



By this morning's mail we received from Montreal the Canada Gazette extraordinary, published on Saturday last, containing His Excellency's Speech on proroguing the Provincial Parliament, together with a complete list of the Acts sanctioned during the session and of those reserved for the signature of Her Majesty's pleasure thereon, which we hasten to lay before our readers, in advance of to-morrow's publication.

MONTREAL, 30th March, 1845. There is nothing of consequence in the Albany and Boston journals of the 27th instant received this morning. The Governor General came down to the Legislative Council yesterday afternoon at five o'clock, with the usual salutes of Artillery, Military Guard, Band, &c. He was loudly cheered out of doors at his arrival and departure. The Council Chamber was crowded; about 500 ladies sitting back of the Members; and the parts below the Bar filled with gentlemen, all admitted on tickets. There were some unusual noises and crowding at the door when the Assembly entered. The Speech is rather complimentary. It will probably have reached Quebec with the list of Bills sanctioned, some seventy in all, making more than a hundred with those previously sanctioned; thirty or forty, some of them of the most importance, were passed by the Assembly and the Council within the two or three previous days. Many of the Members will no doubt be surprised if ever they read those so passed. They certainly never heard many of them read. This, it appears, is responsible government legislation. That they will add to the confusion which already exists in our legislation, is certain. Another four months' session, if things continue to be so conducted, will only be "confusion worse confounded," and a renewal of some forty or fifty thousand pounds expenses, of which the Members of the Assembly carry off about Ten Thousand Pounds or £100 each, besides 10s. for every twenty miles travelling.

PROROGATION OF THE PROVINCIAL PARLIAMENT.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL CHAMBER, Montreal, Saturday, March 29, 1845.

This day, at Five o'clock, P. M., His Excellency the Governor General proceeded in state to the Chamber of the Legislative Council, in the Parliament Building. The Members of the Legislative Council being assembled, His Excellency was pleased to command the attendance of the Legislative Assembly; and that House being present, the following Bills were assented to in Her Majesty's name, by His Excellency the Governor General, viz:—

- An Act to prevent persons riding or driving at a fast rate over Bridges of more than a certain length, in Upper Canada.
An Act to repeal part of a certain Ordinance therein mentioned, and to enable Notaries to act as Clerks of Circuit and Commissioners' Courts in Lower Canada.
An Act to correct and amend an Act passed in the Session held in the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty's reign, intitled, An Act to appropriate certain sums of money for public improvements in this Province, and for other purposes therein mentioned.
An Act to prevent the profanation of the Lord's-day, commonly called Sunday, in Upper Canada.
An Act to detach the Island of Orleans from the County of Montmorency, for the purpose of Registration of Titles, and to establish a Registry Office in the said Island.
An Act to amend an Act passed in the fourth and fifth years of the Reign of Her Majesty, intitled, An Act to repeal the laws now in force in that part of this Province formerly Upper Canada, for the recovery of Small Debts, and to make other provisions therefor.
An Act to provide for the payment of claims arising out of the Rebellion and Invasion in Upper Canada; and to appropriate Duties on Tavern Licences to local purposes.
An Act to regulate the Culling and Measurement of Timber, Masts, Spars, Deals, Staves, and other articles of a like nature, and to repeal a certain Act therein mentioned.
An Act to incorporate certain persons as The Niagara and Ten Mile Creek Plank Road Company, for the purpose of constructing a Plank Road from a certain place in Niagara, to the Ten Mile Creek in Grantham.

His Excellency was pleased to reserve the following Bills for the further signification of Her Majesty's pleasure thereon, viz:—
An Act to dissolve the Marriage of Henry William Harris, Esquire, with Eliza Walker, otherwise called Eliza Lock Walker, his now wife, and to enable him to marry again, and for other purposes therein mentioned.

