## QUEBEC BILL UP AGAIN YESTERDAY

### Passed Through Private Bills Committee Of Legislature Yesterday Morning

The City Bill asking for amendments to the charter of the City of Quebec, and permission to borrow \$700,000, not including the subsequent request for \$100,000 for the building of an Industrial Palace in connection with the Quebec exhibition, which was definitely objected to the day previous by Premier Taschereau, passed through the Private Bills Committee of the Legislative Assembly yesterday morning, when the amount in the borrowing powers granted the city on Monday of \$495,000 was further increased to \$595,000. The addition given by permission of the \$100,000 borrowing powers granted last year by the Legislature that had not been used, and to be placed to the credit of this year's permanent improvements, etc.

Several additional clauses were added to the bill through objections made to their introduction at the last moment, one of these amendments adopted was to give the city assessors the right to do the work on the valuation of immovable property from 1st October to end of November instead of from May 1st, and the right of supplementing valuation in new properties being erected from May to end of August. In asking for the adoption of the amendment, City Attorney Chapleau K.C., explained that the city desired to change the date of valuation of property, in order to guide them in preparing their budget in the spring.

The clause granting an additional Alderman in the St. Sauveur Ward was also adopted, and the city was accorded the power to create a sporting commission, but refused the request for the right to name a commission on city establishment.

When the Legislative Committee on Private and Public Bills was called to order by the chairman, Mr. Tascher, M.L.A. for Rimouski, who presided yesterday, it was observed that the crowd of citizens was small in comparison to the day previous, which went to show that the citizens, either took no interest in municipal affairs, or were absolutely apathetic in regard to municipal politics. The only Minister in attendance at the committee meeting was Hon. Mr. A. Galipeau with the four Quebec City members, Messrs. L. A. Cannon, L. Letourneau, M. Madden and A. Paquet. The city was represented by Mayor Samson and Mr. Chapleau, K.C., City Attorney, and the citizens by Mr. L. Demers, K.C., Mr. H. E. Lavigneur, M.P., who watched the proceedings and at times made timely comments in opposition to several of the amendment clauses.

The amendments to the charter by clauses passed yesterday were as follows:-

To effect such loan, the city may issue bonds or inscribed stock certificates when it may deem the same necessary for the objects above mentioned; which bonds or stock certificates shall be for such sum as the city may deem suitable and shall be payable at a space of time not exceeding thirty years from the date thereof at such rate of interest not exceeding six per cent as the council may determine.

The city may, by resolution declare that the said loan shall be repaid at a shorter term in not less than two and not more than fifteen years, at such rate of interest, not exceeding six per cent, as the council may fix, with a sinking fund of not less than two per cent, per annum, provided that each issue after the first shall be only for the balance due on the loan.

The city shall provide for the payment of the bonds or inscribed stock certificates, the issue whereof is authorized by section 7, either by paying the capital of the said bonds

or inscribed stock certificates half yearly or yearly at its option, a sum sufficient so that at the maturity of each bond or inscribed stock certificate the capital shall be paid, or by establishing a sinking fund in such manner as it may deem advisable, sufficient to pay the capital at maturity, such sinking fund shall not be used for any other purpose than the payment of the bonds or inscribed stock certificates.

Article 29 of the Act 29 Victoria, Chapter 57, as amended by the Acts 5, George V., Chapter 88, Section 5; 5, George V., Chapter 48, Section 5; 5, George V., Chapter 89, Section 7, is again amended:

a. By adding the following paragraph to paragraph 11a:  
"11b. To compel second-hand stores to keep registers in which shall be entered the name and address of persons from whom they buy any effects or merchandise whatsoever, with a description of the article bought, with register they must show the police or any other person in authority, on demand."

b. By adding the following paragraph after paragraph 65a:  
"65b. To allow, under such conditions and restrictions as the city may impose, the circulation of automobiles and the establishment, maintenance and exploitation of lines of automobiles in the city of Quebec; prescribe in what streets such vehicles shall circulate and where such lines may be established and from what streets they may be excluded, subject to the provisions of articles 1388 to 1485 of the Revised Statutes, 1909, respecting the motor vehicles, as regards the maximum of speed, the registration of vehicles and licenses of the owners and chauffeurs."

