## CITY TO BE REPRESENTED AT WORLD CONFERENCE OF YOUTH AT AMSTERDAM

Gordon Hendery, President-elect of Westmount Hi-Y Club, Will Attend Congress at Which 60 Nations Will be Represented—Trip Made Possible by Sums Raised by Churches and Civic Bodies

Gordon Hendery, president-elect of the Hi-Y Club, will represent Westmount at the World Conference of Christian Youth taking place at Amsterdam, Holland, from July 24 to August 2. The congress is described as the greatest movement in Christendom in recent years toward unity of thought and action among the Christian people of the world. It will be attended by delegates from 60 nations, numbering 1,500 in all.

The Westmount Rotary Club, Fossils Club, Hi-Y Club, Hi-Y Grads, Westmount High School, and practically all local churches and Sunday Schools, are contributing to the fund being raised to pay the expenses of the trip.

## MODEL PLANE GROUP READY FOR CONTEST

Many Members of Y.M.C.A. Club Will Enter Competition Saturday

A number of members of the extremely active Westmount Y.M.C.A. model plane group are today putting last touches to the models they intend to enter in the National Model Aircraft Contest at Cartierville Airport on Saturday. The group is affiliated with the Model Aircraft League of Canada.

The local "Y" branch expects to make a particularly good showing in Saturday's event as it was one of the first centres on the Island of Montreal to sponsor a model plane club. This was organized some ten years ago when building model airplanes was considered an extremely unusual pastime.

However the club made rapid progress even during its first year of existence and it is interesting to note that among its early members today are a flying officer in the Royal Air Force, and at least four pilots connected with commercial flying. In its early years the club was under the leadership of W. Buckley, then boys' work secretary at the local "Y" and C. Young, who pioneered the model plane hobby in Montreal.

Saturday's meet is the Montreal section of a nation-wide contest that is the first of its kind ever to be held in the country and there are a number of worthwhile prizes being offered. Similar contests were held in Toronto and Winnipeg last Saturday and winners in these competitions together with Montreal's best will compete at Toronto on June 17 for the Canadian championships. In addition the national winners, who will be two in number, will be rewarded with trips to the New York World's Fair. Other prizes include cash awards, trophies and trips by Trans-Canada Air Lines.

The contest is divided into three sections. First there is the scale model division, entries in which have already been judged.

The second section is for outdoor flying models which will be held at the airport on Saturday morning. Both Wakefield and Stick models will be exhibited and these are equipped with "rubber motors."

Greatest importance, however, is attached to the third class of the contest—the gasoline-powered model aircraft. In this connection it is interesting to note that while the average revolution of an "ordinary" plane motor is roughly 3,000 per minute, these models attain a number of revolutions per minute of as much as 9,000. Nevertheless, gliding ability is the element that counts most in actual competition, and not the power of the motor. This item on the program is set for Saturday afternoon at Cartierville.

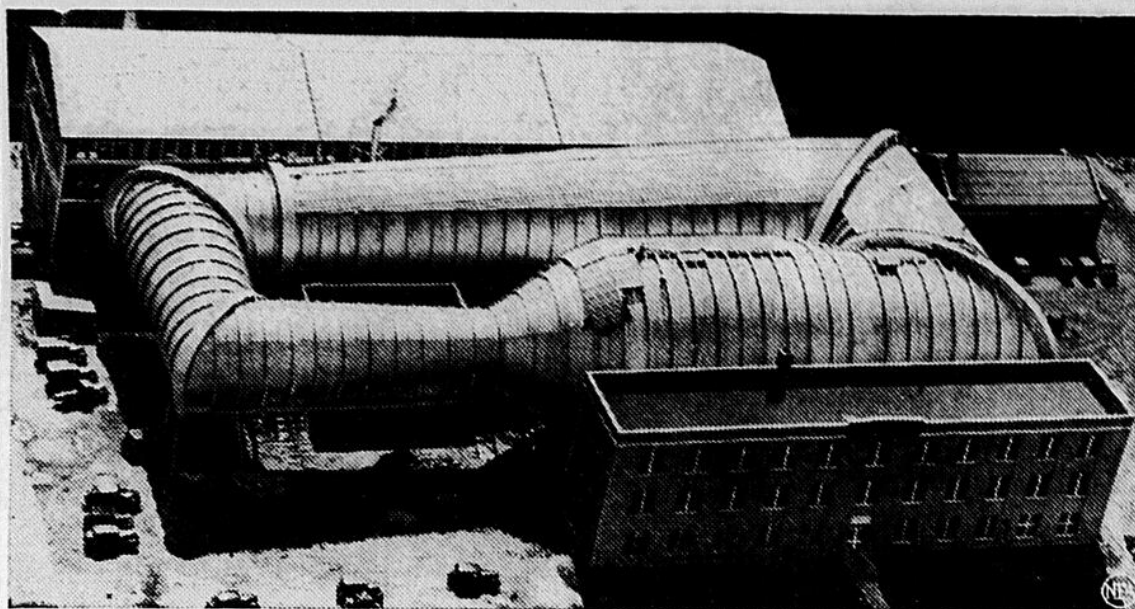
John David Eaton, is credited with part of the initiative that began the competition.

