Parcel Post to Canada.—Comprises such articles of general merchandise as are not entitled to any lower rate of postage. Postage rates can be ascertained at any Post Office. Limit of weight, 15 lbs.; or of size, 3½ ft. in length of width or depth, in no case must the combined length and girth exceed six feet. Matter for transmission by Parcel Post must be open to inspection, and there must be no correspondence enclosed.

C. O. D.

Mail matter, posted at a Money Order Post Office in Canada for delivery at any Post Office in Canada, or on any rural route within the same, may be sent C.O.D. (Collect on Delivery), whereby charges due the sender up to \$100 may be collected from the addressee, and remitted to the sender by the Post Office Money Order Routes are for this purpose considered as Money Order Post Offices and may be granted a C.O.D. service.

C.O.D. fees are: 15 cents, if the amount to be collected is not more than \$50.00; 30 cents if the amount to be collected is more than \$50.00 and not more than \$100.00.

Parcels for delivery within Canada, China, Germany, Great Britain (including Northern Ireland), Grenada, Holland, Hong Kong, Irish Free State, Newfoundland, New Zealand, and the United States. Parcels sent by parcel post may not be registered, but may be insured against loss, rifling or damage. Information as to insurance fees, etc., can be obtained at any Post Office. General merchandise (parcel post), etc., may be sent to the United States at the rate of fourteen cents per pound or fraction thereof with the proviso that the maximum charge on any package of merchandise up to 8 oz. shall not exceed one cent an ounce and the limit of weight for packages of merchandise exchanged between Canada and the United States is 15 lbs. Such matter is subject to customs examination on arrival in the country of destination, and to the collection of any duty to which it may be found to be liable. The United States Post Office Department collects 5 cts. as a delivery fee on a parcel post parcel sent from Canada for delivery in the United States.

The United States authorities require that a Customs Declaration be attached to all parcels of general merchandise (parcel post) prepaid at parcel post rates, posted in Canada addressed for delivery in the United States, except packages of merchandise weighing 8 ounces or less, paid at the rate of 1 cent for each ounce or fraction thereof, in which a Customs Declaration or invoice should be enclosed.

They further require that commercial invoices or statements of value be enclosed with books prepaid at printed matter rates, also in sealed parcels of general merchandise prepaid at letter rate, posted in Canada addressed for delivery in the United States.

Such matter when addressed to the United States should be open to inspection, in the manner described in the regulations concerning domestic Parcel Post. However, sealed parcels of general merchandise (parcel post) may be accepted for transmission provided the sender has placed thereon a printed label or an impression of a rubber stamp giving the name and address of the sender and stating in a general way the nature of the contents.

General merchandise (parcel post) addressed to the United States may be accepted for insurance under the same terms and conditions as apply to parcels posted for delivery within Canada. The rate of insurance fees is the same as for Canada.

Registration.—Every article intended for registration must be handed in at the wicket, and a receipt obtained therefor. The fee on all classes of articles (except parcels of merchandise by parcel post) addressed to countries to which matter may be registered is ten cents.

The sender of a registered article addressed to any place in Canada or to any Postal Union country may entitle himself to a certificate as to the receipt of the said article by the Postmaster at the office addressed, on prepayment of an additional fee of 10 cents. All classes of matter except Parcel Post packages may be registered to places in Canada, United States and most other countries.

The public are reminded that registered letters are only carried on train and accompanied by railway mail clerk. Hence a registered letter and an ordinary letter posted simultaneously will often be received at different times.

PARCEL POST TO GREAT BRITAIN AND OTHER COUNTRIES

Closed parcels may be sent direct from Canada at the rate of 25 cents for the first pound and 10 cents for each additional pound to Great Britain (including Northern Ireland); at the rate of 12 cents for each pound or fraction thereof to Argentina, Bahamas, Barbados, Bermuda, Colombia, Fiji, British Guiana, Grenada, British Honduras, Hong Kong, Luzon, Loosvards Islands, Newfoundland, New Zealand, St. Lucia, St. Pierre and Miquelon, St. Vincent, Trinidad and Tobago, Venezuela and West-Hal-Wei; at the rate of 24 cents for the first pound and 12 cents for each additional pound or fraction thereof to Australia.

There are also direct post services to China, Belgium, Denmark, France, Germany, Holland, Irish Free State, Italy, Japan, Mexico, Norway, Poland, South Africa and Sweden, and the rates may be obtained at the Post Office.

Parcels for the British West Indies, Cuba, Dominican Republic, Dutch West Indies, French West Indies, Haiti and Central and South American countries may be forwarded via New York City.

Parcels may also be sent to and received from any country with which the British Post Office maintains a parcel post service. For rates enquire at the Post Office.

LIMITS OF WEIGHT AND SIZE.

General limit of weight—11 lbs.

Limit of weight to Bahamas, Barbados, Belgium, Bermuda, British Honduras, China, Denmark, France, Germany, Great Britain (including Northern Ireland), Holland, Jamaica, New Zealand, Newfoundland, New Zealand, Poland, St. Lucia, St. Vincent, Samoa (Savaii and Opolu Islands) (Asia), Sweden, Trinidad and Tobago and United States: 15 lbs.

Limit of size: 3½ feet in length, width or depth, but in no case must the length and girth combined exceed 6 feet.

Prohibited Articles and Publications.—Explosive, dangerous or destructive substance, or liquid, or any matter likely to injure useful contents of the mails, or the person of any officer or servant of the Post Office. Liquid Celluloid is prohibited, but celluloid in other forms may be sent by post in bulk, provided it is packed with reasonable care and labelled—"Celluloid"—Inflammable. There is no restriction upon the circulation of cards, calendars, etc., made of celluloid when they are sent singly.

There is no war tax on Postal Notes. Postal Notes are payable only in Canada and Newfoundland, and should not be remitted to other countries.

Odd cents may be made up by affixing Canadian Postage Stamps, not exceeding nine cents in value, to the face of the Postal Note.

Postal Notes are payable at any Money Order or Postal Note office in Canada, and at all Post Offices in Newfoundland.

MONEY ORDERS.

(A war tax of 2 cents, in addition to the commission, must be paid on each Money Order for a sum over \$10.)

Owing to fluctuation in the value of the £ sterling, it is impossible to furnish a fixed table of conversion showing the amounts in Canadian money to be paid by remitters for £ sterling in the United Kingdom, British Colonies and Countries advised via England.

Information as to the rate of conversion in force from time to time can be obtained at any Post Office authorized to transmit Money Order business.
