TIMBER AND HEALTH.

INSUFFICIENT SECURITY.
AN IMPRISONED DEBTOR—REMAINS IN DURANCE VILE.

Security was offered this morning to the Prothonotary for the defendant in the matter of Seybold & Co. and the Machinery Supply Association vs. Adolphe Birts, in which, as has already been noticed, the defendant was arrested and imprisoned on two copias of about \$500 each. The bondsmen offered were Messrs. Frigeau and Birts, of St. Casaire, who were willing to pledge themselves to the amount of each

On the two writs, with costs, that the prisoner, if released would remain in the province, and appear when wanted. Messrs. Atwater and Guerle, representing the plaintiffs, objected to the offered security, that it would not be sufficient unless given for the amount of the two *capiases* collectively, as a bondsman might prove that he could pay \$500 in one case and \$500 in another case, but yet be unable to pay \$1,000. Mr. Larreau, the defendant's counsel, opposed this contention of the plaintiffs, but the matter

was finally referred to a judge and decided in favor of the plaintiffs. The bondsmen were unwilling, however, to bind themselves for the whole amount, and the prisoner will therefore remain in gaol until a satisfactory arrangement is made.

GRAND TRUNK SUMMER ARRANGEMENTS.

The Grand Trunk has succeeded in making its arrangements for a complete service of fast trains between the West and the East via the
