U.K. LABOR GOVERNMENT WILL REMAIN IN OFFICE

World News In Brief

London, Feb. 25.—(AP)—“Well, they're in—but for how long?”

The Conservative London Daily Mail carried that top headline this morning over the story of Labor's narrow win in Thursday's election.

The Conservative Daily Graphic's banner was one word—“stalemate.”

The independent Times, unruffled as usual, carried a two-column headline on its main news page—page six.

It observed quietly, “Narrow margin for Labor.”

Hof, Germany, Feb. 25.—(AP)—German police said today four Czechoslovak soldiers in full uniform fled across the border into west Germany Wednesday. They told police they had been assigned to cutting wood near the border. They used the chance to flee because “we have too much work and get too little to eat.”

London, Feb. 25.—(AP)—Lloyds of London, world famous firm of underwriters, has lost \$25,000 (\$77,500) as a result of Britain's election, it was estimated today.

For premium of \$5,000 Lloyds took on a total liability of \$30,000 in guaranteeing Liberal party candidates against loss of their deposits.

Under British election law each candidate posts \$150, which is forfeited if he does not receive one-eighth of the vote in the district.

Lloyds insured the Liberals against loss of deposits, after the first 50, up to a maximum of 250.

At the end of last night's counting the Liberals had forfeited 314 deposits.

Nis, Yugoslavia, Feb. 25.—(AP)—American minister Donald R. Heath led his 49-member delegation out of Bulgaria today, branding her Red government as an enemy of freedom.

Heath, who had served as American minister in Sofia until the United States broke diplomatic relations with Bulgaria Tuesday, spoke bitterly of Bulgarian charges that he had served as a spy.

In an interview aboard the train carrying out the American diplomats, Heath, haggard after two years behind the iron curtain, said:

“There can be little doubt here that there is no question of justice or of a threat to Bulgaria's security.”

“Here is a deliberate, meticulously planned campaign to create fear and distrust of the United States and to violate the rules, not only of diplomacy, but of civilization,” Heath declared.

Eight Hurt In Crash At St. Cyrille

St. Cyrille, Que., Feb. 25.—(AP)—Rail traffic was resumed near this Eastern Township village this morning following a five-hour tie-up of east-west Canadian National Railways traffic when two passenger trains collided head-on last night.

Seven passengers and a railway engineer were taken to hospital suffering from minor bruises.

The crash involved the west-bound Maritime Express and the east-bound Nova Scotian on a single line track located about a mile from here and five miles from Drummondville.

I was aboard the Nova Scotian when it crashed into the Maritime Express. The Scotian was going at a moderate rate of speed and the Express must have been going slowly too, for only the engines and baggage cars were derailed.

All injured passengers were riding in day coaches. Five of the injured were aboard the Scotian and two on the Express. Last night that it planned to take passengers aboard the Express to Montreal, 63 miles northwest of Drummondville, by bus. But the company said this morning that only 10 passengers had left the train and had taken a bus for Montreal.

An auxiliary emergency crew arrived here some time after the crash occurred at 10:45 P. M. EST to clear the line. It was planned to tow the two locomotives, which suffered only slight damage, to St. Roseville. The impact derailed both locomotives but left them standing upright beside the track.

Drummondville police blamed traffic signals put out of service by an accident earlier yesterday for the collision.

I was told by the engineer of the Scotian that he saw the Express in time to apply the emergency brakes.

Names of the railroad engineer and the seven injured persons were not available.

Most Observers, However, Believe New Election Will Be Called Within Few Months.

London, Feb. 25.—(AP)—Prime Minister Attlee announced today his Labor party will remain in office, despite the shaky majority it obtained in the general election.

The decision was taken at an emergency meeting of the cabinet at 10 Downing Street, which lasted 1 1/4 hours.

It means that Labor, which scraped through with a bare over-all majority in the House of Commons in Thursday's voting, will form another government.

With six results still to come, Labor has a working margin of 10 votes in the new 625-seat house.

How long Labor can remain in power was anybody's guess. Its hold was so precarious that a new election within a short time was widely predicted.

As he left the cabinet session, Attlee told reporters:

“Well, we are carrying on.”

Later, the cabinet issued a formal statement which said:

“The cabinet met this morning to consider the situation arising from the general election.

“After consultation with his colleagues, the Prime Minister has decided that as the House of Commons will contain a majority of Labor members, it is the duty of the present administration to continue in office, for the King's government must be carried on.”

“The Prime Minister hopes that now that the election is over, all will once more give their full efforts to carrying forward the necessary work of the nation.”

After the cabinet meeting, Attlee stepped into an automobile, driven by Mrs. Attlee, and left to spend the week-end in the country.

In a record-smashing vote, Labor's over-all majority of 140 in the old House of Commons was whittled down to a mere nine.

Allowing for the fact that the speaker, who is a Conservative, votes only in a case of a tie, the socialist working majority now stands at 10.

The result in Ross and Cromarty is expected during the day.

Results in four other remote Scottish constituencies will be announced Monday and a by-election will be held March 9 in Manchester-Moss Side owing to the death of a candidate.

Britons, voting on the broad issue of socialism versus private enterprise after five years of socialist government, gave Labor 314 seats, just one more than the figure necessary for an over-all majority in the 625-seat House of Commons.

Inspired by Winston Churchill's “right road for Britain” challenge, the Conservatives almost upset Labor in the see-saw election race.

More than 28,000,000 of Britain's 34,000,000 persons qualified to vote registered their decision in the ballot boxes.

The Conservatives obtained 279 seats, coupled with supporting groups this swelled their strength to 295.

The Liberals won eight seats. The communists and smaller groups failed to win a seat but two Irish nationalists were elected.

The 67-year-old Attlee was understood to feel that it is Labor's duty to carry on in office if it has an absolute majority, however small. If he is still of this mind and the cabinet agrees with his view, Attlee will meet the new Parliament March 1.

But political observers did not believe that Labor could remain in office long with such a precarious control of the House of Commons.

Many London morning newspapers speculated on how soon a new election would be held and most expressed the belief that it would come within a few months.

