Bishop's students ask test

TORONTO (CP) — A resolution calling for an economic boycott against South Africa was approved Sunday night by the international affairs commission of the Canadian Union of Students.

The resolution, proposed by the University of Toronto, calls for a week-long all-day picket of the South African embassy in Ottawa, co-operation with the Canadian Labor Congress of boycotting ships carrying South African goods, distribution of posters to retail stores, fund-raising for legal defence of political prisoners in Africa and pressure on manufacturing, consumer and government groups.

Percy Mangosel, students' council president at Memorial University, St. John's, Nfld., and a native of Basutoland in Africa, said the underprivileged people of South Africa will not suffer from the boycott.

WOULD TEST ACT

In other business, Bishop's University of Lennoxville, Que., proposed that CUS initiate a test case with the federal government challenging the constitutionality of the new Canada Students Loan Act.

Alex Henderson, president of Bishop's students' council, said the proposal was to secure judicial interpretation of the British North America Act on educational powers rather than to oppose or support the act.

The act provides bank loans for students who need financial help for full-time studies towards a degree or diploma at universities or other educational institutions beyond high school level.

CUS took no immediate action on the proposal.

Earlier, a new constitution and a recommendation to conduct a trans-Canada student means survey were adopted by the congress.

English-language delegates from Quebec among the 41 universities represented abstained from voting on those sections of the charter affecting voting rights and amendment procedures. They want a committee of regional representatives to recommend amendment of the sections.



Probe explosion

MONTREAL (CP) — Experts combed the shattered interior of an east-end subway tunnel during the weekend, seeking clues to an explosion that killed three construction workers Friday.

They were attempting to discover whether the blast was caused by gas, dynamite or something else. Their findings were not expected to be made public until a coroner's inquest is called.

MPs work

OTTAWA (CP) — For the first time in a month the House of Commons today will debate government legislation other than the flag proposal.

Agriculture Minister Harry Hays will start the week by launching a proposal to raise lending limits under the Farm Improvements Loans Act.

It is the first time MPs have tackled non-flag government legislation since Aug. 11 when they passed the new federal-provincial taxation arrangements.

Flood toll 190

SEOUL (AP) — South Korea's cabinet held an emergency session today as the death toll from flash floods and landslides in the Seoul area climbed to 190, with another 231 missing.

The floods were caused by the capital area's heaviest rainfall in 22 years. Between five and eight inches poured on the Seoul area during two hours Sunday morning.

Damages run to thousands

Race horses die in city barn fire

Three race horses and a colt were killed yesterday afternoon when a barn belonging to the Sherbrooke Racing Club was destroyed by fire.

The barn was valued at about \$6,000, estimates racing club director Roger Trudeau.

Cause of the fire is unknown.

Losses of the horses and equipment were placed between \$5,000 and \$8,000.

The four horses were the property of Edgar Brunelle, of Varennes. There were 10 horses belonging to other owners in the building but they escaped safely.

Firemen received the call at about 5 p.m. It was answered by three trucks from Station No. 1 with the assistant director Charles Audet in charge, and two trucks from Station No. 4 with Lieutenant Gaspard Bourque in charge. Thirteen firemen came to the scene of the blaze.

The barn destroyed was at the north end of the racing grounds, beside Terrill Street. It was one of three new barns built this spring.

There was some danger of the fire spreading to the other barns but firemen were able to contain it.

The Sherbrooke Racing Club has about 10 such barns.

Different Quebec views from RIN, minister, MP

ESTEREL, Que. (CP) — One speaker urged more discussions about the future of Quebec and Canada Saturday night and three others promptly came forward with sharply different views about constitutional changes in the years to come.

The flurry of political declarations came at the last session of the annual conference of Institut Canadien des Affaires Publiques.

A top member of le Rassemblement pour l'Indépendance Nationale called for an independent Quebec while a provincial cabinet member urged a revision of the federal constitution and a Liberal member of Parliament stressed what he called the advantages of co-operative federalism.

They expressed their views

after Albert Breton, an economics professor at the University of Montreal, told the 500 persons gathered for the conference big decisions in Canada and especially in Quebec, are generally made "without argument . . . and without a full appreciation and evaluation of the consequences of these choices."

Andre D'Allemagne, a member of the executive committee of le Rassemblement, responded by saying such lack of discussion "is a normal thing with a people held in tutelage and colonized."

Mr. D'Allemagne said what Quebec needs is "a system organized in such a particular way as to permit and even force solutions turned to Quebec's needs."

Third ecumenical council opens with plea for unity

VATICAN CITY (CP) — Pope Paul VI opened the third and possibly decisive session of the Vatican ecumenical council today and called on the bishops of the Roman Catholic Church to

clarify their place in church government with regard to the council.

The pontiff called this task of defending papal-bishop authority — an issue with overtones for

Christian unity — the "weightiest and most delicate" task of the council.

He said it would complete the concept of papal primacy elaborated at the last ecumenical council. He made clear that sharing of authority with the bishops does not mean a lessening of papal power.

"As successors of Peter and therefore possessors of full power over the entire church, we have the duty of heading the body of the episcopate . . . the Pope said. "Nevertheless our position in no way defrauds you, our brother bishops, of your due authority."

"On the contrary we are among the first to respect that sacred authority."

The Pope also made a reference to Christian unity in greeting observers from other Christian churches.

MAY TAKE TIME

"Perhaps a great distance still keeps us separated and perhaps much time will have to pass before a full and effective meeting will be accomplished," he said.

"But may you know what we hold you in our heart, and may the God of mercy support so great a desire and so great a hope."

At another point, the Pope said he would "strive" in loyalty to the unity of Christ's church, "to understand better and to welcome all that is genuine and admissible in the different Christian denominations

that are distinct from us; and at the same time we beg of them to try to understand the Catholic faith and life better."

Some non-Catholic Christian circles have felt that the Pope had recently over-emphasized Roman Catholic belief that theirs is the one true church.