An Act to provide a legal recourse to Her Majesty's subjects in this Province having legal or just claims upon the Executive Government thereof, and to enable Her Majesty the more effectually to do justice in such cases.
An Act to establish the boundaries of the Lots and Gores of Lands in the sixth, seventh, eighth, ninth and tenth concessions of the Township of Beverly in the County of Halton.
An Act to explain and amend part of an Act passed in the seventh year of Her Majesty's reign, intitled, "An Act for vesting in the Principal Officers of Her Majesty's Ordinance the Estates and Property therein described, for granting certain powers to the said Officers and for other purposes therein mentioned."
An Act to quiet the title to Lands of persons naturalized under the Statute of Lower Canada passed in the first year of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, and for other purposes therein mentioned.
An Act to make further provisions regarding Aliens.
After which His Excellency the Governor General was pleased to close the First Session of the Second Provincial Parliament with the following SPEECH:
Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly.
I thank you for your indefatigable attention to the laborious duties which you have had to perform during this unusually long Session. I trust that the Acts which have been passed will prove beneficial to the Province, and I consider myself justified in especially congratulating you on those for improving the Administration of Justice in Upper Canada, and those relating to Education and Municipal Institutions in Lower Canada, all of which are of the highest value and promise to render essential service to the community. I regret at the same time to notice that several important measures have been unavoidably postponed. On this account I am reluctant to part with you, for I am loth to lose your assistance while any thing remains to be done which the good of the country requires. Nevertheless, I am sensible that your presence is much required at your homes, and that it would be unreasonable to expect your longer attendance at the present period. Whatever has been left incomplete, will, I hope, be accomplished at our next meeting.
I have had the satisfaction of assenting in Her Majesty's name to nearly all of the Enactments which you have passed, and the few reserved for the decision of Her Majesty's Government have been so dealt with under circumstances, which from positive instructions or otherwise, have rendered it imperative on me to pursue that course. The Act to amend the Ordinance of the last Session of the late Parliament comes necessarily under that description as it affects the property of the Crown.
I have received authentic information of the passing of an Act by the Legislature of the United States which may seriously affect the Commercial interests of this Province. I will not fail to submit the subject for the attention of Her Majesty's Government, and I am sure that it will receive the most earnest consideration.
Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly,
I return you my hearty thanks for the liberality with which you have provided the requisite means for the due administration of our Affairs. I shall anxiously co-operate with you in every measure of economy consistent with the efficiency of the Public Service. It is satisfactory to observe that the prosperous condition of our Revenue enables us after providing for a reduction of the Public Debt by providing for the redemption of a Sinking Fund commencing the establishment of the Guaranteed Loan, to apply a considerable sum to additional Public Works calculated to produce great advantage.

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly.
You are about to return to your homes to resume those occupations which in most cases are indispensable for the support of your families, and which are unavoidably interrupted with some degree of injury to yourselves by your attendance on Parliamentary Duties. I earnestly hope that you may be successful in your undertakings, and I beg you to convey to your several constituencies the assurance that Her Majesty's Government ardently desires the welfare of this Province, and is anxious that the whole of its Inhabitants, without distinction, and with perfect equality, may enjoy all the rights and privileges of a Free People, and experience the prosperity, contentment and happiness which are naturally derived from unfettered industry, prudent enterprise, good fellowship and brotherly love. And now, Gentlemen, with the heartfelt wish that you may be partakers in these blessings, I will say farewell until we meet again. I cannot, however, conclude without expressing my warmest thanks for the aid and support which you have afforded to Her Majesty's Government by your loyal, zealous and patriotic labours.

An Act to incorporate the St. Lawrence and Atlantic Rail Road Company.
An Act for granting Provincial Duties of Customs.
The Honorable the SPEAKER of the Legislative Council then declared that it was the pleasure of His Excellency the Governor General that the Parliament should stand prorogued to Thursday the 8th day of May next.

