Some problems of Consolidated Paper

Quebec grants continuous operation of proposed new mill in Pontiac

President Fred Bradshaw, speaking to shareholders of Consolidated Paper Corporation Limited, said that the Quebec Government is preparing a revision of the Quebec Lands and Forests Act and public hearings are scheduled for May.

Consolidated and other pulp and paper companies are preparing recommendations for this hearing.

The companies are almost wholly dependent for their raw material on pulpwood cut on lands leased from the Crown. In Quebec these leases are renewable annually and since the companies have a huge investment in facilities for sound forest management and in the mills

dependent on this wood supply, they rely on the Government to continue its administration of the forest in accordance with sound economic principles.

The limit holder assumes costly responsibilities to operate the limits on a sustained yield basis and is also responsible to the Crown for their protection from fire, disease and insects.

This requires him to build a large network of roads which is of benefit to the public for recreation and other uses.

He welcomed the appointment by the Quebec Government of an inquiry into Sunday observance in pulp and paper mills and the company has presented a brief in support of continuous operation, which has been granted for the proposed new mill in Pontiac.

With the increasing shortage of fibre in Europe for the manufacture of pulp and paper products and the ever growing world demand, Mr. Bradshaw said his company is confident in the soundness of its plans for achieving increased earnings through growth and further diversification.

Pontiac-Temiscamingue to be divided into two electoral constituencies

Pontiac riding, according to the new electoral boundaries recommended, will comprise Pontiac County, Maniwaki and Mont-Laurier, Gracefield, Wakefield, Aumont, Aylwin, Bouchette, Cameron, Denhold, Hincks, Low, Lytton, Masham North, Sicotte, Wakefield Township, Wright, Blue Sea, Bois Franc, Deleage, Egan South, Messine Montcerf, Northfield, St. Cecile de Masham, St. Therese de la Gatineau, Maniwaki, Indian Reserve, Ferme Neuve, Robertson and Pope, and Brunet along with adjoining unorganized municipalities with a total population of 56,266. It will be called the riding of Pontiac.

Aylmer, Deschenes, Eardley,

East Hull, West Hull and South Hull now called Lucerne will now be in the riding of Hull.

The new riding of Temiscamingue will include parts of the old Villeneuve riding which will disappear.

The recommendations will be subject to public discussion at a series of meetings scheduled throughout Quebec. The commission will sit in the Hull Courthouse on August 17th.

If all goes well at the hearings and the recommendations meet no objection in Parliament, we will wind up with not one Pontiac-Temiscamingue riding but one Pontiac riding and one Temiscamingue riding, each greater than they were before.

Election results in Bryson and C. Bay

In Bryson Village, elections on May 17 resulted as follows: Mayor Frank J. Devlin took his seat by acclamation; Councilor Leo Piche retained seat No. 4 by acclamation; Seat No. 5 was contested by candidates, Wm. Cyril Lepine and Brian Stanton who won the seat by one vote having polled 98 to Mr. Lepine's 97; Seat No. 6 was contested by Ronald Coyne and Clifford Olmstead who polled 123 votes to Mr. Coyne's 68 so the seat went to Mr. Olmstead.

In Campbell's Bay Mayor David Lunam was returned to office

for his sixth consecutive term with a majority of 28 votes over Edgar Lance.

Councillors elected were Harold Wilson, 192; Lloyd Kinsley, 161 and Jean Guy Larriere, 160. Defeated were Cecil Letts, 157; Cecil Vibert, 155; Denzil Brown, 82 and Harold Devlin 55.

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FARM SAFETY WEEK EVERY WEEK

While Canada has no national farm safety week yet farm safety campaigns will be conducted in certain areas during the summer period. Ontario plans a farm safety week from May 30 to June 5. The prairie provinces will observe a farm safety drive from July 25 to 31. Dates for campaigns in other regions have not been announced but plans are being developed in B. C. and some Atlantic sections.

The National Safety League of Canada has been exploring this field of safety promotion for several months and expects to organize a national farm safety campaign eventually. The need is pointed out in the League's statement that, if present rates continue, more than 120,000 of Canada's farm population would be involved in accidents that would produce 33,000 injuries and 2,400 deaths in one year.

