# Ormstown Fair's gate tops that of last year

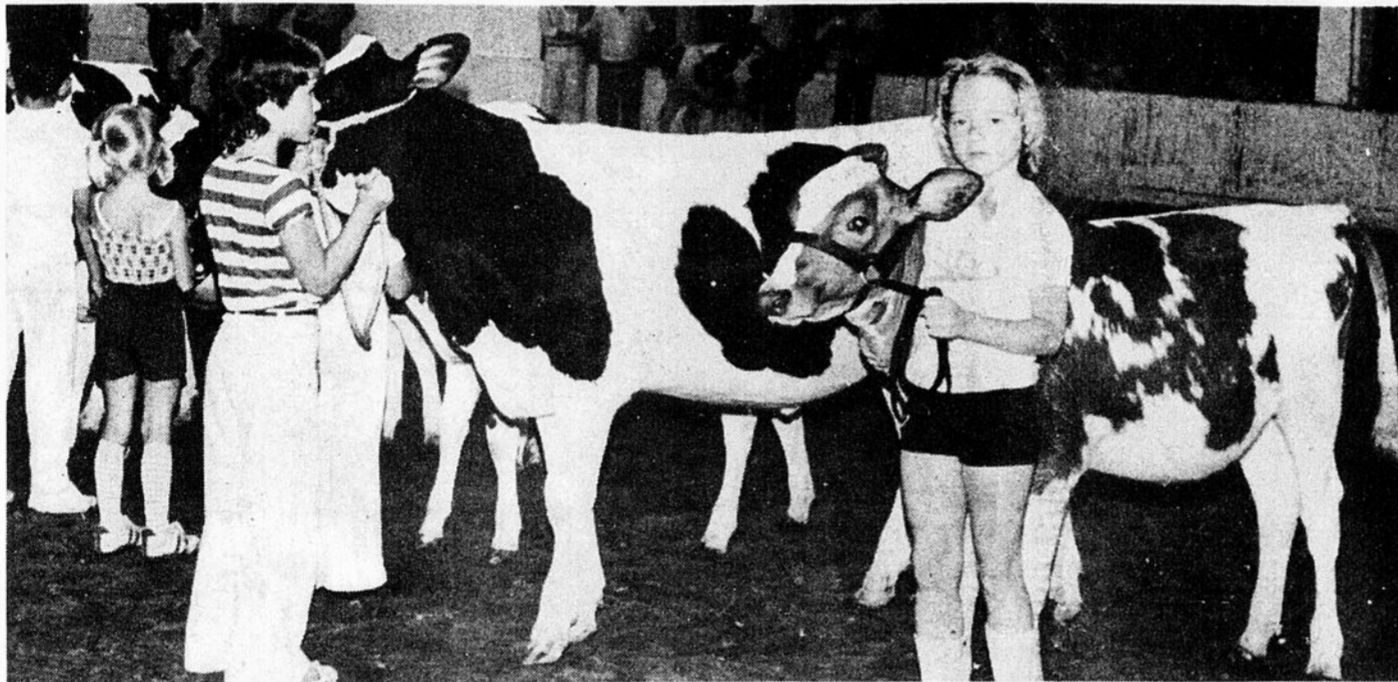
Building from Wednesday's coolish temperatures through Sunday's midsummer heat and humidity, Ormstown Fair notched up another successful year, with total paid entrance exceeding that of last year by about 650.

Secretary-manager Harold McCaig told The Gleaner on Monday that 22,792 people paid at the gate over the five-day period.

Entertainment-wise, most fairgoers were pleased with the many attractions, though most were willing slightly as the temperature climbed into the 90s on Sunday afternoon, with humidity to match. But the rain held off right through the Tractor Pull, and allowed exhibitors of horses and other livestock to load their animals for the journey home.

The 65th annual Ormstown Fair opened Wednesday evening with the traditional parade through the village. Led by the Garde Champain de Valleyfield band, the procession also featured nine floats, the Huntingdon Canadets, and the Valleyfield Air Cadets. Once everyone crowded into the Arena on the fairgrounds, special attraction Roger Doucet, with a firm hand on both Quebec and Canadian flags, turned on his inimitable rendition of the national anthem.

Winner of the \$60 first prize in the float competition was the Ormstown Brownie pace complete with cutlasses and eye-patches as "The Buccaneers". As well as looking terrific in their old-time costumes, the Huntingdon

Craft Centre Kitchen Band kept up a sequence of favorite melodies, and took the second prize.

Then it was back to the younger set - this time very young - as the Huntingdon Nurse School's Queen of Hearts float came third. Fourth were the Ormstown Girl Guides with a float based on the International Year of the Child. Then came the Ormstown Cubs with their canoe; the Franklin Chamber of Commerce with a reminder of their annual Apple Festival complete with sample fruit; the Chateauguay Valley Kennel Club with free dog food for some lucky members of the audience; the Ormstown Lions Club in their yellow Cadillac; and the gleaming speedboat entered by Jacques Rémillard. All float entries received cash awards.

After that it was on to the Horse Show, which this year attracted 303 entries. Worthy of particular note was the quality of the jumpers, with five horses in one Thursday night class clearing the wall at 5 feet 8 inches. Entries in some of the junior classes

were so large that the classes had to be split and two sets of ribbons and prizes presented.

A total of about 450 beef and dairy cattle paraded before the judges on Thursday and Friday and observers felt that in general quality was up from last year.

Among the top winners in Friday night's Parade of Cattle Champions were local

Jersey breeders D.H. McCaig and son Murray of Norval Acres Farm, Huntingdon. They showed the Senior and Junior Jersey champions.

Sheep entries were larger than ever this year, indicating an increased interest in the Chateauguay Valley Sheep Breeders Association Trophy for top ewe lamb (all breeds) went to Peter and Claire

Conway of St-Mathieu, Laprairie County.

Aubrey goat-breeder John Fingland topped approximately 20 entries in Saturday's goat show with his three-year old Saanen doe, Howick View Suzanne. An unhappy note was that five-year old Jill Lang of Ormstown had her pet kid stolen

# Arson suspected in log house fire

The weekend of Ormstown Fair was a busy one for Ormstown Volunteer Firemen, who, as well as keeping a truck on stand-by duty at the fairgrounds, were called out on two major fires.

About 11 p.m. Friday, the first blaze was reported from the Botreaux Range, where an old log house was completely destroyed. The building was being used as a summer cottage by owner William Finn of Montreal, and no one was home at the time of the fire.

Twenty firemen worked for two hours to subdue the flames, and three of them had a narrow escape when a chimney addition weighing about 400 pounds fell and nearly hit them as they worked on the roof of the house.

