From London papers to the 15th & Paris to 19th Sept. The advices from the seat of war are to the 25th August by way of Odessa.

According to an Odessa date of August 27. General Paskevitch commenced the siege of Tokat in the beginning of that month. Letters received from the frontiers of Servia, dated September 1st, announce that Rodosto was captured by the army under General Roth, on the 23d August.

A Bucharest date of the 26th August announced that on the 15th, there had been a brisk combat under the walls of Schumla, which terminated in the outer works of the place being carried by General Kraskovitch.

The Russian army entered Adrianople on the 5th August, without any resistance. It is not known where the Sultan was. It is impossible to form an opinion as to what effect this intelligence would produce in the seraglio; but it was known at Constantinople that 8000 brigands, consisting of deserters and ex-Jacobins were carrying terror and pillage in every direction.

The Paris Journal du Commerce of the 19th says, it was considered certain, even by the friends of the parties, that Messrs. de Bourdonnaye, de Bourmont, and de Montbel, would leave the Council, and be replaced by M. de Belleyme, as Minister of the Interior.

Prosecutions had been commenced against the conductors of the Paris Journals, for announcing the subscription bretonne; also against three, for having defamed the Neapolitan Ambassador, and against the Editor of a Marseilles paper, for some cause not assigned.

The London Globe of the 15th announces advices from Saint Michaels to the 24th August: The Portuguese squadron, after the attack upon Terceira, had been dispersed; a part having arrived at St. Michael's with the Don John 74, the other part with two frigates, (one dismasted.)

In a postscript, dated August 29, the estimates of the Portuguese loss is 900, of which a large proportion was officers. The Grand Jury of Middlesex on the 11th Sept. returned two true Bills against Messrs. Alexander, Isaacson, and Marston, the registered proprietors of the Morning Journal, for a series of libels published in that paper during the months of July and August, insinuating that "the Most Noble Arthur Duke of Wellington is proud, overbearing, grasping, dishonest and unprincipled, and capable of a design to overturn the Crown, and prostrate the laws and liberties of this country."

New-York, Oct. 15.—The Navy Commissioners advertise that proposals will be received until the 22d inst, for furnishing 15,796 yards of cotton canvas, of the best quality, to be delivered at the Navy Yard, Gosport.

A letter from Natchez of the 14th ult. says "The yellow fever is in this place; every body has run off to Washington, all the merchants, citizens, &c. The drays are running day and night. Five deaths have occurred since yesterday morning."

New-York, Oct. 19.—It is reported that orders have been received at the Navy Yard, to fit out for sea with all expedition, the Brandywine frigate, and another vessel of war now in this port.

The ship Fabius Capt. Russell, sailed from this port yesterday for Cadix with the Hon. C. P. Vann Ness, Minister to Spain, lady, daughter and son, Mrs. Ouseley, his relative, and 2 servants.

We have received in a slip from our correspondent of the Boston Commercial Gazette, intelligence from Terceira to the 21st September, brought by Captain Warren, of the schooner Only Son, arrived at Boston. He reports that on Sept. 21st, off Terceira, he was boarded by a sloop of war and a brig of the blockading squadron, and informed that they had captured and ordered to Lisbon 15 sail of English and American vessels.

The Austrian Observer of Sept. 5th, announces the conclusion of a treaty of Commerce with the United States, which grants to Austrian vessels in the ports of the Union, the same rights with national vessels.

The New-Orleans Bee, of Sept. 20th says:—"The Spanish squadron, with troops who were stationed at the Turn, (near our city) sailed yesterday from the Balize, for Tampico. Commodore Laborde is on board of the 74."

The first volume of the life of the celebrated Dr. Arthur Lee, one of the illustrious worthies of our Revolution, has been published. It is written by Henry Richard Lee, grandson of the brother of Dr. Lee, and will be completed in two volumes octavo, containing about 400 pages each.

"Constitutional Chart, or Comparative views of the Legislative Executive and Judicial Departments in the Constitutions of all the States in the Union, including that of the United States," is the title of a thin quarto volume, by James M. Garnett, Esq. of Virginia, just published. This work is on the plan of a similar one, prepared in 1796, by the Hon. W. L. Smith, Member of Congress, from South Carolina. It is so arranged, that at a glance the organization of each State Government may be compared with the rest, and the principal features of all surveyed.

His Excellency Sir Peregrine and Lady Sarah Maitland and family, take their departure to-morrow morning, should the wind be favourable, in H. M. Ship Hussar, Capt. Boscawen for Barbadoes. His Excellency's health obliges him to undertake the voyage, and we most anxiously hope the best consequence will result from it.