No mention has been made of plans for the Province of Quebec but there is no reason why every week in 1965 could not be observed as farm safety week here. Injury and death from farm accidents are no less painful and final during one week than during another. Pontiac County has a good record so far — constant vigilance could keep it that way.

Country Notes

This past week I had another memorable experience. I crossed the Ottawa River by the Oka ferry for the first time. Actually it was a very enjoyable way to travel; the day was warm and the water pleasantly choppy. The little launch towed the raft with our car balanced in the middle along at a surprising clip. But I couldn't help wondering where we might end up if that two hundred feet of string-sized tow rope ever parted.

Which has nothing to do with agriculture, except that it completed a good day visiting farms in the Lachute area. I found seeding being pushed right along, but there were still no cows out to pasture, although last week's thunder storms had helped to bring the grass along.

Roger Bradford at Cushing has had another satisfactory season with his sheep. All the lambs, except four, were sold early in the year on a keen market. But at these light weights he probably cannot claim the new provincial subsidy of \$3.00 for choice market lambs. And this must be something of a record—one of his Suffolk ewes produced three sets of twins in fourteen months. Any challengers?

Stuart Armstrong, just west of Lachute, is planting nineteen acres of table turnips this spring. He must be satisfied with his last year's trial. It seems that most of the waxed turnips in the stores come in from Ontario. But if I read the statistics right, there should be surplus of table turnips in Quebec. They show 45 million pounds grown on 2000 acres. And 6 million people eating, the national average of 5.3 pounds accounts for only two-thirds of that. Presumably, there are cows that eat well, too.

Another call was to see the \$600 cow Jean St Pierre brought home from last week's Holstein disposal. Jean is on the Larose farm at Grenville which I am

told won the agricultural merit award a few years back. He bought the place only two years ago, but he is coming ahead fast. And he doesn't mind breaking with tradition either; his grain corn was planted in the first week of May before he touched the oats. He says he saw corn frozen to the ground last year, and it recovered. His son, Andre is the first president of the Federation of Young Farmers' Clubs in the Lachute zone.

The placement of fertilizer is as important as the kind and amount you use. And a key fact is that roots grow outward and downward to find it. So, for corn, a band two inches to the side and two inches below the seed has proven most efficient.

But there can be two drawbacks with banding. First, large amounts of fertilizer even that close to the seed may hurt germination. And second, fertilizer hoppers on corn planters do not hold very much. So a growing practice is to broadcast most of the fertilizer and plough down, ahead of time, saving 100 lbs or 200 lbs per acre of mixed fertilizer to go on when planting.

For cereals, it is a different matter. Most response comes from placing the fertilizer right with the grain. These seeds are not so sensitive to burn from the smaller amounts generally used.

Corn is a very heavy user of nitrogen. A 20-ton silage crop will have used 150 lbs of the element. That's the amount found in 1500 lbs of 10-10-10 fertilizer. Unlike clover, corn can't take it out of the air, so it must get it from decaying plant material or from fertilizer. A good clover or alfalfa sod turned down should supply 100 lbs. Or 10 tons manure per acre will provide 50 lbs to that crop. Almost all the rest must

come out of the bag.

Atrazine is still at the top of the list of chemicals for weed control in corn. Standard rates are 1½ to 2 lbs active ingredient in 20 to 30 gallons water per acre. Atrazine comes in several strengths—50W, 65W, 80W. The figure 65W for example, means that there is 65 lbs of active ingredient in 100 lbs of wettable material. Otherwise, there is no reason to choose between them.

If Atrazine is put on carefully not exceeding these rates, there is little need to worry about residue damage to next year's crops. I have seen several cases of damage to oats and new seedlings, but all could be traced to carelessness, overlapping runs, not shutting off while turning, or poor agitation in the tank, or worn nozzles.

Depending on custom work has its disadvantages. I thought everything was set to have my Birdsfoot Trefoil sprayed with Dalapon to suppress the grass. But there was a letter in last night's mail: my neighbour is too busy with his own seeding and getting the manure out. Besides, he is on jury duty.

