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GERMAN U-BOATS ACTIVE IN THE BAY OF FUNDY

THREE FISHING SCHOONERS
SUNK SATURDAY WEST OF
SEAL ISLAND.

Halifax, N.S., Aug. 4.—Saturday afternoon, there were further developments in the activities of German U-boats in the Bay of Fundy, which have been continuing for four days, when three fishing schooners bound from Boston to The Banks were blown up and sunk forty miles west of Seal Island. These schooners were the Muriel, the Rob Roy, and the Annie M. Perry, their crews, set adrift in dories, all managed to reach the Nova Scotia Coast, and are at present in Yarmouth. The submarine lay in sight of Seal Island until Sunday morning when it submerged.

This triple sinking follows immediately after the burning of the Dornfontein off St. John on Friday afternoon by probably the same submarine, which seems to direct its attention to the destruction of the smaller fishing vessels.

The Muriel, with Captain Eldredge Goodman, left Gloucester on Friday for The Banks. Saturday shortly before noon, when she was lying forty miles west of Seal Island, the submarine was sighted four miles off. Two warning shots were fired across her stern, and she dove to. Half an hour later the submarine came within a hundred yards of the schooner, and ordered the crew into the lorries; some of them were taken aboard the submarine. Its captain sent several sailors to the Muriel, who placed a bomb amidships underneath her keel. Fifteen minutes later, there was only wreckage floating upon the water.

The crew of the Muriel were placed in their boats and reached Yarmouth shortly after daylight yesterday. Thirteen of their number belonged to town along the Southern Shore of Nova Scotia.

AMERICANS SENT 300,000 MEN OVER IN JULY

ALL RECORDS BROKEN —

Washington, Aug. 3.—In his weekly talk on military affairs today, General March, Chief of Staff of the War Department, said the total embarkation of American troops during July broke all records, more than 300,000 men having been shipped. The grand total embarked to the end of July has passed the 1,300,000 mark. The previous high monthly record was for June when 276,000 men were sent overseas.

noon the submarine ran down the Annie M. Perry, Captain James Goodman, and blew her up in the same way as the Muriel. The crew took to their dories, and reached Woods Harbor yesterday morning. Two hours later, the U-Boat, at a distance of five miles, fired a warning shot across the bows of the Rob Roy, Capt. Freeman Crowell. When the enemy craft drew near, the crew of the Rob Roy were told to hurry into their boats. Then their vessel was blown up. About eleven of them spent the night on Seal Island, the remainder reached Clarks Harbour. They are all in Yarmouth at present.

According to the men, the submarine is 300 feet long. It is neat and clean, painted black along the top. It is equipped with four guns, two fore, two aft. As it lay off Seal Island, it was brilliantly illuminated by a light which seemed to be suspended from the bowhead.

The captain boasted of his accomplishments to the crew of the Muriel. He said that on Friday he had sunk six schooners, and that he had orders to destroy all he met. The direction which the submarine took on leaving Seal Island could not be ascertained.

BORDEN'S AUGUST FOURTH MESSAGE TO CANADIAN TROOPS

NECESSITY OF PROSECUTING
WAR WITHOUT FALTERING
UNTIL FINAL VICTORY.

London, Aug. 3.—(Via Reuter's) — In anticipation of Remembrance Day, the fourth of August messages from Sir Robert Borden, Hon. W. F. Massey, General Botha and Sir Edward Kemp, have been published urging the necessity of prosecuting the war without faltering until victory has been achieved.

Sir Robert's message, addressed to the Canadian troops in England and France as well as the public says: "When the military despotism of Germany made its preparation for dominating the world by force reliance was placed upon the discipline and endurance of the German people. German rulers still believe that the national spirit of their people is stronger and sterner than that of any democracy. In the end, no army in such a war as this is stronger than the spirit of the people behind it.

Four years ago, the nations of the British Commonwealth took the fatal decision and set themselves to the task of defending democracy and public rights in the world.

The task is not yet accomplished, but the pledge then made must not be broken. Traditions founded upon never dying history and the glorious achievement of a thousand years cannot be forgotten.

We are bound alike to those who stand steadfast in our battle line, and to those not yet born, for whom we hold our part in trust; that our resolution shall not even falter until the full accomplishment of the purpose for which this war was undertaken and to which we concentrated our effort, our suffering and our endurance. United by the tie of a common purpose and the bond of a common sacrifice, the free nations of the British Commonwealth will and must hold firm.

Haig's Message.
London, Aug. 3.—Field Marshal Haig, commander in chief of the British forces in France, in his fourth of August message on the occasion of the anniversary of the entry of Great Britain into the war says to his troops:

"The conclusion of the fourth year marks the passing of the period of crisis. The Russian revolution set free large hostile forces which were transferred to the western front. The enemy intention was to use great numbers and to gain a decision before the arrival of American troops could give superiority to the Allies. The enemy has failed. The steady stream of Americans arriving in France has restored the balance."

New York Observes.

New York, Aug. 4.—New York observed solemnly today the fourth anniversary of Great Britain's entrance into the war, paying tribute to her "contemptible little army," which helped the Belgians and French to meet the first onslaught of the Germans, to her navy which has kept the German fleet from the seas, and to her men and women who have given their lives and treasure that freedom might live. Everywhere the British flag was raised beside the Stars and Stripes and it seemed New Yorkers could not do enough for Canadian and Australian soldiers visiting the city.

THE HUNS ARE RACING FOR THE AISNE AND THEIR LOSSES IN MEN MADE PRISONER WILL THRILL ALLIED WORLD WHEN FIGURES ARE ANNOUNCED — AMERICANS ALONE HAVE TAKEN 8,400 PRISONERS—FRENCH AND AMERICANS HAVE CAPTURED IMPORTANT TOWN OF FISMES—EAST OF SOISSONS ALLIED TROOPS HAVE CROSSED THE AISNE — IF ALLIES ARE ABLE TO FORCE GERMANS BACK IN AISNE REGION THEY MAY DISLOCATE ENTIRE GERMAN LINE IN THE SOUTH.

(Associated Press War Summary).

The German retreat continues unabated, with the Allies everywhere in hot pursuit.

Apparently the situation now has resolved itself into a race for the northern bank of the Aisne river by the Germans, who have been evicted from strategic positions along the Vesle river, in the centre of the line and directly east of Rheims which seemingly renders necessary that they put the Aisne between themselves and their pursuers as quickly as possible in order to escape further large losses of men made prisoner.