Formation of a coalition government also was mentioned and although this is considered unlikely the possibility of a Labor-Liberal tie-up was not ruled out.

Prime Minister Attlee is expected today or tomorrow to give the King the Cabinet's decision on the future course of the government. His Majesty now is at Windsor Castle.

Of the deferred seats, the Conservatives and their allies took four to Labor's two in the socialist landslide of 1945. Five of the seats are in remote Scottish districts.

Allowing for the Speaker, Douglas Clifton Brown, who was elected as a Conservative but is a non-party man in the house and has no vote except in the case of a tie.

Statement By Husband Is Rejected

U.M.W. Goes On Trial On Monday

Washington, Feb. 25.—(AP)—Government officials urgently produced coal peace talks today in hope of a break in the strike before the union faces trial on contempt charges Monday. But they weren't optimistic.

With the United States fuel crisis growing steadily worse there seemed little basis for figuring any settlement was near.

Mediation chief Cyrus S. Ching, one of the men President Truman has assigned to try to end the eight-month-long dispute, said there hasn't been any progress since the present court-directed bargaining got underway on Feb. 15.

“The situation is exactly the same as it was when these conferences started,” the Canadian-born Ching said.

Nevertheless, as the union-operator talks resumed Ching and David L. Cole said they were redoubling their efforts over the week-end for an 11th-hour compromise. Cole is chairman of Truman's coal inquiry board.

The two officials held secret meetings yesterday with John L. Lewis and his aides, but apparently nothing came of the talks with the United Mine Workers leader.

Lewis left later for Springfield, Ill., to attend the funeral of a brother. His absence from the week-end coal negotiations was a surprise.

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Jules Sioui Has Started New Strike

Quebec, Feb. 25.—(AP)—Jules Sioui, 43-year-old Huron Indian, says he is on a hunger strike and will continue it until “I obtain justice in my case.”

Sioui, who refuses to recognize authority of Canadian courts to try him on charges of conspiracy to defraud and disturbing the peace, indicated justice will be done if Prime Minister St. Laurent “steps in” and the charges are dropped.

The charges grew out of the volatile little Huron's activities as secretary-treasurer of an organization called “the government of the North American Indian nation.”

His trial was postponed Thursday and is scheduled to follow the murder trial of J. Albert Guay now in progress.

With his wife he is running his little grocery store in the nearby Loretteville Indian village. He is also a barber.

“I'm feeling quite well,” he said in French, speaking slowly as if tired. He admits he can't speak a word of the Indian tongue.

Sioui said he is subsisting on one pint daily of boiled water to which are added two teaspoons of dissolved sugar.

Sioui, who acts as his own defence lawyer, was acquitted Dec. 13 on a charge of seditious conspiracy. The Quebec Court of Appeal said he was innocent.

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No New Evidence Indicated As Trial Of Guay Begins

Quebec, Feb. 25.—(AP)—The crown got in its first formal courtroom licks at J. Albert Guay yesterday, the second day of the trial of the little Quebec jeweller for wife-murder.

In his address to a 12-man jury completed only yesterday morning, veteran crown prosecutor Noel Dorion said the crown will attempt to prove the Guay arrangement for a mystery package to be placed aboard an airliner; that the package caused the crash which killed Guay's wife, Rita, and 22 others Sept. 9.

The crown prosecutor, speaking in French for half an hour, gave no hint of anything new in the crown's case since Guay's preliminary hearing last fall.

Evidence of only one witness was heard yesterday. It was largely of a technical nature and given by Captain Paul Marcel Boisvert of Canadian Pacific Airlines.

At request of the defence, court adjourned until 10 A. M. Monday. Defence counsel Gerard Levesque said he wished to obtain the services of an expert witness and also that he himself was suffering from influenza. A jury request for supervised outings was granted.

Mr. Dorion said the Crown will show there was a “laissez-faire” attitude on the part of Captain Boisvert with whom Guay lived for a time in a St. Lawrence settlement on the north shore.

Also, the Crown will show that its key witness, Mrs. Arthur Pitre, bought 20 pounds of dynamite in August for Guay, that early Sept.

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Night Club Is Scene Of Gun Fight

New York, Feb. 25.—(AP)—A blazing gun battle in a Greenwich Village night club early today terrorized scores of patrons. Three men, including a policeman, were wounded.

Police said seven bandits, stationed at strategic spots about the club, tried to rob the late-hour crowd.

One of the hold-up men strode to the stage where entertainers were performing, shoved a singer out of the way, drew a gun, and announced over the microphone to the crowd:

“This is a stickup. Put your jewelry, purses and money on the tables. I've got six others with me.”

At the same moment, police said, other gunmen stood up about the room, gun in hand.

Confusion followed. Some guests dropped to the floor, covering under tables. Others ran screaming. There was rapid gunfire.

One of two detectives in the night club at the time, John O'Neill, was hit in the right thigh.

Four men were wounded, two of them wounded in the wild gun fight. Police said three other men fled.

The shooting took place in the Moroccan Village club.

Tables and chairs were overturned and glassware shattered by the panicked crowd during the fracas. Approximately a dozen shots were fired.

Police said one of the holdup men fled outside and commandeered a taxi cab, but was captured several blocks away when the cab driver braked his cab in front of a police car and dropped to the floor.

Nightclub singer Blackie Dennis was performing when the robbery attempt took place. About ten other men and women entertained, and a six-man orchestra were on the stage with her.

The holdup ringleader shoved her aside and told the other entertainers, “All right, all of you get over there by the wall.”

Then he faced the crowd, while his accomplices brandished guns at persons in other parts of the bar and dining room.

Hatcheck girl Virginia Fay said one bandit pointed a gun at her and ordered her inside a closet adjoining the hatcheck room.

A half-dozen police squad cars converged on the night club.

Held under arrest were James Ford, Negro, Paul Comps, 33, John Shell, 29, and George Warrell, 27.

Ford was wounded in the stomach, Comps in the arm and left chest.

