FROM THE CONSTITUTIONAL COURIER.

Remotest of War.—Some of the French Priests in our country are labouring hard to bring the American public to make up its mind for war with England. They represent the thing to be inevitable; because, though our wise and virtuous administration has done every thing in its power to ward off the calamity, and heal differences, yet England is so hostile and blood thirsty, that there is no living in peace with her. Her trade with us, they say, has been worth to her fifty million dollars a year; yet she had rather lose all this, and her American dominions into the bargain, than be connected with us on any reasonable terms of commercial intercourse. What a bloody minded monster!

But to show clearly the base falsehood of these deceivers, we will present the public with a copy of a part of a letter, sent by the American ministers at the British court, to Mr. Madison, at that time Secretary of State under Jefferson.

LONDON, December 27, 1806.

"Sir—We have the pleasure to acquaint you that we have this day agreed with the British Commissioners to conclude a treaty on all the points which have formed the subject of our negotiation, and on terms which we trust that our government will approve.

Now be it noticed, that this was the first appearance of an attempt to form a treaty between the two nations, after Jay's treaty had expired by its own limitations; that the business was accomplished, seemingly, with considerable ease; that the treaty was concluded on all the points which had formed the object of the negotiation; that it was concluded to the satisfaction of the American negotiators, and on terms which they trusted our government would approve; finally, that one of the men who agreed to that treaty and thought it good, is now Secretary of State, and the other a candidate for high promotion—both in great repute, at the present day, throughout the ranks of democracy.

Had the treaty been accepted, the Americans in all probability might have had, from that time to this, a free trade to Great Britain and Ireland, to the British colonies in America, Africa, and the East Indies, to the British West India islands; and at present and for some considerable time back, not only to Spain and Portugal, and the Spanish islands, but to New Spain in America, and to the Brazils; a trade of an immense extent and magnitude; and which it would not have been in the power of the French to intercept, but in a small degree.

Mr. Jefferson, merely of his own authority and on his own responsibility, rejected that treaty; not even deigning to offer it to the Senate, as the constitution expressly directed him, lest peradventure they should approve it. Mr. Jefferson, in a manner the most supercilious rejected that treaty; and he would have rejected it, even though it had contained every condition which America could ask or wish; because he hated England, and was a Frenchman in heart and soul. No man else would have dared to act so audaciously. His curious remark, that the veriest coward in the field, perhaps in all America, should be the boldest of all, in the cabinet—should when fairly out of gun-shot, have the temerity of Alexander the Great.

Here commenced the troubles of our country, which have been thickening and increasing from year to year. From that unblest day to the present time, matters have been so ingeniously contrived, that every ostensible attempt to negotiate has tended only to widen the breach.

Rose was sent over, with an olive-branch in his hand, and was charged with offers of reparation with respect to the affair of the Chesapeake. All means were employed to excite a prejudice against his person as well as his mission, before as well as after his arrival. His offers of reparation were rejected, out of punctilious etiquette; the business was stifled in embryo; and the occasion was seized and used with all possible industry to irritate the American public against England.

Next came Erskine, an inexperienced young man, whose cunning once wheedled into an arrangement that contravened his express instructions. Lest this circumstance, however, should not be sufficient to defeat it, Mr. Madison inserted in the letter of the Secretary, to Mr. Erskine, and laid before the British cabinet, a short paragraph in a style of insult to his Britannic majesty, virtually upbraiding him of want of honor.

The thing took; a glow of indignation pervaded the whole parliament, when that paragraph was under con-

sideration. Erskine's arrangement was of course rejected; and there was afforded another precious opportunity for blowing up a tremendous flame against England.

Next, in order of time, Jackson came over with full powers to settle all matters of difference between the two nations. Him they assailed long before he had reached our shores; and during the whole time of his abode in this country, as well before his dismissal as afterwards, American mobs filled the air with their hoots and their hisses and their stinking breath for this amusement. It had been declared beforehand, not only in this country, but also in France, that his mission would prove abortive. It happened as was foretold. Jackson was abruptly dismissed, for what the impartial members of the cabinet were pleased to call an insult; a thing so invisible and intangible, that the leaders of democracy, while they solemnly attested to the truth of its existence, could never agree amongst themselves as to its precise form, or the place of its appearance. This again furnished another opportunity of railing against England; and a great part of the ensuing session of Congress was spent in bullying that nation.

Last of all Mr. Foster arrived. When it was known for certainty that he was coming, the government paper took care to announce to the American public that his errand would be fruitless; and very conveniently for the accomplishment of that prediction, the United States frigate, the President, out of mere accident no doubt, had a rencontre with the Little Belt, and killed about thirty of her men.

These facts we submit to the public without comment, they speak for themselves.

FRENCH "DECREES" IN SPAIN.

French Head Quarters at Valladolid.

We, the Marshal of the Empire, Duke of Istria, Colonel General of the Imperial Guards, General in Chief of the Army of the North of Spain:

Upon the report of the Intendant General, we have ordered, and do order as follows:

Art. 1. There shall be formed by the municipalities in the towns, and by the magistrates in the villages, a list of all the individuals who have quitted their homes, and who do not reside in places occupied by French troops.

