TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

CABLE.

HALF MEASURES DEPRECATED.

LONDON, June 30.—The *Times* insists that every part of Ireland where the National League operates ought to be brought within the scope of the summary clauses of the Crimes Act. It would be absolutely useless, the *Times* maintains, to proclaim only a few counties, because the League could transfer its operations to adjacent counties.

CHURCH AND STATE IN FRANCE.

PARIS, June 30.—A majority of the committee of the Chamber of Deputies appointed to study the question of the separation of church and state, approve M. Boyssier's project for the abrogation of the concordat. The main articles of the scheme are as follows:—The Republic will respect all religions, but will grant subsidies or special privileges to none. The various regulations and laws will be repealed. The departments and communes will retake possession of the various religious edifices and real and personal properties. Ministers now in receipt of a government stipend of over 50 years of age will receive a life pension of 1,000 francs yearly; if under 50, they will be entitled to a lump sum, the maximum amount to be 800 francs. Citizens may form religious societies or syndicates without Government authorization under the laws relating to professional syndicates, and municipal councils will be empowered to let edifices to such syndicates.

AN IMPORTANT RAILWAY PROJECT.

BERLIN, June 30.—A movement which promises to become important will be begun this year. A regiment of engineers stationed here has undertaken a more extensive task than has been assumed in any previous year by military engineers. They propose to construct a private railway line in Mecklenburg, joining Wisemar and Carow by way of Sternberg, Brühl and Goldberg. The contractor for the line has concluded an arrangement with the colonel of the regiment according to which the whole work will be executed at the ordinary price. Operations will be begun directly, and the road will be finished by the autumn. If the experiment proves a success it is proposed to carry on similar operations on a grand scale and to employ military engineers in the construction of all state lines.

A LOYAL ADDRESS.

LONDON, June 30.—A number of loyal Irish Catholics, including the Earl of Fingall, the Earl of Granard, the Earl of Kenmare, Lord Fitzgerald, Lord de Freyne, Lord Bellow, Lord Emily, The O'Connor Don, Sir George Errington, and others who attended the jubilee ceremonies in London have sent to the Queen an address of loyalty and devotion.

BULLER TIRED OF IRELAND.

LONDON, June 30.—Gen. Sir Redvers Buller is represented as becoming tired of Ireland and the Irish, and this is the reason alleged by the *Globe* for the Government's intimated intention of proclaiming the National League in counties Cork, Kerry and Clare as soon as the Crimes Bill becomes a law. Gen. Buller has lately made repeated applications for restoration to his duties in the War Office, and it is said, was the first to suggest the proclamation of the districts named and the stationing there of a sufficient force of troops to enforce the proclamation.

CABLE NOTES.

Emperor William is now able to go out daily. Mr. Holmes, Attorney General for Ireland, has been appointed a judge.

Dr. Dollinger, who has been ill, is better. His illness was only indisposition incidental to old age.

AMERICAN.

A BAD EARTHQUAKE.

GUAYAGUIL, June 29.—The most violent earthquake experienced here since 1828 occurred this morning, at 6:20 o'clock, causing great alarm among the population, and lasting two minutes and two seconds. It had the northeast south west direction. All the clocks of the towns stopped at the hour named. The ceilings of several buildings fell, and it was feared much damage was done to the cities in the interior. No casualties are reported yet.

MR. BLAINE IN LONDON.

HE VISITS THE QUEEN AND PASSES HOURS WITH MR. GLADSTONE.

THE CRUISE OF THE CANOE CLUB.

A STORY FOR BOYS.

WITH NOTES BY A CANADIAN CANOEIST.

CHAPTER IX.

It was an easy matter to help Joe out of the old well. He had fallen into it while running after the wild-cat, but a heap of decayed leaves at the bottom broke the fall and saved him from any serious injury. Nevertheless, he might have been a little bit stunned at first, for he made no outcry for some time, and it was his first call for help that was heard by Charley.

