of early prorogation. The Government's Housing Bill must be pushed through, Justice Minister Lapointe has fifty amendments to the Criminal Code down for consideration and a monetary reform debate may arise on the Government's bill to make the Bank of Canada wholly Government-owned.

There is the budget, to be brought down Thursday by Finance Minister Dunning, and the consequent debate. The belief is it will contain no tariff changes because the Canadian-American treaty has not yet been signed. Because of that a debate that ordinarily would take four weeks may be cut to one.

Remarks of Prime Minister Mackenzie King Friday night have led to the belief in some quarters the Public Accounts Committee may be called to consider charges of political corruption.

Mr. King said the implications in a 1935 letter from Ralph Webb, Manitoba Conservative organizer, to Opposition Leader Bennett, then Prime Minister, were so serious it might be well to bring the matter before the Committee. The letter said three Manitoba constituencies could be won if certain road works were started.

Such an investigation, which probably also would probe charges Mr. Bennett has made of corruption during the present administration, undoubtedly would delay prorogation for weeks.

The charges made Friday brought out into the limelight a political expenditure bill introduced by Pension Minister power in April and since before the Electoral Affairs Committee. The general belief has been that it would not form the basis of legislation this session.

Now that political corruption has been so widely charged the Committee will have to consider what the reaction would be in the country if a measure designed to do something about it was shelved. The bill would curb corruption in elections in an attempt not previously attempted by Parliament.

A campaign measure may also serve to delay prorogation of Parliament. It would rewrite the Elections Act and authorities are convinced no general election could be held without the measure being passed.

The 1935 Act, still in force, provided permanent voters' lists should be built up. But the present Government took the view this had not worked out satisfactorily and decided to return to the system of having new lists made before each election. Because the permanent lists were discontinued it is contended an election could not be held under the present Act.

LARGE SCHOOL AT CHICOUTIMI PREY TO BLAZE

Only Two Grades Occupied Commercial Academy at Time of Outbreak of Flames Which Guttered Large Building.

Chicoutimi, Que., June 13.—(P)—Fire of unknown origin swept through the Commercial Academy of Chicoutimi early today, causing heavy damage to the brick and wooden structure that housed this northern district's main school for boys.

Only two grades of pupils, trying their term-end examinations, were in the building when the flames were discovered in the sacristy of the school chapel. Members of the other classes finished their examinations last week and were on holiday.

Brother Leontine of the Mariste Brothers who operated the academy, raced into the chapel and saved the Holy Sacrament. Pupils and teachers helped save many decorations from the chapel and schoolrooms.

For a half-hour the flames shot from windows and were rapidly extinguished by the wooden firemen. Men got six lines of hose into play and brought the fire under control.

The School Commission president declined to make an estimate of the damage nor would he say if the building would be repaired or rebuilt.

Pupils of the sixth and eighth grades had expected to write their examinations today. They left the building in orderly fashion after the alarm was sounded and many of them joined with their teachers in carrying out the lighter ornaments.

The flames were shooting from the windows when firemen arrived on the scene but under the direction of Chief Guimont, the six lines of hose soon were brought into play and the flames checked. Lack of wind aided the firemen in their efforts.

PREMIER ABERHART STILL HOLDS POWER

Edmonton, June 13.—(P)—Premier Aberhart of Alberta said last night at the Edmonton Prothetic Bible Conference that failure of Social Credit forces to defeat the Liberal party in Saskatchewan election June 8 was no reason why Alberta's Government should resign.

"I did not notice that the Federal Government resigned when we so definitely defeated them in the East Edmonton bye-election," the Premier added. Orvis Kennedy, Social Credit, was elected in that federal bye-election March 31.

"They have had me politically dead and buried many times," Mr. Aberhart said. "The trouble is I'm read but won't lie down."

VANCOUVER DAILIES JUMP SELLING PRICE

Vancouver, June 13.—(P)—Effective this month, the subscription rates of Vancouver evening newspapers will be raised fifteen cents to seventy-five cents a month.

