OTTOMAN DELEGATES REFUSE TO SURRENDER ADRIANOPLE

Such is Report from Well Informed Turkish Circles. Will Make Explicit Declaration to This Effect at To-day's Session of Peace Conference. Dr. Danefff Says Turks Will be Unable to Give Allies Acceptable Conditions.

London, Jan. 4.—(Special)—The Ottoman delegates to peace conference have absolutely made up their minds not to surrender fortress of Adrianople, or islands in Aegean Sea, according to a statement this morning in well informed Turkish circles.

An explicit and categorical declaration to this effect is to be made in course of to-day's session of Peace Conference in St. James Palace. Turks, however, may make some further concession in Province of Adrianople. Delegates of Bulgaria, Greece, Montenegro and Serbia met at half past three this afternoon to consider their attitude, in view of probable Turkish reply to their demands for decision on question of Adrianople.

MEETING OF AMBASSADORS
Ambassadors of Austria-Hungary, France, Germany, Italy and Russia resumed the conversations at British Foreign Office at noon to-day, when they began considering questions involved in crisis which has been reached in peace negotiations. Attitude of Balkan allies during to-day's session of the Conference was foreshadowed by Dr. S. Danefff, Chief of Bulgarian delegation, who stated "We expect that Turks will be unable to give us acceptable conditions. Negotiations will then be broken off. We have an army which can continue war." Dr. Danefff added a phrase which possibly indicates that a war of deadlock may be found. He said "If Turks wish to appeal to European powers we cannot prevent them from doing so."

YESTERDAY'S SESSION.
London, January 4.—The ninth session of the peace conference was opened in St. James's Palace at six o'clock last evening. The proceedings were presided over by ex-premier Lazar Mityuskovitch, the head of the Montenegrin delegation.

The opening of the conference was postponed until six o'clock to enable the Turkish delegates fully to digest the fresh instructions they have received from Constantinople and to put them into shape for presentation to the envoys of Bulgaria, Greece, Montenegro and Serbia.

The Balkan envoys met privately in St. James's Palace before the opening of the session of the conference, to decide definitely their attitude on Adrianople, and the action to be taken by them in reference to the expected communication from Rechad Pasha, the chief Turkish envoy.

ADRIANOPLE OR WAR.
According to report, two currents of opinion prevail among the Balkan allies on the question of Adrianople. One urges the breaking up of the peace conference unless the Turks declare their readiness to cede Adrianople immediately. In this connection, however, King Ferdinand's address yesterday morning in Sofia in which he made some remarks on the situation which are regarded in many quarters as a threat that the war may be resumed, are significant. After expressing the hope that an agreement might still be reached by the peace conference, he said: "Should the impregnable will of God be otherwise, we will not hesitate at a new recourse to arms to compel the enemy to give complete and equitable satisfaction for all our precious sacrifices." He made these remarks in speaking to the delegation of members of the Bulgarian Parliament who came to the palace to present an address in reply to his majesty's speech from the throne.

Another story says that the Balkan delegates have decided to put the direct question today to the Turkish delegation whether the Ottoman Government is prepared to cede the fortress of Adrianople forthwith. In the event of the Turks giving an indecisive answer the Balkan allies will grant them a period of twenty-four hours, and if their reply at the end of that time is unfavorable the conference will be suspended. No other question will be considered by the allies until this point has been settled.

Stojan Novakovich, the leader of the Serbian delegation, said that he was sure the allies would ultimately carry their point. Turkey, he believed, would certainly continue to resist the giving up of Adrianople, but soon facts would be stronger than theories and she would be compelled in the end to give way. Fugitives from the besieged city, as well as information obtained from British and Turkish sources in Constantinople, M. Novakovich continued, indicated that the condition of the beleaguered garrison was an untenable one and that the capitulation of the fortress was merely a question of days and perhaps only of hours. Once Adrianople had fallen in the possession of the allies and its garrison had become prisoners of the besiegers the problem would solve itself.

