A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS a Treaty of Peace and Amity between His Britannic Majesty and His Most Christian Majesty was signed at Paris on the Thirtieth day of May last, by the respective Plenipotentiaries of His Britannic Majesty and His Most Christian Majesty, and the signing and ratification of the said Treaty having been officially communicated to me, I do therefore hereby in His Majesty's Name, call upon all His loving Subjects in this Province of Lower Canada, strictly to observe, by Sea and Land, the said Treaty of Peace and Amity existing as aforesaid.

Given under my Hand and Seal of Arms, at the Government House in the City of Montreal, the Eighth day of August in the year of our Lord Christ, one thousand eight hundred and fourteen, and in the fifty-fourth year of His Majesty's Reign.

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THE ENEMY.

The late affairs at Benedict, having excited considerable interest in this place, principally because some of our own fellow citizens bore a distinguished part in it, we have endeavored to obtain a correct and particular account of the occurrences of the day. The following statement may be relied upon.

The Cavalry of the district arrived on Tuesday evening about five o'clock, and at the moment Gen. Stuart was preparing to attack the enemy who were in possession of Benedict. At this moment a small detachment of the enemy presented themselves at the foot of the hill, not far distant from the place where the cavalry were posted. The order was immediately given to charge and intercept their retreat, which was done in so much haste and impetuosity as to break the ranks, which considering the nature of the ground, was not injudicious. Five of the enemy were presently prisoners. The sergeant of the guard having been separated from his men, and endeavoring to make his escape, was pursued. Amongst the first who overtook him, was Mr. Francis Wise of the Alexandria Dragoons, who made a bold but unsuccessful assault upon him, and being unable to check his horse, passed ten or fifteen paces beyond him. On turning his horse, he received the fire of the sergeant and fell dead. At this moment Mr. Alexander Hunter, a young gentleman of this town, (who had volunteered his services for the occasion with the cavalry, and whose conduct has already been the subject of much and well merited commendation,) came up, when the sergeant faced upon him and received the fire of his pistol, which seemed to take effect. Mr. Hunter's horse being alarmed at the report ran some distance from the spot. When Mr. H. returned he found Gen. Stuart engaged with this intrepid soldier. He immediately advanced to the general's rear upon which the sergeant having had his bayonet unshipped, dropped his musket and mounting an adjoining fence fell upon the other side upon his back. Mr. Hunter dismounted, and unarmed, immediately followed and engaged him, demanding of several who had advanced, to aid in securing him. Two of whom presented their pistols, and after calling to Mr. H. to disengage himself from his antagonist, discharged their pistols, without effect. This brave marine then retreated unpursued, to an adjacent swamp. His escape appearing certain, unless immediately pursued, Mr. H. begged the loan of a sword, which was presented him by the general, and with which he alone pursued, and soon overtook him when a conflict ensued between them, the brave enemy endeavoring by many and vigorous efforts to get possession of the sword, and refusing though repeatedly urged, to surrender except with his life, which a fortunate stroke soon after terminated. At this time a trooper made his appearance and drew the brave and expiring enemy to the border of the marsh, whence he was removed, but a short distance before he expired.

We have been thus particular in the relation of this affair, in order to correct some erroneous impressions concerning it, which have been made by the variety of verbal accounts received. M. Mayeux, the Sergeant of Marines, mentioned above was a Frenchman of great personal prowess, and had been 17 years in the British service. He had distinguished himself in Holland and was made sergeant of the royal marines by the Duke of York for his good conduct. He afterwards obtained the warrant of a first sergeant, and at the time of his death held the post appointment of Sergeant Major. He was esteemed by his officers and men one of the most loyal and truly brave soldiers in the British Navy. So say the prisoners, who were taken at Benedict.

The five prisoners taken a few days since at Benedict, together with one deserter, who calls himself an American, were marched through this town yesterday under guard for Washington.

ALBANY, Aug. 12.

A GENERAL ORDER.

