LOST IN THE SURF.

"BRATSBERG" DISASTER DESCRIBED.

The Captain sees His Crew Perish Without Being Able to Stretch Forth a Hand to Save Them.

FATHER POINT, Que., August 29.—On Saturday evening, as the Norwegian two-masted steamship "Bratsberg," Capt. Neilson, with a coal cargo for Montreal, was proceeding up the river in charge of the captain by the side of the vessel, a sudden change of pilotage grounds, the weather being thick and all at once a fearful shock was felt, and the rush of water under the bows of the ship was so great that the vessel was struck on the side of the hull, and the water came pouring over the bows, and the ship was rapidly sinking.

Two bodies being on board, Mrs. Murray Dodd, of Sydney, C. B., and Miss Harrington, of North Sydney, were carried and the captain took them safely to shore. The wind, meanwhile, rapidly increased in fury, and soon reached a heavy gale, with torrents of rain and cold weather. The vessel was rapidly sinking, and the crew were obliged to pull madly on the heavy coil laden haul, sweeping wildly about in the water, and being her about like a log. The crew, shivering with exposure, concluding that their only chance lay in attempting to reach shore, had the two ships' boats launched, and jumped in, but the surf at once closed over and captured them, and in a few moments, only two reached the shore alive.

THE MELANCHOLY FATE. Of witnessing the death of his brave crew, without being able to stretch forth a hand to save them. The ill-fated vessel was all washed ashore. The only name ascertained was that of Sydney, C. B., the doctor, Dr. O'Connor, Dr. Pelletier, of Matane, accompanied by a jury, and the "Bratsberg" lies near shore, and Davies' wrecking schooner is now alongside. Her condition is not yet ascertained.

Additional Details Obtained From Agents in Montreal.

Mr. Routh of the firm Carbery & Routh, agents in Montreal of the ill-fated steamship "Bratsberg," was called on by the "Star" today, when the following additional particulars were learned. He stated that at the time "Bratsberg" was wrecked, the vessel was on her way to Montreal, and was in charge of the captain by the side of the vessel. The vessel was struck on the side of the hull, and the water came pouring over the bows, and the ship was rapidly sinking.

NEW ENGINE OF DESTRUCTION.

A Submarine Boat Intended to Revolutionize Naval Warfare.

NEW YORK, August 29.—The Herald's Paris special says: "A new submarine boat, intended to revolutionize naval warfare, is to be launched at London on August 15. She is designed by Mr. Lamontagne, Government Engineer, and is intended to be used to destroy the sides of an enemy's vessel, and is capable of maintaining communication with an enemy's vessel by means of a steel wire, by which the cartridges can be exploded by electricity. This new invention combines all the requisite conditions of speed, steering capacity, submersion, emergence, and habitability. The vessel is seven metres long between perpendiculars, and 1.80 metres beam. She is intended to drive under water, and is provided with a variable quantity of compressed air, which is renewed at will. Horizontal steering is effected by a vertical rudder, vertical steering is effected by a double horizontal steering, and is controlled by means of a steel wire, which is built on her bow. It is in this capacity, provided with a vertical rudder, and a horizontal rudder, that she will be appointed to destroy the sides of an enemy's vessel, and is provided with compressed air apparatus.