HOPES FOR UNITY

In an apparent reference to this, Pope Paul said:

"When we invite them (non-Catholic Christians) to enter into the fullness of truth and charity which, as an unmerited blessing but a formidable responsibility, Christ has charged us to preserve, we beg them not to take it in bad part, but as being prompted by respect and brotherly love. For that fullness of truth and charity will be made the more manifest when all those who profess the name of Christ are reassembled into one."

The new council session was opened by the Pope with an unusual mass symbolizing moves toward the sharing of authority between pontiff and bishops.

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Vietnamese coup crumbles quickly

★★★ Hopes Khanh's success will reinforce position ★★★

SAIGON (AP) — An attempt to overthrow South Viet Nam's Premier Nguyen Khanh collapsed today less than 24 hours after 2,000 rebel troops marched into Saigon and ordered his arrest as a traitor. Not a shot was fired.

The air force commander, Brig-Gen. Nguyen Cao Ky, who remained loyal to Khanh during the abortive uprising, told a press conference the government of South Viet Nam was "exactly as before the coup."

He said the rebel leaders would not be arrested and that unity had been restored.

Khanh himself told a press conference he would fulfill his earlier promise to prepare for a civilian government "which has the confidence of the entire people."

He said he was moved by the spirit of unity shown by the armed forces, and added:

"Facing the threat of internal strife, we proved to be very worthy and we were able to save the precious blood of all our fighters against the (Communist) Viet Cong."

The attempted coup, engineered by a group of dissident generals, was not unexpected. Rumors that Khanh faced a revolt swept the city late last week.

It came while Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor, the U.S. ambassador, was out of the country. He returned to the capital early today after four days of talks in Washington concerning the effects of the political chaos in the U.S.-backed war against Communist rebels.

SAIGON STAYS QUIET

Throughout the coup attempt, Saigon residents reacted with sullen indifference. Motorists blew their horns angrily at tanks interfering with traffic. Shoppers paid little attention to announcements broadcast to them from planes with loudspeakers. Even swooping fighter-bombers failed to arouse much interest.

Had the coup succeeded, it would have been the third in less than a year. President Ngo Dinh Diem was overthrown last Nov. 1, and Khanh took power Jan. 30 from Gen. Duong Van Minh, leader of the anti-Diem uprising. Khanh was nearly driven from office in August and early September by three weeks of violent Buddhist and student demonstrations.

The new attempt to seize power was led by army generals blacklisted by the Buddhists, to whom Khanh had made concessions in an effort to unify the country. The coup collapsed primarily because most of the units involved were unwilling to fight and because 33-year-old Gen. Ky staunchly refused to surrender the Saigon airport to them.

Turks claim UN airlift inadequate

NICOSIA (CP) — Turkish Cypriot leaders today termed a United Nations airlift of supplies to Kokkina inadequate and demanded again that the Greek-Cypriot government end its economic blockade of their areas.

UN helicopters delivered two tons of emergency rations Sunday to the northwest Cypriot village, to which the Turkish government had said its navy will convey supplies under armed escort Tuesday.

Turkish Premier Ismet Inonu met Sunday night in Ankara with top officials, but there was no immediate indication whether Turkey intends to carry out its plan.

Greek-Cypriot President Makarios warned Turkey that a navy convoy would be regarded as an aggressive act. Later he said Turkey could send supplies to regular ports—controlled by the Greek-Cypriots—so long as no effort was made to break the blockade.

CLIMBS BERLIN WALL DURING LONG GUNBATTLE

BERLIN (AP) — A native of Germany now in the U.S. Army, East German guards tried to drag him away, but Puhl—covered by western police—marched to the wall and ordered the East Germans back.

Pte. Hans Puhl, 22, was involved in a 40-minute battle at dawn during which West Berlin police and East German Communist guards fired dozens of shots at each other. No one was killed, but it was the longest fight since the wall was put up three years ago.

Lying in the middle of the fray, on the Communist side of the wall, was Michael Meyer, 21, from the East German town of Fredersdorf. He was shot down as he tried to scramble over the wall.

He spotted the young man on the other side of the wall. He was going to cut the wire (top of the wall)."

Two East German guards were pulling on him and I pointed my rifle at them and told them to let him go," he said.

"When they did not let him go, I threw a tear gas grenade across the wall in the hope that they would stop bothering the refugee and they did."

Puhl then ran back to the wall, gave his rifle to a West Berlin policeman and pulled out his pistol.

"Two West Berliners boosted me up so that I could see across the wall and I called to the refugee not to move and that we were going to cut the wire (top of the wall)."

JACOBY ON BRIDGE

BIDDING SHOWS TWO SUIT HAND

I think it was the late Cmdr. Winfield Liggett who said, "I care not who holds the nation's two bids, if I can make the killing opening leads."

At first glance, West has an automatic lead of the spade king. A little employment of gray matter, plus a review of the bidding, will disclose a better lead. South has shown a two suiter and West has the second suit pickled. West wants to destroy as much of dummy's ruffing power as possible, so he

opens the ace of trumps and continues with the four spot. South will drop a high trump on the ace to be able to win the second trump lead in dummy. Then he will lose some sort of diamond finesse.

West will lead his last trump and South will wind up losing three diamond tricks plus the ace of trumps.

The king of spades lead would annoy South, but would not beat him if he played the hand correctly. He would win the

trick and lead the ace and a small diamond. West would be on lead and might continue spades, in which case South would ruff out diamonds and wind up making five odd.

Then, again, West might shift to the ace and one trump, but he will be too late and South would be able to ruff one diamond in dummy for his tenth trick.

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Two launch campaigns for council seats

Lennoxville obtains permission for loan

The town of Lennoxville has received permission from the Quebec Municipal Commission to take out a loan to cover a possible budget deficit this year.

Then loan, for \$20,000 or less, was applied for as a precautionary measure, said Frank Taylor, alderman in charge of finance, at the town council meeting Friday night.

"We didn't know how long loan permission would take to come through," said Mr. Taylor. "We didn't expect it so soon."

No action has yet been taken to obtain the loan.

The action was prompted by Mr. Taylor's report at the August 3 council meeting in which he castigated council for too much spending. "The budget had so much red ink on it I had to put it away," he said then.

The loan was decided on at a special council meeting held August 21, under the chairmanship of pro-mayor Taylor.

