POSTAL INFORMATION.

Postage.—Letters for delivery in Canada, Great Britain and all other places within the Empire, France, Spain and certain Spanish possessions United States and all other places in North and South America, 3 cts. for the first ounce and 2 cts. for each additional ounce or fraction thereof.

Letters addressed to all other countries 5 cts. for the first ounce and 3 cts. for each additional ounce or fraction thereof.

Drop letters for the city, Westmount, Outremont, Maisonneuve, St. Lambert, Longueuil, Montreal South, Verdun, Montreal West, etc., 2 cts. for the first ounce and 1 c. for each additional ounce or fraction thereof.

Letters addressed to places in Canada or to other countries, if posted unpaid or partly prepaid, will be forwarded, subject on delivery to double amount of deficient postage.

Re-directed Letters.—Re-directed letters are not liable to any additional postage, if handed back to the Post Office with a changed address at the moment of delivery or as soon as possible thereafter, provided

always the change in the address does not require the letter to be sent to any place to which the postage rate is higher than was at first payable.

Re-directed letters should not be dropped into a Post Office Box or receiver unless additional postage has been put on to carry them to their second destination.

Request and Address Letters.—Letters from places in Canada, Great Britain, the United States, Mexico and Newfoundland, covered by envelopes bearing a "Request" that the letters be returned to the sender if not delivered within a certain specified time, or the address of the sender either printed or written, will be returned as requested if not delivered in the time stated. Address letters having no time for return specified are held for 15 days and returned direct to sender.

Special Delivery.—Arrangements have been made for the delivery by special messenger daily, except Sunday, of letters bearing a "Canadian Special Delivery" stamp or bearing Canadian postage stamps to the value of twenty cents in addition to the ordinary postage and the words "Special Delivery" legibly written across the upper left hand corner of the address when the letters are addressed to the United States or to the following cities in Canada:—In Ontario: Belleville, Brantford, Brockville, Chatham, Cornwall, Fort William, Galt, Guelph, Hamilton, Kingston, Kitchener, Lindsay, London, Niagara Falls, North Bay, Orillia, Oshawa, Ottawa, Owen Sound, Pembroke, Peterborough, Port Arthur, St. Catharines, St. Thomas, Sarnia, Sault Ste. Marie, Stratford, Sudbury, Toronto, Waterloo, Welland, Windsor, Woodstock; in Quebec: Chicoutimi, Granby, Hull, Levis, Montreal, Quebec, St. Hyacinthe, St. Jean, Shawinigan Falls, Sherbrooke, Thetford Mines, Trois Rivieres; in New Brunswick: Fredericton, Moncton, and St. John; in Nova Scotia: Amherst, Glace Bay, Halifax, Sydney and Truro; in Prince Edward Island: Charlottetown; in Manitoba: Brandon and Winnipeg; in Saskatchewan: North Battleford, Moose Jaw, Prince Albert, Regina, Saskatoon and Yorkton; in Alberta: Calgary, Edmonton, Lethbridge and Medicine Hat; in British Columbia: Nanaimo, New Westminster, Vancouver and Victoria.

Post Cards.—For Canada, Great Britain, other places in the British Empire, France, Spain and places in North and South America 2 cents each; all other countries, 3 cents each. Reply Cards, for Canada, Great Britain and other places in the British Empire, France, Spain and certain Spanish possessions and places in North and South America 4 cents each. Reply cards for all other countries 6 cents each. Nothing may be attached to a Post Card, except a small adhesive tag or label bearing the name and address of the sender or addressee, or an engraving photograph or newspaper clipping adhering completely to the card.

Newspapers and Periodicals.—Transient newspapers 1 cent per 4 oz.

Regular Newspapers and Periodicals to subscribers 1½ cent per lb. Sample copies, so marked, 2 cents per lb. These rates apply to all duly recognized Canadian newspapers and periodicals sent from the office of publication to places in Canada, Great Britain and all places within the British Empire, except Australia.

The postage rate for Canadian newspapers and periodicals sent to Australia is 1 cent per 4 oz. or fraction with a minimum prepayment of 2 cents.

All newspapers and periodicals published less frequently than daily, addressed to the United States, will be subject to the rate of 1 cent per 4 ounces, whether posted by publishers, newsdealers or private individuals.

