NOVA SCOTIA VOTES FOR NEW LIQUOR SYSTEM

Andre Tardieu Will Attempt To Form A French Cabinet

Liquor Control
By Government
In Nova Scotia

Approximately Eighty-Five Thousand Voters Registered Their Preference in Yesterday's Plebiscite for a Trial of System Now in Effect in Several Provinces, While Sixty-One Thousand Marked Their Ballots for Retention of Present Prohibitory Law.

HALIFAX, N.S., Nov. 1.—The electorate of Nova Scotia has gone on record as favoring government control of the sale of liquor. Approximately eighty-five thousand voters registered their preference in yesterday's plebiscite for a trial of the system now in effect in several provinces, while sixty-one thousand marked their ballots for the retention of the present prohibitory law.

Urged, but not required, to vote "yes" or "no" on both questions—retention of the Nova Scotia Temperance Act or introduction of government sale, the electors exercised their franchise on only one. As a result, five thousand more persons voted for the Temperance Act than voted against it, although the majority favoring government control over the act was approximately twenty-four thousand. Taking the negative vote, fifty-six thousand persons voted against the present act, and forty-one thousand against government sale, giving government control a majority of fifteen thousand on this side of the question.

Declares Plebiscite Not Final Settlement of Question

Both J. H. Winfield, president of the Temperance Reform Association, which has led the fight against the act, and Dr. H. R. Grant, the act's chief protagonist, issued statements last night interpreting these figures as spurring the defeat of prohibition. Dr. Grant declared, however, that the present plebiscite was not a final settlement of the question. Mr. Winfield appealed to the people of the province, especially those connected with the church, to assist in the enforcement of the forthcoming control law.

Three to One for Government Control

Halifax, only division to vote against prohibition in the 1920 plebiscite, went three to one for government control, including Halifax city. This constituency recorded the largest vote, 23,115 favoring government control against 6,254 for the N. S. T. A.

Constituencies supporting government control were Antigonish, Guysboro, Halifax, Pictou, Digby, Lunenburg, Cape Breton Centre, Cape Breton East, Richmond-West, Cape Breton and Victoria. Majorities for the N. S. T. A. were returned in Annapolis, Colchester, Cumberland, Hants, Kings, Queens, Shelburne and Yarmouth. Every constituency in Cape Breton Island favored government control.

About 150,000 voters went to the polls. In the last provincial general elections, 179,393 voted.

Province To Assume Responsibility of Enforcement

During the plebiscite campaign Premier E. N. Rhodes said that any government control act necessary to enforce the best features of the control acts of other provinces, and government shops would be established only in communities where the majority so desired. The province would assume responsibility of enforcement and establish an efficient constabulary to ensure observance of the law. An independent Commission would administer the act. Last night Premier Rhodes preferred more complete information before making a statement.

Campaign Was Waged With All Vigor of Election

The campaign culminating in yesterday's vote was waged with all the vigor of a general election. For the first time in the history of the province, prohibition forces encountered organized opposition, when the Temperance Reform Association was formed. Prominent citizens lined up on both sides, and speakers were brought in from other provinces.

The previous plebiscite on the liquor question in Nova Scotia, held in 1920, was "for and against" the prohibition of the importation and bringing of intoxicating liquors into such "provinces." The majority for prohibition was 84,422, with 23,874

British Premier Has Ended
Triumphant Peace Tour And
Is Once Again In England

Was Given Enthusiastic Reception from Crowd on Station Platform as He Stepped Out of His Salon Car—Prior to Meeting Reception Committee, Premier MacDonald Gave Newspapermen Who Accompanied Him from Quebec a Formal Statement in Which He Outlined His Mission.

LONDON, Nov. 1.—Premier MacDonald, returning from his peace mission to the United States, arrived in London early this afternoon and received an enthusiastic reception from a crowd on the station platform as he stepped out of his saloon car.

Prior to meeting the reception committee at Liverpool, where he disembarked from the "Duchess of York" and later returned to London. Mr. MacDonald gave to the newspapermen who accompanied him from Quebec a formal statement in which he said his mission to the United States and Canada had been successful, and he believed his conversations with President Hoover would further the ideal of world peace.

"The exchange of views I was able to have with Premier Mackenzie King of Canada, both of the United States mission and on imperial affairs was most advantageous and timely.

"Throughout my visit I have endeavored as best I could to voice what I believed to be the peaceful aspirations of the British peoples in all parts of the empire, and to that I have met with nothing but the most welcome response.