The loan, if wanted, would have to be arranged at the Len-

noxville branch of the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce, and would have to be paid back on or before March 25, 1965.

Waterworks department finances are in the worst condition at present, he said.

The big thing, added Secretary Ken Herring, was a major repair job on a diesel engine. It's touch-and-go in the roads department too, said Mr. Taylor.

Mayor Mitchell ended the discussion on a cautiously optimistic note: if expenses are watched and there are no major breaks, the budget will be okay from here on in, he said.

Mayor Mitchell and Mr. Herring later attributed the budget deficit so far to ten per cent holdback charges for street paving and building the reservoir last year.

New tax bill system in effect next year

Lennoxville ratepayers will get their tax billings on new forms next year — if the town auditors approve conversion to a new billing system.

The system, the McBee tax billings system, was discussed by the town council at its Friday night meeting.

However council decided to get their auditors' approval before installing it. It would simplify tax billing and reduce duplication.

The system is to cost about \$1,500 and would take 10 weeks to install, according to town secretary Ken Herring. Since the town's tax bills are mailed on January 1 the system should be working then.

Though it is already used fairly widely, Lennoxville would be one of the first Eastern Townships municipalities to install the McBee system, says Mr. Herring.

Lennoxville Mayor Archie Mitchell reported Friday night that work is progressing well on the town's \$76,029 street paving project.

If the work may seem slow in some ways, he said, it is because the contracting firm is at present putting in catch basins and additional pipe for surface water, as requested by the Quebec Water Board.

The contract was awarded to B. Golette & Fils. The work is to be completed this fall.

The paving is to be done on the following streets: Speid, Hunting, Vaudry, Meade, Glendale, Maple, Downs and Deacon.

Council decided to accept a recommendation by the town engineer that pavement laid by tested by Shermont Laboratories Inc. at a cost of 15 cents per foot.

Alderman Taylor suggested that this cost is well worth while when so much money is being spent on paving.

If samples show the pavement mixture is deficient the company can be forced to tear it up and repave, council was told.

The tests usually serve to make contractors more careful in mixing pavement. The paving samples are to be taken by the laboratory.

Council and town evaluators discussed a series of assessment protests and in several cases decided to defer to them.

Youth found responsible
A Sherbrooke youth was judged criminally responsible Saturday morning for the death of another in a car accident, St. Francis District Coroner Dr. Louis Gagnon said this morning.

Claude Gaumond, 19, of 1363 Dorval Street, was driver of one of the cars involved in the two-car collision in which Claude Arguin, 18, of 487 Gault Street West was killed, on May 24.

He will appear in court later this month on a charge of criminal negligence.

The opening of the permanent industrial exhibit at Sherbrooke's Howards Park marks a new milestone in the development of the Sherbrooke region.

The exhibit itself is the culmination of several years of planning, especially on the part of Leo Cadorette, now Howards superintendent, and once a city alderman. It displays a panorama of the city's industrial wealth, and the way it is set out is a credit both to the city and to the exhibitors themselves.

But even more important than the exhibit itself is the industrial diversity and strength it represents. Fringed gentian shy and lovely

The fringed gentian is a shy and lovely flower, the most famous member of a well-known, widespread clan. It grows in low, moist spots and offers its beauty when most wildflowers have finished their blooming and fruiting. From Quebec to Georgia and into the west, the gentian holds deep, glowing blue to the blue of autumn skies. Half a century ago it was common, but ruthless and thoughtless pickers caused the fringed flower to retreat far from trafficked roads.

A poet wrote that the flower comes to cheer the melancholy days that marked the closing of the year; but the countryman, watching the blossoms open at the low end of the meadow, feels the poet was rushing the season. For the fringed gentian means October with crisp, starry nights and mellow warmth at midday. It is a biennial plant with erect branches, each bearing a single terminal flower.

The blossom has four violet-blue, fringed lobes that spread horizontally in bright sunshine. The four-pointed calyx is also four-sided and a rich, bronze-yellow green in color.

The delicate fringe is a graceful touch. But all of Nature's beauty is functional, and so is the fringe of this flower that is becoming more rare. Centuries ago there was no fringe and the ants swarmed into the cup for the nectar. This prevented the cross-pollination essential for seed formation. Therefore Nature in its wisdom caused the flower to develop a fringe to repel the ants but still permit bees and butterflies to harvest the nectar, and at the same time carry vital pollen from anthers to pistils. This flower is no longer found along the travelled roads. But go back from the beaten trails, through the woods to low lying meadows and sloughs, you will see the blue flower with fringed petals holding its beauty to blue skies.

Some Canadians need French, not all

The former premier of Saskatchewan, Woodrow Lloyd, told the Geneva Park Conference at Lake Couchiching that "even if everyone in Canada woke up tomorrow able to speak French easily and fluently, it would not solve the problem of national unity."

Of course it wouldn't and some English-speaking Canadians hot on the bilingual ramp are asking the impossible to do the infeasible when they want every child in Canada to speak both official languages.

It would be good if all influential, well trained or educated persons in English-speaking Canada where fluent in French (most such people in French-speaking Canada now have a pretty good working knowledge of English). This would certainly promote understanding and unity. But what is the point of requiring all boys and girls in, say, Saskatchewan, to know

French when the majority will never use it and seldom meet a French-speaking compatriot? Anyway, it can't be done.

Speaking recently in Hamilton, State Secretary Maurice Lamontagne enumerated things French Canada does NOT want and said: "They do not expect all Canadians to become bilingual."

What should be expected, and rightly, is that young English speaking Canadians have a much greater OPPORTUNITY than formerly to learn French.

It may be useful to give all children in junior grades a smattering of oral French so the language is not foreign. And the time should be approaching when no student is awarded a university degree in Canada who doesn't demonstrate competence in the second language. Why? Because

no person should be certified well educated in Canada who cannot handle its two tongues. Both are international languages, and graduates presumably will be in the leadership groups of the community and nation. They should be able to communicate with each other without a translator.

If the weather is right

Daredevil early flying machines re-built and flown for movie

LONDON — (NEA) — The crazy, but glorious birth of aviation 50 years ago is being relived at a Royal Air Force flying field not far from London, where a unique collection of "old-crock" planes has been assembled for a Hollywood film.

