No Definite Word Yet On New Plant

At last Friday's Press conference Mayor R. Cauchon announced that "he had heard" that the Valleyfield plant of the Nichols Chemical Co. Ltd. would be doubling its operations in the near future in order to be able to supply the much discussed zinc refinery when such a plant is established in Valleyfield. (In its issue of Feb. 8, 1961, the SUN reported that "there were indications that an already established firm in Valleyfield might benefit directly if the refinery is built here"). No further comment on the matter could be obtained from Nichols Chemical plant manager Bill Dickie. Mr. Cauchon's only comment on questions when the announcement of the zinc refinery coming to Valleyfield could be expected were "that preparation of plans and specifications for the zinc refinery were going ahead".

The Mayor stated that Valleyfield's Winter Employment Program in cooperation with the Federal and Provincial Governments, had just about been completed. During the winter period some 110 men have been employed for a total of 5,000 days of work and that some \$80,000 was paid out in salaries.

Last week Wednesday Mayor Cauchon and City Clerk Charles Codebecq were in Que. City in order to attend the final passage of the Valleyfield Bill by the Legislative Council. Mr. Cauchon related how at the last moment a small detail of the Valleyfield Bill almost resulted in a major argument between members of the government and opposition.

The Mayor told the members of the press that he was rather surprised that the member of Parliament in Ottawa for the Salaberry-Beauharnois county, Mr. Bruchesi, suddenly appeared to be showing interest in the zinc refinery project. He said he "was not anxious at this time to get involved in an argument be-

Two Thousand PC'S To Attend Annual Ass'n Conference, Ottawa

The meeting is the first to be held under the party's new constitution, adopted 15 months ago, and 1,500 delegates will have voting rights. Another 500 are expected to attend the meeting March 18-19.

Senator Gunnar Thorvaldson, President of the Progressive Conservative Ass'n, who is expected to be re-elected president, said last week the annual gathering is not one at which the Conservative Party platform will be rewritten.

"We already have our program, and it is being put into effect day-by-day by the government in power," he said.

"But at this meeting we will get the sense of the people, represented by the delegates from all parts of Canada.

Senator Thorvaldson said all 263 federal constituencies will be represented.

"We have been working out the arrangements for two or three months, and all the strings are being tied together now."

The meeting will be built around seminars, on the subjects of the Canadian economy, international affairs, national developments including agriculture, and social justice.

These will be presided over by the Cabinet ministers in charge of departments falling in the four classifications.

"This is an entirely new experiment by political meetings of the party in power," Senator Thorvaldson said. "Anybody can fire any question at the ministers, and they are going to answer in public.

Concurrent with the annual meeting of the main Conservative Party Association, the annual meetings of the Women's Progressive Conservative Association, the Progressive Conservative

ciation, the Progressive Conservative Student Federation and the Young Progressive Conservatives of Canada will take place.

Mr. Gerard Bruchesi, Member of Parliament for the Salaberry-Beauharnois constituency, which includes Chateauguy will be representing this area together with other local delegates.

Canada Largest Exhibitor In London

Canada will have the largest display of any overseas exhibitor at the 1961 Daily Mail Ideal Home Exhibition in London, the Department of Trade and Commerce reported last week in releasing a four-colour folder on Canada's participation. The publication is designed for distribution at the exhibition which runs from March 7 to April 3 and is expected to attract over 1,500,000 visitors.

The folder traces the dynamic growth of the Canadian economy in the twentieth century, and lists the 98 firms displaying their products in the Canadian Exhibit organized by the Department. The large number of exhibitors reflects the enthusiasm with which the British government's recent trade liberalization measures were greeted by

