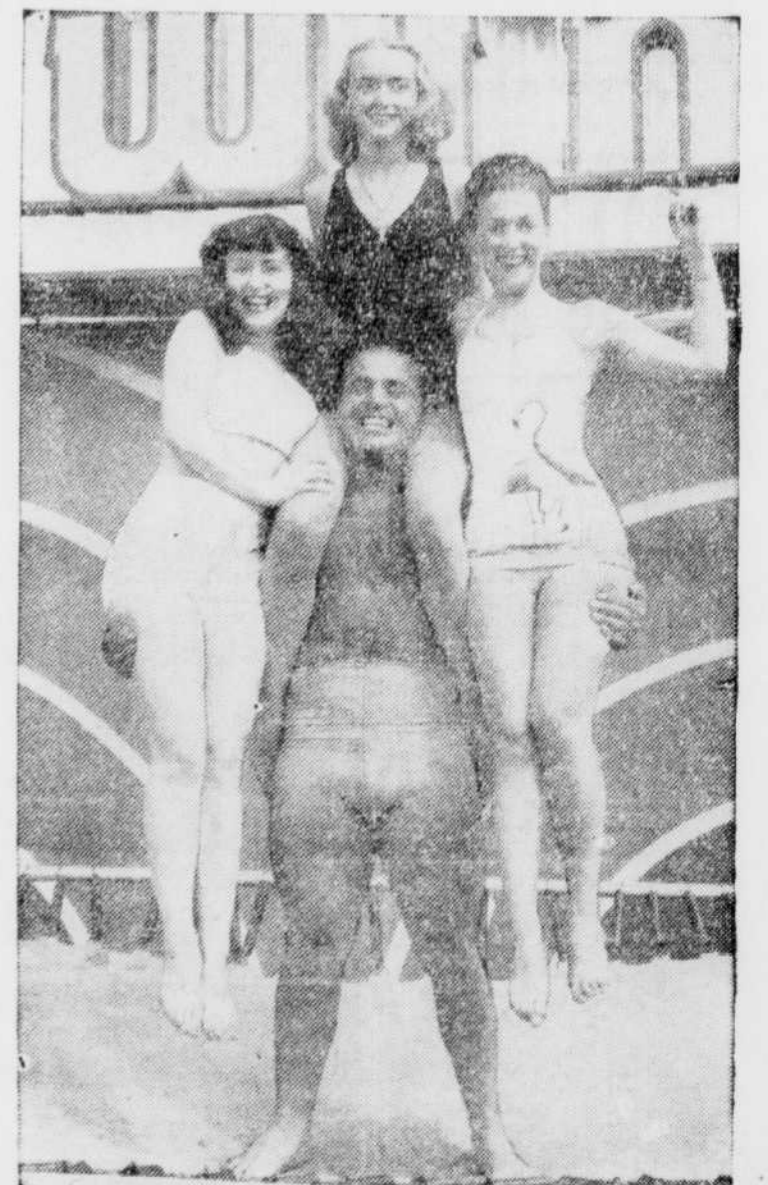

Big Midway And Colorful Grandstand Show Mark Fair

20 Trained Dancers Present Five Numbers In Fair Revue

A jubilant peace time show, Grandstand Follies, the major group presentation of George A. Hamid of New York, will be featured grandstand fare at the Sherbrooke Exhibition.

The gleeful presentation, featuring novelty chorus numbers, clever supplementary effects, catchy music and elaborate settings, costumes and lighting effects, is the largest and most ambitious of a long line of Hamid revue successes.

A line of 20 trained dancers, who have been chosen for their sight appeal as well as their dancing ability, will gaily trip thousands of steps in the presentation of their five numbers.

A novelty bell number, utilizing the musical genius of the Swiss bell ringers, is believed completely different from any outdoor show presented anywhere in the past. Another unusual number, the stair dance, has the dancing lovelies emulating the great dancer, Bill Robinson, who is credited with having originated the routine which featured dancing up and down a flight of stairs. The girls go the great Robinson one better in that they perform the difficult routine in unison. The movements of their 40 dancing feet are perfectly synchronized to create a breath-taking spectacle.

