## Police arm patrol cars with shotguns

Two Westmount Police cars and the city's Public Safety vehicle are now equipped with 12-gauge shotguns installed within easy reach of the driver.

"It is our intention to arm policeman at least as well as some of the criminals who might be roaming the area," explained a police official. "All our men have been trained in the use of the weapons and they will not be used indiscriminately."

He said the department intended to ultimately install the shotguns in all police cars.

In the past, men in patrol cars carried only sidearms. Rifles and shotguns have long been part of the Police Department's armament, the official explained, but they have never been a regular feature of the patrol car's equipment.

Westmount is the only municipality in the area to have this feature.

### All policemen experienced in use of shotguns

All members of the Department are required to fire a substantial number of rounds per month with the conventional sidearms and the new shotguns in the basement practice range. Frequent competitions are held between policemen and members of Westmount regiments.

Shotguns were chosen over rifles "as they seemed to best fill the need for some type of armament and because they were immediately available."

Both the Police and Fire Departments reported a relatively quiet week. The only traffic accident causing injury occurred Sunday morning when two cars collided at Clarke and Sherbrooke.

Marc Bellecourt, 431 Wood avenue, driver of one of the cars and Miss L. Schroub, a passenger, were slightly injured and

taken to Montreal General Hospital.

The driver of the other car, Antonio Sacconaghi, was unhurt. Both vehicles received damages estimated at \$200.

## Local child drowns in private pool

A young Westmount girl drowned last week in a private swimming pool on Lansdowne avenue.

Julie Agnes Delo, three, of 129 Arlington avenue was seen lying at the bottom of the pool at 501 Lansdowne avenue by a maid, late Thursday afternoon. It was impossible to rescue the girl immediately because of the paralyzing cold of the water, and the woman phoned police who had her hooked out nine minutes after receiving the call.

A fireman jumped into the water to rescue the child, but found he was unable to move after a few seconds. Ice was still floating on the surface.

Mouth to mouth respiration, and oxygen from the Public Safety Vehicle failed to have any effect. The girl was soon pronounced dead by a doctor from the Montreal General Hospital. She had been in the water for twenty minutes.

The pool is surrounded by a wooden fence and police do not know how the child reached it.

## Exhibition at Westmount Library

An exhibition of oil paintings by John Little, RCA, will be shown in the Westmount Public Library starting this week and running until May 3.

John Little was born in Montreal in 1928 and attended Mount Royal High School. He studied painting at the Montreal Museum Art School under Arthur Lismer and later at the Art Students' League in New York.

## No Hepatitis upsurge seen in Westmount

No significant increase in the number of cases of infectious hepatitis in Westmount has been reported according to Dr. D. G. Mackay, City Health Officer, although "there is probably more of it in this area than generally recognized."

"I am aware of a great increase in the incidence of this disease in the Greater Montreal, but do not know of any significant increase in Westmount," Dr. Mackay stated.

Dr. Mackay said that the Health Department's only

sources of information on the incidence of the disease were the reports sent in by family (Continued on page 7)

# This Week in Westmount

The official opening and dedication of Grace Haven, the Salvation Army Home for unwed mothers was attended by many volunteer workers from Westmount. The ceremonies were presided over by Commissioner W. Wycliffe Booth, L.L.D. to whom the key to the edifice was presented, and who officially opened the home.

Grace Haven is an addition to the Catherine Booth Maternity Hospital in connection with the expansion plans now underway, and is one of 18 Salvation Army Homes in Canada, for girls facing unwed motherhood, providing protection, guidance and understanding care.

Catherine Booth Hospital will continue to provide

obstetrical services to cases from the "Home" as before.

Commissioner W. Wycliffe Booth, L.L.D., the Territorial Commander of The Salvation Army is the grandson of the Army's founder and first General, William Booth, and son of General Bramwell Booth.

A fund raising campaign to take place during the first two weeks of May is scheduled to aid the Salvation Army with construction costs. In the Westmount area canvassers are being recruited by Mrs. J. F. Evans, 4290 Montrose avenue; and Mrs. G. H. Montgomery, 4689 Westmount avenue.

Westmounters are receiving Charter Flight literature by mail proposing a trip to Greece next fall which is being organized by the Junior Associates of the Montreal Museum of Fine Arts. A 109 seat Britannica aircraft is being reserved, and some of the following plans are on the programme: Leaving Montreal Saturday, September 14, 1963; and returning from Athens Sunday, October 6; Fare is \$296 per person return.