POWERS MAY DISTRIBUTE AEGEAN ISLANDS.
A compromise solution respecting the Aegean Islands is possible. Some suggest that Turkey cede them to the Powers which can decide their fate. It is recalled that such a course has been taken on other occasions presenting even more difficulties than the present. For instance, in the War of 1866 between Italy and Austria, Austria, although victorious, was induced to cede the Venetian provinces to France, which transferred them to Italy. The supporters of this plan hint that Turkey might even cede the islands to the allies, as has practically been done with Albania, on condition that the Powers pledge themselves to claim, as in the case of Albania, the right to decide the status of the Aegean Archipelago. Relief from this situation may result from the meeting of the ambassadors, to whose judgment probably both Turkey and the allies may submit, if they decide unanimously what the fate of the islands may be.

The Powers are particularly concerned in this question, because some of the islands, Samothrace, Imbros, Lemnos and Tenedos, are of international importance, commanding as they do the entrance to the Dardanelles, while Mitylene and Chios bar the entrance of the Gulf of Smyrna. The remainder of the islands are still in the hands of Italy, which occupied them during the war with Turkey. If the Powers unanimously ask Greece to evacuate some of the islands already occupied, it is believed that Greece will obey, as she did at Avlona on the simple intimation of Italy, and as Serbia and Montenegro did on the Albanian coast on the Adriatic, or prepared to do, in order to please Austria.

50,000 MORE E.T. PAMPHLETS
Department of Interior Will Increase its Edition
WILL BE USED IN ADVERTISING TOWNSHIPS ABROAD.
Mr. E. W. Farwell, president of the Eastern Townships Associated Boards of Trade, has received information from Mr. F. R. Cromwell, M.P., that the Department of the Interior, Ottawa, has been induced to increase its edition of 20,000 Eastern Townships pamphlets to 70,000, making 50,000 additional.

The first edition is just off the press, having been printed by the Page Printing and Binding Company, Sherbrooke. These will be shipped at once, to be followed by the second edition of 50,000 very shortly.

TO STUDY ENGLISH ARMY DISCIPLINE.
New York, Jan. 4.—Among the transatlantic passengers sailing from New York to-day was Major Charles B. Hatch, of the United States Marine Corps, who has been sent abroad on a rather interesting mission. Major Hatch is in charge of the royal disciplinary barracks at Port Royal, S.C., and the purpose of his visit to Europe is to study the system of discipline in the British army and navy, especially the detention system in force at the Aldershot barracks.

PUBLIC MEETING AT AYER'S CLIFF

Discussed Project of Power Development.

PRESENT COMPANY HAS NOT BEEN ABLE TO DEVELOP SUFFICIENT POWER.

Ayer's Cliff, Jan. 4.—(Special)—A meeting called in the interests of cheap power and town development was held in the Town Hall last evening, and was largely attended.

Mr. C. A. Kennedy, of Coaticook, was the first speaker. He gave an idea of what the company might do in further developing Burroughs Falls, by forming a stronger company.

Mr. R. N. Arkley, of Sherbrooke, gave his opinion as to the power to be developed with the ordinary flow of water, which he estimated would be in the neighborhood of one hundred horse power, at an estimated cost of \$7,000 for development.

A by-law has been drafted and passed by the Council, wherein it is set forth that the Municipality of Ayer's Cliff proposes to take a mortgage of \$1,000 on Burroughs Falls, with an option to purchase, but with no price named. This measure will be voted on by the ratepayers on January 7.

The Burroughs Falls Co. so far has not been able to develop sufficient power to supply continuous current for the village. At present they are getting power from the Sherbrooke Railway and Power Co. at a sub-station maintained at Burroughs Falls.

DYNAMITE WRIT OF ERROR

Granted in Case of Convicted Defendants

FOREMAN OF THE JURY RECEIVES A THREAT.