Article 25 of the Act 29 Victoria, Chapter 57, is repealed and replaced by the following:  
"The properties of incorporated institutions of education or charity employed or used for educational or charitable purposes shall be free from the tax."

The city is authorized to subscribe an amount of five thousand dollars for the erection of a monument to the memory of Cardinal Taschereau, such amount to be paid at the rate of two thousand five hundred dollars per annum out of the ordinary revenue of the city.

Notwithstanding any provision of the law to the contrary, when the city shall be called upon to repay the long term loan authorized by 51-52 Victoria, Chapter 78, Section 53 Victoria, Chapter 88, Section 25; 55-56 Victoria, Chapter 50, Sections 13, and 15; 57 Victoria, Chapter 28, Section 11, it may, by resolution of the council repay such loans by means of other long term loans according to the provisions of articles 2 and 4 above.

The city may, moreover, if it deems advisable by resolution declare that the loans shall be repaid by short term loans in not less than two years nor more than fifteen years, at such rate of interest not exceeding six per cent per annum as the council may determine, and with a sinking fund of not less than two per cent per annum, provided that the first issue shall be solely for the balance due on the said loans.

Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, when the city shall be called upon to repay any loan, whether for a long or for a short term at maturity, it may, by resolution of its council declare that such loan shall be repaid within a short period of not less than two nor more than fifteen years years, at such rate of interest not exceeding six per cent, per annum provided that each issue after the first one shall be solely for the balance due on the loan.

Section 12 of the Act 7, George V., Chapter 57, as amended by Section 16 of the Act 14, George V., Chapter 110, is again amended by adding at the end of the said section the following paragraph:  
"The third alderman of St. Sauveur ward shall be elected by the electors whose names are on the list for the election of an alderman whose seat is designated by the number 2, and his qualifications shall be that prescribed for the seat number 2."

Article 18 of Chapter 72 of the Act 4, George V., is amended by replacing the said article by the following:  
"18 That part of the municipality of Little River situate within the following boundaries: bounded on the east and one the south by the city of Quebec; on the west by, and including the road commonly called Bell's road, and on the north by and including the Little River Rd. which is the prolongation of St. Valier street, as far as its intersection with the said Bell's road; shall be annexed to the city of Quebec for all purposes whatsoever, (both school and municipal)."

## ARMED BANDS RAIDED NORTHERN IRELAND

immediate steps to insure the release of the prisoners and provide against any recurrence of these grave outrages.

Mr. Chamberlain's statement was made in reply to a hot protest from Captain Charles Craig, member for Antrim South and a brother of the Ulster Premier who challenged the Government to make clear its policy of the boundary question. He warned the Government that bloodshed was inevitable as the northern Government would not allow the marauders from the Free State to invade their territory and kidnap and blow up bridges.

Mr. Chamberlain after reading his telegram to Michael Collins and the Commander in Northern Ireland, added that one reason the Government was anxious to get statutory authority for the provision of a government was that the provisional government might have authority to prevent law breaking and if necessary to punish the law breakers. The message from Col. Spender read by Mr. Chamberlain repeated the details of the excesses known to have been committed, and added that the northern police had captured eleven men who it was proved belonged to the Irish Republican army from Longford and Leitrim, and who were in possession of bombs, revolvers and transport.

Replying to charges by Captain Craig that the Government had made a deliberate attempt to placate South Ireland at the expense of Northern Ireland, Mr. Chamberlain denied that Ulster's rights would be prejudiced by the appointment of a boundary commission. He also repudiated the suggestion that the Government had broken faith. He did not despair of a settlement being reached between Sir James Craig and Michael Collins, but even so, he declared, the treaty would provide a settlement in an impartial commission with an impartial chairman to which both sides could urge their claims.