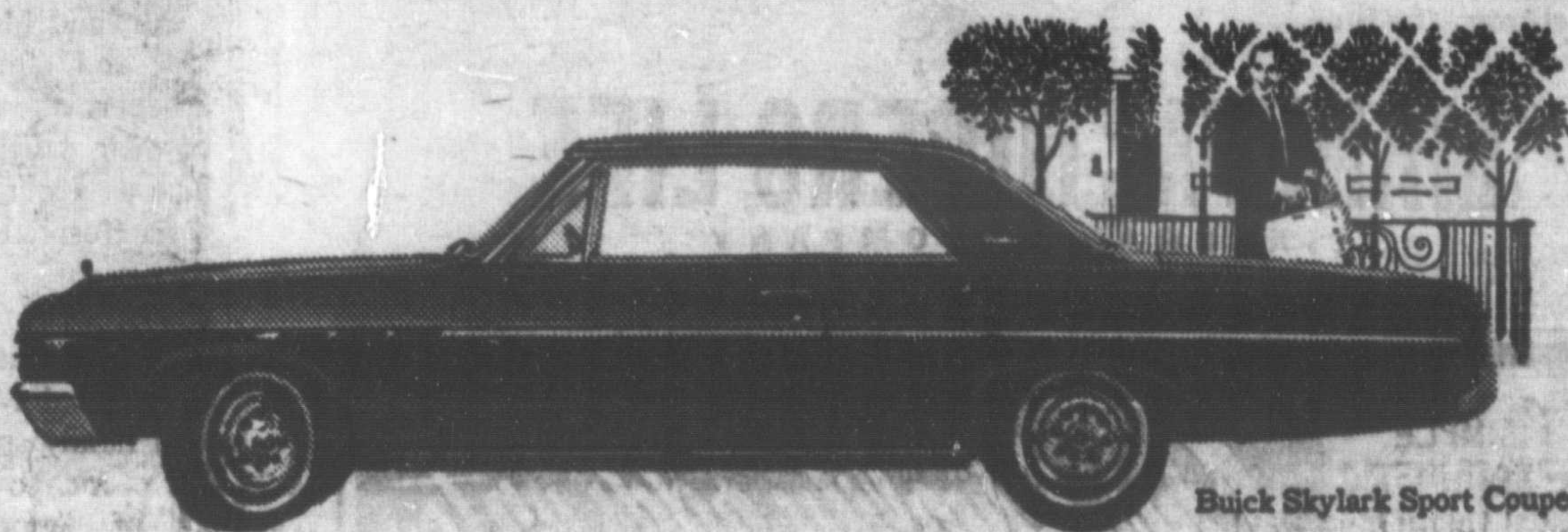
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