2. All such individuals shall be bound to return to their homes in the course of a month; in default of which they shall be considered as forming part of the bands of insurgents, and all their property shall be confiscated; all persons owing them rents, and their debtors of every description whatever, are forbidden to make their payments in any other way but into the hands of the Administrators of the National Domains.

3. The fathers, mothers, brothers, sisters, children and nephews, of such individuals, are declared responsible, both in their property and in their persons, for every act of spoliation committed by the insurgents upon peaceable citizens, or upon their property.

4. If any inhabitant is carried off from his home, three of the nearest relatives of a brigand shall be immediately arrested, to serve as hostages. If this individual is put to death by the hands, the hostages shall be shot immediately, and without any form of process.

5. Every person who shall absent himself from his township for more than eight days, (to commence from the publication of the present ordinance) without permission, shall be considered as having gone over to the bands, all his property shall be sequestered, and sold after the expiration of three months; all his relatives within the degrees mentioned in the Third Article, shall be put under arrest.

6. No inhabitant can remove from his township without being provided with a passport, which shall be given upon the certificate of two resident house holders in the township, who shall be sureties, that at the expiration of the time mentioned in the passport, he who is the bearer shall have returned to his township, or shall have been that he resided in a place occupied by the French army. In failure of which the two sureties shall be arrested and put into prison.

7. Every inhabitant of towns where there is a Commissary of Police, shall provide himself with a card of security.

8. Domestic visits shall be made, in pursuance of orders of the Commandants of Towns, at periods which they shall deem proper; every individual unprovided with a card of security shall be immediately arrested and sent to prison; the public functionaries alone are excepted from this order.

9. In like manner those shall be arrested, who give an asylum to any individual unprovided with a passport or card of security.

10. Whoever shall be convicted of having correspondence with the brigands, shall be punished with death.

11. All correspondence with the inhabitants of districts occupied by insurgents is prohibited who receive letters from such districts must go to the Commandants of Towns, or to Commissaries of Police, where there are such.

12. Infractions of the preceding article shall be punished with ten years imprisonment.

13. The Governor General of the different provinces, and the Intendant General, are charged, with their own department with the execution of the ordinance, which shall be printed, published and put in all the usual places.

GENERAL ORDERS.

Head-quarters at Valladolid, June 5.

Whenever a detachment of troops is attacked on road, and the inhabitants of the town upon which the attack took place have not given information of the concealed post or ambuscade to the Command of the Detachment, the town shall be given up to the most culpable inhabitants shall be arrested and delivered over to a military commission; and in any repetition of the same circumstance, the town be burnt.

The ringing of bells on the approach of French troops is prohibited. The person who gives or executes for ringing of bells on such an occasion shall be shot.

The Military Chiefs and Commandants of Forts are specially charged with the execution of orders.

L'Orient and Rochefort squadrons.—When the French fleet which is arrived at Portsmouth, left Cadix, on the 1st, Admiral Legue was cruising off Cape Spartel the Republic and Alfred, of 74 guns, lately at Alhama, 61, with a view to intercept a French squadron which was expected to attempt to escape out of the straits. A letter we received from an officer at Alhama, states, that the French have lately reinforced their fleet before that city with 10,000 men, of whom 6000 Poles.

The following is an extract of a letter from an officer on board the Northumberland, 74, in Quiberon Bay, Aug. 13:—"We now lie here, in company with the Royal George, 110, Abercrombie, 74, Amazon and some light vessels. The Amazon arrived having just escaped from the cruising ground off L'Orient; she has an account of a boat making her escape to that point."

GENERAL WILKINSON'S TRIAL.

A friend and correspondent has enabled us to state particulars respecting General Wilkinson's trial, which we confidently give as correct.

The court martial for the trial of General Wilkinson after the challenges were admitted and some questions decided, were sworn and proceeded to business. The court as organized consists of General Gansevoort, Col Williams, Col. Wharton — Smith; Majors Porter, Nichols, Stoddard, Swift and Armistead.

There are eight charges made by the President of the United States, through the Secretary at War.

They relate to Spanish Pension—ten specifications. Combining with Spaniards to dismember the Union; five specifications. Conspiring with Burr, three charges. Disobedience of orders, in not removing troops for health. Neglect of duty, in allowing unwholesome provisions to be issued to the troops, and not giving proper aid, as to their pay, clothing, hospitals, hospital stores; misapplication of public money and supplies.

Walter Jones, Esq. Judge Advocate. Council for General Wilkinson, J. H. Thomas, and R. B. Tandy, Esquires. Col. Freeman has been examined as a witness against Wilkinson.

