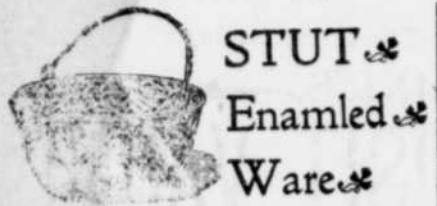

PROMINENT MANITOBA FARMER VICTIM OF AN ACCIDENT.

Shoal Lake, Man., July 6.—A sad fatality occurred here this afternoon, John Templeton, a prominent farmer and one of the pioneer settlers of the district, was driving a load of lumber out of town. His team took fright near the railway station, and ran away. Templeton slipped in front of the load, was kicked by one of the horses, and the wheels of the wagon passed over his chest, causing instant death. Mr. Templeton was a highly respected resident, about 60 years of age, and unmarried. He was one of the Canadian farm delegates to England a year ago.

PORT ARTHUR AGAIN BOMBARDED

Togo Covers the Army's Advance to Within Six Miles of Fortress.

Tokio, July 7.—It is reported that Admiral Togo bombarded the eastern forts at Port Arthur last Monday, covering the army's advance to within six miles of the fortress.

TIGHTEN THEIR GRIP.

London, July 8.—What little news is available in reference to Port Arthur comes from Chinese refugees at Che Foo. According to the doubtful evidence, the Japanese occupy the heights surrounding the fortress, are fortifying Lung Wang Tung six miles to the east, Wolf Mountain five miles to the northeast and other points, completing their cordon around the place. Accepting these statements as true, the critics here foresee the speedy end of the Russian resistance, declaring that the harbor, ships and forts, will be at the mercy of the Japanese artillery.

The refugees further say that the Japanese hold Hwangmichun, and Sanchiupu, seven and eight miles north of Port Arthur, having captured them on June 30, after two days fighting. Other Japanese forces are massing to the eastward, apparently intending to march on. A marine camp containing 20,000 men, landed from the fleet commands the principal pass through the hills back of Port Arthur, which is vital to the safety of the fortress.

LUNG TUNG POSITION.

Che Foo, July 7.—The Chinese report that the Japanese completed their conquest of the Lung Tung position on July 4, the Russians losing a hundred killed and forty wounded. The Russians employed coolies to carry off their dead and wounded. During the fighting fifty coolies were killed.

JAP GUNBOAT SUNK.

Tokio, July 7.—The Japanese gunboat Kaimon struck a mine and sunk in Talienvan Bay on July 5th.

The Kaimon was a small wooden ship twenty years old, and carrying light guns, and about 230 men.

ADVICES TO WASHINGTON.

Washington, D.C., July 7.—The Japanese legation has received the following telegram from Tokio, dated today: "Admiral Togo reports that on July 5 our gunboat Kaimon, while on a special mission in the waters outside of Talienvan, in a dense fog, struck a Russian mine and sank. Three officers, including Commander Takahashi and 19 petty officers and men, are missing. The rest were saved."

COMPLICATIONS ARE THREATENED.

Japan Said to Regard Germany's Attitude With Disfavor.

St. Petersburg, July 6.—In the same Government circles which recently expressed the expectation of Chinese belligerency is now maintained that world-wide complications are imminent. These officials declare that Japan has resolved to regard Germany's attitude as equivalent to a departure from neutrality in favor of Russia. She charges that Germany has sold ships to Russia since the war, knowing they were to be converted into third-class cruisers, but

AT THE WORLD'S FAIR.