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Canada To Spend More On Defence During Coming Year

Ottawa, Feb. 25.—(AP)—Finance Minister Abbott, presenting a 1950-51 expenditure bill of \$2,508,000,000 to the Commons yesterday, gave members some indication of what the cold war in Europe is costing Canada.

He said that Canada's defence estimates for the coming fiscal year will total \$425,000,000, a figure greater than that of all government expenditures combined in many pre-war years. The amount is an increase of \$42,000,000 over defence expenditures for the current year ending March 31.

Part of the defence expenditures will buy new equipment for the navy, army and air force. It is believed that another portion will go toward paying Canada's still undefined commitments under the North Atlantic pact.

But the increased expenditures for defence were topped by added outlays in the health department, largely due to changes in family allowances and old-age pensions legislation last year. Expenditures on health and welfare in the coming year will total \$455,253,570, compared with \$410,890,456 in the current fiscal year.

Mr. Abbott made it clear that the bill of \$2,508,000,000—\$27,000,000 below estimated expenditures for 1949-50—does not represent the final amount the government expects to spend.

Supplementary estimates will be presented later to cover the deficits of the Crown-owned Canadian National Railways and Trans-Canada Air Lines and other unforeseen expenditures.

Last year, the C.N.R. had a deficit of \$33,500,000 and T.C.A. also ran into the red.

“I not only hope; but I expect, that this year will be less than the total of \$48,000,000 brought in last fall—considerably less—unless we are confronted with a serious worsening in the economic situation or the international situation,” said Mr. Abbott.

The minister, who has been striving for months to bring expenditures into line with decreasing revenues, said that his own department expects to save more than \$66,000,000 this year largely as a result of reductions in interest payments on the public debt.

The debt has been reduced in the last three years by sizeable surpluses of revenues over expenditures. Mr. Abbott has forecast a surplus of about \$90,000,000 for the current year, compared with a surplus of \$595,000,000 for last year.

Because of tax cuts in the last budget and because of the measure of reduction in expenditures, there was some speculation that Mr. Abbott will not be able to make many tax reductions this year.

The 1950-51 estimates contained no extraordinary provision for the relief of unemployment. The resources and development department again will ask for a vote of \$2,000,000 from which all departments can draw to plan or initiate projects aimed at relieving unemployment. Once the project is started Parliament can be asked to vote the full amount needed.

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U.S. Freezes Assets Of Soviet Satellite States

Washington, Feb. 25.—(AP)—The sudden freezing of Bulgarian, Hungarian and Rumanian assets in the United States sent American relations with the Soviet satellites skidding to a new low today.

Closely following the breaking of relations with Bulgaria earlier in the week, attorney-general J. Howard McGrath announced last night that the United States has halted payments from bank accounts and other assets held here by citizens of the three eastern European countries.

Only a few hours before, state secretary Dean Acheson had indicated that the U.S. virtually has given up hope of protecting American citizens and their interests in the three countries. He hinted that the next step may be the rupture of relations with Hungary and Rumania.

The justice department said the satellite assets were frozen because of a delay in compensating American claims in the three communist countries.

It wouldn't say whether the action was connected with the conviction of Robert Vogel, American business man, in Hungary a few days ago on charges of espionage. A Budapest court sentenced Vogel to 15 years imprisonment.

Similar charges have been hurled at American envoys in all three countries.

The U.S. broke off relations with Bulgaria Tuesday because that country refused to drop its request for the recall of American minister Donald Heath, whom it

charged with plotting against the Sofia government.

In his press conference yesterday, Acheson made clear that this country feels Bulgaria took the initiative in forcing the break in relations. He indicated that the other two Balkan countries are trying to bring on similar action by keeping up the pressure against American diplomats.

In the case of Hungary, the state department now is considering a demand that the U.S. reduce the size of its Budapest mission, some of whose members have been accused of spying.

It seems possible that the U.S. will reject the charges but withdraw the individuals. In retaliation the Hungarians may be compelled to recall some of their representatives in Washington.

Acheson did not spell out the difficulties which have beset American officials in Rumania but he dealt with that country along with the other two.

He said the state department is not considering severing its ties with either Hungary or Rumania, but he made clear that the possibility is wide open.

Both sides presented their cases in a most pleasing manner, showing that much time had been devoted to both research and preparation.

Today the age of Science is considered as that period embracing the years 1800-50.

Among some of the arguments presented in favor of scientific discoveries were the making of nylon, insecticides, which helped the farmer, the analysis of soil and tests showing crops best suited to the ground.

In the field of medicine the discovery of a vaccine against yellow fever, made possible the building of the Panama Canal, the discovery of penicillin, which has done so much for mankind, and which has also aided the farmer, in the care of his stock, as it can also be

used for curing sick animals. Water power has given man light, heat and power at a nominal figure, while the perfecting of motor equipment, has given the farmer the tractor, milking machine and many other useful helps. Science has by its discovery of many aids to health, increased the life expectancy of man from 48 years in 1800 to that of 65 years in 1950.

The radio has given pleasure to thousands, and in the cases of invalids is a source of great enjoyment. Plastic surgery has brought happiness to many, by the removal of unsightly blemishes.

Science has allowed of extensive work in jungles, which before, was impossible, by the providing of means of combatting the many pests and insects. Synthetic rubber, developed during the war years, did much in winning the war, as otherwise it would have been impossible to have made use of motorized equipment. The telephone is one of the many helps provided by science.

Among the arguments used in rebuttal were cited that today two men can do the work formerly done by ten, owing to the improvements in machines, and this causes unemployment, which in turn causes great unhappiness.

Continued Interest In Teachers' Training Course Is Being Shown

The third meeting of the series of five instruction periods for Sunday School Teachers being held under the auspices of the Sherbrooke Protestant Ministerial Association was held in the Baptist Church with more than thirty teachers present. Rev. O. L. Davidson conducted a service of worship and followed this with the presentation of study material from the text book "The Bible and Christian Living."

Mr. Davidson in his remarks traced the idea of the Messiah as it grew in the minds of the Hebrew Prophets. The great longing for a fuller revelation of God was ever nurtured in the hearts of the devoted servants of God, and even though the thought was vague at times, yet it burned as a fire of hope and was passed on from one generation to another as a peculiar heritage of these people.