The boys returned to their canoes, and, as it was not yet midnight, prepared to resume the sleep from which they had been so unceremoniously awakened. They had little fear that the wild-cat would pay them another visit, for it had undoubtedly been badly frightened. Still, it was not pleasant to think that there was a wild beast within a few rods of them, and the thought kept the canoeists awake for a long time.

The wild-cat did not pay them a second visit, and when they awoke the next morning they were half inclined to think that their night's adventure had been only a dream. There, however, were the marks made by its claws on the varnished deck of Joe's canoe, and Joe's clothing was torn and stained by his fall. With the daylight they became very courageous, and decided that they had never been in the least afraid of the animal. The so-called wild-cat of Canada, which is really a lynx, is, however, a fierce and vicious animal, and is sometimes more than a match for an unarmed man.

There was a strong west wind blowing when the fleet started, and Chamby Basin was covered with white-caps. As the canoes were sailing on the trough of the sea they took in considerable water while skirting the east shore of the Basin, but once in the narrow river they found the water perfectly smooth. This day the fleet made better progress than on any previous day. Nothing could be more delightful than the scenery, and the quaint little French towns along the river, every one of which was named after some saint, were very interesting. The boys landed at one of them and got their dinner at a little tavern where no one spoke English, and where Charley, who had studied French at Annapolis, on the admiration of his comrades by the success with which he ordered the dinner.

With the exception of the hour spent at dinner, the canoeists sailed, from six o'clock in the morning until seven at night, at the rate of nearly six miles an hour. The clocks of Sorel, the town at the mouth of the Richelieu, were striking six as the canoes glided into the broad St. Lawrence and steered for a group of islands distant about a mile from the south shore. It was while crossing the St. Lawrence that they first made the acquaintance of screw-steamers, and learned how dangerous they are to the careless canoeist. A big steamship, on her way to Montreal, came up the river so noiselessly that the boys did not notice her until they heard her hoarse whistle warning them to keep out of her way. A paddle-wheel steamer can be heard while she is a long way off, but screw-steamers glide along so stealthily that the English canoeists, who constantly meet them on the Mersey, the Clyde, and the lower Thames, have nicknamed them "sudden death."

Cramped and tired were the canoeists when they reached the nearest island and went ashore to prepare a camp, but they were proud of having sailed sixty miles in one day. As they sat around the fire after supper Harry said, "Boy's, we've experienced enough by this time to test our different rigs. Let's talk about them a little."

"All right," said Joe. "I want it understood, however, that my lateen is by all odds the best rig in the fleet."

"Charley," remarked Tom, "you said the other day that you liked Joe's rig better than any other. Do you think so still?"

"Of course I do," answered Charley. "Joe's sails set flatter than any lug-sail; he can set them and take them in quicker than we can handle ours, and as they are triangular he has the most of his canvas at the foot of the sail instead of at the head. But they're going to spill him before the cruise is over, or I'm mistaken."

"In what way?" asked Joe.

"You are going to get yourself into a scrape some day by trying to take in your sails when you are running before a stiff breeze. If you try to get the sail down without coming up into the wind it will get overboard, and either you will lose it or it will capsize you; you tried it yesterday when a squall came up, and you very nearly came to grief."

THE FARMERS OF HALDIMAND apparently do not believe that commercial union between Canada and the United States would bring about a separation from Great Britain and annexation to the United States, for they have held a jubilee picnic in honor of the Queen as loyal subjects and seized the opportunity to pass resolutions in favor of commercial union.

IF REPORTS be true King Kalakaua has at least one recourse against the insurgents who are reported to be going for him in a particularly lively fashion. He has a back yard plentifully stored with empty bottles, which he has accumulated by an increasing devotion to the duty of emptying their contents into himself during his kingship. Poor Kalakaua! He was not afraid of journalists in the Sandwich Islands, and he even composed a National Anthem, but he is a very poor king.

ALL THE RUMORS about changes in the Ministry seem to have come to nothing. Mr. Chapleau has been somehow induced to retain his position of galling subordination to Sir Hector Langevin and Sir Charles Tupper retains his double function of running the country on both sides of the Atlantic. He will of course not enjoy the salary of High Commissioner while he remains a Cabinet Minister, but he will not fail to have it made up to him, for Sir Charles is nothing where he is not practical.

