PROVINCIAL SYNOD.

Afternoon Session.

The House reassembled at 2.30.

The rules of order were suspended

for the following reasons: The Bishop

of Montreal, Dr. F. X. Laflamme, se-

conded by Rev. J. A. Preston, seconded

by Rev. Mr. Bleasdel, that the Prolo-

cator be requested to name a committee

on the question of the Diocese—Car-

ried.

The debate on the canon on the elec-

tion of the Metropolitan was resumed.

Rev. B. Roe continued his remarks,

speaking against the canon, on the

ground that it was not necessary to

change the manner of electing the Metro-

politan. He moved to change the title

of that of Primate. Ruled out of order,

and the canon was carried: 90 to 9.

The motion was carried to appoint in a

report recommending that the Bishop

of Fredericton, Nova Scotia, and Quebec

consider the question, and that a joint

report be made next year.

The Oaths Canon was referred to a

committee, also the resolution relative

to the admission of women to the min-

istry. Article 9 of the constitution

was amended so that the printed

journal may be taken as the record of

the Synod. The minutes of the writing

out all the minutes, was carried.

Rev. C. Hamilton's motion to recom-

mend the several Diocesan Synods of the

Province to consider the expediency of

several Provincial Legislatures for the

repeal of certain acts, was referred to a

committee.

The question of an evening session was

brought up, and it was decided not to

have one.

Ven. Canon Balch moved, seconded

by Rev. B. Roe, that the Synod be

requested to appoint a committee to con-

fer with a committee of the Bishop of

Quebec, and to report on the question of

the Provincial Synod, to recommend such

measures for adoption by both Houses as

may be deemed best for the promotion

of the Synod and the Sister Church of

the United States.

Carried.

Dean Bond moved,

that this Synod believe it to be a

present duty of the Church to take spe-

cial action in favor of Temperance, and

The Synod, therefore, respect-

fully invites all Clergymen to take the

lead in abstinence from dangerous con-

sumption, and to encourage the same

among the laity, and to see that their

flocks the Christian duty of self-denial

for the sake of the weak and the tempted,

and to organize Temperance Societies

in their Churches and Schools.

Dean Bond strongly urged the impor-

tance of temperance, and claimed that

it was the duty of the Church to take

action in this matter. He went on to en-

The door once opened, other endorsements followed, and the inevitable consequences of further and deeper entanglement. Renewal and renewals were required, pending arrangements for negotiation of bonds. Then followed demands for further endorsements, still, which went on until the commitments on this account were enormously in excess of those required for the support of his own trade.

Every one knows what an all-devouring business the construction of a railway is. What constant demands for money; what strain upon those who are in charge of its finances; what negotiations about bonds, either selling or pledging; what a running from bank to bank, and a running from city to city, what interminable correspondence, telegraphing and cabling. In such a web of entanglement did this merchant find himself, who, when he began his own business, had been a model of prudence, foresight, and punctuality. Negotiations have been going on for some months, which it was hoped would lead to a successful result, but the result has proved them unavailing. Creditors began to sue, and matters specially came to a crisis. There was no help for it. Insolvency had to be declared, and the merchant found himself a bankrupt.
