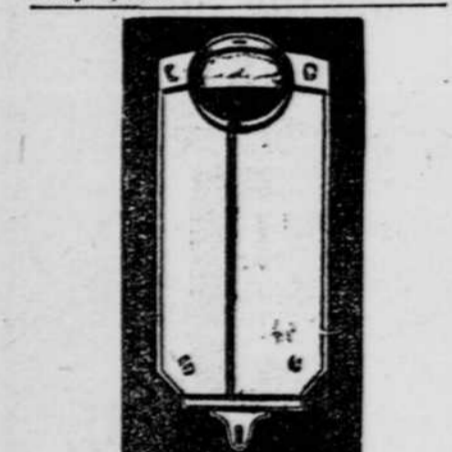

THE TALK OF THE DAY.

The regret in town, is universal, that Mr. ANGERS has retired from the Dominion Cabinet. Since he has occupied a seat at the Council Board, his one aim has been to serve his country to the best of his ability. His departure is one of the most extensive and arduous in the public service. It includes Agriculture, Immigration, Quarantine, Copyright, Patents, Archives, Etc. And though the Minister had good men around him, it is to be hoped that he will remain in Parliament. A man of strong convictions, when once his mind has been made up, it is very difficult to dislodge him from any stand that he might take. He differed from his colleagues on the date when remedial legislation should be proposed. He had no confidence in Mr. GREENWAY, and he was sure that in waiting six months before introducing a remedial measure in Parliament, only valuable time would be lost, no good would arise, and the delay would cause infinite vexation and trouble throughout the country. He was strongly in favor of proceeding at once to business. In vain the other members of the Cabinet declared that the delay would not prevent the required legislation taking place, ultimately, Mr. ANGERS was inexorable, and as the voting power of the minority stood about 12 to 1, to the regret of the Premier and his colleagues, he withdrew. Mr. OUMER and Sir ADOLPHE CARON being satisfied with the pledges given by their fellow-Ministers, returned to their respective duties, and explained their conduct in the House. A gentleman will be found to take the vacant post of Agriculture, and in that connection, rumor points to the member for Jacques Cartier, Mr. GROUARD. But of Mr. ANGERS' sacrifice to principle—and in this instance, he has made great personal sacrifice,—there can be no question. To him the Constitution has been as the apple of his eye. And his whole action has been based on the principle, that when a Minister finds himself completely at variance with his colleagues, his best policy is to resign. This Mr. ANGERS has done, and his conduct shows how ready he is, at all times, to efface himself from the record, the moment that he finds that he can no longer act with his confederates. He is accustomed to remain alone, as witness his conduct during the MERCER dismissal. He is alone now, in a measure, but those who believe in prompt action, those who believe in striking the iron while it is hot, cannot but applaud the calmness of the man—under circumstances which, to say the least, are trying—and which calls for the display of real nerve and courage.

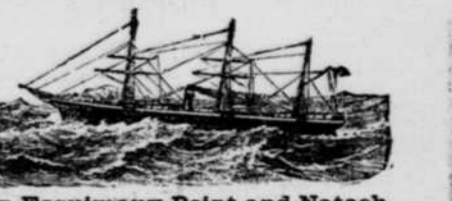

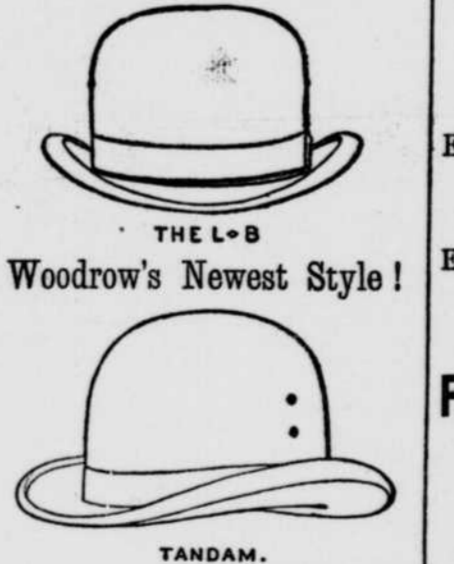

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The Railway Horror.

CONTINUATION OF THE INQUEST.

NEW EVIDENCE.

The proceedings of the inquest on the victims of the Craig's Road disaster were resumed yesterday morning, with a slight increase in the number of those attending on it. The authorities appear resolved that the enquiry shall be a most searching one, and the whole details of the accident thoroughly sifted out. Considerable latitude is given in consequence, and a large number of apparently irrelevant questions are allowed, especially as the questions and answers are all taken down verbatim in longhand. The evidence of the conductor, Dionne, was again proceeded with, Mr. Dunbar, Q.C., for the Crown, cross-examining him. After an extended questioning of about half an hour, nothing new or important was elicited except that the witness did not hear any whistle or bell ringing from the second train, though this is ordered to be done whenever a semaphore is passed.

The jurors being all French-Canadians the evidence is taken in French. After Mr. Dunbar had questioned Dionne, Mr. Ishore Bellin, who represents the railway, was cross-questioned. He elicited the fact that when starting from St. Agapit a voice hailed him and told him not to leave yet. He went back to the station and there a workman, who he said was the driver of the second train, and not to his. On being asked why he did not forward the passengers at once to Lewis, he answered that, as there were no means for crossing trains between there and Craig's Road, he thought it best to place no obstacle in the way of a speedy arrival of the relief train.

The jury adjourned for lunch at one o'clock. At the afternoon Dr. George Henri Beaudry, of Magog, was sworn and deposed:—I embarked on the second train at Sherbrooke at 10.45 p.m. on the 8th instant. Noted that the train gained time on delay at Sherbrooke and even on the time laid down. Knew none of the employees of the train, but noticed that the conductor from Sherbrooke was Richard Levesque, and that the driver was Richmond to Craig's Road. At Arthabaska saw the conductor and a couple of brakemen, but noticed nothing unusual. From St. Agapit to Craig's Road, I saw nothing of an ordinary sort. Did not remark if the train stopped at St. Agapit nor if it whistled when it was about to stop at Craig's Road. Did not notice if the train whistled or rang there, or that it went quicker from St. Agapit to Craig's Road. Did not notice the train slack speed at Craig's Road. Was in the fourth bench of second car and felt a terrible shock at 11.45 a.m. and was hurt. Thought it was caused by an obstruction, but did not know of what nature. The front of the car was blocked by a man who fell from the train. I was on a dying man when another was shown to me under the car. We took him out and put him on the platform. He was the Rev. Father Mercier and still conscious. It was quite dark and objects could only be very indistinctly seen. Was told that the wounded belonged to the first train. Knocked at the station door which was closed, and called agent Fournier. Told him to telegraph for assistance to Lewis, but he did not at first seem to understand and was very excited. He was very much wounded and dead on the second train. Many were wounded on the first train and some of them died soon after the accident. Four were dead after the accident. Four men instantly to my knowledge. Gave 11 bodies to the coroner and remarked that there was a twelfth, Melville, which was still on the ground. Remained at Craig's Road after the departure of the wounded, having taken charge of the wounded from Mr. Harkin. Saw the engine, which was in the yard, and the engine immediately after the accident. Was told that help would soon arrive from Lewis. Told Dionne not to leave once as a wrecked engine was at the Chandler and the injured had more need of help than the pilgrims had of going to Ste.
