

Westmount 'Ham' Heads C.D. Radio

Three mobile short wave sets and at least another seven fixed sets of equipment stand ready in Westmount to aid in whatever Civil Defence operations might become necessary, George Brewer, 4334 Montrose avenue, told The Examiner yesterday.

This group is linked with the well-known American Radio Relay League with its 100,000 members on this continent and also the Amateur Radio Emergency Corps which was organized to cater to all emergencies.

George Brewer was appointed section emergency co-ordinating officer for the Province of Quebec some time ago and has organized communications divisions throughout the entire province.

All 'hams' of the Montreal Metropolitan area, irrespective of suburban or district boundaries, were integrated into the one division and it is to this that the ten in Westmount belong.

The entire organization was planned into Civil Defence as set up and administered by Montreal and is still on call "24 hours a day, ready to assist with any type of emergency", according to Brewer who is chief communications officer.

Interest in CD remains high, and the city is particularly favored in that, the present mayor, J. A. DeLalanne, has held the post of chief warden for the city and is fully aware of the importance of the service and sympathetic to those who seek to see it on a proper basis.

Prof. V. R. Mallory Is Grant Winner

Professor J. R. Mallory, of Westmount, one of McGill University's political science department professors, will work in the Public Archives in Ottawa on papers relating to the development of cabinet government in Canada, it was announced Wednesday.

Prof Mallory is one of four Montrealers among the 18 winners of \$400 grants for post doctoral summer studies, subsidized by the Canadian Social Science Research Council.

Rebel Louis Rielle, poet T. S. Eliot, and the legal ownership of the Arctic are other subjects which will be looked into during the summer along with the development of cabinet government.

Prof. Roger Denhem, of the University of Montreal's economics department, will go to Europe to study economics and fiscal organization of federal states, particularly Switzerland and Germany.

Peter D. Scott, of Montreal, will complete for publication a study of the social and political ideas of poet T. S. Eliot.

Gordon W. Smith, of the College Militaire Royale St. Johns, Que., will complete for publication his study, "The Historical and Legal Background of Canada's Arctic Claims."

Other award recipients are Jean Marie Roy, of Quebec's Laval University, who will complete a study of the utilization of water resources in the mid-western United States, and Maj. G. F. G. Stanley, Royal Military College, Kingston, Ont., who will visit points in Western Canada and the U.S., obtaining material for a biography of Louis Riel.

John Porter of Ottawa's Carleton College, will continue study of "the characteristics of individuals possessing greatest economic power in Canada."

The Wiser Course

Recession May Be More Beneficial Than Inflation To Canadian Economy

Commendable courage was shown by Mrs. H. E. Vautelet, president of the Canadian Association of Consumers, in telling that organization that a recession would be more beneficial to Canada than "a further ride on the inflation rocket."

The fact, as Mrs. Vautelet knows, is that the present recession is the result of

inflation; that further inflation would quickly result in a much worse recession. The only thing really dangerous about the present recession is that it is not bringing costs and prices down as much as it should. This must be attributed to excessively rigid taxes, wages and hours.

Commenting on Mrs. Vautelet's statement, Beland Honderich, financial editor of the Toronto Star says "the vast majority of Canadians" would prefer inflation to recession. They probably would. But that does not make inflation the wiser course.

Mr. Honderich went on to say: "Indeed, the price of high employment and prosperity in Canada may well be a mild degree of inflation." But previously he was telling his readers: "No trading nation, Canada included, can afford to let its prices get out of line with its competitors. After many years of inflation and rising profits and wages, Canada is developing a high cost economy. What we need is a period of stable prices."

Presenting Jesus VI

It has been singularly difficult to write this series of articles, for each one of them has seemed to be a commendation and even an emphasizing of my own work. Frankly there is no higher task in the world than the task of presenting Jesus to the world. No man is sufficient for these things, but as soon as we say that "our sufficiency is of God who has made us able ministers" we begin again to commend ourselves. Fortunately we can fall back on the experience of Paul and of every generation of ministers, and hide our modesty behind them.

