NEW SILVER MINE.

Big Strike in the Clara, an Extension of the Mineral Farm.

(The Pitkin (Col.) Mining News, Oct 6)
A strike of great importance was made on the Clara last Friday, and has been no little talked about ever since. The Clara is located on the North Fork, about two miles above the Silent Friend, and is an extension of the noted Mineral Farm.
The wall was cut and the vein found to be in place, although it was difficult to ascertain the extent of the ore body, but it was thought to be from four to six feet wide. The vein was cut in the 60 foot shaft, and the wall is mineralized and has assayed twenty ounces.

It is a black sulphuret ore and can be successfully treated by the smelter or chlorination process, but it is thought to be more successfully adapted to the latter process. An assay made on Monday by Herzberg gave the satisfactory return of \$86.64 silver. The mineral is found between lime and porphyry, and it is confidently believed by old miners that the Clara will prove one of the biggest mines in this section of the state.

The Clara is owned by Capt. C. S. Roe, Harry J. Harte and brother and Mr. Douglas S. Kimlin, of Quebec.

A NOVEL CRANE.

Designed for the North Shore Railway.

Saturday morning, the model of the new crane, designed by Mr. A. Davis, General Superintendent of the North Shore Railway, for use by his company, was completed at the works of Mr. E. Chanteloup, Craig street, Montreal. It is destined to be used to lower the cars from the railroad to the deck of the ferry boats for Point Lévis. Special boats are being built for this purpose, and they will be able to carry eight cars. The depth from the railroad to the boat at low tide is 32 feet, and at high tide 10 feet. The crane is so constructed that if the boat cannot get to the wharf it will reach 20 feet from the place where the railway stops. The crane has no swing, but it moves backwards and forwards, lifting the cars, or lowering them with ease. Its capacity is for 85 tons, so that passenger cars can be taken as well as freight cars. It is serviceable not only for its special purpose, but also for the unloading of ships. The invention is a most ingenious one, and reflects great credit upon Mr. Davis.

BISMARCK'S SUCCESSOR.

Count Paul von Hartzfeldt, who, it is said, is to be Bismarck's successor, was married in 1869 to Miss Helen Moulton, of New York and Paris, and was divorced from her in 1880. They have three children. He was sent by Bismarck to Spain in 1874. Meeting the Chancellor's expectations, he was in 1878 accredited to the Sultan. So successful was he at Constantinople that he distanced the French, Russian, and English representatives in gaining complete power over the Turkish Government. The policy of the Porte toward foreigners was almost entirely directed from Berlin. Finally when Dufferin went to Constantinople he succeeded in supplanting the Germans. Hartzfeldt had, however, as early as July 7, 1881, been appointed to the office in Berlin to which he has now been called in person. It may be added, as a curious fact, that Count Waldsee, the probable successor of Count von Moltke, who has placed him in charge of the general staff at Berlin, also married an American lady. She was a Miss Lee, of New York, the daughter of a merchant.

The "nobleman's son," Passmore, has turned up again. This time it is at Quebec. Cotterill, the man who was charged with robbing him, left Kingston shortly after he was discharged en route to England, and the first person that he met was his old friend Passmore. It looks as if they had arranged to meet here.

THE POLITICAL SITUATION.

'The Beginning of the End'—Senecal's Candidate Whipped—His Other Candidate.

(Monday's Montreal Star.)

The splendid victory of Mr. Beauchamp in Two Mountains against the "triumvirate" candidate is the topic of conversation and congratulation in political circles to-day. "The issue was a square one," said a gentleman who had canvassed hard for Mr. Beauchamp; "we fought against Champagne because he was the declared friend of Senecal and his friends, and because it was absolutely necessary to check the corruption which had so long been going on under the Chapleau-Senecal Dansereau clique in the province."

The fight took place more especially on two questions: first as to the increased indemnity of \$300 to members and of \$1,000 to Ministers, and second, the manner in which the sale of the road had been conducted, which were both Government measures.

VAUDREUIL.

In Vaudreuil the official promises to be very intense, as the battle will be fought on exactly the same lines as in Two Mountains, Dr. Lalonde, of Rigaud, opposing the Government nominee, Mr. Archambault, the legal adviser of Senecal, his trusted friend and the author of one of the celebrated \$1,500 letters, in which he stated that as legal adviser of Mr. Senecal he had received \$1,500 to be divided amongst the three leading Liberal papers of the Province for the purpose of choking off opposition to the tunnel charter. This letter is being freely used as an instrument against Mr. Archambault, as also the confession of his leader, Mr. Senecal, of the 30th November last, in which he acknowledges having given this money for the purpose of bribing and corrupting *La Patrie*, *L'Electeur* and *L'Union de St. Hyacinthe*. Mr. Archambault, who is supported by the Government, was not always a Conservative, and it is well that the English voters of Vaudreuil should know his record. At the general elections of 1878 he ran as a Liberal against Mr. Coursol, M.P., in Montreal East and was badly beaten; during the Joly regime he was Crown Prosecutor, and was a warm friend of the late Wilfrid D'Orion.