Indianapolis, Jan. 4.—After the attorneys for the thirty-three convicted dynamite conspirators had withdrawn their application for a writ of superseas, Federal Judge A. B. Anderson yesterday granted their prayer for a writ of error. During the hearing W. N. Harding announced that Herbert S. Hokin would not ask an appeal in his case.

The hearing was brief. The granting of the writ of error means that the request for a writ of superseas will be taken before a judge in the United States Circuit Court of Appeals. Chester H. Krum, of St. Louis, was spokesman for counsel for the defense. Judge Anderson granted his request to strike out of the petition the prayer for a writ of superseas, and allowed the writ of error. Mr. Krum said District Attorney Miller would be notified as soon as the judge and time for argument on the prayer for a writ had been decided upon.

No report of the threat made on the life of Frank Dare, of New Lisbon, Ind., foreman of the jury which returned a verdict of guilty against the alleged dynamite conspirators, had been made to the Federal authorities this morning. Mr. Dare received a letter stating that he would be placed under the sword within the next three months.

"Some crank or a practical joker probably sent the letter," said District Attorney Miller. "We have heard nothing of it except through newspapers."

COMPLAIN OF TRAIN DELAYS

Situation at Union Station Annoying to Passengers

INCOMING TRAINS ON Q. C. R. AND B. & M. HELD OUTSIDE STATION.

Continual complaint is being heard relative to delays occasioned to Boston and Maine and Q. C. R. trains at the Union Station. The station belongs to the Grand Trunk and the track as well. The result is that connecting roads have to wait the convenience of the G.T.R. traffic before their trains can be pulled into the station. Freight trains are often given precedence over the incoming passenger trains of these lines and it is not uncommon for Q.C.R. or B. & M. passenger trains to be held for twenty minutes or half an hour just outside the station yard. The B. & M. also, generally experienced another hindrance up at Lennoxville and this coupled with the proverbial lateness of these north bound trains results in a good deal of annoyance to passengers.

These incidents are reviving old rumors that it will not be long before the B. & M. and Q.C.R. trains will run into the C.P.R. station. There is nothing official in the way of confirmation of this. The reports probably originate in the minds of the public who wonder why the C.P.R., which controls the Q.C.R., and is closely associated with the B. & W. does not do something to remedy what has become an almost intolerable condition.

The delays are a serious hindrance to public convenience and there should be some way of overcoming the difficulty.

80 MILE GALE IN NEW YORK

Caused Three Deaths and \$500,000 Property Damaged.

TWENTY-THREE LIVES REPORT-ED LOST IN CHESAPEAKE BAY.

New York, Jan. 4.—(Special)—At least three deaths and approximately \$500,000 property damage resulted from last night's 80-mile gale, which swept New York and vicinity. This morning at 9 o'clock the wind had dropped to 60 miles an hour, but the mercury had crawled down to 30 and pedestrians suffered keenly.

The deaths reported were those of Mary Kline, Brooklyn, who died of injuries after having been blown under a street car; Robert Walker, a painter, fatally injured in a fall from a scaffold in Brooklyn; an unidentified man, blown into Newark Bay from a Central Railroad of New Jersey train.

THREE SCHOONERS ASHORE.

A three-masted schooner went ashore and was flying signals of distress near Egg Harbor, N.J., last night. She drifted off-shore near Beach Haven, not far from Atlantic City, to-day, and the life-savers lost sight of her. Revenue cutters are looking for her.

TWENTY-THREE REPORTED LOST
Newport News, Va., Jan. 4.—(Special)—The steamer J. L. Luckenbach, bound from Baltimore, was sunk in Chesapeake Bay late last night. The master, his wife and twenty-one of the crew are reported lost.

NORTH HATLEY AS WINTER RESORT

Believed that Southern People Will Be Attracted

DR. EDGAR LEAVES SHORTLY FOR SOUTH TO TAKE UP THE MATTER.

North Hatley, Jan. 4.—(Special)—If plans which are now under way materialize, North Hatley will not only increase her fame as a summer resort but will spring into prominence as a winter resort.