Arson is suspected in this fire as witnesses reported seeing a car drive away from

the site shortly before the outbreak of the fire.

The second blaze originated in the back section of the Chez Elaine Restaurant on Lampton St. early Sunday morning. Electrical wiring failure is believed to be the cause. The interior of the small building, located between the Pierre Sauvé Music store, formerly White Insurance, and the Ratté 5 and 10 store.

About 25 firemen had no trouble getting the flames under control after the 4:10 a.m. call, but had problems extinguishing the fire completely due to three false ceilings containing old sawdust insulation.

By the time the fire was declared out around 7 a.m. the interior of the building, especially the rear section was gutted. Equipment loss was estimated in the area of \$20,000 by Ormstown Fire Chief Jim Barrington.

## David D'Aoust School Board Dir.-General

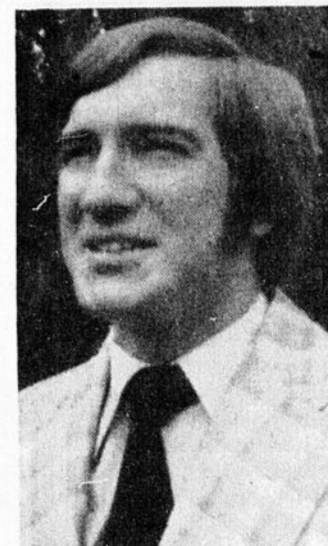
David C. D'Aoust of Huntingdon, Director of Elementary Education for the Protestant Regional School Board of Chateauguay Valley and former Huntingdon Academy Principal, has been named Director-General of the P.R.S.B.C.V.

He succeeds retiring Director-general M.C. Tyler, who has held the chief administrative position since 1973.

D'Aoust 32, was appointed by unanimous decision of the school board at its June 5 meeting, and will take over the post as of July 1 this year.

Educated in Hudson, Que., and at Carleton University in Ottawa, he also holds a Quebec teachers' Diploma from Macdonald College, and a French specialist's diploma from McGill. He is currently working on a Master's program in Special Education at the latter university.

After five years' teaching under the Lakeshore school board, D'Aoust was named principal of Huntingdon Academy in 1971 and remained there for a five-year period. Since that time, he and his wife Joan and their three children have lived in Hun-

# Father Gérard Faivre feted on anniversary

Last Saturday was Father Faivre Day in Huntingdon as the vicar of St-Joseph's Parish was feted in honor of his 40 years in the Order of the White Fathers.

The St. Joseph's Pastoral Council joined with other community groups to organize a very special day for Father Faivre.

"Curé Georges Quenneville told me that there would be a little celebration, but I wasn't expecting anything like this - it's like Christmas!" said Gérard Faivre as the celebrations continued in the Parish Hall basement after a special evening mass in the church attended by some 600 people.

Of these, about 400 jammed into the Parish Hall for the special evening to honor "The friend of the young people" as Father Faivre is called by many.

Since he arrived in Huntingdon to assist Father Quenneville at St.

Joseph's in 1971, Father Faivre has taken a special interest in the school children. On hand Saturday evening were students of St. Joseph's School, who sang songs in his honor.

In the name of his parishioners, Florian Tardif and Kathleen Brisebois spoke in tribute to the elderly priest.

"He's just like a union worker," said Mrs. Brisebois, "He takes his morning and afternoon breaks at the same time as the school recess at St. Joseph's and Notre Dame schools, and there he is, out on the playground with the children."

Father Faivre was presented with a red purse decorated with the figure 40, a gift of money from the parish, and a ceramic plaque with the inscription "Je célèbre ses merveilles".

On behalf of Father Faivre's family, his brother Pierre of Outremont presented him with a portable Mass kit

and a suitcase "so that he can visit us more often".

The evening closed with a brief tribute from Huntingdon Mayor Claude Pilon and the serving of refreshments.

Before coming to Huntingdon, Father Faivre's career included 27 years as a missionary in the African country of Zambia.

Starting in the Parish of Chikowa, he spent two years covering an area of 800 square miles, where his first concern was to set up schools.

He then became secretary for the Diocese of Chipata and later diocesan administrator in charge of the construction of hospitals, churches, and schools. Later, he supervised various parishes.

In 1967, he came to the Diocese of Valleyfield, where he served as Vicar of the Hudson Parish until he came to Huntingdon in 1971.

Born in Montreal in 1913, Father Faivre was ordained in Ottawa on June 10, 1939.

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## Quebec-Canada solution

### Economic approach needed -- Dubois

MNA Claude Dubois, participating last week in a CBC production "Provincial Affairs" called for "an honest economic approach" to the Canada-Quebec question which he termed "more sentimental than realistic."

The Union Nationale member of the National Assembly noted at the outset that the new federal government of Joe Clark "seems favorable to the development of Quebec" and added: "We can surely hope that a new round of negotiations will be satisfactory for all provinces."

He went on: "The Union Nationale believes that Canada must remain undivided, and for this reason I am sure that the citizens of Quebec will instinctively reject a proposed referendum, which ever the question will be, since it will inevitably lead to separation."

"We have already wasted too much time and efforts on this constitutional debate which involves the future of our prosperous country. Nevertheless an honest economic approach would certainly resolve the problem, more sentimental

than realistic." "I insist upon an economic approach because I believe it to be the basis of all discussions which we have already had, and which are still under way. This misunderstanding is not limited to Quebec; it extends from sea to sea, since the economy of 11 governments is at stake."

"This everlasting constitutional conflict seems to me, to be one-sided... continuous accusations against the federal government. It leads me to believe that Quebec is shirking its responsibilities."

"At this turning point, we must stop blaming others for our internal problems. Now is the time to show courage and vigor. Let's go to the heart of our problems."

"Looking back on the past eight years, our governments have voluntarily covered up their faulty economic policies by constant and heated debates on constitution."

"Quebecers have been confused and diverted from the real issues which are strictly economic."

"Before interterring in national and international

issues we must concentrate our efforts on the various vital sectors of our own economy. God knows that we have, right at home, severe problems which can only be settled by strong economic growth, particularly by an exhaustive industrial development and favorable social and labor relations, as well as a comprehensive agricultural policy."

"What is Quebec finally, a Country or a Province? It is evident that separatists see Quebec as a self-contained country and this notion can only bring separation."

"As far as the Union Nationale is concerned, we are just part of a country which has been favorable to us ever since its founding. This is and always has been essentially the position of the U.N."