ONE RESULT of the breaking up of parties that has taken place in Great Britain from the introduction of Mr. Gladstone's Home Rule Bill, is that the press has become wonderfully independent. A few years ago it would have been as impossible for the Standard to denounce the spirited foreign policy of Lord Salisbury, as it now is for the Montreal Gazette to refrain from a resort to its favorite argument of expediency when under stress of exigencies. By the way, if it is wrong to lie on behalf of the crown, as the Gazette just now says it is, is it not wrong to lie when political exigencies demand it.

ADVICES from Bombay and Simla as to the progress of the rebellion in Afghanistan are contradictory. Bombay has a large trade with Afghanistan and information from there comes through merchants, who, it is said, are ready to declare that the Ameer has been overthrown if a caravan is stopped. On the other hand, Simla is, in the hot season, the political capital of India and reports from there are apt to be colored according to the wishes of the rulers of India. There can be little doubt, however, that the Ameer will be able to put down the rebellion. He has money and comparatively effective arms supplied by England, and both will be used to good purpose as soon as he is convinced of the need of doing so. He is parsimonious and dislikes spending money.

AMERICAN YACHTSMEN fear that the Scottish yacht "Thistle," which has proved such

a flyer in her transatlantic races, will bear away the America's Cup this season. The New York Times tries to show that the "Mayflower" is a faster yacht in a moderate or steady breeze than the "Thistle." Its argument is that as the "Mayflower" beat the "Gialtea" by thirteen minutes, over a thirty-six mile course, and as the "Irex" is only about six minutes faster than the "Gialtea" over a forty mile course, the "Mayflower" ought to beat the "Thistle," which is only one minute and three seconds faster, over a fifty mile course than the "Irex." There seems to be a good deal of difference, however, between the British idea of a moderate breeze and the American one. In her Scottish race the "Thistle" made the fifty miles in twenty minutes less than the "Mayflower" took to do thirty-six miles. Strong tides could not alone make a difference of about two minutes a mile in speed.

JAKE SHARP, the man who bribed the New York hoodlum aldermen to give him the franchise of the Broadway Street Railway Company, has been convicted, and will probably have an opportunity of studying penitentiary life from the interior of Sing Sing for a term of years. The hoodlums who have already been sent to prison, were the mere tools of Sharp, and although their crime was greater than his, because they betrayed the trust of the people and forswore themselves, still, as the tempter, his crime is a heinous one. In face of the fact that all the men interested in this job have been driven out of the country or imprisoned, while the Canadian hoodlums—and we have several whose acts were quite as criminal as those of Jaehue and McQuade—continue to sit in Parliament and even to hold office, who will dare to assert that political morality is higher in Canada than it is in the United States! The brace of billers who were taken red-handed in Toronto, bribing members of the Legislature, were not convicted, though their guilt was undoubted. Hitherto people have been satisfied with punishing the bribed, so that it is a distinct step forward when a man like Sharp is convicted and punished. A victory over corruption in the United States will lead to victories of the same kind in Canada.

CARDINAL MANNING'S DENIAL for himself and Archbishop Walsh of the Times' charge that they were separatists is valid, so far at least as he himself is concerned, and is reassuring. The Times defends its position with regard to him by explaining that it had looked upon him as a supporter of Mr. Gladstone's policy. This is on the face of it a false argument. We very much fear that Mr. Gladstone's policy is separatist in its tendency, and object to it on that score, but we should hold it simply absurd to regard Mr. Gladstone as separatist in his desires and aims. If it be possible for the constructor of an apparently separatist policy to be no separatist himself, it is evidently possible for a supporter of that policy to be no separatist. Cardinal Manning will probably point out to the Times that his own professions and teachings in favor of perpetual union between England and Ireland are a better guide to his intent in the matter than is any argument based on the supposed tendency of the policy he supports. It will be in order for Archbishop Walsh to back Cardinal Manning's statement as to his being also a Unionist. We are inclined to think he will not do this. If he is a Unionist he will be one "in to himself," as the saying is, as he would lose much of the influence he now enjoys by proclaiming it. We shall see, however, whether we have judged him fairly.