COMMERCIAL.
(From the Ottawa Advocate, March 26)
THE TIMBER TRADE.—Since our last published remarks on the prospects of the Timber Trade in the ensuing season, a material alteration has been made with regard to the quantity of manufactured timber which may float to Quebec, by the recent unusually severe weather, for the middle of March, and which, should it continue a few days longer, will, by again freezing over the creeks and small streams, enable the greater part of the Timber to be got out, that, on penning our former statement, we were assured would be likely to remain in the woods.
From information, which we have been favored with—coming direct from the best advised authorities—we feel justified in holding out the most flattering encouragement to our hardy operatives in woods.
The ice on the Ottawa is fast land-locked and to all appearance as usual in the middle of winter. A week's thaw would, doubtless, make a great difference. The earliest rafts, most, however, arrive at Quebec much later this Spring, than usual. Several accidents occurred this season on the tributary streams, by breaking through, attended with the loss of horses. Mr. J. Lusk of Eadley, had a valuable span of horses drowned off Rocky Point a few days ago.
Montreal Markets, March 26
Since we issued our Annual Review on the 23rd January last, no transactions of importance have taken place in our market, except in the article of Flour.
Early in February a demand sprung up both on speculation and for English account, and fully 10,000 bls changed hands at and near 24s for Fine, and 24s 6d for Superfine,—with the understanding in most instances, that the Flour should be held at sellers' risk and expense till May next, and paid for on delivery.
In the present month also there has been an active demand chiefly for English account, but at a reduction upon previous rates, the best Superfine having been sold to arrive (in May next) at 24s 4d blb, and a few thousand bls of Fine, of fair shipping brands at and in some instances a little over 23s 2d 4d blb.
There have been no sales since the arrival of the English Mail, but the market appears decidedly stiffer, several lots previously offering at 23s 3d, having been for the present withdrawn.
Wheat—There have been no sales of Upper Canada Wheat, and but in the Lower Canada is now brought to market, any that offers being readily saleable at 4s 10d to 5s 4d blb.
Barley, Pease, and Oats have continued in good demand during the past two months—Barley at 2s 6d and 2s 7d for forward weighing 52 lbs—and 2s 11d to 3s for two rowed, weighing 57 lbs.—Oats weighing 3s to 40 lbs at 1s 6d—and Peas at 3s 3d—at less than which holders are not now willing to sell.
Ashes—Since our last, Ashes have been pretty steady at and about 22s 6d for Pots and 23s 3d for Pearls, but in consequence of the last English advices, (of 4th inst.) both descriptions are now held for more money; and, as, however, there have not been any transactions since the arrival of the mail, no actual price can be quoted.
The present stock in store is as follows—Pots 2759, Pearls 1281. Total 4040; against, at the same period last year, Pots 3059, Pearls 1000. Total 4059.
Provisions—We have no transactions to notice in Beef, and we quote it nominally at \$5 for Prime, and \$7 1/2 for Prime Mess. The stock now in market of last year's packing is estimated at 500 bls, and the whole quantity packed in the city during the winter will scarcely reach 1000 bls.
Pork has advanced from 2s 6d to 5s 4d blb, upon quotations, being now held at \$15 for Mess, \$12 for Prime Mess, and \$10 1/2 to \$11 for Prime, at which prices there is a moderate retail demand, and holders look for a further advance, and it is generally believed that the supply for the coming season will fall materially short of last year's receipts.
In Imports there is but little doing, as is usual at this season of the year. A few Auction Sales have lately been tried, but they were too unimportant in their results to merit particular notice.
Exchange—The Bank rate is 11 1/2 cent premium. There is but little doing in Merchants'.

UNITED STATES.
New York, March 15.—TRIAL OF MCCURRY.—This man was arraigned in the City Court at Baltimore on Monday. The trial excited great attention and the Court room was crowded. Out of one hundred and ten jurors called, seventy-nine were challenged for cause, and nineteen peremptorily. A question was raised as to the capacity of a member of the Odd Fellows' Association to sit upon the jury, the deceased (Mr. Roux) having belonged to that body. Triers were appointed and they decided that an Odd Fellow was not disqualified. The jury having been sworn and the indictment read the Court adjourned to the following day.
We take from the Baltimore American such portions of the evidence in this case as are not already generally known to our readers. The prisoner appears to have preserved a self-possession amounting almost to indifference, varied only by occasional and slight changes of expression as the minutest details of his crime were revealed.
Mr. Paul Roux arrived at Baltimore on the night of Friday, the 12th of January, and took lodgings at the house of Francis Noland, where McCurry was boarding. They retired to rest in the same room. In the morning McCurry came down early and assigned as a reason to the landlord that he was going away.
At breakfast he excused himself from calling upon Mr. Roux by saying that the latter had got up early, gone out and told him (McCurry) that he should not be in to breakfast. McCurry did not leave that morning, but was in and out during the day, making purchases and treating the bar-room customers. He proposed starting in the evening.
While he was out the last time, a trunk which he had purchased was left at Noland's. When he came in, it being dinner time, the landlord remarked to McCurry that it was singular the stranger Roux had not returned to dinner, when McCurry replied that Roux would not be there to dinner; that he had met him up town while out last, and that Roux told him he was loading about, looking for an acquaintance whom he wanted to meet, and that he should not go away until Wednesday. After dinner the landlord spoke to McCurry about packing up what he intended to take with him, so as to have all ready in time, and offered to take the new trunk up into his room and help him to pack. McCurry declined the offer, saying that no one should see what he meant to leave in his trunk until his return.
He then went up stairs, and after being gone a short time, came down and gave his old trunk into the landlord's charge. The other trunk was placed in the bar-room, and McCurry went out again.
McCurry left by the late train and subsequently a customer of Noland's arrived, for whose accommodation he directed his wife to get ready the bed in which McCurry had slept. She found the door locked and with another key Noland opened it. On entering he observed a man's cap lying on the foot of one of the beds, and a coat lying across the pillow.

low. He went to the head of the bed, raised up the bolster, and there found the deceased, Paul Roux, in a pool of blood, with his throat cut.