The very fact that they believed so firmly in this led them to live lives in keeping with their expectations and helped prepare the way for the coming of Christ. When Jesus did come and begin his ministry, his teachings and conceptions of God's will for mankind were so far in advance of anything that the Hebrew people had expected, that many of them were unable to believe in Him. "But," as it is recorded in the Gospel of St. John, "to as many as believed, to them gave he power to become the sons of God."

"And out of the small believing minority grew the Christian Church of today. Jesus came teaching the gospel of the Kingdom of God, a Kingdom that must be within men, an eternal Kingdom of righteousness, something present, but still in the making. As the disciples lived and travelled with Jesus, as they watched Him heal the sick, restore sight to the blind, raise the dead, teach the ignorant, feed the hungry, bless the little children, they became aware of the great new qualities of life which Jesus made manifest. The idea of the spiritual kingdom took root slowly with them at first, but nevertheless it grew, and is still growing in the world today.

The teachers were given an excellent demonstration in the use of the flannel-graph in teaching by Miss Haines. She prefaced her demonstration with personal and amusing stories of actual experiences she has had in Florida and elsewhere in her use of the flannel-graph, and then proceeded to build up Bible story in word and picture for the benefit of those present. So easily did she capture the attention and imagination of her listeners, and so keen was their interest in her skillful presentation, that all were sorry when she had finished. Rev. R. C. Tait expressed very fittingly the thanks of the group to Miss Haines.

Rev. O. L. Davidson then gave a demonstration of the use of the S-V-E film slide and film-strip projector as a means of teaching. He showed how very effectively pictures could be used to gain and to hold the attention of children, and how the teaching of a lesson could be greatly improved by means of a visual as well as an oral explanation.

The teachers were asked to present questions, problems, etc., at the next meeting. These will be answered in the form of a panel discussion at the concluding session of the school.

The next meeting will be held Monday evening, February 27, at Grace Chapel. A special feature of this meeting will be a discussion of primary Sunday School methods for the primary teachers by Mrs. George Hall, and a demonstration of the preparation and teaching of the lesson to be used in the junior and intermediate classes for Sunday, March 5. The teachers are asked to bring their teachers' lesson books with them for this meeting.

The teachers and officers of the Baptist Sunday School served refreshments at the conclusion of the meeting.

Community Chest Campaign Has Been Postponed Until Early Next Autumn

The Sherbrooke-Lennoxville Community Chest campaign has been postponed until next fall and will be run in late September and early October in conjunction with the national Red Feather campaign.

This decision was taken at a meeting held Thursday night by members of the Community Chest executive and representatives of the seven organizations served by the Chest—the Sherbrooke Library, Lennoxville Library, St. John Ambulance, Boy Scouts, Salvation Army, Y.M.C.A. and Y.W.C.A.

When the Community Chest was set up here originally, two years ago, the late winter date was chosen for the campaign at the request of the Red Cross society, whose national campaign takes place at about the same time.

Last year the Red Cross withdrew from the Community Chest at the request of their national headquarters and conducted their own campaign. They have already set their dates for the 1950 campaign, to start next week and coincide with the national Red Cross drive.

To avoid a conflict of dates the Community Chest decided Thursday night to move its dates to correspond with the nation wide Community Chest drive. The local group will unite with the Red Feather Federation of Community Chests.

While the new dates will be of value to the local Community Chest in that it will share in the national publicity that accompanies the Red Feather drives, the appeal to be launched in the fall will have to cover an 18-month budget.

Most of the organizations in the Chest will have to arrange for special financing to carry on their activities during the months before next fall's campaign as the funds they would have received from a late winter drive will, of course, not be available now.

Consequently, when the campaign does take place an objective considerably higher than last year's \$23,000, which was not met, will have to be set and wider and more generous public support will be needed.

Forest Keene will be campaign organizer and with Eric Webster will be joint chairman for the English-speaking organization in Sherbrooke. Ernie Chalut will be the French-language chairman while Col. L. M. Watson and E. W. Gilbey will be in charge in Lennoxville.

LETTER FROM BRITAIN— A New Caledonian Market

Before World War II the Caledonian market was one of the snow places of London, with over a thousand stalls where one could buy any kind of antique from old candlesticks to "genuine" Old Masters. No visit to Britain's capital was complete which did not include a trip to the market and a few minutes' bargain hunting there.

But the market, which was held in north-east London in the Caledonian Road, was closed at the beginning of the war, and the chances of its being reopened were slim.

Realizing this, the stall holders who used to do business there decided to open a second "Caledonian" market elsewhere, and picked on a site in another London suburb, Bermonds, this time south of the River Thames. Here they have set up their stalls, hoping to attract to Bermonds as many visitors, both from Britain and overseas, as went to the old market.

The Caledonian market was probably the most famous of its kind in London, if not Britain, but it never managed to get there myself. So I was all the more interested to visit the Bermonds market on its opening day recently, and see what I had missed. Picture a broad stretch of asphalt covered with rows and rows of small tables; stallholders protected against the rain by all kinds of queer clothing and canvas windbreaks; and laid on the tables and ground, all manners of the strangest junk and works of art imaginable.

The first thing I saw was a harp, some six or seven feet high, with most of its strings missing; in a glass case nearby was a perfect model, in wood and metal, of a field gun; further on, goldfish were swimming about in a large glass tank, while on the other side of the market (believe it or not) was a sedan chair, a sort of one-man coach in which persons of fashion were carried through the streets in the 18th century. I asked the price of the sedan chair just for curiosity; but when I was asked to name my price I sensed danger. And, having no wish to become a sedan chair owner, moved off hurriedly.

Attraction For Festival Visitors
The market is little more than a mile from the Festival of Britain buildings on the south bank of the Thames, and the sellers of pictures, curios, silverware, and furniture hope that overseas visitors to the Festival in 1951 may spare a few minutes to root about among their wares. There are actually facilities at the market for packing articles for export.