Of his Excellency Gen. TOMPKINS reached us too late for today's Argus. It calls into immediate service 3000 men, on the requisition of the President of the United States, and one regiment in the State service, for the defence of the Atlantic frontier.

THE GROUND BROKEN.

This morning the artillery company of captain Bremner, (reinforced to the number of about 70) by volunteers from the 7th ward with the officers of the 3d brigade of infantry under Gen. Mages, repaired to Brooklyn for the purpose of commencing the additional fortifications for the defence of this city, agreeably to the plan of general Swift, of the U. S. engineers, and committee of defence of the corporation. They broke ground about eight o'clock, under a salute from a 6 pounder of capt. Bremner's, on the heights southeast of the Wallabout, on the site of old Fort Green, the works of which are to be repaired in their original form. The lines comprise several acres, and when completed and manned with heavy artillery, as they will be without delay, will make one of the most extensive and formidable field works known to military men. Col.

We understand (says the Democratic Press) from authority fully entitled to credit, that Admiral Cochrane has refused permission to the President of the United States to send a flag vessel, with dispatches to the American commissioners in Europe. We state the fact without comment. The conclusion is inevitable, and cannot be mistaken.

The frigate JAVA was launched at Baltimore on Monday last, amidst the plaudits of 20,000 admiring spectators. She is to be commanded by Capt. PERRY, the gallant Hero of Lake Erie. We are happy to state, that the gallant Captain Porter has been appointed to the command of the new 44 gun frigate now building at Washington.

The late U. S. sloop of war Frolic, has been commissioned at Jamaica, and Capt. Mitchell, of the Nimrod, posted into her. She is said to surpass, in strength and beauty, any ship in the English service.

A letter from Porto Rico, of the 18th ult. states, that the whole province of Caracas is now under the old government.

GENERAL ORDER. At a General Court Martial, held at Kingston, in Upper Canada on the 1st August, 1814, was arraigned Privates Peter Smith and Alexander McKenzie of the Canadian Fencible Regiment, upon the undermentioned Charge:

"Desertion towards the enemy, on or about the 11th July, 1814, when on the march from Fort Wellington to Kingston, and not returning, till brought back by an Escort, on or about the 12th of said month."

Upon which charge the Court came to the following decision: "The Court having maturely weighed, and deliberately considered the Evidence adduced in support of the Prosecution against the Prisoners, Privates Peter Smith and Alexander McKenzie, of the Canadian Fencible Regiment, together with what they have offered in their defence, is of opinion, that the Prisoners are GUILTY of the Crime laid to their Charge; which being in breach of the articles of War, do, by virtue thereof, sentence them the Prisoners, Privates Peter Smith and Alexander McKenzie, of the Canadian Fencible Regiment, to suffer DEATH, by being shot, at such time and place as His Excellency the Commander of the Forces may think fit."

His Excellency the Commander of the Forces approves and confirms the Sentence of DEATH, passed upon Privates Peter Smith and Alexander McKenzie of the Canadian Fencible Regiment, and directs that it be carried into Execution at such time and place as the General Officer commanding at Kingston may direct, in the presence of Detachments of the Garrison. (Signed) EDWARD BAYNES, Adjutant General, N. A.

MONTEAL, 20th August.

On the 15th the enemy's Fleet was only three leagues from Kingston. That place may be considered as in a state of Blockade, on the side of Lake Ontario.

Yesterday evening, 46 American prisoners and 3 officers, taken in the battle of the 25th ult. at Niagara, arrived in Town. By the last advices from Niagara, we are sorry to learn, that Lt. Col. Harvey, Deputy Adj. General, while on a reconnoitring party, received a wound in the Eyebrow, by which he suffers considerable pain.

DIED...On Thursday the 11th instant, The Honorable PAUL ROCH DE ST. OVAIS, aged 68 years, after a long and severe illness which he bore with patience and resignation. He was the most ancient of the Legislative and Executive Councils of this Province, and Col. of the Militia of l'Assomption.