To join, a person must have been a member of the Montreal Museum for at last six months prior to the departure of the flight; several alternative ideas for short and long tours of Greece and the Greek Islands for groups of 30 to 40; and further details will be mailed to those who have sent in a deposit for a reservation.

## Local students to test their mathematical wits

A large number of students from high schools in Westmount will test their mathematical wits at a province wide competition May 3. The occasion is the fifth annual contest sponsored by the Canadian Mathematical Congress

and more than \$2,000 in scholarships and prizes are at stake. In all, over six hundred students will compete.

The competition, a three hour examination which can be written either in English or French, is open to Grade XI students in the province who are recommended by their mathematics teachers. Montreal Island students will write at McGill University (English) or the University of Montreal (French). Students from other parts of the province will write the exam at their school. Deadline for entries is April 20.

### Scholarships for winners

The top six contestants will be awarded \$250 scholarships provided by Sun Life Assurance Company of Canada. In addition there will be cash prizes of \$100 to the winner, \$50, second prize, and twenty \$25 prizes to district winners and other high ranking candidates.

The purpose of the competition is to promote the study of mathematics, and encourage youngsters with a natural bent in this field to pursue their interest in it.

A seminar and prize giving will be held in Montreal for the 50 top contestants and a number of their teachers, May 25.

## Obituary

### Miss Ethel Seath, prominent artist

Funeral for Ethel Seath, resident of Victoria avenue, Westmount, a founding member of the Canadian Group of Painters and teacher at The Study for 45 years, was held this week.

Born and educated in Montreal, she began her career as an illustrator, but soon abandoned commercial art for teaching.

Shortly after her friend Miss Gascoigne founded The Study in 1915, she joined the staff as art teacher and held the position until her retirement last June.

In her later years at the girls school, she taught grandchildren of her first pupils. An outstanding teacher, she was for a time headmistress of the lower school. She also gave Saturday courses at the Montreal Museum of Fine Arts.

She was a guiding spirit of the Canadian Group of Painters (which succeeded the Group of Seven) and her pictures have hung in the National Gallery of Canada, in the Quebec Art Gallery, in the Montreal Museum of Fine Arts, as well as in The Study and many private collections.

She was an eclectic artist who drew heavily on nature for subject matter and whose chief concern was always with color and design.

An enthusiastic Canadian, she found her inspiration in her own countryside.

Survivors include two nieces, Mrs. W. D. Mahaffy and Mrs. C. Emberg, and a nephew, Herbert Seath, all of Montreal.

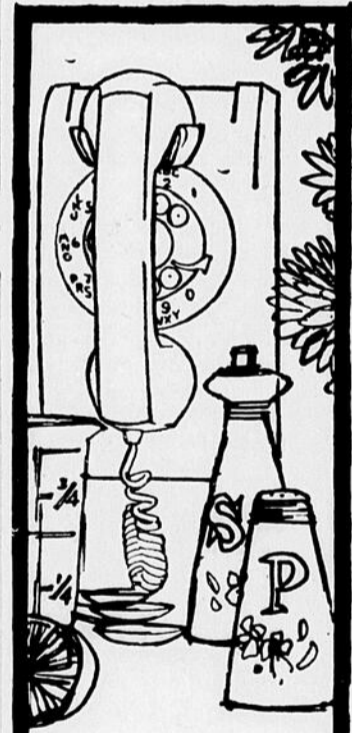

## 'Romeo and Juliet' slated for Westmount

After three performances to packed houses in Hudson last month, the Hudson Players are bringing their production of Shakespeare's "Romeo and Juliet" to Westmount High School Saturday, April 27.

The production is directed by Stanley Mallough, a graduate of the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art in London, England. Mr. Mallough also takes the part of Romeo.

Juliet is played by Barbara Henshaw, who was trained at the MRT Theatre School under Eleanor Stuart. Helen Zajchowski, well-known for her appearances on the Montreal professional stage and on Shoestring Theatre, has the part of Juliet's earthly and practical nurse, Angelica.

Costumes are a noteworthy feature of this production. They were designed and made by Charlotte Mallough, a professional dress designer from Switzerland, and the wife of the director. Working from sketches of the period to ensure maximum authenticity, Mrs. Mallough costumed the cast of 37 to a high standard. Months of work were involved, starting with the dyeing of material to the required shades.

Fencing scenes were coached

extensively by Mr. Leslie Krasa, former British Empire Games team member.

Coaching in another field — that of ballroom dancing — was provided by Miss Maisie MacPhee, Associate Director of the Pointe Claire Academy of Ballet.