All are duplicates of planes that were actually invented in 1910, and they are starring in "Those Magnificent Men in Their Flying Machines," the \$4 million comedy which 20th Century-Fox is shooting here.

Some of the copy-antiques being used in the film were designed to be launched from moving motorcars. Others were supposed to be catapulted into the air. Almost all of them crashed as soon as they became airborne. One plane, the Passat Ornithopter, merely jumped up and down like an angry bird as it flapped its wings.

"Six of the planes we have had made by hand actually fly," explained producer Stan Margulies. "That is, they fly when weather and wind conditions permit. If the wind is stronger than 15 miles per hour, we have to ground all our planes. They are too fragile to take the strain."

So far there has been only one mishap, which occurred when the company was filming at Dover. "Dover is the first stage in the London-Paris air race which is the climax of our film, and we wanted to show the planes taking off over the white cliffs of Dover."

"All of them cleared the cliffs beautifully except the Bristol Box Kite, which

got caught in a down draft and nearly dropped into the sea. Fortunately the pilot was able to make a forced landing on the beach."

20th Century-Fox has had no trouble in getting pilots to chauffeur the vintage aircraft used in the film. This is in spite of the fact that the flying is hazardous and the pilots are not equipped with parachutes. (The planes fly so low that parachutes would be useless in the event of an engine failure.)

"I'd rather fly one of these chicken crates than fly a jet," said Peter Hillwood, 44, former jet test pilot. "These old planes pack a real wallop."

Hillwood, who was a Royal Air Force pilot during the war, recently retired after 15 years as a test pilot with an English aviation firm.

His favorite among the antique planes that are being starred in the Hollywood film is the Antoinette, a monoplane with a 44-foot wing span and powered by a 85-horsepower engine.

In order to fly the Antoinette, Hillwood has to sit on the fuselage and dangle his legs in the cockpit. There is nothing between him and the open sky — no protection of any kind from wind and rain.

"Flying 50 years ago was like breaking a steer," said Hillwood. "Today it is tame. All the fun has gone out of it. Today all the pilot has to do is to flick the switches and the instruments do the rest."

Another plane which has given the film unit trouble is a duplicate of the Demoiselle, with a wing span of only 18

feet. Although it was built to specifications, the Demoiselle refused to take off when piloted by Douglas Bianchi, a flying instructor who weighs 192 pounds.

The researchers discovered that the original Demoiselle was built for a Brazilian millionaire who weighed only 110 pounds. So the plane is now piloted by a woman, Joan Hughes, who weighs exactly 110 pounds, and it now flies beautifully.

"All of our old-crock planes have been built by hand at workshops scattered over England, and they reproduce as faithfully as possible the original planes," said the producer.

"For most of the planes we had to rely upon photographs and descriptions which appeared in the press. The inventors did not bother with blueprints in those days. We never knew until the plane was finished whether it would actually fly."

The film, which is a comedy about international rivalry for air supremacy in 1910, has an international cast including Sarah Miles, Stuart Whitman, Robert Morley, Jean-Pierre Cassel, Terry-Thomas, James Fox and Alberto Sordi.

What will the film company do with its fantastic flying machines when the movie is completed? "We've already had bids for them from all over the world," Margulies revealed. "Air museums from Los Angeles to London would like to have our replicas. So would private collectors. We haven't yet decided what will be done with the planes."

Why bright students read poorly

Probe vision-reading connection

TORONTO (CP)—An enthusiast with a tape measure and dogged dedication is pursuing a new theory on why Johnny or Jane, though bright as buttons, can't read very well.

Arthur Hurst, 48, a school teacher turned optometrist, has been measuring the distance between eye and desk of scores of schoolchildren near his home in Newmarket, north of Toronto.

The study involves an idea that reading and learning ability is affected by vision skills, an idea that Dr. Hurst admits is controversial in that some educationists and medical people believe vision skill and reading ability are unrelated. However, the idea has support, notably among optometrists conducting a vision training program in the schools of Langley, B.C.

Dr. Hurst has found in preliminary studies that children keep their eyes closer to their reading or writing than has been considered normal. He believes this may be a clue to the prevalence of so-called retarded readers and may even be a result of basic changes in human methods of perception wrought by television.

The eye-to-desk distance among 86 children of the first and second grades, for example, was found to average 52

inches and was as low as 4.6 inches in one class. The overall average for both reading and writing ranged upward with age from between six and seven inches in the first grades to about 10.5 inches in Grade Eight.

Working at these distances, Dr. Hurst says, vision reflexes are subject to "a completely different array of requirements" than at 16 inches, the working distance accepted as a norm in vision tests. Therefore, the tests may not be detecting problems present when the child is actually reading or writing.

These problems may involve inadequate vision reflexes such as failure to use both eyes at once, problems Dr. Hurst believes can be corrected by training if detected while the child is still in the first few years of school.

Pioneering work in the field of vision training aimed at improving scholastic ability has been under way since 1956 in Langley under B. J. Cox, research director of the British Columbia Optometric Association.

Dr. Cox says his studies show that many children with healthy eyes "literally do not know how to use them," lacking skills in

such things as control of eye movement, hand-eye co-ordination, distance and size judgment. These skills, normally learned in the pre-school years, can be developed later by training, Dr. Cox says.

"Although only one of 10 children in Grade One has an eye defect, more than one out of three have inadequate visual perceptual skill — the learned co-ordination and perceiving skills of the eyes. This means many children in a primary teacher's class are hindered in their efforts to learn reading."

RECENT TREND?

Dr. Hurst, while emphasizing that his line of research is preliminary, believes that some of this inability may be a recent development resulting from the altered methods of perception engendered by television.

He bases this theory partly on comparison of his eye-to-desk measurements with a similar study 20 years ago in the United States which showed the average working distance ranged from nine inches in the primary grades to 14 inches in Grade Eight — roughly one-third greater than Dr. Hurst's findings.

Dr. Hurst, drawing on theories of communication he studied at University of Toronto under Prof. Marshall McLuhan, sug-

gests visual habits may have been altered by a new emphasis on the senses of touch and hearing.

