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Fighting Tigers Barely Beat Sheenboro Lads

Shawville bounced back from a 6-0 deficit to take a narrow 8-7 win from Sheenboro in an Upper Ottawa Valley Baseball League game last Sunday. The win moves Tigers into a first-place tie with Vinton.

For the third game in a row 18-year-old righthander Bryan Murray did all the pitching for Shawville. He survived a six-run Sheen outburst in the first inning and went on to

pick up his second win of the season in strong fashion.

Catcher Wayne Chamberlain capped a determined Shawville comeback by driving in the tying and winning runs in the fifth inning with a clean single.

In the second inning Shawville had scored five runs while Sheen added one more to make it 7-5 in their favour. Shawville's three runs in the fifth inning brought the score to its final count — 8-7 for the defending champs.

Murray tossed a six-hitter, walking two, fanning six, and holding Sheen scoreless for the last seven innings. Big righthander Ed Walker took the pitching loss after relieving brother Ken on the Sheen mound in the second inning. (Continued on Page Six)

All the introductions from the platform, made by President Arthur Kilgour, were well applauded, especially that of Secretary Nellis Hodgins who with his wife's great assistance has been kept very busy tying up all the strings involved in the new building. But if a record had been kept it would show that the loudest acclaim was for Russell Judd who risked a lot and came out victorious as the contractor for the most ambitious and functionally useful building in this County.

The money realized by admissions to the evening event was considerably augmented by money made both by admissions and at the booth during the afternoon's racing events. Every cent concerned was turned over to the Building Committee and it is a credit to Pontiac's harness racers that top notch officials were happy to give their time to make the day a success.

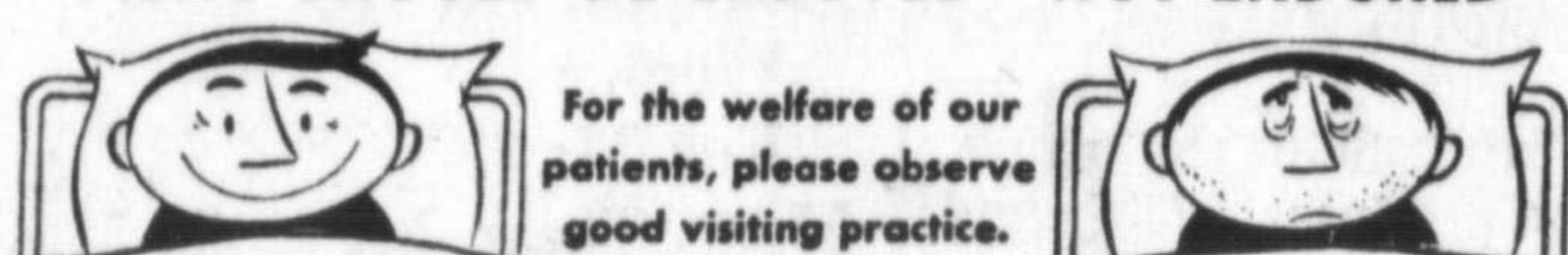

Salute to Algonquins

Recently TV Station CJOH televised the epic of Simon Fraser's exploration of the B.C. river which bears the name of that intrepid explorer from County Glengarry.

Simon Fraser's voyageurs included Ottawa Valley canoe-men. The only portion of the Fraser River which defied their navigational skill and daring is known as Hell's Gate.

The spectacle of those splendid Algonquin-made canoes responding to their paddlers' guidance in battle with storming torrents, was something to see and seeing, to realize how such handcraft of our Algonquin fellow-citizens made such exploration possible.

No people in North America matched the Algonquin centered in this Ottawa Valley and their chieftains resided at Alouettes Island. Champlain called them Algonquins of the Isle.

Explorers pushed the confines of Canada west to the Pacific. Missionaries, Fur Traders and the settlers of Canada West were enabled to establish Canada's claim coast to coast thanks to birch canoes patterned on those of the Algonquins of the Isle.

Salute To Algonquins Of The Isle

Canadians cruised this Ottawa eight thousand years of yore.

Their river craft of ages lie along Portage du Fort. Since era Point Peninsula, from log to water-shoe,

They wrought in skill their craft until they made the bark canoe.