Just how large this bag of captives is at present cannot be reckoned, but unofficial advices from Paris assert that when the figures are made public they will thrill the Allied world. General Pershing in his communication says the Americans alone have 8,400 prisoners and in addition 133 guns.

After hard fighting the Americans and French have succeeded in taking from the Germans the important town of Fismes, once Germany's great ammunition and supply depot, midway on the railway between Soissons and Rheims, while to the east at a number of places along the Vesle river the French have crossed the stream, driving the enemy northeastward.

East of Soissons Allied troops have negotiated the passage of the Aisne to the northern bank of that stream, where they are in a position to harass the enemy as he endeavors to straighten out his line in conformity with that running northwestward.

So fast has been the retreat of the Germans in the centre that already some elements of their forces have succeeded in reaching the northern bank of the Aisne and getting numbers of their big guns across with them. All through the salient towns are still ablaze behind the retreating Germans, and even corn fields have been set afire in order to prevent the Allied troops garnering the ripened crop.

The fighting along the Vesle river was of a sanguinary character as long as it lasted. With the river at fresher and the Germans unable to ford it, they stood with their backs to it and gave battle for their lives. A majority of them were killed and the remainder were made prisoner. One of the most important manoeuvres north of the Vesle was the penetration by the French to the village of La Neuville, which releases the German hold on the northern outskirts of Rheims and seemingly delivers the Cathedral City from the German menace.

With the Germans now thoroughly vanquished thus far on the Soissons-Rheims salient, eyes are being turned to the regions in the northwest on both sides of Amiens. Here the French and British are keeping up their hard pressure against the armies of Crown Prince Rupprecht of Bavaria and have forced them on two highly important sectors to retreat. Southeast of Amiens on the old Mont Didier sectors the Germans have fallen back across the Avre river over a wide front while northeast of Amiens in the region of Albert a similar retrograde movement has been made across the Ancre. The German official communication in admitting the withdrawal near Albert declares the manoeuvre was carried without interference by the British.

Just what bearing these new offensives will have on the fighting front to which the Germans ultimately retreat for a stand in the Aisne region, cannot yet be forecast, but should the Allied troops be able to press back the line for any material gains eastward, it is not improbable that it would dislocate the entire German line in the south.

BRITISH STATEMENT.

London, August 4.—The official report from Field Marshal Haig's Headquarters in France tonight says:

"A hostile raiding party was driven off this morning south of Merris, without loss to us. Our patrols captured a few prisoners during the day in the La Bassee sector. There is nothing further to report."

ITALIAN STATEMENT.

Rome August 4.—The War Office statement issued today says: "South of Nago our 29th assault detachment yesterday wrested from the enemy by surprise attack Hill 173 on Dosso Alto, where on the 18th of June the enemy, after violent artillery preparation, succeeded in gaining a foothold and maintaining himself at the cost of heavy casualty. Our occupation was promptly consolidated under effective protection of the artillery."

"Large enemy parties, hidden in caverns, gave brisk local resistance, but were overcome. The enemy suffered considerable losses and four officers and 178 men and a large quantity of arms and material were captured."

"On the night of August 2-3 French detachments during brilliant surprise attacks overcame the enemy's resistance and penetrated very far into the enemy line at Zocchi, to the east of Asiago, and brought back one senior officer and 124 men of other ranks, and captured also much war material and many arms, including a gun and a machine gun."

"West of Asiago British parties broke into Gaiga, inflicting losses on the enemy and capturing some prisoners."

"In the Tasson region and in the Alano Basin our reconnoitring patrols gathered in material and took some prisoners."

"In Albania the fighting activity yesterday was limited to bursts of fire on our part which drove the enemy parties back to the north of Berat."

A NOTABLE CELEBRATION.

Notable celebrations of Britain's entry into the World War four years ago marked the anniversary yesterday, not only in the Motherland but throughout the Empire. Here, as elsewhere, special services marked the day, and thanks to the victorious advances of the Allied Armies during the last fortnight, there was added brightness in the churches, as elsewhere; and special outpourings of praise and thanksgivings for the measure of victory so far achieved mingled in the same services with the earnest supplications and prayers for the complete and final victory of the Allied forces. So was it of course in every part of the Empire, from its centre in Britain, where the King and his Ministers, and the Lord Mayor and dignitaries of the City of London attended services in State in Westminster and St. Paul's, down to the humblest hamlet mission churches in the outlying parts of the overseas Dominions. The Nation and the Empire on their knees enter upon the fifth year of the War with a firmer confidence than ever in both the justice of their cause and the certainty of ultimate victory, which has been brought nearer than before by the handsome manner in which the Allied Armies celebrated the anniversary in the field by continuing their victorious advance.

ENEMY ALIENS.

The attempted meeting of enemy aliens a few evenings ago in aid of the Bolshevik movement, in the centre of the commercial metropolis of Canada, has spurred the local authorities there to a little more activity in regard to this class of agitators. It is assuring to know for instance that the entire antecedents of those who were arrested for their part in the outbreak and intended meeting are to be thoroughly investigated. They will be made to produce their credentials which will indicate whether they have been long enough in this country to become citizens. If any are found to be British citizens they will be quickly drafted into the army. Those who have not been long enough domiciled to become citizens will be unceremoniously deported, and those who have proved themselves offensive will be speedily interned. This is the kind of medicine which should be administered to every enemy alien in the Dominion. Neither our boys at the front nor yet our returning nurses must be left any longer at the mercy of enemy sympathizers and spies within our own borders, and in any case there is no room on Canadian soil for alien foes, when national service of some kind or another is required of every able-bodied citizen of the Dominion. There has been a little too much gentleness on the part of some officials in dealing with this question and too much readiness to cry down every suspicion of danger from enemy aliens in Canada.

FOUR YEARS AGO.