The idea is that the low-definition television picture has brought about compensating greater use of the non-visual senses in perception. This emphasis on involvement of all the senses — replacing the dominance of vision and print in the pre-television era — causes today's child to move closer to his notebook or reader in an attempt to bring his other senses into play while reading.

Dr. Hurst is anxious to pursue his research with public support — he estimates he has spent \$5,000 of his own funds on the study in the last few years — but has met with little more than mildly encouraging reactions from government officials.

The educational research department of the University of Toronto is considering making available data processing facilities, providing the project gets approval higher up. The Toronto board of education research section is weighing the possibility of permitting a full-scale study among Toronto school children so long as it does not interfere with academic pursuits.

The Ontario department of education—the key link because Dr. Hurst wants the government to finance the research—said toward the end of August that "no decision has been reached."

Deputy Education Minister H. E. Elborn said that because vision is involved the health department has been asked for an opinion.

Miss Jones' brow was furrowed. "But they really are traitors, aren't they, Harry?"

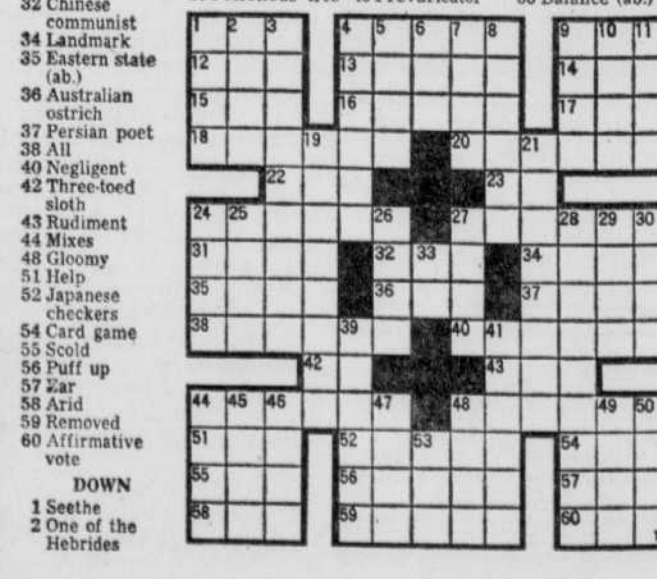

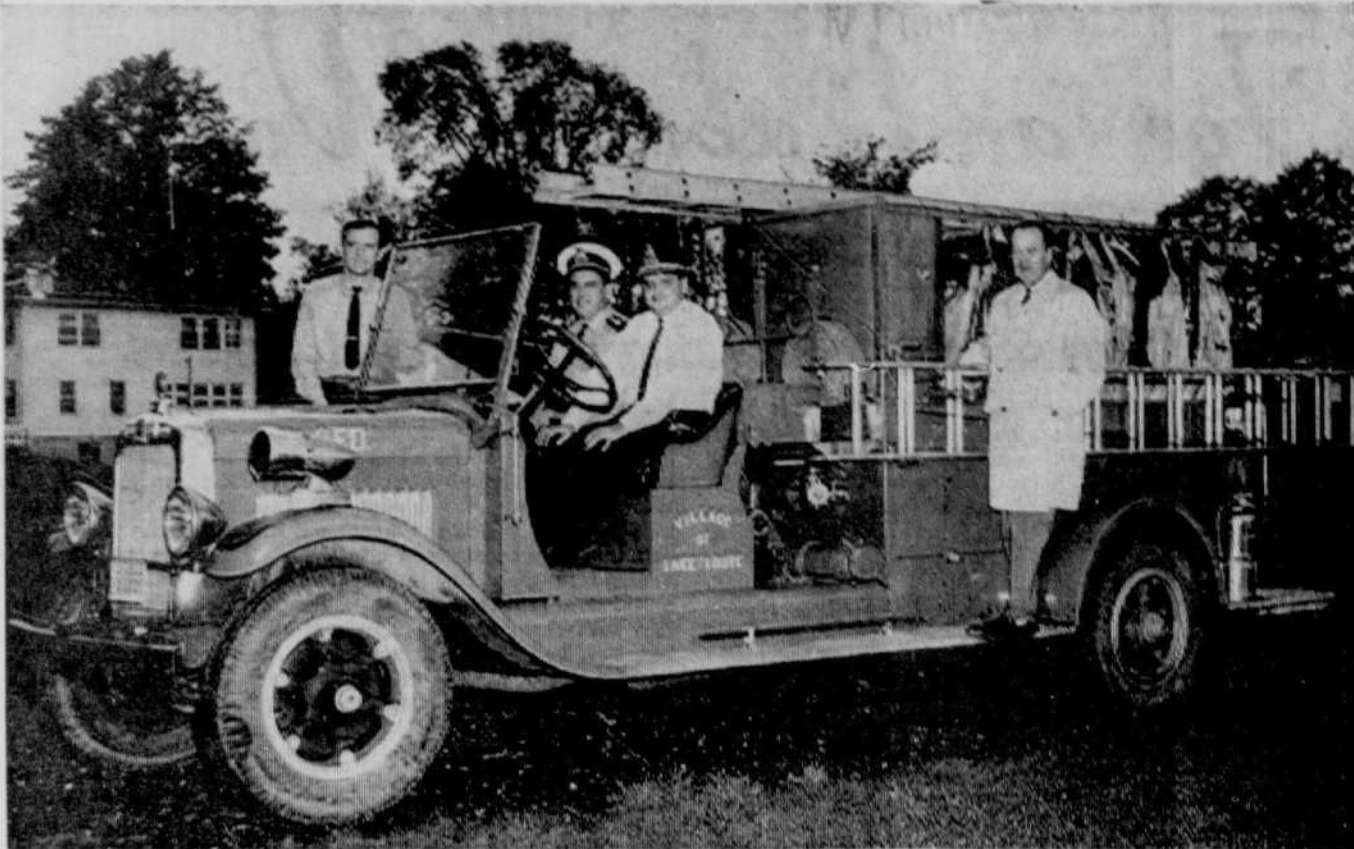

Hampton Beach just too square

Pick up continues after 'the big rumble'

HAMPTON BEACH, N.H. — What possessed 10,000 youngsters to descend on Hampton Beach so that they had literally to be beaten back three miles across the border into Massachusetts by club-swinging troopers?