Dr. C. J. Edgar and his associates believe that North Hatley can attract in the winter as well as summer. There are excellent opportunities for winter sports and one of the finest toboggan slides in Canada can be provided from the hills down on to the lake.

"Connaught Inn" is the name of the hotel which Dr. Edgar will have ready next summer for the reception of guests. It is, indeed, open now for the nucleus of a winter colony which it is hoped will visit the resort during the present season. Mr. G. H. Aylmer Brooke has been installed as manager.

Dr. Edgar will leave shortly for the South in the interests of his plans to still further develop the tourist business of North Hatley. The recently organized Board of Trade is giving its assistance to the matter and there is every reason to believe that the results may be important.

HYDE MAY ESCAPE SECOND TRIAL
Scheduled to Begin in Criminal Court on Monday

ONE OF MOST FAMOUS CASES IN CRIMINAL ANNALS OF MISSOURI.

Kansas City, Mo., Jan. 4.—(Special)—The second trial of Dr. B. Clarke Hyde, convicted after a sensational trial, of the murder of Colonel Thomas H. Swope, a millionaire philanthropist, is scheduled to begin in the criminal court here Monday, but it is thought likely the case may not be called. District Attorney Virgil Conkling, who conducted the successful prosecution of Dr. Hyde at the first trial, died a short time ago, and many persons are of the opinion that the physician never will be called upon to stand trial a second time.

The Hyde case is one of the most famous in the criminal annals of Missouri. In March, 1910, Dr. Hyde was indicted for the alleged murder of Colonel Swope and the latter's nephew, William Swope. Another is detained charged him with manslaughter in connection with the death of James H. Hudson, a cousin of Col. Swope. Dr. Hyde's wife was a niece of Col. Swope, and the motive for the alleged murder was the desire to remove all obstacles between her and the Swope fortune. The physician was tried and convicted for the murder of Colonel Swope, and the Missouri supreme court set aside the sentence of life imprisonment and ordered a new trial. Since that time Dr. Hyde has been at liberty on bail.

CASTRO BUYS HIS TICKET
Sails For Europe To-day on "Amerika"

PRAYS FOR PROSPERITY OF THE UNITED STATES.
New York, Jan. 4.—Cipriano Castro, ex-president of Venezuela, has engaged passage on the steamship Amerika of the Hamburg-American line, sailing for Hamburg to-day at 3 a.m. Castro will have a room and bath in cabin No. 162. His valet will accompany him. The officers of the Hamburg-American line said that so far as they knew the Venezuelan would board the steamer at the pier like any other passenger. This would require him, for a short time at least, to tread the soil of this country, from which he was barred when he arrived from Europe Tuesday on the French liner La Touraine. No formal charge to warrant his detention has been made against Castro beyond the report of La Touraine's surgeon that his physical condition made it advisable to keep him at Ellis Island pending further medical examination. Before the decision of the immigration authorities was announced, Castro declared he was willing to go back to Europe of his own accord. General Castro denied that he was seeking to stir up another revolution in Venezuela.

"It is impossible for me," he said, "to regain my lost fortunes. There is no reason to think that I want to stir up trouble, and no proof. This last word I give to the American people. While I return I pray for the prosperity of the grand people of the United States."

LIBERAL RALLY AT GRANBY

Borden's Naval Bill Criticized by Speakers

HON. R. LEMIEUX, HON. S. A. FISHER, GEO. BOIVIN, M.P., AND OTHERS ADDRESSED MEETING.

Granby, Jan. 4.—(Special)—A largely attended Liberal rally was held in the Town Hall last night, when the speakers of this section listened with interest to addresses by Hon. R. Lemieux, Hon. S. A. Fisher, Geo. Boivin, M.P., Shefford; J. Gauthier, M.P., St. Hyacinthe; W. W. Bullock, M.L.A., Shefford, and others.