The "Inside Inn" is an enormous hotel inside the Fair Grounds at St. Louis. A newspaper man staying there writes:
I am comfortably situated in the Thinside Inn, which is a pleasant little tavern about as big as Missouri Valley. It is built of lath, scantling, jute bagging, wall paper and paint, and is very substantial.
I saw three bell boys carrying the bill for a night's lodging up to the fourth floor just now, and the beams didn't sag much.
The management is careful, though. It puts all new guests on the ground floor. After they have paid their bill for the first day they put them on the second floor. By the time a man has paid his bill for two days he is light enough to go up on the third floor with safety. When he has stayed a week they have to put weights in his pockets to keep him from shooting up through the roof.
I got into the Inn at nine o'clock and I was ninety-sixth in the line. When I got to the clerk he turned me upside down and shook me.
Then he counted what fell out of my pockets, and told me to register, and handed me a blue ticket for a bell boy.
"You have enough money for four days," he said. "Go to the cashier and settle."
My room is No. 5415, three blocks from the public square, and a mile south of the buffet. When I got my receipt and my bell-boy I sat down and waited an hour for a street car. But they told me there wasn't a line in the whole place—not even a hack line. I had to walk all the way to my room, wore out two bell-boys on the way, but there were plenty more. There are more bell-boys than there are guests in the Inn. They use 'em for change. When you give the clerk \$3 for your room he hands you back \$2 and a bell boy.
My room is a little far away for meals, but I make it nicely. I start for supper at 9 a.m., and stop for lunch on the way with a friend I know in room No. 2507.
But a friend of mine who lives in room No. 7649 is up against it. He got two days behind with his meals living out in the country at the rear end of the hotel. Finally he found that he was nearer to Moberly, Mo., than he was to the dining room, so now he walks over to Moberly every morning.—Montreal Herald.

THE QUEEN AND THE FACTORY GIRL.

It is a pretty tale that London has been enjoying of Queen Alexandra's more or less surprise visit to the Alexandra Trust Restaurant in the crowded poor district of the City Road. No better picture of the visit has been given than the record of an habitue of these working class dining rooms, which are the outcome of the combined philanthropy and business of Sir Thomas Lipton. Here are the "lady's" own words: "I was just finished of me paistry when in she walked. Love a duck! I see to Marie, I see, 'Who's this lady?' 'Main—' 'Yes, it is,' see Marie, 'it's the Queen,' she see, and she was right. I tel yer it was alright. She come in jest as if she was you or me; not the littlest bit of side, an' she sat down at a table an' ordered 'er grub—lunch I should sy—from the bill of fare as if she'd bin comin' 'ere ev'ry day of 'er life. Then I don't remember much more, 'cos Marie an' me we stood on our seat, upset our puddin' and cheered. It warn't harf a sign to see 'er eating it, and wot d'yer think, wiv'er gloves on!"
It seems that the Queen's visit was unknown to all but a few and known only to them an hour before she arrived. Her Majesty went to the counter in person for eight 4d dinners, putting down half-a-crown with which to pay. The girl behind the counter pointed out that the money was insufficient, not knowing Her Majesty. Sir Thomas Lipton told her to issue the tickets, but she respectfully declined until Earl de Grey came forward and paid the balance—astute Sir Thomas, he knows how to reach the royal heart.
It was the special desire of the royal party to fare no better than ordinary diners. They had exactly the same china, knives and forks, metal pepper-boxes, and other implements as supplied to other diners. They commenced with ox-tail soup, had a plate of roast lamb each, and finished up with plum pudding and a cup of coffee. Afterwards the Queen inspected the kitchens, chatted with the washing-up girls and some of the factory girls who were dining, and left at half-past two, expressing herself delighted with the excellence of the food and of all the arrangements.