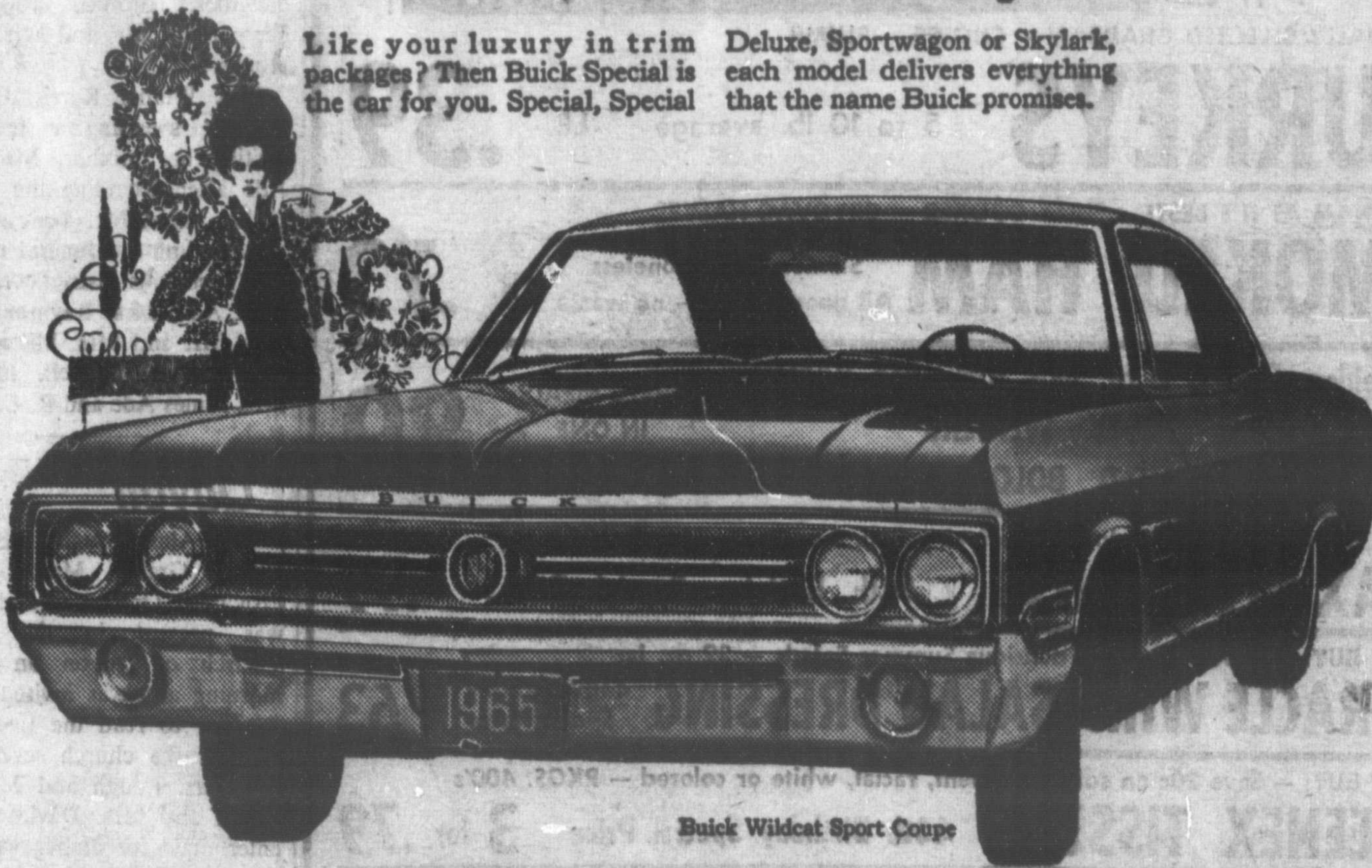