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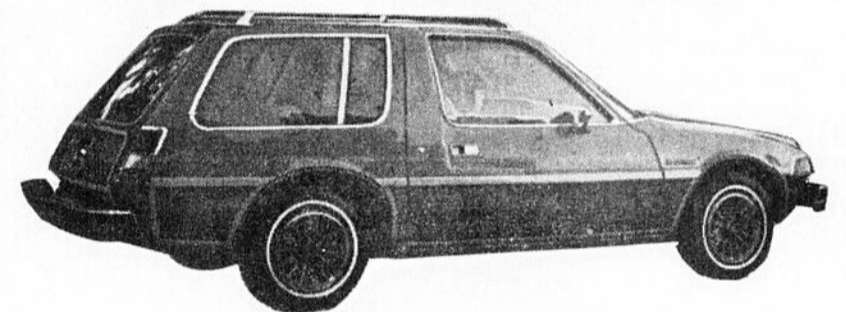

Quebec Provincial Police of Ste. Martine told The Gleaner Tuesday they are still searching for the Sunday morning abductor of 26-year-old Monique Gingras, snatched at gunpoint from her Ste. Clothilde summer trailer. The woman escaped after two hours when the man fell asleep.

The reason for the abduction of the Montreal woman was obscure. Police said the kidnapper appeared to be "a very lonely man" who wanted to talk to someone. He did just that in his truck after taking the woman at gunpoint from the trailer she shared with her husband Yvon Gingras, 34.

Police Investigator Ronald Daigneault said the hunt is for a man in his 20s who drove a black van and wore a white sweater and jeans. Daigneault said the abduction began about 7 a.m. when a man armed with a 12 gauge shotgun burst into the small trailer. Daigneault said there was

a short argument about who owned the wooded land the trailer was situated on.

The intruder then ordered Mrs. Gingras outside and into his van. Her husband was ordered at gunpoint to stay inside the trailer.

Daigneault said Mrs. Gingras was driven about two kilometres away where her abductor parked the van on a small forest road and began telling her his life story.

"Apparently he was just a very lonely man and he told her of all the bad luck he has had in his life," Daigneault said.

Daigneault added that the abductor drank two beers as he spoke with Mrs. Gingras and then dozed off inside the van. The woman then fled on foot.

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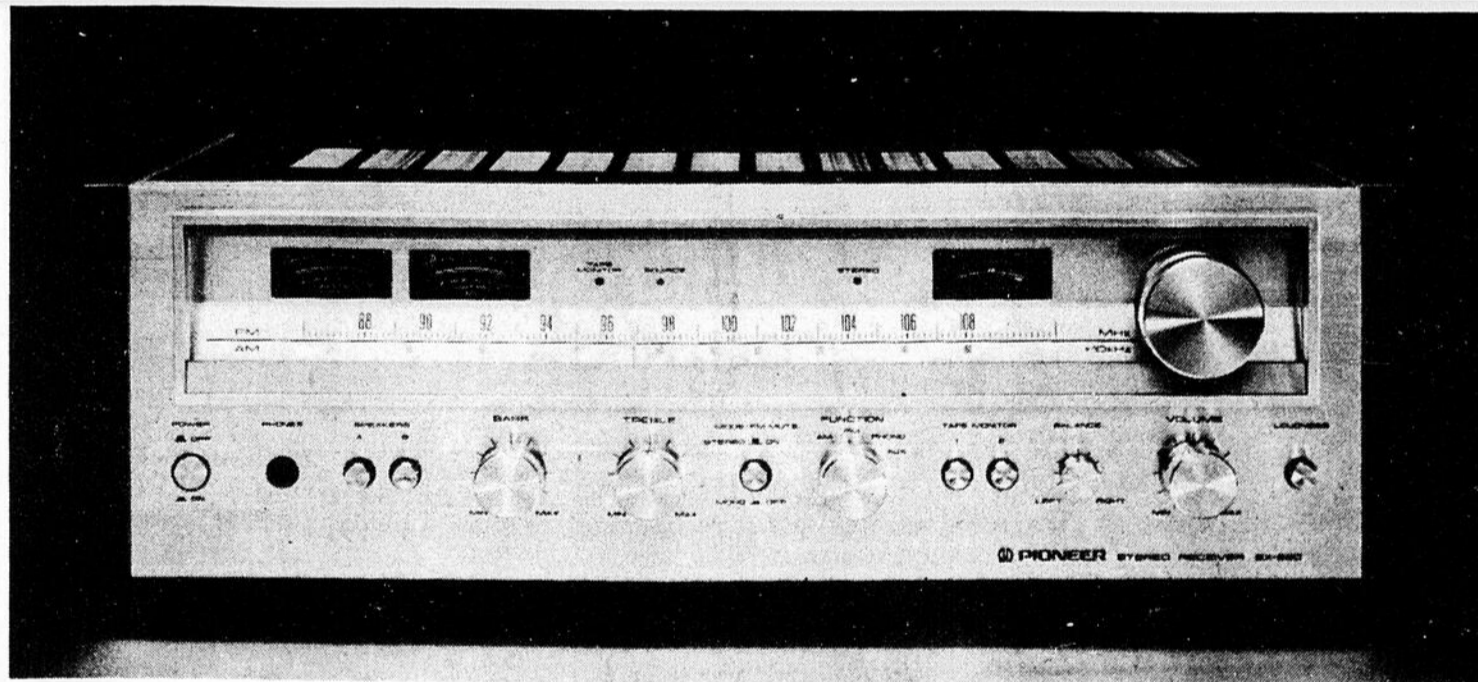
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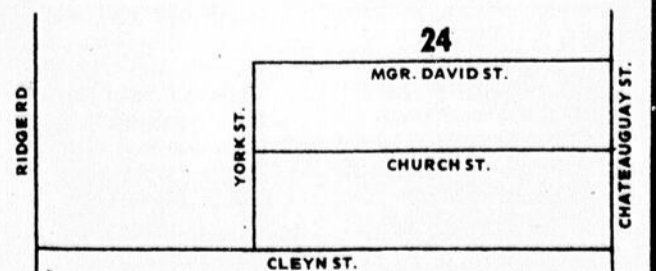
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**FANCY FOOTWORK**

One thing the federalists must learn in their campaign for Quebec remaining in Canada is how to keep their powder dry over the long haul. Obviously Rene Levesque's intent is to keep current uncertainties alive for a good bit, maybe through another election.

The premier, it became clear at the Parti Quebecois convention, is in no rush for Quebec to split. Largely because if he and others are reading the Quebec mood correctly, it doesn't want to.

However Levesque and his party do love power and have charted plans to retain it which, for any politician, seems a somewhat natural course.

They are following tactics which gained them power in 1976: A red herring to distract the electorate from the urgent issue of separatism. In 1976 good government was the promise, overshadowed by the separatist threat once the PQ took office.