## FINAL TRIBUTE PAID TO LATE ALLAN DAWSON

Young Member of Westmount Cricket Club Laid To Rest on Saturday

Final tribute was paid the late Allan Douglas Dawson, prominent member of the Westmount Cricket Club, at William Wray's Funeral Chapel on Saturday afternoon at 4 o'clock. He died in the Royal Victoria Hospital following an operation on Friday morning. Mr. Dawson was 21 years old.

A native of Glasgow, Scotland, Mr. Dawson received his education in Westmount schools, attending Queen's school and later Westmount High School. He developed his prowess in cricket on Westmount Park, followers of the game realizing at the outset that he had natural ability.

He started out as a junior and two years ago was promoted to the first eleven of the Westmount Club and was known as one of its most able players. He was second highest aggregate scorer and was fourth in the batting average last year.

Ten days ago he played in the match against Bishop's College School at Lennoxville. In failing health for the past two years, he underwent an operation Thursday. Mr. Dawson is survived by his father, Robert Dawson, of Westmount, and two brothers, one of whom is in the Malay States.

## Rotarians Hear Dr. A. J. G. Hood

Taking as his subject "Milk Supplied Montreal," Dr. A. J. G. Hood, superintendent of the food inspection division of the Montreal Department of Health, addressed the regular weekly luncheon meeting of the Westmount Rotary Club in Victoria Hall yesterday.

Outlining the work carried on by his department, Dr. Hood stated that no such municipal service existed prior to 1889. Now 80,000 cows are regularly inspected and 100 per cent of the milk coming into Montreal is from tubercular-free cattle. Twenty-three inspectors and two supervisors test milk and inspect farms.

Milk, the speaker declared, was the one perfect food. One quart contains 800 energy-producing calories. It is a great aid in muscular development.

Dr. Hood was introduced by C. Odell and thanked by Dr. F. M. A. McNaughton.

## DAMAGE CAUSED IN COLLISION

## POLICE STILL INVESTIGATING STRANGE CASE

Westmount and Montreal Detectives Press Efforts To Solve Assault on Grier

Westmount and Montreal detectives continued their efforts yesterday to solve the mysterious attack on Brock Grier, 24, of 21 Holton avenue, who was seriously attacked last week, but stated that there was little new to report.

In order to close the case as soon as possible Chief Gough has taken over personal charge of the investigation so far as it concerns Westmount. Local detectives being assisted by Sgt. Detectives Fitzpatrick and Laroche of the Montreal Detective Bureau.

Grier, who has been confined to St. Mary's Hospital, stated this week that he was unable to remember what had happened to him after he put his car in the garage; but he did remember driving home, he said. He was found in his garage in an unconscious condition on the morning of the attack and was removed to hospital suffering head and body injuries. He also suffered a slight attack of pneumonia.

Dr. F. J. Scully, his physician at the hospital, said that he was recovering satisfactorily.

## YOUTH FOUND IN POSSESSION OF WEAPON JAILED

Companion Receives Term For Loitering—Sentenced Here on Tuesday

A youth giving the name of Norman Joseph Christie, 19, who told police he resided at 147 Fourth avenue, Verdun, was sentenced to three months in the penitentiary for carrying an offensive weapon, and to two months for loitering, when he appeared before Recorder C. A. Hale in Westmount Police Court Tuesday morning. The sentences will run concurrently.

A companion of Christie, James Harrington, who gave his address as 435 First Avenue, Verdun, was sentenced to two months in jail when he appeared with Christie on the loitering count. Both entered pleas of guilty.

The accused were arrested at 2.25 a.m. Saturday by Constables Shepper and Carpenter. They were trailed by the constables along Victoria avenue, Western avenue and St. Catherine street and were finally picked up on Greene avenue.

They were brought to the station and charged with loitering, but when police searched Christie they found that he was in possession of a blackjack.