"I am encouraged in this confidence by remembering that I have been accompanied throughout by representatives of the press, of all shades of opinion and that the press of this country, of the United States and Canada have been almost uniformly favorable and helpful to the ends I have had in view."

The Premier, refreshed by one long last full night's sleep, assured his well-wishers he was in the best of health and overjoyed to be back on British soil. He seemed buoyant and jovial, and was hearty in his greetings.

His return was just more than a month after his departure on September 28th.

Perhaps the first plebiscite of this nature was held on March 15, 1894, when Nova Scotians were overwhelmingly in favor of prohibition, 43,756 voting dry and 12,355 wet.
The Nova Scotia Temperance Act has been in force since 1916.

UNSETTLED, BECOMING
WARMER

PREMIER KING
WAS WELCOMED
IN WINNIPEG

Attended Private Dinner at Manitoba Club and Later Shook Hands With Many Citizens at Public Reception in Fort Garry Hotel.

WINNIPEG, Nov. 1.—A whole-hearted welcome, which one of the worst storms of the season failed to dampen, greeted Prime Minister Mackenzie King on his arrival from Ottawa last night. Met at the station by a number of prominent Liberals, Mr. King was the guest immediately afterwards at a private dinner in the Manitoba Club where one hundred and fifty leading business and professional men were gathered.

In order to give a more general opportunity to friends and well-wishers to meet the Prime Minister a reception was arranged by the greater Winnipeg Liberal Association in the ball room of the Fort Garry Hotel at the conclusion of the dinner. Here Mr. King shook hands with a great number of citizens of all walks of life. The reception was followed by a dance.

THOMAS' CANADIAN TRIP
EXPENSES REACHED \$3,250

(Associated Press Despatch)
LONDON, Nov. 1.—Rt. Hon. J. H. Thomas' visit to Canada to further trade between the Dominion and Great Britain, cost Britain just \$3,250. This is an interesting item in the supplementary estimates for about \$8,550,000, details of which were issued yesterday.

To defray the salaries and expenses of the office of the Lord Privy Seal (Mr. Thomas and staff) requires \$51,250, the amount including \$12,200 for Mr. Thomas himself, his salary being \$25,000 per year as from June 8 last.

The larger part of the total required is a grant in aid of rating authorities in Scotland, following the great reduction in local taxation of industry and agriculture.

This grant amounts to \$6,000,000.

Iron And Steel Products Are To
Be Given Study By Tariff Board

November 26 Has Been Announced as Date When, at Request of Minister of Finance, Advisory Board of Tariff and Taxation Will Resume Its Hearings—Will Be of Unusually Important Character and Will Possess Significance for All Persons Who Are Either Makers or Users of Iron and Steel Products in Any Form.

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 1.—Under instructions from the Minister of Finance to be prepared to submit a comprehensive schedule of iron and steel products, the Advisory Board on Tariff and Taxation will resume, on November 26th, its public sittings respecting iron and steel products. The Minister's latest letter to the Board being a warrant to widen its inquiry "so as to cover all tariff items bearing upon the iron and steel industry in Canada."

"It has been stated in Parliament that certain Canadian manufacturers of automobiles have been and are now taking full price advantage of an exemption of excise taxes provided under the budget legislation of 1926.

"I request that you at once start an enquiry into the relative prices in Canada and the United States, as well as an enquiry into the percentage of content Canadian material and labor used in each of the several models upon which exemption from excise tax is now claimed. I specially desire enquiry into charges that certain companies have not given their customers the reduction promised."

Numerous Applications Before Board.

Prior to receiving this widened reference, the Board had before it numerous applications relating to iron and steel, notable of course, those by the Algoma Steel Corporation and the Dominion Iron and Steel Company (formerly British Empire Steel Corporation). These latter are now embraced in the wider reference, as are all others which pertain to the iron and steel schedule.

Among the individual applications which will be reviewed at the sittings are the following: The major applications by the primary steel producers; all related applications which were incorporated therewith at previous public sittings, among which were those regarding stoves, printing machinery, nickel chromium wire, blowers for furnaces, individual reference covering the following: Small hand sprayers, electrical light and power plants, road grading machinery, enamelled ware, motorcycles, bicycles, mining machinery, clay working machinery, harness, hardware, aeroplane engines, corn husking machinery, gasoline tractors for other than farm purposes, lumber carriages, anaesthetic apparatus and parts therefor, copper coated steel

RECENT ACTION
AT THE HAGUE
IS EXPLAINED

Reparations Plan, Government Bill for Pensions Extension and Additional "Doles" and Attempts to Settle Coal Problem Came in for Mention in British House of Commons Yesterday.