Legitimate daily newspapers can be mailed by publishers to bona fide subscribers and newsdealers in the United States at the rate of 2 cents per pound. When mailed by private individuals the rate is 1 cent per 4 oz.

Newspapers and periodicals addressed to other countries are subject to the rate of 1 cent for each two ounces or fraction thereof.

Printed and Miscellaneous Matter.—The postage on Books, Pamphlets, Circulars, occasional publications, etc. Manuscript of books or newspapers, Printers' Proof Sheets, Maps, Prints, Drawings, Engravings, Lithographs, Photographs, Sheet Music (whether printed or written), music books of instruction, etc., addressed to Canada, the United States and Mexico are 1 cent per 2 oz. Most of these articles can be sent to Great Britain and all other countries at the rate of 1 c per 2 oz.; but, in the case of manuscript of books or newspapers and manuscript music, a minimum prepayment of 5 cents (covering a weight of 10 ounces) is required; 1 cent for each additional ounce or portion thereof. In Canada, the combined length and girth must not exceed 6 feet. For other countries no packet must measure more

than 18 inches in any direction, unless in the form of a roll when a length of 30 inches is allowed provided diameter does not exceed 4 inches. The limit of weight for Canada is 5 lbs., for the United States and other Postal union countries 4 lbs. 6 oz. Limit of weight for a single book addressed to places in Canada, the United States or Mexico is 11 lbs.; to other countries 6 lbs. 9 oz.

Commercial Papers and Legal Documents may be sent to Great Britain, Newfoundland United States and all Foreign countries at 5 cents for the first 10 ounces, and 1 cent for every additional 2 ounces. These papers, when posted for delivery in Canada, must be prepaid at Letter rate.

Samples.—Bona fide Samples of Merchandise, not of saleable value and not exceeding 1 lb. in weight, may be sent to any place in Canada, United States or Mexico, at 1 cent per 2 oz. To Great Britain and other countries the rate of postage is 2 cents for the first four ounces and 1 cent for each additional 2 ounces or fraction thereof. The limit of weight for Canada and all other countries is 1 lb. Must be put up so as to admit of inspection. Goods sent in execution of an order, however small the quantity may be, or articles sent by one private individual to another, not being actually Trade Samples, are not admissible.

The limits of size: Canada and other countries, 18 in. in length by 8 in. in width by 4 in. in depth; or, if in form of a roll, 18 in. in length by 6 in. in diameter.

Parcel Post in Canada.—Comprises such articles of general merchandise as are not entitled to any lower rate of postage. Postage rates can be ascertained at any Post Office. Limit of weight, 15 lbs.; but in no case must the combined length and girth exceed six feet. Matter for transmission by Parcel Post must be open to inspection, and there must be no correspondence enclosed.

C. O. D.

Mall matter posted at a Money Order Post Office in Canada for delivery at any Post Office in Canada, or on any rural route within Canada, may be sent C.O.D. (Collect on Delivery), whereby charges due the sender up to \$100 may be collected from the addressee, and remitted to the sender by Post Office Money Order. Rural Routes are for this purpose considered as Money Order Post Offices and may be granted a C.O.D. service.

C.O.D. fees are: 15 cents, if the amount to be collected is not more than \$50.00; 30 cents if the amount to be collected is more than \$50.00 and not more than \$100.00.

INSURANCE

All parcels posted in Canada for delivery in Canada may be insured up to \$50.00 without insurance fee, if so requested by the sender.

Parcels posted in Canada for delivery within Canada and United States and in Australia, China, Great Britain and Northern Ireland, Hong Kong, Newfoundland and New Zealand, and by direct service to Bahamas, Belgium, Bermuda, British Guiana, British Honduras, Denmark, Egypt, France, Germany, Grenada, Holland, Irish Free State, Italy, Jamaica, Leeward Islands, Norway, St. Lucia, St. Vincent, Sudan (Anglo-Egyptian), Sweden and Trinidad—also parcels intended for transmission via England and via France, addressed to foreign countries to which Great Britain and France extend insurance, prepaid at parcel post rates cannot be registered, but may be insured against loss, rifling or damage. Information as to insurance fees, etc., can be obtained at any Post Office. General merchandise (parcel post), etc., may be sent to the United States and its possessions (except the Philippine Islands) at the rate of fourteen cents per pound or fraction thereof, up to 10 lbs.; over 10 pounds and up to 15 lbs., at the rate of \$1.75 per parcel.