Since then, sensing the Quebec mood as he played the power game, Levesque has made separatism a dirty word in the PQ lexicon though it should be noted that Finance Minister Parizeau has difficulty remembering this at times. Now the word is sovereignty or sovereignty-association which

Levesque sold to his convention.

To sound a little less like separatism which, in the long run it really is, the PQ emphasis now is on sovereignty and association with Canada as an equal and the authority to negotiate this.

The PQ hopes to receive that authority via the much-mentioned, always datelessly-forecast referendum. Should the mandate to negotiate be given (and why not, really, since this step on the separatist road seems rather harmless?) and negotiations fail then the PQ would hold another referendum, this time strictly on sovereignty.

Still no date for Referendum No. 1 but 1980's autumn has been suggested as a possibility.

That being so, one must presume that negotiations with Canada could hardly be an overnight affair. They might even take Levesque up to another election time in Quebec and it could be held without separation, as such, ever having been mentioned.

Pretty deft strategy this for PQ retention of power. It's so deft that the one-Canada folk, if they are to counter-punch effectively, will have to be sharp indeed over a long period of time.

**SOUL OF COMMUNITY**

\* The independent business people collect a hefty portion of all the funds it takes to make government tick, including unemployment insurance, Canada Pension Plan, sales and income taxes and workmen's compensation payments often for little or no compensation.

As real job creators in Canada they deserve a hearty pat on the back.

**Carleton U. honors George B. Johnston of Cook's Lines**

George B. Johnston, of Cook's Lines, received the degree of Doctor of Literature, "Honoris causa", at the spring convocation of Carleton University in the National Arts Centre, Ottawa, last week. Presiding at the convocation was the chancellor of the university, Dr. Gerhard Herzberg. Dr. Johnston was presented for the degree by Dr. Robert L. McDougall. Following the conferring of the degree, Dr. Johnston delivered the convocation address in the form of a poem, composed for the occasion, in which he said farewell to the university and to his teaching career. As a further distinction, Dr. Johnston has been appointed professor emeritus in the Department of English at Carleton, where he has taught since 1950.

He has been a summer resident of Cook's Lines for about 20 years and took up permanent residence there this year on his retirement from the university. Dr. Johnston is internationally known as a poet and as a translator of verse from

the Norse. He has published four volumes of his poetry which has also been widely printed in various journals, magazines, textbooks and anthologies.

**THE BUNKER**  
by James P. O'Donnell.

The author served as captain in the Signal Corps intelligence in Europe during World War II, and in 1945, became the first bureau chief for Newsweek in Germany. His research for the book Bunker began when he was released from military duty to serve as a correspondent.

He paid a hurried visit to Hitler's underground hideout on July 4, 1945. It's odor of death sickened him. The military documents,

diaries, telegrams, and appointment books left behind by the fleeing Germans, and curiously overlooked by Russian intelligence officers, amazed him.

The oddly hilarious fact was that the first to enter the bunker were not the steely Russian soldiers, but women from the Russian Army Medical Corps interested in Eva Braun's finery.

O'Donnell decided to write about the last days of Adolf Hitler, and surprisingly a large group of the "bunkerees" were still alive and quite willing to talk to him. He found the names and addresses of more than 200 bunkerees, got in touch with more than 100, and interviews about 50 at length.

And what stories they have to tell, about themselves, about those that avoided arrest; and those that committed suicide with their master. It takes in the lives of such people as Hitler's architect Albert Speer, who planned to put poison gas through the ventilating system to destroy Hitler and his close cronies; Martin Bormann, the most feared of the bunker people; Joseph Goebbels, the wily propaganda minister; the fanatic Magda and his family; Eva Braun, who

married Hitler two days before the fall of Germany. At the center of it all, of course, is the Fuhrer.

If you are one of the believers that Adolf Hitler is still alive, do read "The Bunker" which is available at The Little Green Library.

The library has purchased more than \$400 worth of books recently, craft books, cook books, and biographies. These include the story of the Allen Family of the Canadian Steamship Lines called RAVENSCRAG; the Vivien Leigh and Montgomery Clift biographies, and the biography that everyone has been asking about, Beyond Reason by Margaret Trudeau, in both languages.

Besides the many childrens books on trains, fire engines, ships, camping, paramedics, horse and pony stories, doctors and nurses, and how the body works, the library has purchased books on childhood injuries, successful parenthood, husbands coached in childbirth, parent's book of Physical Fitness for Children, The Academy Awards, and Horoscopes. Also many new fiction and mystery novels such as Vet In A Spin by James Herriot, The Last Valley

by Guthrie, The Lively Ghosts of Ireland, and Victoria Holt's The Queen's Enemy. Some of the members have found Blunderful World of Bloopers, The Trivia Encyclopedia, and Incredible But True books very interesting.

The library has been concentrating on building up the teenage, junior and young peoples sections. To date, the library has spent \$2000 on books for the children and adult departments in both languages.

Our funds are getting very low, but again the public has been wonderful with their thoughtfulness. The Town of Huntingdon has promised \$600 towards the rent for the next six months, and the Township of Hinchinbrook has donated \$100, the St. Andrew's Presbyterian Evening Auxiliary \$50 for childrens books, Mixed Couples Bridge Club \$33, and The Monday Afternoon Bridge Club \$15, and private donations from Mr. and Mrs. Fred Horsely, Mrs. Myrtle Rowat, and Anonymous \$10.

The library appreciates the Memorial donations, which are put towards books in memory, and a book is something personal. The following

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## Municipal affairs

### Ormstown will drill test wells

Water was once again the central issue at Monday night's meeting of the Ormstown Village Council.

With hot summer weather and the possibility of recurring water shortages looming ever closer on the horizon, the Council is still searching for the best and least expensive way to ensure an adequate water supply for Village residents.

It is becoming increasingly clear that a large expenditure will be involved, probably in the area of \$500,000, according to at least one council member.

The Monday meeting

was cut to a minimum, and most regular business was postponed until next Monday, due to a death in the family of the Municipal Secretary-treasurer which prevented him from attending.

The Council did, however, hear a report from Valleyfield engineer Gilles Leblanc on the water situation.

A previous suggestion that the water supply could be increased by cleaning up the water stored in the elevated tanks was rejected, because it would necessitate the installation of a partial treatment and filtration plant which would cost in the area of

\$300,000. Chemicals and supplies to treat the water would cost an estimated \$30,000 in the first year alone.

The most likely solution at this point would seem to be the digging of new wells up to one mile away from the existing wells on the Dumas Range, where a geologist's report indicates there should be plenty of water.