The 5th of August, 1914, was indeed an eventful day. It was a day full of excitement throughout the civilized world, here as elsewhere. In both the Old World and the New, men stood almost agape at the rapidity with which events had moved within the last few days. The money markets were virtually paralyzed. The stock exchanges closed their doors. Bankers were almost afraid to pay out gold. Bank notes were for the time being unexchangeable in Belgium. British and American travelers in that country, of whom there were many at the time, had the greatest difficulty in leaving the continent. Belgium, itself, consequent upon the German invasion, was under a reign of terror. In a village near the German frontier a Belgian woman, standing in her garden watching a number of her countrymen being marched away by orders of a German officer, was asked by the latter for a drink of water. The woman brought it but said at the same time "You deserve to be shot instead of being given a drink." The officer finished his drink, and then stepping back drew his pistol and fired it at the woman, killing both her and her child at the same time. A somewhat similar incident occurred the same day, not far from the scene of the event just described. An unoffending Belgian was shot and killed in his own doorway by the invading Germans. His wife, with her baby in her arms, witnessed the murder and rushed hysterically to the officer who had given the order for her husband's death, tearing at his face with her hands. The brute pushed her away and shot her to death. Seeing that the infant was apparently uninjured, he ran his bayonet through its body, swinging the gun over his shoulder, the little one's arms and legs still wriggling for a moment in the air. Meanwhile the house was fired. The bodies of the woman and of her husband were thrown upon the flames, and the beast in human form laid the body of their child on top of them, before drawing his bayonet clear of it. Meanwhile houses were being sacked and women and girls violated by the soldiery and their officers. Fire and the sword were given a free rein. Lust, rapine and murder were not only tolerated but openly encouraged. In Canada, as in England, loyal men were rushing to the colors and Canada purchased two submarines that day which had been built for Chili. The cable between Germany and the United States was cut, and in the English Channel the British cruiser Amphion destroyed the German mine layer Koenigin Louise. Lord Kitchener was appointed Secretary of State for War. Meanwhile the British Minister at Berlin, Sir E. Goschen, following instructions from London, had asked for his passports, which were handed to

him at eleven o'clock that morning. On the previous evening, the British embassy, even before the declaration of war, was the scene of a disgraceful demonstration, a large and excited mob having assembled outside the building and after certain threatening demonstrations had hurled a number of cobble stones through the windows into the drawing room, necessitating a telephone call for the police. It was in consequence of these acts of violence that on the morning of the 5th of August, before the Ambassador had received his passports, the Kaiser sent one of his aides-de-camp to him with the following message: "The Emperor has charged me to express to Your Excellency his regrets for the occurrences of last night, but to tell you at the same time that you will gather from those occurrences an idea of the feeling of his people respecting the action of Great Britain in joining with other nations against her old allies of Waterloo. His Majesty also begs that you will tell the King that he has been proud of the titles of British Field-Marshal and British Admiral, but that in consequence of what has occurred he must now at once divest himself of those titles." Mr. Goschen adds, in the report from which this incident has been taken, that the above message lost none of its acerbity by the manner of its delivery. A safe passage out of the country to the Dutch frontier was accorded the Ambassador later in the day, and he gladly testified to the great assistance given him during his closing hours in Berlin by the American Ambassador, Mr. Gerard, who, undeterred by the booting and hisses with which he was often greeted by the mob on entering and leaving the embassy, went repeatedly to see him to ask how he could be helpful and also make arrangements for the safety of stranded British subjects. "Lest we forget," there is one other incident of that eventful 5th of August, 1914, which because of the usual bad faith displayed in it by the German Government, should be recalled here; namely the delivery of the following message to the German Ambassador in London from the Foreign Office in Berlin, written on the previous day: "Please dispel any mistrust that may subsist on the part of the British Government with regard to our intentions, by repeating most positively formal assurance that even in the case of armed conflict with Belgium, Germany will, under no pretence whatever, annex Belgian territory." What more crushing indictment can there possibly be of German bad faith than its oft repeated repudiation of this formal assurance of only four years ago?

THE POTSDAM CONSPIRACY.

Every new light that is being cast upon the events of 1914 serves only to place the guilt of the world war where it belongs. First came Prince Lichnowsky, then von Muhlton, then August Thyssen; and now comes Henry Morgenthau, former United States Ambassador to Turkey, with a story that establishes the guilt of Germany beyond all cavil. Mr. Morgenthau is telling his story in World's Work and it includes the recital of a conversation that he had with von Wangenheim, the German Ambassador at Constantinople, in which the Teuton, in a fit of exuberance at the early victories of the Imperial army, told the inside story of the Potsdam Conference. Mr. Morgenthau tells it as follows:

I have already mentioned that the German Ambassador left for Berlin soon after the assassination of the Grand Duke, and he now revealed the cause of his sudden disappearance. The Kaiser, he told me, had summoned him to Berlin for an imperial conference. This meeting took place at Potsdam on July 5th. The Kaiser presided; nearly all the ambassadors attended; Wangenheim came to tell of Turkey and enlighten his associates on the situation in Constantinople. Moltke, then Chief of Staff, was there, representing the army, and Admiral von Tirpitz spoke for the navy. The great bankers, railroad directors, and the captains of German industry, all of whom were as necessary to German war preparations as the army itself, also attended.

Washington now told me that the Kaiser solemnly put the question to each man in turn. Was he ready for war? All replied "Yes" except the financiers. They said that they must have two weeks to sell their foreign securities and to make loans. At that time few people had looked upon the Sarajevo tragedy as something that was likely to cause war. This conference took all precautions that no such suspicion should be aroused. It decided to give the bankers time to readjust their finances for the coming war, and then the several members went quietly back to their work or started on vacations. The Kaiser went to Norway on his yacht, von Bethmann-Hollweg left for a rest, and Wangenheim returned to Constantinople.

In telling me about this conference, Wangenheim, of course, admitted that Germany had precipitated the war. I think that he was rather proud of the whole performance; proud that Germany had gone about the matter in so methodical and far-seeing a way; especially proud that he himself had been invited to participate in so momentous a gathering. The several blue, red and yellow books which flooded Europe the few months following the outbreak, and the hundreds of documents which were issued by German propaganda attempting to establish Germany's innocence, never made any impression on me. For my conclusions as to the responsibility are not based on suspicions or belief or the study of circumstantial data. I do not have to reason or argue about the matter. I know. The conspiracy that has caused this greatest of human tragedies was hatched by the Kaiser and his imperial crew at this Potsdam conference of July 5, 1914. One of the chief participants, flushed with his triumph at the apparent success of the plot, told me the details with his own mouth. Whenever I hear people arguing about the responsibility for this war or read the clumsy and lying excuses put forth by Germany, I simply recall the burly figure of Wangenheim as he appeared that August afternoon, puffing away at a huge black cigar, and giving me his account of this historic meeting. Why waste any time discussing the matter after that?