The maximum charge on any package of merchandise up to 8 oz. shall not exceed one cent an ounce. Such matter is subject to Customs examination on arrival in the country of destination, and to the collection of any duty to which it may be found to be liable. The United States Post Office Department collects 5 cts. as a delivery fee on a parcel post parcel sent from Canada for delivery in the United States; and, in addition, a fee of 10 cents is collected on dutiable parcels for customs clearance and accounting.

The United States authorities require that a Customs Declaration be attached to all parcels of general merchandise (parcel post) prepaid at parcel post rates, posted in Canada addressed for delivery in the United States, except packages of merchandise weighing 8 ounces or less, paid at the rate of 1 cent for each ounce or fraction thereof, in which a Customs Declaration or invoice should be enclosed.

They further require that commercial invoices or statements of value be enclosed with books prepaid at printed matter rate, also in sealed parcels of general merchandise prepaid at letter rate, posted in Canada addressed for delivery in the United States.

Such matter when addressed to the United States should be open to inspection, in the manner described in the regulations concerning domestic Parcel Post. However, sealed packages of general merchandise (parcel post) may be accepted for transmission provided the sender has placed thereon a printed label or an impression of a rubber stamp, giving the name and address of the sender and stating in a general way the nature of the contents.

General merchandise (parcel post) addressed to the United States may be accepted for insurance under the same terms and conditions as apply to parcels posted for delivery within Canada. The scale of insurance fees is the same as for Canada.

Registration.—Every article intended for registration must be handed in at the wicket, and a receipt obtained therefor. The fee on all classes of articles (except parcels sent by parcel post) addressed to countries to which matter may be registered is ten cents.

The sender of a registered article addressed to any place in Canada or to any Postal Union country may entitle himself to a certificate as to the disposal of the said article by the Postmaster at the office addressed, on prepayment of an additional fee of 10 cents. All classes of matter except Parcel Post packages may be registered to places in Canada, United States and most other countries.

The public are reminded that registered letters are only carried on trains that are accompanied by railway mail clerk. Hence a registered letter and an ordinary letter posted simultaneously will often be received at different times.

PARCEL POST TO GREAT BRITAIN AND OTHER COUNTRIES

Closed parcels are exchanged by direct mail between Canada and the following countries: Argentine Republic, Australia, Bahamas, Barbados, Belgium, Bermuda, Brazil, British Guiana, British Honduras, China, Colombia, Cuba, Denmark, Egypt, Fiji, France, Germany, Great Britain and Northern Ireland, Grenada, Holland, Hong Kong, Irish Free State, Italy, Jamaica, Japan, Leeward Islands, Mexico, Newfoundland, New Zealand, Norway, Philippine Islands, Poland, St. Lucia, St. Pierre and Miquelon, St. Vincent, Sudan (Anglo-Egyptian), Sweden, Trinidad and Tobago, Union of South Africa and Venezuela. Parcels may also be sent to and received from any country with which the British Post Office maintains a parcel post. Parcels for the Union of South Africa, British West Indies, Costa Rica, Dominican Republic, Dutch West Indies, Guadeloupe, Haiti, and Central and South American countries may be forwarded via New York, and when intended for transmission by that route should be legibly marked "via New York."

For rates enquire at Post Office. Parcels for, or sent via, Great Britain, will pass exclusively in the mails conveyed by the Canadian Steamers to and from the St. Lawrence in summer and Halifax or St. John in winter. The parcels for Japan, China, Hong Kong, Philippine Islands and Fiji are despatched from Vancouver. Parcels for Australia and New Zealand are forwarded via Vancouver and San Francisco according to rate of prepayment.

LIMITS OF WEIGHT AND SIZE.

General limit of weight—15 lbs.

Limit of weight to most countries — 15 lbs. Information may be obtained at the post office regarding countries where limit is restricted to 11 pounds or extends to 20 pounds.

Limit of size: 3½ feet in length, width or depth, but in no case must the length and girth combined exceed 6 feet.