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Report On The Orange Protestant Children's Home

Among the reports submitted at the Annual Meeting of the Grand Lodge, L.O.A., Quebec in Shawville, was that of The Orange and Protestant Children's Home for Quebec Inc. In presenting it, the President of the Board, Mrs. E. Erskine, and the Executive Secretary - Treasurer, R. H. Butler, gave a consive account of the history and the activities of the year 1964-65.

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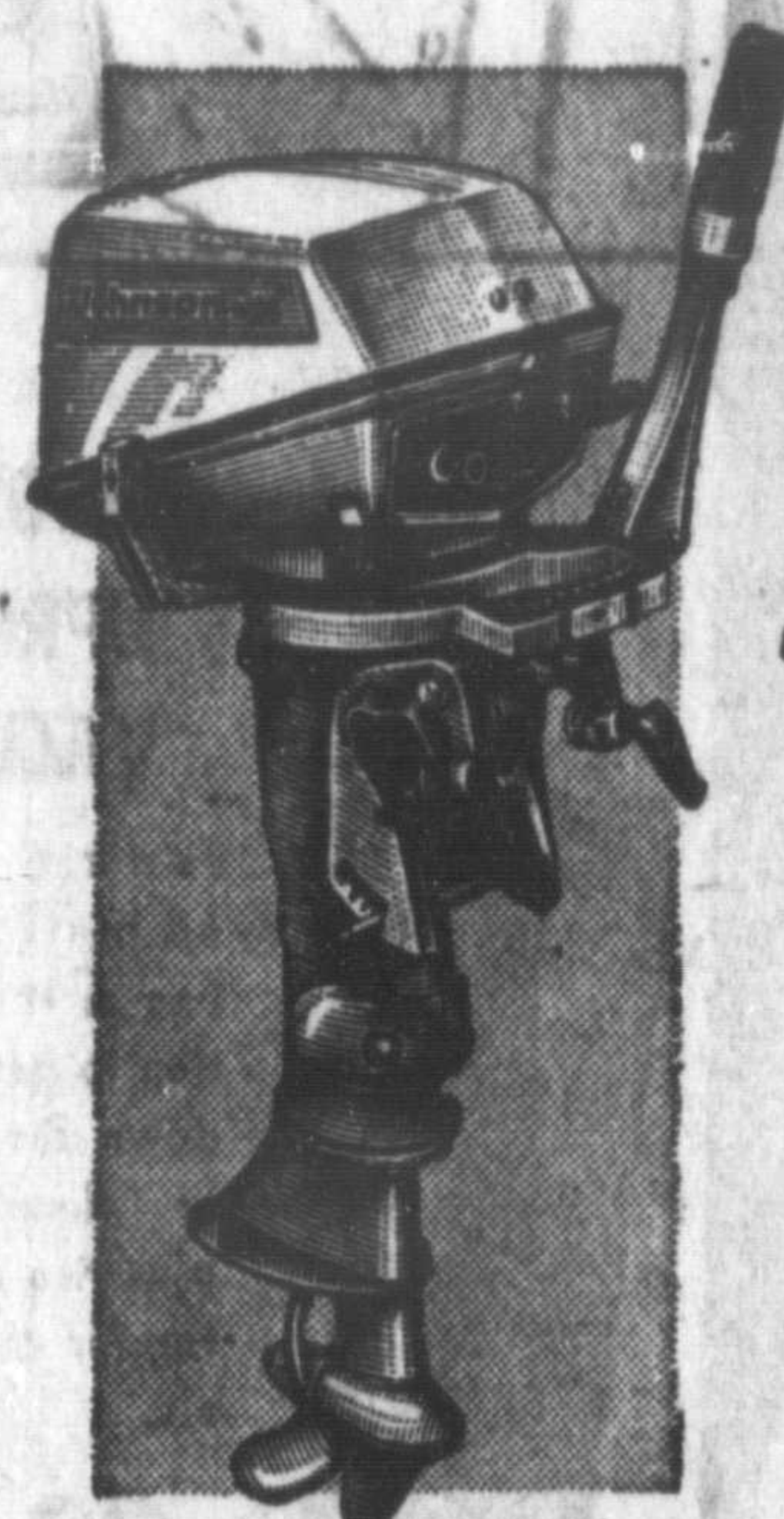