In the House of Commons, said Winston Spencer Churchill, said the Government has received from Michael Collins a telegram to the effect that the outbreak on the Ulster frontier was not due to any question of a boundary dispute as had been suggested but to anxiety and apprehension as to the fate of the prisoners in Londonderry under sentence of death. These sentences had been commuted by the Lord Lieutenant the Minister added, but the association had led to violence on the frontier. Mr. Collins said he had made special efforts to prevent these acts of violence although he had not been aware of any act of violence.

Michael Collins, head of the Provisional Government of Southern Ireland, replied tonight to the British Government's representations concerning the kidnappings in Northern Ireland. He said these had been due to apprehensions regarding the men under sentence of death at Londonderry, but that the Government was doing its utmost to ensure the safe return to their homes of those kidnapped.

Collins' Statement.

Dublin, Feb. 8.—Michael Collins, head of the Provisional Government interviewed this afternoon with reference to the raids in North Ireland said:

"It is what I feared and what any sensible person would expect. Naturally the people whose feelings were outraged by the impending Derry executions would take some action of this kind, and the blame lies with those who delayed until the last moment a decision of the fate of the Derry prisoners."

It is believed in authoritative circles here that the release of the captured Ulstermen will be speedily arranged now that the Derry prisoners have been reprieved. (Announcement of the reprieve of the three Sinn Feiners sentenced to be executed February 9 in the Londonderry Jail was made from Belfast late yesterday.)

It is stated here that when Mr. Collins was in London recently, he made urgent representations to the British authorities warning them as to what would be likely to happen. He said he thought the exasperation in County Monaghan at the detention of the men, however, was so keen that some of those taken by the raiders today would be held until the Monaghan men in Londonderry were released.

the Merchants Bank, and J. D. G. Kipper, Manager of the Montreal Branch, had been replaced. He charged that their reports furnished to the directors were "grossly incomplete."

With reference to the bank's loans to Thornton Davidson & Co., bankrupt stock broking firm, Sir Montagu said that when the bank's books closed at the end of April 1918, advances to the firm stood at \$579,200 against securities which apparently left a good margin in the bank's favor. These advances, however, gradually increased without the authorization of the Board of Directors, amounted to about \$4,500,000 against securities "lamentably deficient."

"It now appears," he said, "that the bank is involved in a loss of about four millions". The bank through loans which went far beyond the bounds of prudence" lost about one million dollars in the failure of the Exclusive Ladies' Wear Limited, and allied companies, Sir Montagu said. These loans had also had been without the authority of the Board of Directors.

City Attorney Chapleau again presented an additional clause, giving powers to the city to build subways at Bell's Road and on Beauport Road if the Railway Commission gives such order. This the Committee agreed to, also authorizing the city to utilise \$7,000 already borrowed for permanent works.

City Attorney Chapleau next announced that the city wanted to borrow \$5,000 to complete purchase of all rights to Berthelot Market property held, which was valued at \$45,000. The request was granted, and the Bill adopted as amended.

the Board of Directors of the bank. "It would be inadvisable," he said, "in the interest of customers, to give other similar instances of losses resulting in the Montreal office in accounts on credits which the directors were not made aware of."

"The bank's shareholders may fairly enquire why its directors permitted such adventurous banking to be carried on. The answer is that it was done without the authority of the Directors."

Sir Montagu continued, detailing the steps that had been taken in learning the condition of the bank through an investigation by the President and Vice-President and H. B. MacKenzie, former General Manager of the Bank of British North America.

Discussing the condition of affairs, Sir Montagu said the directors were faced with alternatives "to try and carry on the bank in a crippled condition, taking the risk of losing public confidence and all that means to a bank, or, on the other hand to open negotiations for disposal of the bank's assets to another bank."