HALIFAX July 30.

The late Treaty between France the right of fishing from Cape St. John to the northern extremity of that Island, thence on that part facing Labrador, through the straits of Belle-Isle, terminating at Cape Ray, in the Gulf of St. Lawrence! Comprise nearly, or quite three quarters of the whole coast of Newfoundland! Grants also the sovereignty of St. Pierre, and Miquillon.

Should France prove as jealous of her fisheries as we ought to be, it will prevent the great injury we apprehend: that of the subjects of the U. States, fishing and smuggling on our coast under the white flag; should they gain such indulgence, our memorials, petitions, &c. for restrictions in the event of a Treaty with them, will be labour lost, for should the fortune of war turn in our favour, and America be forced to accept our conditions of Peace, without being prohibited by France, in participating in her rights of fishing, we shall have lost the only opportunity that may ever offer of framping the commerce of those worthless republicans.

August 1.—His Majesty's Brig l'Espoir, Capt. Duff, from Bermuda, 7 days—Passenger, Colonel Douglas, 98th Regt.—His Majesty's Ships Paclolus and Primrose arrived at Bermuda the 22d ult. from Bourdeaux, which place they left the 2d June, in company with a fleet of Transports, having on board the 4th, 44 and 58th Regiments, three Companies of Artillery, and one of Artillery Drivers, under the command of Gen. Ross—parted from them on the 26th June. Sir ALEXANDER COCHRANE, was still at Bermuda, but would leave the Island immediately after the arrival of the above Troops from Bourdeaux, for some part of the American Coast. Another Regiment was expected at Bermuda from Gibraltar.

Yesterday, His Majesty's Ship Erne, the Hon. Capt. Napier, from Bourdeaux, 42 days—sailed from the Garonne, the 16th June, in company with His Majesty's Ships York and Vengeur, and 43 sail of Transports, bound to Quebec.

On the Banks of Newfoundland, the Erne chased, unsuccessfully, an American privateer brig.

Lord Wellington was at Bourdeaux Jun-18, about to proceed to England.

We are happy to state that for the last seven weeks a Mail has been regularly received every Monday from Quebec—last week in thirteen, and this afternoon, in twelve days—a distance of 632 miles, and a great proportion of it a rugged road.

NAPLES—Murat King of Naples, has arrived in his capital. In his address to his Council of State and Court of Appeal, he announces that the independence of his kingdom is guaranteed to him by the Allies, and promises his subjects a new Constitution. He finished this business with going, accompanied by all his family, to the Cathedral, and kissing the reliques of the glorious St. Januarius!—The Austrian Minister, appointed to the Court of Naples, and also a Russian Officer of distinction, arrived the same day.

POLAND.—The destiny of Poland is at length, decided. Erected into a Kingdom she is to have for her Sovereign the Emperor Alexander, with the title of King of Poland. This is a kind of homage paid to the spirit of independence, at least in a nominal way.

MADAME MOREAU.—From French papers, received by the Olive Branch, we find it stated that Madame Moreau has accepted the invitation of Alexander to reside in Russia. He has allowed her 100,000 rubles to defray the expenses of her journey, an elegant palace near St. Petersburg, for her residence, and an annual pension suitable to the dignity of her rank.

FROM AMERICAN PAPERS.

Head-Quarters, Chippawa, July 25th, 1814.

Dear Sir...On the 23d inst. I received a letter by express from General Gaines, advising me, that on the 20th the heavy guns I had ordered from the Harbour, to enable me to operate against Fort George and Niagara, were blockaded in that port, together with the rifle regiment that I had ordered up with them. I had ordered these guns and troops in boats, provided the Commodore should not deem it prudent or proper to convey them in his fleet, not doubting but that he would have been upon the Lake for their protection, and the enemy would have been driven into port or captured. As General Gaines informed me that the Commodore was confined to his bed with a fever, and as he did not know when the fleet would sail, or when the guns and forces that I had been expecting would even leave Sacket's Harbour, I have thought it proper to change my position, with a view to other objects. You know how greatly I am disappointed, and therefore I will not dwell upon that painful subject; and you can best perceive, how much has been lost by the delay, and the command of Lake Ontario being with the enemy, relieves being placed upon a different state of things. The Indians all left me some time since. It is said they will return, but this you will perceive depends upon circumstances. The reinforcements ordered on from the West have not arrived. From Captain L. Austin, A. D. to Gen. Brown, to the Secretary at War.