They appeared for preliminary hearing on the loitering count before Recorder Hale Monday morning.

## IMPROVEMENTS MADE TO HALL

Six Hundred New Chairs Purchased—Brass Rails Placed on Stairways

A number of improvements to the seating accommodation and appearance of Victoria Hall have been made by the City.

This week handsome brass rails were placed on the sides and centre of the main inside stairway leading to the auditorium. Rails were also placed on the side stairs leading from the entrance to the halls downstairs.

Approximately 600 new chairs, upholstered with heavily padded leather, were purchased last week to replace those formerly used in the auditorium. They are far more comfortable than the old ones and give the hall a much better appearance.

Earlier in the year wicker lounge chairs were placed in the smaller halls used by women's clubs and other societies and brought forth much favorable comment.

### TAX SATURATION

How long governments keep on with unbalanced budgets, and additional taxes? How much more can business stand?

Since last Saturday all the theatres in Quebec City have been closed because additional taxes have made it impossible for them to operate at a profit. Just now, in Quebec City, theatres have to pay some twenty-five taxes annually, which eat up about forty per cent of the gross revenue. In Montreal, the figure is twenty-five per cent. By contrast, the theatres of France are taxed seventeen per cent of their gross, and are complaining about it, while in Ontario the tax is only five per cent.

In Three Rivers, a tax of one thousand dollars on each chain store branch put many of them out of business, while Ontario figures indicate that the government is making less from gasoline taxation since the rate was boosted two cents.

Our legislators could take a leaf from the example of the city of Rotterdam, in Holland, which, in an endeavour to increase its revenue tried the radical experiment of lowering taxes instead of increasing them, and the experiment was a success. With the load lightened, business bounded ahead at such a rate that more revenue was forthcoming, even though the tax rate was lower.

There is inevitably an end to spending—the taking of money from the people with one hand, and paying it back with the other (after deduction of interest). The process can't go on indefinitely, and the sooner the legislators recognize that fact the better for themselves and the people.

### "FINAL WARNINGS"

That indefatigable purveyor of Nazi propaganda, Dr. Paul Joseph Goebbels, is puffing and blowing "final warnings" to the democratic nations that they must stop trying to "encircle" Germany. It won't do at all, the doctor says, and "every blow of this front will be answered by a deafening counterblow."

Mr. Chamberlain, simultaneously, lets

the world know Britain's determination not to yield before attempts by any power to dominate any other country by force. In other words, Germany can protest the so-called encirclement, but the encirclement is not going to recede from their position. They can't afford to do so. It wouldn't be safe. And, as was pointed out the other day, if there is encirclement, Germany and Italy have only themselves to blame. They started the argument. They did the threatening. And they perpetrated the outrages and the land seizures that finally drove the democracies to effective action.

### A QUESTION MARK

Hon. Norman A. McLarty, K.C., Postmaster General, recently told members of the Windsor Rotary Club: "Canadians no longer refer to Their Majesties as 'the King and Queen' but 'our King and Queen.' The Royal visit has done more to cement the two great racial factions in Canada than any other single event in our history. The scene at Quebec as they arrived was replete with drama greater and more pregnant with history even than the capture of Quebec in 1759."

We hope Mr. McLarty is right, and in view of the events of the Royal visit we think it quite possible that he is, but this chronicler has just returned from a five-hundred-mile trip through rural Quebec and has had it impressed upon him that we may witness in the coming Federal election the deadening spectacle of anti-British so-called "national union" candidates in most of the rural constituencies—candidates who hope to win and to control the next Parliament through wielding the balance of power. Following is a typical conversation: "Will the Liberals win here?" "No." "Then Mr. Manion will win?" "Oh, no." "Then who?" "Union nationale." "In a Federal election?" "Why sure." "Why are you deserting Mr. Lapointe?" "He's an imperialist; he spends too much on armaments." "Don't you think they're necessary today?" "No. If we buy armaments today, we'll go to war tomorrow." "But airplanes cross the ocean now in ten hours; tomorrow they'll cross in five. What will we do if we can't defend ourselves?" "The United States won't let them cross." "But if the United States has to defend us, we'll belong to the United States. Will you like that?" "No. But there's no danger. The British won't let the United States take this country."

The big question is, How many of the voters think along those lines. Are they sufficient in number to win enough seats to hold the balance of power? Or do the majority think along the lines of the people who gave Their Majesties such a truly Royal welcome at Quebec, at Three Rivers, and at Montreal?