Mr. J. Bruce Payne presided. The first speaker was Mr. Boivin, who was given a warm reception. In fulfillment of a pre-election promise, he gave an interesting account of his work at Ottawa, since he was elected in 1910.

Mr. Bullock, who was elected to the Legislature last May, followed Mr. Boivin, and spoke along the same lines, thanking the electors for having supported him during the recent election.

Mr. Gauthier, member for St. Hyacinthe, was the next to address the meeting, and dealt at considerable length on the naval question. Hon. S. A. Fisher and Hon. R. Lemieux, also devoted the greater part of their attention to the Naval Bill. They criticized the Borden policy of contributing \$35,000,000 for an emergency which, in their opinion, did not exist.

The only sane policy for Canada was the one submitted by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, namely, a Canadian navy, built in Canada and manned by Canadians.

Hon. Mr. Lemieux spoke for an hour and a half, and although it was after twelve when he finished, a large crowd still remained in the hall.

DAIRY PRODUCE

LATEST ON BUTTER AND CHEESE.

The butter market has passed from the old year into the new in a very quiet phase, the chief demand being from the local trade. There is some enquiry, however, reported from the Northwest which would denote the need of a replenishment of supplies there, but the figure offered in one instance is said to be below the idea of the holder here. There are several cars of June butter held here that have been well kept and can, it is said, be bought at very reasonable figures, one lot being offered at 28-30c. A bid of 29c for a car of full made creamery was turned down, and a lot of over 100 boxes was placed at 30c. Fresh made creamery sells at a wide range according to quality, sales being reported all the way from 26c to 28c. The recent mild weather has curtailed the consumptive demand very materially, and as stocks are ample prices favor the buying interest. As regards dairy butter a car is said to be offered in the West, but the holder wants about as much f. o. b. at point of shipment as could be had for it here. Western dairy is quoted at 25c to 25 1/2c. A lot of Western rolls in half barrels put up neatly in cloths was sold at 25 1/2c, and we quote 25c to 26c, as to quality.

There is some freight space offering at the various seaports on the outgoing steamers, but the freight rates are too high for the export trade, owing to the condition of the market on the other side, and exporters state that eight rates will have to come down before they can do any business. We quote prices more or less nominal as follows: No. 1 quality, \$14.00 to \$14.50; No. 2 extra, \$13.00 to \$13.50; No. 2 ordinary, \$12.00; No. 3 hay, \$10.00 to \$11.00; Clover, as a grade, \$10.00 to \$11.00.