Prohibited Articles and Publications.—Explosive, dangerous or destructive substance, or liquid, or any matter likely to injure usual contents of the mails, or the person of any officer or servant of the Post Office. Liquid Celluloid is prohibited, but celluloid in other forms may be sent by post in bulk, provided it is packed with reasonable care and labelled "Celluloid — Inflammable." There is no restriction upon the circulation of cards, calendars, etc., made of celluloid when they are sent singly.

Glass, in any form. Hays, fish fruit and oils are prohibited unless put up in the manner prescribed by postal regulations. Any obscene or immoral book, or

other publication of an indecent, immoral, seditious, disloyal, scurrilous or libellous character, or any post card or post band or wrapper upon which there are words of the character aforesaid, or any letter or circular concerning an illegal lottery, so-called, gift-concert or other similar enterprise offering prizes or concerning schemes devised and intended to deceive and defraud the public and newspapers, etc., containing advertisements of any obscene and immoral prints, publications, etc.

POSTAL NOTES.

Postal Notes are payable only in Canada and Newfoundland, and should not be remitted to other countries.

The remitter may make up odd cents by affixing Postal Note Stamps, not exceeding nine cents in value, to the face of a Postal Note.

Postal Notes are payable at any Money Order or Postal Note office in Canada, and at all Post Offices in Newfoundland.

Information as to the rates in force from time to time can be obtained at any Post Office, authorized to transact Money Order business.

The commission rates in the above tables include the Revenue Tax of 3 cents, which is charged on all Money Orders.

No single Money Order may be issued for an amount in excess of \$100.

Abstract of City Assessment By-Laws

Real estate assessment—1.35 per cent on value.

School taxes (Catholics)—7 mills per cent on value.

(Protestants)—10 mills per cent. on value; (Neutrals)—12 mills per cent. on value.

Special Loan Taxes—Special taxes are imposed on real estate, under by-laws adopted by the Council, to provide annually for the interest and the sinking funds of the following loans:

By-law 595, 25th April, 1916, \$2,000,000 at 5 per cent, for 20 years, \$0.14 per \$1,000;

By-law 610, 27th Dec., 1916, \$1,400,000 at 5 per cent, for 20 years, \$0.10 per \$1,000;

By-law 835, 14th Aug., 1922, \$1,500,000 at 5 per cent, for 40 years, \$0.09 per \$1,000. Total of special loan taxes: \$0.33 per \$1,000.

Special Paying Tax—Under the Acts 19 George V, Chapter 97, Article 26, and 22 George V, Chapter 105, Section 32, an annual tax is imposed on all taxable and non-taxable real estate situated in the City to cover any excess in the cost of \$5.00 per square yard for pavings laid since the 1st January, 1919, on any street, lane or public place, recognized as such at that date, as well as the interest included in the paving rolls. The rate for this tax is \$0.825.

Special Tax for Various Excesses—Under the Act 22 George V, Chapter 105, Section 40, an annual tax is imposed on all taxable and non-taxable real estate in the City to cover the losses etc., as well as the excess over one year's interest on all rolls for local improvements other than pavings. The rate for this tax is \$0.445.

Total of special taxes:—\$0.14, \$0.10, \$0.09, \$0.825, \$0.445 making a total annual impost of \$1.60 per \$1000. valuation.

Water Pipes—A special tax not exceeding six per cent, per annum of the cost is imposed on all vacant lots in front of which water pipes are laid.

Snow cleaning tax—Rate for removal of snow from all sidewalks during the winter, 10 cents per running foot.

Vault under sidewalk—2 1/2 per cent, on the value of space occupied, based on the value of adjoining property.

Business and Other Personal Taxes—The rate of business tax is 3/4 per cent, on the annual assessed rental value of the premises occupied.