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WAR SUMMARY.

Early in the week ending August 3rd in continuation of their victorious advance, French Guards reached the north bank of the Marne and American and French troops entered Fere-En-Tardenois, the great German supply base which lies in the middle of the Marne sector. In an endeavor to check the Allies' advance the Germans powerfully strengthened their battle line across the Soissons-Rheims salient with additional fresh reserve troops, and succeeded in stopping the Allied advance at some points, but at other points the enemy was pressed hard causing him to retire further. Momentary defeats to the Allied troops at several parts of the advance only had the effect of spurring on the troops at the other points, as for instance when the Americans were driven out of Clerges, they in turn penetrated enemy lines northward from Serzy. The advance was continued to the end of the week when the Germans were compelled to give up important positions and make a precipitous retreat. The Allied troops to the left of the line captured Soissons; to the south they crossed the Crise along the whole river front; on the centre progress was made north of the Ourcq and Arcy-Sainte-Respite passed and the Bois de Dolie penetrated; On the east Coudounes was occupied, while on the right Goussancourt, Villers Agron and Ville-En-Tardenois fell into Allied hands. British troops still continue to harass the enemy. The Australians took several lines of trenches near Morlaucourt in the Amiens sector, while the Canadians near Gavrelle have carried out a successful enterprise, capturing a number of prisoners. The British at the end of the week were continuing their raids on the Germans in France and Flanders, and the enemy, at last accounts, were heavily bombarding the British south of the Somme and near Ypres. From July 15th to July 31st the number of prisoners captured by the Allies numbered 33,400. In the Albanian theatre Austrians claim that the Italians have been compelled to give up a considerable portion of the ground they won in recent fighting. According to advices received discord has arisen between the Germans and the Turks, and that relations between the two countries have been broken off.

DR. BELAND WELCOMED BY
THE PEOPLE OF BEAUCEOVER TEN THOUSAND PEOPLE CHEERED MAN
WHO WAS GERMAN PRISONER FOR FOUR
YEARS—QUEBEC AND LEVIS TURN OUT.

(From our Staff Correspondent).

It was a wonderful ovation which the citizens of Beauce accorded their representative in the House of Commons, Dr. Henri Beland on his arrival here yesterday afternoon after four years spent as a prisoner in Germany. At least 10,000 people took part in the demonstration which was one of the most enthusiastic ever accorded a man in public life. Miss Jeannette Beland who accompanied her father, was not forgotten and she was showered with bouquets from admiring friends.

Dr. Beland appears to be in good health, though he has lost much of his former robust appearance and his eyes are bright, his handclasp firm, his walk brisk despite slightly stooped shoulders which together with dark lines about the eyes are the only traces of the great sorrows through which he has passed.

"Do your duty," said Dr. Beland to the immense gathering who assembled before the church to hear him speak in the evening—"The kind sympathy which you have shown for me—extend to the gallant soldiers who are fighting the cause of a devastated country—devastated because they stood for justice and liberty. "Do your duty and you will be happy. Nobody can reproach you then and you will receive the recompense which can only be given in the great beyond."

On arrival at Levis Dr. Beland was met by a great crowd of Quebec and Levis citizens who greeted him with enthusiasm and many accompanied him on the train to St. Joseph de Beauce to assist at the great demonstration in his home town, while thousands journeyed by automobile to the village to take part in the fête. He travelled in Mr. J. H. Walsh's private car from Levis to Beauce.

On arrival at the station automobiles were waiting and the Deputy for Beauce was led through a dense crowd of cheering citizens to the Church where a Te Deum was chanted. Amongst those in the leading automobiles were: Mr. Pécoud, president of the Reception Committee, Cure Morissette, Mr. A. J. Beland, brother of Dr. Beland, Hon. Senator Bolduc, His Worship Mayor Ferron of St. Joseph de Beauce Village, Mr. Victor Mathieu, N.P. fiancé of Miss Jeannette Beland, Dr. Aurele Nadeau, Mr. Hector Beland, Louisville; Revd. Canon Halle, Abbe Wilfrid LeBon, St. Ann de la Poca-tiere College; V. Gosselin, N.P., Jules Vézina, Alf. Morissette, Hon. C. F. Delage, J. N. Francoeur, Lionel Cannon, Lucien Cannon and many other ladies and gentlemen.

The Church was magnificently decorated for the occasion and a full choir under the direction of René Lessard was in attendance. Canon Halle ascended the pulpit and made a short statement giving credit to the Vatican for Mr. Beland's release. He said:

"If I am about to address you in the middle of this grand fête, it is, of course to unite my expressions of joy at the arrival of Dr. Beland, but moreover to render justice to those meriting it, and I may say without contradiction that the principal reason of Dr. Beland's release was The Sovereign Pontiff Benedict XV."

It was the Pope who by his influence and zealous endeavors, his charity, found the means to surmount the difficulties which faced the Canadian and Spanish governments, and finally placed Dr. Beland at liberty.

Canon Halle then read a letter dated June 6th, from the Vatican, signed by the Under-Secretary of His Holiness, announcing that he had received a letter from the German Ministry announcing that the preparation of the British Government to exchange Dr. Beland for Mr. De Buelow, interned in England, had been accepted. This was the result, but only after numerous advances and propositions had been made. Canon Halle then told of the different correspondence entered into and stated that it was the repeated requests and plans of the Vatican which finally induced the British Government to arrive at some understanding with the German authorities.

"It was the Holy Father who forced the two Governments to discuss

this question, and after an arduous work, succeeded in bringing about a favorable result."

The Reverend Canon then went on to show with what persistence and tenacity the Vatican had stuck to its task and stated that this was done without any request or hope of recompense, but simply out of charity and for the welfare of humanity.

The question was first taken up through the intervention of Cardinal Bégin, who wrote His Holiness, recommending that advances be made to secure Dr. Beland's release. Cardinal Hartman, of Bavaria, is also known to the Quebec Cardinal, whom he greatly esteems, with being elevated to the Cardinalate the same day. It was, therefore, Christian charity and fraternal love which brought about Dr. Beland's release.