What possessed another 1,000, just as frantic and just as lawless, to descend on Seaside in an orgy of riot and ruin?

In both towns on opposite sides of the U.S. clean-up crews still sifted through the sand for broken bottles and empty beer cans, lethal weapons in the all night street fighting. Jails and correctional institutions still held a bailiess, baleful few of the hundreds of youngsters arrested for hurling rocks, Molotov cocktails and obscenities at the beleaguered police.

Its main attractions were a band shell that offered outdoor concerts four times a day and a massive three-block long casino, said to be the largest ballroom in the world, where Louis Armstrong, Sammy Kaye and similar attractions appeared regularly and where coats and ties were always required.

Police claim the evidence is mounting that teen-agers flocked to Hampton Beach because the word went out weeks in advance of a big riot on the Sunday before Labor Day. Maine state troopers are reported to have confiscated placards advertising the big rumble.

Superintendent Michael Morello of the State Industrial School at Manchester, N.H., where 24 of the out-of-state juvenile offenders were taken on the night of the riot, told of checking in a boy two weeks ago whose "only regret was that he would miss the big kill at Hampton Beach."

Morello, a psychologist, said "the kids all knew in advance something was going to happen and yet not one of them could tell you exactly why he was there."

"... The question I would like to see answered is: Where were the parents of these 15- and 16-year-olds when they were tearing up the beach?"

Unions meet opens

QUEBEC (CP) — The 41st annual meeting of the Confederation of National Trade Unions opened with a blast by President Jean Marchand against what he termed the American philosophy of unionism.

"Unionism isn't a 'business,'" Mr. Marchand said in an opening address Sunday to 1,000 delegates. "It must live for the support and confidence of the workers and should earn it."

"The workers don't exist for the unions. The unions exist to protect the workers."

Mr. Marchand described the CNTU, most of whose 120,000 members are Quebecers, as the

champion of a Canadian trade union movement. The CNTU has no U.S. affiliation.

"The CNTU wants the Canadian union movement to be controlled in Canada and not in the United States."

He also said solidarity among labor federations is a concept that can be carried too far, "non-aggression pacts" often did no more than give a mea-

sure of security to groups that hadn't earned it.

The CNTU has been sparring in recent months with the Quebec Federation of Labor, which is affiliated to the Canadian Labor Congress.

Mr. Marchand's report included a call for a public inquiry into working conditions for women. He said the CNTU must occupy itself with problems such as full employment, unemployment and automation. The meeting ends Saturday.

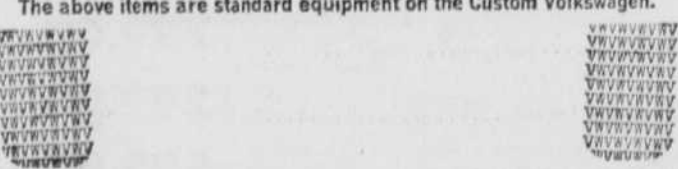

Use categories such as food, shelter, operating expenses, clothing, transportation, health, entertainment, savings and personal allowance, and work out your own guidelines, based on take-home pay. A budget which is too finely detailed won't survive.

General percentages which dictate, for instance, that no more than one-quarter of your income should go for housing, are not as useful as they are thought to be.

"A budget is a highly personal thing," says Robert E. Oliver of the Bank of Nova Scotia in Toronto. "It helps you decide you are going to get the most value for your money by spending it on things you want. It shouldn't be restrictive or a nuisance and something dull."

MAKE CHOICES

Your responsibilities, your interests and where you live will determine your budget, with your income level.

Once you have discovered where your money is actually going, and whether you are prepared to make any drastic change in your spending habits, then decide what you want most. Cut down on vacation and entertainment costs if you would enjoy a television set more. Do without a car or expensive furniture until you can better afford a new house.

Mr. Oliver says interest costs on time payments and charge accounts should be included among expenses. Using borrowed money or credit is a practical idea if you can afford it, know how much it is costing you, and don't overdo it. If your payments have begun to take 20 to 25 per cent of your take-home pay, you ought not to take on more.

Mr. Oliver says any budget should leave a cushion, a personal allowance you don't keep

track of. It should also leave a cushion for emergencies and unexpected spending.

SAVING AN ATTITUDE

Saving should be part of it. "What you save is not so much a matter of income as it is a matter of attitude. In almost every income bracket there are some who save and some who are in debt. But don't say when you are setting up a budget that you will save whatever is left over. There is never anything left over."

If you cannot save any other way, a plan which deducts money from your salary or bank account may help.

Mr. Oliver says investments should wait until you have a cushion, too. He suggests the equivalent of three to six months salary in the bank, plus life insurance, is enough cushion to free some money for investment.

If you are not certain how to organize your budget, there are books on the subject, you can get advice from banks, from some finance companies, and from some social agencies.

A breakfast brightener

To my mind, there's nothing quite so relaxing as being able to linger over a leisurely weekend or holiday breakfast that's a little out of the ordinary.

Such a breakfast demands fruit, of course. In season, I like icy-cold cantaloupe or honeydew melon with wedges of lime.

Crisp cereal is next—but don't serve it too generously because there's more to come.

For the piece de resistance, I'd suggest a special pancake or waffle with syrup or honey and deliciously crisp bacon or sausages. You might prefer back bacon or grilled ham to the more usual side ham—but with pancakes or waffles, there's no need for eggs.

Add fresh, fragrant cups of coffee and you have a treat to please family and visitors any day of the week.

FLUFFY BLUEBERRY PANCAKES

2½ cups biscuit mix
¼ cup sugar
¾ teaspoon baking soda
2 eggs
1 cup buttermilk
¼ cup vegetable oil
1 cup fresh blueberries
Combine biscuit mix, sugar and baking soda lightly but thoroughly. (Do not sift.)
Beat eggs until very thick and light. Stir in buttermilk. Add to dry mixture, combining only until dry mixture is dampened. Lightly stir in oil, then fold in berries.