It was resolved that test wells will be dug in this area, at an estimated cost of \$15,000. If, as expected, enough water is found, the municipality at least has the right-of-way to transport it back along the route now used. But a new

pipeline would have to be installed at a depth of six feet, and costs for this are estimated at about \$20 per foot.

The Council had hoped that it might be possible to use an above-ground plastic pipeline, but the engineer's report indicates that this cannot be done.

"It seems the best thing to do is to look for more wells, and have a cost study done. The geologist's report indicates that there is nothing to be gained by digging the present wells deeper. It may cost around \$500,000 by the time we're done, but we have no choice at this point," said one Ormstown councillor.

### Hinchinbrooke Council

Hinchinbrooke Municipal Council at its June meeting formally lined up with nine other municipalities in the search for a regional dump site and named Councillor Donald Davidson as its representative on an Inter-Municipal Dump Committee.

This committee has engaged the firm of Lapointe, Beauchamp, Reynolds and Cote Associates for preliminary engineering studies of dump sites, the most recent of which is in St. Louis de Gonzague.

The sum of \$100 was granted to The Little Green Library in Huntingdon to help defray operating expenses and \$375 was granted to the Athelstan Community Sports Association.

At the meeting June 8 Lorne McNaughton requested the cleaning of a portion of the roadside ditch on the Boyd Settlement Road which Council agreed to along with a request for roadside ditch cleaning on the 1st Concession opposite the A. Rosevear farm.

Hydro Quebec will be requested to remove some dangerous roadside trees on the Athelstan-Huntingdon road between the properties of Jacques Leduc and Pierre Filion. Council took note of complaints regarding parking conditions in

Athelstan where an auction and flea market is held at Munro Hall. Owner Danny Smith is to be advised to arrange improved parking facilities.

A request for a street light on Clauson Street in Athelstan was refused because there are other areas in the township which have requested improved lighting and are more heavily travelled.

Councillors Wallace and Tully were appointed to investigate a drainage problem on the Gowen Road presented by J.G. Brault.

Complaints having been received about the unsightliness of a vacated trailer-type lunch wagon on Route 202 close to Huntingdon Council decided to ask the owner to have it removed.

It was moved and seconded that Carl Anderson be allowed the cost of four bulldozer hours for roadside improvement on the Gore Road.

Permission was given Yvan Brisebois on Route 202 north of Herdman to open a fruit and vegetable stand provided the premises are kept clean and he is responsible for parking facilities.

Mr. Forthysythe, new owner of the former Bockus farm on Range 1, was given 30 days to report to Council regarding in-

tentions concerning line fences on his farm.

Five loads of gravel are to be spread in Davignon Park along the 1st Service Road and Grousel St. where the school bus passes; also two loads of gravel to be placed on the street leading to Joe Vegh's at Athelstan with D.O. Taylor in charge of both jobs.

Jacques Malofy and Laurent Cartier requested drainage and other improvements for parts of Davignon Park and the much-discussed problem of drainage ditches along Main Street in the park was again brought up.

Council drew attention to its previous discussions in this matter and made clear it is ready to assume its responsibility of cleaning the roadside ditch but is firm in its stand that the

installation of new culverts at the entrance to the privately-owned streets is not the responsibility of the Municipal Council.

A renewed request from Malofy that a portion of the ditch be cleaned opposite his Davignon Park property was refused on the grounds this is not a municipally-owned street.

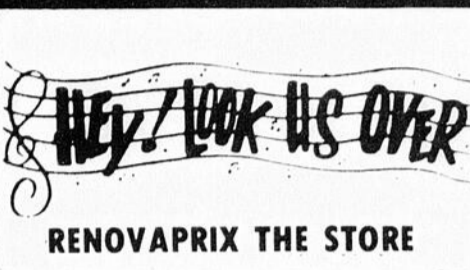

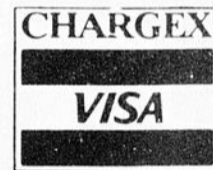

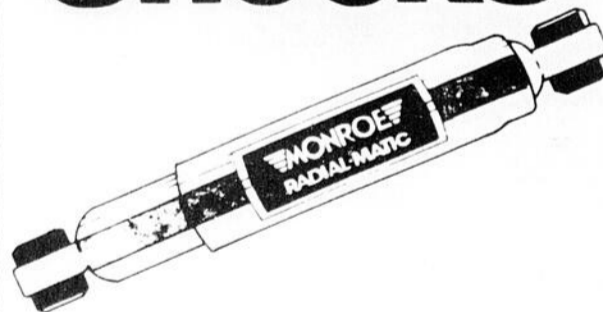

**NEW CLASSIFICATIONS** - for motorcycle drivers' licenses will be in force as of June 1, the Quebec government announced recently. There will now be three types of permits: the first, for beginning drivers, will limit them to vehicles of under 125 c.c. for the first year. The second year, this can be changed for an authorization for motorcycles up to 400 c.c. if desired. After two years of the first type of license or one year of the second, applicants can obtain a permit for all sizes of motorcycles.

**ABOUT 3,000** - new drivers will be affected by these measures this year, the Quebec Transport Department says. Also mentioned was the fact that starting this year, 16 and 17 year olds wanting to take a recognized-course in driving a motorcycle will not have to obtain a learner's permit.

**THE MEETING** - that almost wasn't occurred Monday evening as the Huntingdon Town Council met to hear requests from farmers within the town limits who wish their land to be classed as agricultural under the new zoning law. Only one farmer, Charles Reid, showed up, accompanied by representatives of the local U.P.A. His request will be considered by the Council at its next regular meeting and the decision forwarded to the Zoning Commission.



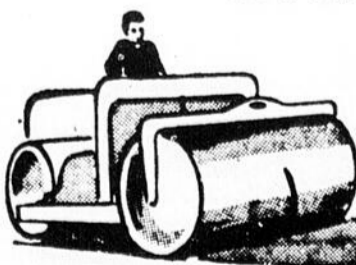

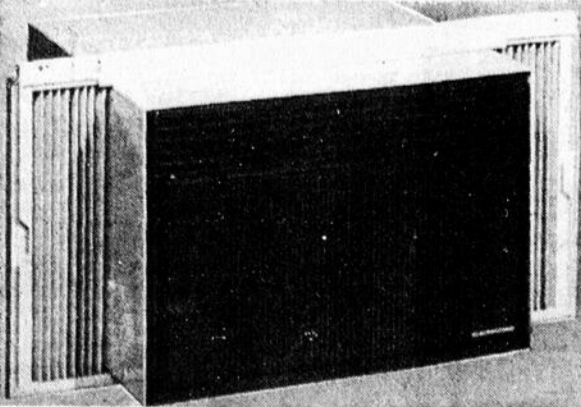
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# Enlèvement à Ste-Clothilde: La police recherche toujours l'individu en question