However, the world press, especially, which certain influences control, do not say a word generally about the Pope's goodness. On the contrary, they condemn his words or his silence alike, and misinterpret all his acts. He works, nevertheless, for the welfare of humanity.

"In conclusion," said Canon Halle, "I repeat, I came here to render justice to the Pope in Canada where, as elsewhere, he is vilified."

After Canon Halle's discourse, a Te Deum was chanted, the big church being literally jammed to the doors. Cure Morissette officiated, assisted by Rev. Fathers Boucher and Bourret. Dr. Beland and his daughter were then escorted to their home, dense crowds cheering wildly as the automobiles made their way slowly along the decorated streets of the little town.

In the evening there were so many people assembled in front of the church that it was almost impossible to pass through, and the Hon. Dr. Beland was again given a tremendous ovation as he made his way to the platform.

His Worship Mayor Ferron presented him with an address of welcome on behalf of the citizens of Beauce. He said:

"Words cannot utter the emotion of your countrymen on the day when the cablegram from overseas flashed those two words: 'Libre enfin.' Two words which were as a cry of joy from a soul crushed by mourning and privations."

Mayor Ferron then went on to sum up the history of Dr. Beland's departure for Europe and his subsequent internment in Germany where he was torn from his wife and child—innocent victims of the war.

"Beauce in particular, which has been so honorably represented by you which has always been faithful in good and bad fortune, would not be outdone in generosity and with one voice, one gesture renewed its confidence in you on Dec. 17th last."

"Beauce rejoices in your return," said Mr. Ferron, "and indeed all Canada is overjoyed to see you again."

In wishing a hearty welcome to Dr. Beland, the Mayor hoped that the warmth of the demonstration in his honor would cast a ray of sunshine in a heart which has suffered much.

Dr. Beland addressed the gathering after the cheering had subsided, in a clear voice. He expressed his great thanks for the demonstration of sympathy in his favor and said it would require an orator of golden tongue to adequately express his sentiments of joy on again beholding the shores of the Chaudière and his beloved countrymen of Beauce.

He referred to the allusion from the pulpit that Cardinal Bégin and His Holiness Pope Benedict had been instrumental in his release and stated that he was not surprised at their generosity. He expressed his deep gratitude to the electors of Beauce for the confidence they have placed in him by their action on Dec. 17 last. "This confidence helped me in no small measure to bear the pains of imprisonment," said the Doctor amidst cheers. "When I was in Belgium at the outset of the war, helping in my professional capacity to alleviate the suffering wounded, I know that the good countrymen of Beauce would have counselled me to remain there and do my duty."

Dr. Beland gave a graphic description of affairs in Belgium and stated that Cardinal Mercier was a real hero. He told how he was at first guaranteed immunity because of being a doctor and aiding in surgical work but later sent to prison by the Huns. "Prison is painful," he said—"but exile is terrible. I would not wish it on my bitterest enemy."

"I ask you to accord your sympathy and support to the brave lads who are giving their lives in defence of justice and liberty and honor amongst nations."

"I am not here to make a political declaration," said Dr. Beland. "I have been absent four years and for a long time saw very little of God's blue sky

and I am glad to be with you again. The speaker told of his meeting French-Canadian soldiers in France and England and paid a high tribute to their efficiency, comparing them as even superior to Prussian regiments he had seen. He met Sir Lomer Gouin's son at the head of a detachment, and also had the good fortune to speak with seven or eight Beauce soldiers and carries home messages from them to their families.

He cannot understand how the services of the French-Canadians are not appreciated in certain parts of the country and stated that the fighting of the 22nd French-Canadians at Courcellette is recognized as one of the greatest exploits of the war.

Victory for the Allies is essential and we must do what we can to help out.

Animosities amongst different classes of Canadians must disappear and the Confederation created by Sir John A. MacDonald and Sir Geo. Etienne Cartier must be preserved.

"Do your duty and you will be happy," counseled the Doctor. "Who then can reproach you?—And you will receive the great recompense which can only be obtained in the great beyond."

The soldiers who give their lives in this cause are not only performing acts of heroism but they do more they are doing an act of religion.

Dr. Beland concluded quoting Victor Hugo's famous utterance about those who die piously for their country and again took opportunity to thank all for their demonstration of affection.

Cure Morissette added a few words to the crowd and the choir rendered O'Canada and "God Save the King"—the latter in French also.

The evening concluded with a remarkable display of fire works.

In conversation with a Chronicle man, Dr. Beland stated that he could not add very much that he had not said in former interviews in England and New York.

"The war must be won. That is the great essential," he said. "The German people are united because they have to be. They dare not revolt as the military rule is too efficient to be broken at present."

"Many" people seem to want to talk politics to me, but as you know, I cannot say much in this direction so far, until I get in touch with conditions. It is evident that there has been altogether too much politics in Canada before the war.

Dr. Beland expects to visit his aged mother shortly. She is eighty-six years of age and is at present at Louisville.

34 INJURED IN
TORONTO RIOT.

Toronto, August 4.—Thirty-four persons are officially reported injured and are subject to medical treatment following a street riot on Saturday night in which Civil Police and a mob composed of 1,200 civilians and returned wounded soldiers participated. The affair was a sequel to the riots of Friday, but in this case no property was destroyed.

BACON AND BEEF

American beef will be used to stretch out British beef supplies. The scheme of rationing, which already is in operation in London and the surrounding countries, is to be extended at once, and after this only two of the four weekly coupons will be available for the purchase of butcher's meat.

The object is to diminish the demand for home grown cattle during the months when these can be fattened on grass. The new order limits the purchase of beef, mutton and pork to 20 cents a head weekly, but does not affect dinners in restaurants and hotels, who are permitted to exchange coupons for meat meals.

Children over six will be entitled after April 14 to a full adult ration of meat. All coupons are cashable for bacon and poultry.

THE ALLIES ARE
HOLDING SOUTH
BANK OF VESLESALIENT IS GONE — FISMES IN
FLAMES, SAYS REUTER'S
CORRESPONDENT.

London, Aug. 4.—Telegraphing at one o'clock Sunday afternoon Reuter's correspondent at American Headquarters on the Aisne-Marne front says:

"The salient is gone. The Allied troops, French, British and Americans, already are holding the south bank of the Vesle river. Fismes is in flames."

"The wagons of the retreating German columns can be seen toiling laboriously over the muddy upland roads leading from the river toward the Aisne. Our cavalry patrols have found nothing to report but rearward screens."

