Montreal Day Nursery Faces Problem Cases For Younger Children

No satisfactory solution has been found for parents who need care for children under two years of age, Maud Bothwell, director of the Montreal Day Nursery, said on Monday. The Day Nursery, a Red Feather service, on Richmond Square, cares for children of working mothers, but only accepts children of three years and up.

"More day nurseries are not the answer to this particular problem because very young children do not do well either physically or emotionally in a nursery group," Miss Bothwell said. "These children need highly individual care and are not ready yet to get along in a group setting."

"There is no question that the best solution is to see that every child of this age stays at home in the care of a loving mother, but sometimes this is impossible," Miss Bothwell said. "The Day Nursery is getting an increasing number of calls asking that these children be cared for, and the reasons are usually hospitalization of the mother, or the mother's need to supplement the family income by taking a job. The parents do not want foster home placement for their children. Day care is all they want

"Every once in a while, articles appear in the press about young children who have been left alone in a house for hours and, for a little while, public feeling runs high. However, when the storm of protest dies down, it turns out that nothing whatever has been done to prevent the same thing from happening again," the Red Feather executive said.

Studying In Europe

Local Student Hits North American Dress

A Westmount student, Barbara Wilson, 20, 70 Belvedere Ave. says North American students are the worst dressed students in Europe. Barbara, who just returned from studying for a year at the University of Geneva, in Switzerland, concedes European women have conserved their femininity. She cited the Genevan and Italian women in particular as smart dressers.

Barbara was in a good position to see the women of the world as the University of Geneva is very cosmopolitan. "They dress not only well, but with daring," she said. It is quite common for a woman to dress from head to toe in shades of one color.

"Many woman have long hair," she said, "some wear it straight down below shoulder length, and some in chignons."

Slacks are very popular, but they are dressy, pencil slim with braid down the side. You never see a woman wearing slacks unless she have the figure for them.

"European students commonly wore bulk-knit sweaters with Swiss scarves in the neck and never wore saddle shoes," she said. Pale lacquers and lipsticks of European-make were common though American cosmetics were popular because of their reliability.

A possible explanation for the difference in dress was that the students at Geneva were perhaps more wealthy than American students. The higher standard of living in Switzerland means that students from other countries lose by changing their currency and find fees and living costs very high.

On the other hand, Barbara pointed out, there was not the tendency to think of university in terms of money. "Of course, Canada is a younger country and it is perhaps necessary to think of economics. But in Europe self-education is highly considered as an end in itself."

The attitude towards sending women to university was divided, she said. "The Italians for instance still have the prejudice against sending women to university. Nevertheless at Geneva there is a larger number of women prorata in the medical faculty than at McGill."

"If a woman does go to university, she will have the brains for it and be a serious student. There is no such thing as a career girl, because it is understood that a woman even if she has a good position will stop work when she marries."

Back at McGill for her final year, Barbara will take up her interest in debating and music, at the same time learning to speak Italian and carrying two extra courses.

Royal Empire Society Plans Essay Contest

Class B for students from 14 to 16 has the choice of "A Locust, a Tsetsefly and a Mosquito meet to boast of the harm each could do to Man. Write an imaginary argument for each" or "The use made of either irrigation or hydro-electric power in the Commonwealth and Empire."

Class C

Class C for contestants under 14 years of age offers this topic — "if you had to plan an exchange visit with a boy or girl of your own age from another and distant part of the Commonwealth and Empire, describe the arrangement you would make for your guest in your own country, remembering that the visit is to last a month and that your visitor will wish to see as much as possible in the time. The November Mission

The City-Wide Mission
By Rev. Canon R. K. Naylor
Rector, Trinity Memorial Church

From November 18th to December 4th a great Mission will be conducted by Canon Bryan Green under the auspices of the Council of Churches of Greater Montreal. The opening and closing of the Mission will be held in the Forum, and the other week-day services will be in St. James United Church and in Christ Church Cathedral, and in other centres if required. The Churches co-operating in the Council of Churches are the United Church, Salvation Army, Presbyterian, Orthodox, Lutheran, Baptist and Anglican. The Missioner will be assisted by the Rev. Harold Frankham and the Rev. Burt Poole, and by a large number of local Counsellors. The Mission centres will be linked up in a closed T.V. system, and the addresses will be followed by question periods.

