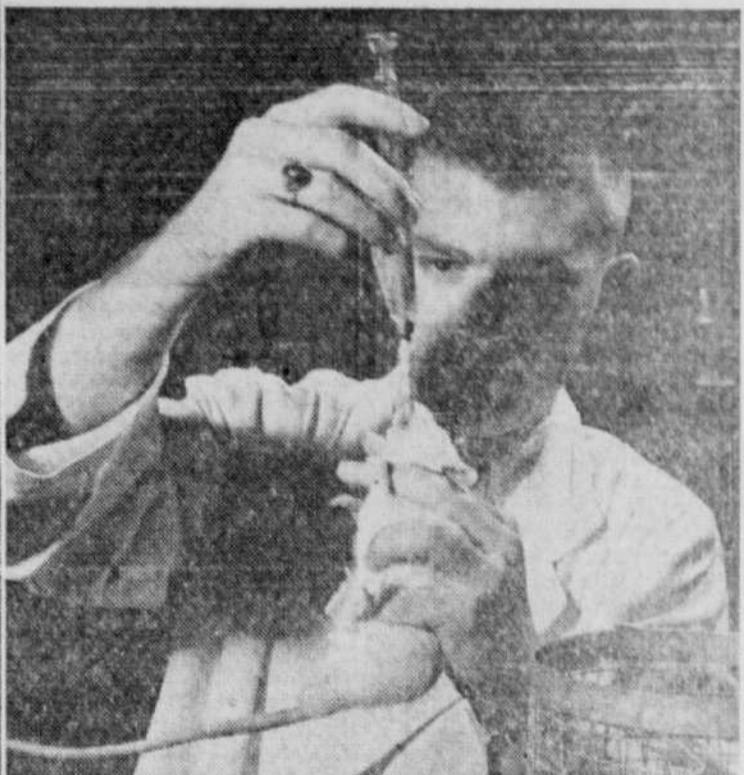

## Compulsive Drinkers, 16 in 1000



Pick, at random, 1000 adult Canadians and inevitably 16 of them are alcoholics—compulsive drinkers, whose addiction to alcohol is adversely affecting their health, family, business and society. Who are these alcoholics and how can they be helped? Research teams across Canada are turning up some answers.



Alcoholism is now considered to have no simple or single "cure". Research, treatment, and education today form a 3-pronged attack against this centuries-old malady.



Contrary to popular belief, most alcoholics are not the Skid Road variety of derelict. The skilled and semi-skilled labourer, the white-collar worker, the professional man, the executive, comprise over 60% of Canada's 182,000 alcoholics.



The alcoholic's family suffers heavily. Often the wife hesitates to seek help that is available. Since the "typical" alcoholic is "in the productive years between 35-45, above average in intelligence and education, married with 2-3 children," he is a potentially valuable citizen in whom society has a vested interest.



Young people are number one target of educators, doctors and social workers who attempt to prevent the spread of alcoholism by pointing out the warning signs that mark the switch from social to problem drinking.