Front page announcements in both The Daily Province and The Vancouver Sun attributed the increase to heavier operating costs both in newsprint and wages. The papers said they were following a course already adopted by other North American papers.

HUNCH LED TO DISCOVERY OF MISSING PLANE

Craft Which Vanished March 1 with Nine Passengers Aboard Found by Prospector in Wild Sierras.

Yosemite Calif., June 13.—(P)—A young gold prospector who followed a "hunch" led the way today to wreckage of a storm-crashed Transcontinental Western Airlines ship which vanished with nine persons aboard the night of March 1.

The shattered plane and the bodies of its occupants lay near the top of 9,000-foot Buena Vista peak, eighteen miles south and east of Yosemite Valley Ranger headquarters. The region, one of the wildest in the Sierra Nevada, is ninety miles east of Fresno.

H. O. Collier, twenty-four years old, a mining prospector from Fresno, told Chief Ranger Forest Townsley he found the ship Sunday morning. Eight bodies were scattered nearby, said Collier.

As evidence he had found the plane, Collier produced an aviator's cap with the T. W. A. insignia and a brief case stamped with the name of H. M. Salisbury of Kansas City. T. W. A. co-pilot and a passenger on the ship.

The airliner vanished in one of the worst California storms in several decades. Pilot John Graves had abandoned efforts to fly eastward over the Sierra to Albuquerque, N.M. He also had been balked in an attempt to fly southward to Burbank, Calif., and finally had turned northward hoping to return to San Francisco.

A radio message was received when the ship was near Fresno. Shortly afterward the plane disappeared. For weeks planes and searching parties sought it vainly.

British Press Demanding Cabinet Reshuffling As European Tension Mounts

Prime Minister Urged to Grant Greater Power to Ministers in Face of Critical Decisions on Czechoslovakia and Spain — Early Announcement on Action Against Bombing of British Shipping in Mediterranean Expected.

CONFIRMED AS LIBERAL LEADER

Adelard Godbout, former Premier and temporary leader of the Quebec Provincial Liberal Party, was the unanimous choice of the party convention in Quebec City on Saturday as permanent chief.

PEMBROKE EUCHARISTIC CONGRESS HELD

Pembroke, Ont., June 13.—(P)—The first annual Eucharistic Congress in Pembroke Roman Catholic diocese was held yesterday with close to seven thousand members of the clergy and laity attending.

Mgr. Charles Nelligan, Bishop of Pembroke, preached in English and French after celebrating a Pontifical High Mass in the Rectory grounds of St. John the Baptist church. Rev. Oscar Gravelle, of Montreal, and Rev. C. J. Jones, of Calabogie, Ont., also preached sermons.

London, June 13.—(P)—Prime Minister Chamberlain returned from a Whitsuntide fishing holiday today to face vital decisions on Czechoslovakia and Spain, coupled with a demand for a fresh Cabinet reshuffle.

The Times (Independent) said in an editorial reviewing the situation on the eve of the resumption of Parliament that Mr. Chamberlain should give his Cabinet Ministers more responsibility.

The Times said a reshuffle was needed since the recent reorganization in which Viscount Swinton was dropped as Secretary for Air did not "add new strength to the team which owes far too much to the indefatigable activity of the Prime Minister."

This plea came as Europe watched for advice Great Britain is expected to give Czechoslovakia during the vital minorities statute talks between Premier Milan Hodza and Konrad Henlein, leader of the Nazi-supported Sudeten German party.

The House of Commons will want to know tomorrow how the Prime Minister plans to halt Spanish insurgent bombing of British shipping in Spanish ports. The Government has given no intimation of what action it plans, but some quarters have suggested the problem may be left to the Non-Intervention Committee.

NO PUNITIVE ACTION EXPECTED ON RAIDS

London, June 13.—(P.-Havas)—As Prime Minister Chamberlain returned today from Hampshire, where he spent the Whitsuntide holidays, it was predicted the British Government will take no punitive action to stop the bombing of British vessels in Spanish waters.

Foreign Secretary Halifax, back in Downing Street after the weekend, was expected to confer with Mr. Chamberlain this evening on answers to be made in the House of Commons tomorrow to questions concerning the bombings.

