SEAWANAHKA BOAT WAS CAPSIZED

Alexandra Struck by a Squall Went Over With Crew.

BROKEN GAFF ONLY DAMAGE

Steamer St. Louis Came to Rescue—First Accident of the Kind to Seawanhaka Racer.

Yesterday was a squally day on Lake St. Louis, and in the afternoon, while the Alexandra and many other boats were sailing off the coast, a violent squall came on and the Alexandra upset.

This accident is not attributed to any tenderness of the new boat, but simply to the fact that the sails could not be lowered in time.

ST. LOUIS TO THE RESCUE. The steamer St. Louis was not far distant, and was by the side of the overturned yacht in a short time.

The Alexandra was afterwards towed back to the Yacht Club, only sustaining a broken gaff.

Both American yachts were also out yesterday, and seemed to stand the heavy weather without any difficulty whatever.

Another Capsize. What might have resulted in a very serious drowning accident occurred yesterday afternoon at Vaudreuil.

The Messrs. Deserres, with two friends, were out sailing in their yacht Jeanette, a half mile from the shore, when a squall came on, and the yacht was overturned.

The young men, who were out on a considerable distance from shore, tried to make for a point on the mainland, when the sudden squall capsized the yacht.

The overturned yacht was seen by some people on land, and they immediately put out to their assistance.

When rescued the young men were much exhausted, and realized their narrow escape. The yacht was afterwards righted, and was towed to shore by Mr. Bert Ambrose's launch.

TRANSCONTINENTAL LINES. Alleged Understanding Between Railways Not Confirmed.

Mr. F. W. Morse, general manager of the Grand Trunk Pacific, disclaims any knowledge of a working understanding having been reached between the Canadian Northern Railway and Grand Trunk Pacific as stated in a special despatch from Ottawa.

The despatch also stated that the understanding was due to the intermediation of Hon. Geo. A. Cox and Hon. Clifford Sifton. It is well known, the despatch adds, that the late Minister of the Interior has established a financial agency in Ottawa under the name of the Canada Assets and Brokerage Company, and reports say that this organization, which has strong backing in powerful quarters, is being used to amalgamate various interests.

The first active step having been the absorption of the Canada Atlantic by the Grand Trunk, and the next being a working arrangement with the Government whereby this corporation secures control of at least running rights, on the Intercolonial.

WILL ROUTE BE CHANGED? Gen-Manager Morse Has No Knowledge of Alleged Change.

Mr. F. W. Morse, General Manager of the Grand Trunk Pacific, disclaims any knowledge of the report that the Government and Grand Trunk Pacific will have to abandon the proposed route across the northern part of the province and come down to North Bay, as was first suggested by the company.

The body of John A. Moorhouse, the little boy who fell overboard from the steamer Three Rivers on Dominion Day, was recovered on Saturday afternoon at Sorel, about eight miles from where the accident occurred.

A jury was summoned by the coroner. After viewing the body the inquest was adjourned until Tuesday at Sorel. With the coroner's consent the remains were brought to Montreal, to be buried by his father on Sunday morning. The funeral will take place on Tuesday afternoon at 3:30 p.m.

Railway Firefighters Organize. The Canadian Pacific Railway Company, recently organized a fire brigade at the Angus shops, consisting of 150 men, 75 of the men being drawn from the car department, and the balance from the locomotive department.

The general foreman, Mr. Rydberg, has been appointed captain of the car men, and the general foreman, Mr. Fenwick, captain of the locomotive men. Mr. Lacey R. Johnson, assistant superintendent of motive power, acts as chief of the brigade. The men have been made familiar with the location and operation of the valves and hydrants throughout the shops, and are called out for drill and instruction every Saturday.

Railways Troubled by Tramps. The railways companies continue to have much trouble with tramps who break into their cars either for the purpose of stealing or to sleep.

EIGHT MEN KILLED BY DYNAMITE

Premature Discharge of Heavy Charge Blew Them to Pieces.

Harrisburg, Pa., July 10.—Eight men were blown to pieces and two others were injured by the premature explosion of a big blast of rock powder on the Pennsylvania Railroad improvements near Cumberland yesterday.

The accident occurred directly across the Susquehanna river from the scene for a distance of 200 yards from the scene of the explosion.

The dead are—James Wiseman, aged 50, dynamite boss, 58 Front avenue, Buffalo.

Arthur Green (colored), steam driller, Harrisburg, Pa.

Robert Thompson (colored), steam driller's help, Harrisburg, Pa.

Frank Mullah, 30 years old. (A Slav.)

Three Indians and one Slav, known only by numbers.

Not a trace of the two colored men who were killed can be found, and it is supposed their bodies were blown into the river, which is being dragged.

An inquest was held yesterday. The jury rendered a verdict of premature explosion from an unknown cause, and no blame was attached to the contractors.

All the killed and injured were laborers, except Wiseman, whose body was terribly mangled. His scalp and a portion of his head was found on a

AMERICANS GATHER IN LONDON

Postponed Celebration of Independence Day Takes Place.

London, July 10.—Dorchester House, the home of the United States Ambassador, Whitehall Road, was the scene of one of the greatest gatherings of Americans ever held in a foreign city.

The occasion was the Fourth of July reception, which was postponed on account of Secretary Hay's death until Saturday.

The banquet house was crowded with Americans and distinguished British subjects.

Between four and six o'clock in the afternoon, Mr. Reid and Mrs. Reid stood at the head of the grand staircase receiving the guests, who arrived in a continuous stream.