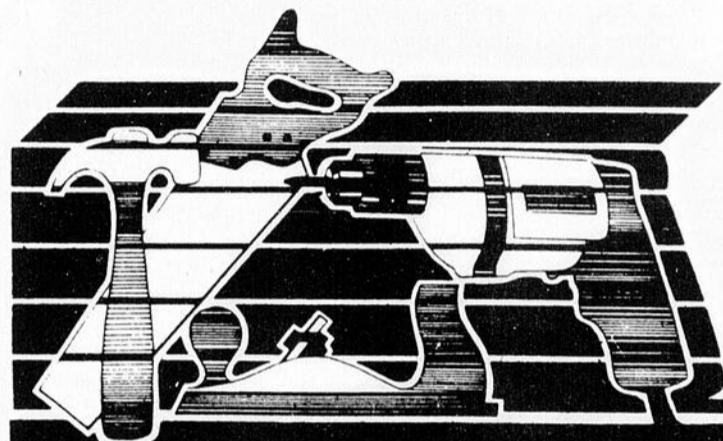

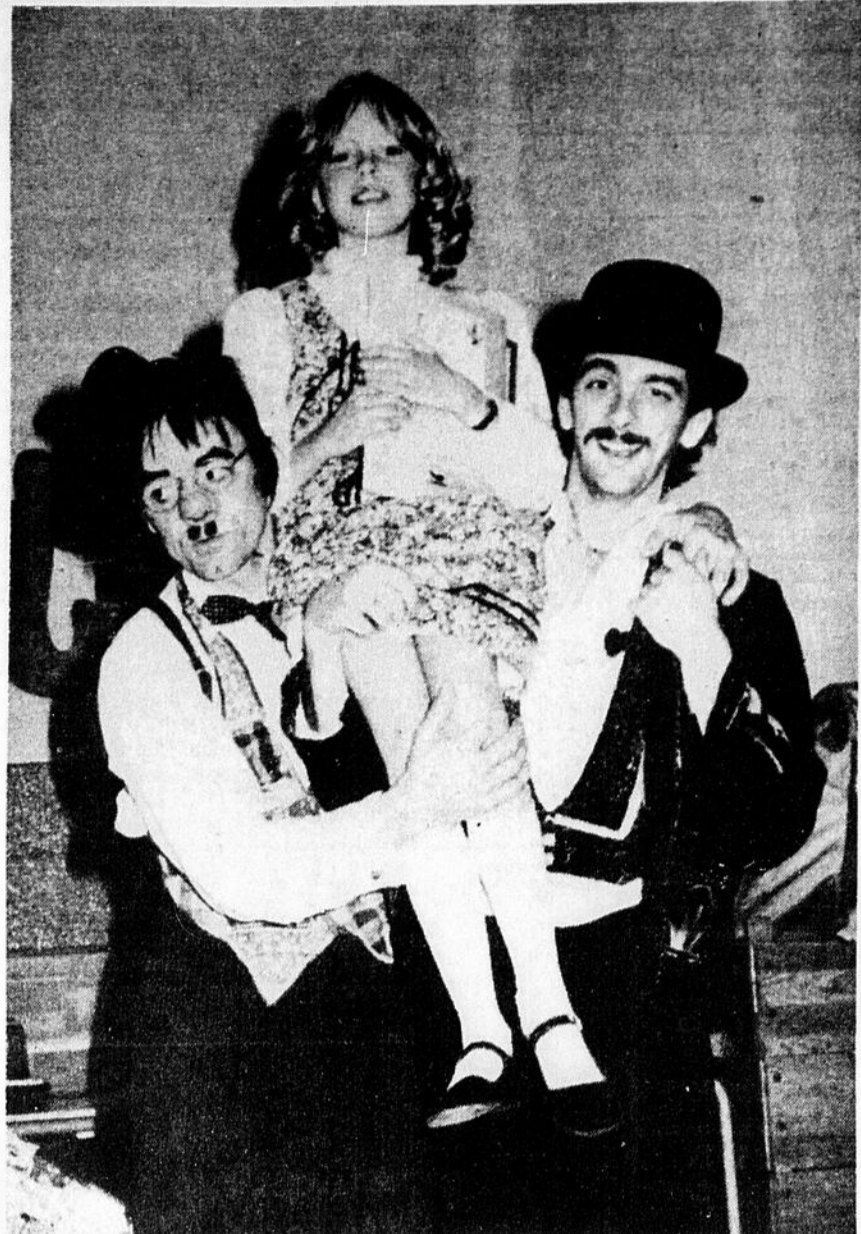

# Inauguration officielle du Centre de mise au point technique pour cultures abritées

Quebec - Le ministre de l'Agriculture du Québec, M. Jean Garon, a inauguré le 25 mai dernier, le centre québécois de mise au point technique pour les cultures abritées. Ce centre situé à Sainte-Martine, comté de Châteauguay, au cœur d'une région à forte concentration de maraichers et de producteurs sous serres, détient le mandat d'adapter à notre réalité, des techniques de culture

abritée déjà éprouvées ailleurs. Parallèlement à ce travail d'adaptation, le centre de Sainte-Martine intensifiera les recherches pour la réalisation de systèmes de chauffage capables d'utiliser des sources d'énergie actuellement négligées, telles les huiles usagées, les déchets de bois ou la chaleur de rejet de certaines usines. Car l'on sait

que le coût élevé des sources traditionnelles d'énergie représente une des principales limitations au développement de la serriculture au Québec. Une formule originale Souignons aussi que le ministère de l'Agriculture y expérimente une formule inédite au Québec dans le domaine de la vulgarisation et de l'en-

cadrement des producteurs agricoles. Deux groupes, comptant chacun une vingtaine de serriculteurs, ont été constitués autour de spécialistes chargés de les suivre de façon régulière; ce, afin de leur permettre de bénéficier immédiatement des nouvelles techniques éprouvées et d'augmenter leurs rendements à par l'introduction de meilleures

pratiques culturales. Les groupes de producteurs déjà impliqués par ce projet proviennent des régions 6, 7 et 10, soit Saint-Hyacinthe, Châteauguay et l'Assomption. Ces producteurs reçoivent, toutes les deux semaines, la visite des spécialistes du ministère. Le responsable du centre, M. Jean-Luc Lussier et ses collaborateurs croient que ce contact direct, de fait, cette formation continue présente plus d'impact et améliore l'information disponible au producteur.