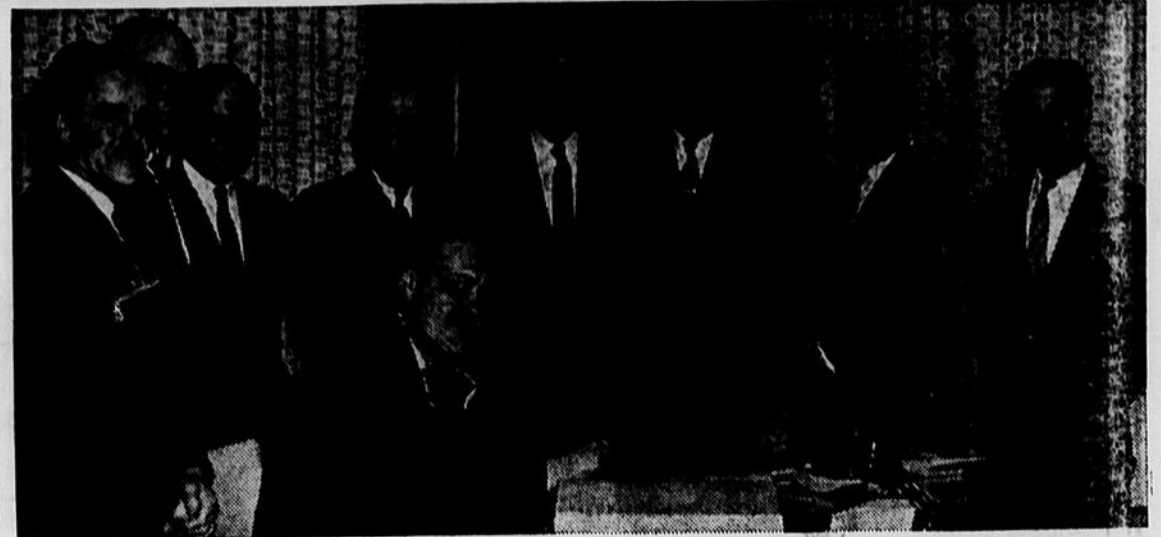

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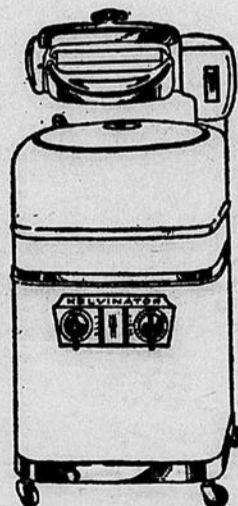

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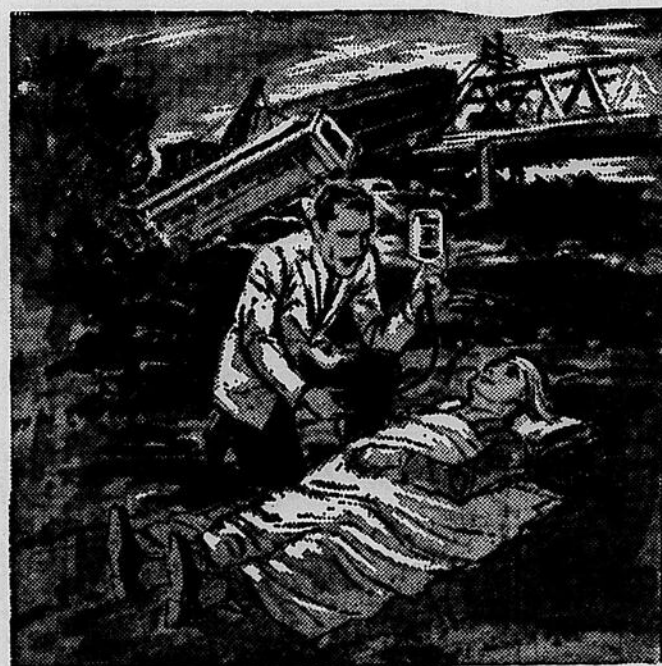

STE. CECILE PARISH COUNCIL AGAINST ANNEXATION WITH V'FIELD. 82% OF VOTERS IN FAVOUR

QUEBEC NOT PREPARED TO ENFORCE LAW

While 82 per cent of the voters in the Parish of Ste. Cecile and 75 per cent of the evaluation are in favour of annexing the Parish of Ste. Cecile to Valleyfield it appears that the council of this parish opposes the idea. And the SUN was informed that for this reason the Department of Municipal Affairs in Quebec has stopped any annexation action for the time being. This in spite of the fact that the law clearly states that if 75 per cent of the voters and 50 per cent of the evaluation are in favour, annexation automatically takes place. Apparently Quebec is only willing to enforce this law as a last resort.

If there is no annexation and the Parish of Ste. Cecile accepts Valleyfield's offer to build sewers and water mains it will cost the Parish \$11,000 per year for use of the main sewer; about \$1,000 per year for the use of

fire hydrants; the use of the water will be paid according to the existing rate in V'field but with a 25 per cent increase for the installation of pipes; \$7.00 per lineare foot for the sewer pipes installed in front of each house payable over 20 years, interest free.

If annexation took place however, Ste. Cecile would not have to pay the \$11,000 or the \$1,000 for the use of the hydrants, or the extra 25% on the use of water & would benefit from all the services such as police and fire protection, garbage, snow-removal, etc., now existing in Valleyfield.

Members of the Parish of Ste. Cecile Council met with the Valleyfield Council last Saturday but at time of writing no decision had been taken and as far as could be ascertained the council still opposed annexation.