## DRIVE AGAINST RODENTS HAS GOOD RESULTS

Informative articles on the danger of allowing rodents to breed in a community and measures that should be taken to eradicate them have been published in the Examiner in conjunction with a campaign currently being conducted by the municipal health officer, headed by Dr. F. M. A. McNaughton to rid Westmount of germ-carrying rats.

The campaign has been a marked success. Dr. McNaughton reported yesterday, and many residents have followed the instructions outlined in these articles. However no effort is being spared by health authorities to rid the city completely of rats and other rodents and the drive will continue until this objective has been reached.

The latest in the series on the extermination of rats, prepared by the health bureau, follows:

The Department of Health has written three previous articles on the methods employed in destruction of rats. During this period a continuous campaign against rats has been going on and explanations given to many residents in the community why rats are causing a nuisance. The extermination of rats on a national scale is impracticable. Their numbers can be kept down locally by various means.

A clean house in which all food is protected is not attractive to them. The foundations and basements of buildings can be made rat proof, casual openings being filled in with concrete and necessary openings such as windows guarded by a stout wire screen. During the campaign, many improvements have been noted, but there are still many who should secure new galvanized iron garbage cans with tight-fitting lids. If the lid on your can does not fit tightly, you require a new one—lids which set on top of cans are too large or too small are not satisfactory. Please assist the

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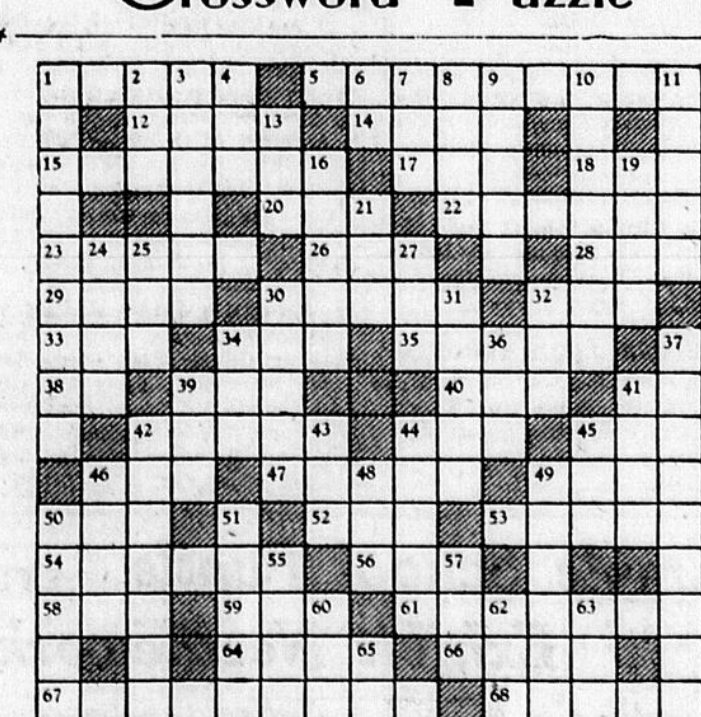

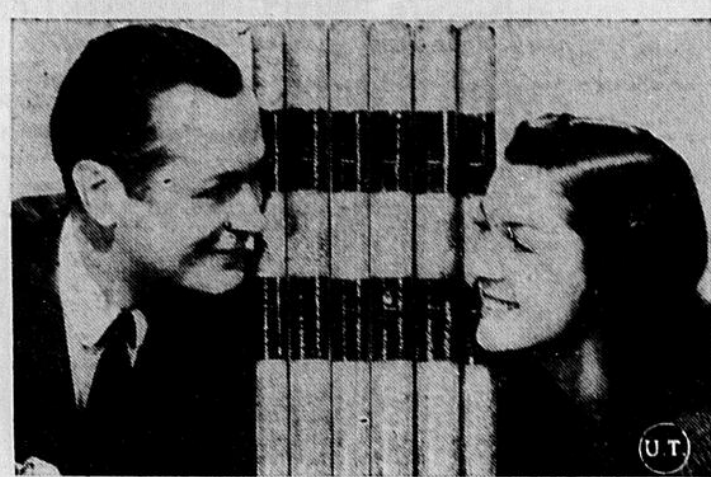

Those cynics who relentlessly maintain that Canadian broadcasters can never hope to rate with their American brethren are sitting up and taking notice these Friday evenings as a group of local youngsters, under the guidance of Rupert Caplan, cavort before CBC-NBC microphones in a dramatic opus entitled "Miss Trent's Children." To put it mildly, "Miss Trent's Children" has become the surprise hit of the year—a story of wide appeal, intelligently treated by Author Joe McDougall, and convincingly played by Betty Taylor, Ivor Francis, Bob O'Reilly and a strong supporting cast. Incidentally, Miss Taylor is the local lass who won top honors at the recent Dominion Drama Festival.