Canon Green was here in the late winter to address a preliminary meeting in St. James United Church, and to meet the city clergy and groups of laymen. His associates will be here at the beginning of October to continue the preparation. All the Churches concerned are urged to make this a major event in their parish programmes for November.

Naturally the question will be asked, What is the purpose of such a Mission? Perhaps the question can be answered in this way, though other men may have rather different answers. As a community we are obsessed by such a multitude of interests that we tend to lose sight of the first and most important thing—our relationship with God. A great many of those interests are perfectly good and right, our families, our jobs, our recreations; but because they are good in themselves we feel justified in letting them fill the whole of our lives. Any man will feel hurt at being told that his family or his job absorbs him too completely. But Our Lord had some very emphatic words about renunciation; and in His interpretation of the Parable of the Sower He says that "the cares of this world and the deceitfulness of riches, and the lusts of other things entering in, choke the word and it becometh unfruitful."

So it seems to me that a spiritual revival of this kind is intended to restore the balance in our lives, and to put the things of this world in their proper perspective.

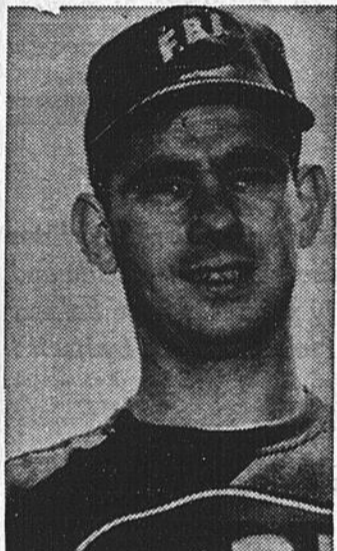

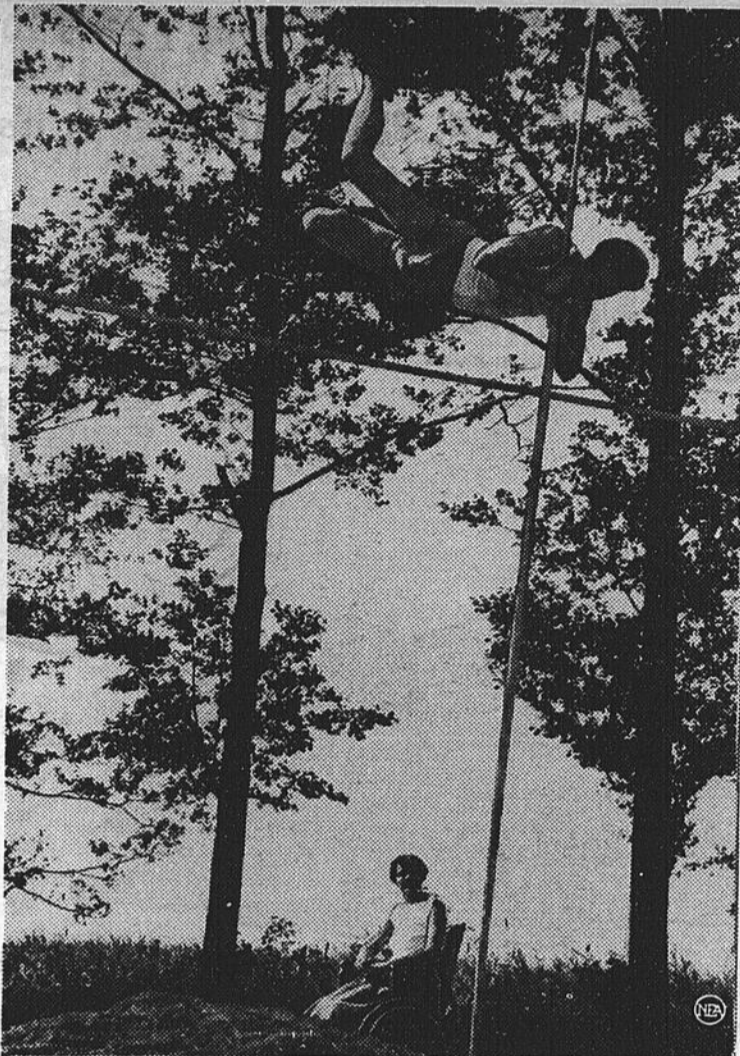