"To have thus driven the enemy back as he was driven back four years ago is no mean achievement, but we must not over-estimate the possibilities it may disclose. That the enemy has been forced to retire bitterly against his will is quite obvious. Nevertheless I am prepared to accept General Ludendorff's statement that the retirement was decided on fifteen days ago after General Petain's blow against the west side of the salient and the Germans can pride themselves on having remained, to use Ludendorff's phrase, 'masters of the situation.'"

That is to say they have been able to avert the doom they feared, which was the collapse of the sides of the salient and the consequent capture by the Allies of all the troops within it; and they have been able to withdraw in an orderly manner without serious loss in men or guns, but at a considerable sacrifice of ammunition."

"To that extent they are masters of the situation—as the bankrupt may be so described who just escaped being sent to prison."

"The American communication today describes the enemy as having been driven in confusion beyond the Vesle, and one is extremely glad to hear it, since so far as I have been able to witness or learn, in the enemy's retirements signs of confusion hitherto have been conspicuously absent. Indeed I have never followed any army's retirement which left so little evidence of being forced, except in this one matter of ammunition."

"The enemy's dead are certainly buried. But who should have buried them? He left men behind him with orders to die. And died they have. They lie in groups about their guns, dozens here, dozens there—everyone with an American bullet through his brain or breast, or with the equally decisive stab of the American bayonet."

"These groups are close together in vital positions and amount to a total of from two to three hundred men. They give evidence of fine discipline and determination, and not of that sort of thing one is accustomed to find behind defeated armies."

"So far as I can see, the enemy counted exactly the cost of his retirement, and paid not a man or a gun above his margin. As a soldierly achievement it moved one to admiration, and cheered as one must be by the confession of weakness which the retirement implies, there is nothing in the retirement of which to build exaggerated hopes of the future. By far the most hopeful feature on the whole business is the difficulty of explaining it on any other hypothesis than that the Germans are much shorter of men than we had supposed."

"Their advance on the west of Rheims was a big artillery bluff which could only have been justified by the success of the attack to the east of it. The attack failed, and, though von Boehm tried for a couple of days to cloak the failure, the moment General Petain struck from the west the Germans had no option, with the force at their disposal, but to retire. And they evidently are profoundly thankful that they have made such a good job of it."

"Ludendorff calls the operation a strategic success. No, it is not that. It is a great tactical failure, relieved by various tactical successes and it may not be too soon to say that the failure, even retroactive as it had been, probably spells ruin to the German offensive for this season at least, against Paris."

"Quite true they have an attack they may deliver in Flanders almost any moment they please, if Crown Prince Rupprecht's reserves have not been drawn upon too largely in the German Crown Prince's interest. But October is likely to be the earliest date for any vital operations here, and October means some half million more of these excellent Americans in the line."

A little British sailing vessel, the Good Intent, carrying 68 tons of cargo and built 128 years ago, has just been sold for three times her original cost.

She was built of sturdy oak timbers taken from British men-of-war and is still in excellent condition. The vessel has undergone little change in construction during all these years.

GERMANS SINK
CANADIAN VESSEL
RECENTLY BUILTBURNED SCHOONER AND
TOLD CREW TO ROW FOR
NEAREST SHORE.

A Canadian Port, Aug. 4.—The four-masted schooner Dornfontein launched at the Strait Shore, St. John, a few weeks ago, was captured and burned to the water's edge on Friday afternoon by a German U-boat off the Atlantic Coast. The ship encountered the enemy craft at noon and after holding her crew on board for five hours the Germans told them to take to their life boats and row for the nearest shore. The captain of the Dornfontein and the members of his crew arrived in this city about ten o'clock Saturday evening. They were none the worse for their experience and went immediately before the naval authorities to give a full report of what happened.

It is reported that the enemy craft which destroyed the Dornfontein was the U-56, one of the latest type of German submarine. After taking from the ship all her valuables and food-stuffs, as well as a large quantity of gasoline, which was stored on board to be used for motive power for the hoisting apparatus, the Germans started a fire in her fore-cabin and another in her after cabin and the ship burned to the water's edge. They explained to the men of the Dornfontein that they did not want to waste a torpedo upon her.

A member of the U-boat crew told a member of the crew of the Dornfontein that there were but four German submarines operating in Atlantic waters but that more would come later and they made other statements easily recognized as German propaganda circulated to cause alarm among the civilian population in coastal towns and villages.

All but the captain were taken below, into the depths of the U-boat through the engine room and into a sort of a hold. The captain remained above, and what happened to him while they were aboard the U-boat none of the crew knew. The crew spent five hours in the bowels of the submarine.

Dinner was served to the crew consisting of bully beef and rice. Some of the crew of the Dornfontein were afraid to partake of the refreshments offered on the grounds that all Germans were rotten and the food offered might very well be poisonous, but one of the Germans, noticing the evident reluctance said to them that they need not be afraid to eat; they were not after sailors.

A member of the German U-boat crew said that it was this very boat that set the mines which destroyed the American auxiliary cruiser "San Diego" some little time ago off the American Coast. It was also the belief of the men that the U-boat was on the lookout for a West India liner.

The local men say that there were seventy or more comprising the crew of the submarine, that the vessel was more than 200 feet long and that she mounted two guns the calibre of which according to the Germans was 5.9. When asked why they did not torpedo the schooner they said they did not want to waste a torpedo on her, for it was better for them to set fire to her.

The Dornfontein was launched here at the Strait Shore by the Marine Construction Canada Limited, on June 11, and hundreds of people gathered to witness the launching of this staunch ship. Her keel was laid down in October, 1917, and she was completed in 200 days. Her dimensions were: Length, 185 feet; depth, 14 feet 3 inches; beam, 40 feet; tonnage, 695. She was the first vessel to be launched from a local shipbuilding yard following the movement to rejuvenate the shipbuilding industry here; the first vessel to be launched here since the bark Curlew, built for William Thomson and Company in 1800 was completed.

EATING MORE FISH
Reports received by the Canada Food Board regarding fish sales in all parts of Canada show increases in the amount of fish which is being used as a substitute for meat, and other foods needed overseas. In one Ontario city the sales from January to April inclusive showed an increase of more than 75 per cent, over last year. Sales are almost evenly divided over the week. Until last year, fish was not bought to any large extent except for Fridays.