H. Q. Buffalo, July 29.

Sir—I have the honor of addressing you by the desire of Gen. Brown, who is now confined by his wounds received in a severe engagement with the enemy, on the afternoon and night of the 25th inst.

Our army had fallen back to Chippawa. The enemy collecting every regiment from Burlington and York, and meeting with no opposition on Lake Ontario, transported by water to Fort George, troops from Kingston, and even Prescott, which enabled them to bring against us a force vastly superior, under command of Lieut. Gen. Drummond and Major Gen. Riall. They were met by us near the Falls of Niagara, where a most severe conflict ensued. The enemy disputed the ground with resolution, yet were driven from every position they attempted to hold. We stormed his batteries directly in front, and took possession of all his artillery. Notwithstanding his immense superiority, both in numbers and position, he was completely defeated, and our troops remained on the battle ground without any interruption. As however, both General Brown and General Scott had received severe wounds, almost every chief of battalion disabled, and our men quite exhausted, it was thought prudent to retire to our encampment, which was done in good order, without any molestation from the enemy—our wounded having first been removed.

Major General Riall, with the aid of camp of Lt. General Drummond, and about twenty other officers, with two hundred privates are taken prisoners.

The loss on both sides is immense—but no account has been returned. The Aid and Brigade Major of General Scott are both severely wounded and Captain Spencer, an Aid to General Brown, most probably dead, having received 2 balls through his body. Both Generals Brown and Scott are on this side confined by their wounds. General Riply commands on the other.

P. S.—General Brown received his wounds at the same instant during a late part of the action, but still continued to keep his horse until exhausted by loss of blood. This probably has rendered his wounds more painful than they would otherwise have been.

BATTLE OF BRIDGEWATER.

Since the opening of the present campaign the Army has rivelled, in brave and gallant exploit, the brightest glories of the navy. The victories of Chippawa and Bridgewater, achieved by our gallant soldiers, bear equal rank with those on Erie and the Atlantic, won by our undaunted tars. The Eagle of our country solemnly towers, and tells to the whole world, that the free born sons of republican America acknowledge no superiors, either on the land or water. The names of Brown, Scott, Ripley, Miller, together with all the other brave officers and men who have so nobly added to the reputation of their country, will ever excite the liveliest emotion of gratitude; Nor will the remembrance of those heroes who have nobly fallen on the field, be quickly effaced.—But Pat.

From the Buffalo Gazette Extra of Aug. 5.

On Wednesday morning last, the enemy crossed the Niagara river, below Squaw Island a mile below Black Rock, with a force said to be rising 1000 regulars, under Lt. Col. TUCKER. They approached Black Rock, and were met at the Conjockets

creek, before day light, by Major MORGAN, with less than 300 riflemen; a part of the enemy crossed the bridge over the creek, but were repulsed, and the bridge taken up. The firing continued nearly three hours, when the enemy finding every effort to cross the creek unavailing, recrossed the river.

During the action, the enemy threw a number of shot and shells across the river. The loss of the enemy must have been rising 50 killed, wounded and missing. Several were found dead, and there were appearances of a number of bodies having been taken away, during the battle; 6 prisoners taken and three deserted. Our loss was 2 killed, and 6 or 8 wounded; among whom, were Capt. Hamilton, and Lieut. McIntosh, dangerously, and Lt. Wadsworth, severely.

In this action, Maj. Morgan and his Corps, have covered themselves with honor. The Major has been joined by Capt. Birdsall, with 150 Riflemen since the action.