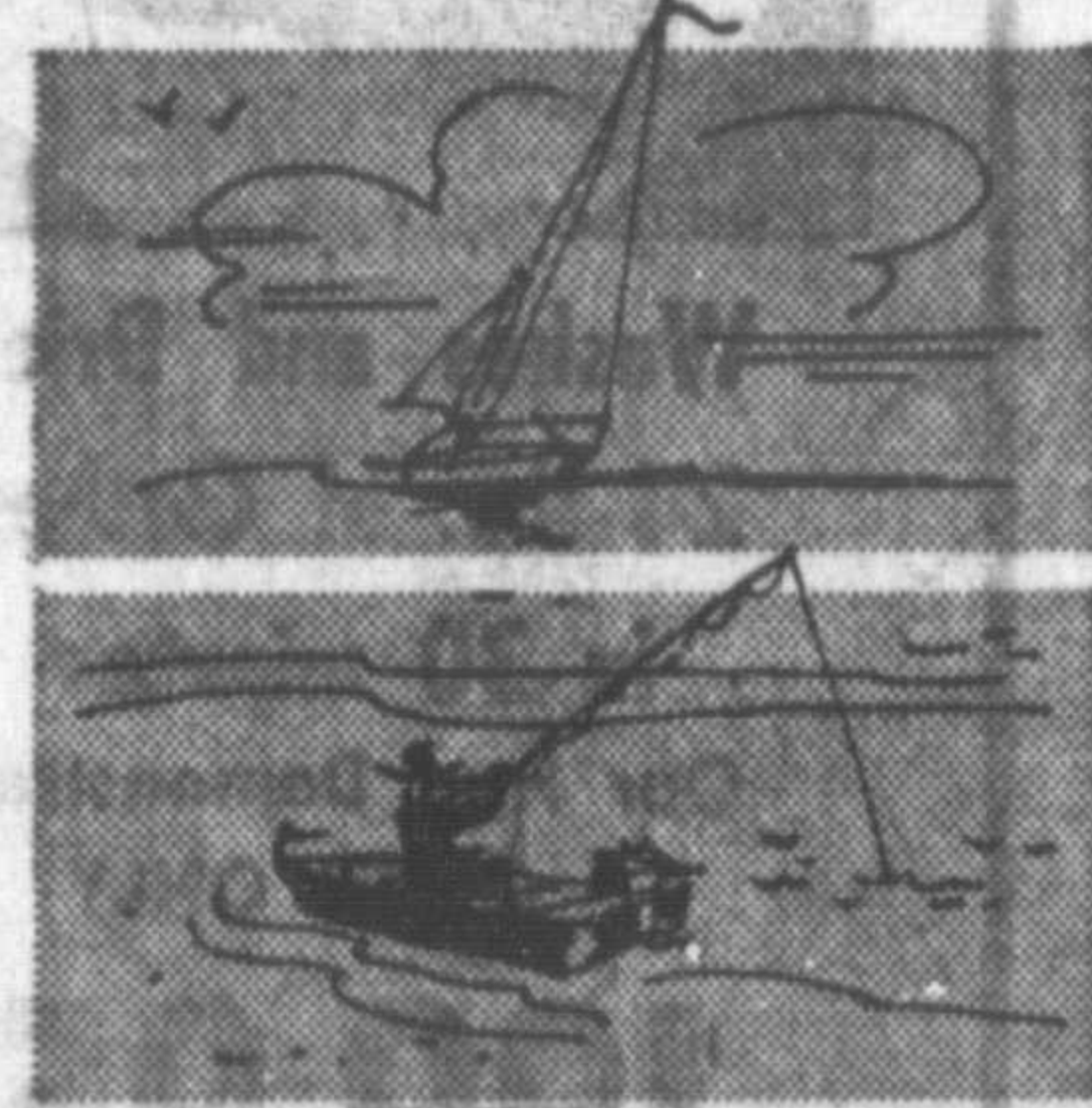

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Baseball season in full swing

On Sunday afternoon, May 16, at approximately 2 p.m., the call of "Play Ball" echoed across three ball parks; and thus began another season in the Upper Ottawa Valley Baseball League.

home team used 3 pitchers, who had a total of 10 strikeouts, 7 walks and were touched for 13 hits. The starting battery for Bryson J. Gauthier and C. O'Reilly. Gauthier worked six innings, then was replaced by Spencer Keon for two innings. He was replaced by C. O'Reilly who worked one inning. The Bryson batsmen rapped out a total of 15 hits, including one home run by J. Gauthier.

Campbell's Bay also used a total of three pitchers. The starting battery was D. Sloan and B. Belland. Sloan worked five innings, and was replaced by L. Belland for an inning, then W. Moorehead pitched the remaining three innings. The Red Sox mound staff had a total of 10 strikeouts and gave up 3 walks. The visitors collected thirteen hits during the contest.

This game was sparked by a rhabarb in the seventh inning. Bryson had runners on second and third, when an overthrow was made to third. Both runners scored on the play. Campbell's Bay coach, B. Mousseau and some of his players began to

protest vigorously. In fact, B. Belland became so enthusiastic in his objections that umpire John Stafford in a firm assertion of his authority, ejected the offending player from the game. The result of this controversy was that the umpire clarified the interpretation on the rule concerning the overthrow, and sent the Bryson runner who had already advanced from second base to home, back to third.

The new and youthful looking Shawville Tigers opened the 1965 Baseball season with a solid 13-1 victory over the weak hitting Quyon Fliers last Sunday in Tigertown. There were six new faces in the line-up for the Tigers Sunday and a quick glance down the names found several top veterans like Powell, Richardson, etc absent.