THE QUARREL between the King and Queen of Serbia has reached an acute stage, and as it is a political one it may lead to national troubles, and not improbably to revolution. Serbia is a bone of contention between Austria and Russia, both of which hope to possess it when the sick man dies and the contemplated division of the Balkan peninsula between the great powers takes place. King Milan is pro-Austrian in his sympathies, and it was generally supposed that he undertook the Bulgarian campaign in order to extend the range of Austria's protectorate. When he came to grief Austria stepped forward and prevented Prince Alexander from annihilating him, and since then King Milan has been little more than an Austrian satrap. Queen Nathalie, on the other hand, is an ardent pro-Russian, and has been intriguing against her husband, whom she despises since the failure of his campaign. Recently, when King Milan set off for Vienna to consult the Emperor of Austria, she went in an opposite direction to Russia to consult the Czar. Queen Nathalie has a son whom she would like to set upon the throne at once, she to act as Regent. The majority of the people of Serbia are Slavic and Russian rather than Austrian in sentiment. Premier Ristich, whom the King was forced to accept as his adviser, is the head of the Slavic party. This party is, however, more inclined to secure Prince Karageorgevitch as their sovereign than the heir of King Milan, though he is also the son of Queen Nathalie. The attempt of the King to exile the Queen will do him little good even if it prove successful. If the sentiment of the people was not against him, he would have little cause to fear the Queen's intrigues. Her assistance is not material to the Slavic party. It is probable that King Milan's position has become untenable.

WHO PAYS THE DUTY.

We do not quite agree with one of the speakers at the Ontario County Farmers' Institute who said that as to the question whether it was the producer or the consumer that paid the duty there was no rule. In the case of barley going from Canada to the United States it was the producer who paid it. In the case of coal coming from the United States into Canada it was the consumer who paid it. The rule is that in both cases it is the Canadian who pays the duty. Why is it that the producer pays the duty in the case of barley? Because the American market is six times as great as ours and rules the price. The addition by commercial union of all the barley raised in Canada to the American market would not lower the price there; so that the change would be a clear gain of the whole duty to the Canadian farmers. Why is it that the consumer pays the duty in the case of coal? Because the American market is so vast in proportion to the Canadian that no fluctuation in the Canadian demand would appreciably alter the price in the States, which would remain the same if the Canadian duty were removed, making the Canadian consumer the richer by the whole duty. Why is it that no changes in our relations with the United States would affect the price of dairy produce on either side of the line? Because the great market for these is in England and as both countries more than supply their own wants neither needs to import from the other. The same is the case with wheat except under unusual circumstances. It has occurred that Canada could not supply all her own wants and had to import and pay duty. The rule then is that it is the dwellers in the smaller market that pay the duty. There are some commodities, such as fish, produced in Canada, for which the larger market is outside of the United States and, being importers of fish, the Americans have to pay the duty on that. This is the case to a considerable extent also with lumber, which is the particular interest which is fighting most actively in the United States against reciprocity, and which is doing all it can to arouse anti-Canadian sentiments on every false scent it can devise.

THE SATURDAY HALF-HOLIDAY.

The hours of work for nine-tenths of our people are never too short; but at this season of the year six whole days of toil in a week become a weariness—and often an injury—to body and mind and soul. The clerks in most of our offices and wholesale stores enjoy the Saturday half-holiday. A number of leading manufacturing establishments have given their men the same privilege, and it is hoped the rest will display the same progressive spirit before long. But perhaps the class of workers most to be pitied is that of salesmen (and saleswomen too, unhappily) in retail stores, who not only work in the regular working hours of every day, but have their toil prolonged until late in the evening. Instead of having a little respite on the last day of the week, their fatigue is turned into exhaustion by extra work. It is pleasant to know that a number of retailers—most, if not all of them, down town—close at six on ordinary days; and the number who close at one on Saturday is increasing hopefully every summer. Mr. Carsley is going to give his employees the Saturday half-holiday during July and August, and we shall be glad if our readers will send us the names of all other firms who are showing the same wisdom: for an employer is just as wise from a financial point of view, in shortening the present exhausting hours of labor, as the engineer in giving his machinery a chance to cool, or the farmer in letting his land lie fallow a while. Newspapers were embarrassed in urging the Saturday half holiday by the fact that it seemed impossible to apply it to their own business. At last the Witness took the leaf of probably all the afternoon newspapers in the world by daring to do itself what it had so long and persistently advised others to do. The experiment has proved so far successful that the Witness has been able to continue the practice for more than a year through all seasons. Its example is now followed by the Star, which finds that public opinion amply supports the effort to shorten the hours of labor. We must urge our advertisers to aid and abet the newspapers in this effort by preparing and sending in all their Saturday advertising on Friday.