The enemy having been disappointed in gaining Buffalo, made a movement on our position at Fort Erie. They opened a fire on the Fort, from a large piece of artillery placed on the point about a mile below, which was answered from the Fort and a schooner in the harbor. The enemy attacked our pickets with a large force, and marched into the open ground in rear of the Fort, and commenced a heavy fire of musketry, which was warmly returned, and a brisk discharge from several pieces of artillery, soon compelled him to retreat in great confusion, leaving a number of his men on the field as the price of his temerity. The actual loss of the enemy we have not ascertained. We had a few wounded.

Extract of a letter from Heimer, N. Y. to the Editor of the N. Y. Commercial Advertiser, dated Aug. 2, evening. "We learn by the western mail of this evening, and also by an officer directed from Gen. Brown's army, that the situation of the remnant of our forces at Erie is gloomy indeed. The army is so much reduced—owing to the immense slaughter in the late battles, and to the small detachments sent off as escorts to the wounded, and as guards over the prisoners—that the main body, now commanded by Gen. Ripley, does not exceed 1000 men; and had just received a summons from the British commander to surrender, and had but two hours time given him to surrender it."

SACKETT'S HARBOR, August 1.

"Sir...I have at length the gratification to announce to you the departure of the fleet. Com. Chauncey, having recovered a sufficient degree of health to resume his duty, was conveyed on board, and with all the force under his command, took his leave of the Harbour early this morning. Ten sail in all. About 1500 militia, commanded by Gen. Martin, have recently arrived at this post, to continue thirty days service, if wanted so long. The officer now commanding the regular troops in this station, is Colonel Mitchell; Gen. Gaines and his staff having started for the westward immediately after the arrival of the news of the recent had fought action at Queens-town.

Gen. Brown, we believe, received a few reinforcements from Erie, just before the recent battle, and others were on their way from Sackett's Harbour and Ohio. When the battle was heard, other troops were sent from Sackett's Harbour.

Reinforcements of Regular troops, from different rendezvous, have been ordered to march for Sackett's Harbour, without delay.

General Riall being severely wounded in the arm remained at Buffalo; the rest of the British officers taken prisoners at Bridgewater, have been sent to Greenbush.

Tribute to valor.—A meeting of the citizens of Baltimore has been proposed for the purpose of instantly raising a sum of money to purchase two most splendid swags, to be presented to maj-gen. Brown and brig. gen. Scott, with inscriptions thereon to convey "gratitude of Baltimore to all the officers and soldiers engaged on these memorable occasions"—the recent battles on the Niagara.—Colon.

PEACE WITH THE WESTERN INDIANS.

Extract of a letter from a gentleman in Cincinnati, (Ohio) to his brother in this town, dated Cincinnati, July 25, 1814.

"The principal object of this communication to you, is to state the completion of the negotiation with the Indian tribes, viz.—Miamiens, Delaware, Pottowatomies, Chickapoes, Shawanoes, Wayandots, &c. &c. lately held at Greenville, 80 miles N. W. from this town; and it gives me much pleasure to inform you that a TREATY OF PEACE, &c. with all of them, is the result. All the tribes assembled at Greenville, have agreed to take up the tomahawk for America. There were in Men, squaws, and Rapposes, about 500. They were a little saucy at first, but the Commissioner gave them a stipulated time, and demanded a categorical answer. Peace is the result of firmness. Should they break again, the whole Western world would rise in mass to put them into the dust."

Resignations...A gentleman from Ohio informs, that the resignation of Maj. Gen. Harrison, excites universal regret in that section of the union, and that the cause was well understood to be the jealousy entertained of him by Gen. Armstrong. The consequence is, that most of the respectable officers in the Western army, being personally attached to Gen. Harrison, have sent in their resignations and abandoned the army in disgust. Among these are Brig. Gen. McArthur, Col. Butler, Lt. Col. Croghan, (the brave defender of Fort Stephenson,) and several others whose names we do not recollect.