The Bermonds market stands on Tower Bridge Road, which leads northwards to the nine-century-old Tower of London and the river bridge after it. And so I walked past the Tower (it's actually a castle, and apart from the keep looks very little like a tower) I was reminded of the fact that this vast stone fortress is moving at the rate of two-and-a-half inches every 100 years. Apparently scientists started measuring the rate of movement in 1919, and by 1949 the Tower had moved three-quarters of an inch. This curious fact I discovered at an exhibition held to mark the 50th anniversary of Britain's National Physical Laboratory in London recently.

To talk of what has come to be called the N.P.L. is to wade into deep waters; for this Government laboratory, which covers 50 acres and has a staff of 1,100, carries out physical research of the most involved kind—witness its ability to record the movements of the Tower of London! But perhaps I can mention one thing I saw at the exhibition also, an electronic brain which works out the most intricate mathematical problems in one thousandth of the time it would take a girl using a desk adding machine.

Another thing which caught my eye was a model of that part of London where the new Bankside power station is to be built. With

this model, and the laboratory's wind tunnel, the effect of smoke from the station's chimneys can be assessed.

Among those I noticed at the exhibition were several schoolboys, who seemed to know a good deal about the latest scientific advances than I did. They had apparently come in school hours, for I noticed some of them in earnest discussion with their teacher. For the teacher such enthusiastic interest must be gratifying. Yet visits such as these are only a part of the world curriculum at schools in Britain. I have before me as I write a list of 66 special short courses arranged by the Ministry of Education for teachers in England and Wales, ranging from such orthodox subjects as music and mathematics to nautical education and foundry practice.

The nautical course is held in the fishery port of Lowestoft on the East coast of England and will be attended by some 60 men and women teachers from coast towns. Preference will be given to head teachers. The interesting thing about this course is that the "pupils" will be given practical instruction in the use of whalers, dinghies and motor boats. They will be given lectures on boat building, marine biology and the history of the sea, and will study the landing and distribution of fish on the quay itself.

Another interesting course, too, is that on lightweight camping. We have had courses on permanent camping in Britain for years, on dealing with big tents, on cooking and sanitation and so on. But as far as lightweight camping is concerned—carrying tent, ground sheet, blankets, food, stove and everything else one's own back—this course is new. It's designed for experienced campers, who will test lightweight equipment, including different types of tent and cooking apparatus, on a week's course in the Quantock Hills, in the West of England. There will be dict tests, too, to discover the lightest and most sustaining food for the camper who takes his whole camp with him and can't spare room, or weight, for bulky or heavy foods.

Ottawa. — An interview with Norah McFarlane is as refreshing as a chat over the back fence with the kid next door. But the kid next door probably hasn't won a \$500 first prize in an international short story contest.

Sixteen-year-old Norah has done just that, and the honor hasn't turned a hair of her pretty bobbed head.

She's nothing if not modest. Her mother, Mrs. Leslie McFarlane, said that when The Canadian Press telephoned Norah recently to tell her she had won the prize in the contest conducted by the magazine, "Seventeen", the little girl didn't even say boo to the family. Mrs. McFarlane had to ask several times before Norah finally broke down and announced casually what the phone call was all about.

Norah says the news didn't really "sink in" at the time.

"I just felt very calm—not as if anything had happened," she grinned. "It really hasn't sunk in yet."

What worries her most is the thought that people will expect her to keep turning out top-notch stuff all the time.

"It sets a stand and I feel as if I'll have to be on my toes from now on," she said seriously.

Poetry At Six
When it comes to writing, Norah has been "on her toes" ever since—at the tender age of six—she wrote a verse called "Birds."

It wasn't published, but some of the poems and articles appeared in Canadian magazines before she was even into her teens.

The prize-winning story, entitled "Time of Casting Stones," is the first piece of fiction she has had accepted. The title came to her while she was leafing through the Bible and found the verse, "A time to cast away stones and a time to gather stones together."

Norah isn't the only writer in the family. Her father, Leslie McFarlane, is a producer with the National Film Board and well known in Canadian literary circles. Sister Pat, 20, and brother Brian, 18, also are interested in writing.

Norah's other interests are in illustrations—she draws for the neighborhood community centre's newspaper—and acting. She belongs to the Junior Theatre and the Ottawa Drama League workshop.

Green Berets For Canadian Rifle Regiments

The units had requested special permission from Army Headquarters to adopt the colored headress now the official dress of British rifle units with which they are affiliated.

They argued that the khaki berets clashed with their black belts and anklets.

Although the PPCLI is the only rifle regiment in the Active Force it is unlikely the unit will adopt the rifle green beret. The "Pats" recently were granted permission to wear the maroon "airborne" tam.

Boy Scouts At Shilo Undergo Winter Training

Thought to be the first Boy Scouts in Canada to take the rugged type of winter training given Canadian troops preparing for Arctic exercises, a group of boys at Shilo and Brandon, Man., have been getting a taste of how soldiers make themselves comfortable outdoors in winter.

Under direction of Thomas Stark, Field Commissioner for Boy Scouts in the area, and Scoutmaster Sergeant W. Currie of the RCAPC, Shilo, the boys have been attending lectures on a wide range of subjects from the proper method of wearing winter clothing to the raising of tents and loading of toboggans. Army training films on winter training also are shown.

The Scouts recently spent an entire Sunday outdoors in 10 below zero weather, hauling their equipment on toboggans and travelling on snowshoes. When the campsite was reached they pitched their tents and prepared a meal over open fires. Until they gain a little more experience they return to camp before dark but hope soon to sleep out overnight "on their own."

Such an overnight hike will prove equally as difficult as similar exercises conducted by troops at Shilo and Wainwright and will call for as much "know-how" as the most seasoned winter soldier needs.