The catchy music of the Scottish highlands is used in the original Scotch number. Plaid and heather

are prominently highlighted in the fascinating costumes of the chorus girls turned lassies. With only a short interlude the chorus returns attired in brilliant, kaleidoscopic Spanish shawls to present one of the loveliest routines in the show. The castenets pacing the staccato tempo of Spanish music add up to an almost unbelievable whirlwind of action.

To properly demonstrate their excellence in precision dancing the chorus has been given a Zouave Drill number. The spectacular costumes, featuring tight jackets and baggy trousers, plus the muskets which identify them as members of the guard, only add emphasis to the agility of the 20 girls as they perform a most difficult dancing routine in perfect unison.

There is never a dull moment in the presentation of the lengthy revue. Specialty numbers are presented between each of the chorus production numbers. Carry Barra, one of the nation's best harmonica virtuosos, handles the master of ceremonies chores as well as playing a number of tunes on his mouth organ in a manner that would indicate that a whole symphony orchestra was involved in the musical effort.

Additional musical novelties are provided by Ben Yost's Varsity Co-eds, an eight-girl group of vocalists. The girls were chosen and trained by Yost whose male groups are nationally famous.

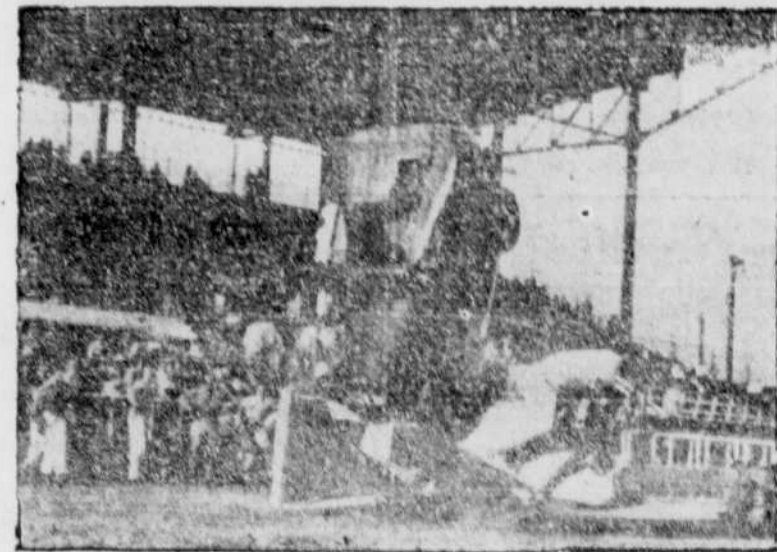
Mr. Edgar Bernier, of St. Felix de Kingsey, the father of three

Exhibits In All Departments Are Of Highest Quality

Comedian A. Robins Provides Many Chuckles At The Fair

A Robins, "the comedian with a Thousand New Ideas, who will be one of the featured attractions at the Sherbrooke Fair, pulls 256 bananas out of his pockets at each performance. It is scarcely necessary to explain that they are not real bananas, but he makes them look like it. This master comedian takes

nearly as much time to prepare for his short act as it does to present a complete musical revue. It takes forty-five minutes just to prepare the bananas which are hidden in a metal tube, and this is only one of dozens of props that are stored away in a voluminous coat which weighs over 60 pounds when all of his many gadgets are

carefully concealed in its many pockets and folds. It is crammed with a folding wastebasket, a music stand, a trick violin, about a dozen flat imitation mandolins, a newspaper, a stool, broom, and a host of other things. In addition he wears other clothes used in making quick costume changes. Robins wears a clown wig and underneath it a woman's wig. Later he also bares a man's wig and in some mystifying manner a mustache falls into place before he makes his exit. Robins combines the timing of a flying trapeze act with the showmanship of a daredevil in a way that denotes the artist.

Always given the full stage to himself when he performs, Robins first appears to be playing an oboe, but the audience soon learns that he is humming the music. Several trunks placed within each other are repositories for this and other props and costumes as he discards them. Upon the conclusion of his performance a few panels are switched and the trunks are transformed into a miniature train. Off comes a glove and then another, but this one is dropped. Robins then takes out a large horseshoe magnet and apparently draws the glove from the ground to it. He made this magnet just as he has manufactured all of his equipment. Then he takes out a metal music stand, removes his stiff bosom shirt with music written on it and plays a mandolin solo, humming the strain. The mandolin suddenly appears to become a dozen instruments.