Another top performer who missed the starting call was first baseman Harvey Sweetman who was enjoying a weekend fishing trip. Tall Bill Murray started on the mound for Shawville and was credited with the victory, although he was relieved by Bryan Murray after five innings. Both were exceptionally effective, striking out 22 batters, 12 by Bill and 10 by Bryan, although Quyon managed to collect all three of their hits off Bill Murray. The only run came after a throwing error in the

fourth inning by the catcher. The Tigers used two receivers for the game as Wayne Chamberlaine caught the first five innings and the husky Elson Schock replaced him when the pitchers changed and turned in a fine job.

Fred Desabrais started on the mound for Quyon and he was relieved by Rick Scott in the 4th inning. Jim Mulligan came on in the sixth frame and then he was replaced by Chris McCotgan in the seventh. The loser was the starting hurler, Fred Desabrais. Altogether they allowed just four hits, but 18 walks added to several errors caused their disaster. Des Keon was the catcher.

Four of the Tiger "veterans" Bryan and Bill Murray, Dave Wilson and Wayne Chamberlaine supplied most of the offensive punch as Wilson pounded out 2 hits, drove in 3 runs and scored 3 more. Chamberlaine had a 3 run double and four walks, Bryan Murray had the other Tiger hit, two walks and two runs while Bill Murray crossed the plate with another three runs. Roy Davidson collected four walks for the Tigers.

Don Reynolds was the top producer for Quyon with a pair of singles while Tom Fraser collected the third, a fourth win-

ning double and scored the only run.

Next Sunday, the Tigers visit the Fort Coulonge Comets in Coulonge and undoubtedly will be looking for revenge against the champion Comets. Game time 2.00 p.m. and the following week Campbell's Bay visits Shawville.

The Ascension Day is sometimes called "Holy Thursday", coming as it does 40 days after Easter Day and therefore always falling on a Thursday. Ascensiontide occasionally is also called The Season of Christ the King, reminding Christians that Our Lord, the Perfect Man, has taken our humanity into the

Kingdom, and now reigns in Heaven, and there intercedes or pleads on our behalf.

The celebrant at The Ascension Day Service will be the Rev. John Pearce, Rector of Clarendon. The preacher will be Rev. Joseph Gauvin, priest-in-charge, Campbell's Bay. Also assisting in the service will be the Rev. Frere Kennedy, Incumbent, North Clarendon, and Mr. A. E. Lawrence, Diocesan Lay Reader.

The service will observe the climax of the Easter Season, and will be the first known Ascension Day observance, in a district sense, in the Pontiac area.

Members of the Anglican Communion in churches in the three parishes will be attending. The Collect, Epistle and Gospel will be those for The Ascension Day.

Pastoral comment...

The Day of The Heavenly King
A week from today May 27, is the Ascension Day (or "Holy Thursday").

On the first Easter Day, a man by the Name of Jesus rose from the grave. For the next forty days, this Jesus was seen alive, in Risen form, by over 500 people, at various times and places.

The day of Jesus' last appearance to His followers at that time in a recognizable way, is the Ascension Day. On the Ascension Day, we think of Jesus returning in glory to the Heavenly Father. Jesus now reigns in Heaven as King and priest for us.

When we pray to God, either in our own personal prayers or at Church, we can be sure of two wonderful things as a result of the Ascension (literally "the going-up") of Jesus into Heaven:—

- (1) The first is that we pray to a God who knows what it is to have lived a human life;
- (2) The second is that we know that we pray to a God who is always praying (interceding) for us, as our great High Priest.

Another important truth about which we are reminded at the Ascension of our Lord is that Heaven is not a place. Heaven is not a far-off country to which a person can travel, for example, in a space-ship.

Heaven is a spiritual condition, a state-of-being.

And the tremendous thing is that anyone can start to live in this condition (Heaven), beginning at Baptism, here on earth. Jesus said to His disciples one day "The Kingdom of Heaven is within you."

What happened then, on the Ascension Day was that our Lord took our humanity, in Perfect form, and returned fully to the Heavenly condition, or Kingdom.

Ascensiontide is a glorious climax to the Easter Season.

And yet Ascensiontide itself points to another wonderful day, Pentecostal or Whitsunday which this year comes on June 6th.