(Associated Press Despatch)
LONDON, Nov. 1.—"Parliamentary" explanations of ministerial actions at The Hague conference on the reparations plan, of the Government bill for pensions extension and additional "doles", and of attempts to settle the coal problem, were given in the House of Commons yesterday.

Right Hon. Philip Snowden, Chancellor of the Exchequer, said that the reparations plan, as adopted at The Hague, would provide Great Britain with sufficient German reparations to cover this country's debt payments to the United States. He added that the advantages of The Hague settlement could be approximated at about \$10,000,000 yearly for thirty-seven years.

There will, therefore, be a small set off each year against the accumulated deficit between Great Britain's war debt receipts and the payments which she had already made.

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WELL KNOWN MEN
OF THE
EASTERN TOWNSHIPS

MR. THOMAS KEELEY

Mr. Thomas Keeley, who came to Sherbrooke in May, 1914, to assume the duties of inspector and superintendent of the Gibb's Home for boys, was born in England of Irish parents on August 15th, 1879, and comes of an ancestry that devoted its energies to agriculture and military service. He attended elementary school until the age of eleven, and for three years was at a private boarding school, after which he was tutored by his eldest brother, Mr. J. R. Keeley, M.A., L.L.B., B.L.

At the age of sixteen Mr. Keeley embraced a military career and proceeded to South Africa in February, 1898. He was a military schoolmaster in Cape Colony until the outbreak of the Boer War in October, 1899, when he joined a brigade described in the official records as having put in as much hard work in marching and fighting as any body of troops in the whole campaign. Mr. Keeley was mentioned in despatches for saving wounded under fire and was invalided to England in 1902.

During his military career he was interested in shooting and athletics, and in his last year won the regimental championship in the one hundred yards flat race and the one hundred and twenty yards hurdle race. After leaving the army he took an active interest in establishing miniature rifle clubs in several villages in the County of Cheshire. In the early days of the Boy Scout movement he became a scoutmaster, formed one troop, and acted as instructor to two other troops organized within a year in the same village.

In 1905, whilst visiting at a boys' home Mr. Keeley made the acquaintance of Reverend Prebendary Rudolf, an outstanding personality in child welfare work. Mr. Rudolf in 1881 had founded an organization in London for the underprivileged juvenile members of the Church of England for caring for the organization is the second largest of its kind in Great Britain. It now maintains over one hundred homes, caring for nearly five thousand children, and when the fiftieth anniversary is celebrated in 1931 it will have given a start in life to about thirty-five thousand youths.

Mr. Keeley cast in his lot with Mr. Rudolf and served in a home for forty-five boys in England. During the following nine years he trained some hundreds of lads, many of whom ultimately made their homes in Canada. The society now maintains a distributing home for boys in Quebec Province and one for girls in Ontario, from which juveniles over fourteen years of age are placed in agricultural and domestic employment, respectively.

In the years 1908 to 1913 Mr. Keeley proceeded to Canada for a few weeks in each year to visit as many boys as possible on the farms during the limited time at his disposal. In May, 1914, he arrived in Sherbrooke to assume the duties of inspector and superintendent of the Gibb's Home.

During his residence in Sherbrooke Mr. Keeley has been keenly interested in community activities. He revived the 1st Sherbrooke Troop of Boy Scouts in 1915, later serving as district scoutmaster and member of the local Scout Association. He has been a member of the Y.M.C.A. for many years and served a term as director. He is a member of the Rotary and Canadian Clubs, the Board of Trade and the Sherbrooke Country Club and is also a charter member of the Canadian Association of Social Workers. Mr. Keeley also belongs to the Royal Arch Masons, and during the present year is Worthy Patron of the Sherbrooke Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star. An Anglican in religion, Mr. Keeley has been a delegate to the Quebec Synod for several years, and has served in other capacities in the Church of the Advent, East Sherbrooke.

WELSH LOCOMOTIVE COAL
WAS SENT TO DOMINION

Nine Hundred Tons Sent During Past Summer on Private Account, According to Statement Made in House by Right Hon. J. H. Thomas.

LONDON, Nov. 1.—About nine hundred tons of Welsh locomotive coal have been sent to Canada during the past summer on private account, without expenditure of government money, said Right Hon. J. H. Thomas in the House of Commons last night.

Canadian coal brought back to England had been supplied without charge, he added. Experiments are still progressing on the mixing of this Canadian coal with British coal in an endeavor to provide a satisfactory fuel the marketing of which would benefit both countries.