Champlain Frontiers...On the 4th inst. all the troops at Plattsburg left that place to join the Main body of Gen. Izard's Army near Odietown. When united, this Army will probably consist of 8 or 9000 men. The British have an Army in front of it of equal or superior strength, and they can unite with it the reinforcements from Europe almost immediately on their arrival. A sanguinary battle is daily expected in this quarter. Reinforcements from different parts of the United States are continually on their march to Plattsburg, where they are removed to head quarters.—Palladium.

On the 23d ult. Two of our gunboats on Lake Champlain captured a raft near the lines, consisting of an immense quantity of planks, several spars, and 27 barrels of the enemy's best Eight pound shot, &c. of the U. S. were found on board the raft, and are in command.

From Plattsburgh, Aug 5.—Our fleet continue near Chazy—that of the enemy near Anisland.

Three or four hundred troops arrived at this place from Sackett's Harbour, on Wednesday last.

The Intelligence, has come out with a few comments on Gen. Wilkinson's defence. The amount of which is, that Gen. Wilkinson, in his attack on La Cole, did what he was forbidden to do, and omitted to do what he was ordered to accomplish. The government are therefore at issue with their commander in chief.

British Goods.—An Albany article of August 2 says—"seventy wagon loads of fine English Goods from Canada, arrived there on the day previous, from Burlington, where they were landed."

From the New London Gazette, Aug. 12.

The enemy at Stonnington.

At 8 o'clock last evening, (after this paper was put to press) an express arrived at Gen. Cushing's head quarters, from Stonnington: with information that two frigates and a brig had arrived in that harbour, and demanded the surrender of the town, or that it should be laid in ashes; to which demand an answer was given that the inhabitants would defend their fire sides with their lives.

At the request of Gen. Cushing, Gen. Williams ordered out the 6th and 30th regiments for the defence of that town. Congre rockets were fired on shore during the night, without injury; and this morning at sunrise a cannonade commenced, and still continues, at 6 o'clock.

The militia have collected in such force as to prevent a landing, but we fear the pace will be untried, as the enemy are lying within half gun-shot and our only defence is two long pound dea.

The expedition is commanded by Commodore Hardy.

New-LONDON, Aug. 7.—The blockading fleet off here has this day been augmented to ten or eleven sail—Admiral Cochrane with them. We are all in alarm! And the general opinion is, that the first attempt will be the destruction of our vessels in the river.

HARTFORD, Aug 8.—Capt. Boardman has arrived here late this evening from New-London, having left there after dinner, and brings information that 18 sail of British ships came into that place this morning and anchored just by the light house, across the mouth of the harbour. The light house is about 2 and a half miles below the town, and one and a half below the fort. The width of the river for the whole distance is about three-fourths of a mile.

The Steam Boat arrived this morning, brings no news of any importance from Montreal.

At the latest dates, the state of affairs on the Niagara Frontier remained as stated last week. Some skirmishes had taken place. It was, however, reported, that Capt. DOBBS had succeeded in capturing some of the Enemy's gun vessels near Fort Erie.

The British fleet on Lake Ontario remain in harbor at Kingston.

On the Champlain frontier nothing has lately occurred excepting the skirmishing of Scouts at the out posts: important movements seemed, however, to be preparing.

In the present state of military operations, peace is generally expected. We dread a peace which may be concluded in Europe under the present circumstances of the war. Such a peace will only defer the designs of the enemy against these Provinces till a more favorable opportunity, without much probability of it containing any provisions for their future security. We are fully persuaded that En land, with a very limited exertion of her means, possesses the power of obtaining such a security, and breaking for ever that spirit of pride and presumption which makes the Americans so universally calculating on the undivided empire of North America. The Americans ought to be made to know that the war which they meditated to carry on in the British possessions, can be successfully transferred to their own territory; that an undisciplined militia cannot prevent a country from being overrun with impunity by a well organized and well conducted regular army; in short, that they were indebted for their Saratoga and York Towns, to causes entirely independent of their own strength.