## Sam Steinberg of Westmount named 'Man of the Year'

A Westmounter, whose family name has become a household word was this week named 1963 Man of the Year by the Montreal Israel Bond Organization. He is Sam Steinberg, 25 Aberdeen avenue, head of one of the most successful retail food store chains in Canada.

Mr. Steinberg will be honored at a dinner on April 21 at the Queen Elizabeth Hotel. He becomes the third outstanding Canadian to be thus honored. Previous recipients of the award were the Rt. Hon. Louis St. Laurent in 1961 and Samuel Bronfman, also of Westmount, last year.

Lord Edwin Samuel, Viscount of Mount Carmel and Toxteth will be guest speaker at the dinner. He is one of Israel's leading specialists on public affairs.

S. J. Davidson, and Milton L. Klein, QC, MP, general chairman of the Montreal Israel Bond Organization will preside.

Born in Hungary 57 years ago Mr. Steinberg has been in the retail food business for 45 years, starting as an after-school general assistant in his mother's grocery store.

For many years he has played an active role in the communal activities. His interest in the arts and sciences was recognized last year when he was appointed a member of the Canada Council. He is national director and co-chairman of the Canadian Council of Christians and Jews, a life governor of the faculty of Commerce at Laval University and President of the Canadian Israel Chamber of Commerce.

## Drs. D.R. Murphy, E.D. Wittkower, receive McGill appointments

The appointment of two Westmounters to the rank of full professor at McGill University was announced this week by Dr. H. Rocke Robinson, principal and vice-chancellor on behalf of the board of governors.

Appointed are: Dr. David R. Murphy, 31 Forde avenue, Westmount, associate professor of surgery to professor of surgery.

Dr. Eric D. Wittkower, 333 Clarke avenue, Westmount, associate professor of psychiatry to professor of psychiatry.

Other appointment include: Harold Spence-Sales, to professor of architecture; and Miss Vernon Ross, to professor of library science.

These are effective June 1. Dr. Murphy is a Westmounter who graduated from McGill in 1939 with a B.Sc. degree. He received his MD in 1942, M.Sc. in experimental surgery in 1949 and a diploma in surgery in 1950, all from McGill. Dr. Murphy is currently surgeon-in-chief at the Montreal Children's Hospital.

Dr. Wittkower is now consulting psychiatrist at the Montreal General Hospital and an associate psychiatrist at the Royal Victoria Hospital. He has some 150 published works, including many books and book

contributions. He received his formal education at the University of Berlin, MD 1924, and the universities of Edinburgh and Glasgow.

Harold Spence-Sales is a graduate of the University of New Zealand. He has been chairman of the committee on physical planning at McGill since 1948. He was appointed as a planning consultant of McGill in 1962.

Miss Ross earned her MA degree at McGill in 1926 and her BS in library science at Columbia in 1937. She is the director of the McGill Library School, where she started as a reviser in 1935. She is a mem-

ber of numerous library associations and education committees.

**Investigation needed into PTC buses**

IT is high time that the provincial government, which seems so interested in progress, took a long, hard look at one of its franchised public carriers, the Provincial Transport Company.

It is somewhat ridiculous to see the "milk run" buses, dirty but brand new, in comparison with the "express run" buses, also dirty, and old and decrepid to boot. Have a look any rush hour on Sherbrooke street.

Surely the PTC has established some sort of record for gathering together the country's biggest collection of bad drivers who take a perverse pleasure in disregarding all the rules of safety, and forcing more careful motorists into the unfortunate position of having to fight for their very existence on the highways.

**Influence of radio, movies TV, grows at Westmount Library**

This is the third part of a history of the Westmount Public Library covering its growth and work in the community from the war years to 1949.

The first part, which appeared two weeks ago in The Examiner, dealt with the Library's beginnings in 1897 when it was established as a mere substitute for a statue of Queen Victoria and covered its rapid growth to a position as reportedly "the city's most valuable institution."

The second part covered expansion and remodelling of the institution from 1936 to the beginning of the Second World War.

An interesting feature in the progress of the Westmount Public Library has been the growing influence of movies and the radio, and more recently of television on the people's reading. A book mentioned on radio, or made into a film or shown on TV is in demand the next day.

During the war, a Central Magazine and Book Depot was set up in the Sun Life Building to serve Military District No. 4. The Library collected many magazines and paper backs for distribution.

It was in 1940 that Summer Loans were instigated and borrowers were permitted to take out five older books for the vacation period. This has proved very popular.

During July and August of 1940 a small deposit of children's books was maintained at the playground shelter on Clondeboye Ave. For three hours a week for two months these were available to children in the district. This work could only be carried on in the summer due to lack of heating facilities. The space was limited.