On the other hand this article is easy because it proposes to state two things; first, that in presenting Jesus to the world the minister is acting not only for himself but as the representative of the congregation. For the time being he is their voice, and a very inadequate one at that. The second point is this: that the congregation is not free from the duty of presenting Jesus to the world in its own way. In fact, each member of the congregation is under an obligation to present Jesus to the world by the witness of His own life. Our Lord's command is to the whole Church and to each member of the Church to bear witness to Him, fully and completely, wherever he may find himself. The world will never be won for Christ by the clergy alone. The business of the clergy is evangelism or presenting Christ, but the business of every layman is exactly the same; it is only the place and manner of evangelism that is different. The minister bears witness in his life and from his pulpit. The layman bears witness in his life and in his office or factory.

And let me say further that neither minister nor layman will

re-present Jesus to the world unless he know Jesus personally. As our Lord Himself said to Nicodemus, "We speak that we do know, and testify that we have seen." Without that personal knowledge our witness is dead: with it we can lift the world.

the systems today, many of which are the same. He said that we are creating history, not by the signing of peace treaties but in our every day lives. Much of this history, however will never be written, he said.

In conclusion he said we learn from history an understanding of political and economical problems which is essential to our prosperity.

Earl Shea, of St. Leo's Academy, speaking on the same subject said today we live in a world of stress and threats, and unfortunately people have never been able to profit from past history. Our future is unknown, he said.

He said by reading history we find the rise and fall of great men and empires occurring throughout the pages. Maybe some day, through a study of history, mankind can avoid his worst errors, he said.

Lesson From History

"Taking a lesson from history, free men might go on further and some day build a better world", he concluded.

David Schatia, of West Hill High School, who spoke on "Is family life disappearing", said for a family to have a decent social life they must live and act together.

He said in this present day there were too many parents, that is mothers, working. He pointed out that recreation was important to a good family social life.

"At the beginning of the 20th century families were closer knit than they are today" he said. TV tends to bring families together but takes up valuable time which could be spent by the family doing something creative.

In concluding he said families today are moving to the suburbs because they are trying to recapture some of the homey atmosphere and family life of other years.

The winner of the contest, Carmen Galileo from Catholic High School who spoke on what can we learn from history, said that history is the whole story of man's life. He said history tells us why.

He said history casts the light of the past on the present, and makes our lives richer and in-

teresting. History he said holds the answer to Canada's ties with the British Empire.

"History provides all the answers", he pointed out.

In conclusion he said that we must profit by our inheritance.

The final speaker, Michael Barza, of Westmount High School, speaking on the same subject, said that history shows us that man's various destructive inventions throughout the ages were later turned to constructive uses. He said man has often expected his doom, but has persevered and made that which would destroy him, work for him.

History is not a diary, but the story or mankind and mankind can change history, he said. We should try to make history the story of men living side by side in harmony.

In concluding he pointed out that we need hop in the atomic age, and must apply the principles which he had outlined in his talk to survive.

"THERESE" which is written by Thomas Job, is filled with moments of suspense and excitement. The story is well-knit and brilliantly composed.