Offering the first real opposition encountered by "One Man's Family" in many a moon, "Miss Trent's Children" tells of three Saskatchewan youngsters, bereaved of their mother at an early age, who move to Montreal where they face the problems of adjustment to city life—problems faced by almost everyone who has been forced to forsake west for east and small town for metropolis.

"Miss Trent's Children" is the result of simultaneous inspiration experienced last autumn by two leading lights in Canadian radio. It all happened when Caplan awoke one morning to the sudden realization that Canadian ether was sadly lacking in human drama. He went into a huddle with McDougall, who had been toying with a theme for just such a program, and several days later rough sketches of the first few instalments of "Miss Trent's Children" were submitted to the regional program chief of CBC. He nodded approval; McDougall edited his scripts; a cast was lined up—and the show hit the national kilocycles as a sustainer. Its success was immediate, and NBC requested that the program be made available to American listeners as an international exchange.

"Miss Trent's Children" deals with everyday folk wrestling with

everyday problems, and attempting to solve these problems in an atmosphere essentially Canadian. McDougall's characters are 'real,' and the show is directed with emphasis on realism. This department seldom goes overboard for a radio program, but we humbly suggest that you dial in "Miss Trent's Children" for sincere broadcast drama at its best. The story is not sensational, nor are the characters glamorous—but the program is clean and refreshing, something utterly different in kilocycle entertainment.

Bake in greased 15x9x2 inch pan in moderate oven (375 degrees F.)

for 40 to 45 minutes, or until done. Spread with boiled frosting on top and sides of cake. Cut model bell out of wax paper, outlining on cake with tooth pick. Remove paper pattern and fill in outline with silver dragees. Decorate sides with white or tinted coconut.

### Boiled Frosting

Three cups sugar, 1 teaspoon light corn syrup, 1 1/2 cups boiling water, 4 egg whites, stiffly beaten, 2 teaspoons vanilla.

Combine sugar corn syrup, and water. Bring quickly to a boil, stirring only until sugar is dissolved. Boil rapidly, without stirring, until small amount of syrup forms a soft ball in cold water, or spins a long thread when dropped from tip of spoon (240 deg. F.). Pour syrup in fine stream over egg whites, beating constantly.

Add vanilla. Continue beating with rotary egg beater 10 to 15 minutes, or until frosting is cool and of right consistency to spread. Use wooden spoon when too stiff for beater. Makes enough frosting to cover top and sides of 15x9x2 inch cake.