Dwelling-houses, stores, shops, offices, &c., on the assessed rental, 6 per cent.; churches 6 per cent. on rental based on 4 per cent. on their assessed value; restaurants, at uniform rate of 12 per cent. on assessed yearly rental, provided that when the rent is \$1000 and over and at least twenty furnished rooms exist, water shall be charged by meter and paid for at the same rate as distilleries, breweries, &c.; horses, \$2 each; cows, \$1 each; horse stalls, livery stable keepers, horse dealers, tavern keepers, &c., shall pay \$1.50 for each stall whether occupied or unoccupied; public baths or baths for the use of which a charge is made, \$6 each tub; steam engines \$6 per horse-power or \$1.15 per 1000 cubic feet by meter; building materials, 6 cts. per 1000 bricks; 3 cts. per cubic yard of masonry and \$3 per 1000 yards plastering; fountains, \$2 for every 1000 cubic feet, supplied by meter; hand hose, for sprinkling purposes, \$2.50; \$2.00 for each 50 feet of frontage or fraction thereof; meter rates for distilleries, breweries, hotels, taverns, railways, laundries, colleges, seminaries, academies, houses of industry, reformatories, boarding schools, nunneries, asylums, dye houses, photographic studios and all manufacturing establishments generally, \$1.15 per 1000 cubic feet; but the quarterly bill by meter must not be less than 1 1/2 p.c. of the assessed rental value of premises supplied; if, for any reason whatsoever in the opinion of the Board of Commissioners, water cannot be supplied by meter 6 per cent. on yearly rental; meter rent by annum; 1/2 inch, \$2.00; 3/4 inch, \$2.00; 1 inch, \$4.00; 1 1/2 inch, \$8.00; 2 inch, \$12.00; 3 inch, \$25.00; 4 inch, \$40.00; 6 inch, \$75.00; 8 inch \$100.00.

Public hospitals having a minimum of 100 permanent beds, kept gratuitously for patients, shall pay each annually, for their water supply a uniform rate of twenty-five dollars (\$25).

Dates of payment.—The water rates are due and payable on the 1st day of September, in each year, up to which date there will be allowed a discount of 3 p.c. All charges for specific supplies, or for fractional part of the year shall be payable in advance, before the water is turned on. **Meter rates—Water supplied by meter is payable quarterly.**

Stopping supply.—The water supply will be cut off if not paid when due.

Penalty interest at the rate of 6 per cent. per annum for the first 60 days, and 7 per cent. thereafter, is payable on all overdue taxes and water rates.

COURTS OF JUSTICE.**SUPREME COURT OF CANADA.**

The Supreme Court, as a Court of Appeal, constituted by Dominion Statute (Revised Statutes of Canada, 1927, chap. 35).

is composed of a chief justice and six puisne judges, and has appellate civil and criminal jurisdiction within and throughout the Dominion of Canada. The judges reside at Ottawa, where the Supreme Court holds annually three sessions, the first beginning on the first Tuesday in February, the second on the fourth Tuesday in April and the third on the first Tuesday in October.

EXCHEQUER COURT OF CANADA.

The Exchequer Court, constituted under a Dominion Statute, 50-52 Vic., chap. 16, is presided over by one judge, and has original exclusive jurisdiction in all claims, suits or actions against the Crown. It has concurrent jurisdiction in relation to revenue cases and the enforcement of penalties; in cases respecting patents of invention, trade-marks, copyright and industrial designs and in respect to land patents; cases against Crown officers for anything done or omitted to be done as such officer, and all actions or suits in which the Crown is plaintiff or petitioner and in respect of Railway debts under 3 Ed. VII., ch. 21. Admiralty jurisdiction is vested in the Exchequer Court of Canada, under 53-54 Vic. (Imperial), ch. 27, and 54-85 Vic. (Canadian), ch. 29. The Exchequer Court is also an Imperial Prize Court in time of war. The Court sits at Ottawa every Monday at 11 a.m., except during vacation or the absence of the judge, for hearing motions, demurrers, etc., and for the trial of causes at such places and times as are fixed by the judge, by general or special orders.

(g) For the movage of any sea-going vessel from any place above Section 50 to the eastern limits of the harbour, or vice versa, \$20.00.

(h) For any vessel requiring a pilot to shift from any place within the harbour of Sorel or Three-Rivers, \$15.00.

(1) For the swinging of a vessel during compass adjustment, \$15.00.

(2) Notwithstanding anything herein contained the minimum rate payable between the harbour of Montreal and the harbour of Quebec, and vice versa, or between any intermediate ports, shall be \$20.00.

(3) The moneys collected from vessels subject to payment of compulsory dues and not using a pilot shall be paid into and form part of the Montreal Decayed Pilots' Pension Fund.

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