Although it had been predicted earlier that a special cabinet meeting would be held today, it was learned this morning that the ministers will not meet before their regular session Wednesday.

Parliamentary circles believe the Commons will be told tomorrow that the bombings of British ships in Spain are the result of foreign intervention in the Spanish fighting, and that therefore the best hope of ending them is through success of the efforts of the Non-Intervention Committee to secure the withdrawal of foreign "volunteers."

At the same time, it was this view would not prevent the sending of a new communication to General Franco, emphasizing the views of the British Government.

In answer to questions from Clement Attlee, Labor leader, and other Opposition members, Mr. Chamberlain is expected to say the present situation is analogous to that when British ships were bombed off Bilbao.

At that time Anthony Eden, then Foreign Secretary, held that those passing a blockade did so at their Continued on Page 2, Col. 2.

Insurgent Forces Rapidly Breaking Way Through Loyalist Defence Line

Castellon de la Plana, One of Richest Ports in Eastern Spain, Next Objective of Insurgent Drive Against Valencia, Temporary Seat of Government.

Hendaye, June 13.—(P)—Spanish insurgents, swiftly hurdling crumbling Government defences, today broke through the outskirts of ancient Castellon de la Plana, one of the richest ports in Eastern Spain.

With Albacete, twenty-seven miles north of Castellon, abandoned by retreating Government troops, the city became the outpost of defences for Valencia, forty miles farther south southwest.

Grado de Castellon, the city's port, was bombed by insurgent planes backing the besieging land forces. Fliers reported Government troops there were loading war supplies aboard small coastal ships in an effort to move them south before they can fall into insurgent hands.

The railroad between Castellon and Valencia, insurgent dispatches said, was cut by air bombardment near Nules, about ten miles south of Castellon.

Scores of lesser towns fell before the insurgent sweep which, in less than three days, doubled the area of insurgent General Franco's wedge between Catalonia and Central Spain. Franco now holds about seventy miles of Mediterranean seaboard from the Ebro river delta south to Castellon.

Five insurgent columns, commanded by Generals Miguel Aranda, Jose Varela and Garcia Valino, converged on Castellon, once again making a battlefield of the city founded by James the Conqueror in 1251.

Tons of shells poured into Government positions and insurgent bombing squadrons attacked the city.

The air raids at Castellon and elsewhere on the coast were said to have been ordered by Franco to enforce a blockade of Government ports which his warships had not been able to establish.

Japanese Offensive In North China Imperilled By Rising Yellow River

Rapidly Mounting Waters Increasing Possibility that Drive Up Yangtze May Become Main Attack on Hankow, Temporary Seat of Chinese Government.

Shanghai, June 13.—(P)—Powerful Japanese land and river forces today captured Anking, capital of Anhwei Province, in a swift thrust up the Yangtze River toward Hankow, China's provisional capital, less than two hundred miles farther inland.

Rising flood waters of the Yellow River, imperiling Japan's offensive through Honan Province, increased the possibility that the drive by land and water up the Yangtze may become the main attack on China's seat of Government.

A Japanese army spokesman acknowledged that fighting in the Chengchow sector, where Japanese are besieging the junction of the Lunghai and Peiping-Hankow railroads, was being hampered by mud and rain.

Actual flood conditions do not exist yet, however, he declared. Japanese army engineers said the

Yellow had risen fifteen feet but must rise another fifteen before the situation could be considered perilous.

If supply lines are cut off by the flood, they declared, the Japanese could not press their Lunghai campaign.

Actual occupation of Anking, Japanese reports said, was achieved by infantry which was put ashore from transports and advanced on the provincial capital from the east and northeast after Japanese warships shelled the city from the river.

ONTARIO APPEAL COURT REJECTS RIPLEY PLAN

Toronto, June 13.—(P)—The Ontario Court of Appeal today upheld a judgment of Mr. Justice C. P. McTague denying the motion by the trustees of the Abitibi Power and Paper Company Limited asking approval of the plan of reorganization of the Company as proposed by J. P. Ripley, chairman of the Bondholders' Representative Committee.