Have a griddle medium-hot and lightly greased. Spoon of the batter. When the pancakes have puffed and bubbles break on top, they should be done on the bottom. Turn and brown second side.

Serve very hot with honey and sour cream, or with syrup and crisp bacon. Makes 12 to 13 pancakes.

PECAN WAFFLES

2 cups sifted cake flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
¾ teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons sugar
2 eggs
1 cup milk
5 tablespoons melted shortening
¾ cup chopped pecans
Measure once-sifted flour into a sifter; add baking powder, salt and sugar.

Beat eggs until light. Add milk. Sift in dry mixture all at once, add shortening and pecans.

beat with egg beater just until combined. Stir in pecans. Bake in hot waffle iron according to instructions for the iron. Serve with syrup, crisp bacon, etc. Or serve with ice cream and a butterscotch sauce. Makes four 7-inch waffles.

FEATHERWEIGHT PANCAKES

These pancakes are very rich and delicate—something quite special when served with crisp bacon and an orange or blueberry sauce. Or try them as a dessert, with sugar and lemon.

2/3 cup sifted pastry flour
OR 1/2 cup sifted all-purpose flour
¼ teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon fruit sugar
6 eggs
1 cup commercial sour cream

Sift together the flour, sugar and salt.

Separate eggs. Beat whites until stiff but not dry and set aside. Beat yolks until very thick, light and lemon colored. Lightly stir in sour cream, then the flour mixture. Fold in whites.

Drop by small spoonfuls into hot butter or margarine in a frying pan. When browned on one side, turn and brown second side. Serve very hot. (TNS)

Questions readers ask

Q—I am not doing very well in high school. My grandmother keeps urging me to eat more fish and celery because she says they are brain foods. Is she right?

A—No, fish and celery are not brain foods. Your grandmother's belief possibly comes from the fact that nerve tissue which makes up part of our brains is rich in phosphorus and fish provides phosphorus containing compounds. But meat, poultry, eggs and milk are also rich in this nutrient. Just why celery could be thought to be a brain food is a mystery because celery contains very little phosphorus.

Q—Is it true that adolescents and adult women have greater need of iron than adult men?

A—Yes, according to Frederick J. Stare, M.D., professor of nutrition, Harvard School of Public Health. In his comprehensive new book, "Eating For Good Health," he writes, "Adolescents and adult women have need of more iron than do adult men."

"Particular attention should be given to menu planning for these groups to see that good sources of this mineral are provided daily—meats, dried beans and peas, enriched cereals and breads and highly colored fruits and vegetables, particularly those that are yellow and green."

"The diets of teen-age girls are inclined to be low not only in iron but also in vitamins A, and C and calcium. This again helps to emphasize the desirability of seeing that foods are chosen wisely from a wide variety of sources."

News flashes from around the world

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—The general council of the United Church of Canada enters its second week of sessions today after a full weekend of social events and services.

Saturday afternoon more than 1,000 commissioners, delegates and their wives were guests of Premier Smallwood at his country home at Roache's Line 40 miles west of here.

Delegates were left with Sunday free and most went sight-seeing with members of the United Church here. Sunday night, more than 6,000 people from throughout the Avalon Peninsula packed Memorial Stadium for service conducted by Rev. Dr. Frederick Grieves, immediate past president of Methodist conference in Great Britain.

The Council today continues consideration of a report on the distribution and use of tobacco.

NORFOLK, Va. (AP)—One-time hurricane Dora, now a wet and windy tropical storm, sped northeastward into the Atlantic today, her savage assault on the United States apparently at an end.

Barring an abrupt change of course, the weather bureau said, Dora no longer threatened any land area even though she might, over the water, regain her hurricane punch.

HAMILTON, Bermuda (AP)—Hurricane Ethel swirled into the chilly North Atlantic today after her fringe winds brushed Bermuda. At the same time, tropical storm Gladys was moving in from the east toward Puerto Rico.

No deaths were caused on Bermuda by Ethel, but trees were blown down, power lines cut, boats sunk and roads flooded. Winds averaged 75 miles an hour with gusts up to 100.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—More than 2,000 seamen thronged the streets of this ancient port city Sunday night as more foreign fishing vessels eased through the narrows to escape Hurricane Ethel.

More than 70 ships were tied up along the harbor's mile-long waterfront and in some places were docked three and four abreast. Most of the ships are of the Portuguese white fleet which has been visiting this port regularly for hundreds of years.

Also in port is the Gil Eannes, the Portuguese hospital ship that serves the white fleet on its annual fishing tour of the Grand Banks and the Greenland sea.

Also in port is the United States Coast Guard cutter Westwind.

LONDON (Reuters)—More than two decades later, a historian's verdict of the controversial Dieppe raid of Aug. 19, 1942, is that it was worth while—despite its lack of success and its heavy toll.

The verdict is that of Sir James Butler, who gives his opinion in Volume III of the official History of the Second World War, just published by the British government station-

ery office. Butler, professor emeritus of modern history at Cambridge University, says the assault, although far from successful, paid high dividends in lessons that were put to good use when the time came for the actual invasion of Nazi-held Europe.

Bolster air power in Malaya

SINGAPORE (Reuters)—Britain moved today to bolster its air power in Malaysia as the threat of war with Indonesia continued to loom over the year-old federation.

An air force spokesman here said "some" Canberra jets were being transferred from Cyprus, but he declined to say how many.

(A London report said 10 photo-reconnaissance Canberras had moved from Cyprus to Singapore.)

Britain has already taken steps to strengthen its Far East fleet with two destroyers and two frigates sent from the Mediterranean.

Last week some 500 men of the British army's 22nd Light Air Defence Regiment were flown from West Germany.

The spokesman today emphasized that all reinforcements were "precautionary measures."

HEIGHTEN WAR FEARS

Recent newspaper reports that Britain is considering striking at Indonesian military bases have heightened war fears here.

However, Malaysian officials have given assurances that they are not considering retaliation for armed Indonesian landings in Malaysian territory. Indonesian troops, guerrillas and Malaysian dissidents were landed by parachute and boat on the Malaysian mainland Aug. 17 and Sept. 2.