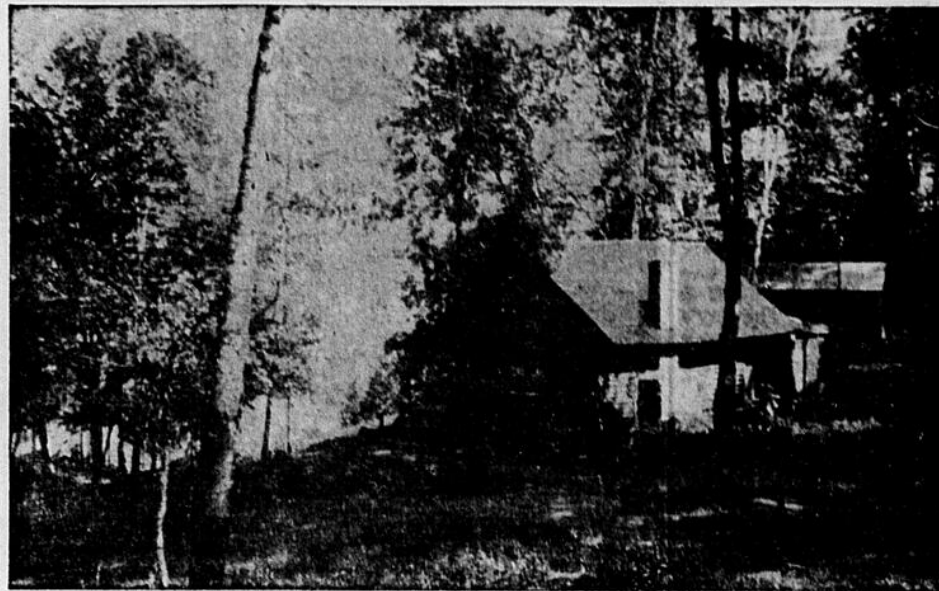

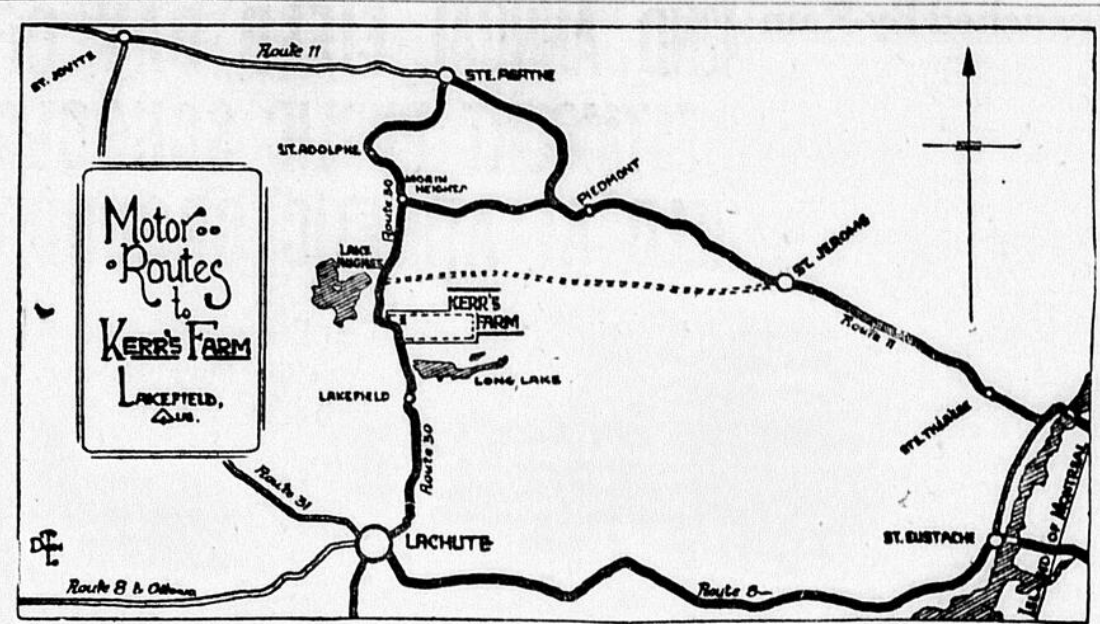

## Bulletins From Birdland

The Bobolink

Bobolinks are accused of having dual personalities. One might almost be convinced that the summer birds of the north and the birds on migration belonged to two distinct species were it not that the females wear the same buff costume streaked with dark brown all year round. Our male Bobolinks have showy costumes, are melodious singers, and live entirely on insects. Males on fall migration are dressed in their wives' uninteresting colours, have merely a harsh call-note, and eat grain only.

Although actually their relatives, Bobolinks do not at all resemble Blackbirds. They are 7 1/2 inches long with Sparrow-like bills. The males as we know them are among the few birds that are darker underneath than above. Their entire underparts are black and the rest is large patches of black, white and yellow.

The female is the housekeeper. As she sits on her nest of grass placed in a hollow on the ground, her husband perches on some nearby tree, or perhaps just a weed-stalk or tall blade of grass, singing his rapid, bubbling song which cannot be confused with any other. Her ecstatic flight song is a joy to hear, rippling from his throat as he rises perpendicularly for several feet and then drops to earth. But Mr. Bobolink is useful too. He gives his wife warning when danger approaches, and at his first 'chah' she leaves the nest and tries to attract the prowler's attention to another part of the meadow. These are the Bobolinks of poetry and song.

When the young are ready to try their wings the big change begins. First the father dons his drab winter clothes and soon the whole family starts on its 5,000 mile flight to South America. Flocks containing thousands of birds stop over in the rice fields of the southern states. They do this with aggravating regularity, just when the rice is in the milk, and do infinite damage to the crops. It has been estimated that the "Rice-birds", as they are now called, in their few weeks sojourn, destroy 10% of the rice. By the time the pests decide to continue their journey sometimes the wreckage is complete. The good diet makes them plump, so that "Rice-birds on toast" used to be a delicacy in these parts until the Migratory Bird Convention Act came into force some years ago. To what family does the Veery belong?

## Camp Memphremagog Is Ideal Spot For Girls

Camp Memphremagog, situated on the site of an old Indian encampment, by the shores of the lovely lake in the Eastern Townships bearing the same name, is an ideal girls' camp offering every possible attraction.