Les Moyens C'est la première fois qu'une équipe de spécialistes, dotée d'outils de travail affectés exclusivement à cette fin, a comme mandat, la mise au point technique, pour une application immédiate chez les producteurs de technologies importées ou conçues au Québec dans le domaine des cultures abritées. Selon M. Garon, ce serait en effet, une erreur pour le Québec que de chercher à refaire le travail déjà effectué ailleurs, alors que nous avons un énorme retard dans ce secteur. Le Québec ne compte qu'environ 160 acres de serres, alors que nous produisons respectivement 14%, 22% et 40% des tomates, concombres et fleurs en pots cultivés sous serres, que nous consommons.

Le centre de Sainte-Martine regroupe un nombre limité de spécialistes, mais leur seule préoccupation est le développement des cultures abritées au Québec. Ils disposent déjà de trois serres jumelées et de deux grands tunnels, et un autre est présentement en construction. L'exploitation actuelle comprend donc, 16,000 pi. ca. et l'on y effectue parallèlement des essais variés, des essais de fertilisation, d'irrigation, sans oublier les nombreux tests de matériaux et de chauffage.

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Les projets Déjà pour l'automne, l'on envisage de dispenser des cours d'une semaine aux producteurs de légumes et/ou fleurs en serre, répartis dans les diverses régions du Québec. De plus, le centre de Sainte-Martine collabore à une étude de rentabilité sur la récupération et l'utilisation des huiles usées (de garage) pour le chauffage des serres. Si les résultats s'avèrent concluants, on verra à implanter un système de collecte de ces huiles usées, par des regroupements de producteurs intéressés.

## Concernant les motocyclettes

Huntingdon - Soit depuis le premier juin dernier, toute personne de la région de Huntingdon, de même que du reste du Québec, qui entreprend des démarches pour la première fois pour avoir le droit de conduire une motocyclette sera soumise à de nouvelles règles quand au type de motocyclette qu'elle sera autorisée à conduire sur la route.

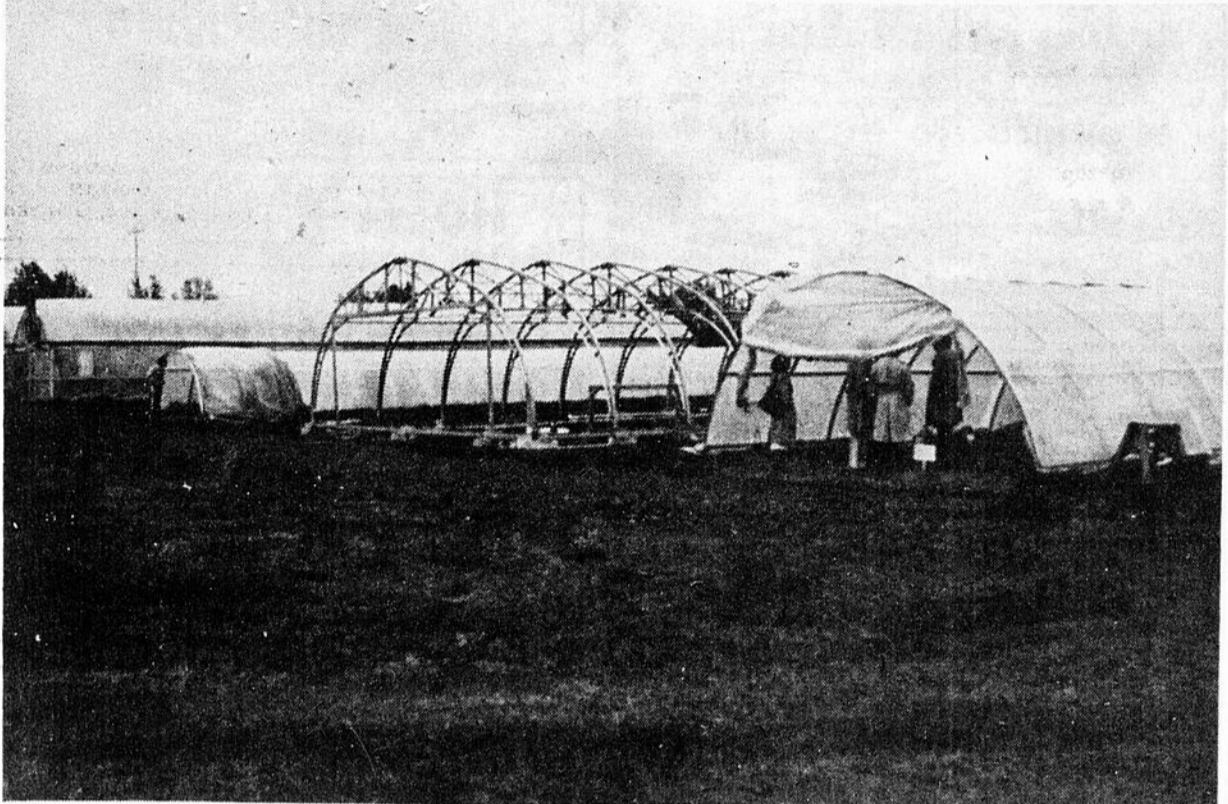
Le ministre des Transports mettra en vigueur trois classes de permis de conduire pour la motocyclette, qui tiennent compte de l'expérience du candidat.

Dès cette année, le

conducteur sans expérience ne sera autorisé qu'à conduire une motocyclette dont la cylindrée est de 125 cc ou moins. L'an prochain, alors que les deux autres classes seront en vigueur, celui qui aura une année d'expérience à son crédit pourra solliciter un changement à son permis afin de pouvoir conduire une motocyclette dont la cylindrée atteint 400 cc. Enfin, la conduite de tout type de motocyclette sera réservée au conducteur qui détient une expérience pertinente de deux ans sur une moto de cylindrée de 125 cc ou moins, ou d'un an sur un véhicule d'une

cylindrée de 400 cc. La Direction générale du Bureau des véhicules automobiles estime que l'application des premières mesures touche cette année environ 3,000 nouveaux conducteurs. Il est à noter que ces modifications ne restreignent en rien les droits des conducteurs d'automobiles qui détiennent déjà un permis de conduire régulier sans restriction "X". Leur certificat prévoit qu'ils peuvent conduire, à la fois, une automobile et une

motocyclette. Si le permis régulier comporte la restriction X, c'est-à-dire s'il exclut la conduite de la motocyclette, les nouvelles mesures s'appliquent. Permis d'apprenti conducteur Autre changement: il n'est pas nécessaire pour les candidats de 16 et 17 ans d'obtenir un permis d'apprenti conducteur pour suivre un cours de conduite pour la moto. Les leçons pratiques sont maintenant dispensées en circuits fermés.