We are happy to state, that Sir Charles and Lady Ogilvie have returned in good health from their interesting visit to the Canadas and the United States. They were highly gratified throughout their tour, and particularly so by the very kind attentions paid to them in all the American towns through which they passed.

Yesterday an inquest was held at St. George's Island on the body of James Redmond, formerly a soldier in the 15th regiment. The deceased was one of twenty three convicts who are confined at the Island preparatory to being removed to Bermuda. On Thursday evening, about 8 o'clock, the sentinel on duty over the prisoners, hearing a disturbance in the room where they were all confined, called upon the corporal of the guard, who, with a file of men went into the room to quell the disturbance, when he and his escort were immediately attacked and thrown by the prisoners, who appeared to be all without handcuffs, though they are regularly put on every night. The sentinel seeing the situation of the corporal, called out to the convicts that he would fire upon them if they did not let him go, when he was also immediately seized and thrown down into the room, the door of which was closed by the prisoners, and an attempt made to get possession of his musket. Some of the soldiers in an adjoining room being alarmed at the scuffle, came to the assistance of the corporal and the room was forced open. A number of the prisoners rushed into the passage, pushing out the corporal and the men who were with him. The scuffle was renewed in the passage, and two of the convicts had got the loaded musket of the sentinel into their possession for a few moments, when it was recovered by one of the soldiers. The prisoners outside the corporal and his escort, and the soldiers to fire; two musket balls were immediately discharged, and a ball entered the left hip of deceased, who staggered backward to the room. The prisoners were driven in at the point of the bayonet, and the whole detachment of the Island was got under arms. It was some time before the Sergeant could venture into the room to remove the deceased, as the prisoners continued in a state of great disturbance after being again enclosed, tearing up the hearth and throwing the bricks against the door and out of the windows at the sentinel on duty. After a patient investigation a verdict of Justifiable Homicide was returned by a most respectable jury. No other prisoner, except deceased, was wounded by the firing; but one, a principal ringleader, has two or three bayonet wounds which are not considered at all dangerous.—(Recorder.)

York, (U. C.) Oct. 19.—On Friday last, the action commenced by Fitzgibbon, Clerk of the Assembly, Colonel of Militia, Registrar of the Surrogate Court, Police Magistrate, Commissioner for the sale of the school house reserved Judge Advocate at Court-Martials, and joint author of the celebrated "Reasons," against the Editor of this paper for an alleged libel, was called on. It occupied the court 15 hours; and a verdict was returned in favour of the Defendant: and on Saturday, the action commenced by Stanton, King's Printer, Lieutenant Colonel of Militia, Police Magistrate, and Gazette Editor, Editor of the Court Calendar, and also a joint author of the celebrated "Reasons," against the Editor of this paper, for an alleged libel, was called on. It occupied the court 2 hours; and a verdict was returned in favour of the Defendant.

On the side of the plaintiffs, were ranged Messrs. Draper and Small, having the Attorney General as Book Counsel. (The damages were laid at £1000.)

Against this formidable phalanx we pitted two striplings, Messrs. Balgwyn and Sullivan; and to the astonishment of the Court and a crowded audience, they defeated the old veterans!—(Observer, edited by Mr. Carey.)

Nagasaki, Oct. 16.—On the 2d instant, His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, accompanied by two gentlemen, passed through Dunoon, on his way to Amherstburg, via Lalot Street. We understand His Excellency had a consultation with the Indian Chiefs, respecting the title for the lands on which the beautiful and flourishing village of Branford stands. It appears that the title for that ground is founded on a lease from the Indians; which is considered not secure: His Excellency is therefore anxious that the land should be sold and surrendered to Government, (by the Indians,) from whom a good and sufficient title might be obtained, by those who have already built, or might wish to build thereon.

The Steamer Niagara arrived here on the 14th inst. from Burlington, passing through the canal; landed near Hamilton 150 persons—men, women and children—settlers from Rossberg, Highlands of Scotland, all bound for the township of Zorrau, London District; where, we understand, lands are located to them.

Kingston, Oct. 14.—We are informed that His Majesty has been pleased to call the Right Rev. Alexander McDaniel, Bishop of Rhemes, to the Legislative Council of this Province.

Montreal, Oct. 25.—Joachim Watier Lanot, Esq. is, we understand, the only candidate as yet in nomination, to fill the vacancy in the representation for the County of York, occasioned by the death of J. B. Lefebvre, Esq. The Election will be held at Val-d'Herbe on the 29th.