It is under the direction of Miss Daisy L. Gass, a Canadian University woman with 15 years' experience directing camps, assisted by Miss Hazel Sinclair.

The camp is located almost at the foot of Owl's Head Mountain, one of the peaks of the Green Mountain range, 2,450 feet high. This mountain towers far above the camp on one side, while wooded hills with picturesque ledges lie behind it. On a lovely ledge overlooking the lake and about 100 feet above it, among tall white birches and sturdy maples lie the camp buildings. The elevation here is 800 feet above sea level.

The health giving qualities of this lovely section of Quebec Province are well known.

Food at the camp is abundant, carefully chosen and well cooked. Truck service provides regular supplies of fresh fruit and vegetables.

The junior camp, for campers six to twelve years, is under special supervision, with its own cosy accommodation, play rooms, etc. Counselors sleep in the same building and one is always on duty after the children go to bed. The juniors have their own specially adapted program of story-telling, picnics, visits to the farm, dancing, etc.; individual instruction in water sports, craft work and other interests.

The camp buildings, 21 in all, number among them a large airy dining-room, large recreation bungalow with fire-place and stage for dramatics; a library with over 500 volumes; a well-equipped infirmary; the nature-love cabin; a craft house; counselors' bungalows, the Director's cabin with guest rooms; in addition to garages, stables and very adequate riding, waterfront and athletic equipment.

The buildings are well built, many of them being of rough

cedar logs. The sleeping cabins, which are of this construction, are screened, open and airy. Tents are also available, each being water-proof and provided with floors and tent flies. There are three open fire-places, two pianos and an organ for outdoor services and sing-songs.

Land sports at the camp include archery, tennis, deck tennis, volleyball, baseball, shuffle-board and allied sports.

Many camping trips are made and instruction is given in outdoor cooking, construction of different types of shelters and fires, etc.

Experts and ardent students of nature lore encourage girls to discover for themselves the mysteries of wood-lore and other of the wild's secrets. There is a well equipped studio for handicrafts and girls are encouraged to develop

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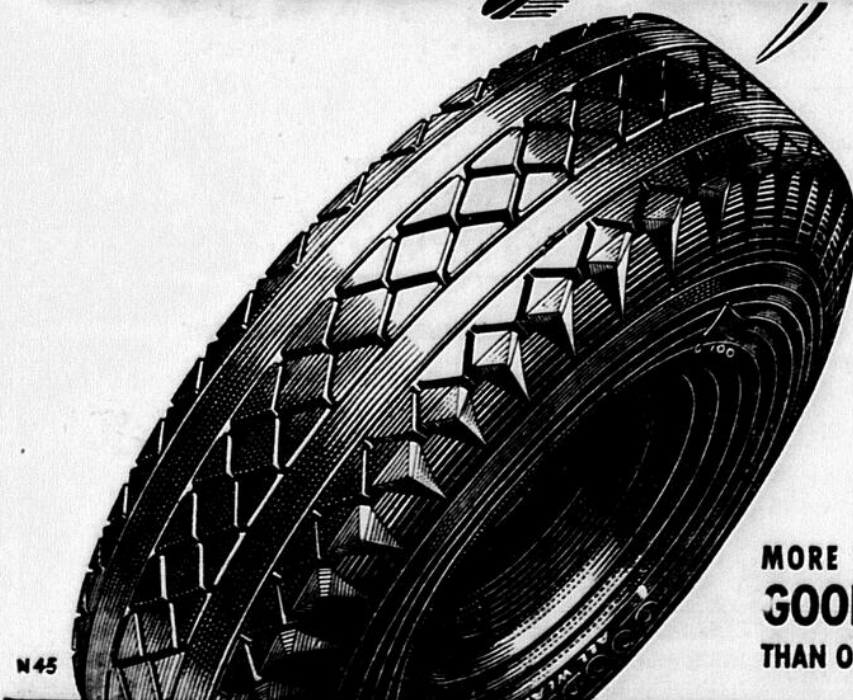

