

**KINGSTON, U. C. June, 15.**

Kingston for the last ten days has been unusually gay—towards which the return of Sir FRED. RICK ROBINSON among us has perhaps contributed not a little.

On Thursday the 6th inst. that highly distinguished corps, the Glengary Light Infantry, commanded by Lieut. Col. Battersby, came down from York in the Montreal and Netley, ships of war, and disembarked for the purpose of being disbanded—Same day the 70th Regiment entertained Col. Battersby and all his officers at their Mess Room, where good Wine and fellowship succeeded in keeping them to a late hour. On Saturday morning the 70th Regiment were reviewed on the field outside the picketing and in the evening gave a dinner to Major Gen. Sir Frederick Robinson, and Major General De Watteville, previous to those officers leaving Canada. There were present the Captains and Commissioners of the Navy, the Staff of the Division and all the heads of Departments. The band of the Regiment attended, and many loyal and appropriate toasts were drank.

On Tuesday last the Racing commenced for the first Spring meeting.—The weather was fine, the course good and sport excellent.

On Wednesday the races were resumed with unabated spirit, and rather more sport shewn than on the preceding day.

On Friday the Mess of the Artillery and Engineers gave a dinner to Sir Fredrick Robinson and Major Gen. De Watteville, to which the staff and heads of departments were also invited.