Bark of the birch Algonquins used and their canoes excelled

In lightness, strength and speed the best that hand of man propelled.

Their king size, used in Fur Trade, carried two tons overall

And won the terms: Canots-a-Maitre. Canoes of Montreal.

With birchen bodies, ribs of cedar, gunnels of white ash,

These thoroughbreds superbly sped their rhythmic paddle-plash.

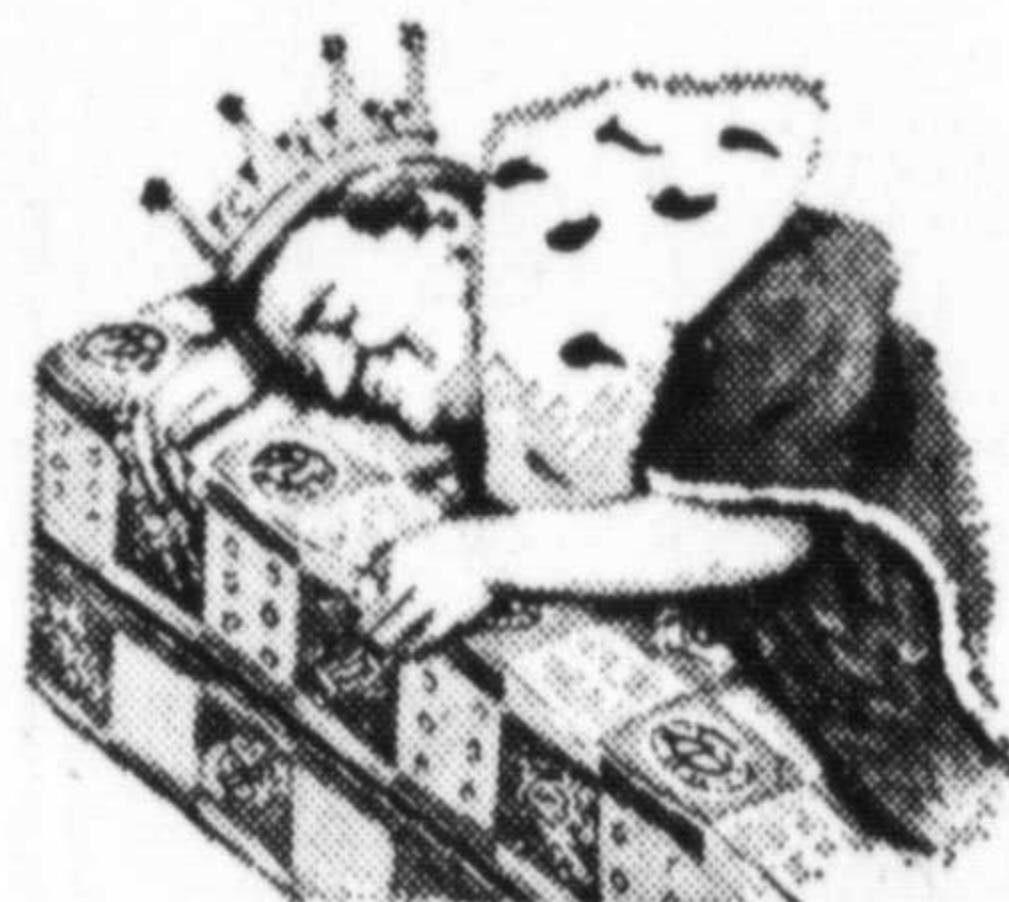



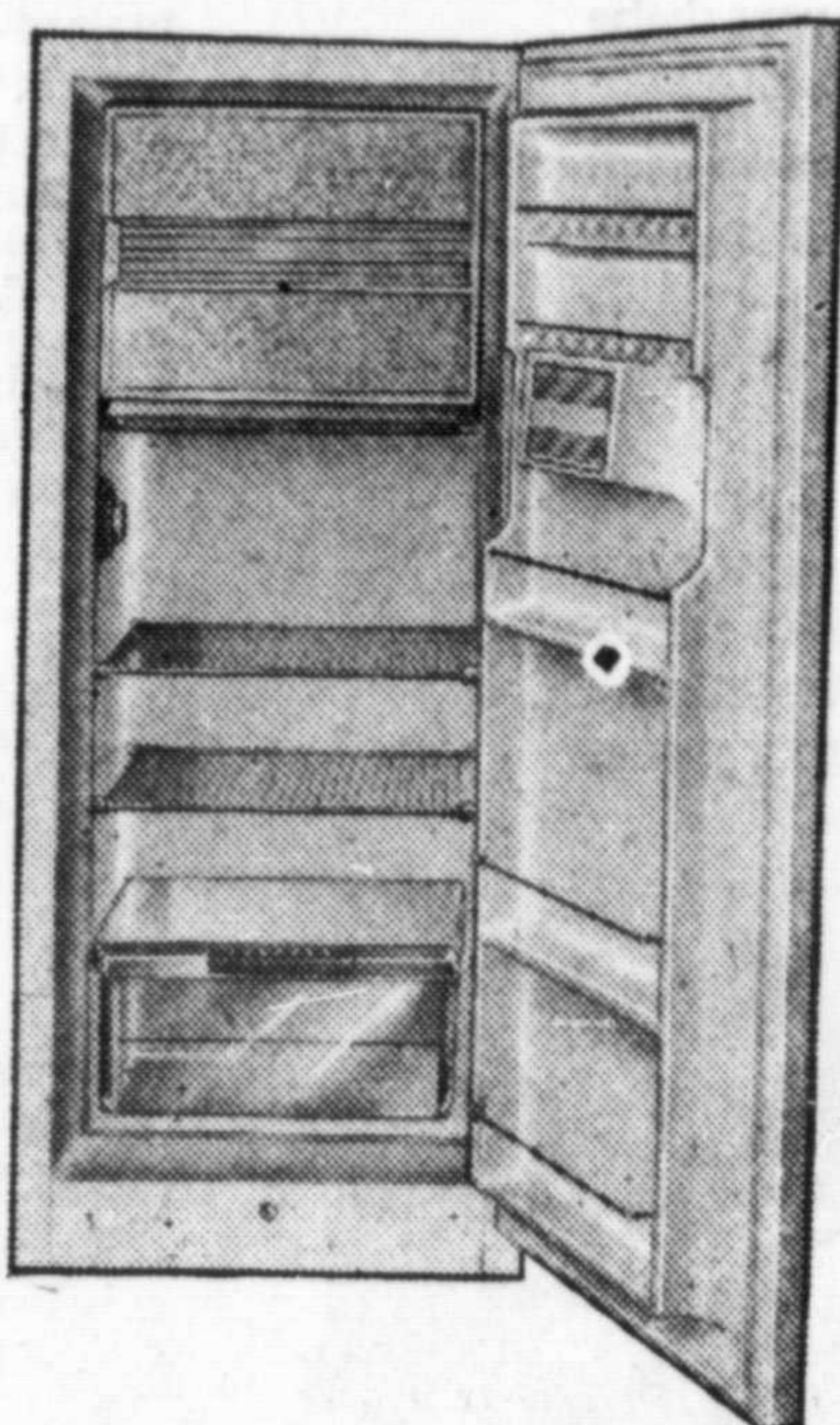

Walt Whitman burst upon the international scene as a writer of a new revolutionary poetry, completely divorced from the classical from hitherto accepted on the American continent which had been dictated by the European writers.

Whitman styled himself as the "Poet of Democracy" and sincerely felt that his writing embodied a new style which, overcoming the initial storm of criticism (anticipated by him) would establish a new trend and become identified as a native American poetry.

He lived to find himself accepted by such intellectuals as Ralph Waldo Emerson and William Dean Howells and his poetry has, in more recent years, been acknowledged and acclaimed by the more radical artist. His work has enjoyed a certain limited success in European circles, his greatest triumph being, however, reserved for the American scene.

Our selection reveals Whitman in a restrained and sober mood, saddened by the loss of his greatest admirer and supporter who had been primarily responsible for the publication of Whitman's earlier work.

"By Emerson's Grave"

We stand by Emerson's new made grave without sadness,
Indeed in solemn joy and faith, almost hauteur,
Our soul-benison no more.
Warrior rest; thy task is done,
For one beyond the warriors of the world lies surely symbolized
here,
A just man
Poised on himself,
All-loving, all-enclosing and sane,
And clear as the sun.