THE SCARCITY OF DWELLINGS.

Emigrants and others arriving in this city still find it very difficult to rent dwellings. Some families of five or six have to accommodate themselves as best they can with one room, and feel thankful after a day's search to be able to rent even that.

THE FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH.

The voting was by ballot, and never in the records of the church has there been such unity of opinion, the utmost harmony prevailing, and every member present voting in the affirmative.

POISONED WATER.

A MONTREAL DOCTOR'S INDICTMENT OF LEAD PIPES.

The last number of the *Journal d'Hygiene Publique*, published in this city, contains an article by Dr. C. V. Barry on the evil effects of the lead pipes used in the distribution of water to the water-works in Montreal. Among other things, the doctor says: "With a lead pipe, the water in your tap, wholesome in front of your residence, wholesome while in the iron pipe, is no longer drinkable when you draw it. It contains lead, a poisonous metal whose effects are terrible on the human system, even when taken in very small quantities." Dr. Barry then refers to experiments made by a chemist, Mr. Starnes, who

in water passing, even rapidly, through lead pipes. He states that after remaining in such pipes for twelve hours,—which is a very frequent occurrence in Montreal,—the water contains 1.221 milligrams of lead. The doctor then goes on to say that with Drs. V. Lafard, Cleroux, Jeannot and Desrochers, he, a few weeks ago, found cases of poisoning by means of lead when coming through the water pipes. Two of the patients are said to be seriously poisoned. The article concludes as follows:—"These facts are serious; they are alarming for the population of Montreal, the whole of which, with very few exceptions, drinks the same water;" and Dr. Barry then suggests the adoption of pewter pipes covered with lead.

A SINK OF THE COMMITTEE.

A FRENCH-CANADIAN IDEA OF THE CUSTOMS REVENUES.

Speaking of the Ayer case, *L'Etendard* says: "A case, the hearing of which has just commenced in the Exchequer Court, that of the Crown vs. Ayer, has brought to light some terrible facts of corruption, robbery, perjury, etc., that we question if ever such iniquities have been perpetrated in any other country in such a criminal manner, and on so large a scale as seems to be practised in Canada."

Further on, the same article says:—"Since the leaders of the nation are allowed to get rich and hold power through fraud and crime, why should not simple public officials, Customs clerks, however high their position in the service, enlarge their small fortunes by fraud, lies, intrigue and rascality, as their masters do? Such is the terrible reasoning which the sanction given to all the iniquities perpetrated in high levels inspires and causes to prevail among the people."

IMPORTERS AROUSED.

A PROTECTIVE ASSOCIATION TO BE ORGANIZED.

A movement is on foot for the organization of an Importers' Protective Association. Mr. Robertson, of the Exchequer Court, was reported as having said to a *Witness* reporter: "There is nothing done at present, but it is proposed, and the proposition has been received with favor, that the Dry Goods Association should be reorganized on an enlarged basis, to take in all importers. The newly formed organization will probably be in connection with the Board of Trade. No meeting to discuss the matter has yet been held or called. I most certainly anticipate that the association will be formed."

IRISH IMMIGRANTS' STATEMENTS.