Malaysia charged Indonesia with aggression before the United Nations Security Council last week. Debate on the charge was to resume in the council today.

Indonesian President Sukarno has pledged to "crush Malaysia" by Jan. 1. He views the federation, formed last year of Malaya, Singapore, Sarawak and Sabah (North Borneo), as a plot to maintain colonialist influence in Southeast Asia.

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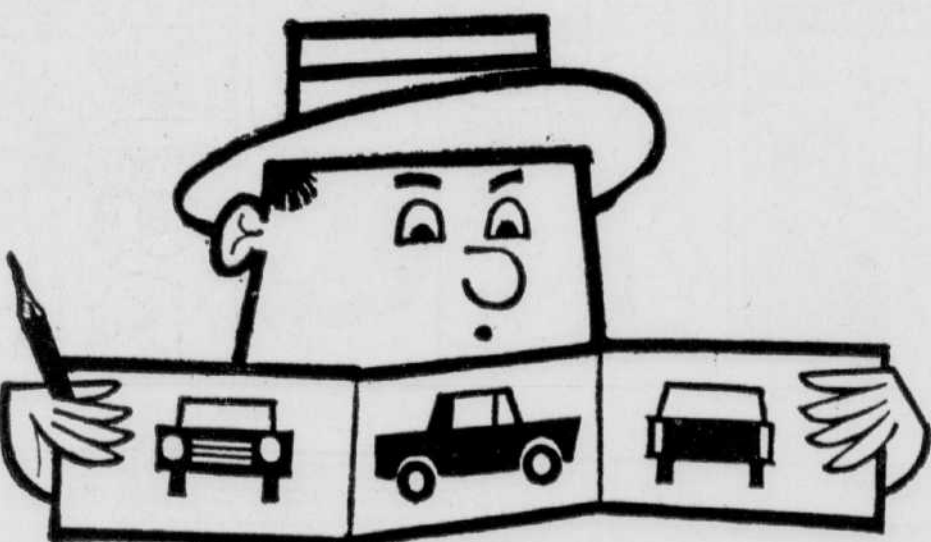
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Drummondville edges Granby twice for playoff crown

Pedro Ramos turns in fine job in relief and Yanks stop Twins 5-2, Orioles, White Sox lose Sunday

When he came to New York Yankees last week, Pedro Ramos brought along his wide-brimmed stetson hats, black shirts with white mother-of-pearl buttons and tight black cowboy pants.

Ramos, however, apparently left something behind—his ineffectiveness.

The 29-year-old Cuban allowed only two hits in five innings of relief Sunday as the Yankees defeated Minnesota Twins 5-2 and slipped into second place, one game behind Baltimore Orioles, in the searing American League pennant chase.

The Yankees acquired Ramos from Cleveland Indians hoping he could help their floundering bullpen staff.

With the Indians, the right-hander compiled a 7-10 record with a poor 5.14 earned-run average, splitting his time evenly between starting and relieving.

HELPING YANKEES

His performance Sunday, though, indicated Ramos could help the Yankees get into the World Series for a record-tying fifth consecutive year.

The 10-year veteran has permitted just two runs in 9 1/3 innings of relief with New York. He was called on for his fourth appearance in eight games when starter Whitey Ford was forced to leave the game after four innings.

Ramos gave up only a leadoff triple to Jimmie Hall in the seventh inning and a single to Hal Bressoud in the eighth.

Don Lock unloaded a pair of bases-empty homers and Don Zimmer stroked four hits, helping the Senators' Claude Osteen to his 14th triumph in 25 decisions.

Elsewhere in the AL Sunday, Kansas City Athletics trimmed Baltimore 7-5, Cleveland nipped Chicago White Sox 5-4, Boston Red Sox edged Los Angeles Angels 4-3 and Washington Senators whipped Detroit Tigers 5-1.

On Saturday the Orioles shaded the Athletics 1-0, Cleveland outslugged Chicago 11-10, the Yankees edged the Twins 4-3, Detroit nipped the Senators 6-5 and the Angels downed Boston 3-2.

FORD INJURES HEEL

Ford had to leave the game Sunday because of a contusion of his right heel suffered when he landed on first base in beating out an infield single in the second inning. Pepitone drove in three of New York's runs with a two-run homer in the second inning and a single in the third.

A run-scoring single by the Athletics' Bert Campaneris in the fifth inning snapped a 5-5 deadlock. Ed Charles knocked in four runs with two doubles while Rocky Colavito belted his 33rd homer.

The White Sox tumbled into third place, 1 1/2 games behind Baltimore with their fifth loss in seven games.

Jim Bunning stops Giants, on way to new mark

Jim Bunning, Philadelphia's ace right hander, is three steps away from a rare pitching double that hasn't been accomplished in 40 years.

Bunning, who earlier this season pitched a perfect game, posted his 17th victory Sunday in the National League leaders' 4-1, 10-inning triumph over San Francisco Giants and took another giant stride toward becoming a 20-game winner in each league.

Only nine pitchers in major league history ever have posted 20 victories in both the National and American leagues, among them Cy Young, Jack Chesbro and Joe McGinnity. Bunning, however, could become the first since Carl Mays in 1924.

Mays, a submarine specialist, won 20 games in the AL with Boston in 1917 and 1918 and with New York Yankees in 1920 and 1921 before switching to the National League and becoming a 20-game winner with Cincinnati.

Bunning, who won 20 games with Detroit in 1957, likely will make four or five more starts in the Phillies' final 19 games. He checked the Giants on seven hits, bringing his record to 17-4—best in the majors on a percentage basis.

PRESERVE THEIR EDGE

Bunning's pitching and a three-run 10th built on Tony Taylor's double, a single by Johnny Callison and Richie Allen's homer kept the Phillies' bulge at six games over the second-place St. Louis Cardinals.

The Cardinals rapped 18 hits while the Cubs contributed seven errors to their downfall. Dick Groat lashed four hits, driving in three runs, while Mike Shannon knocked in four runs. Shannon, Julian Javier and Lou Brock homered in support of Curt Simmons' 15th victory against nine defeats.