When the body was first discovered it was lying as if the individual was asleep; the hands were free from blood, and there was no weapon lying about, with which he could have committed suicide, as was supposed when the witnesses first saw the body. On the morning of the day on which McCurry went away he was, for the first time, observed to have a handsome gold watch, with gold fob and guard chains. The axe was looked for in the cellar on the day on which McCurry left, and it was wanted for use, but it could not be found.

McCurry was seen during the day to go up stairs several times, and one time he brought down two or three handkerchiefs, one of which, a white one, had some spots of blood upon it. These he gave to the servant to wash.

The body of the murdered man was first examined by Dr. Bryar, in the presence of the coroner's jury. The throat was cut about the length of three inches. On examining the head there was a large fracture found on the left side of the skull, which, in the circumference of the fracture, was broken into fourteen pieces, and there was a continued cut about an inch and a half in length upon that side of the head. The wound upon the head was the one which produced the death of the deceased, and such a one as might have been made with the butt end of the axe.

The remaining evidence for the prosecution had reference to the pursuit and capture of McCurry, as already published. Witnesses for the defence were called. From their testimony it appeared that one of them, a locksmith, went and tried a dozen or eighteen keys upon the lock of the room in which the murder was committed, and that out of the number eight were found which fitted the lock, and that two keys were obtained from other locks in the house which also fitted that lock, one of which was taken from the room adjoining, and the other from the back room of the second story. The lock was one that almost any ordinary key would fit.

One or two of the witnesses, who had known the prisoner when he resided at Noland's about five weeks, testified to having always had a good opinion of him up to the time of the charge for which he is now on trial, having been made against him. And here the evidence for the defence was closed.

The locksmith who fitted the key to the lock of the room in which the murder was committed was examined by the state, as to the lock taken from the trunk, and the key found in that of the prisoner which fitted it, and stated that both were of peculiar construction, and that it would be a very hard matter to get a key to fit such a lock without making one.

The evidence being closed the Court adjourned. The trial was concluded on Wednesday evening, at Baltimore, and a verdict rendered "guilty of murder in the first degree." From the Baltimore Sun we gather that the defence set up by prisoner's counsel was certain contradictions in the landlord's evidence, McCurry's former good character, his self-possession and coolness during the day, and the absence of all precipitancy in the manner of his flight. The Sun says of the prisoner's appearance after the rendition of the verdict:

Pale as the prisoner was before, his face now assumed a corpse-like paleness, and on rising a minute afterwards to leave the bar, it was evidently with considerable effort, from the relaxation of the muscles. He was re-conducted to the box, and soon afterwards to the van and removed to the jail, amid an immense crowd, who looked on almost in silence.

THE EFFECT OF BAD EXAMPLE.—We observe with regret that the legislation of our Canadian friends is becoming more and more assimilated to that of a certain house in the ten miles square. A better example to follow would be that of the Senate, which is always decorous.

Some men have singular modes of showing their love and attachment to their wives,—but it seems to us that one of the clearest exhibitions of oddity in this respect recently manifested itself in Genoa, one of the southern towns of this country. As the matter comes to us, upon the most unquestionable authority, it is as follows:

On the evening of Wednesday, the 5th inst., a Mr. Lorenzo Patrick, who, by the way, has always been considered a very good, kind sort of a man, and who was never known (as she declares) to say a cross word to his wife, nor to do a disobligeing thing,—after having assisted her in getting their two children asleep, went into the wood-house, as was his wont, to bring in an armful or two of wood.

While out, however, he called to his wife to come into the woodhouse, as a hen had got into the well, and he wished her assistance in getting it out. After making some little effort, by lowering the bucket, in the hope that the fowl would thus be induced to cling to the rope or bucket, he called to her to see what she could do. She accordingly took hold of the rope, he at the time standing by the well-side,—and while she was leaning over the curb, he, without uttering a word, caught her by the feet and plunged her over head first into the well,—which is not far from 25 feet deep, the water coming up within some 4 feet of the platform. When she went into the water she did not let go of the rope, but went down the length of it, and then came up the rope and got out of the water with her feet upon the stone, and screamed for help.

one of her husband's workmen, carrying with her £74 of his money. The fugitives came to his place, where they have resided most of the winter. So long as the stolen money lasted, they got along well enough. But when the funds were exhausted, the brutal seducer compelled his victim to prostitute herself for gain, and failed not to beat her, in the most shameful manner when she refused, or when she did not receive what he deemed an adequate reward for her iniquity. During a fit of intoxication she stole a pair of shoes, and was committed. The Magistrate committed the seducer also, but there is no law to punish him as he deserves.—[Rochester Democrat.]