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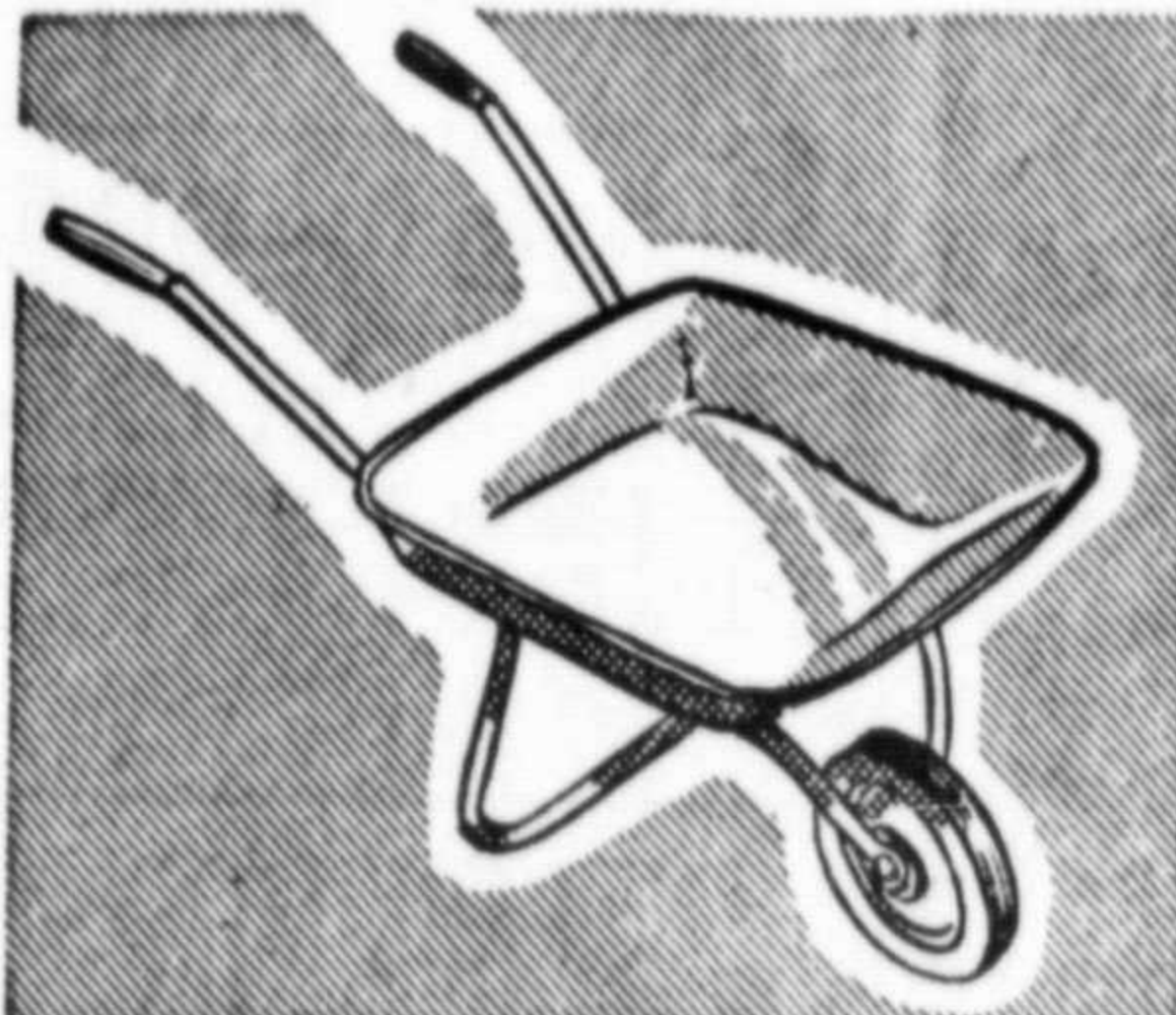