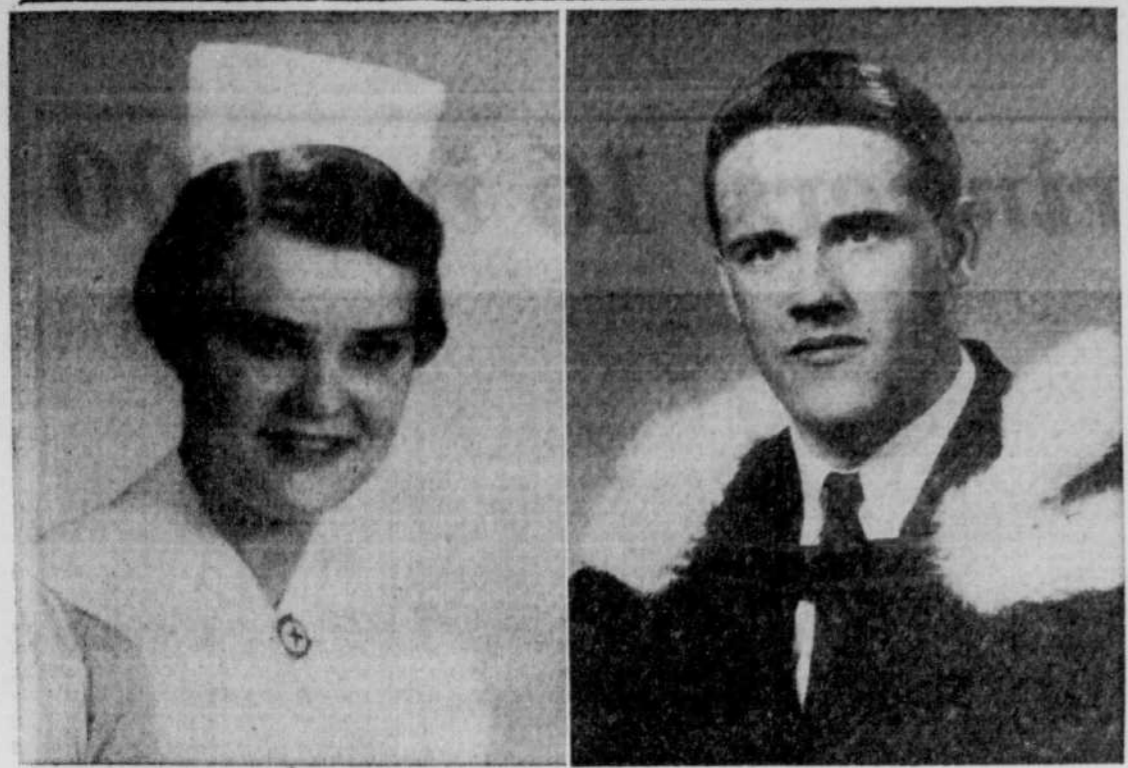

### Homemaking

To wash a tile bathroom to a gleaming white, add a little ammonia to the soapsuds.

Use an empty soft-drink bottle carton as a caddy for household cleaning supplies. The compartments hold soap, detergent, scouring powder, polishes, cloths, etc. Keep it in the cleaning closet.

Be sure to remove metal hanging or pleating pins before laundering draperies. This prevents rust stains and pricked fingers.

Any toy that can be washed with soapsuds is safer for a child to play with than ones that are uncleanable.

A coat of wax on painted shelves will prevent oilcloth or shelf paper from sticking to the wood.

An odd number of flowers in a vase gives the arrangement more balance than an even number.

"I don't think I could have stood the confusion at home another day," she confessed, "with the kids arguing with each other and wanting to go somewhere all the time."

"After two weeks of that, being able to work in peace and quiet seems like heaven."

As more and more married women work, more and more of them are getting a masculine attitude toward home life.

They think it is fine for a few hours a day but they don't want too much of it.

Many of them are also developing such a taste for shop and office routines that in comparison homemaking seems like an inferior job.

If her family can possibly get along without her pay check any married woman with children ought to quit her job the first time she finds herself dreading a week-end or looking forward to Monday and the peace and quiet of an office.

For if she doesn't quit then she never will.

## Good Lunch Packs Punch

"Pack a lunch that packs a punch!" is advice worth heeding. The noon lunch, eaten at home or away, should be the all-important booster meal that carries you through each busy day.

Lunch box meals may be planned in courses, just like other main meals. What could be simpler than following the traditional pattern: first, an appetizer, next a main course, accompanied by a bread course, next a salad, with dessert and beverage last. And the best news of all comes when you learn that your packed lunch, planned in familiar courses, is well balanced nutritionally too!

The appetizer course may be tangy tomato or fruit juice or a crisp, raw vegetable. The main course usually is high protein meat, fish, poultry, eggs or cheese, in carry-easy sandwich filling form. Bread accompaniment can be the fresh slices of enriched white, whole wheat or rye bread in the sandwich itself, or buns, rolls or muffins for welcome variety. The salad course may consist of a plump, red tomato, to be eaten out of hand, or a variety of salad greens, crisp and cool in a handy plastic carton. For dessert there's a choice of seasonal tree-ripe fruits, washed and ready for nibbling, plus any number of appetizing, sweet-tooth-satisfying cookies, cakes, or fruit breads. Beverage for school children and teenagers (and adults, too, if they wish) should be milk. Variety is the spice of interest in lunches too, and a shift from "just plain" milk to milk soup or a milk dessert, will be welcome. Thermos-hot tea or coffee will complete the meal for adults.