DOUBLE DROWNING TRAGEDIES IN DISTRICT

Drowning Claims Two Lives Over Week-End

West Brome Youth and Bromptonville Sacred Heart Brother Victims of Week-End Fatalities—Heroic Rescue Attempt to Save Brother Made by Companion.

Two Eastern Townships residents were drowned over the week-end as the Dominion recorded a total of sixteen accidental deaths. William Beattie, seventeen, lost his life in the Yamaska River near West Brome yesterday and Rev. Brother Louis Rene, twenty-year-old teacher at the Bromptonville Sacred Heart Academy, was drowned in the St. Francis River on Saturday afternoon.

Student of the Cowansville High School, William Beattie had gone swimming near his home soon after eating a heavy meal, and it is believed he was seized with cramps. The youth was swimming with two companions when he suddenly disappeared in about eight feet of water. His companions were unable to reach him and rushed to the shore for aid. George White, who was some distance from the scene, hurried to the river and recovered the body. Beattie had been submerged for half an hour.

Dr. George Fuller, of Cowansville, and K. McLeod, R.N., of the Brome-Missisquoi-Perkins Hospital at Sweetburg, worked on the victim with a pump for some time, but were unable to revive him. Young Beattie's father is a well-known West Brome farmer. The boy is survived by his parents, three sisters and a brother.

In spite of a heroic rescue attempt made by one of four companions with whom he had gone bathing, Rev. Brother Louis Rene lost his life Saturday afternoon. The five Sacred Heart brothers were swimming in the St. Francis River near Bromptonville early Saturday afternoon when suddenly Brother Rene sank beneath the surface.

He called for help and Brother Ovide plunged to his aid. Brother Ovide was able to reach the sinking man but was forced to give up his rescue attempt in order to save his own life, as Brother Rene, panic-stricken, dragged him beneath the surface. The body was recovered an hour and a half later by Chief of Police Ovide Auger, of Bromptonville, and funeral services were held yesterday. Interment will take place this afternoon at Arthabaska.

The victim of the tragedy was born Henry Paul Pellerin, at Three Rivers. Brother Ovide, born Paul Benoit, is a native of Nicolet. A verdict of accidental death was returned at the inquest held into the case by Dr. J. A. Allard, coroner.

SIXTEEN MET VIOLENT DEATH OVER WEEK-END

Sixteen persons, including two from the Eastern Townships, met violent deaths in Canada during the week-end and many others were injured on crowded streets and highways as the summer outing season advanced. Six were killed in motor mishaps, seven drowned and three were killed in other accidents.

A prospective bridegroom and a hitchhiker he had picked up only a few minutes before were victims of the worst motor crash, at Beamsville, Ont. John Coady, twenty-two, driver of the car which sideswiped a truck and buckled up, died three or four minutes afterward, while twenty-one year old Leonard Todd, of Hamilton, given a ride by Coady, died in an ambulance. A passenger in the car but only slightly hurt was Leona Rooney, of Port Dalhousie, whom Coady was to have married in a few weeks.

George Richardson, twenty-three, died in hospital at Vancouver, second victim of a runaway tractor which killed Charles Lindstrom at Hillside, B.C., Friday. Lindstrom was killed as the machine turned over and Richardson, riding with

him, lay beneath it for two hours before being found. Norman Haskell, twenty-two, of Fort Erie, Ont., died in hospital Saturday night of injuries suffered when the taxi in which he and John Bews were riding, driven by George Slowleigh, struck a rut and hurtled into a tree. Thrown through the windshield, Haskell suffered a skull fracture.

Missing a turn on the Sandwich West-Anderson tollway near Amherstburg, Ont., Victor Brown, thirty-two of Ann Arbor, Mich., was killed. His companion, Mary E. Frey, thirty-five, of Detroit, was not injured. Brown's neck was broken.