The *Post* is trying to keep up the little illusion that because certain Irish immigrants were reported as having said to a *Witness* reporter that all Irish tenants were not so hard up as sometimes represented, and because some members of the same party disclaimed having given the information, therefore the information was not given, but was maliciously concocted by the *Witness*. Perhaps there are some people who believe the *Post* when it lets its imagination and its pen loose upon the *Witness*; but we are not very sure. If there are, they may like to know that the conversation as reported took place in the presence of the Government Immigration Agent Mr. Marquette.

ST. PETER'S DAY.

The members of L'Union St. Pierre celebrated the feast of their patron saint yesterday with the usual solemnity. A procession took place in the morning through the principal streets of the East End, after which the members attended divine service at the Church of St. Vincent de Paul. Mass was celebrated by Vicar-General Marechal and the Rev. Mr. Eremont, Chaplain of the Hochelega Convent, delivered the sermon. Representatives of the several French Canadian societies were present, and after the return of the processionists to their hall a number of addresses were delivered.

PERSONAL.

The Rev. Mr. Hamon, of the Seminary, left yesterday for a two months' voyage to Europe. Extensive preparations are being made at St. Boniface, Manitoba, for a reception to Archbishop Taché, who will shortly return to his diocese.

Miss Macpherson, of Kingston, Ont., niece of Sir John Macdonald, is acting as hostess at Earncliffe during the absence of Lady Macdonald, who is at present salmon fishing at Bathurst, N.B.

Very general satisfaction is expressed around the City Hall and in police circles at the promotion of Acting-Sergeant Carpenter to the position of detective. Detective Carpenter will enter upon his new duties on Monday next.

Among the small minority of Nonconformist ministers in England who have not yet followed Mr. Gladstone in support of Home Rule for Ireland are mentioned Dr. Munro Gibson (son-in-law of the late Dr. Wilkes), Dr. Dale, Mr. Spurgeon, Mr. Newman Hall, Dr. Allan, Dr. Bruce and Principal Cairns.

An English paper, speaking of Principal Chapman receiving McGill's LL.D., remarks of his present duties (as Principal of Western College, Plymouth):—"These duties he has discharged with credit to himself and advantage to the College, the usefulness of which is so much felt throughout the West of England. Western College, which was founded in 1752, is one of the oldest connected with the Congregational communion."

CITY ITEMS.

The visiting governors to the Notre Dame Hospital for the week beginning June 27th, are Messrs. H. Beauregard and H. B. Rainville.

Attention is directed to the change of time of the Oddfellows' picnic to Highgate on Dominion Day, from 8 a.m. to 9.30 a.m., which is considered a more reasonable hour for families going to this pleasant resort for a day's outing.

Mr. H. W. Baker, the husband of the woman Mary J. Fox, who attempted to leave the city with another man, a few days ago, has taken in the High Consolable's hands, a seizure on the money which she was carrying away with her, and which she alleges is her own.

PRESENTATIONS.

The friends of Mr. Denis Tansey entertained him to a complimentary dinner at the Grand Hotel yesterday evening, on the occasion of his marriage, which took place this morning. Mr. J. D. Purcell, President of the Emerald Snow-shoe Club, occupied the chair, and on behalf of the friends assembled presented a valuable pitcher of hand-painted china, with silver mountings and silver goblets. The employees of the Post Office also made a valuable presentation to Mr. Tansey.

The employees of *L'Etendard* have presented their former Managing Director, Mr. J. A. Frensdorff, now cashier of the Hochelega Bank, with a splendid cane, bearing an appropriate inscription. Mr. A. Senecal, formerly manager of the job department of *L'Etendard*, succeeds Mr. Frensdorff as manager.

THE AYER CASE.

MORE SENSATIONAL PROCEEDINGS AT OTTAWA.

(From Our Special Correspondent.) OTTAWA, June 30.—The Ayer case was resumed this morning, Underhill's cross-examination being continued by Mr. Macmaster. In reply to questions, he said that he knew Brickett, of Lowell. Did not remember having a conversation with him in July, 1883. Did not remember telling him that the Ayers were strange forward and honorable business people. Mr. Ferguson took exception to the question as being irrelevant, but was overruled, the Judge holding that a witness was now trying to bring out the character of the Ayers it was open to the defence to show that he had expressed a contrary opinion.