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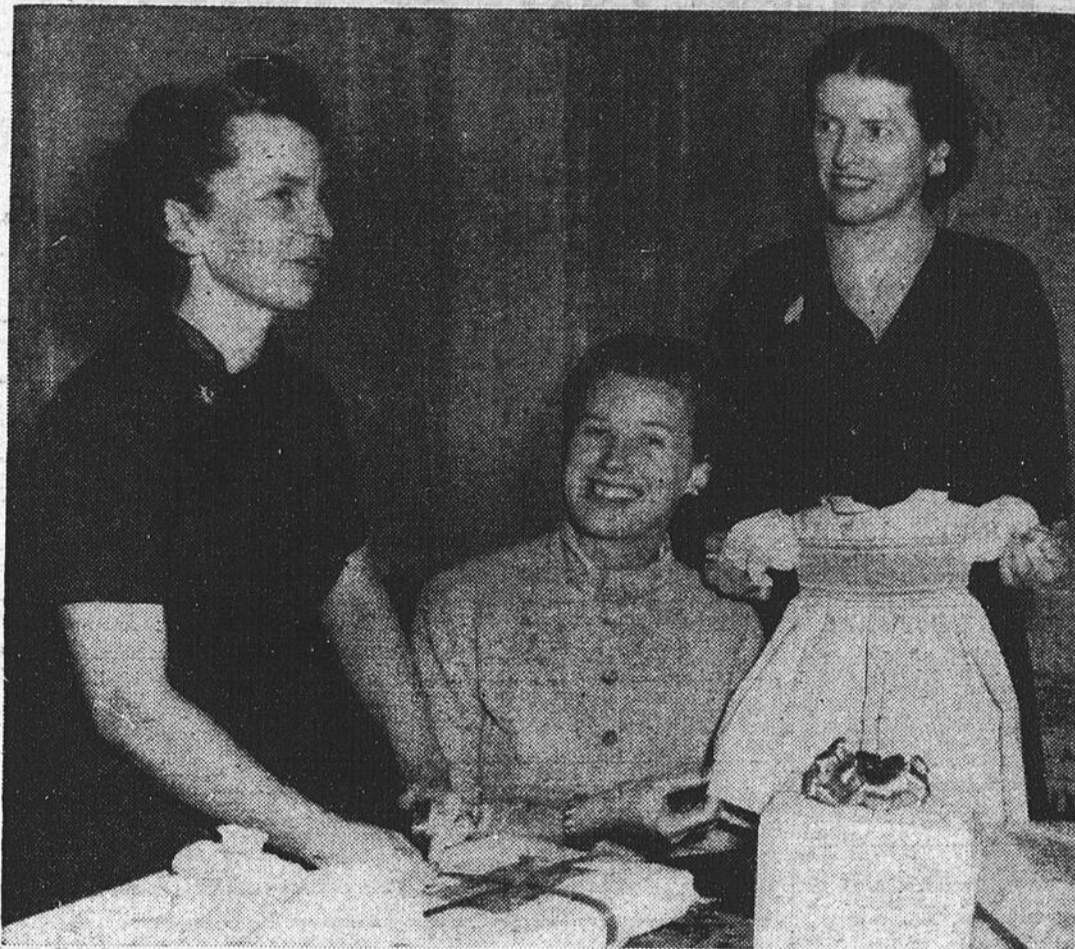

