FRESH IMPULSE TO FEDERATION

Duke's Tour Another Instance of Prescience and Tact of King Edward.

New York, Aug. 26.—The London correspondent of the New York Tribune, Mr. Isaac N. Ford, sends the following special cable despatch: Royalty comes out of the storm and stress of the war creditably to the Government or the Opposition. The military campaign from the outset has been blocked and thwarted by lack of official foresight and practical talent. Blunders have followed blunders, but the final exhibition of incapacity was the recruiting of sixteen thousand Imperial Yeomanry with men who could neither ride nor shoot. Lord Kitchener's ironical description of this corps of uneducated and invalid soldiers has discredited the War Office, which paid a premium of five shillings a day for troopers of this class as substitutes for seasoned men. The Opposition would have been able to make effective use of this demonstration of official ineptitude if it had taken a patriotic stand from the outbreak of the war. LIMITED TRAIN WRECKED

Columbia, S.O., Aug. 25.—The Florida and Metropolitan Limited train of the Seaboard Air Line was wrecked last night seven miles south of Cheraw, S.C. The accident was due to a sandbank washed out. The killed and wounded: Fireman Rosemond, crushed to death; Engineer Muse, shoulder and leg injured; Tom Cleary, engineer, injured in knees and legs; postal clerk, name unknown, slightly bruised.

The other passengers escaped with a severe shaking up. The engine and four front cars left the track, turned completely over; and the truck was torn up for one hundred and fifty yards.

Indianapolis, Aug. 25.—Fourteen persons were injured here to-day in a collision between a Greenfield inter-suburban car and a freight train on the Belt road. The car was thrown to one side but not crushed, and each of the twelve passengers were more or less injured, as were the conductor and motorman.

MARRIAGE LAWS.

Mr. Cephas Brainerd, of New York, presided over the most important four sessions of the International Law Association in Glasgow, when Justice Phillimore read a paper on marriage laws, and there was a prolonged discussion. The debate disclosed little faith among lawyers that civilized nations could agree upon a uniform code of marriage and divorce law. Scotland was described as the country where marriage could be most hastily projected, and South Africa as the land where it could be most easily dissolved, twenty-four hours' desertion being sufficient ground for an absolute decree of divorce.

LONDON'S POOR.

Whitehall, for the third time in six years, is being broken up by the contractor in attempting to break all records of London street repairing by doing the work in ten days. The paths of London poverty is disclosed day by day in this historic street. A horde of children with sacks and barrows removes the old road as fast as it is loosened by the pick-axe. Claims are pegged off, as if Whitehall were a mining belt, and firewood is collected as eagerly as if there were gold in each broken block.

HEAVY TOURIST TRAFFIC.

The Deutschland, the Campania and the St. Louis have gone out with every berth occupied, and another steamer could have been filled with Americans, seeking passage to New York. The accommodation offered by the trans-Atlantic lines was never larger, but during the next six weeks it will be unequal to the demands of travellers. Tourist traffic, while unusually heavy, does not explain this rush for places on westward bound ships. The tourists, with few exceptions, are booked for a return passage when they sail from America. There has been a marked increase in commercial traffic between the two countries, and business men are unable to time their journeys with precision as crowded out when they attempt to secure passage at the busiest time of the steamship trade. Lord Strathcona, Mr. William D. Washburn, Mr. E. Fielding and Morris S. Wise, are among those sailing to-day. Monsignor Doane has returned to London for a final fortnight, and will sail on the Oceanic.

THE METROPOLITAN RAILWAY.

New York, Aug. 25.—Geo. Westinghouse, who has returned from England yesterday, said that there were no differences between Mr. Yerkes and himself, and that Mr. Yerkes has awarded to the British Westinghouse Company the contract for 30,000 of horse-power engines and generators for his metropolitan district railway enterprise and will require much more apparatus, the manufacture of which in England will be advantageous to his interests.