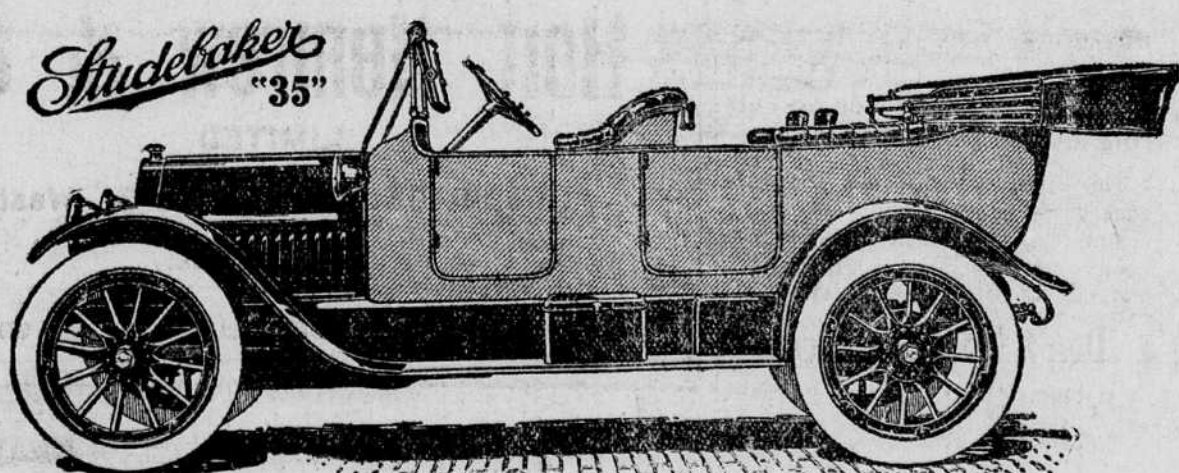

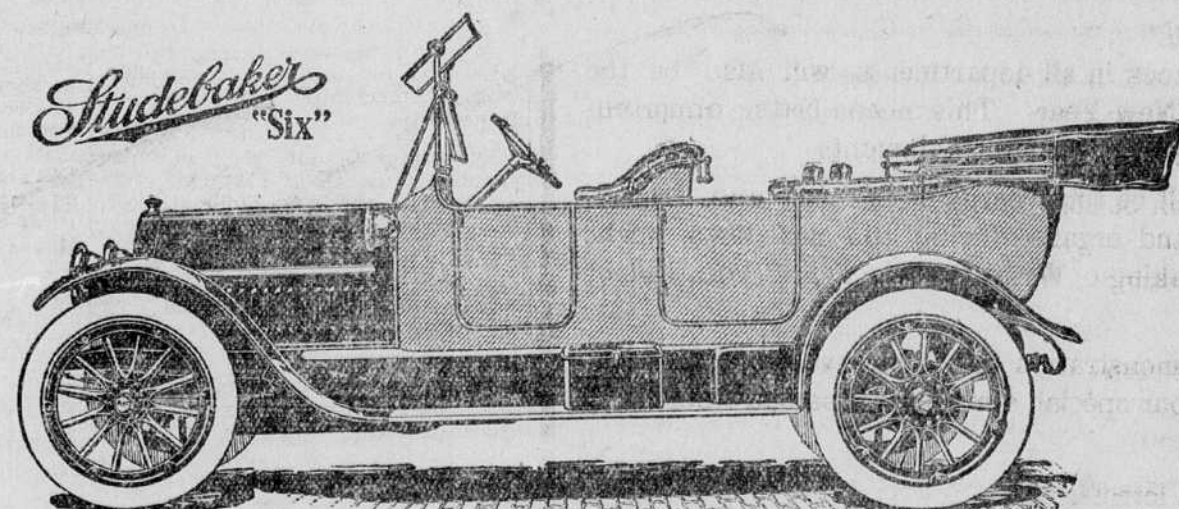

THE ONLOOKER COMMENTS

Prevention and Cure.

Much local discussion has arisen concerning measures taken for the preservation of public health, in cases of infectious or contagious diseases. There has been considerable difference of opinion on the subject, and the line of absolute safety, as dictated by common sense, seems not to have been satisfactorily defined. Proper precaution should prevent the spread of disease. Then, queries the observant citizen, upon whom is the blame when disease does spread, unconfined even to one section or a particular ward or school?

There are always two ways of looking at a question of health; one from the standpoint of prevention, the other of cure. To the ordinary citizen prevention of disease seems the more important. The policy of prevention makes isolation of a suspected case, imperative. Isolation

does not endanger the life of a patient, nor affect his chances of recovery, but does protect others.

Schools, churches, theatres, and moving picture shows all contribute to the carrying of disease. When a disease is ordinarily confined to children, the schools are the gathering points of danger, and drastic as the regulation might seem the appearance of one case of illness of a questionable, contagious or infectious nature, should justify immediate closing of a school for that period of time when other outbreaks might occur. The school should then be fumigated and with a clean bill of health reopen its doors.

The advancement in school work would be retarded. Possibly a child would lose a good deal in the year's schedule of studies. But is it not better for a child to lose a few weeks of school, than for the parent to lose his child?

No Respector of Persons

The entry port for immigrants to the United States has shown itself no respecter of persons. Mylius, who was responsible for the charge that a morganatic marriage had been contracted by King George of England previous to his marriage to Queen Mary of England, was coolly held up as an undesirable citizen when he attempted to enter the American Republic. Next came ex-President Castro of Venezuela, who was held at the immigration quarters pending an investigation as to his being permitted to enter. The latter gentleman has expressed his anger and displeasure in no uncertain terms. The former is contented to complain and continue to plead his cause.