**Westmount Historical Association**

In 1944 at the suggestion of Mr. Roy Campbell, then President of the Westmount Municipal Association, the Westmount Historical Association was formed.

The main purpose was the collection and preservation of all material pertaining to the early days of Westmount and Cote St. Antoine, papers of all kinds, photographs and maps.

The Library was named Curator of any such material and under the enthusiastic guidance of Miss Alice Light-hall, the project was started. Photostats of several maps and documents from the Archives of Montreal were provided from the general fund of the City and several small but interesting gifts were received from the citizens.

An exhibit was arranged in the Library early in 1945 and was opened by the Mayor. Such interest was shown that the exhibit remained on view for four weeks.

**S. P. Dunlop forms Music Appreciation Group**

Under the leadership of Mr. S. P. Dunlop a music appreciation group was formed and met each fortnight in the Library. Mr. Dunlop planned the programs, lent the records and necessary equipment and gave endlessly of his time to the project. This series of programs continued till the spring of 1947.

The end of the war had several immediate effects on the Library. The downward

trend in circulation was halted and an upswing experienced during the last few months of the year. Libraries thrive most when employment levels are low and the converse is true.

**Effects of war**

In Westmount a large percentage of borrowers have always been men. When the young and able-bodied entered the Armed Services, those who are older, through pressure of work, have little time for reading.

To an almost equal extent, the lives of many women were changed. The lack of the usual domestic help in many homes, cut down the leisure of the house wife, and among young women and girls many enlisted or went to work. Gasoline rationing also appeared to have an effect.

The use of the Reading room increased and the type of books asked for changed considerably as people once more began to plan and think of the future.

The sad effects of war time production began to

# Close Western avenue to ALL traffic, report recommends

This is the ninth of a series of reports on Westmount's "master plan" for redevelopment of Westmount between Sherbrooke street and the southern limits.

The planning firm of Bland, Lemoine and Edwards spent eight months on an intensive study of the lower area of Westmount in order to provide "a sound basis for regulation to preserve the unique character of Westmount and at the same time, provide for its orderly redevelopment."

Much of the new zoning by-law, approved recently by City Council, is based on information given in this report. Future planners will draw heavily from it.

The following recommendations are the end result of the long study. It should be noted that many are long-term proposals, many may be impossible to carry out. A knowledge and understanding of them is, nevertheless, vital. An enlightened and responsible society is the only guarantee of satisfactory conditions in a community.

The firm of Bland, Lemoine and Edwards, Architects and Town Planning Consultants recommended the following.

### Major Roads and traffic

It is recommended that:

1. In order to relieve the southern area of much of the metropolitan traffic, enthusiastic support should be given to the proposals to construct expressways to the south and west of Westmount.
2. In order to preserve the residential character of the area adjacent to Westmount Park, Western avenue should be closed to traffic from Claremont to Clarke avenues.
3. In order to develop the areas between St. Catherine street and the railway and to provide an easier flow of traffic in the southern area

a new road be built north of the railway between Glen road and Atwater avenue.

4. In order to facilitate the movement of traffic in the southern area a system of major roads be established and so designed to accommodate their particular density of traffic.

### Circulation and 'super-blocks'

5. A system of one-way traffic be adopted wherever possible throughout the southern area.

6. The City of Montreal's proposal to couple St. Catherine street and St. Luke-Burnside into a one-way system should be extended

wherever necessary.

11. In order to promote adequate development in non-residential use districts additional lanes be established where they currently do not exist.

12. New car parking facilities be provided within the interiors of street blocks utilizing the lanes as a direct means of circulation.

13. Additional parking space be provided in lay-bys adjacent to streets requiring extra parking facilities.

14. Extensive car parks be provided adjacent to the major shopping centres.

### Zoning revisions

15. The residential zones adjacent to Westmount Park be preserved for single and two family dwellings.

16. The multi-family residential zones be consolidated in the areas immediately around single and two family dwelling zones.

17. Unzoned public land be recognized as defined zones for public purposes and in some cases expanded to incorporate adjacent residential and institutional uses.

18. The commercial zones for shops and offices be re-

organized to create definite shopping centres and office or mixed development districts.

19. The industrial zone north of the railway property be eliminated and that industrial development be located only south of the railway.

### Zoning districts

20. The basis of zoning should be extended to include the objective of encouraging fine shopping places, convenient and pleasant areas for professional

and commercial offices, areas for public buildings and areas for manufacturing, as well as maintaining the various categories of residential areas.