"We know our men now," said a Ross-Boucherville supporter to-day. "As long as Mousseau acted independently and gave any promise of carrying out the reforms he boasted of, we would have supported him; but now he has gone straight over to the Senecal party."

Nominations take place in Vaudreuil to-day, when addresses will be delivered on behalf of Dr. Lalonde by Hon. Mr. Beaubien, M.P.P., Hon. Mr. Trudel and Mr. S. Pagnuelo, Q. C., and by other members of the "old" Conservative party.

The two brothers, the Barons Rothschild of the old ancestral house in Frankfurt on the Main, have made the return of their income for taxation. The younger brother, Wilhelm, or Willey, as he is called, appears to be the richer man of the two—at all events for the present taxable year. His return is 4,788,000 marks. The elder brother, Meyer Karl, on the other hand, only returns 4,560,000 marks. According to the figures rendered by himself to the Government, Baron Willy Rothschild enjoys a daily income of 13,120 marks, or over \$2,240.

About one hundred and fifty applications have already been received for entrance to the Civil Service examinations.

It is rumored that Mr. A. J. Dorion, of St. Ours, and late member for Richelieu, will soon be elevated to the Senate.

Official instructions have been sent to Cobourg to set at liberty Miss Wright, the lady who shot a supposed burglar at Brighton.

The official return for South Essex gives Mr. Balfour Reform, a majority of 72. In 1879 the majority was 157 against him.

DEAR SIR,—Some time ago you told your readers that the pilots of the bark Algiers, run ashore at White Island, and the steamer Acadian, at Crane Island, had been acquitted by the Board of Harbor Commissioners, but did not give the reasons why they were so. It would be interesting to people who pay taxes to this concern to know what they do. There is another case likely to come up before them soon. The bark Sandringham was only towed to the foot of the Traverse on Saturday and left with a fair wind, but is now back in port, leaking badly and likely to be detained all winter, having been allowed to drift on Green Island reef. It is to be hoped, for the good name of the river, that the reason why this ship was allowed to go aground will be given to the people.

Some of the tug people are delighted at these mishaps. They help to pay the infamous tax on coal, but leave a most injurious effect on the trade of the river, and people who are thoroughly acquainted with the navigation say there is not a good reason for any of those disasters.

It is to be hoped that if the Harbor Commission is not for pure ornament (which many people assert) that they will get at the cause of this heavy loss to ship and cargo.

THURSDAY EVENING, Oct. 26, 1882

The Provincial Treasurer, has in consonance with the policy pursued against the insurance companies entered suits against the Grand Trunk, Canadian Pacific, South Eastern and Montreal, Portland and Boston Railway Companies for the recovery of the tax, whose legality is now in dispute.

From Ottawa this Evening.

Ottawa, Oct 26. Sir Alex. Campbell is building a \$12,000 private residence on the corner of Metcalfe and Lisgar streets. Sir John A. Macdonald has purchased Earncliffe, the property of Reynolds' estate, situated near New Edinburgh. Sir Charles Tupper estimates that this season there will be a surplus of 2,000,000 bushels of grain for exportation to Europe, and that next year that quantity will quadruple. In a few days the new Dominion four dollar note will be issued. In the centre of the face there is an engraving of the Governor-General. On the right hand corner is an engraving of the great seal of Canada, and on the left the figure four. Then there is the Deputy Minister of Finance. On the reverse side there is the usual green ground and the words "Dominion of Canada". Since March last the Grand Trunk Railway specials have taken four thousand passengers to Manitoba and four hundred car loads of freight. Rev. E. A. Stafford is in the city. Messrs. McGillivray, Perley, Lindsay and Winnie, of the Canada Atlantic, have returned from Montreal, where they were completing arrangements for the lease of the Canada Atlantic Railway to the Grand Trunk. On the 1st of November the latter will put on four new trains, the engines and coaches having been built in the Grand Trunk shops. Sir Hector Langevin is expected back to-morrow. Hon. Mr. Caron left for Montreal this morning. Sir A. Gait left last night for Montreal after having an interview with Sir John A. Macdonald.

From Toronto this Evening.

Toronto, Oct 26. A number of some sets have been confiscated recently, they having been found in Ashbridge's Bay. Doran, who escaped from the Central Prison on Monday, is still at large. Tisdale, the noted swift runner, will give Maybury, of this city, five feet start, in the hundred yard race on Saturday next.

From Montreal this Evening

Montreal, Oct 26. The Directors of Banque Ville Marie declared half yearly dividend of 3 per cent this morning. The stock market was dull and lower to-day.

From New Brunswick To-day.

St. John, N. B., Oct 26. The dead body of an unknown man was found last night hanging in the woods near Spruce Lake, about eight miles from this city. Coroner Robinson is holding an inquest. The blacksmith shop of Allan Bros. foundry was burned this morning. Loss, \$1,000; insurance, \$500.

FROM ST. MARTIN, Q., TO-DAY.

St. Martin, Oct 26. Yesterday the Council of the Township of Elgin voted a bonus to the Montreal and Champlain Junction Railway Co. and the day before yesterday the village of Hanington County and the council of the Township of Manchester voted a bonus to the same railway company.