Flashback

Five years ago, on March 9, 1945, the 4th Canadian Armored Brigade fought its last engagement with the enemy west of the Rhine. On the morning of that date, the Lake Superior Regiment with a squadron of the Governor General's Foot Guards carried out a rapid encircling movement on the wood between Bonninghardt and Winnenthal. Ninety prisoners were captured without a single Canadian casualty. Then the Grenadier Guards, with a company of the Algonquin Regiment, mounted an attack on Winnenthal itself. This proved to be a tougher nut to crack. Early in the afternoon, the Lake Superiors and tanks of the G.G.F.G. joined the attack. After an all-night battle the enemy admitted that the combination of infantry, tanks and flame-throwers was too much and about 200 hard-bitten paratroopers surrendered.

The 4th Canadian Armored Brigade included the Governor General's Foot Guards, the Canadian Grenadier Guards, the British Columbia Regiment. The Brigade landed in France in July 1944 and fought throughout the remainder of the European campaign until victory in May, 1945.

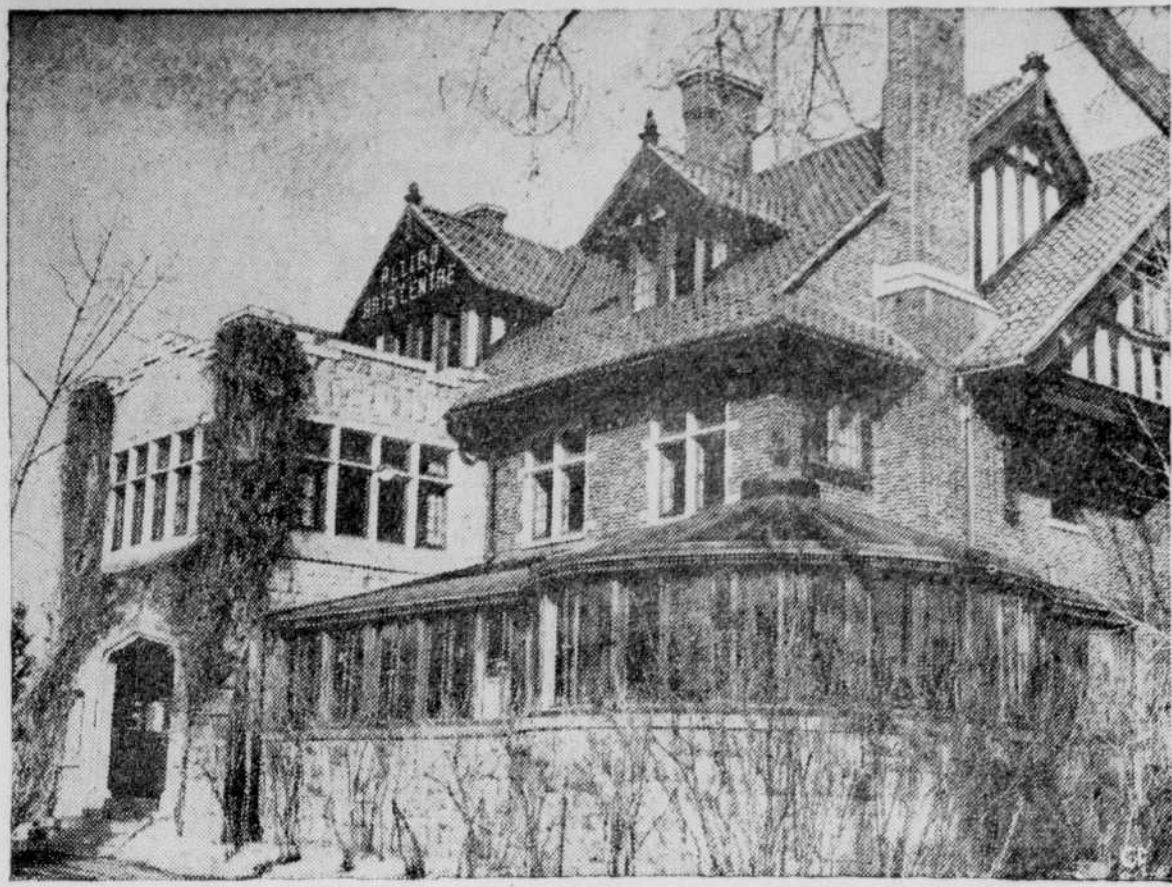

Catholic School Board Bill Is Presented

Quebec, Feb. 25.—A private bill, seeking a change in method of distribution of school-tax revenues between Protestant and Roman Catholic school boards in Sherbrooke, was made public at the legislative buildings today.
The distribution method suggested in the bill is that an amount proportionate to the value of property entered in panel number three, shall be divided between the board of Roman Catholic commissioners and the board of Protestant commissioners, proportionately to the number of children from five to 16 years of age of the two religious denominations residing in a common territory.
Under the bill the Roman Catholic board will give notice of a resolution relating to an issue of bonds or a loan without publishing the entire text but by making known the nature of such resolution and inviting ratepayers to read it at the office of the secretary-treasurer.
The bill also seeks to provide the chairman of the Catholic board an annual compensation of \$1,500 for travelling and entertainment expenses, and \$1,000 for each other member of the board for the same purposes.

Coaticook Wants School Sales Tax

Quebec, Feb. 25.—Roman Catholic school boards in four municipalities seek to levy a one-per-cent sales tax to increase revenues for education in private bills distributed today at the Legislature.
Coaticook, Sorel, St. Etienne de la Malbaie and Three Rivers school boards are seeking powers to impose the tax under a law adopted last session.
The town of Asbestos asks for additional taxation power to increase its revenues. Among the powers sought is one to impose a \$3 annual tax on any male resident, 21 years and over, and who has been a resident for three months and who is affected by other municipal taxes.

Buchanan Wins Byng Trophy

Montreal, Feb. 25.—(By Ralph Bucky) Buchanan, playing coach of Shawinigan Falls Cataracts, has become the first double winner of the Quebec Senior Hockey League's "Byng of Vimy" trophy.
The award is made annually to the most valuable player in the league. Coaching the Cats and waging a tense battle for the individual scoring title with Andre Corriveau of Valleyfield Braves has not detracted from Buchanan's effectiveness in the opinion of 10 Q.S.H.L. referees who awarded him the trophy unanimously.
Announcement of the award was made last night by Roy E. Mackenzie, league secretary-treasurer, who conducts the poll.
Mackenzie said this was the first time a player was awarded the trophy twice and also the first time the award was made by a unanimous decision.
A native of Montreal, the 27-year-old, stocky player-coach currently is enjoying his best season with the Q.S.H.L. He became coach several weeks ago when Leo Lamoureux resigned. This is his third year with Shawinigan Falls' entry in the league.
The Cats already have been eliminated from the playoffs.
The trophy first was placed for competition in 1942 when it was donated by Lady Byng.
Tony Demers, formerly with the Sherbrooke Saints, won it last year. Buchanan won it before in 1947-48.