The house was prettily decorated with flowers and palms. On the lawn an immense marquee was erected in which refreshments were served.

Among those present were the Duchess of Marlborough, Lord and Lady Chesham, Sir Sydney and Lady Waterloo, Sir James and Lady McGregor, Chief Justice Alverstone, Sir Charles and Lady Wellesley, and the Earl and Countess of Yarmouth.

The belated banquet of the American Society in celebration of the Fourth of July was one first occasion of a public meeting between Whitehall Road and Foreign Secretary Lansdowne since Mr. Reid's appointment as ambassador to Great Britain, and both Lord Lansdowne and Mr. Reid delivered speeches in which they reviewed the late Secretary of State Hay and the good relations existing between Great Britain and the United States were the keynote.

DINED AT THE CECIL. The dinner was held in the banquet hall of the Hotel Cecil, which was crowded with resident and visiting Americans and representative Englishmen.

Marshail O. Fox, president of the American Society, presided. Prominent persons present included Count Wolf-Metternich, the German Ambassador; Tsootai Lang Shao Kai, the Chinese Minister; M. Metaxas, the Greek Minister; Rincon Gallardo, the Mexican Minister; and the Earl of Strathcona and Mount Royal, High Commissioner for Manitoba.

The chairman proposed a toast to King Edward. He was followed by Lord Lansdowne, who toasted President Roosevelt. The toast was then taken by the statesmen of America who did not know of anyone who held a greater fascination for Englishmen than President Roosevelt.

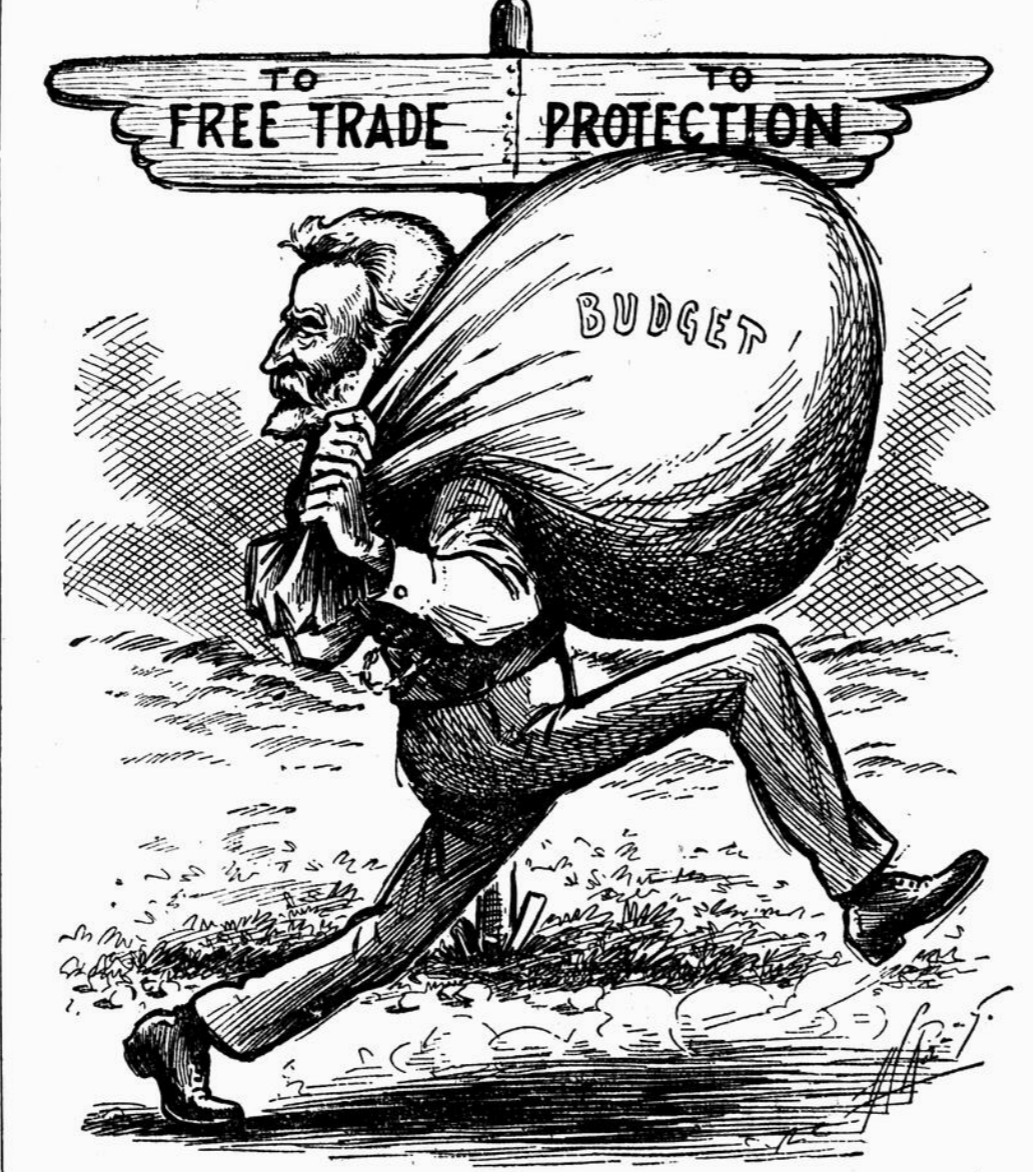