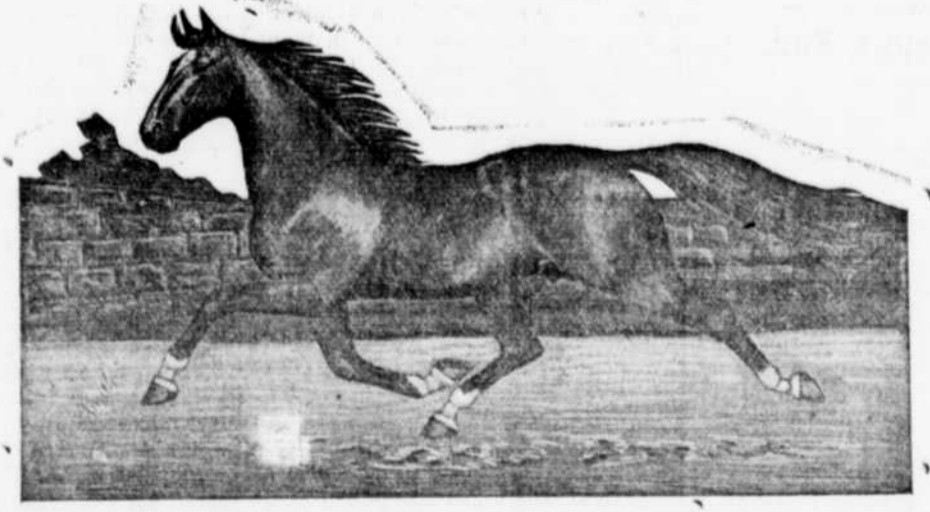

Bathing Facilities.

CITY IMPROVEMENT ASSOCIATION SUGGESTIONS.

At a meeting of the executive of the City Improvement Association, held last night in the Art Hall, the following report was received from the special committee appointed to enquire into the matter of suitable bathing facilities:

"In accordance with the appointment of the undersigned as a committee, on the location of a suitable public bathing site on the St. Francis River, the committee beg to report as follows:—Having examined the banks of the St. Francis, we are of the opinion that the erection of a shelter of some kind at a point to be definitely fixed upon at low water, at the south end of Ball's Island, would be desirable spot for such site. For the convenience of bathers using this site, we suggest the erection of a shelter above normal high water mark, with steps leading therefrom to the banks of the river, terminating in a floating platform. We believe the location to be fairly safe, and it has the advantage of strict privacy, no annoyance to neighbors or citizens generally being likely to ensue."

The sketch attached to the report shows a substantial wooden building 9 ft by 21 ft. 3in. and 7 ft high, with a four foot platform running the full length of the building. The estimated cost is \$91.00. The Association have no doubt about the utility of the erection under consideration, but before the sum mentioned is spent it would be as well if those who regard the proposed site unfavorably, would write to that effect to the Secretary, Mr. E. W. Farwell. While no doubt can be entertained as to the wisdom of erecting a building of the sort, it is possible that another locality would be more suitable to those concerned.

Tuesday was a busy day in camp when Lord Aylmer inspected the troops. Thirteen hundred men lined up in response to the bugle call—the 6th Duke of Connaught Royal Canadian Hussars, the 7th, 11th, and further away, their bright red tunics showing up in vivid contrast, the 13th Scottish Light Dragoons.

HIS TRADE THRIVES ON WAR.

(From the N.Y. Sun.) The manager of a New York concern that deals in artificial limbs and such things is watching the outcome of the war in the Far East with more than ordinary interest.

"After the civil war," he said, "this house, which up to that time occupied cramped quarters, had to branch out in order to meet the demands upon its business. We noticed no increase in our trade growing out of the Spanish-American war, but we expect to open a house in Tokio, and maybe at Harbin and Mukden, after the war is over.

"It would be no use doing so before. While the war lasts the hospitals will take care of the maimed. When it is over and the maimed survivors have gone to their homes and are returning to their vocations then they will want what we shall have to offer.

It is quite common to hear people talk about the great numbers of cripples in a city like New York, made so by the many accidents which occur daily. It is an erroneous impression.

"My business is a barometer on such matters. In a purely business way we have occasion to complain of dull times. In proportion to the great crowds that daily come and go, taking into consideration the countless ways for accidents to occur, it is truly remarkable that we have no more cripples.

"Speaking from a commercial standpoint, concerns like the one I represent might be opposed to the Hague tribunal. The more wars, the better for us. Rather merciless is it not? But it's business.