A very interesting pamphlet has just appeared, printed by Elliot, No. 4 Court-Street; entitled "a Statement of proceedings in the first society in Coventry, Con.: which terminated in the removal of the Pastor; with an Address to his late people. By Abiel Abbott, late Pastor of the last Church in Coventry." This pamphlet, written with singular moderation, and with the most affectionate simplicity, discloses such a scene of religious bigotry, and ecclesiastical domination, as we could not believe to have existed in New-England. If the facts stated are true, the statement must awaken the grief and indignation of every serious Christian, and the alarm of every congregation that has any sense of its rights, or any concern for its peace and improvement.

Bonaparte, it seems, will never have done issuing his extraordinary decrees. Indeed we think he will at length defeat his own object by the extravagance of his despotism. The one to which we allude is sufficiently demonstrative of the jealousy of his man, and we would almost add of the kind of treasure by which he holds the continent. Other sovereigns are usually desirous of promoting a communication between all parts of their territories; Bonaparte, on the contrary, dreads the least interchange of sentiment between those whom he oppresses, and adopts the most rigorous means to prevent it. His new decree forbids the post masters, book sellers, and others, to circulate, in the departments of Holland, and those of the Rhine, any newspapers, periodical journals, or mystical works, printed in the department of the mouths of the Rhine; and also interdicts the introduction of similar works printed in the two first named territories, into any part of the latter department.

(London paper.)

"The Parisians, though groaning under Bonaparte's tyranny, still occasionally indulge in jokes at his expense. The letter N, the initial of Napoleon, is now placed upon all public buildings by Bonaparte's order, and the Parisians say—"Il y a des N. mit (enemies) par tout."

In April last, a baker at Constantinople, who was detected in selling bread short of weight was ordered by the Cadi to be consumed in his own oven;

The Courier says, "that the newspapers have greatly misrepresented the real state of the monarch, who is neither in mind or body, in so bad a state as reported, but particularly with respect to his bodily health."

According to Gen. Suchet's account, the Spanish patriots must possess a peculiar faculty of procreation, to be able, in the course of two months, and while the French were in the very act of killing them, to increase their numbers from 15,000 to 25,000!! If such a facility of multiplication is a general characteristic of the Spanish patriot troops, Bonaparte will have much work to perform before they will be totally exterminated.—Gen. Suchet has, however, set a brilliant example, and is richly entitled to the dignity of Marshal of the Empire, which we are informed

is conferred upon him for the splendid achievement.

HOAXING.

In the despatch of Gen. Suchet, giving an account of the taking of Tarragona, we have a small specimen of French gasconade. He says that he destroyed a garrison of 18,000 men, of the most reputable troops of Spain. Of these 18,000 men,

4,000 have been killed in the city;
12,000 have attempted to save themselves by flight;
1,000 have been sabred or drowned; near
10,000 were taken prisoners; and near
1,500 wounded are in hospitals.

A greater dearth of intelligence than at the present period we scarcely recollect. Should not, however, any conflicts speedily take place between the armies in the peninsula, on the continent of Europe, to relieve our tedium; we may look to the continent of America for some relief, in the mighty war of words about to take place in Congress. Dreadful, as usual, will no doubt, be the denunciations, at the outset, against the tyrant of the seas; and which, as usual, will probably end, in some law, far more injurious to the U. States themselves, than to any other power. To non-importation they may, as before, add embargo; and glory in the ruin they will occasion to their own country, by what they may please to term, dignified retirement.

To close the outlets to the sea to a people whose habits generally are commercial and agricultural; and the productions of whose soil exceed their consumption, is to bar the issues of the heart's blood, in its necessary progress to the veins and arteries, for the support and prolongation of life. There is no nation on earth to whom an anti-commercial system ought to be so revolting as to the citizens of the U. States; and, of course, by whom such a system ought to be so sensibly felt. Nothing then can be more unfortunate for such a country than to have philosophical rulers, who, instead of taking the world as it is, and governing accordingly; would model and bend it to certain visionary theories, the coinage of a brain teeming with every species of novelty; thus abandoning experience for untried projects, without consulting the nature of the people on whom the experiments are to be tried. The philosopher Jefferson took the lead in deviation from the high road. The men of present in power are his pupils, and consider it a duty to tread in his footsteps. Having, indeed, moulded their party to their system, they find it necessary to persevere in it, in order to perpetuate their power, regardless of the sufferings of their country.

As their system agrees with Bonaparte's continental plans, they are further incited to, and supported in it, by his intrigues in the States, through his numerous emissaries, by whom are employed bribes, and menaces, added to every other species of influence. Men who never see the American papers, in the French interest, can form no idea of their violence against England, and all connection with her; however evident it may be that a good understanding and a free commercial intercourse are for the interest, and ought to be the great object of both G. Britain and the States. By blood, by habit, by language, they are made to be on good terms with each other; whom then God has joined together, they should suffer no man to put asunder.

It is not without pain we announce that the season has latterly been unusually disastrous. Strong easterly winds, at the period of the spring tides, towards the latter end of the past week, have occasioned considerable damage in the Cellars and Stores, as well as on the Wharves, in the Lower-Town. On Friday the tide rose to an uncommon height.