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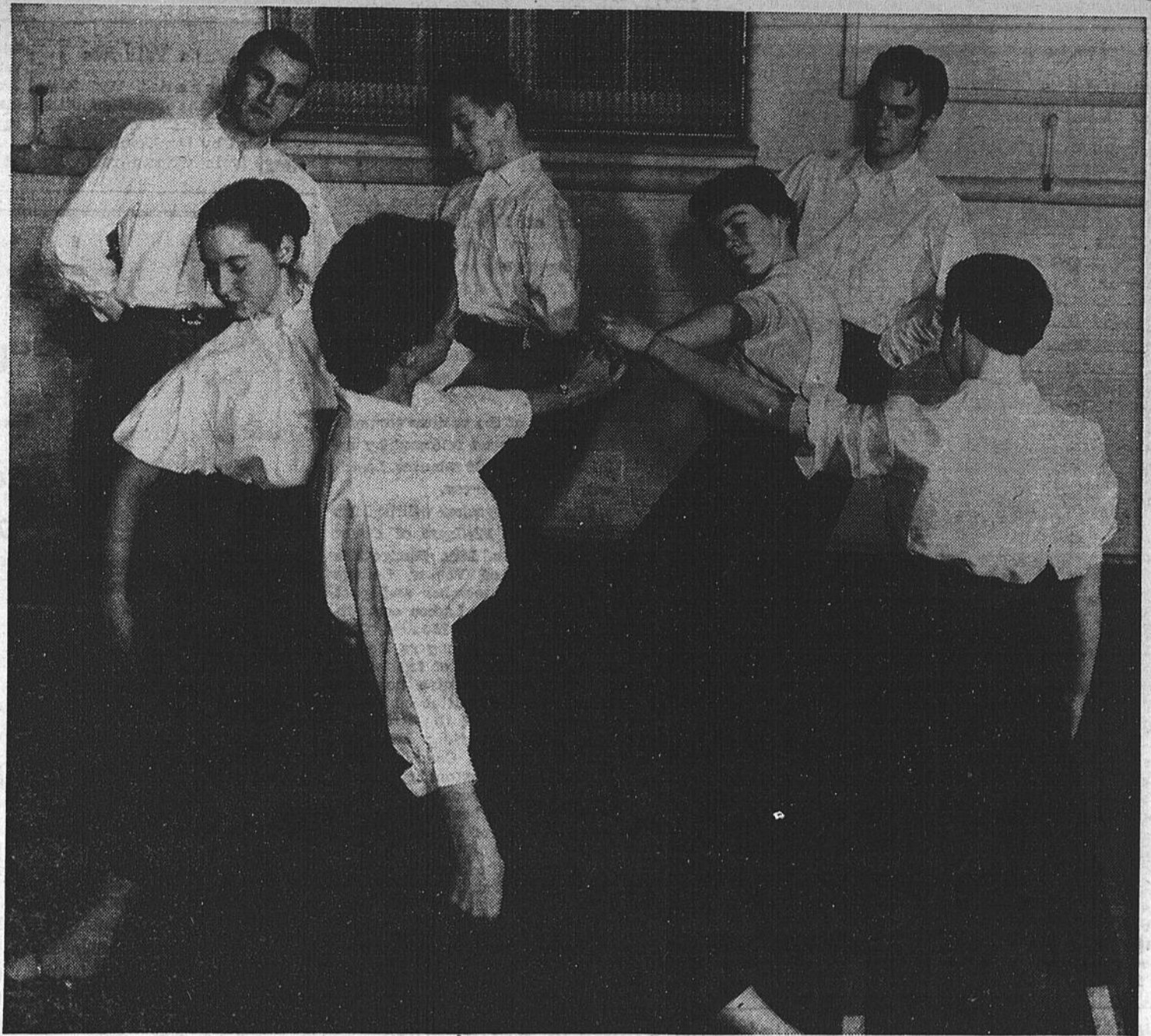

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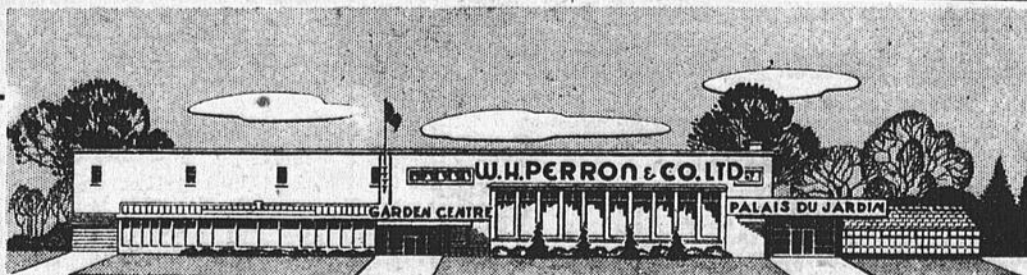

Theatre lovers are all invited to spend an informal evening with the Montreal Repertory Theatre's Theatre Club tomorrow. My Early Days in Montreal is the subject of John Hoare's lecture at 8.15 p.m. in the Arts Club, Victoria Street. In plain view of visitors will be some piranhas, the dreaded man-eating fish of the Amazon an electric eel, generating enough current within its own body to light up a series of bulbs; a tree-climbing perch from Rhodesia as well as tropical fish of every description, including sea-horses that swim "standing up."