FRENCH AND AMERICANS
CAPTURE TOWN OF FISMESGREAT GERMAN STOREHOUSE ON AISNE-MARNE
FRONT HAS BEEN TAKEN — FRENCH HAVE
CROSSED THE VESLE AT SEVERAL POINTS.

Paris, August 4.—The town of Fismes, Germany's great storehouse on the Aisne-Marne battlefield, has been taken by the French and American troops, according to the French official communication issued this evening. The French also have crossed the Vesle at several points.

The text of the communication follows:

"During the day we reached the Vesle to the east of Fismes. The enemy's rearwards opposed spirited resistance, especially between Muizon and Champigny. Our light elements succeeded in taking a footing on the north bank of the river at several places."

"Fismes is in our possession. "Northwest of Rheims we have wound ground up to the village of La Neuville, which the enemy is defending with great energy."

"On the left bank of the Aisne between Castel and Mesnil St. George, the Germans were forced to abandon a part of their positions. We have occupied Braches and penetrated into Hargicourt. We have also advanced our line to the outskirts of Courtenanche. We took prisoners."

"Belgium communication, August 4.—Our patrols brought in some prisoners in the region of Kippe and near Dreihank."

"Aviation.—Second Lieut. Coppens of the Aviation Service, on August 3rd, downed in flames a captive balloon near Zonnebeek. This was his twenty-second victory."

"Eastern Theatre, August 3.—There has been enemy artillery activity at the mouth of the Struma and to the east of the Vardar, and artillery fighting and patrol encounters in the sector south of Huma and before the Serbian front."

"In Albania there have been patrol encounters."

tion with the German retirement across the Aisne, from Dernancourt to Hamel, about fourteen miles to the north, may mark the beginning of a German "strategic retreat" which may have been planned to forestall a British attack which London despatches had indicated was imminent in this sector.

London, August 4.—(Bulletin.)—The Germans have retired to the north bank of the Vesle and the French have effected four crossings of the river, according to information received here tonight. The Germans, it is said, are resisting stubbornly and fighting rear guard actions.

Fruits of Victory.

Washington, August 4.—(Bulletin.)—"The full fruits of victory were reaped" by Allied troops in the Aisne-Marne salient on Saturday, when the Germans were driven in confusion beyond the line of the Vesle," General Pershing reported in his communique for yesterday, received today by the War Department. American troops alone have captured 8,400 prisoners and 133 guns.

The text of the statement follows: "Section A.—The full fruits of victory in the counter offensive begun so gloriously by Franco-American troops on July 18th were reaped today when the enemy met his second great defeat on the Marne, was driven in confusion beyond the line of the Vesle."

"The enemy in spite of suffering the severest losses, has proved incapable of stemming the onslaught of our troops fighting for liberty side by side with French, British and Italian veterans. In the course of the operations 8,400 prisoners and 133 guns have been captured by our men alone."

"Section B.—There is nothing to report in this section."

Veritable Charnel House.

Paris, August 4.—Allied forces in pursuit of the Germans have passed through veritable charnel houses, strewn with the debris of war. Bodies of men and horses are mingled with broken-down vehicles along side of monster ammunition dumps some partially exploded and others intact. Bodies of Germans found in clusters beyond the range of the Allied artillery indicates that severe punishment was inflicted on the fleeing columns by the French, American and British aviators.

Germans Retreating.

With the French Army in France, August 4.—(Bulletin by The Associated Press.)—The Germans are retreating on the left bank of the Aisne River between Bourges and Braches, northwest of Mont Didier, on a front five miles in extent. Allied patrols are keeping in contact with the enemy.

German Flanks Turned.

Paris, August 4.—(Bulletin, 4:20 p.m.)—Both flanks of the German army forces between Rheims and Soissons, appear to have been turned. The French have forced a crossing of the Vesle at Rheims.

German reinforcements are reported arriving in the Soissons sector from the north. The Allies continue their advance, according to latest reports, although it is held within prudent limits. The Allied left wing has moved faster than the right and further progress in the Soissons region might expose it to a counter-attack from the enemy.

The service opened with the singing of the National Anthem. The Rev. Mr. Moffatt preached an eloquent sermon dealing with the responsibilities and issue of the war.

At the evening service the Rev. E. A. Eardley-Wilmer preached the sermon, in which he reviewed the events leading up to the war and its progress to the present, pointing out that self-sacrifice and economy was still to be practiced if the people at home were to prove worthy of the great sacrifices being made for them by those at the front.

The preacher at St. Matthew's Church was the Rev. A. R. Kelley, Priest-in-Charge, who also dwelt at length on the war and spoke eloquently of the great work which was in course of accomplishment by the Allied nations.

In the Presbyterian and Methodist Churches reference was also made to the Day and appropriate services held.

Three Montreals Said To Have Visited Valcartier Yesterday.

Reports circulated in this city last evening were to the effect that three alleged Montreal dynamiters visited Valcartier Camp yesterday. MILITIA AUTHORITIES
WILL BE SEVEREDEFAULTERS UNDER M. S. A.
LIABLE TO EXTREME PEN-
ALTY AFTER AUGUST 24.

By a proclamation just issued in the Canada Gazette, defaulters, deserters and absentees under the Military Service Act 1917, will be severely dealt with after August 24, should they have failed to register between now and that date. The Militia Department wishes to bring forcibly to the minds of those who have not yet registered and are liable under the Act, "Article 12", of the Army Act, pertaining to desertion which reads as follows:

"Every person subject to military law who commits any of the following offenses; that is to say (a) deserts or attempts to desert His Majesty's service; or (b) persuades, endeavors to persuade, procures or attempts to procure any person subject to military law to desert from His Majesty's service, shall, on conviction by court-martial, if he committed such offense when on active service or under orders for active service, be liable to suffer death, or such less punishment as is in this Act mentioned; and if he committed such offense under any other circumstances, he shall be liable to suffer punishment; or such less punishment as is in this Act mentioned; and for the second or any subsequent offense to suffer penal servitude, or such less punishment as is in this Act mentioned."

It is further pointed out by the Militia Department, that all troops in the Canadian Expeditionary Forces are on active service, and defaulters, absentees and deserters surrendering under the latest proclamation, before or on August 24, will be granted leave under routine order 589, and will be treated in all respects like other soldiers and will not undergo punishment by reason of their default, absence or desertion. After August 24, it will be altogether different, those failing to have registered or evading the law in any manner or form holding themselves liable to the extreme penalty when apprehended and tried by court-martial.

