FREIGHT BUSINESS SOMEWHAT DULL

High Price of Grain Affects Business on the Railways.

PASSENGER TRAFFIC BRISK

St. Louis Fair is Getting Its Full Quota of Visitors From the Canadian End.

Freight business at the present time with the railways is very dull. A falling off in this particular is looked for at this season of the year, but the tonnage is even smaller now than it ordinarily is during the summer season. The condition in question is undoubtedly due in large part to the high price of grain, which has minimized the transportation of flour. In all other lines an over supply will doubtless account for the unusual falling off in trade.

On the other hand, the passenger business, which is usually largely stimulated at this season of the year, is exceptionally prosperous condition. The fine weather, together with the present hopeful condition of the crops, has doubtless had much to do with stimulating the passenger traffic. An unusually fine business is anticipated by both the G.T.R. and the C.P.R. for the approaching Dominion Day, owing to the fact that the first of July falls on Friday, thus giving most people an opportunity to run out of the city for three days. Both companies are making preparations to handle the large business that they expect will offer.

THE ST. LOUIS BUSINESS.
Very little St. Louis business is looked for now until the beginning of Sep-

tember. Notwithstanding the fact, the Canadian business to the World's Fair has not thus far been at all below expectations. Experience has proved that expositions must depend largely for patronage on the people living within a limited radius, say, 150 or 200 miles. All expositions have shown, beginning with Chicago, that at least eighty per cent. of those who go to them live within the radius mentioned. Here in Montreal the passenger officials deny that they have done anything that might assist the ticket scalpers who abound in the larger cities of the United States. This disclaimer has been made, owing to the charge made by the Railway Protective Bureau, that in consequence of the irregularities attending the issue of tickets to the exposition, by reason of failure uniformly to require the contracts properly and legally filled in with the date, description, signature of original purchaser, etc., unlawful traffic in these tickets has been rendered easy, and the legal steps which should be taken for the protection of tickets have been endangered by the departure from the provisions of the ticket contracts. In this way the efforts of lines which in good faith have observed their agreements in the connections indicated have resulted in loss of business, and it is impossible that the railways would enter into collusion with the ticket scalpers, but that an agent, asked for two tickets, might, in his zeal, see only that one ticket was signed. The second ticket would thus become susceptible of manipulation.

MANY HORSES WERE BURNED AT MONCTON.

Moncton, N.B., June 28.—Humphrey and Kinneer's livery stable, near the city market, was destroyed by fire this morning. From twenty-five to thirty horses in the stable on the second floor were burned to death, only one escaping. Among the animals burned were about fifteen belonging to Humphrey and Kinneer, the others being boarded owned by citizens. Five cavalry horses, which were to be entrained this morning for the camp at Sussex, were burned. The loss is about \$8,000.

Some Incidents in the Military Career of Lord Dundonald.

The record of the Nile Expedition of 1885 is full of stories of the bravery of officers and men who risked their lives in desperate attempts to hold in check or beat back the Dervishes, that they might loosen the coils which were tightening around Khartoum and the gallant Gordon.

Lord Dundonald, then a captain, was with the column which made the terrible night march from Abu Klea to the Nile, a distance of 25 miles. The Mahdists had been hovering like hawks on the flanks of the little body of men, and before the column had covered half of its march, the dervishes closed in on them as one of their desert storms might circle around and beat down the alien who entrusted himself to its pathless sands. Weakened by the hardships of their long marches and the strain of well-nigh incessant skirmishes with a foe vastly their number and superior, the column made a gallant stand and beat off, although with heavy losses, all the attacks of the enemy. Sir Herbert Stewart, the commander of the column, was mortally wounded, and the tale of dead and wounded would have disheartened men with a less keen realization of the duty

which lay before them and the necessity of accomplishing it at any cost. As a counter to the prolonged attack of the Dervishes, Lord Dundonald with a small detachment of his men advanced under a heavy and concentrated fire and erected a small fort at a point which was seen to be of strategic importance. There being a lack of building material and neither time nor means to send back for it, Lord Dundonald utilized biscuit boxes for his ramparts and escarpments until his men could throw up proper defences, and it is on record that this expedient proved not only rapid, but effective. Having safely entrenched himself under the guns of the enemy, Lord Dundonald pushed his attack to the very gates of the town of Metameh, a hotbed of sedition and conspiracy and a known centre of the Mahdist leaders, but just as his men were preparing to enter the town he was ordered to withdraw by his superior officer and to return to camp. For his daring bravery and ability to seize and take advantage of the points in an enemy's plans, this sortie was one of the most brilliant of all the brave deeds which made the Nile campaign glorious.

DECKER'S RECORD.
Years ago, Decker was known to be connected with the cleverest gang of counterfeiters in the country, and it was he who saw gool many times. About four years ago, he was in Montreal for a time, and while here he left a trail of bills behind him and also got several Montrealers to handle his "goods." Then he went to Woodstock, Ont., and set about printing out another batch. There he was caught. He was sentenced to five years in Kingston penitentiary. He served his time, less the good conduct period, and has been out for some months.

Decker's companion is Charles Edwards, alias Higgins. Edwards is also an expert engraver, and it was he who two years ago was shadowed from Montreal to Toronto where he was caught in the act of passing Molsons Bank bills. He was sentenced to two years in Kingston, and on May 17 last he was released.

With Decker out for months and Edwards again free to get to work, Mr. Carrington's attention was drawn towards them, and he soon had the lines out for catching them should they get to be once more the right man.

EVIDENCE SECURED.
Evidence of an unmistakable character was gradually secured. On Monday, Mr. Carrington left for Toronto feeling that the time had come for the arrest. Meanwhile, C. J. Sherwood, Chief of Dominion Police, had taken an interest in the matter, and Detective J. Parkinson, of his staff, joined Mr. Carrington. The Toronto Chief assigned Detectives Black and Cuddy.

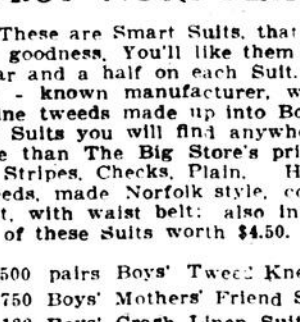