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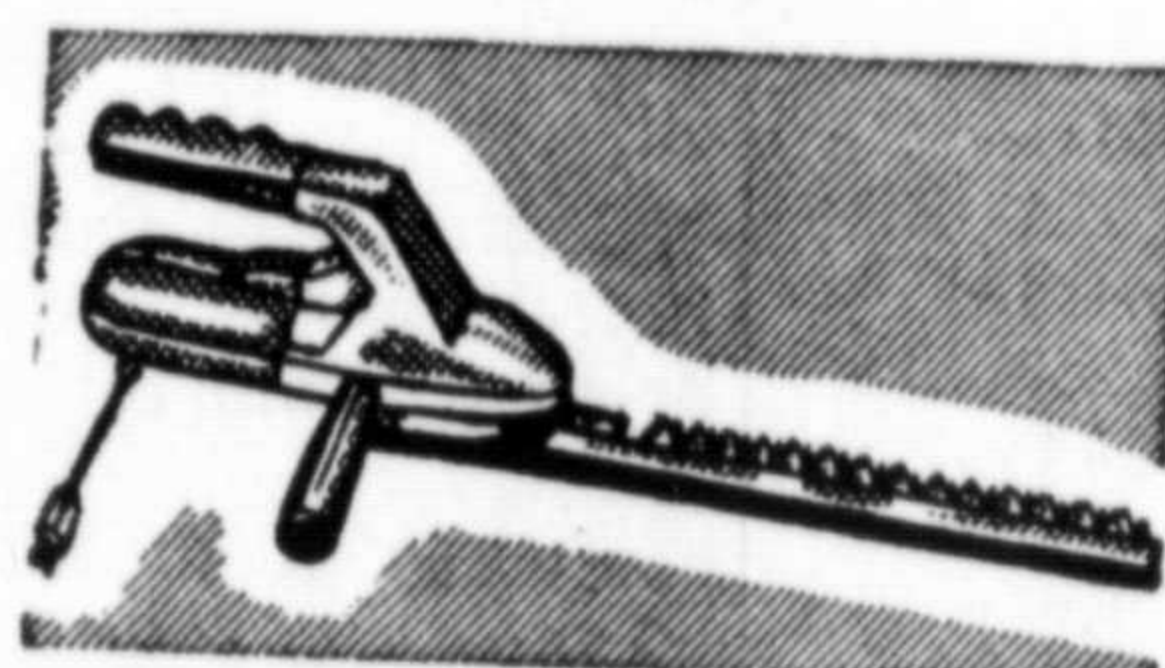

Frank Ryan couldn't make it to Shawville but he sent one of his young lads, Lowell Green, who saw to the broadcasting of the official opening over CFRA.