REDUCTION IN PRICES OF
FORD CARS ANNOUNCED

Prices Will Be Cut \$5 to \$200, According to Announcement Made by Edsel Ford Last Night.

DETROIT, Mich., Nov. 1.—Edsel Ford, president of the Ford Motor Company, last night announced substantial reductions in the prices of Ford cars and trucks. While Mr. Ford's announcement did not state the amounts of reductions, it is understood prices will be lowered \$5 to \$200.

"We are reducing prices now because we feel that such a step is the best contribution that can be made to assure a continuation of good business throughout the country. Our dealers are assisting in the move by accepting a reduction in their discounts," the statement said.

India Promised Same
Status As Dominions
By Labor Government

Accord Between British and Native States, However, First Essential — Viceroy Issues Special Royal Gazette Explaining Government's Viewpoint on Situation—Parliament to Consider Simon Report.

(Associated Press Despatch)
NEW DELHI, India, Nov. 1.—The British Government desires that India, in the fullness of time, should take her place in the Empire in equal partnership with the Dominions. But adjustment of relations between British India and the Indian native states is necessary, before British policy in India is followed to its complete fulfillment.

This is the gist of a long statement by Lord Irwin, Viceroy of India, made public in an extraordinary issue of the Royal Gazette of New Delhi last night, following a visit to England by Lord Irwin. The statement follows publication of letters exchanged between Sir John Simon, head of the commission on Indian statutory reform, and Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald of Great Britain. It indicates the real intentions of the British Government, following much speculation in newspapers recently on the possibility of granting of Dominion status to India.

Fundamentally Loyal.

"The great mass of Indian opinion, irrespective of all divisions of race or religion, is fundamentally loyal to the King Emperor, only wanting to understand and be understood," says the Viceroy's statement. It had been rumored the Imperial Government might pronounce simultaneously in Delhi and London, India's Dominion status, and India had been awaiting some pronouncement with feverish impatience. This was not diminished by the letter from Lord Irwin.

Hon. Mr. Forke Advocates Orderly
Policy In Immigration For Canada

Influx of Newcomers Should Be Kept in Relation to Country's Absorption Power—British and Northern Europe Settlers Welcome—Country Has Need of Energetic People—Canada Continues to Be Attractive Field for New Settlers.

OTTAWA, Nov. 1.—"Canada's immigration policy must be related to the number of people the country can absorb with advantage to themselves and to the country of their adoption," declared Hon. Robert Forke, Minister of Immigration and Colonization, whose contribution to the series of government talks on "The Nation's Business," was the radio broadcast was delivered for him last evening by P. C. Blair, Assistant Deputy Minister.

"Between 1901 and 1914 Canada gave away upwards of 450,000 homesteads, an area of more than 70,000,000 acres of land. While that land was being settled a new country was being opened up. Railways, roads, cities, towns and villages, as well as farm homes were being built, thus offering employment to an almost unlimited quantity of skilled and unskilled labor. During that period transportation was cheap and the European settler would not at least see his capital vanish in the process of exchange. Transportation costs, coupled with loss on exchange, has seriously affected immigration. Prior to the war a Britisher might move from Liverpool to Quebec at a cost of \$30, and a continental immigrant from Antwerp to Quebec was approximately the same cost. Until recently the British immigrant paid from \$84.50 to \$87.50 (unless he was assisted by the Government) the continental immigrant \$112.50 for the same voyage.

"It is perhaps reasonable to suppose that 166,728 immigrants who came to Canada in 1928 and established permanent homes for themselves may constitute a better record than some of the preceding years when a much larger number came, who were merely transients taking advantage of an unprecedented demand for labor in the opening of a new country in western Canada and afterwards returning

WINTER ROAD
SUGGESTION IS
WELL RECEIVED

Announcement Made by Provincial Government Meets With Approval of Royal Automobile Club of Canada—Open Road Throughout Winter Month Would Greatly Help Various Municipalities.

MONTREAL, Nov. 1.—Hon. J. E. Perrault's announcement that the provincial Government will keep open two hundred miles of roads during the coming winter was received with great satisfaction by the officials of the Royal Automobile Club of Canada yesterday, especially as it is regarded as proving the success of the experiment in keeping the King Edward Highway open to Rouens Point last season.

Col. P. R. Hanson, the president, said that the interest of various municipalities around Montreal has been steadily increasing, and the club has had numerous letters and visits from their officials, asking the R. A. C. to support them in the campaign for winter roads. Included in these are L'Epiphanie, L'Assomption, St. Jerome, Chambly and Solesmes.