It is believed by the military authorities that the period of grace allowed, will bring to the colors many men whom it would be very difficult to reach otherwise.

CANADIAN EDITORS
AT BUCKINGHAMTHE KING ADDRESSED THE
QUEBEC JOURNALISTS IN
FRENCH LANGUAGE.

London, Aug. 4—(via Reuters Ottawa Agency)—The Canadian Editors visited Buckingham Palace yesterday afternoon where they saw Their Majesties and the Princess Mary. They were accompanied by Col. Galloway and Major Mantagu Whitmore of the Department of Information. The King discussed Canadian affairs with each member of the party and recalled incidents of his visits to Canada in 1901 and 1908. The Editors were much impressed with the King's knowledge of the Canadian provinces.

The King spoke in French to the Editors from Quebec and expressed his great pleasure at the efforts of the men and women of Quebec. His Majesty also showed a lively interest in the visit of the Editors to France and said there were no troops better than the Canadians. He also referred to the splendid condition of the Americans who were passing through this country. His Majesty expressed great appreciation of the officers produced through the Royal Military College at Kingston.

Mr. Stewart, Editor of the Chatam World, of New Brunswick, who is seventy five years of age, and ascended in an airplane over Vimy Ridge, said it was the greatest experience of his life to see the King, who talked with him for ten minutes. Altogether the Editors were nearly an hour with the King.

WHY TORPEDOED SHIPS SINK

The committee appointed by the Council of the Institution of Naval Architects to inquire into the effects of explosions of mines and torpedoes upon the structure of merchant ships find that there are three principal causes of loss. First, the existence of a forward reserve bunker partitioned off from the cargo hold by a non-watertight bulkhead. A second cause of loss is the failure to close the watertight door in the engine room bulkhead leading to the shaft tunnel. A third danger lies in the main drain pipes, leading from the bilge pumps to the different compartments, and passing through all watertight bulkheads, which are generally fractured in torpedoed compartments. There should be non-return valves on the end of these pipes. The committee recommends that bulkheads should be protected as far as possible from flying splinters, at least temporarily, by using timber or other suitable material as a splinter-screen.

MOTORCYCLES IN WAR

From the arrival of the British expeditionary force in Belgium in the late summer of 1914 down to the present time the motorcycle has steadily gained in importance in different branches of the military service. Its use has not been restricted to the allied armies. The best authorities place the number of motorcycles employed by the armies of the central powers at the time of the Battle of the Marne at 18,000. The British had at least 10,000 in service in the spring of 1915, while the French had about 11,000. The Italian forces up to present have 10,000 according to recent estimates says Popular Science Monthly.

It has been figured that more than 750,000 motorcycles have been in use for military purposes by the belligerent powers since July 1914. This does not include those at present in the United States army service, for prior to our entrance in the great war the American army did not have more than perhaps 150 machines in all.

CONFUSION OVER SHIPPING AT EVERETT

CONCRETE SHIPS ONLY TO
BE BUILT BUT STEEL
BADLY NEEDED.

Washington, D.C., August 4—
There seems to be considerable con-
fusion over the reported entry of the
War Department into the shipbuilding
business at Everett, Wash., and
Wilmington, N.C. The Emergency
Fleet Corporation does not look with
favor upon the development of the
Pacific Coast yard by the War De-
partment, as it wants no rival in the
labor field, which is restricted en-
ough at the best in that locality.

It is understood that only concrete
ships are to be built, but steel is
needed for reinforced concrete, and
the War Industries Board is scruti-
nizing every request that comes to it
for additional steel most severely.
President Hurley of the Shipping
Board and Mr. Schwab are both to
be in conference with Mr. Replogie
in regard to the steel supply, and it is
safe to say that they will insist upon
protecting the Shipping Board's
supply of steel before everything else.

While it was asserted that the War
Department shipbuilding was under-
taken by the quartermasters corps
with the sanction of General Goethals,
formerly head of the Shipping
Board, a representative of his office
informed a press representative that
no large work was under way at
present, and other small craft used
by the quartermasters corps is being
built. At the War Industries Board,
too, it was stated that no request for
steel of any considerable amount had
been made.

BETHLEHEM PLANS NEW SHIP SLIPS

San Francisco, Cal. August 4—The
Bethlehem Steel Corporation has
made arrangements for the acqui-
sition of 153 acres of land adjoining its
Alameda plant, as the site for an ex-
tension to its shipbuilding facilities.
The extension as outlined, it is said,
will make the plant one of the large-
st in the world. The plans include
the installation of eight new ships
The yard is to be a permanent plant,
designed to engage in activities after
the war, it is stated. The cost of the
extension will be \$25,000,000.

By-law to Amend By-law No. 2G and
repeal By-law No. 2H.

(Drawn up in the French Language)
At a meeting of the City Council

Whereas that By-Law No. 2H,
passed on the 2nd of July, 1918, ar-
ticle 20 of By-Law No. 2G amended
by an error, instead of article 19 of
said By-law No. 2G.

It is in consequence ordained and
enacted by by-law of the Municipal
Council of the City of Quebec, and the
said council doth ordain and enact as
follows, to wit:

1.—By-Law No. 2H, passed by this
council on the 2nd of July last, is
hereby repealed.

2.—Article 19 of By-Law No. 2G,
passed on the 23rd of April, 1918 is
repealed and replaced by the following
19—Each and every person or com-
pany carrying on the trade of convey-
ing persons, from one place to another
in the city, for payments, by using
certain vehicles, must before follow-
ing said trade, obtain a license for
such vehicles, there shall be paid the
sum of eleven dollars, for each and
every vehicle.

Every person or company carrying
on the trade of transporting from one
place to another in the City, for pay-
ment, merchandise, or other material
whatsoever by using any sort of ve-
hicle, must before exercising said
trade, obtain a license for the price of
which they shall pay the sum of five-
teen dollars for each vehicle.

3.—Article 20 of By-law No. 2G
passed on the 23rd of April, 1918, is re-
incorporated in the present By-law to
all intents and purposes.

4.—The present By-law is declared
as forming part of By-law No. 2G,
passed on the 23rd of April, 1918.