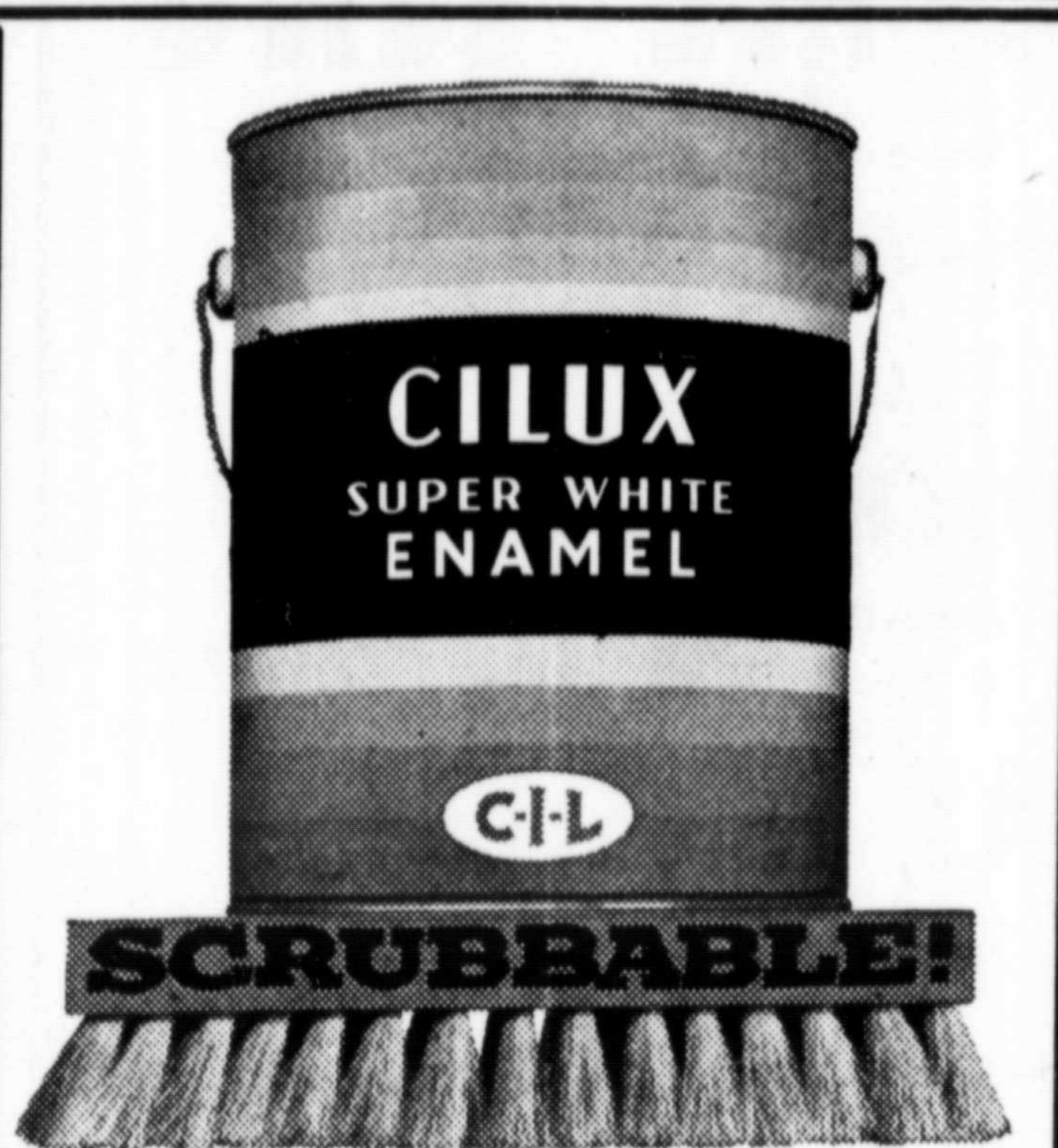

Do You Know?

The omission of the words "all or some" in everyday conversation, seems to me, to be the source of much strife and misunderstanding.

As an illustration you have heard it said, that red haired people are bad tempered, this is a grossly exaggerated statement. So far as I know the necessary statistical research into the association between red hair and bad temper has never been done; and if it were done it would surprise me if red haired people were more bad tempered than those not red haired. There are many other statements or clichés which are just as ambiguous, such as, "the city child is more intelligent than the country child, the Americans are individualists, farmers are independent, grass is cow feed, teen-agers are bad today, or horses eat hay."

The above examples give you an idea of the ambiguity of phrases. Would it not be clearer and less contentious if the following were used instead: Some red haired people are bad tempered; Some city children are more clever than some (all) country children; some Americans are individualists or Russians think that all Americans are individualists; all farmers in Pontiac are independent, but some are dependent upon good markets to retain their independence; some grasses make good cow feed or all cows eat some grass; some teen-agers are bad in the eyes of some people, or all teenagers are bad in the eyes of all people; all horses eat hay or some horses do not eat hay.

I suggest that all white and black have some gray within them and that absolute facts are the exception instead of the rule. It reminds me of a story in one of William James books "he was out on a camping trip and he took a stroll into the woods, on returning the rest of the party were in a ferocious philosophical dispute — The problem was this, suppose a squirrel is on one side of a tree trunk and a man is on the other side. The man starts going around the tree, but however fast he goes around, the squirrel goes in the same direction so that it keeps the trunk of the tree between the man and itself. The question was whether the man went round the squirrel or not. The disputants were evenly divided and were not coming to a solution of the problem. They appealed to William James, who replied, it is not a question of facts but of words, of how one is to use the words "go around".