The Colonel also pointed out that the maintenance of the King Edward Highway during the winter months not only served commercial needs, but also provides connections for a thriving town like St. Johns, and makes the international highway easily round route.

In this connection, Alderman Theodore G. Morgan, president of the Montreal Tourist and Convention Bureau, stated that announcements would be made to this effect in the bureau's advertising through United States newspapers, recounting the prevalent suppositions that it is impossible to travel by automobile from New York State to Montreal during the winter months.

LITTLE DAMAGE
WAS REPORTED
LAST EVENINGVigilance of Police Prevented
Many Great Depredations of
Annual Feast of the Spirits.

Eerie creatures of all natures, ghosts, devils, bats and others impossible to classify, were to be noticed flitting around Sherbrooke streets last evening on the occasion of the great feast of the spirits, Halloween.

Householders would hear the doorbell ring, and upon opening the door would find a host of children of various ages earnestly beseeching charity. Usually the youngsters were made welcome and, upon being invited in, the old Halloween games of ducking the apple, nut hunts, etc., were indulged in.

Although this celebration of Halloween falls upon the eve of All Saints' Day, it has no connection with this great church festival, having its origin in the dim antiquity of the sun and fire worshipping Druid religion that prevailed in the British Isles long before the Christian era.

On this night the sun god was supposed to allow the souls of the departed to walk the paths they had passed during their life, and unless fires were lit to show them the way and proper refreshments provided to appease their hunger, all kinds of trouble might be expected for unthinking humans.

Although large numbers of small children take this opportunity of playing a number of innocent pranks, such as removing doormats, milk bottles, chairs and similar articles from the verandas, older boys that should have known better carried out a number of so-called practical jokes that must have brought little pleasure to themselves and nothing but trouble and inconvenience to their subjects.

No serious damage to property or person was reported in Sherbrooke, but stories coming in from Lennoxville and other outlying towns tell of stairs being removed, walks torn up, fences broken, wind-downs smashed and many other outrages committed.

Police Had Busy Time

Although no great property damage was reported at police headquarters this morning, the members of the department spent a busy night. No less than eight times calls were received for gatherings of youngsters who had started upon work of destruction. The patrol was dispatched each time and the offenders rounded up and brought to headquarters, where they were given a severe warning by the officers in charge. This evidently proved effective, as the same offender never appeared twice.

Constables on the beat found considerable work in replacing articles. Benches which had been removed from the various squares and parks by the spirits were placed across the sidewalk and roadways, and had to be put back in position by the officers. Sewer and manhole covers were taken and the police had to make a search for the same, in order to remove the danger of anyone falling into the holes left by the removal.

One False Alarm
Motorcycle police touring the streets played an important part in the preservation of law and order, as many gatherings of ghosts and devils vanished into thin air on hearing the put-put of the patrolling machines.

Only one false alarm was turned in, when about 1.30 o'clock this morning a call was received from the box at the corner of Bowen and Terrill avenues. Three stations responded to the call, but on their arrival no trace of fire could be found anywhere in the district.

EAST BROUGHTON, November 1.—A large building capable of holding over 100,000 tons of dried asbestos rock will be constructed here by the Newton Construction Company, Sherbrooke, for the Quebec Asbestos Company, according to an announcement made by the company this morning.

The new building, which will be 250 by 460 feet, will be one of the largest of its kind in Canada. Some idea of the size of the building may be determined from the fact that it is estimated that the fill required for the bin will be over a half million cubic yards.

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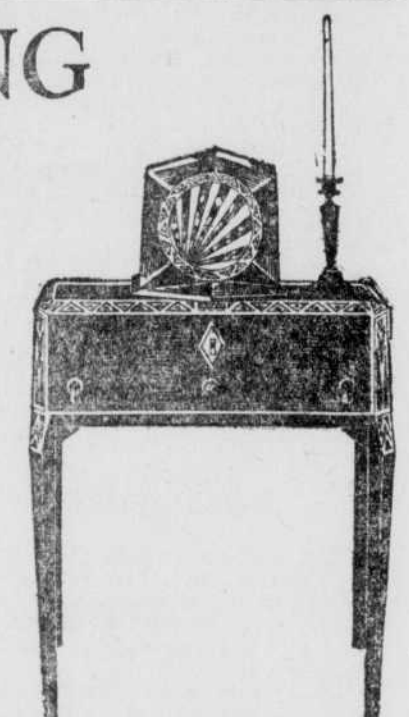