At Matane, Que., Oree Rose twenty-two, was killed when knocked from his bicycle by an automobile. Provincial Police refused to divulge the name of the owner or driver of a motor truck they seized after James W. Montgomery, seventy-three, died in hospital of injuries received when hit by a driver who did not stop.

Three-year-old Huguette Deshaies was killed by a motor car in attempting to cross a road at Alma, Que., near Shawinigan Falls. Two-year-old Dolores Fox collapsed and died before her parents eyes after choking on a bread crust at Montreal.

Police continued investigation today into the death of Grace Hamblly, twenty-eight year old stenographer whose body was found in Lake Huron less than twenty-four hours after she arrived at Port Elgin, Ont., from London to accept a position. She was fully dressed and police thought she might have fallen into the water from slippery rocks.

Wallace Norris, department store manager at New Glasgow, N.S., drowned at Trout Lake when a boat from which he was fishing capsized. Three other members of his party had gone ashore just before a squall sprang up.

Aided only by a ring inscribed "L.P.B.," authorities sought to identify a man whose body was found with only four cents in the clothing in the Jesus river near Ste. Therese, Quebec, Saturday. The body of an unidentified man was found floating in the Black Watch river near Beamsville, Ont.

POST BAIL TO KEEP PEACE
Accused of creating a disturbance in Windsor Mills yesterday, Leopold Godbout, Eugene Godbout and Rodolphe Godbout, of that community, appeared before Justice of the Peace Herbert O'Bready this morning and posted bail of two hundred dollars to keep the peace for a year. The trio was accused by Theophile Bolduc, Windsor Mills constable.

Leopold Godbout was also charged with obstructing an officer in the exercise of his duty. The case was remanded until Wednesday.

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Outlines Plans For Good-Will Road Between This City And Lyndonville

Plans for the construction of a good-will highway from Sherbrooke to Lyndonville, Vt., were announced last night by Col. the Hon. Johnny Bourque, Minister of Public Works. The announcement was made at a banquet held in the Armory of the 27th Field Brigade, R.C.A., considering the unveiling ceremony yesterday afternoon of the peace monument on the international boundary line between Stanhope, Que., and Norton, Vt.

The new highway is expected to shorten the distance from here to the Vermont city by about four miles. Curves will be eliminated wherever possible and the roadbed will be given a hard surface. Col. Bourque stated that the work on the project will be started within the year.

Quebec's part in the improvement will entail working on the highway from Sherbrooke to Norton, while Vermont will be responsible for the remainder of the route, from Norton to Lyndonville. It is approximately seventy-five miles from Sherbrooke to Lyndonville.

Declaring that "the Quebec Government realizes the need of progress," Col. Bourque pointed out that while other countries in the world are spending huge sums on wars or preparations for wars, Canada is more interested in making improvements.

Roads Minister F. J. Ledue was unable to be present at the banquet last night, but spoke at the unveiling ceremonies in the afternoon. The announcement concerning the highway followed a conference between the two Ministers. Col. Bourque stated that the matter will be given further consideration by the authorities some time this week, probably Tuesday or Wednesday, and that definite steps will be taken shortly.

MRS. McFADYEN, WIFE OF B.B.C. DIRECTOR, DIES

Popular Stanstead Citizen Passed Away Suddenly in Her Sixty-First Year.

Stanstead, June 13.—Susie Bready McFadyen, wife of a foremost Eastern Townships citizen, and herself an active church worker and beloved member of this community, died suddenly in the Montreal General Hospital Saturday afternoon. She had not been in the best of health for some time, but her sudden death in the midst of great activity at the United Church Conference, which she was attending with Mr. McFadyen, came as a great shock to Stanstead Wesleyan College staff and students and to people throughout this whole district.

First Mrs. McFadyen was in her sixty-first year, twenty-nine years having been spent at the College here. She was born and educated at Morrice, Ontario, and in 1903 married John D. McFadyen there. Since coming to Stanstead, where her husband has for many years been director of the Bugbee Business College, the commercial school of the Wesleyan College, she worked actively with him in his interests in church, community and college affairs. Among the many classes of students and numerous changes of staff members who lived on the campus with her over the space of many years, she was loved and respected as a kind-hearted and sympathetic person.