Robins' first change is into the costume of a prima donna, with slicked back hair. Knots of hair over each ear have a funny way of stretching out several feet when he pulls them. And then they snap back. What appears to be a bass drum becomes a darkey's costume when he pulls it over his head. And in a jiffy there is the funny fellow with the black face, strumming at a banjo and imitating its sounds with his shrill voice. Robins steps out of this costume and before one realizes it he is wearing a loud uniform. Upon returning for a bow, he displays a coat covered with medals.

His performance isn't nearly as easy as it may appear to be on the stage. Behind it is over a quarter of a century of clowning of the continent and in the States. He maintains a well-equipped work-

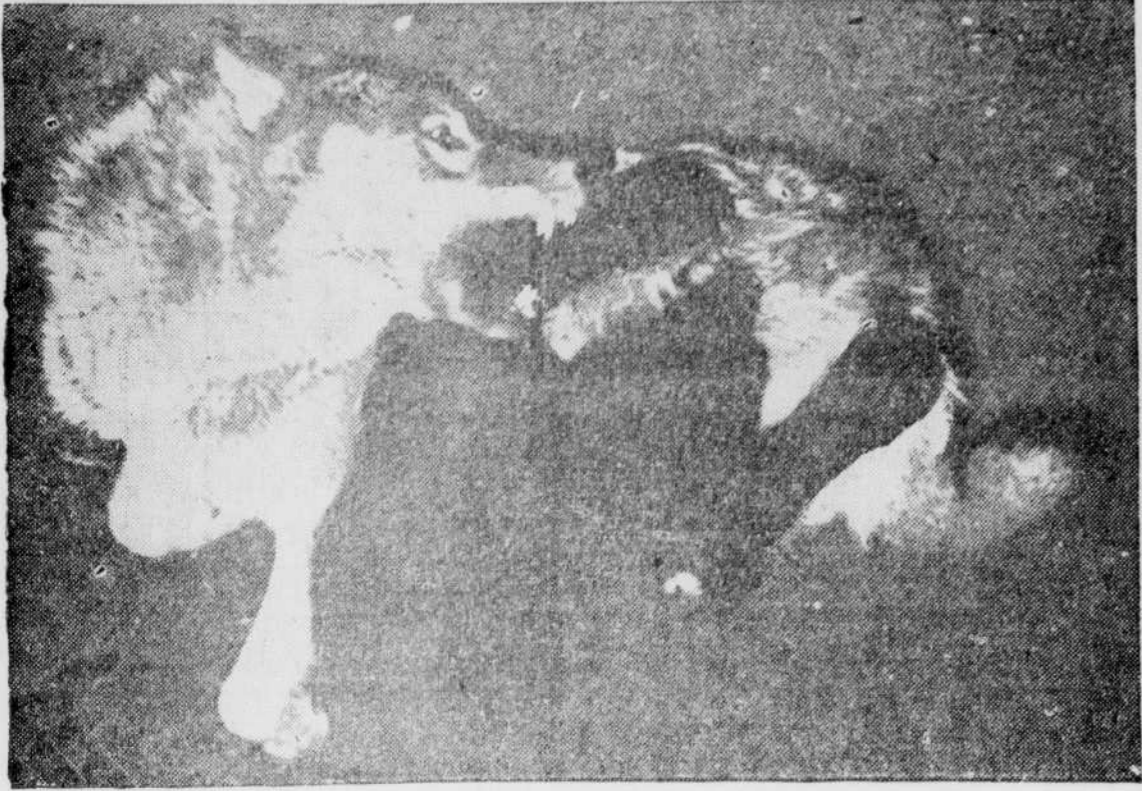
shop in New York where he manufactures all of the props that he uses and is constantly seeking new ideas to incorporate into his act.

Wolf To Wrestle Bear At Fair



One of the features of the exhibition which Joe LaFlamme, famous northern Ontario trapper, will stage at the Sherbrooke Fair which opens Saturday is a wrestling match between his wolf "Mahegan" and his bear "Louis." These animals, both 2 1/2 years old, spare no holds in their crowd-pleasing and thrilling bout. The wolf and the bear are just part of the menagerie which makes up LaFlamme's zoo, being brought here by the Eastern Townships Fish and Game Association through the co-operation of the Provincial departments of fish and game and of lands and forests. "Muskeg," LaFlamme's famous three-year-old trained moose will also be seen.