Sir Montagu deprecated the suggestion that "your directors stamped into a bargain with the Bank of Montreal", pointing out that heavy borrowing from the Dominion Government or the attempt to turn over the bank's assets to a number of banks, would have resulted in the broadcasting of the bank's true condition with probable disastrous occurrences on the exchange and "run" on the bank's branches. The resolution submitted by Sir Montagu consisted of the terms of the agreement between the Merchants Bank and the Bank of Montreal, whereby the latter consented to acquire the assets and liabilities of the former and to give one share of Bank of Montreal stock in exchange for two shares of Merchants Bank stock and a cash bonus of ten dollars a share which would amount to \$1,050,000.

Govt. Permission Necessary

Ottawa, Feb. 8.—Now that the shareholders of the Merchants Bank of Canada have agreed to the absorption of their institution by the Bank of Montreal, permission of the government will be necessary before the two banks can be merged.

Following the meeting of the Merchants Bank shareholders, application must be made to the government for authority to go on with the undertaking. This application will be dealt with by the Treasury Board and permission will be granted if the board sees fit to do so. There is no reason to think that it will be refused in the case of the Merchants Bank and the Bank of Montreal.

### BURY SHACKLETON IN SOUTH GEORGIA

#### Last Resting Place Of Explorer Will Be The Gateway To Antarctic

Montevideo, Uruguay, Feb. 8.—The body of Sir Ernest Shackleton is to find its last resting place on South Georgia Island, not because the explorer died there but because it is the gateway to the Antarctic—the scenes of his explorations. It has been learned that the decision to bury the body there was taken by Lady Shackleton who is acting in the belief that she is fulfilling her husband's wishes. It became known today that definite instructions had been received in England to return the body to South Georgia.

# Chicoutimi 4 Voltigeurs 1; Hamilton And Canadiens Won

## CHICOUTIMI SCORED SECOND WIN OVER THE VOLTIGEURS ON LATTER'S OWN HOME ICE

Four To Three Victory Practically Gives Winners The Championship—Combination Play Of Visitors Was Treated To Watch—Checking Was Close Throughout

Playing a combination game the like of which has not been witnessed around here since the Sons of Ireland had their famous team. Chicoutimi defeated Voltigeurs 4 to 1 in a Provincial Hockey League fixture at the Arena last night.

A crowd of about eighteen hundred, not including the schoolboys who were packed like sardines in the North End of the rink, attended the game and were well rewarded as the contest was the fastest and best seen here this season. The locals also showed great improvement in their play, breaking away on many nice combination rushes, and it was only hard luck that prevented them from scoring more than one goal.

The visitors' defence played a strong game, breaking up many dangerous attacks and breaking away fast, though the team as a whole played a combination game that in itself was a treat to watch. They swept down the ice two and three abreast with the puck going from one to another like clockwork. Checking was hard throughout the game which accounted for the numerous penalties handed out by Referee Jimmy Gardner, though they were all for minor offences.

For about a minute in the first twenty Voltigeurs played six against four as Veinza and Pednault had been chased to the cooler and though the locals redoubled their efforts they could not get the rubber past Gagnon, though during this time he had numerous shots to stop. Play was fairly even in the opening twenty, though in the second the visitors had the edge. In the final three minutes of the first period, though the locals had some chances, only good work on the part of both net-minders prevented a further tally.

Chicoutimi in the second period displayed the best combination of the match. Time and again the visiting forwards swept down the ice two and three abreast and Chamalliere and Mill had hard work in keeping them away from the nets. Five minutes after the period started, Quenneville and Pednault rushed and on a pass the latter put his team in the lead. Jacobs and Mill were playing a strong game for the Voltigeurs though Mill seemed to have difficulty in shooting. Pednault made the count 2-1 seven minutes later when he secured the rebound off Tremblay's shot, and shortly before the period finished Quenneville made the count 4-1 when he rushed in on Lacombe after taking a pass from Desbriens.

In the final period the locals worked like Trojans and gave Gagnon some anxious moments though the lanky net-guardian turned everything aside. The locals forced the play, though they had difficulty in passing the Veinza-Desbriens blockade. The visitors then adopted a three-man defence which kept Chamalliere and Co. shooting from long range and those shots were easily handled by Gagnon.