Considering the articles emanating from the yellow journals of the United States relative to European royal families, with little regard to truth or good taste, the reprimand to Mylius seems rather far-fetched. There is no purveyor of scandal so harmful as the yellow journalist, yet the United States has a "yellow" journal business that puts all other countries to shame. When so many scandal mongers of the Mylius stamp reside within her borders, why does the Republic hold up only the foreigner to scorn?

Exit The Dynamiters

The famous dynamite conspiracy case has been concluded and the convicted Union officials have entered upon their terms of imprisonment in the penitentiary. Only two officials of the Ironworkers' Union are now at liberty.

In the struggle between capital and labor the conspiracy among officials of this union is unique. Daring, unscrupulous, the work of the dynamiters was typical of the worst element of the forces opposing the growing capitalism of the age. Human life was subordinated to vindictiveness of purpose. And in furthering the corrupted ideals of their own union, the officials did great harm to the many other labor unions whose purposes are honest and legitimate, based on the reasonable demands of labor upon capital.

Many of a thoughtless public would take ground on a case like that of the dynamiters, to condemn the labor union movement, as tending, as a whole, toward a combination of forces dangerous to the community. But those persons having knowledge of the actual benefit to the laboring classes of organization for their protection, will wisely isolate the record of flagrant law breaking in the Iron Workers' Union. Nor should it be forgotten that while methods of lawlessness can never be condoned, the methods employed by capital against labor are not always according to righteousness.

The Caterpillar Pest.

From Melbourne Ridge comes the report of a caterpillar nest contest, over nineteen thousand of these pests having been collected by the school children. This other instance of good work in the rural schools might prove a beneficial hint to agriculturists and educationalists. The rural school is an undeveloped, unappropriated opportunity for the dissemination of practical knowledge. If the Government interested the school children in the extermination of worm, insect and plant pests, the next generation of farmers would not need "demonstrations" by the Government to teach them what they might have acquired somewhere along the "royal road" of their school days.

Delhi, India, Jan. 4.—The Viceroy of India, Baron Hardinge, is not recovering as quickly as expected from the wounds he received on Dec. 23, when an Indian fanatic threw a bomb at him during his official entry to the new imperial capital. The doctors in attendance report he is suffering considerable pain and remains in a feverish condition. A further operation, it is said, will possibly be necessary in order to remove some fragments of the bomb which remain embedded in the flesh of his shoulder.

BRITONS CELEBRATE PITMAN CENTENARY

Inventor of Phonography
100 Years Ago To-day

CELEBRATIONS IN LONDON AND NEW YORK.

London, Jan. 4.—(Special)—In all English speaking countries throughout the world the centenary of the birth of Sir Isaac Pitman, inventor of phonography, the parent system of modern shorthand, was celebrated to-day with appropriate exercises. The celebration in this city, which was held under the direction of a committee headed by Sir Thomas Crosby, Lord Mayor of London, included exercises in all schools where shorthand is taught and a large gathering and banquet with addresses by noted exponents of the Pitman system and many public men interested in stenography. In New York also a celebration was held, under the auspices of a committee including many men of note, among them President-elect Woodrow Wilson, Andrew Carnegie, President Hadley of Yale University, Dr. William H. Maxwell, Prof. Brander Matthews, George B. Cortelyou and many others.

Isaac Pitman was born in the little town of Trowbridge, England, on January 4th, 1813. His father, Samuel Pitman, was overseer in one of the numerous cloth mills of Trowbridge, and raised a family of ten children, six of whom later became teachers. Isaac went to the grammar school of Trowbridge to receive the rudiments of an education, but showed no particular brilliancy in his attainments. Owing to the poor ventilation of the school Isaac's health broke down and at the age of thirteen he was compelled to leave school.