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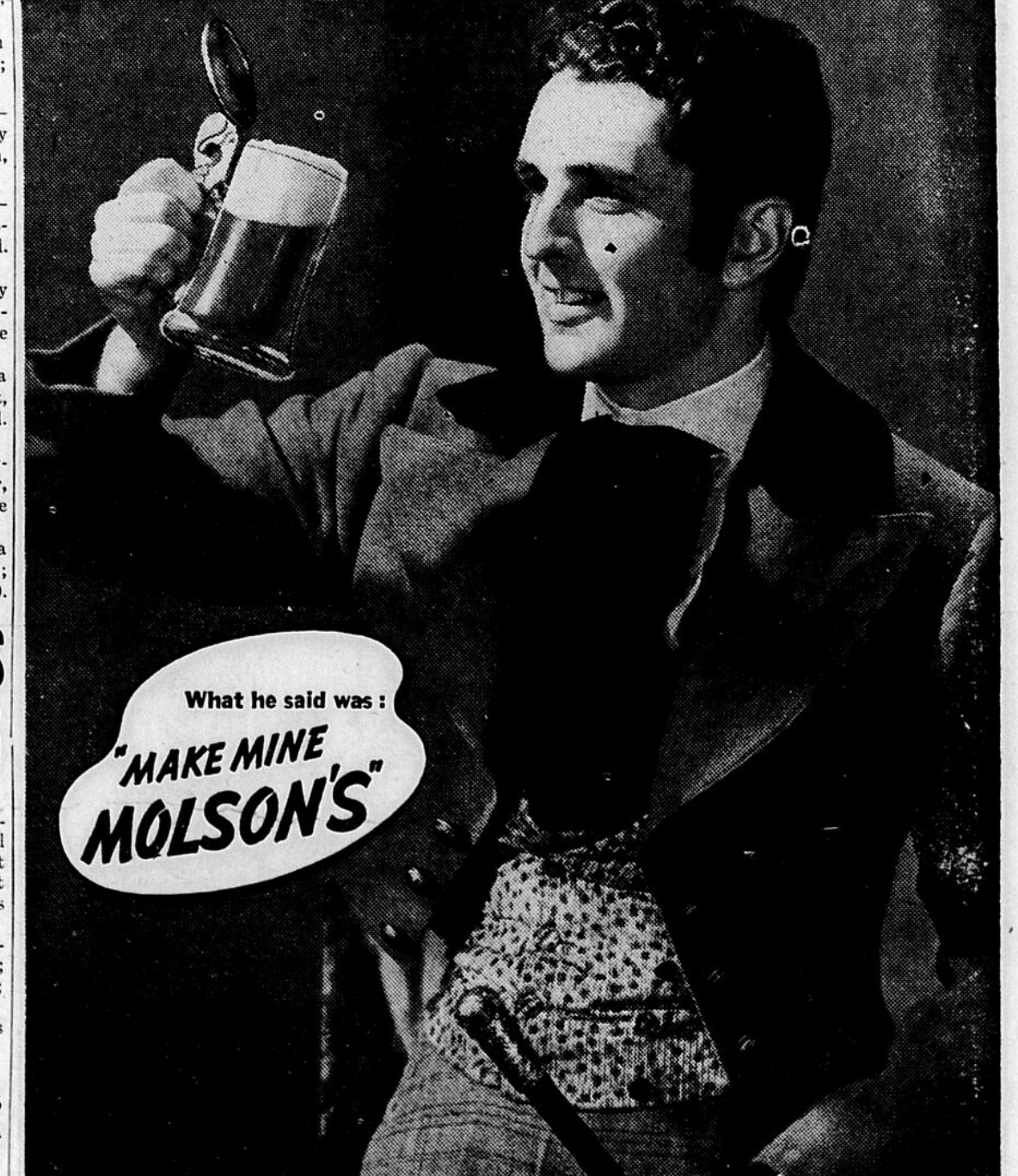
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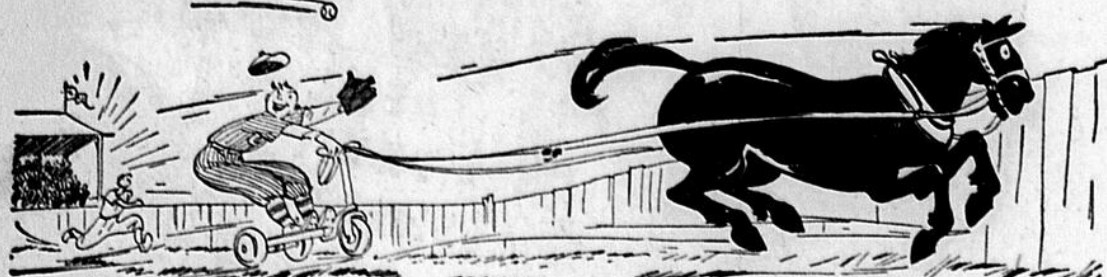
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