Being associated with many different church organizations, she was at the time of her death the secretary of the Women's Mission Society of Centenary United Church, Stanstead Her field of interest also extended actively into the other work in her church and in the community.

Her husband, J. D. McFadyen, was former Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Quebec, a former president of the International Chamber of Commerce, Rock Island, and is a noted speaker and author on commercial and educational subjects.

STOCK MARKET DRIFTED INTO LOWER LEVELS

Continued Reports of Dollar Devaluation Has Depressing Effect on New York Stock Exchange Prices.

New York, June 13.—(AP)—The stock market drifted into lower territory today, leaders slipping fractions to a point or more. Pressure was exceptionally light throughout, however, with the tickers tape moving sleepily from the start. A few gold mines, including Homestake and McIntyre, edged forward near the second hour, and rails and utilities were only slightly in arrears.

Prominent on the downside were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, General Motors, Chrysler, Western Union, International Harvester, Boeing, Douglas Aircraft, Texas Corp., Westinghouse, General Electric and Allis Chalmers. Restraining selling forces, brokers reported, was the fact dollar devaluation talk was still heard in financial quarters. At the same time the principal European currencies, strong last week in terms of the dollar on rumors of a possible boost in the world gold price, lost their buoyancy.

Country And Dairy Products Prices

Montreal, June 13.—Prices turned soft on the butter market following announcement at Ottawa late Friday of Dominion stocks in store as well as production during May. The latter showed a gain of 1 1/2 per cent, while the stock report showed a surplus of 4,000,000 lbs. of butter when compared with a year ago supplies. Buyers withdrew from the market at the week-end and prices sagged, being as much as a half-cent off on the spot market and five-eighths of a cent down on futures compared with Friday. A surplus of butter for export later in the year is anticipated. Slight declines were shown on the week.

Some bids were lowered in the cheese market but asking prices were generally unchanged pending week-end country boards. The egg market edged a little higher again on top-grading stock just arriving, the tone of the market being firm, with demand good. New potatoes were a little cheaper again at the week-end.

Sales at the Canadian Commodity Exchange were 190 boxes of spot Quebec fresh 92 score butter at 24 1/2 c and 300 at 24 c, with spot prices quoted at the close at 23 1/2 c.

Two November butter futures sold at 26c. Butter futures closed weak, five-eighths of a cent lower, at 24 1/2 c for July and 24 1/2 c to 25 c for November. Quebec parchment foil butter to arrive was offered at 25 1/2 c. The open spot butter market was 25 1/2 c. Small lots of butter to the retail trade were quoted by jobbers as follows: A-1 large, 31-32c; A-1 medium, 29-30c; A-1 pullets, 27c; A-large, 29c; A-medium, 27 1/2 c-28c; "B", 26c, "C", 24-25c.

New Virginia potatoes, No. 1, were \$5.40 per bbl. and \$3.50 per 100 lb. bags, while old potatoes were \$1.15 to \$1.20 per 90 lbs. for P.E.I. Mountains, 90c to \$1 per 80 lbs. for N.B. Mountains, and 80c to 85c for Quebec Whites per 80 lbs.

The poultry market was quoted to the retail trade by wholesale jobbers as follows on A-grade dressed stock, B-grade being one to two cents per pound less. Turkeys, 27-29c; milked chickens, 29-33c; selected chickens, 26-30c; selected fowl, 19-25c; Brome Lake ducklings, 26c.

Graded shipments of eggs in used free cases were selling on spot at 25 1/2 c to 26 c for A-large, 24 c for A-medium, 23 1/2 c for "B" and 21 1/2 c for C. Offerings at the Commodity Exchange were at 25 1/2 c, 24c 28 1/2 c and 21 1/2 c respectively. Small lots to the retail trade, in cartons, and one cent less for loose, were quoted by jobbers as follows: A-1 large, 31-32c; A-1 medium, 29-30c; A-1 pullets, 27c; A-large, 29c; A-medium, 27 1/2 c-28c; "B", 26c, "C", 24-25c.