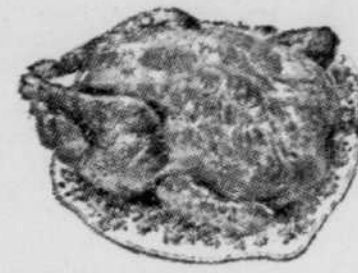

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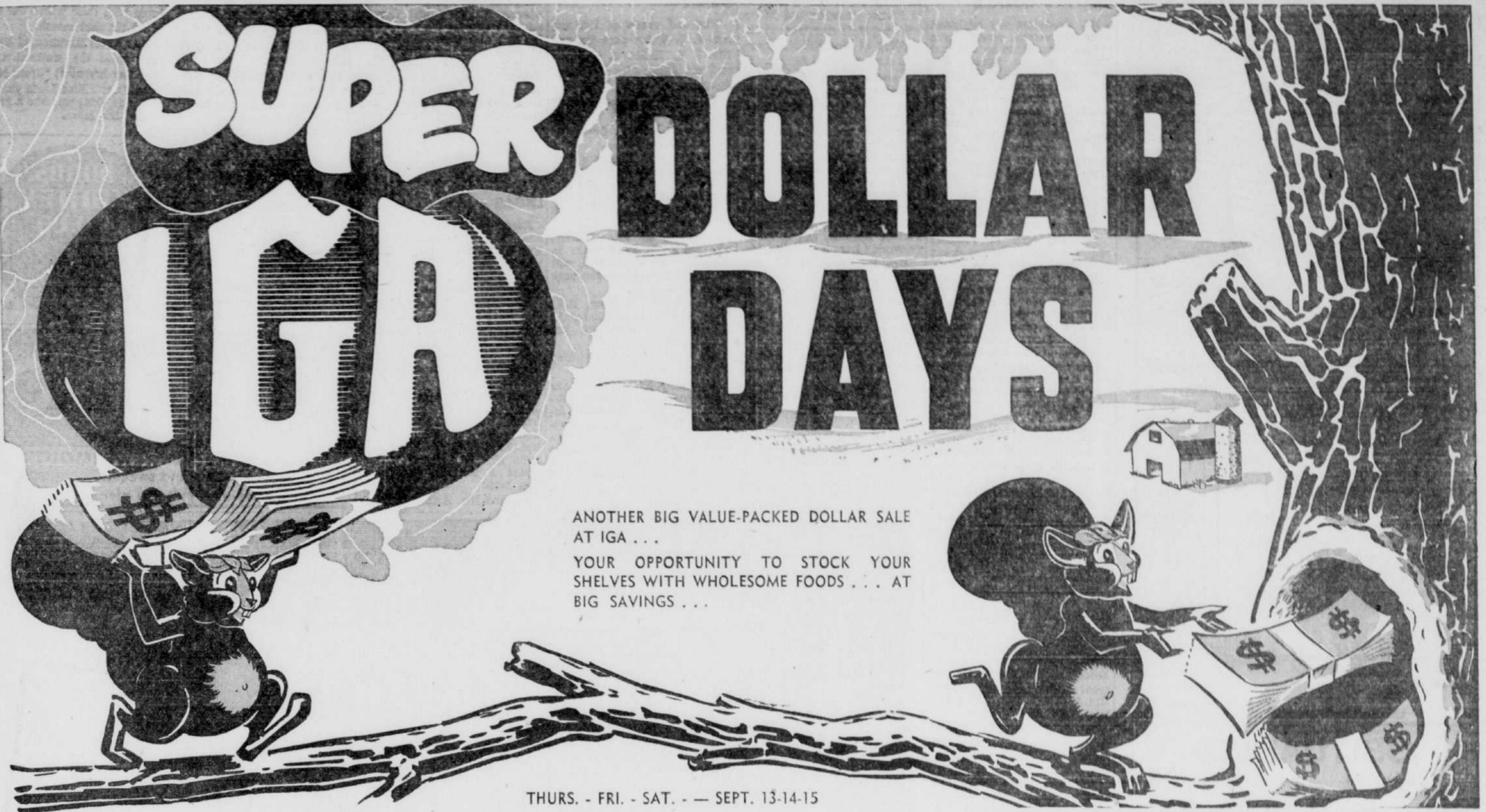

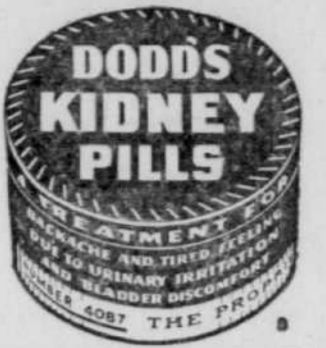