The Wheat Harvest is begun in this District. The early Weats, of which a much greater proportion than usual has been sown, prove remarkably good. The four months Wheat is not yet ripe, and its quality cannot be fully ascertained. The crop of Hay has been better than common, but a great proportion of it is not yet saved, owing to the badness of the weather. Much of what is saved, is injured in quality. Peas and Oats are uncommonly promising. Indeed the year seems to be abundant in all the productions of the soil.

MAD DOGS.—There is unfortunately still some reason for agitating this melancholy subject. Three children were bitten on Monday in St. John Suburbs, by a strange dog passing alone along the street, apparently affected with the disorder. Several dogs, supposed to be mad, have also been lately killed in the city and suburbs, some of them by their owners.

It is to be regretted, that the salutary caution given and Lament Order made some time ago by the Magistrates of this District, has not been more generally attended to. Danger which is not present, and in some degree uncertain, has little influence on the bulk of mankind. Individuals who know of dogs having been bitten, will not take the trouble to go to a Peace-Officer and give the information. Owners of dogs who know that they have been bitten, from an attachment which is very general to that animal, continue to keep them, in the hope that they will not be infected, till they suddenly run off, biting every animal they meet. For days together, before they die of the disorder or are killed. The dog that bit the children in St. John suburbs escaped. Many others in the country, after doing great injury, have also escaped. It is thus that the disorder is perpetuated. Many dogs lying about their owners' doors, as well as other animals, are bitten, both in the night time and in the day, without its being perceived by any one. They in their turn, are attacked with the disorder, and run off, committing similar ravages.

Circumstances may render every dog going at large a public nuisance. It is that, case, it will not only become lawful to kill them, but their owners will also be liable to fine and imprisonment. At this moment, a person can hardly walk the streets of Quebec without driving the dog out of his way. It is not unfrequently that crowds of dogs are met with, which idle and disorderly persons abuse themselves with, by making them fight. At every church door in the country, on Sunday, there are at least as many dogs as carts or other carriages. It is easy to judge, to what extent the evil may reach, if it should unfortunately continue, without a speedy remedy. It is certain, that the existence of all the dogs in the country, can never be preferred for a moment to the life of any one, even of the very meanest of the King's subjects.

It may be proper to observe, that the best Medical Writers in Europe agree, that the time between the bite of a mad animal and the appearance of the disorder, is uncertain, from three to one hundred days, and even more; that when the disorder does appear, it is invariably mortal; that there is no safe preventive, but the immediate cutting out of the injured part, or as speedily as a Surgeon can be procured; but that out of twenty to thirty persons bitten by this maddened animal, it has been known that only one has had the disorder; that the danger is greater when the bite is on an uncovered part of the body than on a part which was covered at the time; that there is no certain indication by which it may be known when a dog is mad so as to be able to communicate the disease; that the bite of every other animal affected with the disorder, is equally capable of communicating it.

No dog or other animal supposed to be mad, ought to be irritated or alarmed. If he cannot be killed, it is better to let him pass quietly, as he is frequently disposed to do. A contrary conduct only increases the mischief. It might also be observed, that the bite of a mad animal, whether previously mad or not, after they have been greatly irritated, or maltreated and driven to despair, is capable of communicating the terrible disorder called Hydrophobia.

It has been remarked that dogs which have been badly fed, are more liable to the disorder than those that have been well fed, and are in good flesh. Dogs have been known to become infected by having been kept in a place where a mad dog was formerly kept. The disorder does not seem to prevail more in hot than in cold seasons. In the present season, the disorder made its appearance in this neighbourhood, when the snow was on the ground. Seven all dogs had died at Chateaubourg, in consequence of the bite of a mad dog, previous to the 11th April. The dog which bit so many dogs that have since run mad at Chateaubourg, was killed in the parish of Ste. Foy, was killed in Easter week, after having bitten his owner's horse, which is since dead of the disorder.
