The Gazette thus supports its declaration that hired canvassers at elections are illegal.

Among those who are declared by the Act to be guilty of bribery are the following:

Every person who shall, directly or indirectly, by himself or any person on his behalf, make any gift, loan, offer, promise, procurement or agreement as aforesaid, to or any person in order to induce such person to procure or endeavor to procure the return of any person to a seat in Parliament or the vote of any voter for any election.

We submit that our contemporary's reading of the above is very much strained.

If the Gazette's interpretation were correct no candidate could make an election speech or write an election address. What are election addresses but a mass of "promises"? But, as we take it, the paragraph above quoted does not mean such promises as candidates commonly make, and canvassers repeat, that is to say, promises to vote for good men, reform, certain public works more or less affecting the constituency, &c., &c., but rather promises of direct remuneration in money, kind or services, all of which of course would properly come under the head of "bribery."

According to the Gazette's reading our contemporary is being guilty of bribery at every election, and that his articles written for it are to induce persons to procure or endeavor to procure the return of certain candidates to seats in Parliament? As we remarked a day or two ago, we would like to see our canvassing done away with, we are bound to say that the law as above quoted does not apply to it.

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THE ANGLICAN CHURCH.

The following circular issued by the Rev. G. T. Driffield, M.A., Rector of St. Mary, Stratford-on-Avon, England, speaks for itself.

My Dear Friends,—I desire to call your attention to a plan which has been formed, and in which we desire to take a part, for holding what is termed a "Mission" in many of the Churches and Parishes of the Diocese of London during the month of February. The design originated in a recommendation jointly issued to the Clergy of London by the Metropolitan Conference of the Clergy of the Province of Canterbury on the 24th inst. The object is to consider what measures should be taken to secure an increase in the number of communicants in the churches of the Province.

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