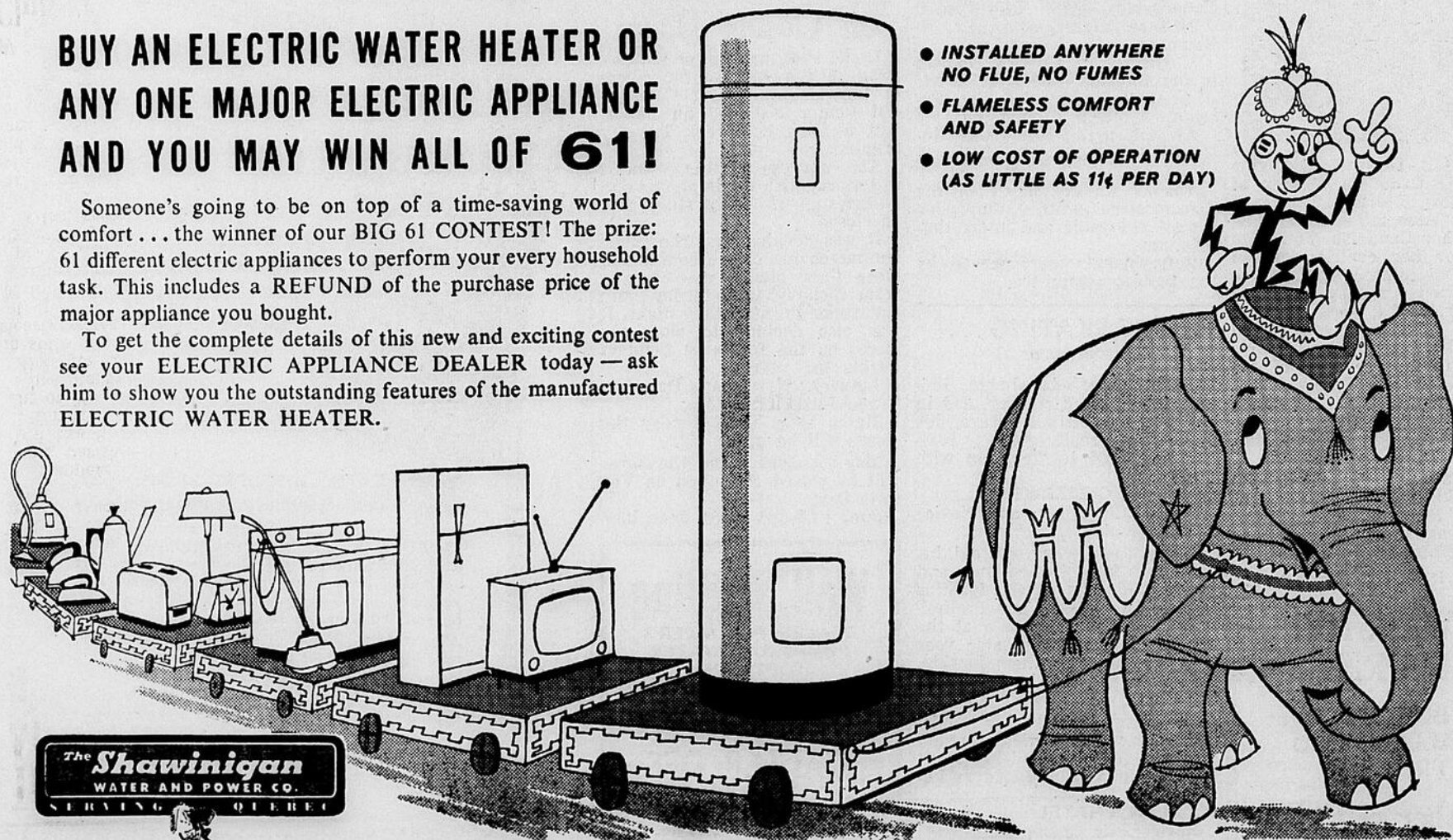

Protestant School Board Decides To Change Electoral Boundaries

Permanent Kindergarten Facilities Now Being Studied — High School Courses Planned —

A. At a recent meeting of the Chateauguay Protestant School Board, a resolution was passed for the re-allocation of electoral boundaries, effective July 1st, 1961, providing one representative for each of the following areas:

- 1.—Chateauguay Heights.
- 2.—West side of Chateauguay River, including Chateauguay Station, West End, Imperial Gardens, etc.
- 3.—East side of Chateauguay River, from Chateauguay North to Maple Street and No. 3 Highway, including Chateauguay Gardens, President Gardens and Chateauguay Terrace.
- 4.—East side of the Chateauguay River from Maple St., bounded by No. 3 Highway on the South West, including Colonia, D.V.A. homes, and above No. 4 Highway, bounded on the South West by the Ste. Marguerite Boulevard.
- 5.—East side of Chateauguay River, bounded on the North East by No. 3 Highway and Ste.