The examination being continued, witness admitted that he might have used favorable language regarding the Ayers. If he did so, it would be to influence Brickett, as he came occasionally to Montreal.

Mr. Macmaster—"Did you not speak the truth sometimes, spontaneously?"

Witness—"Not after I came to Canada."

Mr. Macmaster—"You were utterly demoralized, were you?"

Witness—"Perhaps so." Witness said he felt uncomfortable in Canada latterly. He felt so, because he had not succeeded.

Mr. Macmaster—"You were sorry to leave Ayer?"

Witness—"Yes, I was sorry." Witness added in a low tone some words which Mr. Macmaster took exception to, and the Judge ordered the words to be struck out. Mr. Ferguson with the Court, but the Judge summarily refused to listen to an attempt to procure a change in his ruling, stating that he believed the witness had not been unfairly treated or examined too severely.

The examination being resumed, Mr. Macmaster asked, "According to your evidence, the Ayers appear to have asked you to do things dishonorable to you as a man?"

Witness—"You assented to my doing so."

Mr. Macmaster—"You did not regard them as enemies then?"

Witness—"No, I did not."

Mr. Macmaster—"Did you not respect Ayer, and regard him as a man?"

The witness hesitated to reply, and the Judge ordered him to "speak up."

Mr. Macmaster—"If he was a swindler and scoundrel you could not respect him."

Witness—"I did not respect him always."

Some other questions were put, to which the

witness gave quibbling replies. The Chief Justice reprimanded him, and said, "It is no trouble to answer frankly if a man wants to tell the truth. It is always when he does not want to tell the truth that trouble arises, and then he gives himself away to the lawyer."

Proceeding, the witness said that Frederick Ayer might have the reputation of being an honest and honorable man, for all he knew. He was something of a machine when he worked for the Ayers.

The Hon. Mr. Bowell, Minister of Customs, being in waiting for examination, Underhill was asked to stand aside. Mr. Bowell, being sworn, was examined by Mr. Macmaster. He said he had a conversation with Broseau regarding the Ayer case. He had never told Broseau that an offer of \$30,000 had been made to settle the case, by him (Macmaster) as sworn by Broseau in Montreal. Had telegraphed to Mr. Ryan, Collector of Montreal, on seeing the evidence, and had received reply saying that he could not recall any such conversation. A settlement had been made with Ayer & Company through Mr. Black, of St. John's, regarding medicines containing spirits. The settlement did not apply to other transactions. Mr. Bowell's examination was continued at considerable length on technical matters connected with his department.

Mr. Underhill's cross-examination being resumed, the witness said that since he had left the box he remembered an answer to a question put to him previously, to which he could not think of a reply at the time—regarding a dishonorable transaction on the part of Ayer. The transaction was in 1864.

Mr. Macmaster said the question was regarding Ayer's conduct as the head of the firm. The Chief Justice held that to go back to 1864 was exceeding proper limits. He was anxious to have a fair investigation, but thought the range desired too long.

A letter, dated April 22nd, 1882, was read from Underhill to Ayer, assuring the latter that he appreciated the kind spirit in which he had advised him regarding his personal conduct, about which complaints had been made. He said he looked upon Ayer as a true friend during twenty-two years of employment with him, and in all that time could not recall a single instance in which the utmost kindness had not been shown him. He said it was true he was his own worst enemy. Underhill admitted the letter to be his, and could not account for his change of opinion as shown in his evidence. After some further questions regarding the importation of goods, Underhill's cross-examination was concluded. The Court then adjourned for fifteen minutes.

MR. O'HARA'S DENIAL.

(To the Editor of the Witness.)

SIR,—I am shocked to find my evidence in the Ayer case so grossly misrepresented and commented upon by the Montreal press as to impugn my character and reputation for honesty and truthfulness. I shall take the earliest occasion after the termination of the proceedings here to have myself righted in this matter. Simple justice to me as well as to yourself and the public demands a correction of the report and a discontinuance of the discussion until you are in possession of the real facts.