21. The permitted uses within each district be clearly defined and presented in a table.

22. In specific areas maximum height lines should be established in the interest of civic design.

23. The zoning districts should be classified according to uses, height limits and bulk requirements.

7. The principle of the super-block should be adopted as a device for conserving and improving the character of the area within the block.

8. The circulatory pattern of traffic within the super-block be such to eliminate or minimize unnecessary through traffic.

9. The widths of pavement be standardized wherever possible to conform to the density of traffic they should carry.

### Lanes and parking facilities

10. The existing network of lanes be improved by their widening in certain locations and by the provision of means of ingress and egress

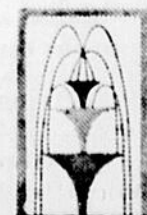

doctors. "In the case of school-children contacting some infectious disease we have the school report to go on, but we do not always get a truly accurate picture of the rate among adults," he said.

A substantial upsurge of the Hepatitis has been noted in the number of Montreal suburbs in the past two weeks. Over 200 cases of the disease were reported last year in Quebec, about half of them from the Montreal area. No figures were immediately available for Westmount although "the disease seems to be on the increase to some extent."

Dr. Mackay said it was possible the hepatitis virus was spread through municipal water purification systems, but not likely. "There is a vast amount not known about this disease, about the source of infection."

Symptoms of hepatitis resemble in some respects those accompanying flue, although the disease has a much harsher effect on its victim.

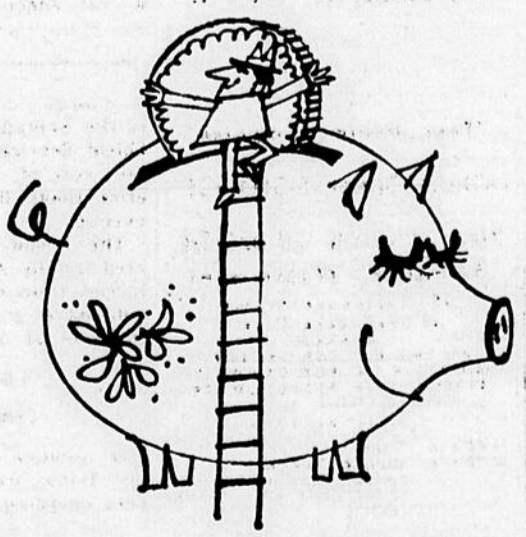

**UNRECOGNIZED DANGER**

It is surprising that so many people do not recognize poison ivy although, unfortunately, it is one of our commonest weeds, widely distributed. Any part of the plant, root, stem, leaves or berries, will cause the itching burning rash that appears on the skin one or two days after coming in contact with the plant. The leaflets grow in trees on the stem and the whitish green berries grow in clusters. If there is any suspicion of having walked through, or touched poison ivy, the skin should be thoroughly washed with strong household soap or detergent.

### RCGA announces amateur status rule changes

The Royal Canadian Golf Association today announced several important changes in the rules of amateur status which are of interest to all golfers, both amateur and professional. These amendments may be summarized, as follows:

The rule which stated that after the 21st birthday, amateur status was forfeited if compensation was received for serving as a caddie, caddy-master, an assistant caddy-master, or an employee engaged in making, repairing or cleaning clubs, or selling golf merchandise in a golf shop has been rescinded.

It is not felt that persons serving in these capacities have any more advantage than persons working on the greens staff, locker room or in the clubhouse and consequently they should not be penalized by being classed as professionals.

It was formerly implied by the rules that there were several things which could be done before the nineteenth birthday which would not professionalize a person. Such an interpretation of amateur status now applies to those who irrespective of age:

#### Receive compensation

For serving as a professional golfer or as a teaching or playing assistant to a professional golfer.

For giving instruction in playing golf.

For allowing his name or likeness to be used for the advertisement of anything for sale.

For personal appearance involving his golfing skill or golfing reputation.

In connection with the publication of golf articles or books.

Because of golfing skill or golfing reputation from anyone dealing in golf merchandise.

#### And to one who

Takes any action which clearly indicates the intention of becoming a professional golfer;

Accepts a prize or testimonial having a retail value exceeding \$200.00. Note: Previous retail value was \$150.00;

Accepts, without full payment, golf equipment, golf merchandise or golf clothing from anyone dealing in such merchandise;

Accepts membership or privileges in a golf club without full payment because of golfing skill or golfing reputation;

Accepts because of golfing skill or golfing reputation any consideration to be a student in an educational institution, except under certain approved circumstances.

These amendments are, in the opinion of those concerned, a forward step in clearly defining amateur status and at the same time recognizing the necessity of making the rules realistic and in keeping with present day requirements both at the club level and taking into account the changing conditions in golf generally.