A record of 84 per cent of Britain's qualified voters cast a total of 28,582,901 votes.
While the votes still were being counted yesterday, Morgan Phillips, Labor party secretary, said a majority of 30 seats was the minimum with which any single-party government could effectively execute its major policies.
Both Labor and Conservative leaders were dismayed by the results. Many blamed the Liberal party, which ran 474 candidates in a major—and unsuccessful—comeback effort.
One of the first problems confronting the new government is preparation of the budget, customarily brought down in April.
Should the government be defeated on any of the major issues it has promised to put through—such as further nationalization or even approval of the budget—it would have to resign. New elections then would have to be called.
One factor played up by Conservative commentators was that more Britons actually voted against Labor than for.
Attlee's party got 13,209,400 votes. Churchill's party got a close 12,408,808 votes, which added to the Liberals' 2,610,276 and other smaller parties outnumbered the Labor vote by nearly 2,000,000.
The 1,868 candidates running was the largest number ever put up for election.
Also a record was the number of candidates forced to forfeit election deposits of £150 (\$405) each for failing to get an eighth of the votes in their districts. The deposits of 49 candidates went into the treasury.
Most resounding beating of all went to the communists, whose 100 candidates managed to gather in

Montreal Theatre And Club Closed

And last night, after permits of a night spot and burlesque house were revoked, it appeared a police campaign against theatres and night clubs violating city regulations was gaining strength.
Civic authorities revoked the permit of the Gaiety, the city's top burlesque and vaudeville house on St. Catherine street, for ignoring closing hours.
At the same time, deputy police director T. O. Leggett threatened to have a summons served against owners of the Nite Cap cafe, a midtown night spot whose restaurant permit was revoked three days ago.
The permit, obligatory for any cafe serving liquor with meals, was revoked after Leggett charged the restaurant's operation was contrary to city morality by-laws. But the Nite Cap went right on serving customers and yesterday morning Leggett gave its owners 24 hours to shut down or be brought into court.