Des efforts importants de recherche et de développement pour la production des légumes sous tunnel sont entrepris à Sainte-Martine. Dix espèces de légumes de primeur à bon potentiel pourraient être ainsi cultivés, entre autres le melon, les tomates, les piments, la laitue, le chou-fleur...

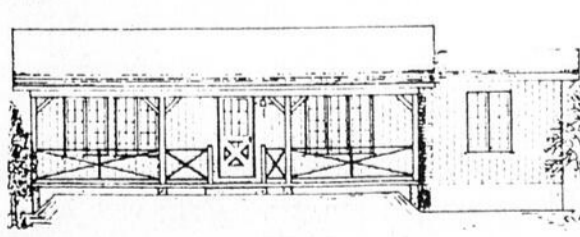

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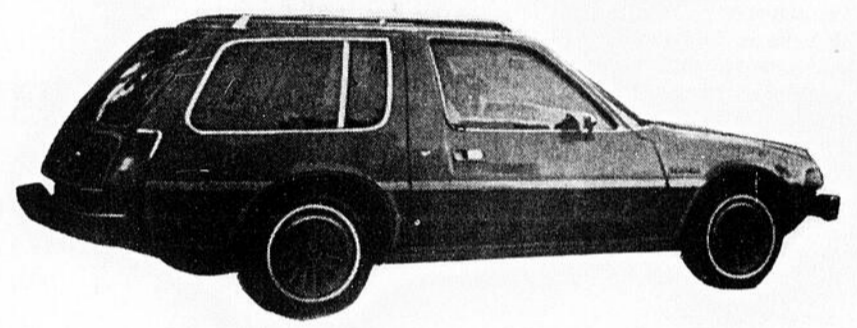
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## Séance d'information pour l'entreprise

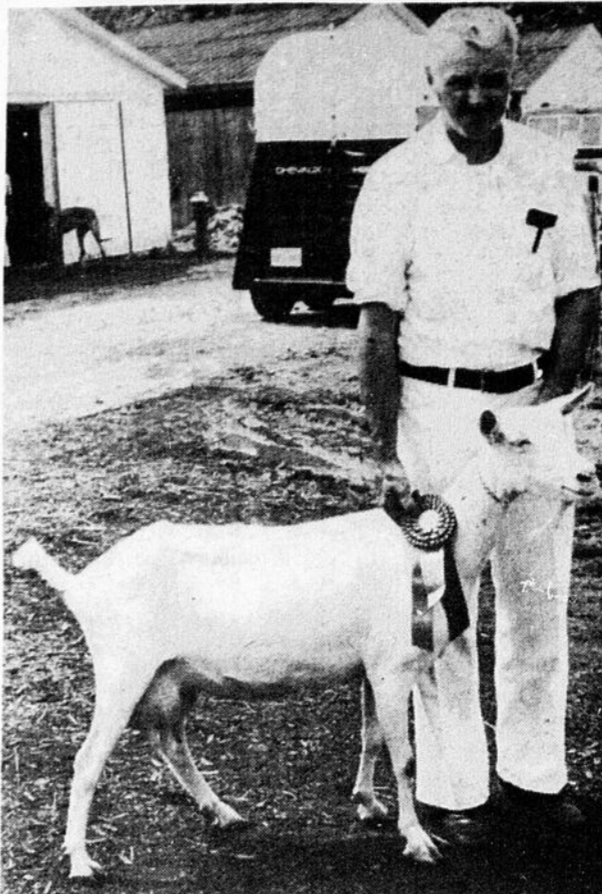

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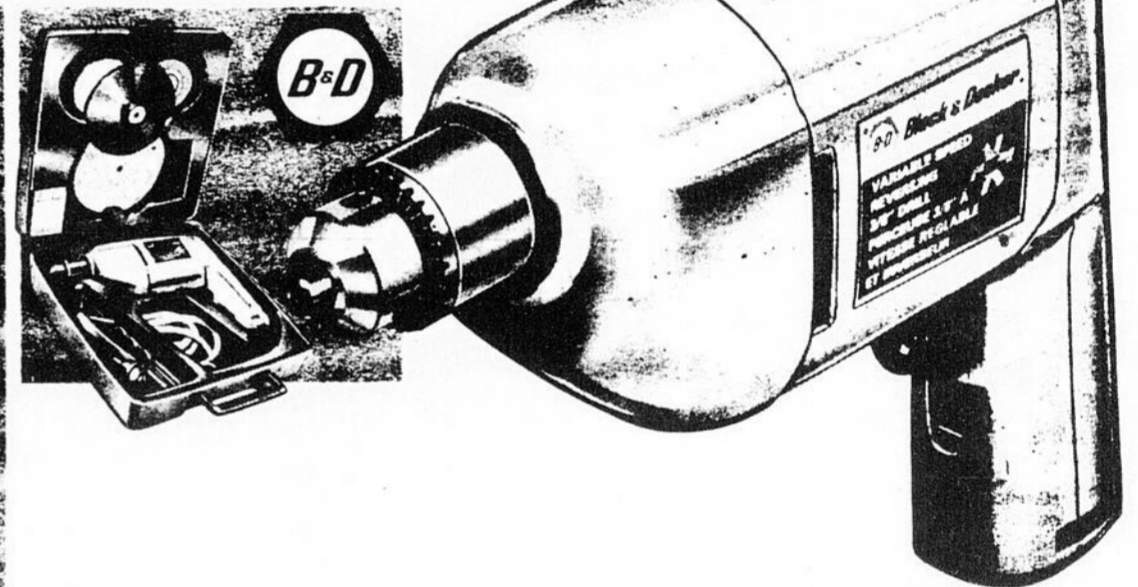

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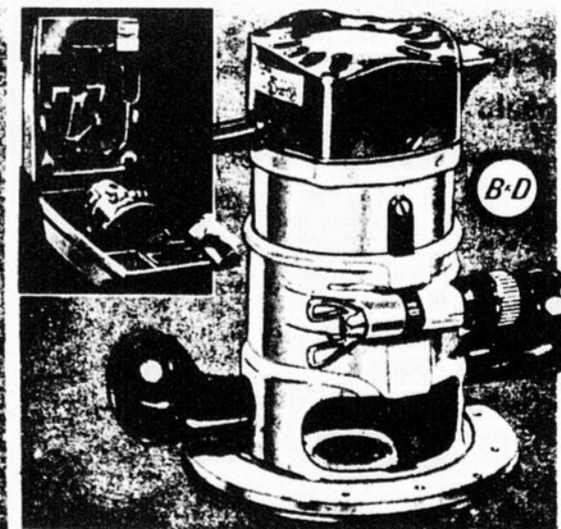