Marguerite Boulevard, including Chateauguay Park, Parkview and Prudential Homes.

B. Consideration was given a petition signed by approximately 500 parents, requesting that the Board make provision for the establishment of kindergarten facilities within the school system. The Board decided to make a complete investigation as to the cost of such a venture and ways and means to finance it, prior to reaching any decision.

C. After considerable investigation of the merits and costs of various high school courses and, keeping in mind the particular needs of our students, the Board unanimously agreed to provide facilities for the following optional courses in the new high school:

- Home Economics
- Industrial Arts
- Commercial - Bookkeeping
- Stenography
- Typewriting
- Office and Secretarial Practice

"PARENTS AS TEACHERS" EXPERIMENT DURING EDUCATION WEEK A SUCCESS

An interesting experiment was conducted at Maple School, Chateauguay on March 8th, in conjunction with Education Week. Sponsored by the Home and School Association, and with the full co-operation of the principal and staff, parents volunteered to take over, for a full day, all teaching and supervision duties.

Detailed lesson plans and schedules were prepared in advance by the class teachers and, with text books, were given to the parent volunteers. Opportunity was given for parent-teach-

er discussion on the work to be covered and the various related duties. The parents, for their part, reviewed the material to be taught and, in many cases, prepared very complete lessons. Class teachers spent the day in the staff room, office, medical room, or any other spot where they could work in peace, on preparation of lessons, tests, etc.

CRITICISM OF SCHOOL CLOSING

March 10th, 1961.

Dear Sir,

There has been some criticism regarding our decision to close the Protestant Schools of Chateaugay on March 9th. Through the medium of your paper, I would like to answer this criticism with a brief explanation of the facts which brought about this decision.

Being held responsible in large measure for the academic success or lack thereof, of the pupils of our schools, it follows, therefore, that I am most interested that there be as little time lost as possible. You can be sure that the decision to close school for a day is not lightly made.

This is a wide-spread community. While some two hundred pupils are able to walk to school, the vast majority, over six hundred, are transported by school bus. This is effected by four buses, each making three round

trips morning and afternoon. On the morning of March 9th when it was time for the buses to begin their run, the majority of the streets had not even been plowed. While the buses could have operated on some streets, they could not begin to maintain the complex schedule on which they travel. Consequently, when they would have arrived at the various stops, pupils would have been tired of waiting and would have gone home. Need I dwell on the additional hazards to safety, of children waiting on street corners under blizzard conditions? Add to this, a forecast of 6 to 12 inches of snow, a temperature of 20°, north winds reaching velocities of up to 50 miles per hour and it will be noted that the decision to close schools was made with some foundation.

Notice of school closing was broadcast on the radio from 7.30 a.m. until after 9.00 a.m. through the courtesy of stations CFCF and CFOX. The writer, after answering phone calls steadily from 7.00 to 9.00 a.m., walked to school and spent a full day as usual on school business. I was not alone. Several of the teachers, who were able to get to the school, spent the day there on school work.

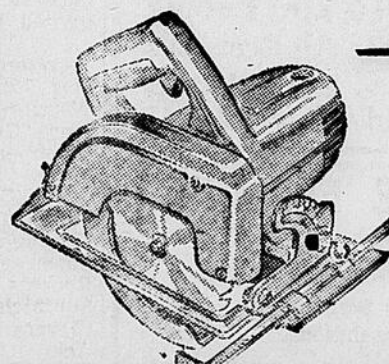

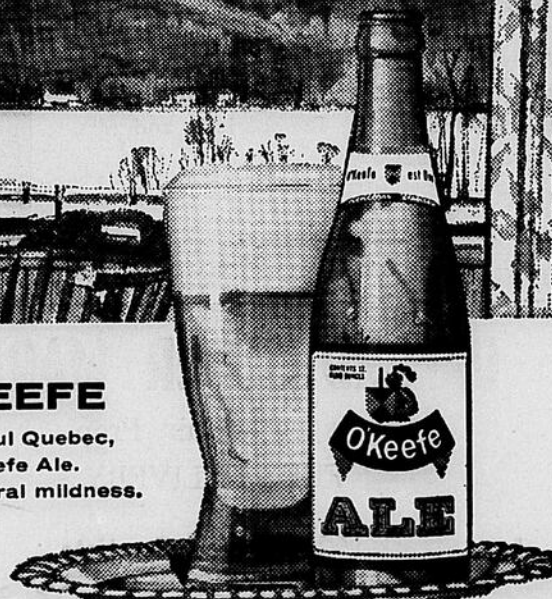