LATEST FROM RIVER PORTS.

Little Metis, Oct 26—SW wind. One ship inward. Fame Point, Oct 26—Fresh NW wind. Ss Barcelona inward at two pm. Custom House Brokers.—Duties collected at the Custom House to-day amounted to \$2553.82.

BY CABLE THIS EVENING.

Paris, Oct 26.

The published details of the anarchist conspiracy show that it is composed of a small number of staunch supporters in all the towns and manufacturing villages of France. Its members are mostly young men, who distribute revolutionary papers. Each group has a distinctive name. The letter seized by the authorities recommends the groups to pretend to be trades unions. All the groups in department form a federation, some having a secret symbol, and these federations are the link between the groups and the central committee. Several persons arrested Saturday belong to the federations. The central committee is composed of a delegate from each federation. It meets monthly, generally. Letters in Prince Krapotkin's handwriting show him to be a member of the conspiracy. The disturbances in August at Mont-Coué Les mines were not ordered as the committee disapproved of them as premature. They were due to the clericalism of the manager of the mine. The dynamite found by the authorities was manufactured at St. Stauvier, Switzerland. The succession of fires at Amiens have produced great uneasiness. The action of the Government in suspending the trials of the persons arrested in connection with the rioting at Mont-Eau Les mines is much criticised, but is taken as a resolution not to allow the miscreants to enjoy immunity. Two republican newspapers at Lyons have been notified that their offices will be blown up.

England and France.

London, Oct 26. The Times says the British Government is informed that France makes no objection to abolition of capitulations with Tunis and the establishment of French tribunals, in the honorable conduct of which it has full confidence. Great Britain, however, can permit nothing detrimental to her Commercial Treaty with Tunis. France has given the fullest assurance on this point, and it is perfectly understood by her that whatever arrangements England may make with Egypt, the rights of French citizens shall be respected equally with those of the British.

Imperial Parliament.

In the House of Lords the vote of thanks to the British army in Egypt was carried without division. The House of Commons was crowded. Dilke said no convention had been concluded with Egypt for charging the cost of the army occupation.

The Egyptian Trials.

Cairo, Oct 26. English counsel, decline to defend Mahmoud, Baroudi, and Touba Pacha, accused of incendiarism, but will defend Arabi, Ali, Fehma, Abdelan and Osmia Fanz.

Prof. Palmer and Party Killed.

Alexandria, Oct 26. Colonel Warran, who has been searching for Prof. Palmer and party, reports that he has seized a letter at Akba, written by the Governor of Nakhli, proving that the Governor had them killed.

Arrived, ss Alaska.

RECORDED'S COURT TO-DAY.

Ten young boys, for loitering in rear of Hamels block and destroying property, were admonished and discharged. John P. Jones, for drunkenness, got 8 days jail. A woman, for abusive language towards another woman, was fined \$5 and costs.

A boat's crew belonging to the founder British barque Rosenath, containing the mate and four men were also murdered by natives, excepting the mate, who was rescued by friendly Indians, and sent to Valparaiso. A third boat's crew were also massacred by natives.

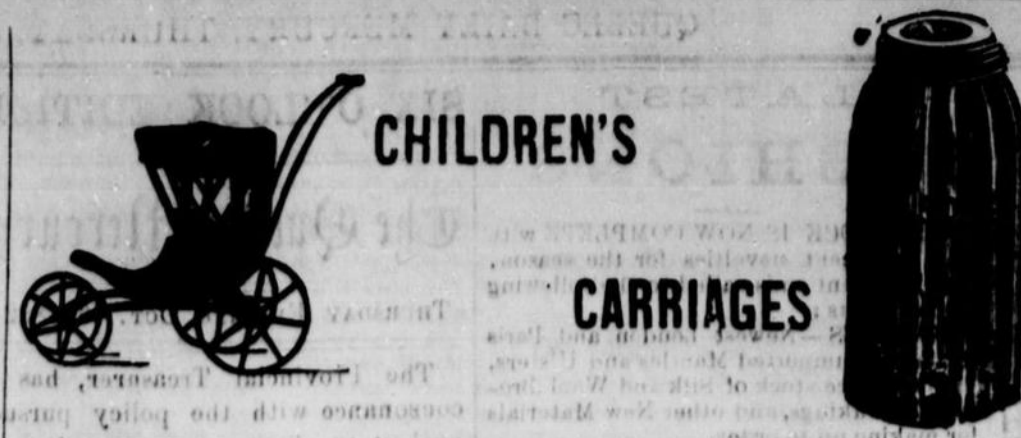

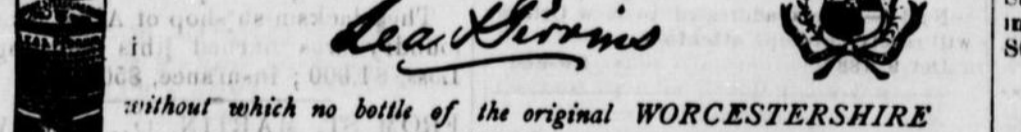