Montreal, Oct. 24.—The Steamboat Laprairie, which is during the present Summer, pined between Montreal and the Longueuec, short, we understand has lately been despatched by her former proprietor, Edmund Henry, Esq. to Mr. Oliver Wait, of the Current of St. Mary, and Mr. Prefontaine, of Longueuec.

On Thursday night last, the stable of Mr. Arthur Evett, of La-Clare, was broken open, and a horse stolen therefrom. A few nights ago the store of Messrs. Levi Solomons, and Co. in St. Paul-street, was broken open a second time, and filled of about three dollars in silver and coppers, which was all the cash in the store.

QUEBEC: MONDAY, 26th OCTOBER, 1829.

We received this morning London papers of the 15th September, and the Gazette de France of the 19th of the same month. The Russians have taken Adrianople without bloodshed, and have set out on their march towards Constantinople, combining the operations of General Diebitsch's army with the flotilla in the Black Sea and the troops near Rodosto. The Turks can oppose no effectual barrier to these forces, and the capital must fall. The Sultan has shewn a disposition to treat, but obstinately holds to his former terms, which the Russians have rejected under less favorable circumstances, and which they will now certainly reject again. The Sultan must submit to the Russian terms. Britain and France will then arrange the balance of power as well as they can.

The Russian fleet in the Mediterranean has been ordered to co-operate with the land forces under General Rotin, and would make an attempt to pass the Dardanelles. With the exception of the advices from the East, the papers are without news of general interest.

The Duke of Wellington has got the London Morning Journal indicted for a libel on himself. The weather has been very tempestuous and rainy in Great Britain from the 10th to the 16th September. The wheat had been all secured before that time, but much of the oats and barley had been damaged, and as the former it is well known, forms a part of the food of the inhabitants, a deficiency in it, will affect the prices of wheaten flour, which it depends on.

The Halifax post of to-day, brought papers of the 14th inst. with the English September Mail, which had arrived there in 24 days. Sir Peregrine Maitland, was to sail on the 15th in the Hussar for Barbadoes, where he is to pass the winter for the benefit of his throat.

H. M. S. Hussar, arrived at Halifax, on the 9th in 8 days. H. M. S. Champion, had also arrived from Newfoundland. Dispatches from the Colonial Office for Sir James Kempf, were received to-day by the Halifax mail.

It is rumored that a new Commission of the Peace for the Province is about to be issued. Mr. Lanot is the only candidate as yet for the County of York, where a member is to be elected in the room of Mr. Lefebvre, lately deceased.

Colonel Heriot, Provincial Aide-de-Camp, and Mr. Evans, formerly agent for a number of the inhabitants in the Eastern Townships, have offered their services to the Electors of the County of Drummond, which returns one member.

The Bank of Montreal has declared a semi-annual dividend of 3 per cent, payable at Montreal on the 1st December next; and called in by three instalments of 5 per cent each, on the 1st January, 1st February and 1st March, the whole capital stock of the Bank, under its charter.

Dr. McDougle, at the head of the Medical Staff in the Canadas, sailed from New-York for Liverpool on the 16th inst. He is succeeded by Dr. Skey, as Deputy Inspector of Hospitals, who has arrived in this city.

The civil suits by Messrs. Stanton and Fitzgibbon against Mr. Carey, the editor of the York Observer, for libel, have both failed before juries. The damages in each case were laid at £500.

SHIPPING INTELLIGENCE. Two bark and a brig bound up, were at Kamouraska on Saturday last. Sophia, Neill, sails for Greenock, the 27th part of next week. British Sovereign and Ottawa, sailed from Portmouth 12th Sept. Endeavour, arrived at Douar Graves end, 6th Sept. The William Berle, hence at Halifax. Loss of the Bank—This vessel sailed from Riviere du Loup for London, on the 1st instant, and on the 7th was totally wrecked, on the S. W. point of Anticosti, her bottom falling out shortly after striking—all hands were saved. The Captain and crew were 4 days on the island, but not near either of the points. They put to sea in the jolly boat and were afterwards taken on board a schooner bound to Quebec; subsequently, off Bic, Capt. Cockburn, with four apprentices, took passage in the Rosanna, Capt. Thompson hence for London; the remainder of the crew had arrived at this port. The crew of the Bank mention having seen four new made graves near where they were wrecked, one of them containing the body of a man dressed in a sailor's clothes; a quantity of dead and staves with ship's materials lying about the spot, some piled in good order.