The purpose of this discussion is to bring to light, the need, to use words correctly in our main media of communication — conversation — and I have found that two handy words (tools) are all and some, which if used with discretion will aid discussion and avoid misunderstanding. I speak as a layman and I think that the layman's part of any discussion is to weaken the wine of the experts and make sure that his voice is heard and understood.

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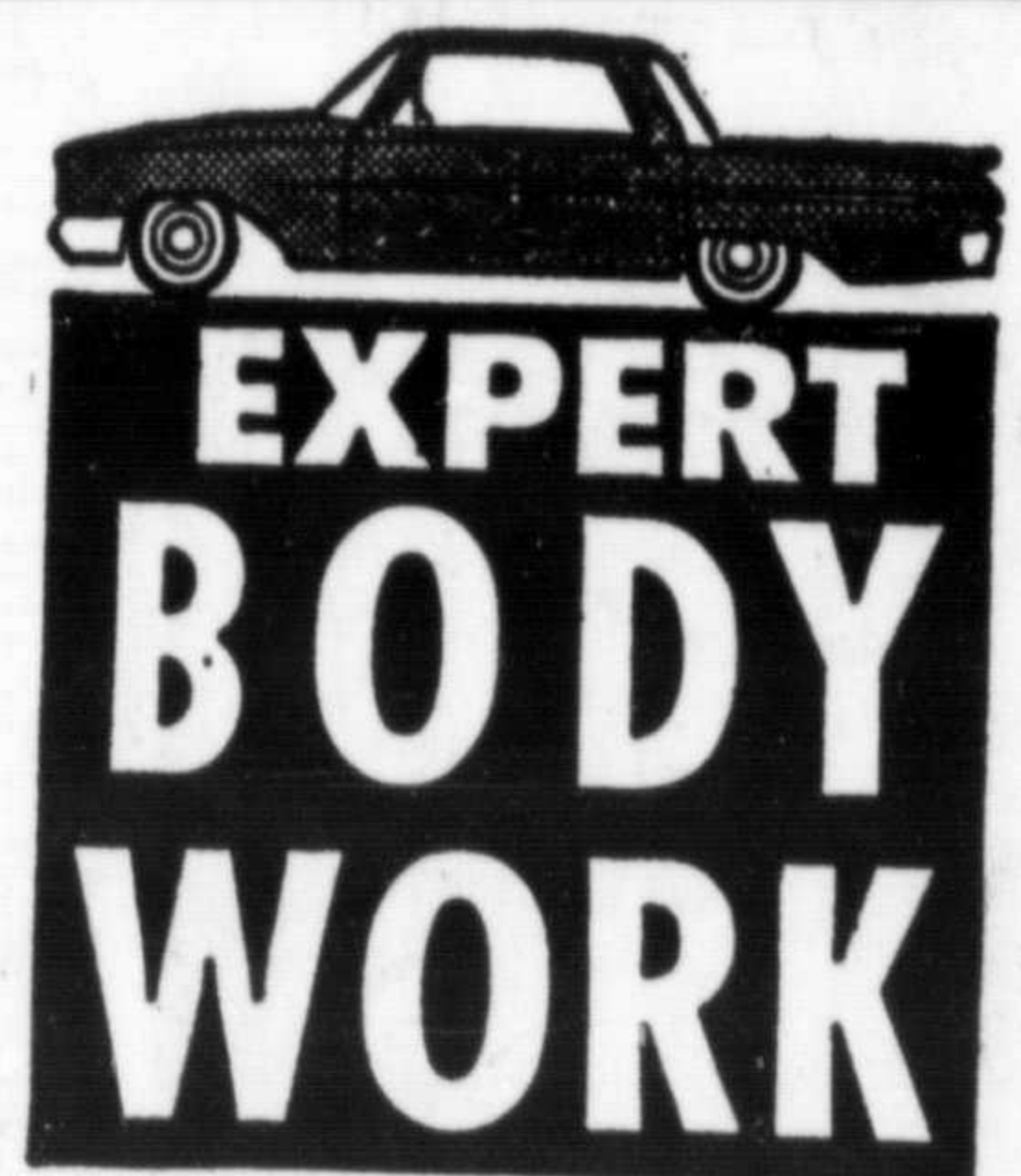