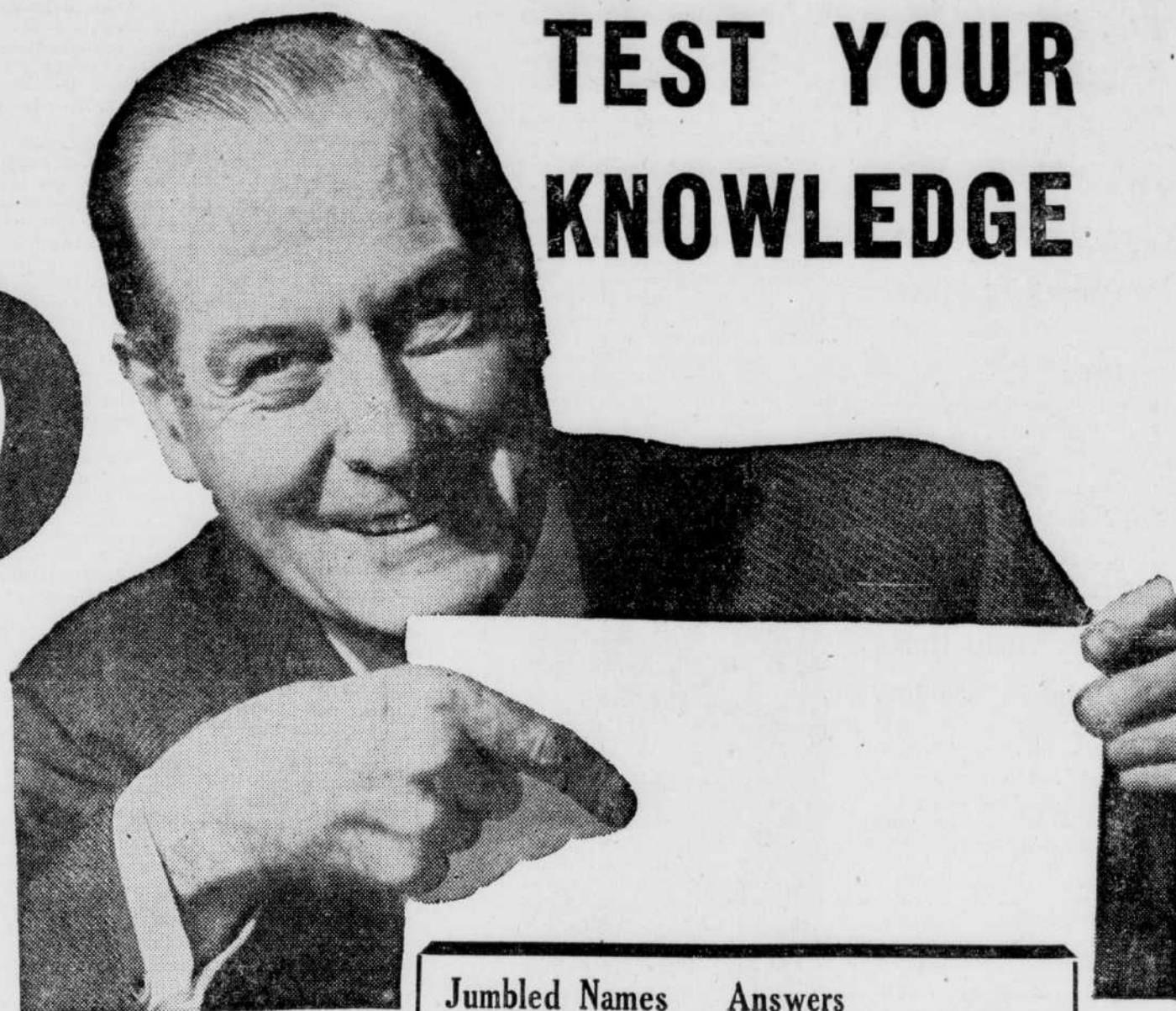

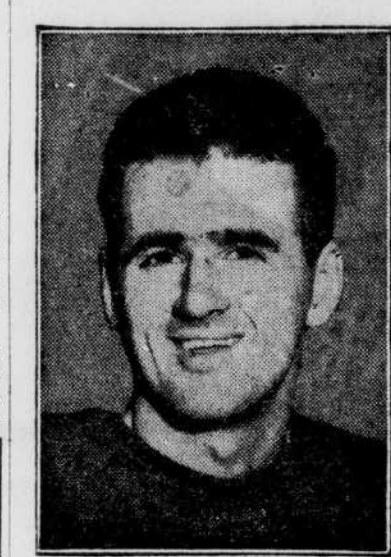

Billy Reay Fined \$100 By President Campbell

One New Champion Will Be Declared At World Figure Skating Contest Which Will Be Held At London

London, Feb. 23. — (AP) — At least one new champion will be crowned at the World Figure Skating Championships which open here March 6.

When entries closed yesterday the world pairs title was left undetested. It was won at Paris a year ago by Andrea Keckes and Ede Kiraly of Hungary.

Kiraly is back but only in the men's singles division where he is aiming at the title owned by Dick Button of Englewood, N.J. The Hungarian won the European singles title at Oslo last week-end but the 22-year-old Button will be heavily favored to keep the crown.

Aljona Savitskaya, 18-year-old Czech stylist who succeeded Ottawa's Barbara Ann Scott as champion at Paris last year, will defend her woman's title.

Carrying Canada's colors will be Toronto's Suzanne Morrow, Dominion Senior Champion for the last two years, and Marlene Smith of Niagara Falls, Ont., runner-up to Miss Morrow at the 1950 title meet in St. Catharines, Ont.

The Kennedy kids—Michael and Kay—of Seattle, Wash., probably will be favored to win the vacant Paris title. They have cleaned up all North American opposition but never have been victorious in world competition. Laszlo and Marianne Nagy of Hungary also are regarded as serious contenders.

Marlene Smith and her fiancé, Donald Gilchrist of Toronto, are expected to represent Canada in the pairs. They are the 1950 Canadian champions.

Gilchrist, Canadian men's singles titleholder, also will compete in that event.

Fifty-five skaters from 12 countries are represented. Entries have come from Austria, Belgium, Canada, Britain, Hungary, Switzerland, United States, Australia, Denmark, Italy, Czechoslovakia and France.

The championships also will include, for the first time, an International ice dance competition but only the United States and Britain will be represented in it.

'The Rocket' Leads For Lord Calvert Trophy

With the NHL campaign rapidly heading down the homestretch, Maurice Richard today regained lost ground in the Canadiens' popularity poll by dominating the latest fans' vote in the "Player of Distinction" race for the Lord Calvert Trophy.

For the first time in the last three weeks, the "Rocket" was accorded the most ballots to stretch his commanding lead in first place to 2,770 points. After being topped by Kenny Reardon and Bill Durnan in recent games, the "Habs" star jumped back into No. 1 spot in fan-dominant recognition with the return of his vaunted scoring punch. Richard's season total is 7,676 points in the Calvert voting system, which calls for three points to the first selection, two to the second, and one to the third.

While Richard holds the distinction of having led the whole team all season in the voting, his main rival, Bill Durnan, today was threatened with the loss of second place as battling Kenny Reardon continued to move closer to the goalkeeping. The rugged defenceman who dislodged Elmer Lach recently from third position has succeeded in slicing Durnan's margin to 322 points. Reardon's total now reads 4,584 points.

Another serious threat for runner-up honors was Norman Dussault to whom the fans have given heavy support in recent home contests. After having climbed all the way from 12th into fifth spot over a period of two months, the fast-skating forward has moved within 493 points of Lach in fourth place.

Scotstown was also short some of their players. For the losers R. Valcourt, in goal and Joe Gauthier, who played the whole game with out a rest on defence, were pick of the losers.

For the Flyers the defence proved to strong for Scotstown and Hubert Couture, in the nets, not only played a good game and got a shutout, but also had an assist on the Flyer's tenth goal. M. Pomeleau got the top hat for Sawyerville, also. Obie Jespersen turned a hat trick.

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Lavern Roach's Death Is Ruled "Accidental" By Medical Examiner; State Commission To Report Soon

New York, Feb. 25. — (AP) — The death of Young Lavern Roach, boxing's first fatality of 1950, was listed as "Accidental" today by the City's Chief Medical Examiner.

An autopsy was performed by Dr. Thomas A. Gonzales who said that the 24-year-old Texas died from a "subdural haemorrhage and ruptured pia emissary vein" in the brain.

The death was recorded as "accidental during a professional boxing bout."

Roach, a former Marine from Plainview, Tex., died at 12:50 p.m. Thursday following his knockout loss to George Small of Brooklyn in the 10th and last round of a feature bout at St. Nicholas Arena.

As Gonzales gave out his report, two agencies investigated the death.

The State Athletic Commission, with Chairman Eddie Egan presiding, held an open hearing and listened to 10 witnesses. At the conclusion Egan announced a report will be made "sometime next week." City was also conducting an investigation.

As part of the record, the investigating bodies had a statement from Detective Lieut. Devlin, of the New York City Police. Devlin said he had seen the match and "there does not appear to be any negligence at this time."

At Egan's hearing, most of the testimony concerned a sore nose Roach complained of last Sunday. It was brought out that five doctors examined and passed him for the bout.

But, when existing contracts expire, maybe a lot more plums will be removed from television's menu, leaving only secondary fare for an expanding public.

Why? Because a powerful combination of sports promoters and governing bodies regard television—in the present state of copyright law—as a present and future menace to their cash boxes.

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