In 1834 Queen Victoria conferred the honor of Knighthood upon Mr. Pitman, in recognition of the great value of his invention. On Friday, Jan. 22, 1897, Sir Isaac died, and, in accordance with his wishes, his remains were cremated. His portrait, painted by A. S. Cope, A.R.A., was hung in the National Gallery.

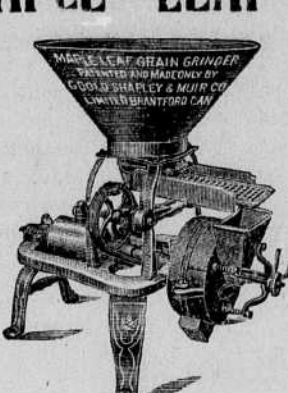

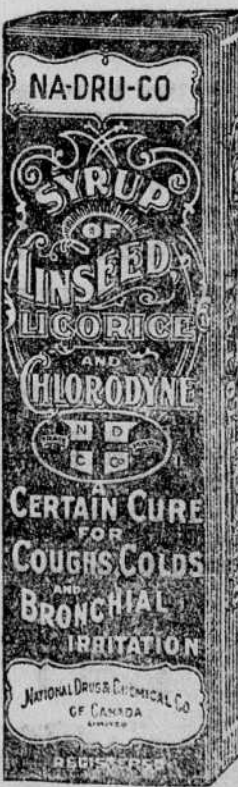

FREES LAST OF THE SERFS

All Russian Bondage
Legally Abandoned

PASSAGE OF LAW IS URGED PERSONALLY BY THE PREMIER.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 4.—The Council of the Empire yesterday adopted a law abolishing the last vestiges of serfdom in Russia. When the rescript of emancipation was issued in 1861 the Czar was expected from its provisions on account of special conditions there and temporary transitional measures were instituted pending the adoption of the most suitable method for giving the serfs their freedom. This transitional stage now, after half a century, has been terminated, though there was still opposition to its being abolished. Premier Kokovsov personally appeared before the Council of the Empire to urge the adoption of the new law. It already has passed the Duma.

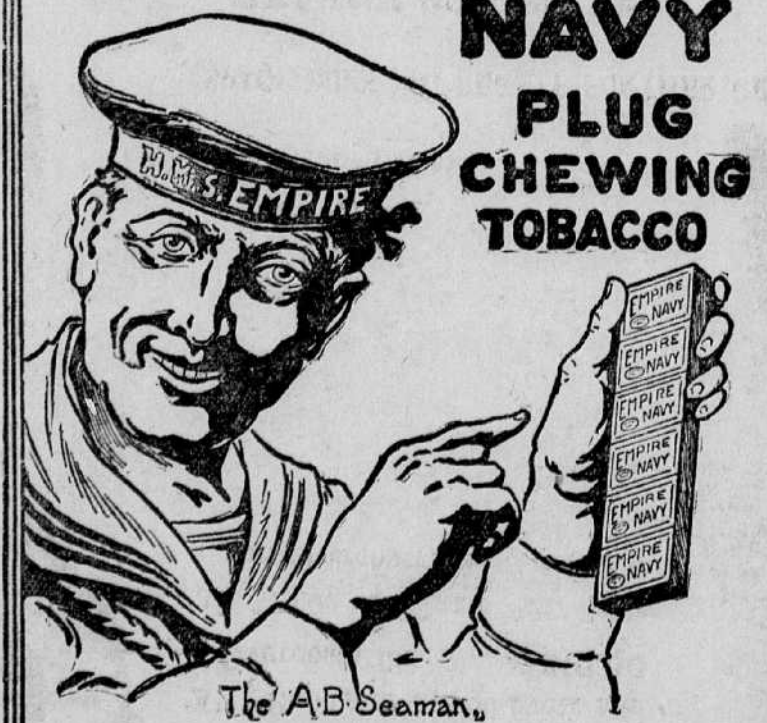
